Fort Atkinson man faces attempted murder charge

A Turkey Valley High School student has been charged with attempted murder and felony domestic assault for an incident that took place last month.

Robert Dale Kruse, age 18 of Fort Atkinson, was charged in Fayette County District Court after Winneshiek County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to a domestic disturbance a mile north of St. Lucas on June 27.

Upon investigation, they learned of a serious assault that had taken place in Fayette County. Fayette County Sheriff's Office deputies learned that a female was taken to a remote area along the Turkey River and was seriously assaulted, choked, and forced under the water.

Kruse was arrested on Fayette County warrants on June 29 and transported to the Fayette County Jail. Following his initial appearance, he posted \$20,000 bond.

If convicted Kruse could face up to 25 years in prison.

God fills in the gaps

Reporter's late father put her on the path closer to her Father

Last month, as Father's Day approached, I somehow convinced myself that this year would be easier, that Sunday would just be a normal day that grief couldn't touch. Yet I couldn't help but reflect on the role that my dad played in my life, and the role any father plays in his daughter's life.

This is the seventh year my mom and I have spent Father's Day with an empty seat beside us in church and an empty chair at our table.

His legacy continues to live on in our lives and traditions, however. My mom and I greeted at church that Sunday and my mom joked with the usher, one of my dad's friends, about taking a jar of peanuts and putting our names in the Father's Day drawing in my dad's honor. But, alas, the Kwik Star gift card went to my best friend's dad instead. The empty seat at our table would have had a plate of steak in front of it had my dad been there to fill it, but we enjoyed the meal nevertheless.

I've often wondered, and talked about this with some of my other friends who's lives have also lacked a steady or loving fatherly role, if society realizes how important a dad is in his daughter's life.

I told my mom that as the years roll on since my dad passed on, how I've transitioned from the questions of "why" aimed at God, to the realization of learning to live without a father figure in my life anymore.

While memories of a loving father and his guidance may sustain me in many ways, I will never again see his smiling face in the bleachers, feel his strong arms wrap around me in sadness and joy, feel the tickle of his mustache as he kisses my cheek goodnight or hear his voice over the phone when I'm desperate for some fatherly advice.

Nor will his shoes ever brush against my white dress as I walk down the aisle someday.

Of course, this continued realization and ache of longing brought me to tears yet again this Father's Day. Somehow frustration at God and injustice of losing my dad so young seemed to distract me for awhile. Now that I've mostly made peace, and learned to trust that God brings good from it all, I can only be frustrated by how helpless I feel to fill that void in my life.

As I began my run that Saturday before Father's Day, with my amazing mom biking beside me, I fully expected to find myself choking up at some point during the five miles of my feet pounding the concrete. When my expectation proved true, however, it was not for the reason I initially suspected.

Running down a section of the Tribe Trail, instead of the ache of loss I had experienced that afternoon, my emotions

bubbled over from a heart filled with gratitude.

I had been toying around with writing this column, but I knew it wouldn't go in until after Father's Day so I decided to write about the importance of a fatherly role in a girl's life. So as I ran, ideas began swirling through my head, along with the positive aspects of the column that I wanted to include.

For me, the positive ways God has brought good from this loss, and reminded me of His faithfulness, have been the people He has placed around me.

Running under a brush-painted sunset sky, beside corn fields of green new life, I reflected on these many people who have made this loss a little easier, and made my life a lot richer.

From when my coach and her husband walked me to my car recently when I didn't feel safe, to the encouragement of my teachers, boss, coaches, and family friends, to my dad's friends, like the usher at church and my youth pastor, some of whom have called me Charlie-girl or Charlie junior since his passing, to family members, like my uncle who faithfully watches online or attends my races. Once I compete, I look forward to his text message filled with love, pride and advice that I know I will find on my phone once I reach my sports bag.

