## Supervisors OK EMS Department

After contentious discussion, board votes 3-2 to approve ordinance for county-owned ambulance

Chickasaw County now has an EMS Department, at least as of today (Thursday), thanks to the Board of Supervisors approving the adoption of a new ordinance during its regular meeting on Monday morning.

As has often happened during the saga to create a county-owned ambulance service — one that must be up and running by Jan. 1 — the ordinance was approved on a 3-2 vote with Board Chairman Matt Kuhn, Jason Byrne and Steve Breitbach supporting adopting the ordinance by waiving the second and third readings while Jake Hackman and Tim Zoll opposed the motion.

Hackman went on the offensive immediately after Monday's public hearing on the ordinance began. "This department will curate more people, more payroll, more HR issues, more attorney costs ... again, more taxes and wages," he said. "Hopefully this board and future boards understand that."

Hackman went on to add that supervisors should also understand that creating an EMS Department would adversely affect every existing county department. "They're going to want more, they're going to want more wages to compare to this new department," he said. "I hear it already."

Hackman, who represents the western side of New Hampton and surrounding rural townships, also questioned why the supervisors didn't first create the department before signing the 28E agreements this past summer and he urged his fellow board members not to waive

## County to move offices to Heritage

Supervisors unanimously vote to move county, non-profit offices to former county home

Although the sale of its office building on New Hampton's East Main Street technically isn't final, Chickasaw County leaders decided Monday to move the county departments and non-profit offices that are currently housed there to the Heritage building that is located just south of the city limits.

The Board of Supervisors voted 5-0 to move the five offices at 910 E. Main St., even if a proposed sale to a company that plans on building a Dollar General store derails.

Early in Monday's meeting, County Attorney David Laudner said that a purchase agreement for the sale of the East Main building has been finalized but that the company purchasing the building now has 150 days to decide to move forward or back out of the agreement.

"I'd anticipate closing in the next several months," said Laudner, who added that if the company backs out of the purchase, supervisors would be back to "square one and the purchase agreement would be null and void. You guys would be back to deciding whether you want to sell it and, if so, to whom [but] you obviously should operate going forward as if it's sold."

Currently, the East Main building houses the county's Veterans Affairs and Northeast Iowa Community Action/General Assistance offices, as well as agencies like Iowa Child Care Resource and Referral and Helping Hands.

There was discussion about possibly moving Veterans Affairs into the former Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home building that currently houses the County Attorney's and the Emergency Management Agency offices because EMA Director Jeff Bernatz said he would like to be housed in the same building as

## New park has a name

Fundraising continues for Kindness Square at Runion Park

The latest addition to the New Hampton parks system may not be built yet, but it has a name as officials from the Parks and Recreation Department announced earlier this week that the all-inclusive park will be called Kindness Square at Runion Park.

And the department's recreation manager said fundraising continues to go well for the park that she hopes will be open by late next summer.

"Our hope had been to try to get it built next spring," Tara Hackman said, "but like with everything it seems right now, the lead time is taking longer but we're excited because we know we're getting closer every day."

Kindness Square will be New Hampton's most unique park as it will be handicap accessible and open to all, and Hackman said that the committee charged with making the all-inclusive park a reality is more than halfway to its fundraising goal of \$350,000.

She said that the committee has raised about \$200,000 and is embarking on several fundraising campaigns.



The committee has opened an "online store" in which it will sell Kindness Square clothing, water bottles, to-go bags and other items.

All profits from the store that can be accessed by going to <https://ksnh22.itemorder.com/shop/home/> will go to the project.

The second fundraiser will begin soon as committee members are working with Five Star Cooperative and Homeland Energy Solutions to allow farmers to "donate" a portion of their grain to the new playground.

All farmers need to do is let the grain scale office personnel know how much they would like to donate to the project.

This nonprofit was established in 2020 and has been up and running strong. It has a number of upcoming programs and opportunities for those interested in mental health in general and suicide prevention in particular.

In October, the group will have its second annual scholarship program open. The nonprofit provides scholarships annually to deserving students who are attending an establishment in higher learning. Students must have completed a year in the healthcare program (not general education).

Everybody Hurts has recently notified certified counselors in the county and surrounding areas of funds that may be available to those who need counseling services and are unable to pay for it.

The provider would be paid directly if necessary. Everybody Hurts officials say they are hoping to get mental health services to anyone who needs it.

Lastly, the local non-profit is partnering with Alive and Running nonprofit. Ryan Nesbit with this organization is willing to provide QPR training to county residents. This training is for students in grades 7-12 and adults.

QPR stands for Question, Persuade, and Refer — the three simple steps anyone can learn to help save a life from suicide. Currently we are looking to get into all the schools in Chickasaw County and any groups that are interested.

