First, though, community leaders and daycare proponents celebrated the completion of the project last week. Gone is Great Plays Daycare, capacity 54; in it's place is Little Sprouts, capacity 99.

Ameling called "the money man." There was New Hampton Economic Development Director Tammy Robinson, whom Ameling dubbed the "get-it-done girl." There were the countless donors who contributed to the project. There were the residents who lobbied long and hard for New Hampton to get a federal daycare grant that helped fund a project that cost north of \$1 million.

The benefits, though, can be seen in those capacity numbers.

Just ask Kayla Wood and her three daughters — Emberley, Nicolette and Ayla. The Woods had been on the Great Plays "waiting list" for five years, but the three girls will walk into the new facility today as Little Sprouts.

"That's what this is all about," Ameling said, "and to know so many people contributed to this project — time, money, getting the word out — it still gets me. It still makes me emotional."

The increase in the daycare's capacity

also means Ameling will direct a larger staff. Great Plays had 14 employees, and that number will grow to 23 when Little Sprouts opens its doors. For Robinson, whose office has made

a larger daycare a priority for years, last week's ribbon cutting was also emotional.

"I just think of all the people who contributed to this in some way or another," she said, "and it makes you realize what a special place New Hampton is."

must remember. Budweg said, "that for our Gold Star families, Memorial Day is not limited to 24 hours once a year. ... It's with them forever."

Budweg stepped away from the microphone, and American Legion Fae Stine Post 38 Commander Brian Quirk recounted Specialist John G. Heiselman's story — the oldest of 10 children who was killed in action on March 6, 1968, in Gia Dinh Province in South Vietnam.

As Quirk spoke, Budweg and fellow American Legion member Don Dixon solemnly finished folding the flag. When they were done, Dixon saluted Budweg, who then presented the flag to one of John's younger brothers, Dan.

For a moment, all was still.

This was Memorial Day in one reflective, moving snapshot. And it was a reminder that the holiday we celebrated on Monday wasn't about the unofficial start of summer, the cookouts or the end of a three-

As the Rev. Kevin Frey of Trinity Lutheran Church so eloquently put it during his invocation, Memorial Day is about "lives lost forever and lives forever changed."


And no moment on a beautiful Monday morning represented Memorial Day better than when Budweg presented the re-dedicated flag to Dan Heiselman.

"It meant a lot to us," the younger brother of the fallen soldier said, "and we're very appreciative that they did this for us. ... You know, John was the brother I didn't really get to know. I was 7 when he died, but I'm thankful, I think we're all thankful, that he's still remembered for what he did."

Memorial Day programs always pull on the heartstrings. From the laying of the wreaths to the firing of the guns to the playing of "Taps," it's a chance for those who enjoy freedom to say thank you to those who fought for it and died for it.

And on Monday, the veterans who came home took a moment to say thank you to the men like John Heiselman and the families they left behind.

In other words, they did Memorial Day right.



Tracer gives veteran his life back

"Twenty-two veterans a day commit suicide," he said and then paused for a moment to let that number sink in. "You heard me right, 22 veterans

Since coming home from the Middle East in 2011, he knows first hand the pain that comes with those suicides. Dirks talked about Doc Hutchinson and Ryan Witt — friends and fellow soldiers that ended their lives. He talked about the tragic deaths of Carlos Puente and Lindsey Stupp, and he shared that he was at the point where he, too, thought about ending his own life.

"I was at the point where I was self-medicating and ... honestly ... I thought about taking my hands off the wheel," he said.

And then Tracer stepped in.

His service dog, provided by Retrieving Freedom, was with him on that fateful day. He jumped into the front seat, put his paw on one of Dirks' hands and the eyes of dog and master met.

"Those eyes looked deep into my soul," Dirks said during his keynote address at the Memorial Day program, "and told me, I needed to get help."

On that day, that beautiful labrador knew his friend was at a proverbial T in his life. One turn would have taken Dirks to suicide; the other, the have that same chance.

one he took, was a chance at life again.

Tracer, Dirks said, helped him make the cor-

The former soldier went through an intensive four-month treatment program and began rebuilding his life. Tracer, he said, was at his side

Today, he serves as the resource development director for Retrieving Freedom and is based in Waverly. He said Tracer has not only helped his depression, anxiety and PTSD but he has also given him a chance to be "a good father to my son" and a productive member of society, one who takes great pride in raising funds so that the organization can provide service dogs to veterans

Following the program, he was asked about speaking in front of hundreds of people.

