Farmland values reach historic highs

ISU and ISU Extension survey show dramatic increases throughout nine-county area

The average value of farmland skyrocketed in Floyd and surrounding counties in 2021, according to an annual survey by Iowa State University and Iowa State University Extension and Outreach. Every county increased the average value per acre of farmland from

2020 to 2021 at a rate higher than the state average, ranging from a 29.2 percent increase in Floyd and Mitchell counties, all the way up to a 35.4 percent increase in value in Franklin County.

Although Franklin had the greatest gain, the highest average value per acre occurred in Bremer County, where the survey showed it at \$11,251 per acre. The lowest value

among the nine area counties was \$9,168 per acre in Howard County.

The average price per acre in Floyd County was \$9,916, up from \$7,673 in the previous year's survey.

Across the state, the average value of an acre of farmland increased 29 percent this year, the report said.

The average dollar value of an acre of farmland is now higher than at any point since ISU and the ISU

Extension and Outreach started surveying land values in 1941, and is 12 percent higher than the previous high mark set in 2013.

Adjusted for inflation, however, the land values in 2012 and 2013 were higher than the current averages.

A December that had plenty of warmth and relatively little snow took a dramatic turn this week.

Start with a decent snowfall on Tuesday, throw in a little freezing drizzle later in the day and the coldest temperatures of the season on Wednesday and we can probably safely say that winter might be settling into the area.

Much of Chickasaw County was blanketed with 3 to 4 inches of snow Tuesday even though forecasters originally expected just 1 to 3 inches to fall, and more may be on the way this week-end as forecasters say they are keeping close eyes on a storm system that may impact the area on New Year's Day.

Tuesday's storm ended what had been a mild month. Through the first 27 days of the month, Nashua had recorded just seven days of high temperatures that failed to break the freezing mark. The city also had 11 days in which highs were at least in the 40s, with the warmest day coming on Dec. 15 when temperatures soared into the high 60s.

That meant the city had its fifth consecutive Christmas without snow on the ground, but Tuesday's snowfall looks like it will stick around for a while. Highs today (Thursday) and Friday are expected to be in the 20s before plummeting below zero by Saturday night.

Council will pay for ambulance feasibility study

Council members vote to use 'seed money,' enter renegotiations with current provider, table AMR decision

The Chickasaw County Ambulance Council voted unanimously to hire a Minnesota company to provide a feasibility study on the county's EMS needs during a meeting held last week.

During the same meeting, council members also voted to appoint a two-person committee to meet with the county's current ambulance provider's owner to discuss the possibility of Chickasaw Ambulance Service providing EMS services beyond June 30.

The actions came during a joint meeting with the Board of Supervisors and the Chickasaw County ARPA Committee last Tuesday night. During the meeting, the Ambulance Council also tabled discussions and possible action on the only bid it received when it sent out requests for proposals (RFPs) this fall, an action that led Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath to opt out, effective this coming summer, of a two-year contract.

The meeting was called after the Board of Supervisors voted on Dec. 13 to not consider the ARPA Committee's recommendation to use part of the \$2.3 million from the America Rescue Plan Act to start a county-owned ambulance service until an EMS needs assessment was completed. Supervisors said they felt the \$25,000 "seed money" that was part of a settlement that set up the new Ambulance Council should pay for the assessment.

During last week's meeting, though, some Ambulance Council members questioned why the council should pay for the study.

"If it's a county-run ambulance and the Board of Supervisors is going to oversee it and this board is going to have to change to an advisory committee," said Scott Cerwinski, who represents Nashua

'Short week' has lower COVID numbers

Chickasaw County had its lowest number of positive COVID-19 tests in months last week as 29 residents tested positive for the virus.

Granted, Public Health and Homecare Services Administrator Lisa Welter's weekly report covered just five days because it was released on Wednesday, two days earlier than normal, because of the Christmas holiday.

Still, the 29 positive tests were seven less than the report released on Thanksgiving week last month.

Of the 29 new cases, nine were fully vaccinated, including one in a resident who had received a boost dose.

