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## County hears ambulance options

### SafeTech Solutions' consultants present four possible 'models' for EMS in county

Chickasaw County should have two on-duty ambulances with a third rig as a backup, its ambulance service should have one location to house its vehicles and be equipped with crew quarters and office space, have a full-time manager, accept all payor types and have a contract with an outside billing services company. So said the two consultants for SafeTech Solutions, who presented

a report to the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council and Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors Tuesday night.

SafeTech's Tom Fennell and Lee Huber also gave council members and supervisors four possible system models the county could use for ambulance service in the near future, and they both said that one of their key findings during the two days of extensive interviews they conducted is "the inability of the current parties to govern the cur-

rent system in a constructive way."

After presenting the four models and going over their "pros and cons," Fennell told members of the council, supervisors and about 75 residents that the county faces difficult decisions in the days ahead.

"You're faced with a challenge today and we're presenting some options, but by doing nothing, we're just going to further the gap ... and widen the distrust," he said. "Issues around trust and transparency resulted in jeopardizing EMS

in Chickasaw County. It has. We heard that loud and clear when we were here."

The Ambulance Council earlier this year agreed to pay SafeTech Solutions \$30,000 to conduct an EMS feasibility study. The Board of Supervisors requested that the council do the study to find out more about the EMS

### NASHUA-PLAINFIELD FRESHMAN WINS 400 TO CLAIM SCHOOL'S FIRST-EVER TRACK CHAMPIONSHIP

Kadence Huck seemed to float across the finish line Thursday afternoon.

The N-P running star sure didn't look like a newcomer in front of a jam-packed crowd that lined the home stretch at Drake Stadium.

For a self-proclaimed long-distance runner,

the fantastic freshman from Nashua-Plainfield made it look easy in her first ever state race in the 400 dash.

Starting blocks?  
Who needs them?  
"I just don't think blocks are for me. I also think I look really dumb when I don't start out in them because everybody else is," smiled Huck.

Huck burst onto the scene on the big stage in Des Moines to reel in N-P's first ever state title in track and field. She did it in a school-record time, breaking her old mark in the 400 with a blistering clip in the final heat to secure gold.

"The last 100 - that hurt," said Huck. "It hurt for her, too. I could tell."

## Area growers use heat wave to their advantage

As the temperatures soar, so, too, does the pace of planting in Northeast Iowa

The four most-oft heard words last week? Hot enough for you?

But area farmers saw a heat wave that produced record high temperatures in the 90s last Wednesday and Thursday and temperatures in the 80s this week as a godsend and made up for lost time when it came to the 2022 planting season.

The weekly Crop Progress and Condition report put out by the United States Department of Agriculture's National Agriculture Statistics Service each Monday proves it. Last week, the report showed just 14 percent of the state's corn crop had been planted and that number jumped to 57 percent this week.

In the Northeast Iowa

District that includes Chickasaw County, the dry, hot week saw the percentage of corn planted jump from 5 percent to 41 percent, and ISU Extension Agronomist Terry Basol said he believes that number might be closer to 60 to 70 percent after a busy weekend for farmers.

"We were able to take off and really get going," he said on Tuesday afternoon, "and I know we had a lot of grateful farmers when it came to Mother Nature. Once planting got going, I mean it really got going."

And while planting slowed Tuesday because of the rain showers that hit the area, Basol said that for the crop all ready in the field, the rainfall that was around one-half inch of rain was perfect.

"It was a nice, timely rain,"

## Splash pad set to open just before the holiday weekend

Water/Wastewater superintendent says issues with system caused by residents flushing wipes

Just because the weather outside reached temperatures of 90 degrees recently doesn't mean wading in water right now is recommended if you want to have a fun and relaxing leisure activity to undertake.

It's still chilly.

That's one of the reasons the Nashua Splash Pad has not been opened yet, but the water park will soon be up and running right before Memorial Day if all goes as planned for city officials.

