School boards get to work on finding new superintendent

Turkey Valley, New Hampton board members meet with search firm to set up 'parameters'

School board members from New Hampton and Turkey Valley began the process of hiring a new superintendent during a joint meeting held Monday night when they met with officials from Grundmeyer Leader Services.

For almost two hours, board members met with Grundmeyer's Gary McAndrew and Roger Wilcox and set up a timetable for hiring a replacement for Jay Jurrens, who announced in September that he will retire at the end of the 2024-25 school year.

Both consultants from the search firm that the boards hired during a meeting on Oct. 28 emphasized that they were there to help but the ultimate decision remained with the school boards.

"We're excited to help you find your next superintendent," McAndrew said, "but the decision will be made by you. We're here to help give you options, but we don't hire, you do, and I think that's important for people in your communities to know that."

Mostly, Monday's meeting began the process of setting up the parameters of both the search and the potential offer the boards will eventually make to the "winning" candidate.

The Grundmeyer officials worked with the boards to set up a timeline that will start with the job opening being posted by today (Thursday) and run through Jan. 5, which will be the deadline for applications.

The search firm will then meet with the two boards on Jan. 13 at Turkey Valley, and board members will learn who applied for the shared superintendent position, and McAndrew said that the names will be delivered through a three-tier system — ranging from most qualified to least qualified.

Hackman wins third term

Incumbent supervisor wins rematch with Knoll for District 3 supervisor seat

The rematch turned out not to be a heavy-weight prize fight after all as Chickasaw County voters in District 3 gave Jake Hackman a relatively easy victory Tuesday and a third term on the Board of Supervisors.

"I'm honored that the people of District 3 believed in me and gave me another term," Hackman said after the Republican incumbent turned back a challenge from former Chickasaw County auditor and Democratic challenger Joan Knoll. "We were picking up [campaign] signs today, and people told me that they like

that I get involved, that I do my research, I ask questions and I'm a fighter. And I'm going to continue to do that for the next four years."

Hackman garnered 651 votes, or 54.8 per-

cent, while Knoll received 535 votes, or 45.1 percent, from residents of the western half of New Hampton and most of the rural Dayton-Richland precinct.

In 2020, Hackman received 54.2 percent of the vote while Knoll finished with 45.8 percent of the vote.

Hackman was first elected in 2016 and served as the board chairman for three years during his first term in office. He

City Council moves forward on new wastewater treatment plant

New Hampton city leaders inched forward Monday night on building a new wastewater treatment plant that the city must have in place by 2036, according to a mandate by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.

During its regular meeting, council members unanimously approved three resolutions that kept the project moving forward.

Most notably, the council agreed to pay Strand Associates more than \$550,000 to complete a preliminary design of the plant that will replace New Hampton's current facility, which

was built in the early 1960s.

New Hampton Public Works Director Casey Mai welcomed the votes, saying "we can't kick the can down the road any more."

The city originally hired Stand Associates to complete a facility plan for the new treatment plant, and that plan was accepted by the DNR, but even with Monday's City Council action, it will be a while before the city can "turn dirt" on the new plant.

Strand Associates engineer Steve Troyer told the council that the preliminary design represents about 30 percent of the overall design work

Event gives students chance to get involved in community

They were selling their creations — be it woodworking projects that have come to life or cool designs like a colorful saw blade that's an interesting piece and could grab any passer-by's attention.

"We've done pretty decent so far. We've sold quite a bit of goods already," said Spratt, in his second year full-time as the New Hampton High School Ag Education teacher and industrial arts instructor. "We'll be here until 4 o'clock."

Young adults weren't alone in their quest to either sell items or purchase them as shoppers of all ages could start to peruse and buy a vast array of merchandise at various participating businesses all over the downtown area at 9 a.m. sharp. So that meant holiday shoppers or just folks looking for a great deal could start their day off early and spend some hard-earned money during one of New Horizons' biggest shopping extravaganzas of the year.

Yes, Christmas is not that far away.

Speaking of December, that was the last time when Spratt and his proteges were out and

about in the public about a year ago when they attended and were a part of a New Horizons' event.

"It was a lot colder out. We were in the middle of December for the last minute sales thing they had going on," said Spratt. "That was the first time we ever set up down here."