City Council approves drafting new contract with Sheriff's Office

Sheriff reminds Nashua residents that they must comply with snow ordinance so that crews can clear city streets after snow falls

The first step taken toward the possible signing of a new contract with the city of Nashua and the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Department took a positive step last Monday at the final regular city council meeting of 2021.

For current and outgoing Nashua City Council members, an important

decision was made that could continue to keep Nashua a safe community for years to come.

Council members approved to draft a new, two-year contract with the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Department to provide general law enforcement services to the city. The current three-year contract, which began in 2019, expires on June 30, 2022.

Nashua has contracted the use of the sheriff's department since 2018 according to Chickasaw County Sheriff Marty Hemann. While last Monday's meeting is a step in the right direction toward retaining the use of the sheriff's department to police Nashua, there will still need to be other steps taken before a contract is officially drafted and the new city council votes on the matter to proceed with signing a new

agreement between the two entities.

If the Nashua City Council approves the final draft, it may be another two or three months at the earliest for the paperwork to be complete.

"That won't even be signed until some time late winter, early spring," said Hemann.

Nashua no longer has a police force, as former chief Jeremy Iriarte resigned that position earlier this year. The

Chickasaw Sheriff's Department has been patrolling the streets of Nashua for well over three years now and the good news is that the new contract that has yet to be signed will save the city money.

While the hourly rate to provide patrol, investigation and all auxiliary and technical services by the sheriff's

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Stronger commodity prices, strong yields help land values

The last time average farmland values increased more than 25 percent in a single year was in 2011, when values rose 32.5 percent.

“Surging ethanol demand and high commodity prices were two of the significant factors driving the increase in 2011,” said Wendong Zhang, an associate professor in economics and extension economist at Iowa State’s Center for Agricultural and Rural Development.

“The increase this year is in part due to much stronger commodity prices thanks to higher exports, stronger-than-expected crop yields, and strong ad hoc COVID-19 related government payments,” he said.

Zhang leads Iowa State’s annual Land Value Survey, which found that the average statewide value of an acre of farmland is \$9,751, an increase of 29 percent, or \$2,193, since 2020. The \$9,751 per acre estimate, and 29 percent increase in value, represents a statewide average of low-, medium- and high-quality farmland.

Zhang said that favorable interest rates also contributed to the increases in 2011 and this year; however, he noted that inflation was a very important factor behind the value increase this year as well. Earlier this month, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that the nation’s inflation rate rose 6.8 percent over the last year, which was the largest increase

since 1982.

“Inflation is driving some investors to consider farmland as an alternative investment asset because farmland value tends to rise with higher inflation. The inflation-adjusted average value rose 21 percent but the nominal value rose 29 percent, which shows the effect of inflation,” Zhang said.

As for U.S. net farm income, Zhang said it is forecasted to grow \$22.0 billion (23.2 percent) from 2020 levels to \$116.8 billion in 2021, which is the highest level since 2013.

“The increase in 2021 farm income is largely driven by the rises in commodity prices and

the resulting crop and livestock receipts, as opposed to almost solely ad hoc federal government payments as in 2020,” he said.

Zhang said that while 80 percent of respondents had optimistic views about what the farmland market would look like one year from now, most reported that they expect values to increase less than 10 percent in 2022.

Looking five years ahead, Zhang said that the number of respondents expecting a decline in farmland values nearly doubled, but over 80 percent of respondents predicted that farmland values would rise another 10 percent to 20 per-

cent over 2021 values.

All 99 of Iowa’s counties showed an increase in land values. For the ninth consecutive year, Scott and Decatur counties reported the highest and lowest values, respectively. Land values in Scott County increased 30 percent, or \$3,193 per acre, to \$13,852. Land values in Decatur County increased 31.5 percent, or \$1,213 per acre, to \$5,062.

Clayton and Allamakee counties reported the largest percentage increase, 36.4 percent, while Scott County saw the largest dollar increase, \$3,193 per acre. The smallest percentage increase, 23.2 percent, was reported in Keokuk County.