The tentative date for the Splash Pad to open is Thursday, May 26 - right before Memorial Day Weekend.

Water/Wastewater Superintendent Nick Henningsen told the Nashua City Council at

a regular meeting on Monday that a lot of the time the city holds off on opening the Splash until late into May.

"No matter how hot it is, that water's still 40 degrees coming out of that," said Henningsen. "We don't heat it."

Henningsen also said it helps to conserve water if few swimmers are even going to the park if it were to be open in mid-May.

"If you go up there early in the season, you'll hardly see anybody in it," said Henningsen. "They just push the button and we waste lots and lots of water. I don't know if we want to just be dumping that water just so somebody can stand there and push the button."

# E-15 popularity grows as area gas prices soar

With gasoline prices at their highest average level ever, drivers may have started taking notice of a cheaper option available at some pumps.

This alternative fuel is known as E15, commonly sold as Unleaded 88, and is a blend of gasoline and ethanol that has been available at some stations for years.

E15: Lower-priced option for modern vehiclesThe Iowa Governor's Office announced Monday that Gov. Kim Reynolds would sign the Biofuels Access Bill today (Tuesday) at a ceremony in Johnston.

The Legislature passed the law this session which will require Iowa gas stations and other fuel retailers to begin offering E15 beginning in 2026, substantially expanding the availability of E15 in the state.

The bill provides exemptions for stations that meet certain criteria, including stations built prior to 2023 that sell fewer than 300,000 gallons of fuel per year and have no plans to replace storage tanks. Stations that choose to upgrade their systems to include E15 would have the ability to apply for state grants to help cover a portion of the costs.

Nationally, President Biden announced a plan last month whereby the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will issue emergency waivers to allow E15 to be sold nationally between June 1 and Sept. 15.

Nearly all gasoline sold today contains some amount of ethanol, usually 10%. E15 contains a higher percentage of ethanol (between 10.5% and 15%) than regular gasoline. This has some drivers wondering if it's the right choice for their vehicle,

especially as the availability of E15 could expand in the coming years.

While E15's cheaper price may be enticing at the gas station, there are a few things for drivers to consider before fueling up.

"Some vehicles are prohibited from using E15" in their engines, explained Steve Robel, owner of Quality Auto in Charles City. These include all vehicles older than model year 2001.

He added that while the fuel shouldn't cause any problem in modern engines, it can become "caustic, only if the fuel sits for long periods of time."

The EPA says E15 can be safely used in all gas-fueled cars, trucks and SUVs from 2001 on. It should not be used in motorcycles; vehicles with heavy-duty engines, such as school buses and delivery trucks; off-road vehicles, such as boats and snowmobiles; and small engines such as chainsaws, lawn mowers and snow blowers.

The ethanol industry says the fuel is one of the most tested in history and has no effect on vehicle drivability.

Robel said there is a slight decrease in the miles per gallon with E15. That decrease has been shown to be larger in tests of "Flex Fuel" vehicles, designed to use up to E85 - fuel with 85% ethanol.

But Robel said that ethanol has its benefits.

"Ethanol is a renewable fuel. It does reduce prices at the pump. However, with corn prices on the rise, the future benefit - at least price-wise - remains to be seen."

E15 is currently available in 30 states at just over 2,300 stations, according to the EPA website, [afdc.energy.gov](https://afdc.energy.gov).

## Career change has been good for intern funeral director

Former elementary teacher says his new job at funeral home is in some ways like his old one

Anthony Hable knows the look - you went from this to that? - by heart, but the funeral director intern has an answer for those who wonder how an elementary school teacher suddenly changes careers and works at a funeral home.

"It's still about relationships, it's still about communication, it's still about organizational skills," he said during an interview in his office at Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home in New Hampton. "You had to have those to be a third-grade teacher, you need to have those here."

The funeral home also operates the Olson Chapel on Nashua's Main Street.

