Patrie pleads not guilty to murder

Trial for man accused of killing retired grocer in rural Nashua set for January '23

The man accused of murdering a retired grocer in rural Nashua almost a decade ago has pleaded not guilty to first-degree murder charges, and his trial is slated to be held early next year.

In court filings last week, 39-year-old Randy Patrie, who is being charged with the murder of Kenneth

Gallmeyer in September 2012, also waived his right to a speedy trial.

Patrie's arraignment in Chickasaw County District Court was scheduled for Tuesday, but instead of making his first appearance in court, he and his lawyer, Steven J. Drahozal, filed a written arraignment on Monday, April 11, in which Patrie pleaded not guilty.

Three days later, Patrie waived his right to a speedy trial, although

under state law, he can rescind that waiver at any time.

If Patrie had not waived his right to a speedy trial, he would have had to be tried within 90 days of his indictment.

On Wednesday, Chickasaw County Court Judge Richard Stochl set Patrie's trial date for Jan. 23, 2023.

Patrie is accused of killing Gallmeyer in the former grocer's

rural Nashua home in September 2012.

Gallmeyer's body was discovered by Chickasaw County Sheriff's Office deputies when they were called do a welfare check at his home north of Nashua on Oct. 4, 2012.

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Supervisors OK with feasibility study for jail

ARPA funds will be used to study future of Chickasaw County facility

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors moved ahead Monday with a plan to conduct a feasibility study on the future of the Chickasaw County Jail, which the county's sheriff and his staff readily admit is, in a word, antiquated.

Supervisors heard a proposal from Chickasaw County Sheriff Marty Hemann and two of his deputies, Ryan Shawver and Jordan Gansen, during Monday's meeting in which the law-enforcement officers asked the board to use American Rescue Plan Act, better known as ARPA, funds to pay for the study that they said will cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

Hemann told supervisors that the current jail has a number of issues and that the county has been told by the state jail inspector that county has "maintained a good, older facility, but due to the age of the facility, Chickasaw County is encouraged to develop and implement a five-to-10-year plan of action to adequately, effectively and efficiently address any major maintenance concerns."

He told the board that there are a number of safety concerns the inspector has about the jail and that the 65-year-old facility doesn't allow the Sheriff's Office to have enough "classification"

Board chair touts live streaming, new county website

The chairman of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors puts it pretty succinctly when it comes to why he and his fellow board members are now "live streaming" their meetings.

"It's about transparency," Matt Kuhn said, "and it's about involving county residents who can't always come to a meeting to have a chance to see what we're doing."

And Kuhn said that transparency is also the reason that the Board of Supervisors earlier this year approved using federal American Recovery Plan Act to create a new website for the county.

Start with the live streaming of meetings. The Board of Supervisors began doing so earlier this year, spending a little less than a \$1,000 for a device called a "Meeting Owl Pro" — a device that provides a 360-degree camera, microphone and speaker device — that allows

Nashua City Council receives updates on Greeley St. Project

The Nashua City Council received good news at last Monday's meeting regarding the \$2.3 million Greeley St. Project that is scheduled to break ground in the spring of 2023.

Jon Lutz, an engineer on the project, let council members know that the \$500,000 STBG (Surface Transportation Block Grant) that the city was awarded a few years back for a future project can be utilized for the Greeley St. Project.

Nashua has also applied for almost \$400,000 in CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) funds that could go toward the project as well. The city is also working on obtaining a SRF (State Revolving Fund) loan of almost \$500,000. Nashua plans on using \$975,000 in municipal bonds to help with the cost of the street work as

well.

The bids for the contract will begin this fall and work will focus on 1,800 linear feet of roadway that will replace the water main, storm sewer and sanitary sewer. The roadway profile will be lowered and the adjacent ditches will also be filled in. Temporary storage will be constructed in some boulevard areas along the corridor. This will prevent erosion in the ditches, promote infiltration and minimize the flooding to the surrounding properties.

