## **Board passes** on 'bonuses' for Public Health

Board of Health recommendation dies with no motion at supervisors meeting

Members of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors wanted to make it abundantly clear Monday that they appreciate the hard work put in and the dedication shown by employees of Chickasaw County Public Health and Homecare Services during the COVID-19 pandemic.

But supervisors didn't want to travel down an unknown road, one that they believe they would find themselves on if they agreed with a Board of Health recommendation to hand out "bonuses" to Public Health workers.

Public Health Administrator Lisa Welter, on behalf of her board, made the request to the Board of Supervisors, asking it to approve

# Let's treat holiday with reverence it deserves

A year ago, I did something I said I'd never do for the rest of my life. I missed going to a Memorial Day observance.

The previous day, Noah and I had boarded a plane and taken off for Boulder, to get him

ettled in at the University of Colorado. On that Monday morning, we were having breakfast with his new position coach, and although I thought about begging off and finding an observance, I knew was important to Noah that join him at the table.

Still, I felt guilty as hell. One of the last good conversations I had with my father — one that took place in the fall of 2004 — he asked me to continue the tradition of attending a Memorial Dav service and say a little prayer for his best friend who died on a battlefield in Korea we had stablished so many years ago.

I've written about this before, and I'm sure I rill write about it again because it's one of the best memories I have of my father, a man from the tiny Minnesota town of Gibbon who spent 20 years in the U.S. Air Force.

Every Memorial Day, we'd meet up at the VFW club in Mankato for breakfast and then walk the few blocks to that city's Korean War Memorial for what would be the first of several observances. I watched and listened while Dad performed his duties in the American Legion Post 11 Color Guard.

Mankato's a decent-sized city, and my father and his friends trooped from memorial to memorial and cemetery to cemetery every single Memorial Day. They did so in blistering heat and, at least for May, frigid cold. They did so on bright, sunny days and on dark, cloudy ones when the skies opened.

When the last program had been held, I'd join the veterans for a late lunch at the American Legion, where we'd play cards and I'd hear stories from long ago. Over the years on Memorial Day, I heard some epic tales, but the one I still remember to this day is a man who lost more than a thousand of his friends the day the USS Arizona blew up and sank at Pearl Harbor.

Whenever AJ told the story, his eyes would well up and his voice would crack.

Those men, he would remind me over and over again, had made the ultimate sacrifice. His voice always was filled with reverence.



#### MEMORIAL DAY: FROM 2

Ditto for Dad, when he would tell the story of Archie Lenz, his best childhood pal. They did everything together, even taking Grandma's eggs and using them as baseballs to show each other they could pitch like Bob Feller.

Archie, though, didn't finish his senior year of high school; instead, he volunteered to serve in the Marine Corps knowing full well he would be sent to war-torn Korea.

Late in my dad's senior year, Dad was called to the office, where a chaplain and military officer sat.

"Melroy, this isn't going to be easy," said Morrell Anderson, Gibbon's superintendent, principal, business teacher and basketball coach, "but I need you to go with these men to Archie's mom.'

I heard that story a million times, but even today, I can't imagine what it was like to be an 18-year-old kid in a car that was taking two men to his best friend's farm, where those two men would tell Mrs. Lenz that Archie would never come home.

Archie, my dad would tell me over and over again, had made the ultimate sacrifice. And every time he told that story, his voice was filled with



reverence

In the last year of his life, Dad had to tote an oxygen cart with him everywhere he went, but on hot, muggy days, there wasn't enough oxygen in the world to give him any level of comfort.

Memorial Day 2004 in Mankato was hot and muggy. When we arrived at the VFW at 7 a.m., the temperature was already nearing 80 and it was oppressively humid.

The VFW and the Korean War Memorial in Mankato are separated by about five blocks, and I honestly didn't think my father was going to survive that

walk. He was breathing hard enough that one would have thought he had just finished a marathon.

Halfway there, I suggested that I go get the car and he go home

He turned on me as if I had slapped him hard across the face.

