Nashua Public Library to offer a host of activities next week

If Nashua Public Library Heather Hackman and her staff have learned anything in the past two years, it is this: Change is not necessarily a

As the facility prepares for National Library Week that runs from Monday through Saturday, Hackman knows that this year's theme, "Connect with Your Library!," is not necessarily a goal but already a reality at the Nashua Public Library.

"Our patron usage has really gone through the roof in recent months," Hackman said, "and it's getting more utilized it seems every day. Families are coming back, check outs are high, people are really embracing the library and it's so exciting, especially after what we've been through the last two years.'

effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Many were closed for weeks during the spring of 2020 because of the virus, but many, including Nashua's, came up with unique ways to stay connected with their patrons.

"What we learned more than anything is you have to adapt to change," the library director said, "and you have to find a way, or ways, to make it work."

So the library came up with things like "curbside" pickup and home delivery, and although curbside pickup has now gone by the wayside, Hackman said that she still makes "house visits" to a handful of patrons.

"We still have some people who might be sick, who might be recovering from this or that, but they're homebound," she said. "At the same time, they still want to read, they still want a DVD, right? It's our way of staying connected

Still, normalcy is finally returning to the Nashua Public Library, and Hackman couldn't be happier.

It's one reason she's excited about the activities the library has planned for next week.

Through the first 22 days of March, Nashua had eight days of high temperatures either in the 50s or the 60s.

The final nine days, though, proved that Old Man Winter isn't quite ready to go into hibernation after a season in which he has been relatively lame.

And it's frustrating the heck out of us who want to go out and enjoy spring.

"I think we've been out one day since we started practice," Nashua-Plainfield High School golf coach Jeff Trost said, "and I don't know who's more frustrated — the kids or me. I get it that we haven't had much of a winter —

knock on wood — but can spring get here and soon?"

Trost isn't kidding about the "much-of-awinter" line; in fact, this is by far the least snowiest winter we've had in the last decade. The inch or so of snow that fell overnight on Wednesday gave Nashua a grand total of 16.4 inches of snow this season, continuing a threeyear trend of diminishing snowfall after the area recorded seven straight years of 40-plus

Iowa Sen. Waylon Brown (R-Osage) and Rep. Todd Prichard (D-Charles City) did a lot more listening than they did talking on Monday morning at a legislative update breakfast at Charles City's NIACC Center.

The Floyd County Farm Bureau, the Butler County REC and the Charles City Area Chamber of Commerce hosted the event, and about 40 people attended. Although the two local legislators were questioned on a wide variety of issues, most of the time was spent discussing the plans to build carbon dioxide pipelines through Floyd County.

"How many of you are directly impacted by this proposal?" Brown asked the crowd, and more than half of those attending raised their hands.

• Wednesday will be Kids Stuff Animal Sleep Over and Animal Craft Day. Stuffed animals can be dropped off anytime before 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday and picked up between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. the next day and patrons are reminded to bring only stuffed animals they can sleep without because those animals will enjoy story time, snacks, games and movies (sleep is optional for them!) with the librarians.

"We've had kids ask us if they can spend the night, too," Hackman said, "but we're going to limit it to the stuffed animals, OK?'

The library director couldn't help but laugh.

Mental health facility, county will part ways

Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors vote 3-2 to give Inspiring Lives a 90-day notice

A local mental health facility is in jeopardy of shutting its doors if the 15-bed unit can't come to a new agreement with the county on its current lease.

Inspiring Lives – a drug and alcohol treatment center formerly known as Prairie View Management – was given a 90-day notice to terminate its lease at the county's Heritage building on New Hampton's south side by June 30 of this year by the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors at Monday's meeting this week. The facility is located at 2275 South Linn Avenue in New

An email was sent to the county regarding the lease on March 22 and in that memo Inspiring Lives CEO/ Administrator Laura Pevton stated the \$2,000 monthly rent that the county came to a consensus on in a proposed new lease contract was not feasible with the facility's current budget. Inspiring Lives stated it would terminate its lease on Oct. 1, 2022.

In turn, the Board of Supervisors voted 3-2 to end that lease earlier than that proposed date with the required allowed time of 90 days or before the new Fiscal Year starts on June 30 – a little over three months from the time of Monday's meeting.

"There's so much to think about here, guys. The way I read the letter – they're done," said Board member Jacob Hackman. "I think they're out." Hackman said he thinks the

cost of the rent is the stumbling block in the center's reluctance to agree to the new lease. He also has concerns like the facility's water and sewer bill that came to over \$13,500 in a year.

"Maybe there's some issues we don't know about," said

Board member Jason Byrne made the motion to terminate the lease in three months and he was seconded by Steve Breitbach. Both board members, along with Tim Zoll, voted in favor of the motion. Hackman and Chair Matthew Kuhn were the nay votes.