On Father's Day, I texted him and took a moment to thank him for the incredible impact his love and support has had on my life. When I was in middle school and just starting to run, my dad loved to give me advice. I tease my mom that her post-race comments like "You looked cute!" or "Who did your hair this time?" don't help much in the long run, as appreciated as they are (french braids are a secret to success, after all). However, phone calls, text messages and conversations with my uncle have helped to ease that empty seat in the bleachers.

In high school, that absence was filled in part by people like Mike Shatek, my friend Riley's dad, who would yell "Go Lydia!" over and over until I smiled through the pain on the cross country course, or Coach Bob Vorwald, with his pre-race encouragement and post-race bear hugs filled with pride, no matter how I competed.

And it's moments like when my coach and her husband walked me to my car, when my mom wraps her arms around me when I cry, or when I felt the comfort of my heavenly Father after losing one of my uncles this winter, that my dad's protective embrace, for a moment, doesn't seem so far away.

He may never be here to kiss me goodnight again, but that's one memory I will never forget. I didn't want to go to bed as a kid until his headlights hit the garage door announcing that Daddy was home from work. Some things in my life forever changed on that September day in 2015.

Now that I'm older I wish I had asked my dad more questions. I wish I could pick his brain about his knowledge of the

Bible or ask him about childhood memories or what jobs I should take for the summer. My mom and I both desperately wished he was here when I learned to drive. Every time she puts her foot on the brake in the passenger seat I still do!

But my mom is thankfully one of the wisest people I know, and in numerous situations where I'm unsure, I often think of what she would do. I begrudgingly admitted to her that when driving by myself, many of her innumerable tips are often running through my head. Her personal favorite is "They don't know what you're thinkin', unless you're blinkin'," so needless to say the cheesy dad jokes department is under control.

And I look forward to the day when I can walk down the aisle arm-in-arm with the woman who's love and godly influence has helped make me into who I am today.

As she and I went on a bike ride last week, we met up with some longtime family friends of ours, a mother-daughter duo who recently lost their husband and father. The image of the four of us flying down the hill on our bikes represents two families, both forever changed by grief, but both forever marked by love.

Talking with my friend on that ride also reminded me of the importance of friendship. My friends and teammates bring incredible joy and blessings to my life, as do many of their families. I've been reminded of the amazing friendships God has given me with, some of which have become more like family over the years.

One of my favorite verses is found in Psalm 68:5-6, "A father to the fatherless, a defender of widows, is God in his holy dwelling. God sets the lonely in families, he leads out the prisoners with singing..."

My mom often reminds me that God fills in the gaps of not having my dad here. While He can never replace that spot in the bleachers, I can feel Him racing with me.

While His strong arms may never wrap around me physically, I've felt His immense love and comfort in times of both sorrow and joy. While He may never kiss me goodnight, I feel His peace watching over me as I drift off to sleep. While I may never hear His voice on the phone, it whispers in my ear in times of desperation and uncertainty, guiding the path for me to walk.

My dad's greatest legacy was helping to lead me, and so many others, closer to a Father who's love is far greater than his ever could be. Without Him, the hole in my heart would be far greater.

The ache of missing my dad may always be there, on Father's Day and throughout the year, but through the people in my life and the loving Father who has placed them there, the ache becomes far lighter.

I'm grateful for the 14 years I was given with my dad and I hope my grief somehow reminds all of us to appreciate the fathers and father-figures, who love and support us. Father's Day is only that, a day, but sometimes loss reminds us to celebrate those we love all year round.