Hable began his journey a little more than a year ago - Dec. 23, 2020, to be exact -

when he sat down with his good friend and fellow Chickasaw Wrestling Club coach Andy Hugeback.

"We knew we needed more help here," Hugeback said, "and I knew Anthony was a hard worker who could be trusted and I knew he was really good with people. Those are important qualities for a funeral director."

Two weeks later, Hable's journey began. By then, he had enrolled in mortuary science classes, which meant he was teaching third-grade at Fredericksburg Elementary School full-time, taking 18 credits of classes and coaching youth wrestling. All at the same time.

"It was crazy there for a while," he said with a laugh, "but even though I was a little hesitant when I first talked to Andy, the more and more I

thought about it, the more and more I wanted to be part of a small-town business that does a lot for the community."

Hable graduated from Decorah High School in 2010 and attended the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse and Upper Iowa University - wrestling at both schools - before receiving a degree in elementary education from UIU.

He then took a job at Fredericksburg, and for four seasons - from 2017 to 2020 - he was an assistant baseball coach at New Hampton. He said he wasn't necessarily looking to get out of education, but the chance to become a funeral director was too good of an opportunity to pass up.

And he has no regrets about the decision he made.

Hugeback served as his "preceptor" during his schooling and

will do the same during Hable's one-year internship. Basically, that means Hugeback will "sign off" on the work Hable does at the funeral home.

And as he continues marching to his goal of being a full-time funeral director - i.e. dropping the intern from his title - Hable continues to see the parallels between education and the funeral home industry.

"It's still about helping people," he said. "As a teacher, you're helping kids at a very young age begin their journeys and now, you're helping people go through some of the most difficult times of their lives. Obviously, there are differences - there are a lot of early mornings and late nights - but to be able to work with the great group of people we have here, it's been really a good way to start my new career."

## Huck doesn't need blocks to win 400 state title

Mt. Ayr's Adalyn Reynolds - a senior - placed runner-up in 58.28. Reynolds placed third in the event last year in Class 1A. Haley Meyer of Kee High, another senior, placed third in her final run in the 400 with a time of 59.61.

"She's such a great competitor. I saw her shadow after the first 100. I told myself, 'she's coming Kadence', so I told myself I had to go," said Huck.

The clocked time of Huck read 57.35 up on the big board that overlooks the blue oval that brings the state's best together for one three-day run to see who rises to the top.

Huck did just that and it seems she may just be getting started with a prep career that could know no bounds.

"I kind of kicked it in a little bit," said Huck. "Going at that 100, I was hurting. I couldn't feel my legs. I still can't feel my legs."

Huck took down a field that

comprised mostly of upper-classmen and all of the runners used starting blocks, except for Huck.

"I'm a distance runner. I've never used blocks. I used blocks twice this year and both times I kind of stutter-stepped or just didn't come out of them very strong," said Huck.

It was an incredible start for Huck in her first state race ever and this could just be the beginning of what could be several other state titles claimed by Huck and her Huskies.

Huck will anchor the distance and sprint medley later at state. N-P is ranked No. 1 in the dmed and No. 2 in the sprint medley.

N-P is just four points back of first-place Algona Garrigan with 16 points in the Class 1A team standings.

"I think we can get the trophy," said Huck.

Huck had a premonition early in the season and she let her mother know about how she felt she could be one of the state's best in several events. It just wasn't the 400.

"I told my mom, I'm just going to win the 1,500 this year and then I'm running a 400," laughed Huck. "I'm really happy that I pulled it off, because I didn't know if I was going to."

needs of the county and also to consider if a publicly-owned ambulance service was a realistic possibility.

As they did at a public meeting in March, the SafeTech consultants said Tuesday there were three phases to the study. The first phase included interviews with various county and city leaders, EMS personnel and other stakeholders, as well as the gathering of data.

The second phase was Tuesday night's presentation, and Fennell said the third phase will come after leaders decide which model they want to pursue. That's when SafeTech will help the county institute the model.

