An 'A' for Nashua-Plainfield CONGRESSMAN SAYS STUDENTS HE MET ARE GOING TO BE 'GREAT LEADERS'

Randy Feenstra wants to let you know that he's got your back.

The freshman United States Congressman visited Nashua-Plainfield High School last Friday in a planned tour of Iowa's 4th Feenstra. Congressional District. The 37-county area he

represents reaches as far east as Chickasaw grad was a former Iowa Senator for 12 years County and spans all of northwest Iowa – where Feenstra was born in raised in Hull.

"It's just great to be at the high school here. Nashua-Plainfield High School has just trying to climb out of the depths of the COVIDbeen incredible. The kids that we've met today, you can tell that they're great leaders," said

Feenstra understands the plight and difficult times that Iowans are facing. The nation is still 19 pandemic, which has been a large reason that inflation has skyrocketed.

"You have to remember they have a new mayor and a new council," Hemann said. "But if this does happen - if we go from 240 to 200 then obviously the revenue in this budget will be reduced."

Supervisors earlier in January approved having Hemann present the Nashua City Council a proposed one-year contract for 240 hours a month of service.

In December, the old Nashua City Council seemed receptive to a contract with 240 hours a month of service, especially when it learned that the county will discontinue charging Nashua for dispatching services because the city no longer has its own police department.

Even with a rate increase to \$59.50 per hour, Hemann has pointed out that the city would pay the county about \$3,000 less during the 2022-23 budget year than it will this year.

N-P student helps the 'Ghost Army' receive its Gold Medal

Sinnwell ecstatic after Biden signs bill honoring units that deceived German forces in WW II

When Caleb Sinnwell heard the news on Tuesday that President Joe Biden had signed the law bestowing the Congressional Gold Medal on

World War "Ghost II's Army," he was, in word. а pumped. "I think I was more excited than

I won National History Day," said the Nashua-Plainfield High School freshman who played a role in giving the Ghost Army the recognition he believed it so richly deserved. "To me, it's all about those guys, who did so much during the war, came home and never could

talk about it. That's why I'm pumped."

Sinnwell's 2021 History Day national championship project - a website titled "Ghost Army: Deceptive Communication and the Power of Illusion" focused on the work done by the 23rd Headquarters Special Troops and the 3133rd Signal Service Company during World War II.

As he worked on his website, he interviewed author Rick Beyer, who has worked on the Ghost Army Legacy Project for the past seven years, and Beyer last spring asked Sinnwell to help his organization lobby U.S. senators to approve the bill that had languished for several years after the U.S. House of Representatives approved the measure.

At the time, Sinnwell was a 14-year-old eight-grader, but

Sinnwell ecstatic for **Ghost Army veterans**

his answer was a resounding "sure."

"I was a little nervous the first couple of times," Sinnwell said with a laugh Thursday morning, "but it's something I really believed in. I just thought it was something really important that had to be done.'

He contacted a number of senators and got several — including Iowa's Charles Grassley and Joni Ernst, as well as Mississippi's Cindy Hyde-Smith — to sign on to the bill, which passed the Senate last week. Because there were some slight differences to the House bill, the House also had to pass the bill, which it did before Biden signed it into law on Tuesday.

Sinnwell's National History Day advisor, Suzy Turner, said she wasn't surprised that her student was confident enough to talk to some of the most powerful people in the county when it came to the Ghost Army.

"Caleb, for his age, has talked to some pretty 'big names,' if you will, for his History Day projects so he's had that experience," she said, pointing out that Sinnwell interviewed U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack for a website he did on

helped famine-stricken Japan more than 60 years ago. "It's also something he's really passionate about, and I'm just so proud of him and his contribution to this Gold Medal."

The Ghost Army saved thousands of Allied lives because it used deception to confuse German troops into first believing that the D-Day landings would take place north of Normandy and then later by deceiving the Germans that a large army – which in reality was made up of soldiers manning inflatable tanks and using audio and other misinformation – was about to attack once the Allies had landed in France.

Grassley, during an appearance in Nashua last fall, said that Sinnwell provided a convincing argument.

"Representative government is a two-way street," Grassley said. "It is the essence of representative government. He made his case to me, and trust me, he made a very good case."

Sinnwell said Thursday he was especially happy that the Gold Medal was bestowed while there were still members of the Ghost Army alive.

> and they've waited a long, long time to get this recognition. They deserve this; it's the highest award Congress gives, and for what they did during World War II, this was long overdue."

Beyer agreed, releasing a statement on Tuesday in which he expressed his gratitude to the men who fought their own kind of war in France more than 75 years ago.

"Armed with their wits and guile these men saved lives and helped win the war," he said. "Their story is an inspiration to all of us!"

At Nashua-Plainfield, meanwhile, Sinnwell is preparing his 2022 National History Day project - a website focused on the visit made by then-Soviet Union Premier Nikita Khrushchev to an Iowa farm owned by Roswell Garst.

"That's what I love about History Day," Sinnwell said. "It lets me explore things I'm really interested in. I love agriculture. I love veterans. And I love telling their stories."

Public Health head finds hope in latest COVID report

At first glance, the weekly report put out by the Chickasaw County Public Health and Homecare Services on COVID-19 doesn't offer a lot of hope when it comes to the area's recent virus surge.

But said administrator, Lisa Welter, will beg to differ.

Yes, the latest report showed the county had 117 positive tests for COVID, marking the third straight week of triple-digit positives.