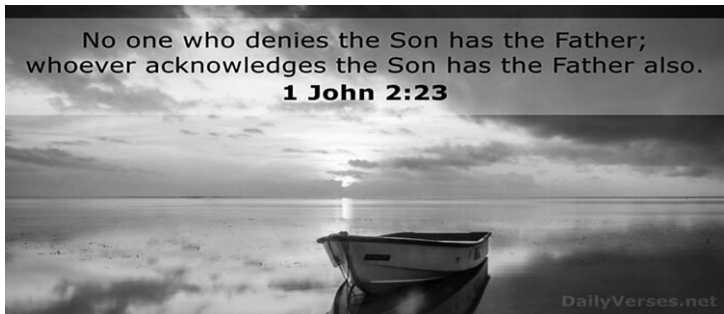

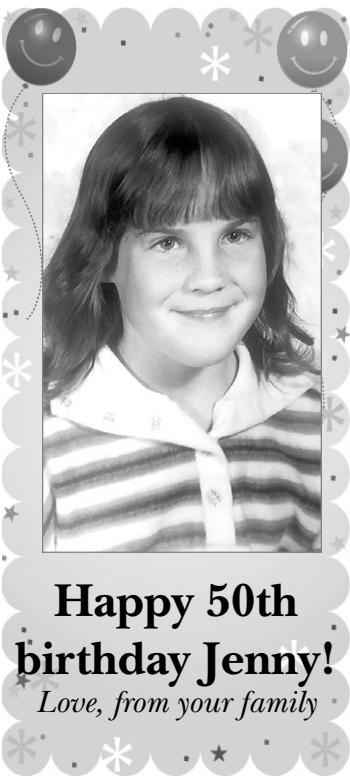

A Sumner daycare center made its pitch to the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors Monday for funds to help it open a facility that would serve some Chickasaw County residents.

The issue, county leaders say, is the fact that the daycare would not be located in the county because Sumner is a Fayette County city.

“It would be serving people from our county,” Auditor Stephanie Mashek said, “but the structure would be not.”

So that means in all likelihood the supervisors could not use county betterment funds if they decide to support the daycare.

Sheila Uhlenhake made the pitch for the Sumner daycare and said the need for more child care is pressing in the Fredericksburg area.

“We are in a daycare desert,” Uhlenhake said. “Since we started this, we have had four additional daycares close.”

Uhlenhake, a resident of Fredericksburg, said she has experienced the “desert” firsthand, pointing out that it took her two years to find daycare for

two of her four children.

She also shared the story of a Fredericksburg mother who went more than a year without daycare until finding a “slot” in New Hampton.

“That means she will drive from Fredericksburg to New Hampton and then go to work in Sumner,” Uhlenhake said.

She said the group has reached an agreement with Sumner-Fredericksburg Community Schools to use an unused wing of an elementary

school in Sumner for a facility that will open this fall and serve 72 children between the ages of 2 and 12.

Uhlenhake said the group still needs about \$46,000 to bring the wing up to code for a daycare.

She went on to add that the group is looking to build a new facility in Sumner that would serve 120 children.

Uhlenhake said that the new facility would cost between \$1.5 million and \$2 million

and that if the county donated funds, the daycare could make sure it would use it on items that would be moved to the new facility when it is completed.

The three supervisors at the meeting — both Steve Breitbach and Jacob Hackman were not at the meeting — asked a number of questions but held off on a decision because they first want to know what fund they could use if they decided to donate funds.

One supervisor believes county should negotiate with current provider

agreements to each of the cities.

Before they did, however, Supervisor Jake Hackman again reiterated his opposition to a publicly-owned ambulance service — pointing out that a service in Carroll County has a budget for the fiscal year that begins today (Friday) of more than \$1.45 million.

“We’re going from \$250,000 to \$1.2 million,” he said, referring to the current

contract the Ambulance Council has with Chickasaw Ambulance Service.

Asked by New Hampton City Clerk Karen Clemens what his solution would be, Hackman came back with a quick response.

“Negotiate with the current provider,” he said, even though Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath has said on a number of occasions that he has no interest in extending his contract past Dec. 31.

During Tuesday night’s City Council meeting in New Hampton, city leaders said

they remained on board with the proposed 28E, although they also would like to see a couple of language items reworked.

New Hampton leaders also approved having City Attorney Todd Prichard begin work on getting a question on the ballot for this fall’s general election.