Council member Rhonda Dean also came up with an idea for the community and its citizens to be able to interact with the Nashua City Council in what will be called "Coffee with the Council." The plan is for two Council members to meet at the Nashua Library on the second Saturday of each month from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. to discuss events, projects, plans or anything else citizens

would like to talk about. The first planned gathering will be Saturday, May 14 from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m. and everyone is welcome to attend.

City leaders also unanimously voted on moving Chickasaw County elections from the Welcome Center to City Hall. There was talk about moving the elections to the fire station, but there was no motion by a Council member to move that action forward.

City Clerk John Ott brought to the attention of the Council that some citizens are having an issue with bright lights shining into their homes across Cedar Lake. The light was put in place for an ice skating rink. Council member Hal Kelleher explained that a timer will be put on the light and the bulb will be changed. The angle of the light will also be adjusted.

The Council accepted the resignation of Nashua Deputy Clerk Beth Henningsen.

board meetings to be aired on YouTube.

Supervisors worked out several kinks in the system and are also considering adding individual microphones for each of the board’s members, but the reviews so far have been positive.

“We’ve heard some good feedback that people appreciate that they can attend a meeting without necessarily coming to the courthouse,” Kuhn said. “I think it’s a good way to involve our citizens in what we’re doing, what we’re deciding.”

And Kuhn also pointed out that even if residents miss a

ings through the county website.

“You can’t go to YouTube and type in ‘Chickasaw County,’ for example,” he said.

Kuhn said that one of his goals was to expand the live streaming to other meetings, like a number of autonomous boards the county has.

The board chairman also said he was excited last Friday to open his browser and see the new website up and running. In December, the Board of Supervisors agreed to spend \$25,000 of ARPA funds to create a better and more efficient website.

“I’d say the big thing is that the new site is just way more user friendly than our old site was,” he said. “And the other thing is we just have way more information on it now than we did before.”

Murder defendant is currently being held in Fayette County Jail

federal court to possession of firearms by a felon as an armed career criminal and possession of sawed-off shotguns and was sentenced to life in prison, but that sentence was later overturned and he was given a 20-year prison sentence.

Chickasaw County Sheriff Marty Hemann said in February that once the life sentence was overturned, his office’s goal was to build a murder case against Patrie and have him tried in state court.

Patrie was returned to Iowa from a federal prison in New Jersey last month and is currently being held at the Fayette

County Jail because Hemann said that facility is certified to hold federal prisoners and is also better suited than the Chickasaw County Jail to house an inmate like Patrie.

Patrie’s arraignment was originally scheduled for April 5 but was pushed back after Aaron Hawbaker, a public defender from Waterloo, withdrew from the case, citing a “conflict of interest.” Drahozal, a public defender from Dubuque, was subsequently appointed to represent Patrie.

Chickasaw County Attorney David Laudner will assist Doug Hammerand of the Iowa Attorney General’s Special Prosecution Office with the case.

areas for different kinds of inmates.

“We’re taking a structure that was built in 1957 and we’re trying to make the updates,” he said, “but there are still some things we can not be improved [including], like Ryan said, the classifications. We have A, B and C, when we probably need D, E, F, G.”

Hemann and his deputies said they felt that the first step was to conduct a feasibility study, one that Shawver said will cover a variety of topics — ranging from the status of the current facility to the costs of building a new jail to the possibility of entering a 28E agreement with another county to use its jail to the possibility of having a facility in the county that would serve only as a “24-hour holding” facility.

“The building over there is old. ... It’s no secret that the rest of the facility is not what a law-enforcement facility should be, it was designed to be a house,” Shawver said of the current jail. “I think with the one-time money that I don’t think we’ll ever see again, this is an opportunity to get some answers.”

He added that how the Board of Supervisors uses the feasibility study would be up to its members.

“It will answer all those questions,” he said. “It will give us options — say a 22-bed facility, a 14-bed facility, or an eight- or 10-bed 24 hour hold facility. ... We can proceed to move ahead with one of those or you can sit on them and say thank you. But it will give us something to work with, it will answer a lot of questions.”

Board of Supervisors Chairman Matt Kuhn said that “I think the feasibility study has to be done,” and his fellow supervisors agreed.

