Nancy Hillesheim's first reaction to being told that she would be the grand marshal for Nashua's annual Water Over the Dam Days Parade?

"I'm going to be honest, I was absolutely floored," said the long-time Five Star Coop employee and the secretary of the Big Fair Board secretary. "We have so many deserving people, I was so surprised. I'm not sure I should be the one, but it's a very nice honor."

Hillesheim will lead the parade that begins at 10:30 a.m. Saturday and is one of the crowing events of the annual celebration that kicks off its two-day run this evening (Friday)

with a triathlon, the crowning of the Water Over the Dam Days queen, live music and more.

And the grand marshal duties come less than a week before Hillesheim will retire from her job at the coop, where she has worked since 1978.

She said she also thinks its a tribute to her late husband, Butch, who passed away two summers ago.

"We always loved our commu-

nity and the people here," she said, "and I know Butch will be right next to me during the parade, at least in spirit.

Nashua Park Board member Nate Sinnwell said Hillesheim was a perfect choice to serve as the grand marshal, and he said festival organizers also thought it would not only be a fitting honor for Hillesheim but also a nice tribute to her husband.

Voters won't get chance to weigh in on ambulance

Board rejects third reading of 422D resolution that would have led to fall vote on making EMS 'essential' service

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors on Monday left a possible vote this fall on making ambulance coverage an "essential service" all but dead.

Supervisors voted 3-2 to reject the third reading of a resolution that was the first step to Chickasaw County residents voting on a 422D referendum.

In the Iowa Code, 422D allows county residents to declare EMS an essential service, which allows taxes to be levied on property to support an ambulance service.

During their two previous regular meetings, supervisors voted 3-2 in favor of the resolution that would have led to the appointment of an advisory council that would have made recommendations to the board when it came to how much it would ask voters to approve for 422D.

But on Monday, Supervisor Tim Zoll, who had supported the resolution during its first two readings, joined Jake Hackman and Steve Breitbach as no votes.

"I feel it's an unfair tax. It should be looked at other resources," Hackman said. "[It should not be] just property tax. ... I've talked to other supervisors from other counties, and they're looking at ... lobbying the people in Des Moines to add local option sales tax as a third funding mechanism."

County Attorney David Laudner said the rejection of the third reading "all but kills" a vote this fall.

He pointed out that the board could theoretically "republish" a notice and hold three more readings but because of Monday's vote and because time would be the essence — supervisors must approve putting the referendum on the ballot — he said the issue is a moot point.

So what's next for a publicly-owned ambulance service to become a reality?

Laudner basically asked that question to supervisors a few hours after they rejected 422D.

That led to a lengthy discussion about what

Nashua remains 'up in the air' on publicly-owned EMS

The city of Nashua feels like they're sitting between a rock and a hard place when it comes to providing emergency medical services for the town of just over 1,500.

EMS — which is not an essential service in Iowa like fire and police protection — will no longer be provided in Nashua after the town's contract with the current private provider — owner Jeremy McGrath and Chickasaw Ambulance Services — runs out on Dec. 31, 2022.

That's why negotiations and talks have been ongoing for months among the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council on how best to provide those life-saving measures within the county's borders. That service being maintained or continued in some form or fashion could all hinge on a potential contract being signed if several cities agree to the new terms that are still trying to be ironed out.

"I did not tell them we were on board. I did not tell them we weren't on board," said Nashua City Council member Samantha Johnson at last Monday's regularly scheduled Nashua City Council meeting. Johnson is Nashua's representative on the Ambulance Council.

The question is, what will towns like Nashua, Fredericksburg, Lawler or Alta Vista — which are bound by a current 28E agreement that allows EMS in its communities — do if no new contract is worked up?

SINNELL WINS SECOND STRAIGHT NATIONAL TITLE; TWO MORE PROJECTS GARNER HONORS

Caleb Sinnwell's grandfather sat next to his grandson Saturday inside the Nashua Fire Department and uttered three words that pretty much summed it up.

"All or nothing," Buchholz said.

And a few seconds later, during the virtual awards for the National History Day, the

National History Day students who were gathered together found out it was "all" as Sinnwell, a soon-to-be sophomore at Nashua-Plainfield High School, was named a national champion for a second straight year.

Sinnwell's individual website — "Khrushchev, Corn, and Cold War Diplomacy: Garst Grows Relations With Russia One Ear At A Time," which detailed how a visit by Soviet Union Premier Nikita Khrushchev helped thaw Cold

War relations in the 1950s — was named the best by judges during the contest that for a third straight year was held virtually.