And in not so many words he said we do this to honor and revere men like Archie, and he walked that last 2 1/2 blocks like he was an athletic superstar in his 20s.

A few months later, he knew the end was coming and he asked me to carry on the tradition.

"Go to a Memorial Day observance, say a prayer for Archie," he said. "Promise me, you will do that."

For 16 years, I didn't let him down.

And then came last year. I can say it was extenuating circumstances, but today, Dad, I promise you it won't happen again.

I would ask you, the readers of this column, to do the same.

Thousands of men and women have gone before us and made the ultimate sacrifice so that we can enjoy the freedoms - including having a three-day weekend like the one upcoming - that we cherish today.







## **Board passes on Public Health 'bonuses'**

## **Should You Make Extra Mortgage Payments?**

You might enjoy owning vour home - but the mortgage? Not so much. In fact, you might want to do everything you can to pay it off as quickly as possible. But is that always the best strategy?

In one sense, your mortgage can be considered a "good" debt because it's backed by a tangible asset - your home - that has real value and may even gain further value. Furthermore, by historical standards, you're probably paying a pretty low interest rate on your mortgage, so you're getting a lot of benefit – a place to live and a potentially appreciating asset. And if you itemize on your taxes, you can possibly deduct some, or maybe all, of your mortgage interest.

Or, in an even more serious scenario, what if your job ends and you need money to tide you over until you get a new one? In these situations, you need liquidity ready access to available cash. And your house may not be the best place to get it. You could apply for a home equity loan or line of credit, but these typically require approvals (which might be difficult if you aren't employed), and you'll be using your home as collateral. A home equity loan or credit line isn't always bad – under the right circumstances, it can be a valuable financial tool. But that doesn't change the basic fact that your home is essentially a non-liquid asset.

So, instead of making extra house payments, make sure



you have built an emergency fund containing several months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a low-risk, accessible account. After building an emergency fund, you should weigh extra mortgage payments against other uses of your money. For example, if you have other types of debt - such as credit cards or student loans - you might want to work on paying those off more quickly, as these debts may also carry higher interest rates.

You might also consider increasing your contributions to your 401(k), IRA or other retirement/investment accounts. You could spend two or three decades in retirement, so it's important to save as much as possible for those years.

As you can see, you do have some good reasons for using any extra money you may have for purposes other than making additional mortgage payments. sonal decision. 





really good races, and they really pushed me to a really good time."

For the first time in her illustrious career, Blazek had struck gold. Four times she had been an all-state cross country runner and five times -a number that undoubtedly would have been higher if COVID-19 hadn't canceled the 2020 season she had earned medals at state. But until Saturday, victory had eluded her.

She added another gold medal in the afternoon, taking an early lead in the 1,500 and then holding off a determined charge by Steines to win the 1,500 in a time of 4:46.63, almost seven seconds better than the school record she set in this year's state qualifying meet.

"This is kind of a newer race for me," she said, "and I was more nervous about this than the 800. "I don't know how to say it except to say I could feel her coming and all I could think about was just get to the finish line first."

And in victory, she was just as classy as she was all those times when she came up just short.

This past fall, Blazek broke the all-time record at the Class 1A state cross country meet, but so, too, did Steines, the talented freshman from eastern Iowa who won the individual title. Yet, Blazek immediately congratulated her opponent that beautiful fall day in Fort Dodge.

So on Saturday, after becoming a two-time state champion, the Turkey Valley star who will run at Iowa next year was asked

I could, if I left it all out there and somebody beat me, then it's good job no matter how disappointed you might be." There's a sports cliche that

says "nice people finish last." It is patently false.

Because on Saturday, the nicest of girls finished first. And she did it twice.

"It means the world to me," she said as the interview came to a close, "but so does just being a member of my team and my conference. I've loved it, and I am excited to see what happens next, but trust me, there will always be a lot of Northeast Iowa in me."

Blazek's 20 points gave the Trojans an 11th-place finish at the state meet, where four other Trojans also competed.