Also in attendance at Monday’s meeting was New Hampton Police Chief Zach Nobsch, who said that one possibility would be for the county and city to come together to house both his department and the Chickasaw County Sheriff’s Office in a new law enforcement center.

“We’ve had informal discussion with him and the city people,” Hemann said, “because their facility is also not up to date either.”

One possibility, the officers said, would be to have the

county build a law-enforcement center and have the city lease space.

Supervisor Jake Hackman, though, said before moving ahead with a project of that scope, he would want guarantees that the city would participate. He pointed to Floyd County, where at one time the county’s new jail was also going to include a “government center” in which the city of Charles City and the county would have offices but the city eventually backed out.

“Zach, I appreciate your comments,” Hackman said, “but I don’t want to be in the same boat as what happened in Floyd County.”

Still, supervisors were willing to move ahead with the feasibility study, which Shawver said would begin with construction management firms presenting the Board of Supervisors with their proposals for how they would conduct a feasibility study. After hearing from those firms, the board could then decide which company to use and move forward.

But the law-enforcement officers added, as Gansen put it, that the current jail “is on borrowed time” with state inspectors so the feasibility study is urgently needed.

Chickasaw County Attorney David Laudner agreed.

“We had a female defense attorney up here who indicated that she was nervous to go meet with her client to break him some bad news because of the structure of our jail,” he said. “And she actually said I’m hoping he gets transferred to a different jail so I can meet with him there. ... I’ve been over there a lot, and I feel it’s odd that you have to get buzzed to come and see me [at the County Attorney’s Office] but you don’t have to be buzzed to get into [the Sheriff’s Office].”

Laudner added that he believes Hemann and his staff do an excellent job with the building they have.

“I’m not saying it’s unsafe,” he said. “I’m just saying it could be a lot more efficient, a lot more safe.”

The supervisors agreed, but they also wanted to make sure that the feasibility study would give the county a variety of options, and the law-enforcement officers said it would.

“We want as many options as they can give us,” Hemann said, “so that you guys can make the best decision for the county.”

Soil temperature map is available

Soil temperature is one of the most important factors crop farmers use to guide their planting decisions. The rule of thumb is to wait until the upper 4 inches reach at least 50 degrees Fahrenheit, with a warming trend in the forecast.

One way farmers can keep track of soil temperature in their county is by using the soil temperatures map compiled by the Iowa Environmental Mesonet at Iowa State University. Updated daily in the spring, this map provides current and historical soil temperatures for each county in Iowa.

Daily fluctuations are common, especially in early spring. Historically, the optimum planting window for Iowa corn has been April 11 to May 18, with a shorter window in the northern part of the state compared to the south. The risk for a heavy frost (temperature below 28 F) remains above the 50th percentile until about mid-April.

