Accused murderer's arraignment is pushed back

Lawyer cites two issues, asks court to delay Patrie's first appearance

First, the public defender found out he was representing the former Charles City man accused of murdering a retired rural Nashua man 10 years ago through the news media.

And then he learned of a conflict of interest with said client.

So on Monday morning, attorney Aaron Hawbaker asked for and received a continuance for the arraignment of 39-year-old Randy Patrie, who was scheduled to make his first court appearance since being charged with the September 2012 murder of Kenneth Gallmeyer.

In his motion to delay the arraignment, Hawbaker, who works for the Public Defender's Office in Waterloo, wrote that "our office did not receive notice of this appointment from the clerk of court; we learned of it through news accounts." He added that he subsequently learned the clerk had incorrect electronic document management system information for the office and that offi-

cials were working to correct that. Hawbaker also said he spoke with Patrie on Monday via telephone and learned of "a conflict of interest precluding the completion of an arraignment on Mr. Patrie's behalf." The attorney said he is in contact with public defender offices that "serve as conflict designations to determine who will represent Mr. Patrie" upon his withdrawal from the case and that he needs

additional time to find substitute counsel. District Court Judge Richard Stochl granted

It's official: County, Nashua have a deal

City Council approves one-year deal for the Sheriff's Office to provide law enforcement

After months of back-andforth negotiations, a one-year contract for law enforcement services by Chickasaw County to patrol the city of Nashua was officially signed off on by those city leaders on Monday after a 4-1 vote in the Council Chambers. Nashua has also left the door

open to explore the possibility of hiring a police chief after this new, one-year contract is finished on June 30, 2023. The new contract signed begins on June 1, 2022. The town of 1,500 most recently utilized a police chief in 2018. Since then, the town has

contracted the services of the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Department – which agreed to patrol the area for an allotted annual total of 2,880 hours for a cost of just over \$171,000.

That comes out to roughly 240 hours a month. But in the amended contract by the county - Nashua can be charged overtime for any amount of hours that exceed those 2,880 hours at the end of the year.

In prior contracts, Nashua was not charged for hours the county went over in patrolling the city in the agreed upon total or what is essentially overtime hours logged. The hourly rate for the Sheriff

Department to provide patrol and conduct investigation as well as auxiliary and technical services is \$59.50. The overtime rate would increase to \$89.25 or time-and-a-half.

Nashua voted to lower that hourly total to 2,400 hours a year just last month from what the previous two-year contract was (2,880 hours).

Vet's goal: Help residents properly dispose their flags

Businesses help Macon set up a pair of flag disposal sites in city

It's right there in the Flag Code that


Congress amended in 1976.

"The U.S. flag is a living entity and, as such, has all the rights thereof, including the right to exist and expire with dignity.'

And New Hampton resident Jeff Macon, who served in the U.S. Air Force during the late 1980s, is trying to do his part to make sure residents not only understand the code but also have a way to properly dispose of flags that have reached the end of their useful lives.

"I've been bouncing some ideas on how I can help veterans and how I can help people understand the importance of taking care of their flags, and this was one of the things that really hit home for me," Macon said. "We've all seen it when we're driving around; there are flags that really

Drought situation improves in Northeast Iowa

we'd enjoy an early spring; after all, in the first 22 days of the month, we had eight days in which high temperatures were either in the 50s and the 60s.

Since then, though, we've reached 50 once, and that was this past Saturday after we received a couple of inches of snow

The cold, rainy conditions have made a mess of the early spring sports schedule. Take track, for example. New Hampton's coed meet at Waverly last Thursday was canceled because of the cold, and while the boys did get to run in a meet at Decorah on Monday, the girls meet at Mason City Tuesday was canceled.

And today's (Thursday) meets — the

"I'd say it's frustrating," boys golf coach Bill Glenn said, "but I'm the old guy now, which means I've been around long enough to know that this is typical Iowa. Some years are better than others; sooner or later, the weather will straighten out."

should not be flying anymore, but a lot of people don't have the first clue at what is the proper way to dispose of a flag.

And rule No. 1 is that flags should never be thrown away in the garbage.

So Macon reached out to area businesses, who helped him set up two disposal sites — one at Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home and the other at Security State Bank — in New Hampton. He collects the flags from the

bins periodically and eventually, a ceremonial retirement of those disposed flags will be provided by the New Hampton Cub Scouts.