For Spratt's students it means more than just showcasing and selling their creative expressions of themselves through their handiwork.

"The primary thing that I want to do is get them out here and have the community meet some of the students, but then also have the students get involved into the community," said Spratt. "We can showcase what we're doing in the school also."

This is just one facet of New Hampton's SkillsUSA Program that Spratt's students have been a part of now for two years.

"We wanted to develop a culture that taught the students more of an entrepreneurial aspect on top of learning all the trades so that they weren't confined to just having to work for somebody," said Spratt. "They could actually be able to start their own business and understand the concepts behind it."

New Hampton students will be back at it with another booth setup next month on Thursday, Dec. 12 for the New Horizons' "Holiday Hustle for Him."

"We plan on having some items here for last-minute gifts for men to buy for their wives or significant others," said Spratt.

Luke Gorman, a New Hampton High School freshman, said all proceeds from sales at Saturday's booth return to the school so they can spend that money on useful things in Spratt's classroom.

Just down from the NHHS students' booth was the Maker's Market — or "Merry Market" if you will — at the New Hampton Municipal Utilities building, which is often center stage and home base for many of the town's community-based events.

There Melissa Nelson was at the main booth as you walk into the entrance of the well-lit and packed city-owned structure.

Nelson, who has been New Hampton High School's art teacher for the past decade, talked about why she was there. She's been a staple of New Hampton's Holiday Open House.

"I do this for fun. I enjoy it," said Nelson.

Nelson — who also owns her own business, titled Art Blaze — brought along one of her students in NHHS senior Karla Pickar.

"I've been doing art fairs for a long time and Karla has come to see me at art fairs before," said Nelson. "We were talking one day and I was like, I would love to teach people how to do these because you have to be social, you have to talk to people."

That's important as most people know all too well these days how staring at your cell phone or computer screen all day can be a habit that's hard to break. Nelson wants to change that on-going trend and that gets started by engaging with others through one's art.

"I just get tired of seeing people sitting there on their phones and not talking to the people around them and then won-

dering why they can't sell anything," said Nelson.

Pickar has teamed up with the school's library to essentially kill two birds with one stone. Old library books that haven't been checked out since the Reagan administration are now being recycled through Pickar's innovative and unique way to prop them up on a mantelpiece or coffee table.

"All these are folded to make different lengths and different shapes and patterns," said Pickar. "It's not cut, it's just folded."

She explained how she got started with the art of folding the pages of books in an interesting origami-like fashion.

"One of my friends, her mom works at the library. This is one of the projects you can do," said Pickar. "I enjoy doing it. It's very rewarding."

Pickar said she made a couple sales already during the morning and it wasn't even close to noon yet.

One of Pickar's books had a price tag of \$100 on it and she said it took her about five or six hours to create. The smaller books are cheaper and she mentioned some of them take less than an hour to transform into a nice decorative addition to a living room, which is sure to be a topic of conversation.

"Trying to get the young artists out and doing this is so important," said Nelson. "It's so important to see that they can do this."

Pickar said she'll attend the University of Northern Iowa after graduation and will study education or business — or perhaps both.

"They kind of fit well into each other. What I get inspired by or what I teach — it ends up on my table," said Nelson.

New Hampton's Holiday Open House also had a Fall and Winter Craft and Vendor Show at the Chickasaw Events Center as well as face painting at New Hampton Public Library. Those were just a few of the happenings going on in what essentially kick-starts the holiday shopping season for many in the area.




St. Joe's students take to the stage

Thanksgiving may not be a Christian holiday, but it certainly has plenty of Christian values

Pilgrims with black hats and puffed sleeves having a turkey feast with Native Americans are the common images associated with Thanksgiving. Most Americans were taught about this event in school as children and can remember being involved in plays and pageants depicting the events of the "first Thanksgiving."

While the holiday has long been perceived in this way, there are many reasons to question this picture of the event that the modern secular/civic religious Thanksgiving is based on.

Based on modern scholarship, many historians and scholars are convinced that the history of Thanksgiving is much more complex than commonly depicted. Not only has the idea of the holiday as an originally Christian one been questioned, but the colonialism associated with the "first Thanksgiving" has recently become much more apparent and unmasked.