"I'm not going to lie, I was really, really nervous," he said, "and then when Grandpa said it was 'all or nothing' I kind of laughed but I was even more nervous."

The title came a year after Sinnwell won the

Student, teacher honored at the opening of 'Ghost Army' exhibit

Let's just put it this way: Caleb Sinnwell had kind of a big week.

Two days before the Nashua-Plainfield High School student learned he had won a second straight national championship at the National History Day contest, Sinnwell and his NHD advisor, Suzy Turner, were in suburban Chicago to help open a traveling exhibit about the Ghost Army that the Illinois Holocaust Museum will have on display for the next six months.

The Ghost Army, of course, was the subject of Sinnwell's 2021 National History Day individual website that gave Nashua-Plainfield its first-ever NHD national title.

"It was an amazing experience," Sinnwell said, "and it meant a lot to me and Mrs. Turner."

Turner certainly wasn't going to argue.

"We weren't sure what to expect, but to walk in there and see the 'special thanks' to us on one of the placards, it was nice," Turner said, "although actually, I'm just riding the coattails of Caleb. ... But it does

show you the power of History Day and the connections our students can make."

The Ghost Army were American military units that used radio communications and camouflage to deceive the Nazis during World War II, and Sinnwell's NHD project brought him into contact with author and filmmaker Rick Beyer, who spent a number of years lobbying for Congress to present the Ghost Army and its veterans with the Congressional Gold Medal.

The exhibit had been displayed at the National World War II Museum in New Orleans and will now be displayed at museums around the country, with the Illinois Holocaust Museum being the first to host the traveling exhibit.

After Sinnwell won his 2021 NHD title, the then-freshman in high school joined those lobbying efforts — calling on U.S. senators from around the country in an effort to garner their support for the bill that passed Congress in the fall of 2021.

Sinnwell said the best part of

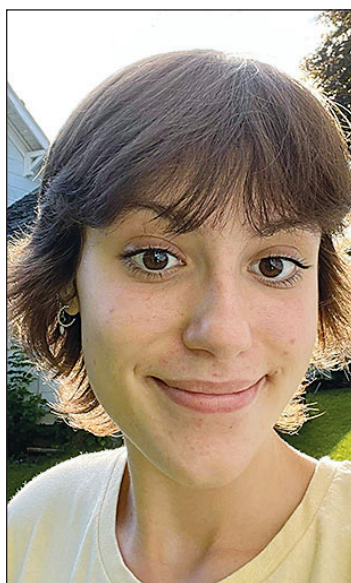

a lot for our community so when people see Nancy in the parade, I hope they remember him, too."

As for retirement, Hillsheim said she's going to miss both her co-workers and the legions of customers she has known since first going to work at the co-op 44 years ago.

"I've met a lot of great people, from those I've worked with to the farmers," she said, "so it was kind of hard to say goodbye. But they always say you know when it's time, so I'm ready."

She paused and laughed.

"At least I think I am ready." But Hillsheim said she will continue to serve on the fair board and is already looking forward to the annual four-day event that is held over the Labor Day weekend every year.

"I think the fair might be one of those lifetime contracts," she said with a laugh, "but I really do love our little fair and being involved with it."

Attorney warns supervisors county will have 'all the risk'

transpired at a joint meeting held last week between the Board of Supervisors and the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council.

At that meeting, the Ambulance Council members said they believe that the county should own the service and each city should have its own 28E agreement with the county to provide funding for the ongoing expenses of an ambulance service that would receive its start-up costs through the county's American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) funds.

But Laudner wanted to make sure there was support from the board to start and own an ambulance service before he began work on the agreements, which he said would be the same for each city, save for the amount each city would pay the county.

"Given what transpired with 422D transpired this morning, the fact that we spent a

lot of time — [County Auditor] Stephanie [Mashek] and I did — working on that. ... It was 5-0 when we first talked about it, let the voters decide, and it's slowly has gotten to the point where we are at now where it fell apart."

Laudner said he wanted some assurances from the board before going to work on what he called "fairly complicated" 28E agreements.

"Before I spend the next two weeks on and off throughout the day working on this ... so before I start working on this process, I believe I know where three of you are," he said. "Now that we have had a couple of days to digest it ... is that still the plan. I don't want to come back to you on the Tuesday after the Fourth [of July] with this proposal and there are not votes on here to have county ambulance service or there's not votes on here to spend the ARPA money to get it started."

"... I hate to put you on the spot, but I don't want to waste

my time to do it if there's not support."