The City Council directed Prichard and Clemens to ask voters to approve allowing the city to use local option-sales tax (LOST) funds to support both ambulance service and improvements to the city.

fact that the city has received just one applicant for a current vacancy on the police force.

Council members bandied about a number of ideas — ranging from increasing pay to offering sign-on bonuses to paying retention bonuses. They also agreed with Nosbisch’s suggestion that the city modify its handbook to allow employees to live more than 10 miles from the city.

Councilwoman Katie Fisher said she would support increasing the distance an employee could live from the city to 40 miles to help New Hampton possibly attract residents of places like Waterloo, Decorah and Cedar Falls.

But a vast majority of the discussion was centered around pay.

New Hampton currently starts its officers at \$21.83 per hour and once they are certified they are paid \$23.86 per hour.

But among the cities surveyed, that starting wage was at the bottom of the proverbial barrel.

Eagle Grove had the next lowest starting pay at \$23 per hour while Charles City is paying its officers a starting hourly wage of \$27.30 and Cresco tops that with an hourly wage of \$28.13.

Nosbisch suggested that the council consider an across-the-board increase of \$2 per hour for those that work for the department, but to do that, the city would have to negotiate at the very least an addendum to the current contract with the union that represents city employees.

“With the union, I think that

could be difficult,” Councilman Joe Denner said, although Paul Scally, the union representative for police officers, told the council he felt that could be done.

The current contract the city has with its union employees doesn’t end until June 30, 2024.

And Nosbisch said the city can’t afford to wait two years before bringing New Hampton’s police pay more in line with other cities.

When Denner brought up the fact that other union employees in different departments might ask for more money, Councilwoman Mindy Humpal said she believed because public safety was at stake, the council should find a way to bump police pay.

“We’ll deal with that when the time comes,” she said about other departments also seeking pay raises.

Fisher wondered aloud if the city couldn’t use so-called “sign-on bonuses” to attract more applicants, but Nosbisch said he felt pay was more important for a couple of reasons.

“It’s what people look at,” he said, “and the other thing is that we have officers who have been here, who have made sure we’ve gotten through this and now all of a sudden, a new guy gets \$5,000? I’d rather see a retention bonus, rather than a sign-on bonus.”

In the end, the City Council members decided that they would explore the idea of changing the distance city employees can live from New Hampton and also directed City Clerk Karen Clemens to send a letter to the union requesting that both sides meet to negotiate higher pay for police officers.

Charles City group to screen movies this month

They say when it comes to movies, everyone’s a critic. On Tuesdays in the month of July, everyone in Charles City will get the chance to put that saying to the test.

The Charles City Arts Center is sponsoring a series of movie screenings on Tuesdays in July, with each screening starting at 5:30 p.m. at the NIACC Center in Charles City.

The series is titled “Europe in Flames, Perspectives of World War II,” and the movies will include a short pre-screen presentation and a short discussion afterwards. Popcorn will be available.

Cost will be \$5 per film or \$16 for all four. Tickets are available online at the CCAC website or in person at the CCAC.

“These are four films that deal with World War II, mostly from the European perspective,” said Robert Mulcahy, who will organize and mod-

erate the screenings. “We are hoping to get a perspective from each of four countries that took part.”

The movies are a way to expose people to films that they probably haven’t seen before, according to Mulcahy, who has taught film classes at the university level. He said that the screenings in July will be a trial run, and there might be one in the fall and another next spring if the movies are a success.

The July 5 movie was “We Are

From the Future,” a 2008 Russian film directed by Andrei Maliukv. On July 12, the movie will be “Life is Beautiful,” a 1997 Italian film directed by Robert Benigni. The July 19 movie is “Everything is Illuminated,” a 2005 United States film directed by Liev Schreiber. On July 26, the movie will be “The Captain,” a 2018 German film directed by Robert Schwentke.

Screenings will be at the NIACC Center because the facility has better tech and also because it’s conve-

nient for Mulcahy, as he works there. Mulcahy has been on the CCAC board since the start of the year.