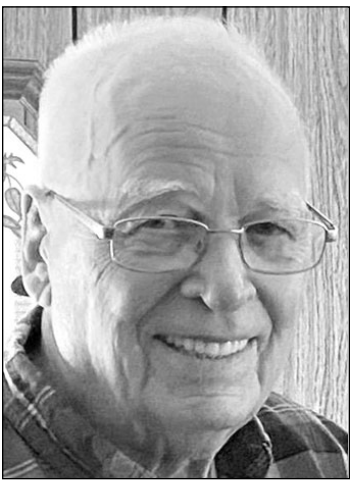

CITY COUNCIL MINUTES
City Council Chambers, City Hall
The Nashua City Council met in regular session on April 18, 2022 in Council Chambers at City Hall. The meeting was called to order at 7:00PM with Mayor Anthofer presiding. Council members present were Rhonda Dean, Samantha Johnson, Hal Kelleher, Tim Malven, and Ernie Willsher. City employee(s) City Clerk John Ott was present along with Water/Waste Water Superintendent Nick Henningsen. Jon Lutz and John Berns from Origin Design were also present along with Chickasaw County Auditor Stephanie Maschek and Election Official Laura Wickham. There were also 3 guests in attendance. Mayor Anthofer asked for consideration approving the agenda. Malven/M, Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes. Mayor Anthofer asked for public comments. City Clerk Ott expressed some concerns that citizens are having with the bright lights shining into their homes across the lake. The light was put in for the ice-skating rink. Kelleher explained that they are going to put a timer on the light, change the bulb and adjust the angle, but was unsure of a timeframe. Another citizen inquired about driving their golf cart across the bridge on 346. The council informed the citizen that this was a state law that prevents them from being able to drive on the bridge. Laura Wickham and Stephanie Maschek from Chickasaw County were there to explain to the council why they wanted the election polling place moved to the Fire Station from the Welcome Center, after discussion; Dean/M to move the Chickasaw County Polling Location to City Hall rather than the Fire Station. Malven/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes. Resolution 22-24 Approving Chickasaw County Using the Fire Station as a Polling Location died as there was no motion to move it forward. Jon Lutz gave an update on the Greeley St. project and informed the council that the \$500,000 STBG grant that was awarded for FY'23 is going to account for some of the needed funding. The city has applied for an additional \$397,000 in CDBG funds in which we will have two chances to be awarded those funds (April and July). The contract bidding will start in the Fall of '22 and work will begin in the Spring of '23. Department Reports:
City Clerk Ott informed the council that March bank reconciliation has been completed and is ready for council to review. He also presented the March Financial reports.

City Council
Kelleher mentioned that the campground opening has been postponed due to weather. He thanked everyone who volunteered for cleanup day. Council Member Dean expressed that she would like there to be more communication with the citizens and so she suggested doing a "Coffee with the Council" where 2 council members meet at the library on the 2nd Saturday each month from 10AM-11AM to discuss events, projects, plans, or anything else with the citizens. The first one will be Saturday May 14th from 10-11AM. Everyone is welcome.

Nick Henningsen Water/Waste Water Superintendent gave his monthly report. He explained to the council that once the clarifier gets fixed the city will get an order from the EPA on what needs to be fixed and the city will have to begin fixing whatever the EPA has in the order. He thinks from their discussion it will be fixing rainwater getting into the sewers, which can be fixed by relining sewers and sealing manholes. Some of this issue will also be addressed with the Greeley St. project.

Heather Hackman presented a monthly report for the council to review. Action/Discussion:
The council discussed several topics and bids. The council discussed the proposal for street cut repairs which was \$18,575.22 (of those \$12,293.23 are private repairs that will be reimbursed to the city). Dean motioned to approve the proposal with the possible addition of the street cut on Wentling St. Kelleher/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes. The council discussed the repairs of the boat ramps as well as Phase 1.9 of the electrical repairs needed at the campground. Dean/M to give the two estimates to the Park Board and see what they would prioritize to get done. Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes. The council discussed the bid for painting the welcome center. Dean/M to table the estimate because we are currently in the process of getting the elevator fixed and she wanted to see how much that was going to cost. Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes. The council discussed approving the Mosquito Control of Iowa Contract to spray for mosquitoes. The contract did not mention a minimum number of times they would spray and so Dean/M to table approving the contract until we get more information on a minimum number of times they would spray as well as better communication with the city on when they were going to be in town spraying. Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes.

Malven/M to approve the ICAP Contract for Property and Liability insurance at a cost of \$42,546 a 9% increase over the prior year. Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes.

The council discussed hiring a new cleaning crew for City Hall and the Welcome Center. The cost is \$30/hour for Trina's Helpful Housecleaning. Malven/M, Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes.

The council discussed posting the job opening for Deputy Clerk. After discussion, Johnson/M to have a workshop April 27th at 6:00PM, to discuss the Deputy Clerk position further. Malven/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes.

The council discussed allowing

WODD (Water Over the Dam Days) donations to be collected at City Hall. Kelleher motioned to allow donations to be collected at City Hall. Johnson/S, M/C, RC: All Ayes.

Action/discussion on moving handicapped signs for food trucks was removed.

Other Business

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Husky golfers take on N-K, CS

Nashua-Plainfield improves six strokes from last meet

It's not a one-size-fits all improvement plan for the Nashua-Plainfield boys golf team.