To understand whether Thanksgiving is truly a Christian holiday, one must examine the event behind the modern celebration of Thanksgiving, the Pilgrim practice of holding thanksgivings, and how the celebration became a national holiday of America.

The 'First' Thanksgiving

Pilgrims, not the Puritans, were the ones who settled in North America after arriving on the Mayflower in 1620. As Christian separatists, they left England to worship freely because of the persecution from the Church of England. Their trip across the ocean was perilous and many of the Pilgrims lost their lives on the voyage.

When they finally made it to the New World, many more of the passengers became ill and died. While the Native Americans did help the Pilgrims learn to survive, their relations with the newcomers were more complicated than is commonly depicted.


The Wampanoag tribe did enter a peace treaty with the Pilgrims but did so mainly to protect their own tribe. Also, in contrast to popular stories, the Native Americans did not pass on their land to the Pilgrims.

In September or October of 1621, the governor of the new settlement, William Bradford, declared a feast in celebration of their successful harvest. Although half of the original Pilgrims had perished, the remaining settlers celebrated a feast.

Pilgrims and members of the Wampanoag joined in the celebration, although most historians agree that the food and events of the feast are mainly unknown. The feast was a celebration of the harvest, but the Pilgrims did not recognize it as a new holiday to celebrate annually.

Also, there is very little documentation of the event, which proves it was not a major event that the Pilgrims chose to "mark on their calendars" for the coming years.

While the Pilgrims did worship the

Lord and would have given thanks to Him for their harvest, the event known as the "first" Thanksgiving was a "harvest feast and not, as far as we know, an official religious day of thanksgiving."

Surely, the Pilgrims would have recognized God's provision for the harvest and would not have specifically separated the sacred from the secular as people do today. However, there is no indication that the 1621 Thanksgiving celebration between the Native Americans and Pilgrims was a strictly Christian observance.

Thanksgivings to the Lord

The Pilgrims had a long tradition, spanning back to their time in England, where they would observe times of suffering and times of plenty. During times of suffering, Pilgrim leaders would call for a fast and repentance of sins.

Likewise, in times of abundance and blessing, the people would collectively observe a time of thanksgiving, when they would offer praise to the Lord. An official day of thanksgiving was celebrated by the Pilgrims in 1623 because of rain after a long season of drought.

This celebration was seen as an official day of thanksgiving when the grateful Pilgrims praised the Lord for the rain after suffering the effects of drought.

An Official National Holiday

Recognizing a day of thanksgiving was not restricted to the Christian communities. On October 3, 1789, George Washington proclaimed the last Thursday of November to be a day of Thanksgiving to give thanks to the "Almighty."

Although Washington was not a Christian, but a Deist, many people in the newly formed United States of America would have seen Washington's proclamation as referring to the Lord. Thanksgiving, as proclaimed by George Washington, would be a day of prayer to give thanks and ask God to help the

nation.

Later, President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation on October 3, 1863, declaring Thanksgiving Day, the last Thursday of November, as a national holiday. He was urged on by Sarah Hale, who persistently campaigned for the holiday.

Lincoln hoped the observance of Thanksgiving would encourage a reunion of the nation during the Civil War.

As the President that officially inaugurated the holiday, Lincoln is credited with making Thanksgiving a national holiday.

Thanksgiving Day became enmeshed with the history of the "first" Thanksgiving in 1621, to provide a nationalistic narrative to the holiday.

Christians and Thanksgiving

Thus, Thanksgiving Day in America is not truly a Christian holiday. There are Christian traditions associated with the day, but the official national holiday declared by Abraham Lincoln is not rooted in Christianity. Instead, Thanksgiving is a secular or civic religious day that is grounded in America's history and used to support nationalistic ideals.

Christians can celebrate the day, since spending time with family and loved ones while giving thanks is important. However, believers should "give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18, NIV). Every day can be a day of "thanksgiving" to the Lord.

Even though Thanksgiving is not a Christian holiday, followers of Christ can choose to observe the day to the glory of God, thus making the day special even if other Christians choose to abstain from celebrating the holiday (Romans 14:6). Either way, the glory of the Lord is the focus for Christians on Thanksgiving (1 Corinthians 10:31).

and that it will take the firm about six months to complete.