"If you had told me I'd be doing this six, seven years ago," he said, "trust me, I would have thought you were certifiable."

He paused for a moment, looked down at Tracer and smiled.

"He's the reason I'm here," he said, "and he's the reason I will continue to tell my story. He gave me my life back, and I want other veterans going through the same pain I went through to



Different kind of harvest

Christians believe just as Jesus went into heaven, so will they

If you go back and read the Old Testament, you will discover that Pentecost was one of the Jewish feast days. Only they didn't call it Pentecost. That's the Greek name.

The Jews called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks. It is mentioned five places in the first five books — in Exodus 23, Exodus 24, Leviticus 16, Numbers 28, and Deuteronomy 16.

What is the Origin of Pentecost?

Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest. In Palestine, there were two harvests each

The early harvest came during the months of May and June; the final harvest came in the Fall.

Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant that Pentecost always fell sometime during the middle of the month of May or sometimes in early June. There were several festivals, celebra-

tions, or observances that took place before Pentecost. There was Passover, there was Unleavened Bread, and there was the Feast of Firstfruits. The Feast of Firstfruits was the celebration of the beginning of the barley harvest. Here's the way you figured out the date of Pentecost.

According to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of Firstfruits, and beginning with that day, you would count off 50 days. The fiftieth day would be the Day of Pentecost. So Firstfruits is the beginning of the barley harvest and Pentecost the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest.

Since it was always 50 days after Firstfruits, and since 50 days equals seven weeks, it always came a "week of weeks" later. Therefore, they either called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks.

When Is Pentecost Sunday This

This year, Pentecost will be on Sunday, June 5, 2022, observed on the seventh Sunday after Easter, which was held on April 17 this year.

Why Is Pentecost Important to **Christianity?**

Modern Christians observe Pentecost as a holiday, not to celebrate a wheat harvest, but to remember when the Holy Spirit invaded the Church in Acts 2.

1. On Pentecost Sunday, the Holy Spirit filled the Church with power and added 3,000 new believers. The account in Act 2 reports that, after Jesus ascended into heaven, Jesus' followers were gathered together for the Feast of Harvest (aka

Pentecost), and the Holy Spirit "filled the whole house where they were sitting" (Acts 2:2). "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them" (Acts 2:4).

This strange occurrence drew a large crowd, and Peter stood up to speak to them about repentance and the gospel of Christ (Acts 2:14). By the end of the day that the Holy Spirit came, the Church grew by 3,000 people (Acts 2:41). This is why Christians still celebrate Pentecost.

John Gill expresses the significance in his commentary:

"Through this baptism of the Holy Ghost and fire, the apostles became more knowing, and had a greater understanding of the mysteries of the Gospel, and were more qualified to preach it to people of all nations and languages.' 2. The Holy Spirit was prophesied in

the Old Testament and promised by Jesus. Jesus promised the Holy Spirit in John 14:26, who would be the Helper for his people. "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom

the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I said to you."

This New Testament event is also significant because it fulfills an Old Testament prophecy in Joel 2:28-29.

"And afterward, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days."

The Significance of Pentecost

In a video for Christianity.com, Phillip Nation explains why Pentecost is significant for Christians today, read the transcript of that interview below:

The significance of Pentecost to the church is something that we need to walk through carefully, and we shouldn't ignore, because Pentecost was a Jewish celebration. And so in our modern day of the New Testament church, we don't celebrate Pentecost in the way that the Old Testament Hebrews did.

But Pentecost was the moment in history after Christ had ascended. And he had promised during the gospel narratives, during his earthly ministry, that he would leave, but that he would send the comforter, he would send the holy spirit. And it was at that moment in Pentecost where the spirit came, and he empowered the early believers, specifically the apostles that were left, and Peter, who is almost a comedic personality in the gospel narra-

He is the one who constantly puts his foot in his mouth, constantly is having to be corrected by Jesus, but is in the inner

And because of grace and mercy, he is chosen to be the one who stands up in front of this throng, probably thousands, maybe tens of thousands of people to proclaim the gospel, there in the midst of a Hebrew celebration that was intended to remind the Hebrews of how God had always protected them. And here Peter stands up and says,

"And let me tell you about the Messiah, who is the eternal protection for all of humanity. Let me tell you who he is." And so Pentecost becomes this marker in history to really what many people would say, "And that's the moment that church is born."