Statewide, low-quality land now averages \$6,397 per acre, an increase of 26 percent or \$1,319 per acre. Medium-quality land now averages \$9,071 per acre, an increase of 27.4 percent or \$1,953 per acre. High-quality land now averages \$11,834 per acre, an increase of 30.5 percent or \$2,766 per acre.

The Northwest district reported the highest values for low-, medium- and high-quality land at \$8,088, \$11,042 and \$13,997 per acre, respectively. The South Central district reported the lowest values for low-, medium- and high-quality land at \$4,058, \$6,094 and \$8,194 per acre, respectively.

The most frequently mentioned positive factor influencing the land market was higher commodity prices. Favorable interest rates and strong yields were the second- and third-

most frequently mentioned factors. Other frequently mentioned factors included limited land supply, strong demand, COVID-related government payments and a good farm economy.

The most frequently mentioned negative factor affecting

land values was higher input costs. Other noted factors included concerns about the sustainability of high land prices, possible changes in interest rates, political uncertainty related to policies, such as tax law changes, and uncertainty related to COVID-19.

Ambulance Council will pursue feasibility study

on the Ambulance Council, “then I’d say the Board of Supervisors should pay for it.”

The ARPA funds can be used to purchase new ambulances and equipment, as well as build a garage to house the rigs, but they can’t be used to provide ongoing funds — i.e., pay employees — for a county-run service.

Board of Supervisor member Jason Byrne said that he felt the current agreement that funds ambulance contracts — 40 percent is paid by the county and 60 percent are paid on a per capita basis by the county’s cities — should remain in place to cover those “ongoing” costs.

Cerwinski agreed that the 28E agreement per capita is “probably a good idea, but let’s see what the feasibility study says because I can tell you right now, if [it] says no ambulance in Nashua, then Nashua is out because we have other options.”

That led to discussion on just what Safe Tech Solutions — the company that McGrath mentioned to supervisors during the Dec. 13 meeting — would actually provide.

McGrath pointed out that the company would look at population, demographics, what the county has for a pool of potential EMS employees and the current reimbursement rates for Medicare, Medicaid and private insurance companies to determine what the county does need for ambulance service.

“They’ll come in basically and say you

need two ambulances, three ambulances, you need 16 employees, you’re projected income based on this many calls is x amount of dollars, your expenses are projected to be this x amount of dollars — concrete numbers,” McGrath said. “Instead of jumping without knowing what you’re jumping into.”

MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center CEO and President Aaron Flugum asked council members why they were so reluctant to use seed money that was supposed to be used to determine ambulance needs in the county?

“Isn’t that money just to be utilized for the benefit of the citizens of Chickasaw County,” Flugum said. “I feel that [ARPA] money is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.”

Fredericksburg Mayor Jimmy Mitchell agreed that the seed money should be used to determine the county’s needs.

“We need to know what we need,” he said. “Let’s find out. ... Let’s get this done.”

Council members finally crafted a proposal that would have the Board of Supervisors and New Hampton representatives reach out to Safe Tech Solutions to do a feasibility study and to do so as quickly as possible and the five voting members of the council voted to approve the plan.

That Board of Supervisors representative, Jacob Hackman, also wanted to open the door to negotiations with the Chickasaw Ambulance Service, and Ambulance Council Chairman Mark Muetherthies asked McGrath if he would be willing to talk about possibly providing service beyond his opt-out date of June 30, 2022.

“I would be willing to sit down with a couple of people,” McGrath said, “and see if we can work something out.”

In 2020, McGrath agreed to a two-year contract with the Ambulance Council that would pay his service \$217,500 in this fiscal year and \$228,385 in the fiscal year that begins July 1, 2022.

When the Ambulance Council sent out RFPs, McGrath filed a notice that he would leave the agreement.

Those RFPs generated just one proposal — a \$245,000 request from AMR for the first year of a contract and 5 percent increases each year after that to provide at least one fully-staffed ambulance to the county.