Everybody Hurts will fund the training for groups who are interested.

the second and third readings of the ordinance.

"I would like to see a second reading," he said, "just so it has time for my comments, other people's comments [to get] out in the paper and move forward."

Byrne and Kuhn, though, both said that county residents have had months to weigh in on the county's ambulance service that will provide service to the cities of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

"Everyone in the county should be well aware of what's going on," Kuhn said. "The 28E agreements have been signed, it's been on our agendas for months."

Byrne agreed. "These people could have come up and protested this three months ago," Byrne said. "You can't wait until after we purchased the equipment or accept those 28Es. I'm sorry, they should have been here a long time ago."

He also said the residents who have

reached out to him support the county-owned service, which led to an exchange between Hackman and himself.

"I think people realize what this is going to cost," Byrne said, "and people I've talked to said that keep going because we need it."

"So an open checkbook," Hackman retorted, and Byrne shot back, "What's the price of a life?"

Hackman, though, said property owners would be penalized and Byrne replied that everyone pays property tax.

"Everyone doesn't and you know that," Hackman said.

"Indirectly, they pay property tax," Byrne replied. "They rent a house; they're paying property tax."

Hackman added that the county doesn't even know where its share of funds for the service will come from, and County Attorney David Laudner said that remained up in the air.

"I don't know if there is a good answer on that," he said. "I think the answer varies statewide; in fact, there are several county attorneys that have a different opinion,

unfortunately."

Still, the board's legal advisor said that the passing the ordinance would be "formalizing what you've already done, in my opinion, or agreed to, let's put it that way."

And in the end, by a single vote, that's exactly what supervisors did.

Board members will meet with the Chickasaw County EMS Advisory Committee this afternoon (Thursday) at 1 p.m. to discuss a variety of issues ranging from pay to job descriptions.

EMS Advisory Committee member Bridget Edson told supervisors it was important for the committee to have more information to present to current EMS providers when it holds an EMS Appreciation Night this coming Tuesday at the Chickasaw Event Center, beginning at 5:30 p.m.

Edson told supervisors that the goal of the committee is to give EMS personnel an opportunity to learn more about the new service, including shift and pay information.

the county-owned ambulance service.

But Supervisor Jason Byrne said that if Chickasaw County Public Health and Homecare Services move to the Heritage, a possibility that has been discussed, the VA should be at the Heritage.

"I was told from Public Health that if they move out there," he said, "they'd prefer the VA to be with them ... because they work hand in hand with Community Action and the VA."

In the end, board members agreed and voted 5-0 to move the offices located at 910 E. Main to the Heritage on or before Dec. 1 and directed the county's head custodian, Dave Gorman, to move ahead with preparing the office space for occupancy.

In other news from Monday's meeting:

- Board members heard con-

cerns from two of the county's library directors — Nashua's Heather Hackman and New Hampton's Carrie Becker — about the overpayment the county made to libraries this year.

Due to a clerical error, the libraries that receive county funds were overpaid by about \$1,800 this year, and Hackman said the county's libraries want to know if they will have to pay the money back during the current fiscal year.

"We just kind of want to know where you're at," Heather Hackman said, "because we have our boards that we answer to. We have no problem paying it back, but everyone needs to communicate with us."

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn said no decision has been made and that the budget amendment the board will consider next week only puts enough money into an account to fund the libraries.

"I apologize that we haven't reached out," he said, "but at the same time, we haven't come to any decision so I'm not sure what I could have reached out with."

- County Engineer Roman Lensing told supervisors he is considering pushing up work on County Road V18, at least from U.S. Highway 18 to North

Washington and will report back to the Board of Supervisors at either this coming Monday's meeting or, at the latest, during the Oct. 10 meeting.

- Supervisor approved purchasing a small parcel of land from Nashua residents Michael and Deborah Franke for \$7,500 to complete the county's radio tower project.

But the devil cannot win the war.


That’s because God sent His Son to atone for all sin by shedding His holy blood on the cross. The devil will try to accuse you, throw your sins in your face, make you think that God has

## County to hold public hearing on budget amendment

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing next week to consider a budget amendment that is needed for a variety of reasons — including the start up of a county-owned ambulance service.

The hearing will be held at 9:15 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 3, during a regularly scheduled

board meeting.

The board finished hammering out the numbers during a meeting last week and the budget amendment includes a spending increase of \$1.45 million from the budget that was last certified.

That budget called for the county to spend about \$19.71 million.

A vast majority of the increased spending will come in the form of \$1.31 million for public safety and legal services, i.e., the ambulance service.

The county plans on using federal ARPA dollars to buy equipment and for start-up costs for Chickasaw County EMS, which will go into business on Jan. 1.