Each linkster for Jeff Trost's Top of Iowa squad brings a different set of skills to the course, which requires specific attention to hone in on what needs to be fixed to become consistently successful.

That's the competitive nature and willingness to learn that Trost has been able to unearth and instill in his golfers in the 43 years he has guided the Husky program.

"Everybody's gotta work at something different," said Trost. "That's where the dedication comes in and the discipline of working on the things that you need to work on."

His Huskies are getting there. N-P improved by six strokes from its last home meet when it tangled with conference rivals Northwood-Kensett and Cenral Springs on Tuesday at home.

The Panthers took home the team title with a 183 and saw Drew Wilder blister the Nashua Town and Country Club with a two-over par 37 to run away with medalist honors.

N-P shot a 207 last week in its home-opening triangular against North Butler and St. Ansgar. This time around, the Huskies came into the clubhouse with tally of 201 in their third meet of the season.

Once again, N-P was led by senior Trey Nelson, who carded a 44. Fellow senior Drew Rodruck lowered his score by six strokes since the last time he played his home course. That saw him card a 47. Trost's other senior on his 2022 roster — Bryce Anderson — shot a 56.

Together — all three seniors are trying to lead the way on a team that seems to be gaining momentum each and every week.

"They work at it. They want to get better," said Trost. "They give a good, solid foundation as a team. You always need that."

That's key for N-P at this juncture of the season — taking incremental steps toward polishing golf games that could look a lot different in May.

"If you're peaking in early April then we've got bigger problems," said Trost. "We've got to keep getting better. That's the goal of the whole thing."

The proof is in the pudding for some of Trost's younger, more inexperienced linksters.

N-P sophomore Devon Griffin lowered his score to 55. He shot a 65 in his previous round. Husky freshman Cal Levi also fired a 55 on Tuesday.

That's a nine-stroke improvement from last week's meet.

"It's always good to see when they do remarkably better than they have," said Trost. "They feel good about it. They feel good about themselves. That inspires them to come out and keep working at it. Now the key is to not go back the other way."

Rounding out the scores for N-P were Dawson Glaser's 59, Ty Berger's 62 and Kendrick

Huck's 68.

"When it comes time for tournaments, we want to be playing our best golf at that point," said Trost.

The Huskies are going to take an extended break from playing at home as four of their next meets are on the road.

The Huskies golf at Osage today (Friday). Then N-P travels to North Butler on Monday and makes the road trip to

Sheffield on Tuesday. Then it's off to Northwood on Thursday, April 28 and back home against Mason City Newman, Riceville and St. Ansgar on Monday, May 2.

N-P fares well at Eastern Iowa Track Festival

For all intents and purposes — the Eastern Iowa Track Festival at Iowa City West this past Saturday was a mini-state meet.

That's how hard it is to crack the lineup of the elite meet held in Johnson County.

So if you perform well on this stage, it's safe to say you're more than in line to medal at next month's state meet in Des Moines.

In order to run at Saturday's meet — hosted by Iowa City West — team's must submit their rosters and qualifying times. Then it's up to meet officials to select the top 16 times/distances that will compete in each event.

N-P freshman Kadence Huck didn't have a problem joining the top 16. It's the top spot in the entire state her opponents should be more concerned about.

Huck almost broke the N-P school record in open 800 in Iowa City with a time of 2:24.23. She placed third to runner-up Jolee Mesz of Lawton-Bronson (2:22.31). Ani Wedemeyer of Iowa City High won the grueling race with a winning time of 2:19.57.

Huck is now nearing Andie Griffith's all-time best mark (2:22.4) at N-P — accomplished in 1991. If that name sounds familiar, it's because Griffith is Andie's maiden name. She now goes by Andi Olson and is the retired volleyball coach that led Osage to super-duper success

out on the hardwood in her tenure of racking up championships for the Green Devils. Griffith is the older sister of N-P grad Travis Griffith — who coaches the North Linn baseball squad.

"She is just getting started in her NP varsity career and we can't wait to see what she does with it over these four years," said N-P head coach Jessi Mahnesmith.