If it’s decided to continue the screenings, Mulcahy said, he hopes future topics would include horror films.

“I think horror films get a bad rap. There is value in looking at them from a scholarly perspective,” he said. “I think horror films might draw more people in, and since this is a fundraiser for the arts center, it would be good to have a bigger audience.”

Jim Ashley wanted to know the age of the cardiac monitors. Jeremy McGrath advised all three cardiac monitors are on a full maintenance contract where they

are inspected every year. If there are any issues,

Physic-Control sends a loaner and the broken cardiac monitors is shipped back to the manufacturer for repair. Cardiac monitors are \$35,000 to purchase new. Lucas CPR devices do not have a maintenance plan but is an option.

Randy Taylor advised that the 2003 ambulance did not have to be traded in and could be kept for a spare or station in Nashua or Fredericksburg. Jeremy McGrath advised there was only \$5-10,000 valuation on that one.

James Mitchell asked if a non-complete clause was discussed, it was not but could be put into the purchase agreement.

Samantha Johnson confirmed that the staff living quarters would be in the same building as the rigs.

James Mitchell pointed out that they need to find a director first that can help with creating the new EMS Service. Jeremy McGrath suggested that the Director should be in place by October 1, 2022. CCAC all agreed that the Director needed to be working-Director. The EMS Director would be a county employee.

Jason Byrne advised CCAC that with this agreement, Jeremy McGrath had agreed that he would help get all the certifications needed so that it was a turn key January 1, 2023

Mark Mueterthies questioned, if Jeremy McGrath was going to help get the EMS service up and running, does CCAC need Phase 3 of the Safe Tech Solutions program. It is believed that it was \$30,000 for the whole project, including Phase 1, 2, and 3. Matthew Kuhn will talk with SafeTech Solutions.

Stephanie Mashek addressed CCAC about grants that could be available. Rural Development Department of Agriculture, would be eligible for up to 35% of the start-up cost to start an ambulance service. That would equate to \$595,000.

Jeremy McGrath talked about the GEMT program which is Medicaid supplemental program that only governmental services were eligible for. It would be a year before any return because you have to report on a full year of service. Jeremy McGrath also talked about an OIG option for tax payers that live within the service area, the service would only bill their primary insurance and the balance would be wrote off.

Samantha Johnson and Mark Mueterthies confirmed that any money brought in for this project would ease the payments for all members of CCAC.

Mark Mueterthies confirmed with

Jeremy McGrath that he is done providing EMS Service to Chickasaw County on December 31, 2022 at 11:59 pm, Jeremy McGrath confirmed that is correct.

David Laudner addressed both the CCAC and BOS, no one is required to provide EMS service by law.

The current 28E will remain in place until it is changed. Anyone that wants out must give 180 days' notice before July 1. No one can get out of the current 28E until July 1, 2023 unless CCAC exceeds the budget cap of \$250,000 with 5% increase every year, or if everyone want out.

James Mitchell requested that Stephanie Mashek list what each CCAC member is paying now and then the projected increase and revenue with the SafeTech Solutions' numbers.

Randy Taylor suggests talking to Iowa Falls EMS to see how their employee structure is setup and the option of a paramedic intercept for our BLS trucks.

Matt Kuhn wants a new 28E agreement created to protect the investment.

Samantha Johnson believes that if it is a full-time position, people from towns outside of New Hampton would drive to New Hampton to work their shift.

Jeremy McGrath wants to promote EMS in Chickasaw County and statewide. Make EMS a professional occupation with a livable wage.

Jim Ashley reiterated for the sake of all to take back to their own city councils, the BOS will use American

Rescue Act money to purchase the EMS equipment and building and the CCAC members will be responsible to pay for their share towards the salary and benefits.