"I'm kind of wondering if fer," said Kuhn.

The county was given a nine-page inventory list and Hackman said there are six sheets missing from when the center first provided copies of that list well over eight years

"That's going to become critical if they are actually terminating the lease," said Hackman. "We're missing some stuff."

Hackman said the facil-

ity is losing approximately \$165,000 annually and brought in a total income of \$1 million last year, but spent close to \$1.2 million.

There are several options the county could do with the property and building that is valued at over \$2 million and lists contents inside the structure at One would be for the coun-

ty to sell the property along with the building on the acreage

"Do we capital project this and remodel it for county use?" said Hackman. Hackman wondered why the

this building," said Hackman. 'Why can't that be an expense that the region pays?" Chickasaw County Attorney David Laudner also seemed

perplexed with the email sent

last week from Inspiring Lives. "It's a two-page letter and all but two sentences are about the process itself and procedural issues and not addressing the issue at hand – which is whether you want to pay it or not," said Laudner.

Laudner said he was disappointed in the tone of the letter, which he thought berated the process, and by a lack of suggestions from the mental health

"If you're really serious about keeping it open and doing what's best for the region and for your business and for your non-profit – one would have expected the letter would have said, 'Would you take \$1,000 or would you take \$1,500?" said Laudner.

The County Attorney also stated the center could have addressed the Board and described success stories that the facility has been able to orchestrate with its past or current residents - how their lives were changed for the bet-

Those pleas or suggestions, he said, may help negotiations to possibly continue the lease.

"There's none of that. There's absolutely zero of that," said

There are many questions meeting – one of them is where will the patients at the facility go if the center shuts down?

"I don't know where these individuals have to go. I don't know how many people are out there today. I think the number Action Corporation moves every single day," said Hackman. "Are we gonna get a black eye because the state's trying to make roads right now to get more beds for mental

RAGBRAI returning to area this summer

Annual bike ride will make its way through Floyd and Chickasaw counties in July

RAGBRAI's ride through Chickasaw County this summer has been discussed by mayors and law enforcement personnel for almost a month, but until Sunday, the return of Iowa's biggest bike ride wasn't official.

The full route for the Register's Annual Great Bike Ride Across Iowa was published in the Sunday edition of the Des Moines Register, and the Friday, July 29, ride between Charles City and West Union will feature Ionia, New Hampton, Waucoma and Hawkeye as pass-through towns while the so-called "meeting town" will be Lawler on the ride's penultimate day.

Three companies have said they will seek a state permit to build hazardous liquid pipelines to carry captured carbon dioxide away for underground storage, and they will likely ask the Iowa Utilities Board to grant them the ability to use eminent domain to force easements with property owners who refuse to grant access voluntarily. Summit Carbon Solutions has already officially applied for a permit, with the right to use eminent domain.

Prichard said the Iowa House has passed a measure that would not allow any eminent domain hearing until next February. The Senate and governor would also need to approve it for it to take effect.

Many of those in attendance Monday were adamant that they didn't think the private pipeline companies should be granted the authority to use eminent domain. "Who benefits from this? No one local-

ly," said one Floyd County farmer. "If you follow the money, the money isn't staying here. The money is going elsewhere." Both Prichard and Brown said they were in agreement with those who were against

He said that the state needs to offer more amenities as well as do a better job of highlighting the positive.

"We don't have the nightlife here, but what we do have is great water trails, bike trails, and the ability to get out and enjoy nature," Brown said. WHEREAS, Iowa Code Section 422D.1 authorizes the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors to declare emergency medical services an essential county service and, as a result, offer for voter approval the authorization to impose an ad valorem property tax not to exceed seventy-five cents per one thousand dollars of assessed value on all taxable property within Chickasaw County with revenues from said tax used to fund the essential county service; and WHEREAS, the Chickasaw County

Board of Supervisors desires to establish a county emergency medical services system advisory council in accordance with Iowa Code Section 422D.1(2) that will coordinate efforts with the local emergency medical services agencies to assist in researching and assessing the service needs of Chickasaw County and also recommend to the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors an amount of funding to be specified on the ballot;

WHEREAS, revenues from the ad valorem property tax shall be deposited into an emergency medical services trust fund pursuant to Iowa Code Section 422D.1(4), and used only for those emergency medical services costs directly related to the essential county service as listed within Iowa Code Section 422D.6;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED that pursuant to Iowa Code Section 422D.1, the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors declares that in order to maintain the health and welfare of the citizens of Chickasaw County, emergency medical services are an es-