The four possible models included:

- Developing a new "balanced" contract with the current provider, Chickasaw Ambulance Service, which has a contract with the Ambulance Council that runs through the end of 2022.
- Solicit through a request-for-proposal (RFP) for a new provider.
- Create a new provider owned through what SafeTech calls a "joint powers agreement" or "ambulance district," which in essence would be the public option.
- Have MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center choose to provide the service, even though the hospital's CEO and president, Aaron Flugum, has said repeatedly in the past that the hospital doesn't have the resources to develop and run an ambulance service.

Fennell and Huber freely admitted that all four models had pluses and minuses, but they also urged both the Ambulance Council and the Board of Supervisors to try to come up with an EMS plan for the coun-

ty that was reliable, viable and sustainable.

They said that based on the numbers they were able to gather, a publicly-owned ambulance service would need about \$1.725 million for start-up costs that included three new ambulance rigs and a 3,000-square foot building.

Yet, they also said that it would be virtually impossible for the county to purchase three new ambulances and have them delivered by Jan. 1, 2023 and the county would probably have to buy used rigs.

Their report showed that a publicly-owned service would be more than \$625,000 in the red during its first year of operation, and even if the current annualized subsidy of \$294,000 is used, it would still suffer a loss of more than \$331,000.

"But it's not apples to apples," MercyOne's Flugum said after the meeting, "because the staffing levels they're proposing aren't what we have now."

Flugum said he felt that the staffing levels proposed by SafeTech might be "pie in the sky" and that there would be ways to reduce costs.

The consultants, though, said that all the models — including working together with the current ambulance provider — may lead to a higher subsidy.

Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath asked the consultants how they expected to attract the 12.45 full- and part-time paramedics and EMTs to work in any of the models that SafeTech proposed.

"Finding and keeping the right people, it's a tough world, it's a tough market for paramedics," Fennell said, "so we have to foster, we have to create an environment here in Chickasaw County that people want to be a part of. ...

"That's a community wide thing. That's not just the ambulance council. That's not just the ambulance provider."

The consultants also said that under any model they were proposing, the ambulances should be housed in New Hampton because even the larger small towns in the county — like Nashua and Fredericksburg — simply didn't have the call volume to support housing an ambulance.

Huber said, in response to one question, Fredericksburg's total number of calls was just one-eighth the number needed to house a rig.

One Ambulance Council member expressed disappointment in the report.

"I think all of us here have at one time or another considered all four of these options," Fredericksburg Mayor Jimmy Mitchell said. "I was hoping for more direction."

A number of his fellow members agreed, although Nashua City Councilwoman Samantha Johnson, who represents the city on the council, said she felt the study did provide useful information for them to make a decision.

"Maybe it's because I'm relatively new to this," said Johnson, who came onto the Ambulance Council at the beginning of this year, "but I think this was helpful and I think it was definitely worth doing this story."

Both Ambulance Council members and the county supervisors expressed interest in holding a joint meeting in the near future to discuss the report.

"We know that hard choices are going to be required," Huber said, "but what we're hoping is that we have given you the information you're going to need to make those difficult decisions."

also said another reason that the Splash Pad isn't open for business quite yet is the railing on the top of a fence at the water park needs to be fixed. He said that is a safety issue until it is repaired. Kelleher also stated cement needs to be poured so the pergola — which helps provide the Splash Pad with shade — can be put back to use. The pergola sustained damage because of high winds and also needs to be fixed.

Henningsen addressed the Council with his monthly report and wanted to remind citizens of Nashua to stop flushing sanitary wipes down the toilet.

"For some reason I have a bunch of people throwing stupid wipes down the sewer again. I just jetted a line and pulled out a whole ball," said Henningsen. "We've had an influx of wipes. We gotta make sure we stop flushing wipes again."