Nashua makes progress on EMS

City Council says it has crew chief, moves closer to purchasing an ambulance

Rhonda Dean came bearing good news to the Nashua City Council on Monday. For the citizens of Nashua, this was welcome information.

Nashua is hoping to have an ambulance service operational at the start of the New Year after the contract with its current provider runs out on Dec. 31, 2022. The town of around 1,500 residents has been in limbo and concerned about the future of its EMS (emergency medical services) after it chose to withdraw from the Chickasaw County proposed publicly-owned ambulance service that is still trying to get off the ground.

That means Nashua is branching out on its own in attempt to provide life-sustaining, critical care service to its residents. Dean let her fellow City Council members know at their Sept. 19 meeting that the effort to begin the framework for an EMS is moving in the right direction.

Dean, one of four new members on the Nashua City Council that were sworn in at the start of 2022, cut straight to the point to inform all in attendance inside the Council Chambers about the most recent developments concerning EMS.

"There is an ambulance that should be here this week that we are looking at," said Dean. "It's a 2004 Ford Diesel that used to be a Lifeline ambulance, which means it's smaller."

Dean did not mention the cost to purchase the ambulance, but did state that it is headed towards Iowa from Illinois - the corporate headquarters of Life Ambulance Network.

"It has low miles on it compared to some of the newer ones we saw. They think it will be a good fit for us," said Dean, who is a part of an ad-hoc committee that meets with members of the Nashua Fire Department to help form an EMS.

As far as where the ambulance would be stored - that decision has not been made yet as the vehicle has not been purchased.

"They think it will fit in the garage. Splash Pad stuff is going to have to go somewhere else," said Dean.

"Although, the fire department maybe wants to house it at the fire department. It's all squished in there now, I don't know how we're going to throw in an ambulance."

Dean stated rural trustees of the Nashua Fire Department are interested in sharing some of the expenses for the ambulance, like pagers and radios that the volunteers

are going to need.

Dean relayed perhaps even bigger news to the Council shortly after the announcement that the potential purchase of an ambulance for Nashua looks promising.

Dean announced that Zenda Viktorek will be Nashua's new crew chief for the EMS - at least on an interim basis.

"I'm so excited about this because I didn't think we were gonna end up with one - but we got one," said Dean.

After Nashua works out all the kinks in getting its EMS up and running - Dean said the city will at some point look to replace Viktorek with a more long-term hire.

"One thing that I really want to talk to her about is succession, because let's get somebody in there that will take over for you once we get going. Because I don't think she wants to do it for ever and I don't blame her," said Dean.

Dr. David Schrodt, with the Floyd County Medical Center, has verbally agreed to be Nashua's medical director on a volunteer basis. That was one of the first hurdles crossed in Nashua's effort to provide EMS to its citizens.

Nashua City Clerk John Ott had been in talks with Charles City Administrator Steve Diers and Charles City councilman Keith Starr about a possible partnership with AMR Ambulance and the city of Nashua.

There was no word at Monday's meeting as to what the state of those negotiations currently are.

Nashua plans on holding a town hall meeting to inform those interested about EMS on Wednesday, Oct. 26 at 7 p.m. in the fire station.

CHICKASAW COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. V-17 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A NEW COUNTY DEPARTMENT TO PROVIDE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

BET ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF CHICKASAW COUNTY:

SECTION 1. ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW DEPARTMENT

The Board of Supervisors hereby establishes a new county department to provide emergency medical services in Chickasaw County, including: services in which a person seeks emergency medical care, attention, and service; ambulance transport from home, work, or accident to the nearest hospital, medical center, or specialized treatment facility for emergency medical care as the circumstances of the situation dictate to first responding medical authorities; and emergency and nonemergency medical care at the scene or during out-of-hospital patient transportation in an ambulance—including transferring a patient from one hospital, medical center, or specialized treatment facility to another. The new county department will be owned and operated by Chickasaw County and known as "Chickasaw County EMS."

SECTION 2. TEMPORARY ADVISORY BOARD

Through January 31, 2023, a temporary advisory board shall be in place to oversee the creation, development, and initial operation of Chickasaw County EMS. Members of the advisory board shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. The advisory board shall report directly to the Board of Supervisors, and

any decisions with respect to Chickasaw County EMS shall be made solely by the Board of Supervisors. The advisory board shall automatically be dissolved on February 1, 2023, unless extended by a resolution approved by the Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 3. ORGANIZATION

Chickasaw County EMS shall be under the general supervision of the EMS Director. The EMS Director shall ensure that Chickasaw County EMS is operated in accordance with high standards and meets all of the requirements of State and Federal laws and regulations. The EMS Director shall also ensure that personnel working or volunteering for Chickasaw County EMS are qualified and have met the minimum training and certification requirements. Personnel working or volunteering for Chickasaw County EMS shall report directly to the EMS Director. The Board of Supervisors shall appoint, supervise, and—if necessary—dismiss the EMS Director. The EMS Director shall report directly to the Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 4. COMPENSATION

The EMS Director shall be compensated as determined by the Board of Supervisors. Other personnel working for Chickasaw County EMS shall be compensated in accordance with Chickasaw County policies and the general employee handbook.