Once that is completed, the city will need to get approval from the DNR, which Mai said should take between four and six months. The city then would have to OK a final design, which would also need to be approved by the DNR.

"The earliest we could go to bid is probably the spring or summer of '26, and hopefully we can start construction that fall or the spring of '27 at the latest," Mai said Tuesday morning. "And we still are going to need council approval for all these steps so, in one way, we're still not committed to it."

But Mai said he believes the city needs a sense of urgency when it comes to building a new wastewater treatment plant.

He said the current estimate for the plant's cost is \$28.3 million, but it comes with a caveat.

"We've talked to the engineer and they just had two bids come back that were 15 percent higher than the estimate," the public works director said. "All we're going to do if we don't keep going is make the cost higher — a lot higher."

Also on Monday, the council voted 4-1 to install stop signs on East Prospect Street at North Water Avenue for east-west traffic, making the intersection a four-way stop.

During an Oct. 21 meeting, Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson asked the city to make the intersection that is near the ambulance station a four-way stop, and a motion was made that night to do just that.

But after being reminded that the agenda item was just for "discussion" and did not include "possible action," council members delayed the vote until Monday. Only Councilman Joe Denner cast a dissenting vote, and the intersection will become a four-way stop as soon as the stop signs are installed, which could be as soon as next week.

A week later, on Jan. 20, the boards will meet in New Hampton and conduct zoom interviews with the "semifinalists" chosen by the boards.

Both the Jan. 13 and Jan. 20 meetings will be closed, and the names of the applicants will not be made public.

"Only the finalists will have their names out there," McAndrew said.

Those finalists will be interviewed on Feb. 6, and they will not only meet with the boards but also with what both Wilcox and McAndrew called a "mixed-interview" team that will include teachers, staff members, students and community members from both districts.

And they said if there's a healthy interest from people to take part in the interview process, two "mixed-interview" teams could be used.

Asked why not have separate groups, Wilcox said the issue with doing that is that candidates tend to tailor their answers to each particular group.

"When you're a superintendent, you have to be accountable to everybody," he said. "It's why we like the mixed-interview dynamic."

The search firm will also have a community survey available soon online to not only learn what stakeholders want in the new superintendent but also to allow residents to express interest in taking part of the interview process.

That survey is expected to go "live" sometime later this week or early next week.

Board members also spent a considerable amount of time discussing the parameters of the job posting and settled on a salary range between \$170,000

and \$190,000, offering family insurance and other benefits, including up to \$5,000 in so-called "relocation expenses" if the successful candidate resides in one of the two districts.

"It's a great incentive to get them into the community," McAndrew said, "and most school districts are going that route, offering that carrot."

The two Grundmeyer officials said that the salary range would attract candidates, but they also told board members that the unknown remains — will the districts be able to attract candidates who have superintendent experience?

They also said that candidates will receive questions — ranging from salary expectations to how excited a candidate's family is about making the move to New Hampton

and Turkey Valley — from the search firm.

In the end, board members from both sides of the room agreed on most points. What took the longest was finding dates that worked for all 10 board members.

"That's always the challenge," Wilcox said, "but we'll get there."

But they agreed with the Grundmeyer officials that getting the job posted before the upcoming Iowa School Boards Association Convention was a must.

And while the process seems lengthy, McAndrew reminded board members that "you are still way ahead of the process. You are in a good position, and yes, it's going to be time-consuming and a lot of work, but we're going to be there with you every step of the way."

What do you know? We finally got rain!

'Soakers' are a good start, but ISU Extension agronomist says more precipitation needed

The weather turned on a proverbial dime in the last week as we seemingly went from the "Dust Bowl" to searching for Noah's ark.

But area farmers didn't care because after three months of seeing little rain, we finally got a much-needed dose of precipitation.

"It's a good start," ISU Extension agronomist Terry Basol said, "but honestly, it can rain a while. At least we're starting to replenish our soil moisture profiles, and boy, did they ever need it."

And while some of us might want the spigot to be turned off for a while, the fact is that the recent rainfall — New Hampton officially received almost 3.5 inches of rain between last Wednesday and Tuesday — we're still looking at a major rain deficit over the past three months.

