meeting here in July,” he said, “but I can tell you that we have committee members who have already started their 2023 files.”

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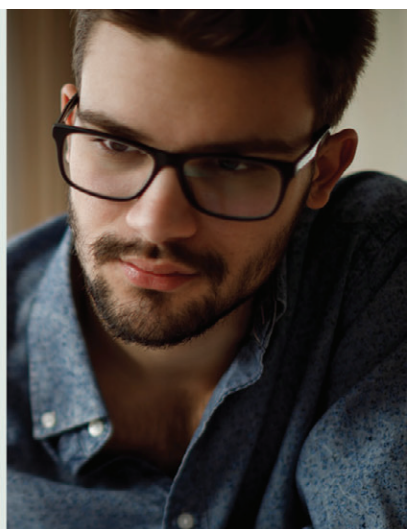

Bob's life began on Oct. 22, 1936, when his parents, Hans and Elsie (Griesert) Ross welcomed their second of five children to the world in Fredericksburg. Bob grew up on a farm near Fredericksburg, helped his parents on the farm where he learned the value of a great work ethic and attended country school before going to Fredericksburg High School, where he was a standout athlete in baseball and basketball and a member of the Class of 1954.

Major League Baseball scouts liked what they saw in Bob, a lefty pitcher, first baseman and outfielder who had a chance to play professional baseball after graduating, but he was a farmer at heart and decided to work the land and raise livestock.

## Supervisors approve sending 28Es to cities

the financial risks for both the county and cities to the adjustment to payment amounts to how a city or the county could "terminate" the agreement during its initial term.

Start with the length of the agreement, which Laudner's draft has set at five years, and the payments each city would have to make during 2023. Those payments were based on a \$1.2 million budget — the amount of expenses a consultant hired by the Ambulance Council said a publicly-owned ambulance service would incur in its first year of operation.

The payments range from \$4,608 for the city's smallest city, Bassett, to the \$356,904 that the county's largest city, New Hampton, would pay. Nashua's share would \$158,472.

Proponents of the publicly-owned service point out that the \$1.2 million budget is based on staffing levels that, at least at the start, aren't realistic and does not include revenue the service will receive.

Laudner said his draft also states that city's annual payments would be capped at the initial 2023 rates plus automatic 5 percent annual increases, and that cities could not be charged any more than that additional 5 percent "even if losses exceed initial guidance."

"You guys can never come back to them with your hat in hand and say hey we need more," he said. "They have very fixed costs that you're taking the risk that you can run it for \$1.2 million."

Laudner's draft also states that beginning in 2025, the third year of the agreements, the Board of Supervisors has the right to adjust future annual payments downward, and he also has a clause in the agreements that supervisors can waive any payment amounts, which he said would generally be a quarterly amount.

His draft also allows for a city to opt out of the agreement, but even though a city can leave the agreement with no notice, they must pay what he called an "exit fee," which would be all of the anticipated annual payments from the city during the entire initial term of the agreement.

As for the county, its "opt-out" would be that it could provide a one-year notice to discontinue the county-owned EMS business.

And Laudner's agreement also does allow that after the initial five-year agreements, either party may terminate the agreement with no exit fee but must provide written notice to the other party by Sept. 30 and that the termination would not be effective until the following July 1.

"This is a draft only," he said. "The bottom line is all this can be changed, all this can be gutted, all this can be restarted."

The county attorney also said that he based his draft on what he heard during a June 15 joint meeting between the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council and the Board of Supervisors. Thus, it does not create what he called a "separate entity" and the publicly-owned service would not have an advisory council; instead, the Board of Supervisors will have the exclusive right to manage the finances of the county-owned EMS business.

"This is going to come down to trust," he said. "I'm sorry, it just is. If it's going to work, they are going to have to trust you the guys or the members in your seats are going to make the right decisions [for the betterment of everyone in the county], but they know what their obligations are capped at."