The Council approved the purchase of a new water pump for Henningsen and his department at the cost of \$6,500. Henningsen said he will keep the current one as a back-up once the new device is installed.

Henningsen also gave the Council an update on the broken clarifier at the wastewater plant. He said that the clarifier — which is a settling tank that helps with removal of solid waste — should be fixed within the next three weeks.

"I've been keeping the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) updated on that. I've been talking to ICAP (Iowa Communities Assurance Pool), making sure they're all on the same page. They've already said they'll come pay for it," said Henningsen. "It's covered under insurance."

Council member Rhonda Dean informed the Council that no one attended the first "Coffee with the Council." The chance for citizens or interested parties to talk with members of the Nashua City Council was held last Saturday, May

14 from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m. at the Nashua Public Library.

Dean said the next scheduled "Coffee with the Council" is slated for Saturday, June 4 from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m.

"No one showed up except Alex's (Mayor Alex Anthofer) kids and my grandson," said Dean. "I'm thinking if we don't have anybody in June and we don't have anybody in July, we're going to stop for awhile and do it in the winter."

Dean — who is a committee member for the Council at the FMC Landfill meetings — said she would be interested in picking up old or dead batteries and disposing them at the landfill.

"People aren't supposed to throw their batteries in the garbage. Put them in a bucket and bring them to me," said Dean.

Dean said batteries that are being thrown in the landfill are heating up and exploding. High winds at the dump make the problem worse.

Dean said a bin can be kept at City Hall where residents of Nashua can dispose of the batteries. Council member Samantha Johnson also said that there could be a possibility of placing a bin at the Nashua Public Library as well to collect the expired batteries.

City Clerk John Ott said 16 tons of cold mix was used around town to fill potholes on city streets.

Council member Tim Malven thanked the street department for the work recently done. He also said primary streets in town like Greeley and Main still need to be addressed.

"I'd like to commend the street department on some serious potholes that were filled finally after years, but there's still plenty more to be done," said Malven.

The Council also approved work to be done by ProCrafters to fix a roof that leaks on the powerhouse for an estimated cost of \$40,000, although Ott said that cost could rise.

he said, "and as long as we don't have four or five days of this, it's going to be really good."

Growers were also able to start planting soybean fields around the state as the percentage of soybeans planted jumped from 7 percent to 34 percent.

"As slow as we started," Basol said, "I know there are a lot of guys who took deep sighs of relief last week. With the planters we have these days, we can make up a lot of time pretty quickly, and we saw that last week, this weekend and even Monday."

Basol did say he was hopeful that the forecast for Thursday night into Friday morning

called for a chance of storms would not become a reality.

"If we miss those, we're going to be in great shape," he said.

Once the cold front that could trigger storms moves through, though, we may need to have sweatshirts and jackets ready because highs this weekend in all likelihood will be in the 50s.

Still, Basol said farmers badly needed last week.

"From where we were a couple of weeks ago, we're looking a lot better," he said. "Two weeks ago, we may not have been panicking, but we were starting to get really worried."

"Today, we still want to get the crop in obviously, but we've made a lot of progress over the last 10 days."

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# Supervisors agree with sheriff and raise daily jail fees

Before taking up the jail study, supervisors approved a recommendation from Hemann to raise daily jail fees from \$50 to \$65 for in-county sentences and to \$80 for out-of-county sentences.

Under state law, the county can only charge jail fees to those who have been found guilty and sentenced to jail time, and Hemann said the county, at times, will allow a county resident who has been found guilty in another county to “do their time” in Chickasaw County.

Supervisors also covered a number

of non-jail related issues during its Monday, including:

- Board members heard concerns from North Washington Mayor Dave Geerts about a future road project that will go through the small Chickasaw County city.

The Engineer’s Office is planning to repave a portion of County Road V-18 sometime in 2024, and Geerts asked the county to consider tearing out about a one-half mile of the road that runs through North Washington instead of just “overlying” it.

