A Turkey Valley High School student has been charged with attempted murder and felony domestic assault for an incident that took place last month.

Robert Dale Kruse, age 18 of Fort Atkinson, was charged in Fayette County District Court after Winneshiek County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to a domestic disturbance a mile north of St. Lucas on June

Upon investigation, they learned of a serious assault that had taken place in Fayette County. Fayette County Sheriff's Office deputies learned that a female was taken to a remote area along the Turkey River and was seriously assaulted, choked, and forced under the water. Kruse was arrested on Fayette County

God fills in the gaps

Reporter's late father put her on the path closer to her Father

Last month, as Father's Day approached, I somehow convinced myself that this year would be easier, that Sunday would just be a normal day that grief couldn't touch. Yet I couldn't help but reflect on the role that my dad played in my life, and the role any father plays in his daughter's life.

This is the seventh year my mom and I have spent Father's Day with an empty seat beside us in church and an empty chair at our table.

His legacy continues to live on in our lives and traditions, however. My mom and I greeted at church that Sunday and my mom joked with the usher, one of my dad's friends, about taking a jar of peanuts and putting our names in the Father's Day drawing in my dad's honor. But, alas, the Kwik Star gift card went to my best friend's dad instead. The empty seat at our table would have had a plate



of steak in front of it had my dad been there to fill it, but we enjoyed the meal nevertheless.

I've often wondered, and talked about this with some of my other friends who's lives have also lacked a steady or loving fatherly role, if society realizes how important a dad is in his daughter's life.

I told my mom that as the years roll on since my dad passed on, how I've transitioned from the questions of "why" aimed at God, to the realization of learning to live without a father figure in my life anymore.

While memories of a loving father and his guidance may sustain me in many ways, I will never again see his smiling face in the bleachers, feel his strong arms wrap around me in sadness and joy, feel the tickle of his mustache as he kisses my cheek goodnight or hear his voice over the phone when I'm desperate for some fatherly advice.

Nor will his shoes ever brush against my white dress as I walk down the aisle someday.

Of course, this continued realization and ache of longing brought me to tears yet again this Father's Day. Somehow frustration at God and injustice of losing my dad so young seemed to distract me for awhile. Now that I've mostly made peace, and learned to trust that God brings good from it all, I can only be frustrated by how helpless I feel to fill that void in my life.

As I began my run that Saturday before Father's Day, with my amazing mom biking beside me, I fully expected to find myself choking up at some point during the five miles of my feet pounding the concrete. When my expectation proved true, however, it was not for the reason I initially suspected.

Running down a section of the Tribe Trail, instead of the ache of loss I had experienced that afternoon, my emotions bubbled over from a heart filled with gratitude.

I had been toying around with writing this column, but I knew it wouldn't go in until after Father's Day so I decided to write about the importance of a fatherly role in a girl's life. So as I ran, ideas began swirling through my head, along with the positive aspects of the column that I wanted to include.

For me, the positive ways God has brought good from this loss, and reminded me of His faithfulness, have been the people He has placed around me.

Running under a brush-painted sunset sky, beside corn fields of green new life, I reflected on these many people who have made this loss a little easier, and made my life a lot richer.

From when my coach and her husband walked me to my car recently when I didn't feel safe, to the encouragement of my teachers, boss, coaches, and family friends, to my dad's friends, like the usher at church and my youth pastor, some of whom have called me Charlie-girl or Charlie junior since his passing, to family members, like my uncle who faithfully watches online or attends my races. Once I compete, I look forward to his text message filled with love, pride and advice that I know I will find on my phone once I reach my sports bag.

On Father's Day, I texted him and took a moment to thank him for the incredible impact his love and support has had on my life. When I was in middle school and just starting to run, my dad loved to give me advice. I tease my mom that her postrace comments like "You looked cute!" or "Who did your hair this time?" don't help much in the long run, as appreciated as they are (french braids are a secret to success, after all). However, phone calls, text messages and conversations with my uncle have helped to ease that empty seat in the bleachers.

