County looking for new tower site

After Nashua City Council nixes permit, supervisor says 'time to move on'

Chickasaw County is looking for new ground.

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors is weighing its options after the city of Nashua denied a special land-use permit last week to allow the county the ability to build a 300-foot mobile radio communications

near the Avenue of the Saints but inside the city limits of that town.

Board member Scott Cervinske said he has been in contact with a property owner that owns land that is just down the road from where the county wanted to construct a \$250,000 mobile tower on a small parcel of non-farmable ground near Amherst Boulevard in Nashua.

Cervinske said the elevation of the

potential small piece of acreage is not a whole lot different than the prior spot where the county was planning on building the tower.

Board member Jacob Hackman had this to say last Tuesday afternoon prior to Nashua's vote on the matter that evening.

"I think it's time to move on into the country and find a new location outside the city of Nashua," said Hackman.

Hackman said there is ground nearby that may work for construction of the tower, but that land is in Floyd County. The county preferred this particular site inside the Nashua city limits because of its height and ability to transmit its signal to another tower in Bremer County, specifically Waverly.

COUNTY LEADERS INTERVIEW TWO, PICK SHAWVER TO TAKE OVER FOR HEMANN

Almost 11 years ago, Ryan Shawver made the move from the New Hampton Police Department to the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Office, and he'll be the first to admit that back then he was young and cocky.

"I was green behind the ears," he said, "and I thought I knew everything when I really didn't know anything. ... I'm not saying I didn't learn at the PD, don't get me wrong, but one thing

I've learned in law enforcement is that you're never going to know everything. You keep growing, if that makes any sense."

The 1999 graduate of New Hampton High School has grown a lot since he first stepped foot in the Sheriff's Office on April 30, 2012, and in a week, he'll become acting sheriff and four days later, he'll be appointed to the vacancy that is being created by current Sheriff Marty Hemann's retirement.

After interviewing the two qualified applicants for the position Hemann will leave on Jan.

19, the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors voted 5-0 last Wednesday evening to publish a "notice of intent" to fill the vacancy on Monday, Jan. 23.

The notice, which is being published this week, includes the verbiage, "the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors intends to fill the vacancy in the Office of the Chickasaw County Sheriff by appointing Ryan Shawver as Chickasaw County Sheriff."

Famed church lands second pastor

Associate pastor will 'manage' Little Brown Church and work with youth, student ministry

It ended up being a homecoming for Sam Rambo when Pastor Drew McHolm and his wife Jesse invited the new associate pastor of the Little Brown Church and his family to share in the joy of Christmas last month.

Rambo and his wife Carolina have decided to stick around for awhile and the parishioners of the historic 150-year old church located in Nashua should be better off because of it.

Rambo was introduced to the church on Sunday, as McHolm welcomed Rambo and his family with open arms.

There's been no word if McHolm and Rambo are planning on producing and starring in any blockbuster movies this summer.

"Just to let you know, Sam's got a unique name – as you could well understand. I'm officially changing my name to Drew Schwarzenegger because I think that would be very attractive to most people," laughed McHolm.

All joking aside, Rambo – a Cedar Rapids native – will work part-time as associate pastor as well as managing the church. McHolm – who took over as full-time pastor at the LBC over four years ago – said Rambo's main concentration will be working with the youth and student ministry – of which there are about 25-30 kids.

"Sam comes to us with a huge love for the Lord," said McHolm. "The thing I really liked was his passion for Christ. Pastor Sam comes to us with excellent Biblical training."

The two preachers met at Aromas Coffee in Charles City – McHolm's self-proclaimed "public office."

"I do that on purpose because you get to meet real people and have conversations about the Lord," said McHolm. "That's part of my strategy for being there."

McHolm and Rambo were wearing the same Arabic scarf at the coffee shop that day and the chance encounter turned into a wonderful friendship.

"I felt like God had called me to this area," said Rambo. "It was just such a beautiful moment."

Rambo is a 2015 Cedar Rapids Washington High School graduate and graduated from seminary school at Trinity Bible College, located in Ellendale, North Dakota. He said ever since he was a kid he wanted to be a pastor – part of a personal mission to give God glory and help people out.

"The people that I met that day are my spiritu-

al father and my spiritual mother," said Rambo about meeting Drew and his wife Jesse McHolm.