He said that the city’s concern was that an overlay would make driveways even “steeper.”

County Engineer Roman Lensing said he had met with Geerts before the meeting and that “he has valid concerns” and agreed to tear out the existing road through North Washington.

Lensing said after the meeting that the cost for the half-mile portion of the project would double but “it’s something we probably should do.”

- County Attorney David Laudner gave a report to the board on the possibility of drawing up a new ordinance that would give the Board of Supervisors the power to appoint township trustees and clerks.

Laudner said that he believes that supervisors already have that power, according to state law — pointing out that if a vacancy occurs on a township board that isn’t filled within 30 days, Iowa code says supervisors can appoint a new member who will serve until the next general election.

Supervisors last month passed a resolution to have Laudner draft an ordinance, but after hearing the attorney’s report on Monday, they passed a resolution nullifying the one they approved in April.

- Supervisors agreed to spend \$207,054 for a new elevator at the courthouse. The county’s maintenance director, Dave Gorman, said there were concerns about the old elevator breaking down because replacement parts are no longer available. Only Hackman voted against ordering a new elevator.
- The board turned down a request, at least for now, from County Assessor Ray Armel to use \$22,000 of ARPA funds so that his office could get better “imaging” of rural areas.

Supervisor Jason Byrne said he wanted to hold off on the request “until we see what happens tomorrow night,” referencing Tuesday night’s release of the ambulance feasibility study.

state and is listed as No. 5 overall in the shot put with a heave of 40-1.25.

“So going into the throw I was still kind of worried about my ankle because I sprained it a couple weeks ago. I was like, ‘okay, just forget about it,’” said Hackman about her discus effort at districts. “It came out just right and it felt good.”

Then the fireworks really went off as N-P reeled in first-place finishes in the sprint medley, 4x400 and distance medley.

N-P now sits No. 1 in the state with the best times in the small-school class in the dmed and is fourth overall in the 4x400.

The Huskies clocked out at 4:14 in the 4x400 with the team of Abbie Hyde, Jennah Carpenter, Jordyn Frost and Kadence Huck.

The distance medley team of seniors Makenzie Foelske, Carpenter, Hyde and the freshman, Huck, ran to a finish of 4:21, not its season best, but it was more than enough to qualify for the 24-team field.

“It’s been really special for our seniors to see them continue to progress all the way throughout their senior year,” said Mahnesmith.

N-P holds the school-record in the sprint medley and is currently the second-fastest team in that event according to Varsity Bound. The Husky foursome of Hyde, Rylee Weiss, Foelske and Huck crossed the tape in 1:53.2.

Foelske, like Huck and Hackman, put on a show in their individual events.

Foelske won the 100 dash and open 200. She clipped Olivia Bohlen of Belle Plaine as darkness began to fall on the stadium by just one-hundredth of a second (27.10 to 27.11). Foelske’s winning time in the

100 dash was 13.37. She placed seventh in that event last year at state to earn a medal.

About two weeks ago Foelske won conference in the 100 dash by that same margin over Osage’s Meredith Street in her marquee sprint event – winning by one-hundereth of a second (12.82 to 12.83).

“That was definitely a huge confidence boost,” said Foelske about the big win over her TIC rival. “I haven’t been able to beat her since junior high.”

Huck rebroke her school record in an amazing effort in the open 400 after just running the anchor leg in the dmed. Her new school record is now 57.78, just over two seconds faster than the old one (59.79) she set at the Comet Relays last month.

“I almost cried during that because I was so nervous in her going back-to-back and

never doing that before,” said an ecstatic Foelske. “She did obviously amazing.”

Foelske and her Huskies are going to reach for the stars this weekend in what could be a potential top-five finish in the state team standings in Class 1A if all goes well for Mahnesmith’s squad.

“Our goal is definitely a team trophy,” said Foelske. “I’m super, super excited.”

do well. I’m just excited to compete if I’m being honest.”