Earlier in Monday's meeting, Bassett Mayor Jim Ashley said he felt that the cities not having a "voice" would be a major sticking point, but after Laudner's summarized his draft, Supervisor Jason Byrne took issue with Ashley's contention.

"I thought it was pretty clear when [Fredericksburg Mayor] Jimmy Mitchell made that statement, 'He goes we're going to write you a check and wash our hands of it,'" Byrne said, "that this is the path the cities want."

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn, who also serves on the Ambulance Council, agreed.

"That's exactly what I heard, too."

After Laudner finished his presentation, supervisors discussed how they would fund the county's portion of the publicly-owned service, which would amount to \$480,000 in 2023, and their attorney said he didn't believe how the county — or the cities, for that matter — come up with the money for the service should be in the agreements with the cities.

"It's not germane to the 28E," he said. "You don't [care] how they fund theirs. If they use some of their LOST or if they put a user fee on all their water bills ... that's not your business, no more is it how you fund it is

their business."

After a relatively lengthy discussion Monday, board members said they would look through both the summary and the actual 10-page draft of the agreement and reconvene on Thursday.

Once again, board members engaged in lengthy talks about possible changes.

Byrne, who was unable to attend the start of the meeting, suggested to Kuhn on Wednesday that the county might want to include language on "capping" the amount the county would keep in its ambulance account.

"Jason's idea is if the account balance was set for a maximum of say \$1 million," Kuhn said, "the cities would feel more comfortable if they knew [the county] was going to hoard the money."

But supervisors weren't ready to commit that to the proposed 28E agreements.

Instead, they decided to make a couple of minor changes to Laudner's draft and voted 5-0 to send the agreements to each of the cities.

Before they did, however, Supervisor Jake Hackman again reiterated his opposition to a publicly-owned ambulance service — pointing out that a service in Carroll County has a budget for the fiscal year that begins today (Friday) of more than \$1.45 million.

"We're going from \$250,000 to \$1.2 million," he said, referring to the current contract the Ambulance Council has with Chickasaw Ambulance Service.

Asked by New Hampton City Clerk Karen Clemens what his solution would be, Hackman came back with a quick response.

"Negotiate with the current provider," he said, even though Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath has said on a number of occasions that he has no interest in extending his contract past Dec. 31.

# 4-H and FFA Achievement Show kicks off Tuesday

Patrick Dirks and his fellow employees at the Chickasaw County ISU Extension office have had a busy couple of weeks; after all, they're in the process of moving offices from downtown New Hampton to the old Farm Bureau building on West Milwaukee Street.

And, oh yeah, the Chickasaw County 4-H and FFA Achievement Show starts next week.

"It's been kind of busy, you know," said Dirks, who serves as the county's youth coordinator, "and obviously, the timing isn't great but at the same time, we've had a great amount of support from everyone in the community and we're ready for the show."

That's good, because it kicks off a six-day run beginning Tuesday at the Big 4 Fairgrounds in Nashua, where the annual static — i.e., non-livestock projects that range from photographs to sewing to cooking to woodworking projects to more — judging takes place between 4 and 7 p.m.

But for Dirks, the annual 4-H and FFA Achievement Show is a chance to shine the spotlight on the youth of the county.

"What makes the fair special is that it gives kids lifelong skills," he said. "There's nothing

like watching the progress these kids make from the first time they bring a project to the fair to the last time they're going to. The confidence, the work ethic, the talent ... to me, that's what we should be celebrating at the

fair." Fair officials, meanwhile, are excited to offer some new items to this year's Achievement Show. They range from having food trucks on the grounds for the first two days to a new

"Fair Dance" that will be held on Saturday evening after the crowning of the Chickasaw County Fair Queen.

Big Foot's BBQ will have its food truck at the fairgrounds from 4 to 8 p.m. on Tuesday while Reno Smokehouse will be on the grounds from 4 to 8 p.m. on Wednesday.