The city has received 7.08 inches of rain since Aug. 1 — meaning that almost half of that rain fell in the last week or so — and that represents just 61.9 percent of the normal rainfall for the period.

And in that span, Northeast Iowa went from being completely off the drought radar to what the U.S. Drought Monitor

calls a severe drought.

"I know I've said it a lot, but I really don't think it affected this year's crop all that much," Basol said, "but I think all the guys were starting to get really worried about what it was going to look like going into next year. To say we needed this is an understatement. And if we can get a few more good rains in before the ground freezes, that would be great."

The good news is that more rain is in the forecast. After drying out for a few days, showers are in the forecast, beginning on Saturday and running through Sunday evening.

The latest USDA Iowa Crop and Condition Report that came out on Monday showed improving soil moisture profiles as 54 percent of topsoil in the Northeast Iowa District, which includes Chickasaw County, was either "short" or "very short" of moisture, down from 90 percent the week before.

Ditto for subsoils as the percentage of "short" or "very short" dropped from 89 to 66 percent.

"Keep it coming, that's all I can say," Basol said, "and trust me, I've got a lot of farmers who would agree with me. This has been perfect. It's not the 3 inches from a thunderstorm; this has been the soakers that farmers love."

It's coming so today Iowa marks Winter Weather Awareness Day

Wintertime poses a wide range of threats to residents of the Midwest. Whether it be exposure to the cold, vehicle accidents caused by slick roads, or fires resulting from the improper use of heaters, hundreds of people are injured or killed each year as a direct result of winter weather.

That's why today (Thursday) has been designated as Winter Weather Awareness Day in Iowa, and the National Weather Service Office in La Crosse, Wisconsin, which provides forecasts and weather information to Northeast Iowa, is reminding area residents to be prepared for winter weather when it strikes.

Winter storms range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a massive blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states while others affect only a single community.

High winds, freezing rain or sleet, heavy snowfall, and dangerously cold temperatures are the main hazards associated with winter storms. Impassable snow drifts can maroon people at home without utilities or other services for days after an event.

Heavy snowfall and blizzards easily trap motorists in their vehicles and make walking to find help a deadly effort. Bitter cold temperatures and wind chills during and after a winter storm can lead to hypothermia and kill anyone caught outside for too long.

The aftermath of a winter storm can impact a community or region for days, weeks or even months, incurring steep economic costs.

So as we get ready for winter, here are some terms to remember:

- **Blizzard:** Blowing and/or falling snow with winds of at least 35 mph, reducing visibilities to a quarter of a mile or less for at least three hours. Winds lofting the current snow pack and reducing visibilities without any falling snow is called a ground blizzard.
- **Freezing Rain:** Caused by rain falling on surfaces with a temperature below freezing. The rain freezes upon contact with the ground. Large build-ups of ice can down trees and power lines and coat roads.
- **Sleet:** Rain/melted snow that has begun refreezing when it reaches the ground. Sleet tends to be softer than hail and is easily compacted. Sleet can make roads slippery very quickly.
- **Wind Chill:** The apparent temperature the body feels when wind is factored into the equation.

said two priorities he will have for his third term will be to "consolidate our county buildings" and work on a way to help "out our sheriff so we can get a suitable holding facility."

The race was one of just two contested in the county during an election in which the number of absentee ballots cast surpassed the number of votes cast on election day. Auditor Sheila Shekleton said of the 6,274 ballots, almost 3,300 were from absentee or early voting.

"It went well and we're really appreciative of everyone who made it go smoothly," she said. "Our staff, our poll workers, everyone did just a great job."

Shekleton, a Republican, was one of four candidates who ran unopposed Tuesday. The others included incumbent Republican Sheriff Ryan Shawver, incumbent Democrat District 1 Supervisor Steve Breitbach and Republican Issac Carter,



who will take over the District 4 Supervisor Matt Kuhn's seat, beginning on Jan. 1. Kuhn did not seek a second term in the district that includes the eastern half of New Hampton and surrounding rural areas.

The other contested race in the county came for the four seats on the County Agricultural Extension Council. Tony Schwickerath led the way with 3,813 votes, Kim Kuehner had

3,102, Ben Freidhof received 2,545 and Matt Carlton had 2,404 to win terms on the council while William Maurer finished with 2,252 votes.