Rambo was pastor at Amazing Grace Church in Charles City for three years – starting in December of 2019. Then he moved to Florida to work as a mechanic. Hurricane Ian – which devastated the coastal area of the Sunshine State last fall – had other plans.

So Rambo and his family headed back to Iowa and looked for work in a capacity to serve the Lord once again.

"We are so deeply excited and so gratified to be here," said Rambo. "We thought going to Florida was going to be the most attractive choice for us. We're used to seeing beaches and palm trees, but my goodness – I would not trade this for anything in the world. It just feels like being back home."

Rambo, 26, tried to find work as a pastor in Minnesota prior to coming to Charles City – but that job opportunity ended up not being his calling.

"I really wanted to do something for God.

Ministry jobs – they're hard to find. Most of it's based on relationships rather than availability," said Rambo. "We've had just a really big journey."

McHolm officiated the wedding of Rambo and his wife Carolina down in Cedar Falls recently.

"The ability to come back here and pastor again means more to me than anything else because God loves each and every one of you," said Rambo. "There's no place that's too small for God and Drew McHolm – right over there – is living testimony to that."

Rambo's first official worship service as associate pastor will be this Sunday at 10:30 a.m. at the LBC.

"I just want to say thank you guys so much. This is such a big moment for me and my wife," said Rambo.

Sam and Carolina have a 14-month-old son named Samuel and a newborn named Camila.

"You guys have shown just such a love and such an appreciation already. We are just overcome," said Rambo.

City logo vote is too close to call

Run-off election needed to determine finalist winner

With a final vote tabulation that was paper thin – Val Johnson and the Big 4 Chamber of Commerce have decided to hold a run-off election to determine which city logo will represent the town of Nashua.

Johnson, Big 4 Chamber President, remarkably said the voting contest between the two competing city logos came down to a single vote – 104 to 103.

The final results of the voting between the two finalist designs will be presented to the Nashua City Council at the next regular meeting on Monday, Dec. 16 at 7 p.m.

Johnson also said after the final results are revealed to the public and Nashua finds out what its new logo will be, the Chamber will release the names of all those that submitted entries.

The two competing logos feature two idyllic traits of Nashua – fishing on the beautiful Cedar Lake and the town's historic Little Brown Church.

That's how God would have us learn about him and his forgiving salvation.


It is brought down to us, like the snow and rain that fall from above.

(Once you turn 72, however, you will have to start withdrawing certain amounts from your 401(k) and traditional IRA.) But your earnings can affect another source of your retirement income — your Social Security benefits.

If you return to work before your "full" retirement age, which is likely between 66 and 67, the Social Security earnings limit in 2023 is \$21,240. For each \$2 earned over that amount, Social Security will deduct \$1 from benefits. If you reach your full retirement age in 2023, the earnings limit is \$56,520; Social Security will deduct \$1 from your benefits for each \$3 earned over this amount until the month you turn your full retirement age. But in all future years after you've reached your full retirement age, you can earn as much as you want without losing any benefits. Social Security will then recalculate your payments to give you credit for the months your benefits were reduced or withheld due to your excess earnings. Be aware, though, that your earned income can potentially result in higher taxes on your Social Security benefits at any age.


"We have a number of different perspectives, and to have all these people willing to share

of volunteers," Markham said, "but we really appreciate the generosity of people in our country. We have so many people to thank, and we appreciate everyone who contributed to the campaign."

She said more than 150 residents volunteered to ring the bell at Fareway in New Hampton. That included individuals, organizations and fam-

ilies. Markham said St. Joseph Community School took an entire week of shifts.

Markham said the campaign will allow the Salvation Army to continue to provide a variety of services — ranging from helping with rent to providing emergency housing to donating funds to area schools for coats, boots and snowpants.

The latter was done this year as the Salvation Army donated \$1,000 to each of

department — EMS, secondary roads, city workers and state agencies would also use the ISICS (Iowa Statewide Interoperable Communications System) that the tower provides.

The Board also approved to pay five percent (\$122,00) of a remaining Motorola Services contract for a radio project.

Joel Knutson, the new director of the Chickasaw County EMS, was in attendance to discuss his proposed budget.