"They're both open to the public, as is the dance," Dirks said, "and we hope that entices more people to come out and see the static projects on Tuesday and check out the animals on Wednesday. I said this last year, but we want people to see what our kids are doing and how much work they put into their projects. For people who haven't been here before, I think they're going to be really surprised at just what our kids do."

The crowning of the fair queen on Saturday, July 9, will once again be a part of a "fun night" that will include the Family BBQ put on by the Chickasaw County Cattlemen's Association. Tickets for the BBQ are \$7.50 and available from the Extension Office or any 4-H member or leader.

"We don't want this to be just a 4-H and FFA event," Dirks said. "We want our whole county to be part of what I think is a really good celebration of our kids, their animals and their projects. So please, come out. Enjoy it."

Mayor Anthofer asked for consideration approving the agenda after amending it removing 13(a) Consideration/Approval to allow the Fire Association to keep money given by the Grandy Estate, 13(d) consideration/approval to get sand for the beaches, and 13(h) consideration/approval of re-estimated dock repair.

Dean/M to approve the amended agenda. Malven/S, M/C. Roll call all ayes.

Mayor Anthofer called for a motion to approve the consent agenda. Minutes from the regular council meeting June 6, 2022, Consent Calendar Payment of Claims June 3-16, 2022 totaling \$50,856.07 (see claims report), and the following permits: Building: 502 Saint Lawrence, 102 Dixie Dr., 174 Greenwood Ave., 28 Douglas St., and 824 Main St.; Cigarette/Tobacco license renewals: Kwik Star; and Alcohol/Liquor licenses Big 4 Fair and Welcome Center. Willsher/M, Malven/S, M/C. RC: all ayes. Mayor Anthofer asked for public comments. A resident inquired about the city doing something with a culvert and gutter by 114 Wabash to address the flooding. Another resident had inquired about golf carts being able to cross over the bridge on 346. The council informed the citizen that this was not permitted per state law. Dean mentioned that they are going to hold one more coffee with the council on July 16th and encourages anyone who would like a round table discussion about the city to attend.

Nick Henningsen Water/Waste Water Superintendent gave his monthly report. He noted that they will be working on the Splash Pad timer to shut off after 5 minutes of inactivity. He also informed the council of a repair issue at the sewer treatment plant for a new gearbox for the clarifier that will cost \$7,644.47. He also mentioned that the new pump that they installed at the waste water plant is working great. The company that provides a smoke test for the sewer lines is scheduled to be here in July. Heather Hackman Library Director shared her monthly report with the council. The library board was concerned about two trees at the library. The council said they will let the Maintenance Department

know to remove them.  
Action/Discussion  
The council discussed the fee structure for out of district fires and accidents that was presented by Fire Chief Johnson. Malven motioned to set a public hearing to update the current ordinance. Willsher seconded. M/C. RC: all ayes.

The council discussed looking at an ordinance to prevent pushing snow onto or across city streets and right of ways. Johnson/M to table the discussion due to the timing. Kelleher/S, M/C. RC: all ayes. The council discussed employee wages and reviews for FY'23. Dean stated that she would work with City Clerk Ott to plan some times after 5:30PM and have evaluations with the 3 employees. The council discussed the applicants for the Deputy Clerk position. The Mayor and City Clerk have been interviewing candidates. Dean motioned to move forward with recommendation of the Mayor and City Clerk. Malven seconded. M/C. City Attorney talked about moving the handicap signs for the food trucks. He talked to the bank and they were OK with the city moving the sign to the opposite side. The council discussed approving paying for the WODD alcohol and liability insurance. The liability insurance estimate was \$575 and the alcohol insurance we haven't been able to secure an estimate for yet. Dean/M to approve paying the \$575 for the liability insurance and up to \$2,000 for alcohol insurance. Johnson/S, M/C. Roll Call: all ayes. Johnson discussed the information that she received at the ambulance council meetings. She stated that the city's total cost would be \$160,000, but after revenues from the service it would equate to about a \$39,000 loss. She mentioned that the ambulance council representative of the surrounding towns in Chickasaw County seemed to be on board with using a per-capita fee structure; however they haven't taken the information back to their respective city councils to get their opinion. The County Attorney is in the process of drafting a 28E Agreement. Dean motioned to put further discussion into a work group with council and encouraged the Fire Department members to participate as well. Johnson/S, M/C. RC: all ayes. The council discussed painting crosswalks per information from Chamber President Val Johnson. They wanted to get more information because the Iowa DOT is usually in charge of Hwy 346 and so they wanted to get clarification. The council discussed changing the city logo. Another man on the cannon crew gave this name, which seemed suspect, but if he was fibbing, he never let on.