Welter, though, pointed out that the 117 positive cases was down from the 138 in her preceding report, but more importantly, because she didn't release the report until Monday, the 117 positive tests came over a 10-day period, instead of the normal seven days.

"If you take the average per day, that's definitely a move in the direction we want to be going," Welter said, "but saying that, obviously we still have a long way to go to where we want deaths because of COVID.

We still have to do our part, and that means following all the guidelines – stay home if vou've tested positive, wear a mask for five days after you're done with your quarantine and please, please, stay home if you're sick. ... At the very least, though, I have hope that we're trending the right way."

Her latest report showed that 62 of the latest positive tests were recorded in those who had been vaccinated and 18 of those residents had also received a boost vaccine.

But she again pointed out that in the vast majority of cases, those who have been vaccinated and "boosted" experience far less severe symptoms than those who haven't.

The county also crossed a threshold in the latest report in that since the first COVID case was found in Chickasaw County in April 2020, there have been more than 2,500 positive tests – 2,556 to be exact - recorded.

of these services. A child with hearing loss does not use their sense of hearing to develop speech like a child with typically developing hearing does. If verbal communication is the goal, a child with hearing loss must receive special treatment from a qualified SLP to help train the auditory nerve.

- For those who choose the journey in specialized auditory training, there are several reasons why starting this at a younger age is crucial. There are critical windows in development when children are most able to learn certain developmental skills. If an important window of opportunity for learning is missed, it becomes more difficult to develop these skills later in life. It is vital to help a baby/child with hearing loss learn to communicate and interact socially as soon as possible to prevent further complications down the road.
- Untreated hearing impairments can affect verbal speech and language development. Language development then affects reading development and other academic skills. Delays in these areas may affect an individual's success in participating in daily activities and within the community. For these reasons, early intervention for individuals with hearing loss is key, both for those who choose to receive auditory rehabilitation, and those who do not.

The proposed budget has expenditures of \$1,915,455, and Hemann said there were four main reasons for the increase, includ-

• Housing jail inmates in other counties. • Purchasing two new vehicles after not buying a vehicle in this budget year that ends June 30.

• Increase in wages.

• Increase in fuel costs.

Supervisor Jacob Hackman said he had concerns about the budget, but he supported it.

"This budget I am afraid is going to be [soon] over \$2 million," he said, "but we have to protect the citizens of Chickasaw County."

After making his presentation, Hemann said in the long run, the county will save money by housing some inmates outside the county.

Gallmeyer was a 70-year-old retired grocer who had moved to rural Nashua after selling his store in Clarksville.

At Patrie's first federal sentencing in June 2014, Gallmeyer's daughter, Marti Hornsby, said she appreciated the work done by local law enforcement on her father's case but also lashed out at Patrie.

"Why would anyone kill my dad? ... He was a good guy,' Hornsby said. "Everyone enjoyed his good humor and infectious laugh. My dad lost his life because of Randy Patrie's life of crime."

In a complaint and affidavit filed in federal court. law enforcement authorities said they discovered that Gallmeyer had suffered a gunshot wound to the head and that numerous items - including several firearms and a Samsung 40-inch flat-screen TV, had been taken from his home.

say that on July 4, 2013, the Charles City Police Department executed a search warrant at Patrie's residence in Charles City and that investigators from the Sheriff's Office and He added that his office the Iowa division of Criminal Investigation contacted Charles City police and obtained a copy of the items seized during the execution of the search warrant.

It was discovered that several of the items seized were items taken from Gallmeyer's home. They included three firearms, one of which, according to the affidavit was "consistent with the firearm used to kill" Gallmeyer.

An additional search warrant was then executed by the Sheriff's Office and the DCI at Patrie's home, and additional items belonging to Gallmeyer were located and seized. During the second search, officers discovered a Samsung 40-inch flatscreen TV mounted on the wall of Patrie's bedroom.

Hemann said on Tuesday that Patrie is currently incarcerated in a federal prison in New Jersey, but Hemann expects Patrie to be returned to Iowa within the next 30 days.

Young Munn comes up big for Huskies

have been the surprise of the meet for the Huskies.

N-P sophomore Hayden Munn (8-1) shot all the way up to the third highest step on the medal stand after his thirdplace finish.

Frost made an impassioned pitch for Munn at the seeding meeting prior to the start of the conference meet. The best he could come up with was a six seed.

"I couldn't get much respect for him in the seeding meeting," said Frost. "That was a big deal because we had some opposing coaches that were not happy that I was even fighting for a seed. I said this guy is the legit deal."

Munn's only loss of the day was to seventh-ranked Tanner Arjes of Central Springs in the quarterfinal round. Arjes pinned him in just 1:00, but Munn earned two pins and two hard-fought decisions by scores of 9-8 and 3-2.

Munn also proved that he could probably start for almost any other team beside N-P. Munn worked his way to 23 varsity wins a year ago as a freshman.

That's saying something because Frost's Huskies are loaded.

"We got guys in the lineup that can fill his spot. We took advantage of it today. Hayden Munn stepped up today and came ready to wrestle," said White, who worked three pins and a major decision en route to a conference championship and is now 42-9 on the year.

Nelson, ranked eighth and now 41-9 on the season, placed third at 138 pounds. He lost for a second time this year to second-ranked Clayton McDonough of Central Springs in the semis. McDonough has ripped through the competition in this his senior year and is 45-0.

"It's something that I think is going to help me grow," said Nelson. "That match is going to help me for sectionals, regional duals, districts."
