Supervisors set county's 'max levy'

If not lowered, tax asking for county general services fund will increase by 5.5 percent

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors on Monday approved its "max levy" for the 2022-23 budget year, one that could lead to an increase in county property tax bills despite the fact that the levy rate could drop.

Because valuations in the county will increase next year, the county is expected to take in more than \$4.35 million in property taxes for its general services fund, an increase of 5.53 percent from the \$4.13 million that the county will receive from property owners this year.

Supervisors spent more than 30 minutes discussing the max levy and approved it on a 4-1 vote, with only Jake Hackman casting a dissent-

Under state law, supervisors can lower the "max levy" when it approves its 2022-23 budget and tax levy, but it can't raise it. A board that can't get a super-majority — in Chickasaw County's case, that means four of the five board members — to approve the max levy, a county would be limited to a 2 percent tax-asking

"We can still lower this," Supervisor Tim Zoll said, "and I think we need to work on that here in the next month or so to do that."

But Hackman, during a short recess, said he voted against the max levy because he doesn't believe the board will lower the max levy when it approves to the final budget and levy.

"It is like last year," he said, "and the bottom line is that we approved the max levy and that's what we went with. ... My frustration is that by my math, we're talking \$170,000 if [we had a 2 percent increase] and we're really not going to take the time to look at grants, other funding sources? We just always go to the taxpayer, and I

Hospital CEO to council: Support public ambulance

On a night it approves 'max levy' and tourism grants, council hears plea from hospital CEO

The biggest "talker" at Monday night's New Hampton City Council meeting wasn't even on the agenda.

On a night in which council members approved the city's "maximum levy" for 2022-23 and handed out \$23,500 in tourism grants, the issue that led to the most discussion may have been the future of ambulance service in the city and Chickasaw County.


As the meeting neared an end Monday night, MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center CEO and President Aaron Flugum asked New Hampton Mayor

Bobby Schwickerath to provide the council an update on an Ambulance Council meeting that took place last Thursday.

During the council, which includes Schwickerath, voted to extend the time SafeTech Solutions can have to do a feasibility study on a possible county-owned service until Aug. 30. The measure passed on a 4-1 vote, with only the Ambulance Council small cities - Ionia, Lawler, Alta Vista and Lawler — voting against the extension.

Flugum told City Council members he was frustrated by the action and urged them to

COVID stats take a turn for positive

Lisa Welter will be the first to admit that her latest weekly report COVID-19 was a "short" week, but she's still celebrating

That's because the Public Health and Homecare Services administrator's report released last Friday showed just 25 new positive tests recorded in the county, the lowest number since early September.

"I know it's only four days," she said Monday afternoon, pointing out that the Jan. 28 report wasn't released until Jan. 31, "but this is the best news we've seen in a long time. And we only had 10 new positive



Are you expecting a tax refund this year? If so, what will you do

Of course, the answer largely depends on the size of your refund. For the 2020 tax year, the average refund was about \$2,800, according to the Internal Revenue Service. But whether your refund this year will be about that size, smaller or larger, you can find ways to benefit from the money. Here are some possibilities:

· Contribute to your IRA. You've got until April 18 to fully fund your IRA for the 2021 tax year. But if you've already reached the maximum for 2021, vou could use some, or all, of your refund for your 2022 contribution. Assuming you did get around \$2,800, you'd be almost halfway to the \$6,000 annual contribution limit. (If you're 50 or older, you can contribute up

• Invest in a 529 plan. If you have children or grandchildren, you might want to invest your refund in a 529 education savings plan. A 529 plan's earnings can grow federal income-tax free, and withdrawals are federal income-tax free provided the money is used for qualified education expenses. If you invest in your own state's plan, you might get a tax deduction or credit. A 529 plan can be used to pay for college, vocational training and even some K-12 expenses in some states. Plus, if you name one child as a beneficiary, and that child's educational journey does not require the funds from a 529 plan, you may change the beneficiary to another eligible family member of the original beneficiary.

• Add to the "cash" part of your portfolio. It's generally a smart move to keep at least a portion of your overall investment portfolio in cash or cash equivalents, because the presence of cash can help you in two ways. First, since its value won't change, it can help cushion, at least to a degree, the effects of market volatility on your portfolio. And second, by having cash

available, you'll be ready to take advantage of attractive investment opportunities when they

• Boost your emergency fund. You could use your tax refund to start or supplement an emergency fund. Ideally, this fund should contain three to six months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. (If you're already retired, you might need this fund to cover a full year's worth of expenses.) Without such a fund, you might be forced to dip into long-term investments to pay for costly housing or auto repairs or large medical bills.

• Reduce your debt load. It's not always easy to minimize your debt load, even if you're careful about your spending habits. But the lower your debt payments, the more money you'll have available to invest for your future. So, you may want to consider using some of your tax refund to pay off some debts, or at least reduce them, starting with those that carry the highest interest rates.

• Donate to charity. You could use part of your refund to donate to a charitable organization whose work you support. And if you itemize on your tax return, part of your gift may be deductible.





"Most counties are in the same boat we are," he said, "and from what I'm hearing, they are at the same point we are." During the discussion, the subject of increasing valua-

that the county's health insurance premiums will increase by 5 percent during the fiscal year that begins on July 1, and during the discussion both Board Chairman Matt Kuhn and Supervisor Jason Byrne said they would like to see the county cover some costs for county employees who opt for family plans.

Currently, the county pays the entire premium for "single" policies, but if county employees want a family plan, they must pay the difference — about \$1,100 per month — between the cost of the single and family

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
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
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
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Lettermen give day care a helping hand

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


Riceville 18-8 in the final period and had balanced scoring as four Trojans hit double-figures.


"What's happened, I couldn't change," he said, "so I kind of just had to forget about the past and just worry about what was in front of me.