Meanwhile, it was a good night for the county's Republicans as both State Rep. Charley Thomson and U.S. Rep. Ashley Hinson easily were re-elected to their seats. The local GOP also celebrated former President Trump's relative-

'Runaway boat' needs to be rescued in Charles City

A wide range of emergency responders responded to a boat being stranded on the edge of the Cedar River dam above the Main Street Bridge in Charles City Monday afternoon.

The owner said he had tied up the boat at the small landing by the county courthouse parking lot, and when he turned back he saw the boat had pulled away from the landing.

No persons were on the boat when it pulled away from its mooring and got caught on the dam.

The owner said he thought about going into the water after the board, then decided against the risk.

"I got insurance ..." he said. Two Charles City firefighters, Lt. Justin Schuttler and Landon Luft, put on their cold water gear and walked out on the lower ledge of the dam to grab the line attached to the front of the boat, tie it to another rope then take that rope over to the Mill Race Park observation area

on the north riverbank, where other emergency responders were able to grab the rope.

They took the rope down the riverbank to near the Pub on the Cedar, where the Floyd County Search and Rescue truck pulled up and parked.

The rope was attached to the truck's winch line and the boat was pulled back from the dam to the north riverbank, where Luft hopped in and drove it back to the courthouse landing.

The number of responders was due as much to the location and their availability, as it was to a need for more than several helping hands, but it included the Charles City Fire Department, Floyd County Search and Rescue, Charles City Police Department, Floyd County Sheriff's Office, AMR ambulance service, Iowa State Patrol, Iowa Department of Natural Resources, Floyd County Emergency Management Agency and Iowa Underwater Search and Rescue, according to Fire Chief Sam Deverell.

New Hampton coach Jamie Ohrt said she was proud of Glaser's effort. "Sophie's such a fighter, such a competitor," she said, "and I know she was a little disappointed but she's been such a blessing for our team. ... I think it's always tough when you go down as an individual — the only individual — but I know Sophie. She'll use this for fuel for next year."

And for Glaser, the best part of cross country is not the running but the team aspect of the sport. So she was appreciative that almost a dozen of her teammates were in Fort Dodge to support her on Saturday but she wished that they were running with her and not just spectating.

"I do like running — not all the time, mind you — but it is the team that I really love about this sport," she said. "You can talk to a lot of people who say they hate running but they love cross country and it's because of the team part."

And Ohrt said Glaser is the consummate teammate.

"She's one of those kids at practice who's always finishing first but she goes back out and runs in with her teammates," the New Hampton coach said. "She's super competitive, but she's also super supportive."

Glaser also brought tears to her coach's eyes in Fort Dodge when the runner told the coach that she was sad to see cross country end.

"It's kids like Sophie, that's why you want to coach," Ohrt said. "It's not just what she does on the course, that's really only a small part of it, it's the way she represents our team, our school, our town."

After a season in which she achieved so much — another all-conference run at the Northeast Iowa Conference meet and a sixth-place finish at the state-qualifying meet late last month — Glaser didn't get much time to rest.

Wrestling practice at New Hampton started on Monday, and she hopes to do the same thing she did in cross country — earn a second straight trip to the state tournament.

"I'm ready, I think," she said with a laugh on Sunday afternoon. "There's not a lot of downtime — today's it."

Before she went to the mat, though, she took one last look at the cross country season she just completed. And Glaser focused on her teammates.

"We've always had a good supportive team," she said, "but this year, our team was just awesome when it came to supporting each other. They're the best, and it felt amazing to see so many of them there supporting me. It's something I'll never forget."



New Hampton admirably bowed out in the semifinal round against No. 3 West Delaware (38-6) – a state qualifier in Class 3A – but not before taking the favored Hawks to the brink in game four and almost forcing a fifth and final game.

Part of that reason why was Rosonke's explosive play up front near the net as she led all strikers with 19 kills.

That made her a force to be reckoned with all season. She was all-NEIC second team last year and took her game to the next level.

"Key words that describe her: humble and hardworking," said Geerts, who put a cap on her 19th season as Chickasaw head coach.