Although their proposal stated just one ambulance would be housed in the county, AMR officials have said they will have a second ambulance in the county and will do everything to staff it with on-call employees.

During last week’s meeting, the council voted to table discussing or making a decision on AMR’s proposal, and Hackman pushed for entering some kind of conversation with Chickasaw Ambulance Service.

“I just want for the record that we do have the possibility of renegotiation,” he said.

Council members then voted on a proposal to have the Board of Supervisors and Ionia representatives on the Ambulance Council to meet with McGrath. That vote passed by a 4-1 margin, with only the Ambulance Council’s vote — cast by Nashua’s Cerwinski — voting against it.

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Sheriff's Office will no longer charge for dispatching services

Department will increase – the city will no longer have to pay for dispatch services.

“Basically, since the city no longer has a police department, I along with the (Chickasaw) Board of Supervisors, do not feel that we can charge the city for dispatching anymore effective June 30th,” said Chickasaw County Sheriff Marty Hemann.

Once drafted and approved, the contract of the pay rate to retain a law enforcement officer will be bumped up from the current hourly wage of \$56.81 an hour to \$59.50. That’s an increase of around \$7,700. The yearly cost, which was \$163,000 according to Hemann, will be raised to \$171,000.

Around \$11,000 will be saved by the city by eliminating the cost of paying for dispatch services. That equates to an overall savings by the city of roughly \$3,700 when the pay increase of patrolling is figured into the new contract.

The sheriff’s department will continue to patrol Nashua for an obligated hourly total of 240 hours per month, which was the same allotment time in the previous 28E Agreement. The initial contract called for 160 hours a month, but an addendum was added for an additional 80 hours later on in the contract.

Counties declared disaster areas by governor

Gov. Kim Reynolds has issued a disaster proclamation for Allamakee, Bremer, Chickasaw, Fayette, Howard and Winneshiek Counties in response to severe weather that hit the area on Wednesday, Dec. 15.

The governor’s proclamation activated the Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program (IIAGP) and the Iowa Disaster Case Management (IDCM) program.

The IIAGP may provide up to \$5,000 of assistance, reimbursement and/or vendor voucher, for covered items to households with income at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level.

Residents may be eligible for home or car repairs, replacement of clothing or food, and repair or replacement of personal items damaged by the storm. Applications must be made through your local community action office and must be received within 45 days from the date of the proclamation, which was Dec. 16.

The final day to apply is Jan. 31. For more information or to download an application, visit <https://www.iowadcas.org/programs/disaster-assistance/>.

The IDCM program is to address serious needs to overcome disaster-related hardship, injury, or adverse conditions. Disaster case managers work with customers to create a disaster recovery plan and provide guidance and referrals.

There is no income eligibility requirement for Disaster Case Management and there is no direct financial assistance provide by Disaster Case Management. Disaster Case Management closes 180 days from the disaster proclamation.

Individuals suffering losses

“I hope that the city of Nashua is satisfied with the service we’ve been providing,” said Hemann. “I think 240 hours is probably adequate. We’re always going to respond to the city with whatever they need.”

Sheriff Hemann also brought forth to the council at the same meeting a new ticketing process for snow citations that would affect citizens of Nashua if they don’t move their vehicle in accordance with the city’s snow ordinance. This has been a problem for several years as those cars or trucks parked on the street along snow plow routes within Nashua hinder the ability of crews to properly clean up the streets and remove snow.

City workers would notify the Sheriff’s Department when streets were going to be plowed once inclement weather affects the area. The Sheriff’s Department would then issue citations to vehicles that were not moved in a timely manner so the plows could get through city streets to maneuver.

The initial citation would be a fine that violators of the ordinance could pay at City Hall. If the citation was not paid within a selected time frame, a municipal infraction is filed with the Clerk of Court and the cost would increase to \$85 – which is the current filing fee.

Once filed with the Clerk of Court, the citation

would no longer be able to be paid at City Hall and the fee would increase to the original citation plus filing fee.