The county attorney also pointed out that he wanted county leaders to head into the process with "eyes wide open," pointing out that he believed the county was taking on the "risk" that comes with a publicly-owned service.

"That's why I want to make sure that we're all on the same page; not all, at least three of you are on the same page to say we're going to spend the ARPA money and we're going to take the risk of running the dang thing."

Board members like Chairman Matt Kuhn and Jason Byrne expressed some uneasiness that the Ambulance Council would dissolve and that the cities, or at least the majority of members of the Ambulance Council, were willing to not "have a say" once the publicly-owned service is up and running.

Byrne said he would like to see, at the very least, an advisory council that included city

leaders be formed to bring their "concerns" back to the Board of Supervisors on at least an annual basis.

Kuhn also said it was critical that the county must receive a relatively long-term commitment from the cities if the board is going to move ahead with starting a service at the beginning of 2023.

"We need a kind of lock where the cities can't get out of it," he said, "because we're putting in a large contribution to the starting costs."

After more than 30 minutes of discussion, the Board of Supervisors voted to direct Laudner to draft the 28E agreements, with Kuhn, Byrne and Breitbach supporting the motion while Zoll and Hackman were against it.

Laudner said he would present at least a rough draft to the Board of Supervisors by this Monday and bring the final agreements back to the board for its approval by its July 5 meeting.

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Nashua wrestles with EMS issue

"In a perfect world, I'd love to have a cheap contract with a large hospital to supply us what we need that we could budget," said Nashua City Attorney David Skilton.

Chickasaw County is looking to run a publicly-owned EMS for approximately \$1.7 million and have it funded through the various cities within the county that would utilize it life-saving services. Publicly-owned ambulance service proponents are asking the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors to use American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) funds to cover the costs of "buying out" McGrath's operation.

The projected financial numbers are bleak for the EMS startup – at least in the first several years it gets off the ground and tries to make a profit. Call volume will be a big determining factor in how much revenue is generated from the EMS.

Johnson said Nashua's per-capita contribution to the potential startup would be roughly \$160.00. That yearly contribution figure was much higher than the previous total of \$75,000 she presented to the City Council during the first meeting of the month. She stated a yearly loss of \$39,000 is projected for Nashua.

Five Ambulance Council representatives that represent the eight cities within the county – New Hampton, Alta Vista, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler, Nashua and North Washington – are planning on adjusting their financial numbers to bring forth to their City Councils to possibly amend their budgets to potentially fund a new EMS run by Chickasaw County.

Chickasaw County Sheriff Marty Hemann stated that Fredericksburg voted 4-1 at its most recent Council meeting to go along with the potential startup EMS.

He said the current cost for Fredericksburg would be around \$100,000 – almost five times what the town's current contribution of \$20,000 to the privately-run EMS is. Hemann said a loss of \$20,000 is projected in its first year in terms of what Fredericksburg's bottom line could be after Year 1.

Nashua's main stumbling block it is wrestling with is it's location and the time it takes for an ambulance to reach those in need if that EMS has to travel from New Hampton – where the Council wants the proposed publicly-run service located.

"The numbers to wait 45 minutes for an ambulance is absolutely unacceptable," said Scott Cerwinski. "In a community that has got a bigger population of elderly people than anything else, it's unacceptable."

Cerwinski is a former Nashua City Council member and will sit on the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors after defeating Tim Zoli in

the primary election.

Nashua City's Council formerly requested to have a staffed ambulance inside its city limits during the first City Council meeting of the month on Monday, June 6. Nashua is exploring the option to staff that ambulance with volunteers.

"I told them we're always up for discussion," said Johnson. "I personally believe that going through this 28E agreement that we need to set a meeting with us and the Board of Supervisors to hash out the details instead of doing a back-and-forth thing that we did with the Sheriff's Office. Just because that was a big fiasco that took forever that didn't need to be done if we could have just gotten together."

"I think our best bet would be to present it to the Board of Supervisors in the manner that this is money that they're losing out on by not allowing us to have one of their ambulances," said Johnson.

Nashua Council member Rhonda Dean made a motion that was seconded and unanimously approved to come up with come up with some ideas in a workshop, along with the Nashua Fire Department present, in a workshop that could provide potential solutions to the town's predicament.

"I don't like this situation that we're in," said Dean. "I hate it. There's not a whole lot we can do, unless we want to completely fund an ambulance service in Nashua, Iowa. Even if we had the money, we'd never have a staff."

The Ambulance Council will more than likely be disbanded should cities elect to participate in the much-talked about publicly-owned EMS.