That is when thousands come into the faith. And it goes from this little sect of believers who followed a Jewish rabbi from Nazareth who died and rose again, and suddenly the church breaks forth into the culture. Suddenly it is that unstoppable force that no one can really deny any longer. Pentecost has taken on a new significance for us. It, at one point, is just a historical memory. Now it is the living reality of the moment that the spirit of God seemingly burst forth.

3 Historical Insights into **Pentecost**

There are three things you need to know about Pentecost that will help you understand Acts 2.

1. Pentecost was a pilgrim festival. That meant that according to Jewish Law, all the adult Jewish men would come from wherever they were living to Jerusalem and personally be in attendance during this celebration.

2. Pentecost was a holiday. No servile work was to be done. School was out. The shops were closed. It was party time.

3. There were certain celebrations and sacrifices and offerings which were prescribed in the Law for the day of Pentecost. On Pentecost, the High Priest was to take two loaves of freshly baked wheat bread and offer them before the Lord. The wheat bread was made from the newly harvested wheat.

In short, Pentecost in the time of the Apostles was a great and grand harvest celebration.

The streets of Jerusalem were clogged with thousands of pilgrims who had come from every point of the compass to celebrate the goodness of God and the bringing in of the wheat harvest. – christianity.com

Ambulance Council explores funding public EMS

Members know costs will go up, at least initially, say they need to take it back to their respective cities

City representatives plan on providing their respective City Councils with adjusted contribution numbers to potentially fund a

public-owned ambulance service. That's the latest development after the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council met Tuesday evening.

It's an encouraging step forward by the county and the various cities within its border in an attempt to extend emergencv medical services after the current private contract with the Chickasaw County Ambulance Service runs out at the end of the year on Dec. 31.

The owner of that privately-run ambulance service, Jeremy McGrath, said he is not interested in extending the current contract with Chickasaw County, but said he would sell the 3,000-square foot building that houses three ambulance. The price tag is \$1.725 million and that cost does not include operational expense such as dispatch service and a benefits package for

"I'm done with the politics part of this," McGrath said during a Board of Supervisors meeting on Tuesday morning. "That's why I gave a hard stop date."

The county currently foots 40 percent of the bill for the EMS and the cities combine to pay 60 percent of that total. A public, county-owned EMS is expected to lose \$650,000 in its first year of operation according to estimated figures provided to

"The first couple years will be rough, Any startup is," said Ionia Mayor Randy Taylor. "But I think if everybody sticks together, after those first years - numbers start staying together. It will probably end up costing less than it does now."

NOW FIVE AMBULANCE Council representatives that represent the cities within the county - New Hampton, Alta Vista, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler, Nashua and North Washington will adjust financial numbers to bring forth to their City Councils to possibly amend their budgets that could signal a new service could possibly be up and running at the start of the year.

For instance, if Lawler contributed \$20,000 yearly to the EMS in a proposed contract, that figure would have to be inflated three-fold to \$60,000 with the new estimates for cost according to some city representatives in attendance.

That increased city contribution would of course require a vote by each City Council to approve the new amended totals that could extend service.

"I think the only way this works in this time frame is to purchase the current provider out," said Fredericksburg Mayor Jimmy Mitchell.

"The projected cost of this thing is a lot bigger than what we're probably allowed to commit to. Not only that, we have the question of funding 28E. That all needs to be answered."

CHICKASAW COUNTY ATTORNEY David Laudner let the Council and those in attendance know that the deadline for any city to back out of the current 28E Agreement that binds both city and county to the current contract with McGrath's

ambulance service has since passed. There

needs to be a 180-day notice before the

start of a fiscal year if an entity wants to

back out of the 28E. "The 28E is going to stay in place until something happens to it. Anybody that wants out has to give 180 days notice before July 1 (2022)," said Laudner. "The bottom

line, anybody that wants out can not get out until July 1, 2023.

Laudner said there are what he termed "escape hatches" to the 28E. One such instance is to exceed the budget cap, which is \$250,000 for the fiscal year that ends June 30 and then per the agreement, can go up 5 percent each following year. That means the cap, under the current agreement at least, is \$262,500 for the fiscal year that begins July 1.