The proposed process is currently being utilized in nearby Fredericksburg. The city issues \$25 tickets for vehicles that do not move off city streets when the snow ordinance is enacted.

Hemann said that four or five inches of snow fell last winter in Fredericksburg and he said his department did not write one single ticket in that town for violators of the snow ordinance.

“I was really surprised,” said Hemann. “We’re lucky because it’s taken us a lot of years to get to that point.”

Hemann said the sheriff’s department contacts the owners of vehicles in Fredericksburg that were issued citations and were delinquent in paying the \$25 fines.

“We try and work with people,” said Hemann. “If we give them five days or a week, City Hall will give them a bit longer. Then after probably 10 days or two weeks, they’ll say, ‘hey, these haven’t

paid.’ That’s what I just follow-up on.”

No vote has been made by the Nashua City Council as to whether or not this new approach to clearing the streets when snow or nasty weather that hinders travel will be passed.

One of the biggest problems for citizens concerning this proposed approach is where do vehicle owners move their cars or trucks if they don’t have a suitable place to park their vehicle?

Mayor Butch Betsinger brought up the example of a potential home owner that has two or three cars and a one-car garage and they own a short driveway. Sheriff Hemann said some residents of Fredericksburg park their cars on their lawns when the snow ordinance is enacted to avoid a ticket.

“You’re going to hear people say, ‘where am I going to park at?’” said Hemann. “I don’t know if there’s any city parking lots? If there is, the city’s going to clean off that parking lot and you can park it there either. So they’re going to have to figure out something.”

City employee(s) John Ott City Clerk and Nick Henningsen Water/Waste Water Superintendent were present as well as Sheriff Martin Hemann and 3 guests. Mayor Betsinger asked for consideration approving the agenda. Cerwinski/M. Anthofer/S. M/C. Roll Call: All Ayes. Alex Anthofer and Ernest Willsher took their Oath of Office.
Mayor Betsinger asked for public comments and there were none. Mayor Betsinger called for a motion to open the public hearing to open the bids for sale of police vehicle a 2016 Ford Explorer. Business of the Mayor:

Mayor Betsinger had no business to discuss
Department Reports
City Clerk Ott reviewed the November Financial Reports and informed the council that the Bank Reconciliation for November has been completed. He also wanted to inform the council that due to the Holidays and his vacation he will be out of the office beginning December 23rd, so all information that needs to be included in the Tuesday January 4, 2022 council packet will need to be to him by December 22, 2021. He also thanked the current Council and Mayor for their service and dedication to the community.
Council Members
Johnson mentioned that the Fire Department has applied for the FEMA grant to purchase 21 sets of new gear. The city match would be \$5,000 and he will include it in the Fire Department budget.
Kelleher wanted to let everyone know that the Park Board is working on Winter Fest, which is planned for February 5th. He also informed the council that the Pergola blew over in the wind storm and took out a portion of the fence around the Splash Pad. Cerwinski thanked Tom Johnson and Mayor Betsinger for their service.
Sheriff Hemann says that he has been working with the County Board of Supervisors for a new Sheriff’s contract with the city as the current contract expires June 30, 2022. He recommended that the city continue with a 240 hour/month contract. For the first year, this would be an increase from \$163,612 to \$171,360.; however due to the City of Nashua no longer having a Police Department the city would not have to pay for the Communications/Dispatch contract which would save the city \$11,518, so the city would have an overall savings of about \$3,770 the first year. He has only figured the contract for the first year and says that due to the rising costs of public safety he would like to do a 2-3 year contract. Cerwinski motioned to approve writing up a 2 year contract. Johnson seconded. M/C. Roll Call: All Ayes.
Sheriff Hemann also talked about implementing a ticketing process for snow citations for citizens who don’t get their vehicles moved and that hinder the ability of the Streets to be cleaned during snow storms. He talked about the process that has been implemented in Fredericksburg for many years and is working really well. The process would involve the city workers letting the Sheriff’s Department know when they are going to be going out to plow. The Sheriff Department would come and issue citations for vehicles that impeded the city workers ability to move the snow from the streets. The initial process would be a citation that could be paid at City Hall and if the citation wasn’t paid in a few days, it would be filed with the Clerk of Court and would add an additional \$85 which is the current filing fee. Once filed, it