Matt Kuhn requests a consensus to have the Chickasaw County Attorney review and update the current 28E agreement. David Laudner advised as soon as all CCAC members return from their city council meetings that this is confirmed the direction CCAC is going then he will work on updating the 28E.

managed one out through the first four batters after that tomahawked pitch by Kurtenbach.

Bodensteiner reached on an infield single in the first inning and pitched well enough to win. The junior pitched five innings and his pitch count reached 90, so Stepan brought in Noah Hanson to finish off the game. Bodensteiner allowed six hits and three earned runs. He walked three and struck out five.

The game was tied at 4-4 headed into the top of the sixth.

"We knew we were probably to go to Noah then," said Stepan.

TV ended the bottom of the first inning on a tailor-made 6-4-3 double play to end a threat after Tucker Franzen and Hillegas had each singled.

The Trojans saw Carson Busta lead off the top of the third with a single and then Bodensteiner ripped a hit to left and TV was back in business. Hillegas wiggled his way out of the jam, though, as he induced a strikeout, a come-backer for the second out and finished the frame with a flyout to right.

"We didn't jump on that. That might have been a place - but that's baseball," said Stepan.

Down 2-0, N-P finally got on the board in the bottom half of the third with a two-out rally. Hillegas launched a first-pitch fastball to left that looked like it might leave the yard. It ended up being a ground-rule double, which prevented two runs from scoring. 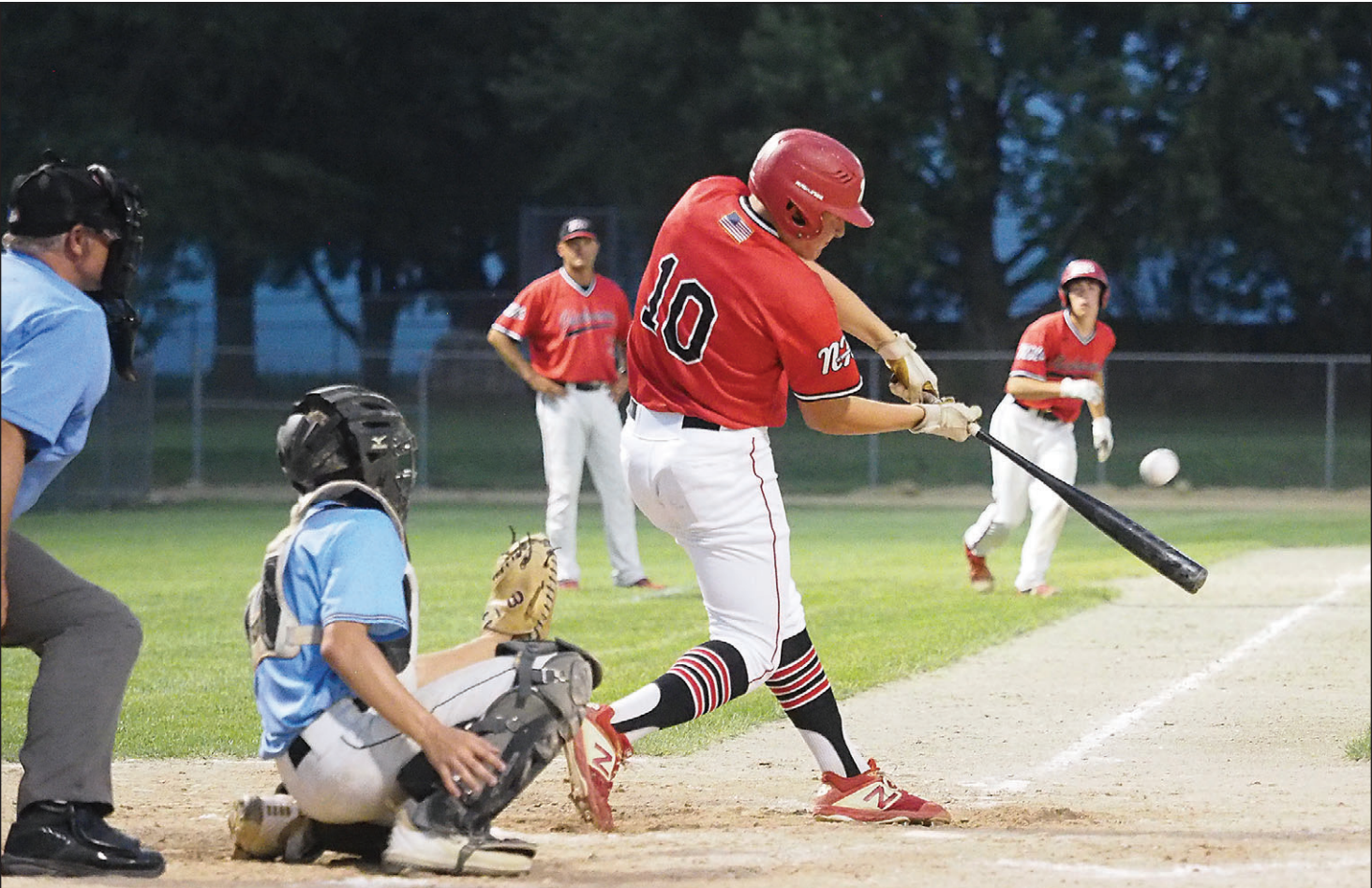