"My name is Al Cannon," said the Mason City man. "I'm literally A. Cannon. My wife's name is also Al Cannon."

The cannon the crew was manning actually belonged to his wife.

"I got it for her for a present," said Cannon. "Most women want diamonds, my wife wanted a cannon." The female Cannon, he explained, has been part of the reenactment for years. "She started as a powder monkey when she was nine."

The cannon's name was Sally Ann, and she had a "sister" also on the field — Rebecca Ann.

"You need to name your cannon," said Aaron Hurlbet — who goes by Jingles during the reenactment. "It's just like a boat." They are "sisters" since the replicas were made at the same time.

The battle started with a pair of very loud cannon blasts. Dick Pohorsky knew they were coming, that's why he removed his hearing aids.

"I love it, I've been doing reenactments for 30 years," he said. Which might have

something to do with the fact he needs hearing aids.

Hillegas finished the regular season on the hill with a 2-2 record and 3.65 ERA. He struck out 47 batters in almost 31 innings of work. Harrington led the Huskies in the ERA department (2.58). He pitched to a 3-3 mark and was also tops on the team with 52 strikeouts.

Harrington brings a hefty bat into the post-season as well. He finished third in the TIC with a .515 batting average. Hillegas was No. 1 in RBI on the team with 35 and sports a .442 clip at the plate.

"I know fully that these guys can win and make a run," said Miller. "We've got the tools. We've got the pieces."

N-P played an unconventional doubleheader with Northwood-Kensett and Hampton-Dumont-CAL on Thursday, June 23. The Huskies ravaged the base paths against the winless Vikings (0-20, 0-16) en route to a 29-9 lashing.

Hillegas knocked in six runs against the Vikings. Harrington, Tucker Franzen, Landon Pratt and Sam Fundermann each collected four RBI in the blowout over N-K.

Hampton-Dumont-CAL (21-7) defeated N-P, 12-2. Dawson Glaser started in that contest and gave up three earned runs over five innings of work. He struck out six and walked two.

McMadd Munn's three hits and Eli Kalainoff's three runs knocked in were some of the high-lights offensively in the Riceville victory.

Franzen overcame six walks to notch a complete game over Riceville. He allowed just three hits and three earned runs. Like Kalainoff, Franzen also amassed three RBI in the last regular season game versus the Wildcats.

While N-P ran into a buzz saw in the form of Mason City Newman last year in the second round of district play, Miller guided the Huskies to the district final against St. Ansgar two summers ago. The Saints slipped past the Huskies, 5-4. St. Ansgar broke a tie in the bottom of the seventh to win the game in walk-off fashion.

"We've talked throughout the year of how to kind of – so to say, close the gap and get those tight wins in those tight games," said Miller. "We feel like we've got a pretty damn good chance this year."

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# First-time event a big hit!

After successful debut, organizers already looking forward to '23 family-friendly triathlon

Families, friends and local residents lined the shore of Cedar Lake, shouting encouragement, lifting a poster and pointing the way, as bike riders came down their final stretch where kayaks awaited.

Those in bike helmets helped their teammates push off, or got ready to row on their own, after carrying colorful kayaks down the sandy hill to the beach. The silver blue lake shimmered as paddles broke the surface of the water.

Sarah Sudol looked out at the dots of kayakers spread out across the horizon, and explained what first ignited the idea for a Water Over the Dam Days Triathlon.