would no longer be able to be paid at City Hall and the fee would increase to the original citation fee plus filing fee. This is the process that is used in Fredericksburg and the Nashua City Council has not made any decision on if they are going to implement this process. He said the most important thing in implementing any process is communication and letting the residents know that the city is cracking down on vehicles impeding the ability of the streets to be cleaned properly during snow storms.
Nick Henningsen Water/Waste Water Superintendent provided his monthly report. He informed the council of some of the upcoming repairs that may be needed including cathodic protection of the water tower to prevent rust on the inside of the bowl. He also mentioned that they have received the booster pump for well #5, but they are waiting for connectors.
Library Heather Hackman presented her November Library Report.
Action/Discussion
Cerwinski briefly discussed the proposal from AMR for ambulance service for \$245,000. He stated that they may be willing to negotiate. He also stated that the County is looking at putting in their own ambulance service, but stated that the current contract with Jeremy McGrath ends on June 30th and there would be no way Chickasaw County would be able to build a facility and team of ambulance service workers and get an ambulance service up and running before June 30th when the current contract ends. He stated that the city needs to make sure that it has Mutual Aid Agreements with Charles City and Waverly in place.
Cerwinski motioned to approve paying the Welcome Center volunteers \$11.00/hour for cleaning the Welcome Center in the interim until a new cleaning associate is found. Kelleher seconded. M/C. Roll Call: All Ayes.
Cerwinski motioned to post the job listing for cleaning associate for City Hall and the Welcome Center. Anthofer seconded. M/C. Roll Call: All Ayes.
Other Business:
There was no other business. Cerwinski motioned to adjourn. Anthofer seconded. M/C. Roll Call: All Ayes. Meeting adjourned at 8:13PM.

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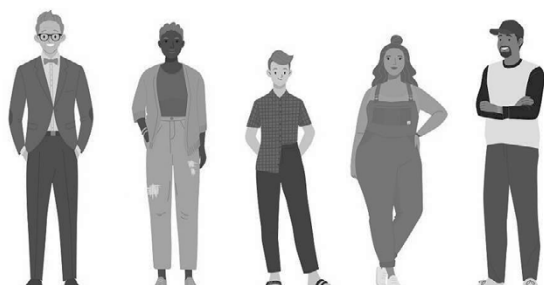

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Despite lofty ranking, N-P coach says ‘our work’s not done’

matches. “It does get to be a grind being on edge all the time, too. It probably wasn’t a bad deal for us to have that kind of competition.”

While this won’t be the first or the last time N-P runs up against a lesser opponent, there will be a significant step up in competition when the season resumes on Thursday, Jan. 6 in a dual at Belmont against second-ranked Osage, Belmont-Klemme and St. Ansgar.

“If we want an opportunity to make it to the state duals, we still have to do some improving in certain weight classes,” said Frost. “Our work’s not done.”

The Iowa Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association (IWCOA) recently released its state dual rankings and N-P is penciled in as the fifth-best team in Class 1A. N-P is ranked sixth in the team tournament ratings released by IAWrestle.

There are no home meets scheduled for N-P the rest of the season. That will change if N-P can remain competitive and rack up wins to be able to host a regional duals meet. The state

allows the top eight teams in each class, determined by rankings and other criteria, to host those regional postseason meets.

“Those (rankings) are important. We talked about that on several occasions with the team,” said Frost.

As far as how the action went down at the meet hosted by North Union – N-P steamrolled its way to pin after pin amidst a considerable amount of forfeits from the other teams.

Rockford sported just five wrestlers and had to forfeit nine matches. N-P racked up 11 pins against North Union.

“We ended up pretty much dominating the competition over there,” said Frost. “The teams weren’t real solid.”