"The other way you can get out is if everybody wants out," said Laudner, who the general sentiment among that Council said EMS is not an essential service like

That means the city or county is not obligated to provide its citizens with an EMS.

"We need to start moving. Otherwise we're just kicking the can down the road like we have been for how many years?"

MCGRATH SAID A director should probably be hired and on staff by Oct. 1. He said that director can also be a part-time staffer that helps out with shifts.

Jason Byrne, a member of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors, said the

director should also be a county employee.

"With this agreement, Jeremy has agreed that he would help us get all of our certifications and get everything in line so it's a turn key by January 1st," said Byrne. "Whether that be him helping us find a director or how we do it, I don't know? But I think we need to move on this quickly and get somebody possibly hired so we can get everything laid out here."

THE COUNCIL ALSO discussed possible funding sources like a Rural Development Grant through the Iowa of Agriculture that could provide aid of up to 35 percent of the project or \$595,000.

Also on the table is a potential funding source via a 422D Tax Levy by Authority that the Board of Supervisors passed a motion to potentially utilize. There are still three readings that need to be voted on and then voters would have their say on the issue in November.

At the max allotment of 75 cents per \$1,000 of property tax evaluation, that levy would produce \$707,000 with gas and electric included. Half of those funds, should the levy

be passed, would not be accessible to the county until October 2023. The second half of that money would be allocated in March

"I think the question is how do we want them staffed and what can we do to pay for ongoing costs," said Matthew Kuhn, the Board of Supervisors representative now that Supervisor Jacob Hackman submitted his resignation on the Ambulance Council the morning of May 25. Kuhn also stated – and this seemed to be

on May 16th, 2022, for the purchase of an elevator for the courthouse" — on the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors' agenda Tuesday morning seemed pretty

Last month, on a 4-1 vote, supervisors had approved spending a little more than \$207,000 to put in a new elevator at the courthouse because of maintenance concerns about the current elevator, which led to concerns that if parts couldn't be obtained for it, the courthouse would not be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

But because one of the payments for the new elevator needed to occur before the fiscal year ends on June 30, supervisors on Tuesday considered using American Recovery Plan Act funds for the almost \$52,000 that Schumacher Elevator required before starting the installation.

Not so fast, said County Attorney David Laudner, who pointed out that the supervisors, according to state law, should have put out bids for a new elevator.

"Anything north of \$100,00 needs to be bid out," Laudner said.

Supervisor Jason Byrne, though, said it was his understanding that Schumacher is

And while they didn't indicate how interested they were when it came to selling the Heritage property, minus the farmland, they did agree that an easement would be needed to allow the Pioneer Cemetery Commission to maintain the cemetery.



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

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Three generations bring store to the century mark

Ace: From 1

J.G. Schueth purchased less than four years after World War I ended, has seen many changes.

Located where New Hampton's Lucky Bamboo Chinese restaurant now sits, it expanded in 1946. Almost a quarter of a century later, in 1970, the store moved into a brand-new building, and in 1997, it purchased a building at its current location, 6 W. Main St., and expanded to the west. And in 2005, it opened a store in Charles City.

During the last century, Schueth Ace Hardware has remained a family affair. After moving to New Hampton, J.G. met Irene Westemeier, and the two were married in 1925. For years, the Schueth couple worked side by side in the store.

Ownership of the store passed from J.G. and Irene to their two sons — Jim and Don — in the 1950s and 1960s. When Jim retired in 1991, Don's son, Doug, came on as a partner, and when Don retired in 2000, his daughter, Jackie Perkins, became the second third-generation Schueth to run the business.

But you see, the locations and the owners may have changed over the last 100 years, but there has been one constant — a commitment to customer service — at the hardware store over the last century.

"It started with Grandpa, no question about it," Doug Schueth said, "and our dad and uncle carried on that tradition that we're always going to do our best for our customers. We're not going to oversell, but we're going to sell what you need, and we're going to stand by what we sell. It's been the way we've done business for 100 years, and it's the way we're going to continue to do business."

As he talked, his sister nodded her head in agreement.

"We had very good teachers when it came to putting customers first," she said, "and over the years — from Grandpa to us — we've also been blessed with a lot of wonderful employees. This isn't the story of just the Schueth family; it's the story of employees working together to do right by our customers."

SCHUETH ACE HARDWARE

has had some "big weeks" over the last 100 years, but next week may be the biggest ever.

When a family-owned business hits triple digits and turns 100, the party should be huge.