SECTION 5. PROVIDING MUTUAL AID

Chickasaw County EMS is authorized to provide mutual aid to other EMS services, ambulance and rescue services, or first responders as required by law, or as required by any written agreements

mutually approved by both the Board of Supervisors and any other political subdivisions and/or private companies.

SECTION 6. FEES AND CHARGES

Fees and charges for the use of services provided by Chickasaw County EMS shall be established to help offset the operating costs of Chickasaw County EMS. The fees and charges for Chickasaw County EMS shall be established by a resolution approved by the Board of Supervisors. The fees and charges shall be payable upon presentation of a statement of said fees and charges to the user and/or recipient of the services provided by Chickasaw County EMS, and shall be paid directly to Chickasaw County according to procedures established by the EMS Director, County Auditor, and Board of Supervisors. Actions for collection of fees and charges may be brought in the name of Chickasaw County, after authorization of commencement of an action by the Board of Supervisors, in the same manner as other actions at law.

SECTION 7. DEDICATED FINANCIAL ACCOUNT

The Auditor is directed to establish a dedicated financial account for exclusive use by Chickasaw County EMS. Said dedicated financial account shall include all funds received from cities within Chickasaw County pursuant to 28E Agreements, payments for fees and charges, grant money, and other operating income of Chickasaw County EMS. The Auditor is directed to pay claims associated with the operating costs of Chickasaw County EMS from said dedicated financial account. The Auditor shall keep regular records regarding said dedicated financial account and periodically provide updates to the Board of Supervisors of the details of the same.

SECTION 8. RULES AND OPERATING PROCEDURES

The EMS Director shall establish rules and operating procedures consistent with State and Federal laws and regulations—but subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors—as may be necessary for the operation of Chickasaw County EMS.

SECTION 9. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 10. EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its final passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

PASSED AND ADOPTED by a majority of the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Iowa, this 26th day of September, 2022, after waiving both the second and third reading.

It helps to have a captain of the ship that's encountered his fair share of storms. Now he's just one victory away from a milestone mark.



During the first quarter it was a 35-yard Hayek pass from Hanson that set up a touchdown pass a short time


later as the seniors connected again for an 11-yard pass play that, when Hanson ran in the conversion, gave the TV boys a 24-0 lead.

New Hampton put up a good fight in the first two sets, but with a pair of 25-22 losses, the Chickasaw volleyball team had their backs against the wall Tuesday against Waverly-Shell Rock.


played really well, they shined a light, it was like they were saying 'we can do this.' So kudos to them, playing against a highly-respected team and holding their own."

keep putting on the hold defensively."

The two passes to Hayek were the only ones Hanson attempted for the night. "On the touchdown play, Noah saw the linebacker wasn't really covering me and it was a nice throw."

Field position favored Turkey Valley early as the defense forced a 3-and-out and the Wildcats punted from their own end zone, giving the Trojans a short field which ended with a Hanson 11-yard score.

Oliver Schmitt would run in the second touchdown of the game from the six before the Hanson-Hayek strike, and although there were only three minutes left in the first period after that drive, the Trojans managed two more scores before the quarter's end.

On the first TD, Hanson had a big hole, courtesy of his offensive line, then cut to the inside for a 47-yard touchdown with 1:34 remaining. And after another defensive stop, Carson Busta took the first play from scrimmage and romped 40 yards to score with 31 seconds left.

"We ran 23 offensive plays in the first half to score 55 points," pointed out coach Mark Scott. "Playing the major portion of the first half on our side of the field allowed us to score quickly, but the downside would be our offensive stats don't look impressive."

Janesville helped Turkey Valley to even shorter fields in the second quarter as the Wildcats tried a fake punt, which the TV defense stopped and Turkey Valley took over on the Janesville 28, that ended in a Schmitt 3-yard run and later the visitors tried a play in which the return man on a kickoff tried passing to a teammate, but the pass was broken up by Hayek and recovered by Ryan Franzen on the Janesville 11. Burke Busta scored from the 15 on that drive.

The 2-point conversion had been successful on each attempt to that point, and the Trojans mixed it up, with Hanson running twice, passing to Carson Busta twice and Calvin Bodensteiner once and a run by Burke Busta, but on the final attempt Mauricio Tinajero kicked the ball through, something the Trojans only attempted once in all of last year.