Fourth-ranked Kendrick Huck pinned all three of his opponents in a little over four minutes of mat time combined. Huck, a junior, is 23-1 on the year.

The rest of Frost’s ranked wrestlers – Garrett Rinken (24-0), Trey Nelson (21-4) Jayden Rinken (24-1) and McKade Munn (23-3) encountered little resistance at the last meet of 2021 before the calendar flips over after the New Year.

Tate White, a 182-pound sopho-

more, rolled to two pins and a forfeit and now sports a mark of 21-6 on the mat. Nic Brase, a freshman, is 16-7 at 113 pounds. He pinned Rockford’s Garrett Medlin in just 39 seconds at 106 pounds. He did lose to Landon Price of North Union by decision, 10-3, in the 113-pound weight class.

Kaden Wilken, a junior at 132 pounds, worked his way to two wins by fall and is now 15-8 on the season. Husky sophomore Aiden Sullivan won by technical fall over James Hagen of Forest City by a score of 18-1. Sullivan (160) has wrestled to a 10-11 mark. Titus Evans (14-5), another sophomore, wrestled just one match in the last quad, but it ended up being a pin over Lucas Dreyer of North Union in 2:51 at 160 pounds.

“These guys got high hopes yet,” Frost added.

Landon Pratt (220, 285) also earned two pins at the heavier heights. The junior is 11-13 so far. Jackson Zwanziger (195) pinned Peyton Klein of Forest City in just 42 seconds and is 11-14.

Peak performances should be just around the bend for these Huskies – but that kind of success is usually

accompanied by plenty of sweat and sore muscles after a hard workout.

“Unless you put the time in – they’re ain’t gonna be a switch to flip,” said Frost. “Hopefully you’re hittin’ on all cylinders when those tough matches come around and you get it done. That’s what we gotta keep striving for.”

N-P enters the competitive weekend Tripoli Invite on Sat. Jan. 8.

Perhaps three of the more important elements of successful wrestling are constantly being stressed upon, either at practice in the wrestling room or under the bright lights of an actual match in front of cheering Husky fans.

“The biggest thing we gotta keep working on is mental toughness – getting in shape and keep working on technique,” said Frost.

HUSKIES CLOSE OUT 2021 PORTION OF SCHEDULE WITH THREE ROUTS ON THE MAT

Every wrestler has it — whether he or she is able to utilize it or not is an entirely different discussion.

An extra gear is tapped into by many prep grapplers in the state of Iowa when the post-season draws near in early February.

Many of those hard-working mat men and women earn top medals on the podium stand when state tournaments roll around.

So while the Nashua-Plainfield Husky wrestling squad is still staying focused and dialed in during the Christmas break — wrestling your best at exactly the right moment is in the back of the minds of almost all of Al Frost's wrestlers that comprise his powerhouse squad.

"Obviously we want to peak during postseason," said Frost. "I'm hoping we haven't peaked yet. We still got some growth to have and make in some areas."

It's been a good run thus far through the first half of the season as N-P finished off three overmatched opponents in a quad held at Swea City on Tuesday, Dec. 21.

N-P (16-3) rolled to convincing victories over Forest City (65-15), North Union (72-9) and Rockford (78-6).

"The competition wasn't even near the caliber that we just got done wrestling at the



Battle of Waterloo," said Frost. "The boys felt good and knowing it was the last weigh-in before Christmas."

The last three wins of the seasons against out-gunned Top of Iowa Conference teams put a cap on a stretch that saw N-P wrestle 13 duals in just eight days. That meat grinder of a schedule saw N-P knock off 14th-rated West Des Moines Valley and Clarion-Goldfield-Dows. The Huskies also came

up just short versus the likes of Hampton-Dumont-CAL, Crestwood and No. 1 ranked Waverly-Shell Rock.

Now it's time for a rest for Frost's wrestlers and maybe a few Christmas cookies to nibble on — but not too many.

"That can get pretty tiresome, especially with kids that gotta cut weight," said Frost, referring to the difficult run of