The Board passed the 2023 ambulance fee schedule as listed on file. Hackman made the motion to approve that schedule and Cerwinski seconded the motion. All board members approved the new EMS rates for the calendar year.

Knutson said the rates were derived from a sampling of other services in the district.

"For those not familiar, insurance chooses to pay what they want. You have to have a fee schedule," said Knutson.

For \$5,400, the board voted to decal one of the EMS' ambulances. ARPA funds would be used for that work to be done.

Water quality at the Heritage Building Center was also brought up. Board Chair Matthew Kuhn had this to say about the \$10,000 project that could affect the bacterial growth of the septic system at that building by using water softeners.

"They're looking at changing where the bleach or the chlorine — where that goes in. Right now the stuff gets done ahead of the pressure tanks. He's talking about doing it

after the pressure tanks," said Kuhn.

Kathy Lechtenberg, a clerk in the Auditor's office, has submitted her resignation — effective Feb. 17. Currently Lechtenberg is on medical leave, but the Board wants to fill her position as early as next month.

The Board voted to allow County Auditor Shelia Shekleton to hire a potential replacement for Lechtenberg by Feb. 6. Lechtenberg would train that new hire for two weeks when she is back from medical leave. The County has yet to conduct interviews to hire that clerk position.

Liz Zweibohmer was appointed to serve on the Eastern Iowa Tourism Association Committee and Chickasaw County Assessor Ray Armel was picked as Land Use Administrator/Flood Plain Manager.






"We just have to keep grinding during practice and keep on working hard," said Gebel. "After every home meet, if we do good we'll get pizza and stuff."

If New Hampton head coach David Leichtman can get his hoops players to believe – that's half the battle to winning basketball in his mind.

Those Chickasaws are believing all right and playing some of their best basketball in the process.

The New Hampton girls hoops team rolled to two convincing wins last week as the Chickasaws took down Clarksville on Thursday, 62-42, then came from behind to blitz Crestwood the next night on Friday by a score of 61-46.

Two games in two days – equaled two wins and plenty of happy faces all the way around.

What was the key to Friday night's win over the Cadets in a game that saw NH trail, 33-25, early in the third period?

"I told the ladies it's going to get contagious," said Leichtman. "Early in the third, there was a timeout – I said the next defensive stand is where

it's going to be. Then we were able to buy into our defense."

NH outrebounded Crestwood 48-36 and saw three Chickasaws snare double digits in rebounds in senior Carlee Rochford (12), Ries (10) and Rosonke (10).

Leichtman talked about the deficit his team had dug in the first 18 minutes of the NEIC clash.

"At half – we all knew it," said Leichtman. "We knew that wasn't us."

Rochford hit for 29 points against Clarksville and also repeated that same total against Crestwood (4-6, 0-4). Rochford – New Hampton's all-state guard – is the second-leading scorer in the state. She averages almost 27 points a game.

Rosonke netted 10 points and nine rebounds in the Clarksville victory.

Molly Wegner, a Chickasaw junior guard, scored 10 against Clarksville and netted 15 points against Crestwood. She nailed three 3-pointers.

Ries and Schwickerath have been active on both ends of the court for New Hampton – which has caused fits for opponents that must deal with their athleticism.

"If we play like a team like we did tonight, we could go a ways," said Schwickerath, who scored four points and grabbed five rebounds against the Cadets.

Ries scored six points to go along with her 12 rebounds and six assists.

Ries talked about New Hampton's slow start and what the Chickasaws were able to fix once they started to start to cut down on mistakes and play together as a team.

The number of excuses for not working out are only limited by one's imagination.


But with so many resources in the area that offer a variety of ways to get in shape, a lack of facilities shouldn't be one of those excuses.

Brandy Hoffman of the Husky Wellness Center pointed out at certain times her facility had 20 different pricing options, although she is trying to streamline that process.

were named co-directors in March, but there are 14 other "staff members" listed. That helps cover the hours they are open: Monday through Thursday from 5 a.m. to 8 p.m., Friday from 5 a.m. to 7 p.m., Saturday from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from noon to 6 p.m. There is also a 24/7 access pass.

Patrons may choose a day pass for \$6.50, a punch pass — good for 10 trips — for \$46 or a month pass for \$65. There are also family, couple, single, student, senior couple and senior single rates, and all of them have the 24/7 option.