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in accordance with Iowa Code Section 422D.1(2)(a), the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors will consider and vote upon final approval of this Resolution on Monday, June 6, 2022, at the

regular business meeting that takes place in the boardroom on the second floor of the Chickasaw County Courthouse and that begins at 9:00 a.m.; the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors also will consider and vote upon final approval of this Resolution at regular business meetings that occur at the same place and time on both Monday, June 13, 2022, and Monday, June 20, 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon the third and final approval of this Resolution by the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors at the regular business meeting on Monday, June 20, 2022, a Chickasaw County Emergency Medical Services System Advisory Council will be established, and said organization will be directed to recommend to the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors no later than August 2, 2022, the amount needed to fund the essential county service pursuant to Iowa Code Sections BE ÌT FURTHER RESOLVED that

after receiving the recommendation from the Chickasaw County Emergency Medical Services System Advisory Council, in accordance with Iowa Code Sections 422D.5 and 422D.1(5), the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors then will prepare the Question for voter approval. which will state publicly the reason for imposing the tax, the amount needed to fund the essential county service, and the proposed ad valorem property tax rate—that shall not exceed seventy-five cents per one thousand dollars of assessed value, be set so as to raise only the amount needed to fund the essential county service, and be for a maximum

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that after the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors prepares the Question for voter approval, the Chickasaw County Auditor

then will be directed to publish notice of the same in the official newspaper of record on or before September 8, 2022. and also place the Question for voter approval on the ballot for the November 8. 2022, general election pursuant to Iowa

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if sixty percent of those voting on the Question for voter approval vote in favor of the Question, the ad valorem property tax then will be imposed for property taxes due and payable in fiscal years beginning after the fiscal year in which the election was held in accordance with

Iowa Code Section 422D.1(3); and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the Question for voter approval is approved, revenues from the ad valorem property tax will be deposited into an emergency medical services trust fund pursuant to Iowa Code Section 422D.1(4), and used exclusively for those emergency medical services costs directly related to the essential county service as listed within Iowa Code Section 422D.6; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the event the Question for voter approval fails at the November 8, 2022. general election, then this Resolution shall be deemed void pursuant to Iowa Code Section 422D.1(2)(d); and

track debut at St. Ansgar was called off on Tuesday, when the high temperature was a chilly 35 degrees and the Huskies' golf opener in Charles City this coming Monday hinges on this weekend's weather forecast, which does include that four-letter "S" word for Friday night and Saturday morning. Yet, for those of us who have

an aversion to shoveling, this has been a winter to enjoy. As forecasters at the National

Weather Service office in La Crosse, Wisconsin — which provides coverage to Chickasaw County — have put it, the big snowfalls have either veered to the north or stayed to the south. Yet, winter-like weather - at

least late winter-like weather remains in the forecast until at least early next week when we'll finally get back into the 50s,

albeit with rain chances both Tuesday and Wednesday. However, unless we have a

repeat of an April like 2018, we're going to finish the season with far below normal snowfall. In a typical year, the area gets about 33 inches of snow, which means we'd need 17 inches of snowfall in April to get to nor-That's unlikely, but then

again, four years ago, we saw almost 17 inches of snow fall in April so we're not out of the woods yet. The good news is this: We've

gotten enough precipitation this past month to alleviate our drought situation; in fact, according to the most recent U.S. Drought Monitor report that came out on Thursday, almost all of Chickasaw County is "normal."

The extreme southwestern part of the county is classified as "abnormally dry" as is most of Bremer County while Floyd and Butler counties are either "abnormally dry" or still suffering "moderate drought" condi-

N-P ready to take golf game outside

Huskies set to open 2022 golf season with a meet at Charles City on Monday

Nashua-Plainfield's golfers are itching to get outside. So is their coach. And hopefully, knock on

wood, they'll get to do just that on Monday when the Huskies are scheduled to open the 2022 season with a meet at Charles City's Cedar Ridge Golf Course. What that will look like is

anyone's guess," said veteran coach Jeff Trost, who is entering his 43rd year leading the Huskies' golf program. "We have a nice mix — some veterans, some newcomers — on our teams, but boy, we just haven't been outside enough to get a real good gauge on where we're at.' Still, Trost is thankful that

his team has the use of the Husky Wellness Center, where Nashua-Plainfield golfers have spent the bulk of their time since practice opened on March 14.

We work on swings, we

work on putting strokes so they get it going on a line, and we work on the consistency of the stroke," Trost said, "and don't get me wrong, that's all important. But you also need to get outside to see where you're really at."

When they do finally get outside, the Huskies will see some changes from a year ago.

To start with, the Nashua-Plainfield girls will have team scores this year after having only three players out a year ago. In high school golf, teams can have up to seven players on the course, and the four lowest scores count, so if a team doesn't have four golfers, it doesn't get to record a team score.

"I think it's important to have that team aspect," Trost said. "For each of our girls this year, it's not just playing for herself like last year but it's also playing for the team. I think there's a little more motivation to play better