He's had plenty of help from those businesses.

charge the city to \$70 an hour. After Nashua agreed to bump its hours in the contract back up to 2,880 – each party settled on the hourly rate of \$59.50.

Nashua City Attorney David Skilton informed council members and those in attendance at the regular meeting that the county had already made out their budget and allocated funds to their various departments. This created somewhat tense talks between the two parties in coming to an agreement.

"If we had done these requests before the county had generated their budget than we would have had more flexibility," said Skilton. "The decisions were already made."

Council member Samantha Johnson, who motioned to accept the one-year agreement with the county and Tim Malven seconding it, talked about the timetable that it took for a deal to finally get done.

"I think that was the biggest issue with everything with this is that the Board of Supervisors was counting on us to have this set amount of hours because we waited so long," said Johnson. "I think the previous council wanted the new council to be the ones that make that decision. That's were it all kind of

Nashua tabled the discussion on hiring a police chief but did want to receive feedback from the public via town hall meetings at a future date.

"We need more community input and this is a service to the community," said Council member Hal Kelleher. Skilton also said avenues can

"Long ago – Ernie (Willsher) the rate they were going to was aware – we looked at speed cams underneath the bridge on the highway," said Skilton. "The status of the law has changed. Would that make a difference in the budget?'

Johnson stated Nashua at one time - as far back as 2017 had a four-person police force. She said having two full-time police officers in Nashua would in salary alone cost \$199,000. That provided Nashua 48 percent coverage - with full coverage obviously being round-theclock patrol.

"We're saving a lot of money by contracting with the county, regardless," said Johnson. "Then you also have to consider dispatch cost being put back in there, IPERS, insurance, health coverage for that person or their family.'

There's also issues with retention in keeping police officers on the force.

"We do have two Sheriffs that live here in town that are a part of the community," said Johnson. "I think we would turn out to be a training ground to come in, get paid to train - then be taken by a bigger department."

Johnson said that the four-person police force eventually all left the force, whether that was because they were hired elsewhere or for other reasons. Police Chief Jeremy Iriarte took a leave from the force in a military deployment overseas. He recently passed away last month at the age of



Celebrating Palm Sunday

Day has special importance for many Christians around the world Historical celebration of Palm Sunday

Every year, my calendar reminds me that it is almost Palm Sunday. For many people, this day is the unofficial beginning of Spring Break, but it has a deeper significance for Christians.

As we prepare for Palm Sunday this weekend, here are some of the important facts about the day and why it's important to Christians around the world.

What Is Palm Sunday?

On Palm Sunday, Christian churches often give the congregation palm branches to re-create the celebration of Christ's final arrival in Jerusalem because his followers used palm branches to honor him as King and Messiah.

When Is Palm Sunday?

Palm Sunday is the last Sunday in Lent and the Sunday before Easter. It's the beginning of Holy Week, the most important week of the year for Christians. The date changes every year because the date of Easter changes in relation to the Jewish holiday of Passover.

The Story and Meaning of Palm

Palm Sunday commemorates Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem for the Jewish holiday

Jesus rode a young donkey into the Jerusalem and was greeted by a large crowd with palm branches and people shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David," "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord," "Blessed is the king of Israel!" and other expressions of praise (Matthew 21:9). The people put their coats and palm branches on the ground as Jesus passed

Descriptions of this event in Jesus' life can be found in Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:28-40, Matthew 21:1-11, and John 12:1-17. Some Bibles title the passage "The Triumphal Entry" or "Jesus comes to Jerusalem as king." These passages provide insight and background into the significance of this celebration for Christians. Each Gospel account provides a different perspective on Jesus' life and ministry the way four friends might focus on different things to describe the same activity.

Why did the people lay their coats and palm branches on the ground on Palm Sunday?

Laying their coats and palm branches on the ground was a symbolic way for the people to treat Jesus as their king. They hoped that Jesus would overthrow the Roman government in Jerusalem.

John 12:13 records the people saying, "Blessed is the king of Israel!" Mark 11:10 quotes them cheering,

"Blessed is the coming kingdom of our When a king or conquering ruler entered a city, people would create a carpet by putting their coats and branches on

the ground to welcome them. Even today we might use the expression, "rolling out the red carpet" to welcome a celebrity or an important guest.