Nashua sits in a precarious spot – situated near the border of four counties in northeast Iowa – Chickasaw, Bremer, Butler and Floyd. If a startup, public-owned EMS gets off the ground and is run out of New Hampton – that's a decent drive for Nashua residents to have to wait to receive life-saving support from an ambulance that may take 20 to 30 minutes to arrive at a caller's doorsteps.

"When we're discussing the 28E agreement, that's something we can bring up – that the majority of our citizens have stated that they'll just hop in the car and drive up there and that's no income for you. At least if we have one here, that's income," said Johnson.

The Board of Supervisors is entertaining the thought of creating separate 28 E agreements for each city, as opposed to revising the current one when it runs out at the end of the year.

The biggest stumbling block with the current contract is the county's budget is capped at \$262,500, which begins at the start of the new fiscal year on July 1. That won't be enough to cover the costs for the first six months the publicly-owned service would be operational.

junior national title for a website he constructed to tell the story of a the "Ghost Army," which was made up of units that used deception to help defeat Nazi Germany in World War II.

And it was the cap to what turned out to be an excellent National History Day contest for Nashua-Plainfield, which has become a powerhouse both in the state of Iowa and nationally.

High school students Cal Levi, Paige Franzen and Kadence Huck were awarded the E Pluribus Unum Special Award from the America 250 Foundation for its group documentary titled "Out of the Chairs, Up the Stairs: ADA Now!"

Soon-to-be Nashua-Plainfield freshman Elea O'Neill not only made the finals for her junior paper titled "Herbert Hoover: Humanitarian Hero Halts Hunger Through Food Diplomacy" but she also was honored by being named one of the White House Historical Showcase honorees.

And junior high students Connor Sullivan, Chris Niedert and Lily Jones finished third in their "room" at the contest.

At the contest, the winners of each room move on to the finals, where they are once again judged, and during the awards ceremony the finalists are first announced before the top three — in reverse order — medalists are named. So for Sinnwell, that meant waiting agonizing minutes to find out if he had repeated.

"I mean it's good to be a finalist, but when you're not third or second," he said, "Grandpa nailed it with that 'all or nothing' line. When I saw my name go up, oh my gosh, it was just as good as last year."

FOR LONGTIME Nashua-Plainfield History Day advisor Suzy Turner, the "nerves" on Saturday didn't quite approach those she had during the state contest that was held in late April in Des Moines.

"That's the one that's always the hardest on me," she said. "It's such a 'cheers and tears' kind of thing at state. You're so happy for the ones that made it and you fill the emotions for those who didn't."

Turner said she was proud of all of her NHD contest qualifiers.

"I think one of the things that always means a lot to me is they never really settle," she said. "Their projects changed from districts to state, and even after they made nationals, it wasn't like they just sat on them if that makes any sense. They worked on them, made them better. Even if we hadn't won a thing at nationals, I would have been happy because I know they put so much time and effort into their projects."

ONE OF THE most-oft asked questions

of Nashua-Plainfield National History Day participants over the years has been this: Do you really have fun competing in an extra-curricular project that, well, basically is doing a lot of homework; after all, they put in hours of research, time and effort into their project.

"Yeah, it's kind of crazy, isn't it," Levi asked with a laugh, "but seriously, we do have fun."

One of his project partners summed it up perfectly.

"It is a lot of work," Huck said, "but you definitely have your moments. Your doing history that you're really interested in, and you're doing it with your friends ... so yeah, it's fun, which I know sounds a little strange to those who don't do History Day."

The ADA group members were asked how they "separated" the work with their project.

All three did the research, Franzen provided the "voice over" for the documentary and Levi did much of the technical and editing.

Huck's job? "She made sure we got our work done," Franzen said with a laugh, and when Huck heard what her friend had said, she couldn't help but laugh.

"Well someone has to do it," she said. "Seriously, it really is a group effort. I think we're all competitive enough that we always kept thinking of ways to make it better."

The same went for O'Neill, whose division requires a paper be between 1,500 and 2,500 words.

"I changed a lot, I added some things and all that," she said, "but yeah, you find out that playing with 300 words may seem like a lot but it really isn't."

Still, she found something she was passionate about as she told the story of the only president from Iowa who many remember as a failure because of the Great Depression yet is considered a hero by the Belgian people for his work on bringing food to the famine-stricken country after World War I.

"That's what makes this so meaningful," O'Neill said about History Day. "Regular history is just so basic, but here, you get to really dive into something that you're really interested in."