Huck ran to 10th-place showing in the 1,500 run.

Huck wasn't the only one to shine as senior Makenzie Foelske ran to a clip of 27.92 in the 200 dash. That placed her third behind winner Meredith Street of Osage (27.05) and Lydia Staudt of Charles City (27.74).

Foelske, signed on to run at the Wartburg College, placed eighth in the 100 dash in 13.42.

N-P senior Breanna Hackman won the shot put with a toss of 39-3 and placed runner-up in the discus with a throw of 120-5.

Hackman will compete at the University of Northern Iowa after graduation. "Hack" placed fourth in the shot put last year at the Drake Relays.

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N-P continues onslaught of record books

Hackman, Huck help Huskies break school marks in discus and 1,500 run

The hits just keep on coming. This is a playlist track fans need to tune into because there's considerable noise surrounding the Nashua-Plainfield girls track team – and it's the good kind.

It's been a melody of masterful music to the ears of Husky fans that are currently watching history unfold right before their very eyes.

You might want to listen as well as N-P zooms past the competition.

Two more records at Nashua-Plainfield toppled at Cresco on Tuesday.

Kadence Huck, just a freshman, shattered the 1,500 run record at N-P with a scorching time of 5:01 flat. Her now school-record jaunt around the track four times broke Callie Matthews' 10-year reign as the best ever Husky in that event. Matthews' old mark was set in 2012 and came in at 5:03.83.

"Kadence is a beast when it comes to any event. She is one who will put in the extra miles to make sure she's setting herself up for the best outcome. She's also very strategic and knows exactly where she needs to be on the track and at exactly what time," said first-year N-P head coach Jessi Mahnesmith.

Huck has already helped N-P break the sprint medley record relay – which stood for 22 years before the squad of Bailey Fisher, Abbie Hyde, Foelske and Huck broke that long standing mark. The fan-tastic foursome was at it again in Howard County this week and almost rebroke the record they set earlier this month. The Huskies sped around the track for a winning time of 1:53.45. The school-record time the squad holds is 1:53.23.

"Bailey is recovering from an injury so we will still be mixing that up a little before we set in on our final lineup for that sprint med. Either way, we've got a great group of girls running that!" Mahnesmith added.

N-P senior Breanna Hackman would not be outdone as she shined as well for the Huskies. She now holds the shot put and discus school records in those field events after breaking Julie Moses' all-time mark in the discus. Hackman threw 124-10, just inches better than Moses' record of 124-6 that stood for 24 years.

Moses, a 1998 N-P grad, was

Huskies run in chilly conditions at Comet Relays

N-P snares two blue ribbons in 4x400 and distance medley relays

At this point, Chase Sudol will take what he can get.

Does he prefer warm weather to compete in for his Nashua-Plainfield boys track team?

What coach doesn't?

But now the portion of the 2022 season has entered make-or-break mode with less than two weeks to go before the conference meet kicks off.

Is this a zero-to-60-miles-an-hour on a short track type scenario with little to no time to prepare for?

Not quite, but there won't be any time to waste to get up to speed.

While N-P has had a whole host of meets cancelled this year due to inclement weather, the Huskies got one in at Charles City on Tuesday at the Comet Relays.

"For us, it's just going to be a matter now of getting kids where they need to be and it's going to be time to go," said Sudol.

And the weather was, as you would expect, overcast and chilly. It's wiped out a lot of meets during the regular season for the Huskies.

That void has created not much of a lead-up in order to be able to peak at the right time as the postseason nears.

"It limits what you can do. You can't play with your lineup like you would like to in the past," said Sudol. "Our approach is it's kind of go-time."

The weather's been a broken record this season for the Huskies and most of the entire state.

It is what it is.

"Next week's going to be cooler, but we really just need to get meets in. At this point, I don't even care how nice it is," said Sudol. "It's just a matter of getting the opportunity to compete. That's what I need."

N-P placed fourth overall in the gray team standings with 97 points. St. Ansgar won the meet with 158 points, Tripoli was second (103) and Northwood-Kensett finished third (97).