Among the cardio equipment available are eight treadmills, three recumbent bikes, three ellipticals, two upright bikes, a NuStep machine and an adaptive motion trainer, which is a type of elliptical, but more versatile. "You can walk, run, climb on them," said Holschlag. "It is easier on the knees and joints than a treadmill which makes them popular."

For those wanting to tone or strengthen, circuit training stations — complete with information on how to use the machine and which muscles will be targeted — are available, along with 5,000 pounds of free weights.

Always on the lookout to improve, Holschlag says they are saving for another NuStep machine.

"That's really popular with our elderly population, especially someone with a knee or hip replacement, it's very low risk."

Shortly after Robinson and Holschlag were named co-directors in March, they faced challenges.





"We had a water main break we're dealing with," she said. "We're trying to get things updated but it takes money and we can't get everything done at once."

They've also had a decrease in participation in their classes offered. The CWC offers classes from kettlebells to spin classes to high interval training and yoga. Holschlag hopes class sizes, which saw a drop off during COVID, pick up again soon. The classes run in six-week sessions, with the next session to begin sometime in February.

When the complex opened in 2004, there was a need for more space for the nearby high school to send athletes. That changed with the construction of a second gym at New Hampton High.

"When the weather is bad in the spring some track kids will run on our track and some will do batting practice but it's kept to a minimum."

Wrestling practice is no longer held at the CWC, so there's room for something else in that room, the directors just don't know what yet.

"The carpentry class at the high school came in and put in new flooring in the old wrestling room, it saved us a ton on installation fees and they got experience," said Holschlag of the November project. "They carried all the flooring up, they worked really, really hard."

While other amenities, like a racquetball court, locker room, steam room and, of course, the track, make the facility attractive, Holschlag pointed to what she thought the best part of the CWC was.

"I think it's our friendly

atmosphere," she said. "Our members come first, the staff knows a lot of them on a first-name basis and we're here to help."

NASHUA'S HUSKY WELLNESS CENTER opened in 2013, but director Brandy Hoffman is a newcomer, starting as the Director in September of last year.

While she's still figuring out the dynamics of directing a facility that's both school and community focused, she is helped out by five staff members, five fitness instructors and an "amazing" custodian.

One thing that changes in 2023 is that fitness classes are free for members. The catch may be the time they are held, as workout classes, kettlebell and spin classes begin at 5:15. In the morning. A lower intensity workout takes place two days a week and starts at 6:15... still in the morning.

"We usually have a group of 5-10 people in the mornings," Hoffman said. "We did just add yoga on Saturday mornings at 8 a.m. This is a new offering which we paired with tumbling so that parents can participate in yoga while their kiddos attend tumbling." The ages for tumbling classes are 3-8 years old.

Hours for the facility vary, but at this time of the year regular hours are 5 to 8 a.m. Monday through Friday, 4 to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 8 to 11 a.m. Saturdays and 1 to 5 p.m. Sundays. However, the extended pass allow patrons to access the strength/cardio rooms from 4 a.m. to 11 p.m. seven days a week and access to the field house — which includes the walking track and courts — Friday 3-8 p.m., Saturday 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Sunday 8

a.m. to 6 p.m.

"The weight and cardio room are by far the most used year round," said Hoffman. "But in the winter time we see a lot of people come in to walk the track. We also have an Adult Volleyball League on Sundays which kicked off Jan. 8."

There's also a "track pass" for \$2 each time, which allows admission to those who only want to walk the track. Day passes are \$5 and 10-punch passes \$35. Month passes are offered, plus two-week extended access passes and three-month memberships. Family, couple, single, student, senior couple and senior single memberships are available, plus extended access for all those memberships for an additional fee.

The objective of the Husky Wellness Center seems to view "wellness" as more than just fitness.

"The National Honor Society uses the facility two times a year for a Red Cross blood drive," said the director. "And we just had a Wellness exam, where Allen Hospital came, they drew blood and did tests for greatly reduced prices."

Community involvement is a big goal.

"We are always looking for someone to share their talents whether that be couponing, budgeting, crocheting, photography, etc., and we have a form on the website for community members to complete to share ideas."

Hoffman, whose "day job" is for CUNA Mutual, is passionate about finances and is looking to do some type of financial literacy classes. "Being new to this role I am eager to try new things to help the student body and community."