Sudol and her cousins, Brittany Theilen and Nikki Stumme, came up with the idea when watching a similar triathlon at the festival in Fairbanks, Iowa last year.

"We had seen it happen in another community and so we just decided, it's my two cousins and I, and we thought 'oh this would be fun, something fun for Water Over the Dam Days,'" Sudol said, "so we started planning it back in January and that's kind of where it started."

"So we just implemented it and we tried the, the route was just a ..., " Theilen said, and paused to think of the right words.

"A learning experience," her sister Stumme jumped in and added.

"Learning experience, the route of least resistance. I mean avoid this hill at all costs on a bike," Theilen said and motioned toward the hill behind her in the campground. "We don't want kids flying down on that."

"Especially with speed bumps," Nikki added.

"Oh gosh, yeah. Taking off on that would just be brutal," Brittany said with a laugh. They had the riders start off down the hill toward the public beach instead.

When they were planning, Sudol said that they tried to keep the distances of the route shorter so that families and kids would be able to participate.

They decided on three miles of biking, one mile of kayaking and one mile of running.

"The easiest was bike. The run was ok, but the kayak, that was hard," the winner, Mike Caswell, said after Friday's triathlon. "Something different that I haven't trained for."

Caswell, a Nashua native, has run "quite a few triathlons and half Iron Mans" before Friday's competition, but still admitted the WODD event wasn't easy. But when asked if he would do it again, he was quick to answer.

"Oh, yes," he said. "My son did it with me too so that was even better." He and his son Jace were two of four individuals that Sudol said competed on their own alongside 13 teams who split up the events between participants.

The team who came in second and Brad Theilen, who came in third, thought the run

was better than the bike, but they agreed with Caswell that kayaking in Friday's wind, was in a word "tough."

"The kayaking was very difficult," Brad said, "did not expect that. It was fun though."

"Yes, the mile on the water felt a lot longer than I thought it would have," said Callie Masters, whose group also included Chloe Matthews and Ike Sinnwell. "Yeah I knew who we had to catch so I just had my eye on the first team/group and I went after it."

Once Masters hit the shoreline, her sister, Matthews, was off and running, literally, on the last leg of the race.

"And then really honestly mine was just the easiest part I thought, just run the mile. I mean I think they had the hardest part, but Callie really caught us up, so from there it was just run," said Matthews, who was a successful track and cross country runner for Nashua-Plainfield high school.

"Compared to running, you know three miles like we used to, so a mile's nothing."

The first leg of their relay was Sinnwell, who was a multi-sport athlete at Nashua-Plainfield and graduated a year before Matthews, in 2020. He took off on wheels at the start of the race.

"Biking was a lot harder than I thought," he said. "I felt like I was pedaling as fast as I could but it didn't go as good as I thought it would and then Callie kind of kicked butt."

And now that they've officially competed in the WODD triathlon, Matthews, Masters and Sinnwell agreed on one thing - they'll be back.

"We've learned what we're gonna fix,"

Matthews said and Sinnwell added that they hope to beat their time of 35:42 next year. "So we'll be back next year..." Matthews added.

The good news for them is, the organizers said that too.

And like the Matthews, Masters and Sinnwell team, they've already taken some notes on what to fix for next year.

"Maybe the kayak won't be as long," Brittany said with a laugh.

The wind and the heat may have made portions of the triathlon harder in certain aspects, but overall the organizers were happy with the weather.

Brad and Caswell agreed.

"The wind was the only thing, it was a little windy, but you gotta expect that around here. But it was, like I said, couldn't ask for a better day - it's mid 80s, nice breeze," Brad said.

"The weather is beautiful out today," said Caswell. "You can't ask for anything better."

Caswell also said he was pleased with the support and the turnout.

"Awesome, awesome. For the first time, I think it'll grow."

That's what the organizers are hoping.

"So yeah we do want it to be something that we can you know continue to do and hopefully grow every year and get bigger every year!" Sudol said.