In addition to a variety of specials and giveaways that will take place at its stores in New Hampton and Charles City, Schueth Ace Hardware will serve free-will donation lunches in New Hampton from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Wednesday and from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in Charles City on Thursday, and all proceeds will benefit local food pantries.


On Friday, the Charles City store will close at 4 p.m. and the New Hampton store will close at 5 p.m. so that employees can participate in the Heartland Days Parade, which will be led by Grand Marshals Doug Schueth and Jackie Perkins.

And after the parade, as the advertisement in this week's Tribune states, the stores' owners are asking residents to "put your dancing shoes on and boogie with" The Dweebs, the fun, family-orientated band that will take the Mikkelson Park band shell stage from 7:30 to 11:30 p.m. at New Hampton's biggest celebration of the year.

A century in business made choosing this year's parade grand marshals an easy one, but New Horizons-Chamber Director Jason Speltz said more went into the decision than marking a milestone.

"What you have with Jackie and Doug is what makes businesses in small cities like ours stand out," Speltz said. "Go into Ace, and I guarantee you that Doug, Jackie and their employees are always going to give you that proverbial 110 percent. I don't know how many times I've heard people say that their customer service is the best, but it's true. They go that extra mile, every single time."

IT ALL BEGAN, of course, in 1922.

That's when J.G. Schueth purchased an existing hardware store in Chickasaw County's largest city.

New Hampton that year was home to about 2,500 residents, and although cars had become the main mode of transportation for most, it wasn't uncommon for people to get here and there by horse. While the wonders of electricity had come to many area cities, most, if not all farm homes were not equipped with it or even with indoor plumbing.

J.G. went to work to build a store that sold quality products and provided outstanding customer service, and Irene had the same core values as her husband.

Over the years, the hardware store grew despite being in a competitive market and despite challenges like the Great Depression.

"Grandpa honestly carried some people for a lot of years," Doug Schueth said. "As long as you worked with him, he'd work with you. I've seen the records, the books, and there were people that would pay a little each month and Grandpa was fine with that. He kept a lot of people in business during some really lean years."

In 1946, the store's success led to the Schueths purchasing the building just to the east of its store for expansion.

"I think of how hard they had to work," Perkins said, "and how meticulous they were. They always had a plan, and that store and their family, that was their life."

IN 1952, THE FIRST of the Schueth brothers returned home from the service, and Jim went into business with his father at the hard-

Seven years later, Don became a partner in the store with his older brother.

Over the years, hardware competitors came and went, but Schueth Ace Hardware remained.

The Schueth brothers followed in their parents' footsteps — not only with their hard work in their store but also by raising their families and being very involved in New Hampton.

In 1969, they purchased the old Forkenbrock Hardware building on West Main Street, tore it down and built a brand-new store.

"I was just a kid, but I can still remember that building going up," Doug said. "We were all pretty excited, but when I look back on it now, I realize dad and our uncle were really making an investment in our community."

His sister agreed. "They loved New

"They loved New Hampton,"
Jackie said, "and they believed in it."
Jim and his wife, Sue, had three

Jim and his wife, Sue, had three children — Steven, Peter and Tony — while Don and his wife, Sandra also raised their children — Doug, Jackie, Lon and Jodee — in the City of Expanding Horizons.

As hard as the brothers worked in the store, they also gave back to their community. Jim served 16 years on the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors while Don was a member of the New Hampton City Council for 22 years.

"Giving back, being involved, supporting your clubs and organizations," Jackie said, "that was a big thing for our store since Grandpa first came to New Hampton. Dad and Jim picked up the mantle from our grandparents and hopefully, Doug and I have done the same."

HARDWARE HAS BEEN a mainstay throughout its 100 years in

business, but throughout its history, it has offered other products.

At one time, Schueth Ace Hardware sold appliances, and it also at one time had a large gun department. Those days are gone, but during its history, its gift department has grown, and it remains a key component of the business.

For the store's current owners, it wasn't a given that either would follow in their grandparents' or parents' footsteps.

ents footsteps.

Doug worked for a number of years as a salesman in the Chicago area while Jackie found her calling in the grocery business — eventually becoming the first female store manager for SuperValu, working first for Wendal Liddle and then for Matt Anderson in the store located across the street from New Hampton Elementary School.