What is the significance of Jesus riding on a donkey on Palm Sunday? Conquering kings typically rode in char-

iots or on horseback, so it is significant that Jesus rode on a donkey. Jesus wasn't an ordinary King with a kingdom of this world (John 18:36). Jesus rode on a donkey to fulfill a prophecy about the Messiah.

To make sure their readers realized it, each of the Gospel accounts mentions Jesus riding on a donkey. The Gospel writers even record Jesus' specific instructions to his disciples to go to a village where they would find a donkey with her colt beside her. They were told to untie both animals and bring them to Jesus. Matthew 21:4-5 explains this took place to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet

"Say to the daughter of Zion, 'See, your King comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey." Zechariah 9:9

What does Hosanna mean, especially during Palm Sunday?

Hosanna means "Please Save Us." It is a Greek word based on two Hebrew words - "yasha," which means "save or deliver" and "anna," which means "please, I beseech." Mark 11:9 records the people as saying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

The people were quoting Psalm 118:25-26, "Save us, we pray, O LORD! O LORD, we pray, give us success! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD!"

By calling Jesus the Son of David they didn't mean that he was the literal son of David but that he was a descendant of King David and a rightful ruler based on a promise God had made to David in Psalm

or Passion Sunday, as the Sunday before Easter was called in the Catholic, Episcopalian, and Anglican churches, can be traced back over 1600 years.

"The observance of Palm Sunday in Jerusalem was witnessed by the pilgrim Egeria in about 381-384. During this observance, there was a procession of people down the Mount of Olives into Jerusalem. The people waved branches of palms or olive trees as they walked," according to EpiscopalChurch.org. In the Orthodox Church, Palm Sunday

is a continuation of the celebration of Lazarus' resurrection recorded in John 11. Palm Sunday is one of the great feasts of the Orthodox Church. It is called a movable feast day because the date changes every year in relation to Easter. Russian Orthodox churches give out willow branches because palm branches were not historically available.

In a Catholic service, the palm branches are treated as holy because they were blessed by the priest. They are not to be thrown away but instead are collected and incinerated to make the ashes used in the Ash Wednesday service.

Scripture to Reflect on for Palm **Sunday:**

Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem was a day of celebration but it was also a day that many of the cheering crowd did not understand. They thought that they were welcoming a military hero.

Jesus came in peace on a donkey to save them not from the Romans but from the curse of death and to give them eternal life in the Kingdom in Heaven.

• "When Jesus had entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred and asked, 'Who is this?' The crowds replied, 'This is Jesus, the prophet from Nazareth in Galilee.' (Matthew 21:10-11) • "Blessed is the king who comes in the

name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" (Luke 19:38)

• "Jesus said, 'My kingdom is not of this world. If it were, my servants would fight to prevent my arrest by the Jewish leaders. But now my kingdom is from another place."(John 18:36)

Supervisors move ahead on bridge project despite inflation concerns

Chickasaw County Engineer Roman Lensing gave his bosses the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors — a real-world taste of how inflation is making road projects challenging these

During Monday's meeting, supervisors opened bids for a bridge replacement project the county has been planning for this summer, and let's just say they got a little sticker shock.

"We're really seeing it right now," Lensing said after the low bid for a bridge on 260th Street east of Cheyenne Avenue came in at \$148,400. "Throw in the rock letting we did last week with this, and it's making it really challenging."

During last week's meeting, supervisors accepted a bid of \$13.91 a ton for road rock, an increase of 8 percent from the \$12.88 the county paid for rock a year ago.

Monday's news was even

Lensing told supervisors a similar bridge project last year cost about \$80,000 and that even when he asked for an estimate on the 260th Street project in November, he was told it would be about \$96,000.

"I mean that's what happened in the last four months," he told supervisors. "The rock, this bridge project ... it makes realistically get done."

But the Board of Supervisors decided to accept the bid from PCI, especially after Lensing told them that "this bridge will probably be closed if we don't do it this year."

Board members debated on how to pay for the extra Act, better known as ARPA, funds.

But fellow Supervisor Jason Byrne said he wanted to wait meeting: to see about "other projects," including the ambulance feasibility study by SafeTech Solutions before earmarking ARPA funds for road projects.

Board members discussed