"... It looks like everybody's enjoying themselves," Brittany said, "so we're just excited to bring a new event to Water Over the Dam Days and hopefully it continues. I have no plans of this being a one and done."

His Huskies have climbed the ladder before and put up a peak performance just two years ago by almost qualifying for the substate final.

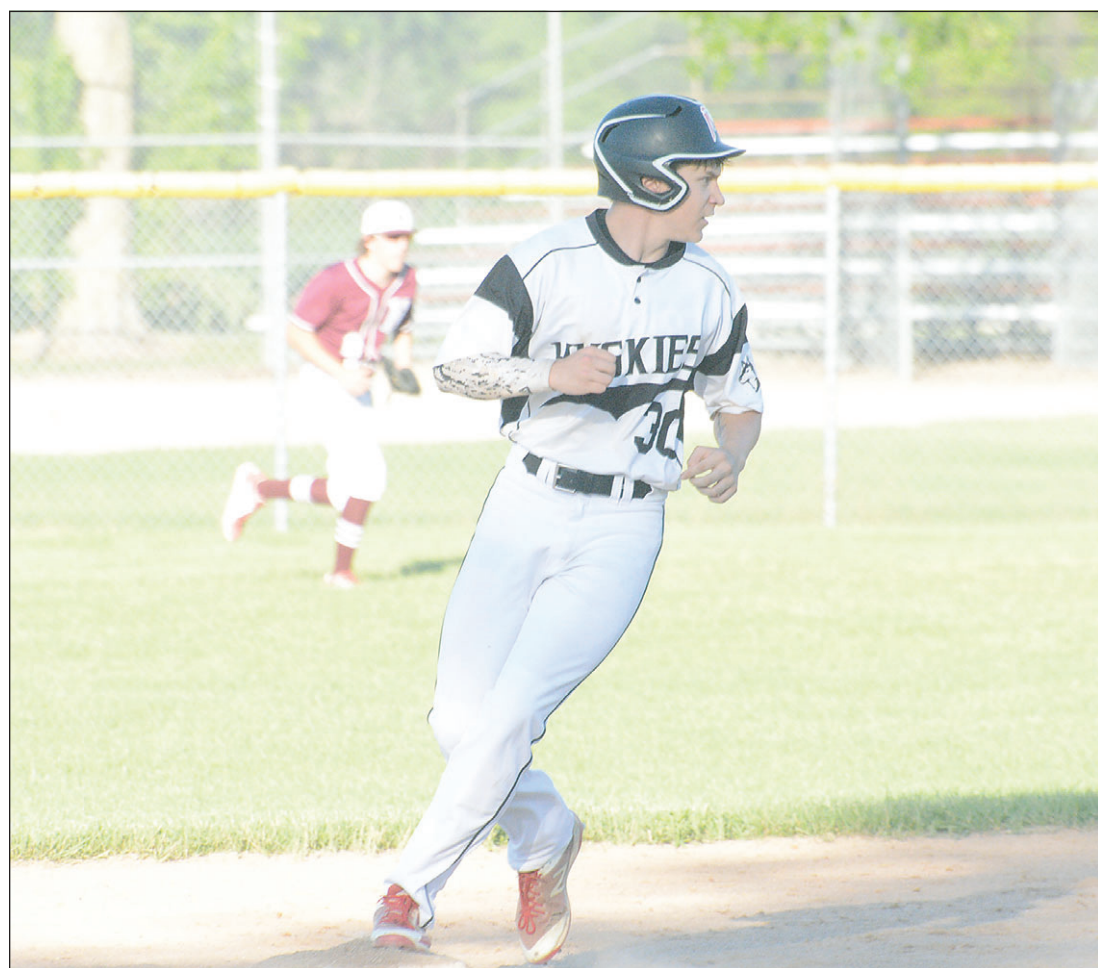
The odds won't be in N-P's favor by most prognosticators to obtain a district championship in 2022, but don't count the Huskies out, either, in that quest.