Seniors Kara Reicks, Josie Weber and Kourtney Schmidt were anchored by Blazek to an 11th-place finish in the distance medley while junior Jacqlyn Schmitt took 23rd in the discus.

"We were just off a season best time in the d-med," Hackman said, "and Jacqlyn, I know she wanted to throw better but she got a taste of what it's like being down here. Honestly, we had a great weekend. The titles are nice, but the kids we have, they made it great and I'm glad those seniors got to end their careers here."

There aren't many girls - if any - that medaled in those different and challenging type of events, regardless of class.

"Carlee is a pretty remarkable athlete, bringing home four medals and placing higher in each of her individual events than last year," said Laures. "She's always looking for improvement, which is one of reasons why she's so coachable.'

Rochford broke the school record in the high jump (5-6) as she tied for fourth place. If it weren't for back-to-back state-title winner Maddie Olson of Sheldon - Rochford could conceivably had snared a state title if she would have caught some breaks on Friday.

"You can't really be disappointed with a PR," said Rochford. "I'm a competitor, so when I see other girls clearing 5-6, I'm like, 'OK, why not me?' I can do that, too."

Rochford leaped 17-6.75 on Thursday in the long jump. That placed her third. While she didn't surpass her school record leap of 17-9 set at the state qualifier the week before, this was still an impressive achievement.

"The distance runners definitely made a statement this weekend!" said Laures. "Natalie and Campbelle both ran great 3,000 races in the heat."

Jackson finished off a remarkable career that saw her compete at state every year sans the COVID-19 campaign her sophomore year that canceled the entire season. Jackson ran to a 5:04 clip in the 1,500 to finish 12th.

I thought they handled it really well."

Hayfield-Ventura by 24 strokes. And the Chickasaws also claimed three of the six individual qualifier spots as Noehl finished third in the individual standings with an 85 and Olson survived one bad hole to take fifth with an 88 at a challenging Bear Creek Golf Course in Forest City.

The site of the regional final round is strange to say the least. The front nine has been open since the 1930s while the back nine, nicknamed the "Grizzly," opened in 2004 and is known for its length and its emphasis on strategic golf.



# **DOUBLING UP ON STATE TITLES**

TURKEY VALLEY'S BLAZEK BREAKS THROUGH AND CLAIMS 800, 1,500 CROWNS BY BOB FENSKE

Jalyssa Blazek came off the track Saturday morning a champion, and the Turkey Valley senior had the smile to prove it.

Coming into the Class 1A state track meet, the senior had put together a career that had been simply brilliant. Only one thing was missing. A state championship.

And then came Saturday, when Blazek not only won the 800 but then a few hours later added the 1,500 title to her resume.

"I think once I got the hang of winning a championship here," she said with a quick smile Saturday afternoon, "then it was a little easier. ... It sounds cheesy, I know, but all of my hopes and dreams have come true."

Her coach, Dalton Hackman, said no one deserved those championship medals more than his senior superstar.

"She makes my job easy," he said, "because with Jalyssa, you always know that you will get her best effort. I can give her a workout, any workout, and she's going to put in the extra time to make it even better. But what makes her so special to me and our school is that she's just a class act. We've seen that for four years now, and even if she hadn't won those races today, I'd be saying that."

But she did win. And she did it in impressive style — demolishing her own school records in both races — to turn back worthy competitors like Calmus-Wheatland's Noelle Steines and Grand View Christian's Maddy Childs both in the morning and in the afternoon.

Start with the 800, where Blazek was in third for much of the first 600 meters of the race.

"I felt like I was in a good spot because running the 100 this year, I think that's helped my kick a little," said Blazek, who ran in the 100 preliminaries on Thursday. "I wanted to make sure I was in good position and didn't get boxed in. Once I went, I just hoped and prayed it was going to be enough."

She took the lead near the scoreboard in iconic Drake Stadium and never looked back, finishing the race in 2:15.83 to beat the school record she set a year ago at state by almost 4 1/2 seconds.

"It felt really, really good," she said. "I thought that [Childs] and [Steines] ran