Nashua-Plainfield was able to qualify in three other events at the district meet – senior Drew Wilken in the open 400, the 4x400 relay and shuttle hurdle squad.

N-P – which tied with Belle Plaine in the runner-up slot in the team standings with 99 at districts on Thursday, May 12 – just missed qualifying for state in the distance and sprint medley.

“The kids are runnin’ their best, their throwin’ their best, they’re jumpin’ their best. You can’t ask for much more than that,” said N-P head coach Chase Sudol. “The kids are battlin’.

N-P won the 4x400 relay and had the 14th-fastest state-qualifying time in the event. The contingent of Sam Fundermann, Bo Harrington, McKade Munn and Drew Wilken crossed the finish line first in 3:33:34.18.

Sudol had this to say at the Hudson meet before the state released each of the 24 separate qualifiers in each event on Saturday. The state took the winners of each event at all eight sites. Then it filled out the state field on the next best 16 throws, jumps or times.

“The hard thing is we’re running our best times by a couple seconds, but it’s still that tight. You just don’t feel comfortable with the way people are running tonight. There’s teams stepping up, so it’s like – are we in or are we not?” said Sudol.

Drew Wilken worked his way to a third-place finish in the 400 dash (53.08), which vaulted him down to Des Moines. He was fourth in the 800 run in 2:08.

Dylan Blanchard also placed fourth in the open 400 in a time of 55.21.

Kaden Wilken was fourth in the 110 hur-

## Husky boys bow out at district meet

Road warriors.

Sometimes its takes that menacing mindset out on a golf course when you're teeing it up away from the friendly fareways of one's home country club.

The Nashua-Plainfield Huskies seemed to be a little home sick after tackling the Spring Valley Golf Course near Livermore in the Class 1A District meet held on Monday.

The Huskies and head coach Jeff Trost shot a 412 to finish in 10th place at the state-qualifying meet. While it wasn't N-P's worst 18-hole round of the season – the conclusion to what was a pretty good season was somewhat of a bummer for the Huskies.

"We just don't seem to respond well or play well on the road this year," said Trost. "It's just one of those things. Not many of the guys play other courses than ours, so that's that learning part of the game and making sure your game can travel."

N-P played well on its home course the

week prior in sectional play to advance to districts with a 370. Monday was a different story as Trost's top three golfers all fired rounds of 97.

"I was a little disappointed in the way we played, the way we competed. They went over there with the attitude they didn't have a chance of winning or moving on and that's just kind of the way they played," Trost said.

Trost said his team played a practice round on the course that's south of Algona on Friday. Trost mentioned his golfers had a hard time keeping the ball in the middle of the fairway and out of the thick grass. That trouble inflated the squad's district tally after N-P fired a season-low round in sectional play at Nashua.

"It was definitely a penalty if you hit in the rough," said Trost.

N-P seniors Trey Nelson and Drew Rodruck played their final prep golf meets of their career on Monday. Nelson carded a 47 on the front nine and shot a 50 on the back portion of the 18-hole golf course. Rodruck shot a 51 in his first round and lowered that by five strokes in his finish to

the day.

Trost talked about his seniors – which included Bryce Anderson (131).

"All three of them are great kids and they're fun to be around," said Trost. "They're quality people. If anything, that's probably more important than their golf game."

N-P freshman Dawson Glaser came on strong this season and tallied a 97 as well. He recorded a 46 to open play and finished with a 51 on the back nine.

N-P sophomore Devon Griffin and freshman Ty Berger each wrote down a final number of 121 to finish off their scorecards.

Lake Mills (331) and North Butler (340) advanced on to the state tournament.

Husky girls score 16 points, qualify for two finals on opening day

And the Huskies got the three-day meet off in fine style Thursday, piling up 16 points and qualifying for the finals in two others.

Nashua-Plainfield got a win in the open 400 when freshman Kadence Huck blew away the field to claim the school's first-ever girls track title, and senior Breanna Hackman gave the Huskies six more points with a third-place finish in the shot put.

