Board barely OKs to move ahead on potential fall vote on EMS funding

Supervisors vote 3-2 to pass first reading of resolution to set up an advisory council for ambulance levy

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors on Monday moved ahead a resolution that could lead to voters in the county deciding this November if they're willing to having ambulance service declared "essential" to the county.

But the board did so just barely as it voted 3-2 — with Jacob Hackman and Steve Breitbach both dissenting — to pass the first reading of a resolution that would set up an advisory council that would recommend to supervisors how much they should levy if voters approve what is known as 422D, a part of the state code that allows residents to declare ambulance service essential; thus allowing tax dollars to be levied to support

the service. "This does not commit anyone to anything today as far as what's going on the ballot," County Attorney David Laudner told board members. 'All it does is keep the ball moving forward ... so at some point in the future it can be [potentially] on the ballot."

Laudner emphasized that no matter what the advisory council comes up with for a recommendation, supervisors "will have the final say what goes on the ballot" or if it goes on the ballot at all.

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn urged his fellow board members to approve the first reading because "I think we should keep moving forward."







New Limits Expand 401(K), IRÂ **Opportunities**

You could spend two, or even three, decades in retirement. So, to pay for all those years, you'll probably need to take full advantage of your retirement accounts. And in 2022, you may have expanded opportunities to deduct retirement plan contributions on your tax return.

Before looking at what's changed this year, let's review benefits of these the kev accounts:

- Traditional IRA You typically contribute pretax (deductible) dollars to a traditional IRA, and your earnings can grow tax-deferred.
- Roth IRA You invest aftertax dollars in a Roth IRA, so your contributions won't lower your taxable income, but your earnings can grow tax free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you're 591/2 or older when you begin taking
- 401(k) A 401(k) or similar plan (such as a 457(b) for state and local government employees or a 403(b) for employees of public schools or nonprofit groups) is generally funded with pretax dollars and provides tax-deferred earnings. Some employers offer a Roth 401(k), in which employees contribute after tax-dollars and can take tax-free withdrawals if they meet the same age and length-of-ownership requirements as the Roth

So, what's different about these plans in 2022? First, consider the traditional IRA. If you and your spouse, if you're married – don't have a 401(k) or similar plan, you can always deduct the full amount of your contribution on your tax return, no matter what you earn. But if one or both of you are covered by an employer-sponsored plan, then your deductions could be reduced or eliminated based on your income.

Single taxpayers can claim the full deduction if your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) is \$68,000 or less (\$109,000 for married filing jointly), with deductibility decreasing at higher income levels and phasing out entirely at \$78,000 (\$129,000

for married filing jointly). But here's the key point: Compared to 2021, these ranges are \$2,000 higher for single filers and \$4,000 higher for those who are married and filing jointly which means that this year, you might have more opportunities to make deductible contributions. And a similar type of increase applies to Roth IRA eligibility. In 2022, if you're a single filer, you can put in up to \$6,000 (\$7,000 if you are 50 or older) in a Roth IRA if your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) is less than \$129,000 - up from \$125,000 in 2021. Allowable contributions are reduced at higher income levels and phased out if your MAGI is \$144,000 or more, up from \$140,000 in 2021. If you're married and file jointly, the respective ranges are \$204,000-\$214,000, up from \$198,000-\$208,000 in 2021. Again, higher ranges may

mean more opportunities for you. (Consult your tax advisor to determine your eligibility to contribute to a Roth IRA or make deductible contributions to a traditional IRA.)

And finally, the annual contribution limit for 401(k), 457(b) and 403(b) plans is \$20,500 – up \$1,000 from 2021. If you're 50 or older, you can put in an extra \$6,500 this year, for a total of These changes may not seem

Hampton's Aaron recently directed a \$5,000 Bayer Fund America's Farmers Grow Communities donation to the New Hampton FFA Chapter. The chapter will use the funds to update LabQuest equipment and probes along with other materials related to CASE (Curriculum Agricultural Science Education.)

"These funds give our Ag Education Program to get up-to-date with equipment. The students will be using these probes to collect data in the greenhouses, vineyard and mums as well as the classroom," said New Hampton ag education instructor and FFA advisor Jim Russ.

City not alone when it comes to infrastructure

"We knew our infrastructure was going to need work, and we know that the ambulance issue is going to cost us money," Mayor Bobby Schwickerath said. "Nothing said last night was necessarily a surprise, and we're going to work on how we're going to pay for it."

Start with the ambulance situation.

City Council members reiterated New Hampton's commitment to the current 28E agreement and a publicly-owned ambulance service, despite the fact that a feasibility study by SafeTech Solutions that was released last month showed a publicly-owned service could expect to lose more than \$650,000 a year.

But Schwickerath said that he believes that number is inflated because the SafeTech study recommended that the new service hire the equivalent of more than 13 full-time and part-time paramedics and EMTs.

'I think that's where we would like to get to," the mayor said, "but we also know that it's probably not realistic, especially with how hard it is to hire [EMS personnel] right now. We are going to have to have that service grow, so I'm not sure the money they're talking about it costing us is really all that realistic.'

Still, council members discussed the possibility of using the city's local-option sales tax (LOST) money for EMS. To do that, though, the city would have to have 2036.

voters approve changing the "usage" of LOST funds, which the city now uses for City Clerk Karen Clemens said the city

receives about \$500,000 in LOST funds

and that the council, if it puts a measure on the ballot, could ask residents to approve "using LOST for EMS and the rest for infrastructure. Council members also discussed the possibility of sending a measure to voters under Iowa Code 357F if county residents as a whole vote against declaring ambu-

lance service an essential service this fall. But that vote can only occur if the Board of Supervisors put the measure on the ballot. "One thing we're pretty adamant about is that we need to stay together," Schwickerath said, referring to the county and the cities. "It's the best possible way to