Kael Meyers was humming on the hill Tuesday evening at Jesup.

The Trojans are just starting their march toward that ultimate goal after making quick work of West Central, 12-0, in the opening round of Class 1A regional play last Friday night in Jackson Junction.

"None of us are ready for the season to be over with," said Hackman. "I think we can make a run. We're playing well."

Five seasons ago, Hackman took over a Turkey Valley program in 2018 that sport-

ed two eighth-grade starters in Josie Weber and Kara Reicks. Hackman's other senior — Olivia Drilling — has played on the varsity squad since her sophomore season.

That's incentive alone to keep cruising along in a postseason that featured a second round matchup in Class 1A, Region 7 that took place in Gilbertville on Wednesday against the host Don Bosco Dons.

"We're going to have to play a very good game to beat them," said Hackman.

Coincidentally, that same year in 2018 when Weber and Reicks first started their prolific careers at Turkey Valley, the Trojans started the postseason with a 5-3 win at Don Bosco.

Trojans celebrate a UIC ‘threepeat’

Turkey Valley sweeps Clayton Ridge to share crown with Kee for a second straight season

The Turkey Valley softball team made it three conference crowns in a row after sweeping Clayton Ridge last week Wednesday by scores of 12-2 and 12-0.

With those two emphatic victories, Junior Hackman and his Trojans have now claimed three-straight Upper Iowa Conference league titles.

The past two seasons TV has shared the conference regular season championship with Kee as both teams sported 14-2 league marks. In the shortened COVID season in 2020, Turkey Valley won the league outright with a perfect 16-0 mark.

TV (18-7, 14-2) won four conference games in a row to keep pace with Kee (17-14). The Hawks won 11 league games in a row after splitting with Turkey Valley in a doubleheader in early June. Turkey Valley’s last league loss came at the hands of North Fayette Valley, 8-6, on

June 22.

TV smashed the softball against Clayton Ridge and scored 24 runs in the twinbill.

“We’re getting hitting everywhere in the lineup right now,” said Hackman. “We’re dangerous all the way through.”

Maici Weber, Hackman’s eighth-grade catcher, collected eight RBI in the sweep over the Eagles. Weber led the conference in hitting with a .538 batting average and is the ninth-best hitter in Class 1A in terms of her hitting clip at the plate.

Brianna Busta, a junior, also managed three hits in the opener like Weber.

TV closed out the regular season on Thursday of last week with a non-conference game versus Sumner-Fredericksburg (21-5).

The Cougars won the North Iowa Cedar League 6-4 and trailed 3-0 before scoring six runs in the fourth and fifth innings against junior reliever