Meanwhile, senior Makenzie Foelske assured herself of two medals by qualifying for both the 100 and 200 finals.

"I definitely knew I had to be top eight in both," Foelske said, "if we wanted to meet our goal of getting a trophy at the end. We all just believe in each other so much and that definitely helps."

Huck broke her own school record and ran the 400 in 57.35 seconds to beat Mount Ayr's Adalyn

Reynolds by almost a full second while Hackman threw the shot 38-7.75 to finish behind Algona Garrigan's Audi Crooks and Bedford's Emily Baker. Crooks broke the state meet record with a throw of 45-1.

And then there was Foelske, who came into the state meet seeded 22nd in the 100 and ninth in the 200, largely because her state qualifying meet ran into a brutal headwind down the stretch.

But she came through big time on Thursday and finishing third in her heat and eighth overall to qualify for Saturday's 200 finals and then, running out of lane eight, she won her 100 heat and qualified third for the finals that will also be held on Saturday.

Aiden Lamborn will get his second crack at a state medal in the high jump this morning (Friday) at Drake Stadium when he looks to climb even higher in his quest to become an all-time Nashua-Plainfield great.

The slender, 6-7 giant of a jumper already holds the school record in the difficult event that saw Husky history be made a few weeks ago at the Panther Co-Ed Relays in Manly.

That's when Lamborn climbed the ladder and cleared the bar at a school record height of 6-4. That broke Corey Hendricks old-mark of 6-2 set in 1994.

It's a moment Lamborn won't soon forget.

"I just remembered getting swarmed off the mat," said Lamborn, a junior.

Lamborn's previous PR was 6-1, set at the state-qualifying meet at Northwood a year ago. He went above and beyond that old mark after setting the school record in front of a support-

ive "home crowd" at Manly.

"So I think I had almost probably dang near our whole boy's track team and some of the girls over there. So that helps the environment a lot," said Lamborn.

Lamborn, who did not place last year as a sophomore at state, cleared 5-11 at last week's district meet at Hudson. That was more than enough to qualify him for a second-straight trip down to the blue oval in Des Moines.

"I was in a slump for a good portion of the middle of the year. It's nice to do good during the season — don't get me wrong. But you gotta do good when it's necessary," said Lamborn. "That's what truly matters."

Lamborn will go for broke when the high jump gets underway in Class 1A at 9 a.m. Friday.

"Last year it didn't go as I wanted, but it was still nice to make it down there," said Lamborn. "I just want to

### N-P's Rinken commits to UNI to wrestle

Huskies' state champ is first to commit to Panthers' 'Class of 2023'

The purple and gold of the UNI Panthers seems like a perfect fit for Garret Rinken.

Rinken — perhaps Nashua-Plainfield's all-time best wrestler — became UNI coach Doug Schwab's first 2023 commitment after he verbally committed to put on a singlet for the University of Northern Iowa wrestling program this week.

Rinken — a 2021 state prep champ and state-runner-up at 120 pounds last February — is no stranger to his soon-to-be

home of Cedar Falls and the program that Schwab has led for the past 12 years.

"I've been practicing down there since I was really little," said Rinken. "I know all the coaching staff just really well."

Rinken — who wrestles for the Immortal Athletics Wrestling Club alongside current UNI Panther Julian Farber — went 57-1 last year and sported a 106-match streak before getting upset by Brandon Paez of Lisbon in the 120-pound title match at Wells Fargo Arena this past spring.

Immortal Athletic Club is

located in the unincorporated community of Oran — in southwestern Fayette County.

"I get to be with the same people I've always wrestled with," said Rinken. "It was the best fit for me."

Rinken — who also drew interest from Wisconsin and Navy — said the loss to Paez has him laser-focused to fix what went wrong in the final prep match of his junior career. Rinken pinned Paez in the regular season.