One more miscue by Janesville — a snap that went over the quarterback's head — was recovered by Brady Fischer on the Janesville 13. The Trojans didn't score on that possession, but added a touchdown in the final quarter on a 7-yard carry by freshman John Kruse.

"This was a good Homecoming win," said Scott. "The players executed well in all phases of the game. The defense was aggressive and ran to the ball very well. It was a good game to allow the younger players to play on Homecoming night."

Although Turkey Valley scored about the same num-

ber of points as the prior week against Riceville — 61 points this week, 62 last week — Scott was right about the stats not being impressive, as the Trojans rushed for 261 yards, well short of last week's 429. The averages were impressive though. While leading the team with 69 yards on six attempts, Carson Busta averaged 11.5 yards per try and Hanson went 68 yards on three carries for a 22.7-yard average.

The defense was led by Troy Schmitt with 6.5 tackles and Oliver Schmitt came in with 4.5, as Russell Nieman and Braylen Byrne each recorded a sack. Hayek finished with four tackles on defense, but also played on offense where, of course, his blocking stats won't show. "I like going to the second level and blocking a linebacker," he said of his work on offense. "But laying a good hit on an offensive runner is pretty fun, too."

"Next week we travel to Clarksville," Scott said, "who has been playing very well and lost a close game to Tripoli Friday night."

The Indians will come into the game with a 3-2 record; they are as much a running team as the Trojans are. "I haven't thrown that much this year," Hanson said, "I haven't needed to, we've been able to ground and pound teams. The run is a tradition at Turkey Valley but if the passing game works as well as it should, we could be a dual threat."

## Chemistry key to 5-0 start for Chickasaws

24-14 win against the Cadets. New Hampton's perfect season is still intact after holding Crestwood to just 18 unofficial yards in the second half and riding the legs of all-state running back Braden McShane. The junior workhorse tailback pulverized the Cadet defense on the ground with another 200-yard-plus performance. Frerichs gave McShane the ball early and often, and he pounded the rock for an unofficial tally of 245 yards on the ground via a whopping 38 carries. McShane scored three touchdowns – all in the second half – after New Hampton trailed 14-0 at intermission.

"There's nothing better than playing in a rain game, to be honest. It's fun," said McShane. McShane managed his fifth 200-yard rushing game in just 16 varsity starts. He was also part of a Chickasaw defense that made it a point to show all in attendance that the sixth-ranked team in Class 2A isn't going to go home without a fight.

"It was just physicality on the line. We played lower," said McShane. "That helped the linebackers. We were able to flow to the ball. When we can flow to the ball – me, Ben and Isaac – they're aren't going to get anything."

In what was Crestwood's homecoming, the Cadets (3-2, 1-1) were on-point and focused from the get-go. They pounded the ball into the end zone on their very first possession on a 10-play drive that started out at midfield after a 39-yard punt return.

"Cresco came out – you can see their size, they're big," said Frerichs. "They executed their opening drive very well. They're very capable of doing that. They have kids who run hard, their linemen block well."

On New Hampton's ensuing first possession, Crestwood forced a turnover on downs at the Crestwood-28-yard line with 3:50 left in the first quarter.

In the first half New Hampton (5-0, 2-0) was besieged by penalties, dropped passes and a demotivated Crestwood team that desperately wanted to pull off the upset.

"We pretty much asked ourselves, how bad do we want it?" said Chickasaw senior quarterback Brady Speltz. "I think we wanted it more and we should come ready the first quarter. We came out flat and had dumb mistakes."

NH senior wideout Carter Steinlage hauled in a 33-yard pass on NH's first offensive series. He was forced to punt after a penalty and a sack slowed NH's second possession.

With a short field, Crestwood moved the ball from the NH 33-yard line into the end zone after Crestwood senior quarterback Cole Butikofer rolled right and found Topher Bigalk near the right sideline and past the pylon for a five-yard scoring strike. That gave Crestwood a

two-touchdown advantage, up 14-0 with a little over eight minutes left before half.

New Hampton was whistled for four penalties in the first half. Crestwood committed zero penalties over the course of those first two periods of play. New Hampton also misfired on a throwback pass by McShane, who had Steinlage wide open right sideline, but just overthrew him.

"We knew we were right in the game, we were just shooting ourselves in the foot on offense, getting penalties when we didn't need to," said McShane. "Getting the roughing the kicker on Carter sparked our offense back up again."

And that it did and New Hampton never looked back.

Steinlage's punt on 4th-and-3 from the Chickasaw 37-yard line with 9:59 left in the third period on New Hampton's opening drive of the third quarter saw Crestwood run into him.

That warranted a five-yard penalty and a Chickasaw first down.

Still, New Hampton had over 60 yards to navigate to break the Cadets' shutout they were pitching.

That meant plenty of McShane left and McShane right and one of the best throws from Speltz you may see all season. Hunter Serie may have made an even better catch.