SINNWELL, MEANWHILE, appears to have found a championship formula when it comes to National History Day, and it starts with a meal at HuHot Mongolian Grill.

"Yeah, I ate there last year on Saturday and I ate there this year on Saturday," he said with a laugh, "so when we finally get to be in person next year, there better be a Hu Hot out there somewhere."

But as he soaked in a second straight year being a national champion, Sinnwell talked about how appreciative he was for his National History Day advisor and his teammates.

"They make it worth it," he said. "We do have a lot of fun doing this, which I know to some people sounds crazy, but to me, that's the best part of National History Day."

Another way to put it – the Class 1A baseball brackets have been released by the Iowa High School Coaches Association.

Wednesday night's Top of Iowa Conference contest versus St. Ansgar at Stan Burkle Field in Nashua was a postseason preview – with a catch.

The contest was a rematch from earlier in the season when the Saints walked off N-P to claim a 6-5 win in the bottom of the seventh.

N-P worked its way to two impressive wins prior to the Saints' setback. N-P junior Bo Harrington silenced Central Springs' bats to claim a 5-0 victory over the Panthers on Tuesday. The Huskies broke out the bats versus Aplington-Parkesburg in another road tilt on Monday, defeating the Falcons, 9-8.

Janesville's Leo Dodd handcuffed Husky bats on Thursday, June 16 en route to 5-1 Wildcat win. Dodd allowed just two hits and struck out 11. Second-ranked Mason City Newman topped N-P, 10-2, last week Friday.

N-P is 0-9 against teams with a winning record and 9-2 against squads that have played to an under .500 mark.

Those are just numbers to Miller.

"I we cared about our overall record, we would not schedule top 10 teams in non-conference – just to make sure people

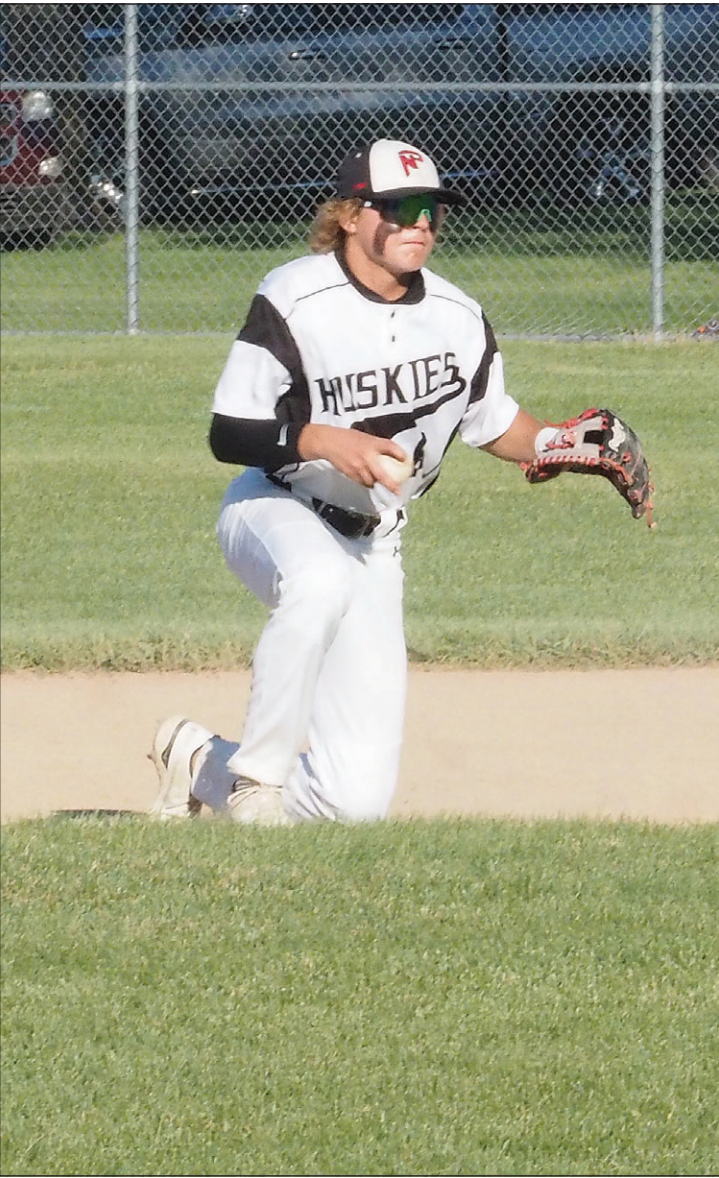
Huskies also left a runner on second without knocking him in in the sixth.