"The fact that is was cold, I was impressed with the way we competed. The times probably aren't where they're going to be here in a week or two. They competed with some really good schools and got after it," said Sudol.

The Huskies' 4x400 and distance medley relays each earned a blue ribbon.

"They were two of our bright spots," Sudol said.

Bo Harrington, Joel Winters, McKade Munn and Drew Wilken comprised the first-place 4x400 team. The group crossed the tape first in 3:42.

Max Hillegas, Aiden Lamborn, Munn and Harrington took home another gold medal in the d-med with a time of 4:05.

N-P senior Sam Fundermann placed second in the long jump (17-10), third in

the 200 dash (24.48) and fourth in the 100 dash (12.17).

Lamborn, a junior and state qualifier in the high jump last year, won the event with a leap of 4-8.

Husky junior Kaden Wilken placed second in the 110 hurdles in 16.66 and was fourth in the 400 hurdles in 1:06.97.

"He probably had the best night that I've seen him run," said Sudol. "He ran phenomenal. I know he's a hurdle guy, but we're going to try him in a couple relays. We're going to put together a sprint med team with him in it now that we've found him kind of rolling and we're going to try to put together a 4x200."

Jackson Zwanziger, a junior, PR'd in the discus (95-6) to place 10th. Husky sophomore Zach Zwanziger also had a personal best in the 3,200 run in 11:37, placing runner-up.

Huskies show marked improvement out on course

Franzen fires career-best 48 to earn medalist

If you talk to Jeff Trost long enough – you'll understand fairly early on in the conversation that he loves the game of golf.

So it goes without saying that he wants his Nashua-Plainfield Huskies to do the same.

After three meets into the 2022 season – his N-P girls squad has proven that's exactly the case.

The Huskies might have lost on Tuesday at home in a triangular versus Central Springs, but a defeat over Northwood-Kensett by seven strokes is signaling that the up-and-coming Huskies could well have to be dealt with on a serious front some time soon.

"Even though we got beat, everyone one of the girls can look at their score and say – 'there's a couple strokes that I could have got back and then we win the thing,'" said Trost.

The Panthers slipped past N-P by four strokes – 228 to 232. N-K carded a team score of 239.

"I was kind of pleased with the way we played," said Trost, who has coached the Huskies for 43 years.

Still, this was quite a chilly afternoon for freshman Paige Franzen and junior Autumn Nelson, who seemed to heat up as the day wore on. The two were paired together and came away with season-bests.

Franzen fired a career-low of 48 and Nelson improved her score by six shots from last week's home meet to card a 54.

Franzen's nine-hole round won her medalist honors.

Franzen, who plays alongside her fellow freshman cousin Faith Franzen, came up big on a day that wasn't all that pleasant to play. Temps were unseasonably cool for mid-to-late April and N-P has only played two regular season meets thus far leading up to the clash with

conference foes.

"There's room for her to get better – that's the exciting part," said Trost about Paige Franzen.

Trost raved about Nelson's commitment to getting better and setting an example for her teammates to follow.

"That was one of Autumn's best rounds," said Trost. "Her work ethic is second to none. She's diligent. She really works at it and looks to improve."

Trost said if Nelson could eliminate a few holes that saw her card a larger number than normal, her score may well have been on par with Paige Franzen's total.

"She takes those out of there, then she's got a really good round then," said Trost.

Paige Franzen's encouraging round wasn't the only personal record set on this day. Husky sophomore Natalie Sinnwell came into the clubhouse with a career-best 66.

Faith Franzen shot a 64. N-P sophomore Maddie Foster worked the course to a 78, nine-hole total. N-P sophomore Payton Howland sliced off eight strokes from her previous total of 87 last week at the Nashua Town and Country Club. That left her with a 79.

"Just getting that consistency – in her first meet, I think probably 10 strokes were whiffs," said Trost about Howland. "Now she at least moves the ball every shot."

It helps to have a team bond and Trost said he doesn't have to worry about that.

"The nice thing about it is all the girls get along pretty well," said Trost. "We've got a good camaraderie there with that."