On a 2nd-and-20 from the Crestwood 47-yard line, Speltz dropped back and put plenty of air on a ball with a deft touch that Serie promptly ran under for a 34-yard gain over the middle of the field.

"That just comes down to our team chemistry and how we just trust each other," said Speltz. "That's why we're 5-0 right now."

McShane would blast his way into the end zone several plays later from two yards out to put New Hampton on the board, down 14-6 with 5:17 remaining in the third quarter. That pivotal drive by the Chickasaws consisted of 13 plays and chewed up 6:43 of game clock.

Like a quick lightning strike, New Hampton's defense put forth an electric play literally a minute or two later. Speltz read

a swing pass perfectly and aided by Steinlage's hit on Bigalk from his safety position, hauled in the interception and raced 32 yards down the left sideline for the pick-six. Speltz secured the tipped ball and came up with yet another big play in a season that has been full of them.

"It was a big momentum swing right there," said Speltz.

With all the momentum in the world at that point, New Hampton – still trailing 14-12 – took the lead, then shut the door and closed it for good.

"It was contagious," said Frerichs.

McShane barreled into the end zone almost untouched from 38 yards with 37 ticks left on the third-quarter clock.

"I'm glad he's on our team," said Speltz about McShane.

The Chickasaws were firing on all cylinders and tacked on an insurance score on an eight-yard TD plunge by McShane with 4:40 left in the game.

New Hampton may well have scored again on its last possession of the game, but Frerichs signaled for victory formation and the kneel down at the Crestwood 7-yard line.

"I feel like our team needed this really bad," said Speltz. "Just to prove to ourselves that we are this good and we can score that much, that fast."

New Hampton limited Crestwood to a little over a yard a play in the second half. Crestwood gained 18 yards on 15 plays in the second half. The Cadets finished with 126 total yards of offense – 87 of that came on rushing yards.

The Chickasaw offense did not commit a turnover and is currently the second-best rushing squad in all of Class 2A with 1,355 yards from scrimmage. Red Oak, 4-1, leads 2A in team rushing yards with 1,361.

McShane is the second leading rusher (900 yards) in 2A behind Red Oak's Riley Fouts (1,089 yards). McShane leads 2A in rushing touchdowns with 14 and leading tackler on New Hampton at linebacker with 23.5 stops. Isaac, Howe, a senior is second on the Chickasaws with 22.5 total stops at his linebacker position.

"It was one game, but to

come back the way we did and to respond the way we did is pretty awesome," said Frerichs.

Frerichs' current coaching record is 199-97. His Chickasaws will try to help him claim win No. 200 in a big showdown with Osage this Friday in Mitchell County. The Green Devils blew the doors off the Chickasaws last year in a 42-12 rout.

Speltz and his teammates remember the feeling. They don't want a repeat of last year's game between the two defending co-district champs. New Hampton, Osage and Clear Lake all shared the district title in 2021.

"That's been circled on my calendar for a long time," said Speltz about the Osage game.

in her class through hard work and determination, won the first varsity race of her career at Waukon. New Hampton went 1-2-3 in the girls race as sophomore Natalie Nobsisch finished runner-up and freshman Tegan Dungey was right behind her in third place.

"That was a pretty amazing sight," said Ohrt, who helped guide both her boys and girls squads to team titles just a week prior at Osage.

Kolbet ran a 21:11, Nobsisch a 21:44 and Dungey a 21:48 at Waukon. New Hampton placed second overall as a team with 64 points, 10 back of powerhouse Decorah, which won the meet with 54 points.

The powerful Chickasaw trio was at it again on Thursday, Sept. 22 at the Sam Iverson Invite in Grundy Center. This time, almost every runner on Ohrt's squad achieved either a career or personal best this season.

Kolbet, ranked 16th in Class 2A, ran the fastest time of her life as she clipped out in a solid 19:43 to place fourth overall amongst a slew of other rated runners.

While Kolbet is an amazing story this season and is gunning for her first chance to run at the state meet in late October, the rise of Dungey has taken Ohrt's team to another level.

"I think Tegan surprised herself! In the beginning of the season, she would look at Bob (Vorwald) and I like we were crazy when we told her she could keep up with Natalie and Campbell. Now she knows she can accomplish that task. Those three are going to be fierce competitors!" said Ohrt.

Dungey also ran an all-time best (20:45.55) at Grundy Center and finished less than a second back of Nobsisch – who cracked the state field last fall as a freshman. Nobsisch continued her strong sophomore campaign with a season PR of 20:44.85 and placed 10th overall. Dungey was 11th.

"The girls are gaining more confidence and are willing to take more chances. By chances, I mean they're willing to go out faster and stay with opponents or teammates as long as possible," said Ohrt.