After his uncle retired in 1991, he returned to New Hampton and went into business with his father.
"I wasn't sure, honestly," he said

"I wasn't sure, honestly," he said when he was asked if the plan was always for him to end up being a third-generation owner. "We lived up here when we were kids, and you know, I guess at first I thought I'd want to try something different. But there was something about New Hampton, that small-town feeling, that drew me back."

For much of the 1990s, dad and son worked side by side, and they knew they were running out of room.

So in 1997, like J.G. and Irene had done more than 40 years before with their original store, they expanded — purchasing the building to the west and almost doubling the store's space.

Two years later, Don was ready for retirement, and the question was asked to Jackie: Would you be interested?

"That was a really tough one for me," she said, "because I really loved the grocery business. It was me, and I wasn't quite sure. But the challenge of owning a business with Doug, the pride I had in our family's business, that was enough for me to take the plunge."

BUT SCHUETH ACE Hardware wasn't quite done expanding.

In 2005, the third-generation owners of the business decided to open a store in Charles City, and while their store's roots were planted in New Hampton, the owners emphasize that this is as much a celebration for their "new" store as it is for their "old" one.

There were growing pains, of course, but today, they feel as much a part of the Charles City community as they do their hometown.

"I think, you know, there was some, 'OK, who are these out-of-town people?' But we were committed to providing the same hometown service that we had given New Hampton all those years," Jackie said and then added with a smile as she referred to the school colors of Charles City and New Hampton. "So we added orange and black to our red and black."

Her brother believes one of the "turning points" for the Charles City store came in 2008 during the his-

toric floods that ravaged the Floyd County city.

"We were able to find some generators, we ordered them, we had to drive and go get them," he said, "but we didn't mark them up. We sold them for the same price we would have if we had had them in stock. I think that showed people that we were a part of the community."

ANYONE WHO HAS shopped at Schueth Ace Hardware — either in New Hampton or Charles City — has their stories.

There's the time a resident bought a new gas grill and couldn't figure out how to start it. He called the store, and not only got an answer, but a few minutes later, one of the store employees showed up at his house to make sure the gas was flowing.

There's the countless times someone has come in to the store trying to figure out a solution to a problem, and Doug, Jackie or one of their employees will quickly grasp what they're asking and present the answer.

There's the even more countless times that the store employees will match a certain shade of paint in a matter of seconds.

"We love our customers," Jackie said, "and they're like family to us. You do nice things for your family, right? So why wouldn't we do it for our customers."

Over the year's the store has won numerous awards from Ace, which is really a cooperative of thousands of stores. What that means is this: Ace stores are owned locally and those owners are not tied to a corporation coming in and telling them what to

"We get a lot of help from Ace, don't get us wrong," Doug said, "but it's our store, our decisions, and that I think is important."

ONE HUNDRED YEARS. It's a huge milestone obviously.


The list of stores that have come and gone in New Hampton since 1922 is almost infinite, yet, the Schueths are still here — selling hardware and gifts, running their rental business and getting an "A-plus" when it comes to treating their customers right.

This isn't supposed to be a story about just the Schueth family, for scores of residents over the past century have contributed to the success

"They're family, too," Jackie said, "and there's no way, our grandpa, our dad, our uncle or Doug and I could have done what we've done without them. We're so grateful for them. We're so thankful to what they bring to our store. For Doug and me, it's important that they know family comes first and the job comes second."

The owners are looking forward to celebrating their store's milestone with their children and grandchildren. Doug has two children – D.J., who is married to Emily, and Christina, who is married to Aaron — and four grandchildren, McKenna, Donny, Maci Jo and Bodhi.

Jackie, too, has two children — Tara, who is married to Corey — and Ryan, who is married to Leann — and has five grandchildren, Maycen, Myles, Shay, Harper and Ellie. Both say that their spouses — Doug is married

to Stephanie and Jackie is married to Chris, who works at the store — are critical to their careers.

"When you own you own a business, you're pretty much always on call," Doug said, "and to have spouses that understand that, it's just a must."

When the Heartland Days celebration comes to an end, Schueth Ace Hardware will enter its second century of business, and the siblings were asked how they envisioned the future of the store their grandparents started so long ago?

"I think one of the key things for the stores is we've been able to ... I don't know how to quite put it ... but we've been able to roll with the times," Doug said. "But honestly, I guess the answer about what's next is probably this: We're going to do what we've done for 100 years. 