In high school, that absence was filled in part by people like Mike Shatek, my friend Riley's dad, who would yell "Go Lydia!" over and over until I smiled through the pain on the cross country course, or Coach Bob Vorwald, with his pre-race encouragement and post-race bear hugs filled with pride, no matter how I competed.

And it's moments like when my coach and her husband walked me to my car, when my mom wraps her arms around me when I cry, or when I felt the comfort of my heavenly Father after losing one of my uncles this winter, that my dad's protective embrace, for a moment, doesn't seem so far away.

He may never be here to kiss me goodnight again, but that's one memory I will never forget. I didn't want to go to bed as a kid until his headlights hit the garage door announcing that Daddy was home from work. Some things in my life forever changed on that September day in 2015.

Now that I'm older I wish I had asked my dad more questions. I wish I could pick his brain about his knowledge of the Bible or ask him about childhood memories or what jobs I should take for the summer. My mom and I both desperately wished he was here when I learned to drive. Every time she puts her foot on the brake in the passenger seat I still do!

But my mom is thankfully one of the wisest people I know, and in numerous situations where I'm unsure, I often think of what she would do. I begrudgingly admitted to her that when driving by myself, many of her innumerable tips are often running through my head. Her personal favorite is "They don't know what you're thinkin', unless you're blinkin,'" so needless to say the cheesy dad jokes department is under control.

And I look forward to the day when I can walk down the aisle arm-in-arm with the woman who's love and godly influence has helped make me into who I am today.

As she and I went on a bike ride last week, we met up with some longtime family friends of ours, a mother-daughter duo who recently lost their husband and father. The image of the four of us flying down the hill on our bikes represents two families, both forever changed by grief, but both forever marked by love.

Talking with my friend on that ride also reminded me of the importance of friendship. My friends and teammates bring incredible joy and blessings to my life, as do many of their families. I've been reminded of the amazing friendships God has given me with, some of which have become more like family over the years.

One of my favorite verses is found in Psalm 68:5-6, "A father to the fatherless, a defender of widows, is God in his holy dwelling. God sets the lonely in families, he leads out the prisoners with singing..."

My mom often reminds me that God fills in the gaps of not having my dad here. While He can never replace that spot in the bleachers, I can feel Him racing with me.

While His strong arms may never wrap around me physically, I've felt His immense love and comfort in times of both sorrow and joy. While He may never kiss me goodnight, I feel His peace watching over me as I drift off to sleep. While I may never hear His voice on the phone, it whispers in my ear in times of desperation and uncertainty, guiding the path for me to walk.

My dad's greatest legacy was helping to lead me, and so many others, closer to a Father who's love is far greater than his ever could be. Without Him, the hole in my heart would be far greater.

The ache of missing my dad may slave.

The ache of missing my dad may always be there, on Father's Day and throughout the year, but through the people in my life and the loving Father who has placed them there, the ache becomes far lighter.

I'm grateful for the 14 years I was given with my dad and I hope my grief somehow reminds all of us to appreciate the fathers and father-figures, who love and support us. Father's Day is only that, a day, but sometimes loss reminds us to celebrate those we love all year round.





fact that the city has received just one applicant for a current vacancy on the police force.

Council members bandied about a number of ideas ranging from increasing pay to offering sign-on bonuses to paying retention bonuses. They also agreed with Nosbisch's suggestion that the city modify its handbook to allow employees to live more than 10 miles from the city.

Councilwoman Katie Fisher said she would support increasing the distance an employee could live from the city to 40 miles to help New Hampton possibly attract residents of places like Waterloo, Decorah and Cedar Falls.

But a vast majority of the discussion was centered around

New Hampton currently starts its officers at \$21.83 per hour and once they are certified they are paid \$23.86 per hour.

But among the cities surveyed, that starting wage was at the bottom of the proverbial





It's the finish that prevented Dan Stepan's Trojans from advancing to the next round in Class 1A postseason prep baseball action in Calmar on Saturday.





Five seasons ago, Hackman took over a Turkey Valley program in 2018 that sport-



"We're getting hitting everywhere in the lineup right now," said Hackman. "We're dangerous all the way through."