New Hampton placed fifth in the girls standings at Grundy Center with 148 points.

Adriana Tiedt, who was a force near the net and in the serving department for the Trojans, had this to say about picking up the win.



# Fall Home Improvement Guide

## Get the garden ready for what's coming from Old Man Winter

Individuals who don't live near the equator or in another warm climate know that winter will rear its chilly head this year.

Cold temperatures and snowy conditions may be excellent for skiing and sledding, but gardeners recognize these conditions are not ideal for their plants.

The inevitable slowing of activity in the garden during fall marks a time to shift attention from constant plant care to preparing the landscape for next season. It may be tempting to simply let Mother Nature take over, but a little pre-winter TLC can ensure gardens make it through winter unscathed.

### Remove spent plants

Decomposing organic material is the basis for compost and other fertilizers. However, vegetable plants that are left to sit can lead to decay in the garden.

Decaying plants can serve as hosts for pest populations and diseases. Rotting vegetables also can drop unwanted seeds into the soil, which eventually can strip nutrients that normally would go to next year's crops.

Ornamental plants and perennials can be cut back in fall. Cut down stalks and remove leaves.

### Plant a cover crop

The gardening resource This Is My Garden recommends planting a cover crop to set the stage for a successful spring. A cover crop protects the soil and can return



nutrients to it.

When the soil is bare during winter, weed seeds can easily blow in and lie in wait, ultimately becoming a problem during the ensuing year. Cover crops can include clover or field peas, which will increase the levels of available nitrogen.

### Amend the soil

Fall is a perfect time to add soil amendments, such as manure and compost. These fertilizers will add nutrients and break down gradually, enriching the soil over the winter.

### Replenish mulch

Gardeners may have added mulch around shrubs and other areas of the landscape early in the season because it is attractive. But mulch also does much to reduce water loss and protect the soil from erosion. It may inhibit weed growth as

well. Replacing mulch when the mercury drops can insulate the soil, which helps to regulate soil temperature. A thick layer of mulch around root vegetables left in the garden can offer protection against hard frosts.

### Divide bulbs

Divide plant bulbs and plant them where you want flowers like daffodils and tulips to grow in the spring.

### Prune dormant plants

Wait until plants are dormant to prune them and adjust their shape. Most shrubs and trees should be pruned in late winter, right before new growth.

### Move potted plants

Bring delicate plants into a sheltered area, such as a greenhouse or indoor garage, so they can continue to thrive during the winter.

## Meet the builders

Lester Glaser of Country Carpentry has a different relationship with his crew than most construction bosses.

Unless those bosses also employ their daughters.

"I have six daughters, they've all done construction work," said Lester, "they've helped do it all."

But daughter Amanda is currently his crew. "I started helping when I was.... 12 maybe?" she said looking at her dad. "Growing up with it I knew how to do it."

After high school Amanda furthered her education with degrees in politics and Spanish, working for NICC teaching English as a second language. But she came back to the carpentry business and has been a full-time employee for 14 years.

Country Carpentry does a variety of work, from designing the house and drafting blueprints to building cabinets and furniture and everything in between. Lester has built up to five houses in a year's time and has started a house every month of the year. At one time he employed four full-time carpenters, but now just has one or two help out once in awhile.

"I've seen them dig base-

ments where there are three-foot chunks of frost dug out," he said. "Some years we put more shingles on in January and February than we do all summer long."

But, uh, the cold? "It doesn't bother us a lot," Lester said. Amanda agreed, "It's not cold that many days."

If you say so. But if it really gets cold — though we're not sure what constitutes really cold — there is always work in the shop, crafting furniture and cabinets.

When you build quality, like the Glasers do, you're in high demand. Country Carpentry has built in Okoboji, Grand Rapids, Michigan, Dubuque, Rochester, Waverly, Osage, Lawler, North Washington, Plainfield, and has repeat customers. "One guy, he'd build a house, live in it 6-7 years, sell it and build another. We built for an investor... holy crap, I don't know how many I built for him." When they built in Okoboji, they even stayed with the customer's family.

They also did in Grand Rapids and Dubuque, but they were building FOR family.

Asked why she came back to the construction business, Amanda explained, "It's always something different," and her dad added, "you're outside a lot, not stuck in a building."



favorite part was. "I've never had a pantry before, I love the way that turned out." She also pointed out the built-in trash receptacles and counter backsplash.

All cupboards were built by Glaser and his "crew." That would be his daughter Amanda, staffing Country Carpentry.

"Lester and his daughter, just super, super carpenters, she can just back him up and do anything he can do," Steve said. "When they come to do something they don't piddle around, they get it done." Teresa added, "Amanda does all the stain work. And some things Lester just knew we'd like. They did a lot of stuff they wouldn't have had to do, they go out of their way to make us happy."

But the Pattschulls still had plenty of decisions to make. The first backsplash they picked out didn't look the same when it arrived. "It was stark white with a diamond shape," recalled Teresa. "We put it up there and didn't like it. We had to pay a restocking fee, but it just wasn't as nice as the one we have now." The color and style goes much better with their new granite countertops.

The new bedroom is just off the kitchen, that is a 16' by 18' room. "This rug came from Dungey's in New Hampton, I saw it and I just had to have it," said the lady of the house. "They had it displayed with furniture on it and I asked if that



## Masonry business goes to next generation of Tanks

When Tony Tank was in high school, he used to help his dad out from time to time in his business, Jerry Tank Masonry.

Now, over 15 years later, the tables have turned as the younger son became the owner this spring, and he's helped out from time to time by his dad.

Actually, the name Tank is synonymous with masonry in New Hampton as Tony is the fourth generation to work at the labor-intensive task. Tony's great-grandpa Harold was in masonry, so was his grandfather LaVerne and, of course, his dad Jerry.

"When I was maybe 8-9 years old — my grandpa had a truck to haul brick — I'd climb in with him and my grandpa would pack a couple sandwiches for both of us and a bunch of snacks for me and we'd go deliver brick. My grandpa did a lot of schools, some churches and hotels — back in the day they'd be all brick."

Even though Tank is only 35, he has the experience, starting with his dad full-time 15 years ago.

"I'm honest with my prospective clients, I might only be 35, but I can do it. They might think I'm young and dumb, but that drives me even harder. Let them see my final work and let them judge."

And he has an extensive list of work done on homes and businesses over

Chickasaw County, Northeast Iowa and into Minnesota, including a pair of Dollar General stores in Minnesota.

"The way that worked out is that I did a Dollar General in Nashua, the contractor was super happy with the way that turned out and he had two more to do, dad gave him some numbers and we did the jobs."

Tank has also done work from Riceville to Decorah, Waterloo, Cedar Falls and Greene, but he says the bulk of his work comes from New Hampton and Charles City.

His unquestionable favorite job is installing a fireplace. It borders on art. "I absolutely love doing stone fireplaces. It's like a giant puzzle, there's no diagram. You want it to flow together, but there's multiple colors and you don't want the same colors all in one spot."

He recalled a fireplace in Charles City he worked on. "It took 4-5 weeks, I'd say I worked 9-hour days, five days a week. We'd have boxes and boxes and boxes of stone, we'd empty the boxes and set them all out to see what we had. It's very detail oriented."

Tony had discussed buying the business from his dad a few years ago. "I told him I wanted to buy him out but I didn't want to put myself in a huge amount of debt. But the time was just right. He's a very hard-working man. Very hard. And he's done well for himself."

The physicality of the job doesn't

lend itself to working to a ripe old age. But, according to Jerry, it's easier than it used to be. "We used to skreed concrete with a 2x4, now there's machines to do that." The older Tank also acknowledged the job can be dangerous, as he's had block fall on his head and he's taken some tumbles.

There is still plenty of work that needs hand labor. "There's some days when you wish you could get out of the sun," said Tony. "Your normal cement block is 34 pounds, you lay one after another."

Tank has two full-time employees, one is his "adopted" son, Landon Moorman, the other is Jacob Durnan. Tank seems to have a certain type he likes to hire, as both are former Chickasaw football linemen. But then there's Alex Kriener, he wasn't a lineman, but was a football player and wrestler. "Alex approached me this summer for a job and he did really well, too. I'm no small lad, either. Having some big boys, we definitely have the muscle to put into it."

Tony just finished working on an ICF block, slab on grade home; that means there's no basement, but people usually have a safe room in which to shelter from storms. "More people are going with that, they like the in-floor heat through the

whole house. When I build my house, that's what I'm doing." The insulating concrete forms, or ICF, hold fresh concrete in the center and the forms remain in place, providing insulation. The walls of the house he worked on were 22 feet high. "I'm surprised he did that," said Jerry. "That's a really tall building and he's afraid of heights."

Though he keeps busy at work, Tony makes time to spend with his wife Ashley, son Lohen and daughter Journie. They especially like to camp, a passion his grandpa sparked.

Tony has been doing the physical work many years, but the paperwork is something he's adjusting to as the owner. "These past couple years I'd been doing most of the estimates, but my parents did the billing and paperwork, that's the hardest part, getting estimates out, returning phone calls and text messages. I have to make time to go see them and pencil it out and order supplies, just the office end of the business and trying to do it out in the field is hard."

For now, the name remains Jerry Tank Masonry and concrete, LLC, as Tony learns the highs and lows of ownership. "Trying to make sure everybody's happy is my key thing but sometimes... it's tough."