Rosonke led the entire NEIC in kills with 290, kill efficiency (.415) and was fourth overall in blocks (51). Her play spoke volumes, but her positive demeanor and team-first attitude also went a long ways. She wasn't afraid to clock in and work overtime, either.

"She is not as vocal as Taylor (Ries) but keeps things light and puts her head down and works hard. She is so humble and leads by example. She was a great leader on and off the court," said Geerts.

With those award-winning attributes, it will only make sense that Rosonke will take her game to the next level in college out on the hardwood.

where volleyball is going to take Braelyn. Any college will be lucky to get her," said Geerts.

Weber – a transfer from Turkey Valley – set the table for New Hampton and was second in assists in the league with 671. She also generated 180 digs and served 23 aces.

"Maici was a great addition to our team this year. Coming into a new program and bigger school had to be intimidating, but she started off strong by showing great leadership," said Geerts. "She worked hard over the summer and showed her team how well she could lead."

Despite a broken thumb that she suffered just days before key regional clashes at home

versus Crestwood and at West Delaware, Weber toughed it out and still played at an elite level for her Chickasaws in those elimination contests.

She managed 36 assists on the night to go along with 17-17 serving.

"At the end of the season she truly showed grit having a broken thumb and still played her heart out in our final eight matches. We are lucky to have her back for another season," said the NH head coach.

Cahoy, the only freshman to crack the two nine-player NEIC all-league squads, came on to the scene in a big way for New Hampton. The younger sister of three-time all-state player

Marissa Cahoy made a splash right from the get-go with her inspired play – which features the ability to make an impact from anywhere on the court.

"Aleigha brought a lot to the table for us. She is so young but has a lot of court time. Her six-rotation spot kept her busy and she excelled no matter where she was on the court," said Geerts.

Aleigha was second in the league with 263 kills and was fourth overall in the NEIC with 34 aces. She also came up with 272 digs and a team-leading 34 ace serves.

"We can't wait to see what the next three years bring for Aleigha as she will come back with several other girls with experience and several girls who show promise for our team. Stay tuned for what's to come!" said Geerts.

Ries – third best in the NEIC in digs with 300 – was also the team's best server in terms of efficiency with a 95.4 clip. She was fourth in the league with 329 successful serves and rained down 33 aces. She also brought plenty of heart and tenacity to the court.

"Taylor was definitely the glue of our team this season. She is a true leader who kept everyone together and showed it through hard work," said Geerts. "She embraced her leadership role. Her passes help make our hitters and setter excellent. Off the court, Taylor is just a great kid. We will miss her next year."

State denies Decorah's bid to join Upper Iowa Conference

The director of the Iowa Department of Education turned down Decorah's bid to join the Upper Iowa Conference in a ruling that was released last week.

That means the UIC will become a 12-school league next year with the addition of New Hampton, Crestwood and Waukon, all currently members of the Northeast

Iowa Conference, while Decorah, also currently a NEIC school, will in all likelihood compete as an independent in 2025-26.

The three schools were accepted into the UIC last winter, leaving Charles City and Decorah without conferences. Charles City applied to the North Central Conference, was denied but accepted into the league on a "gradual basis" during the mediation process.

Decorah, meanwhile, applied for UIC

membership, was denied and took the issue to a mediator, but that process still left the Vikings homeless. So Decorah officials took their case to the Department of Education Director McKenzie Snow, who had several options at her disposal. Those ranged from rejecting the appeal, placing Decorah in the UIC or even forcing schools to form a new conference that they would be tied to for four years.

Snow chose the first option, and she based that decision on the fact that Decorah's school enrollment is more than 2.5 times the average enrollment of the Upper Iowa Conference with the inclusion of Crestwood, Waukon and New Hampton, which will be three of the four largest schools in the league.

"Ideally, Decorah would have a conference of similarly sized schools in close proximity," Snow wrote. However, a choice between travel time and school size must be made. By its decision, the mediation team gave greater weight to the latter while considering both factors."

Snow also wrote that "while Decorah was excluded from a conference it had not been 'unfairly excluded' and denied the school's application into the UIC.

literally on the bottom rung of the proverbial officiating ladder.

He had a friend who suggested he contact Arlo Flege, one of the legends of Iowa wrestling officiating, and for a few years, he'd travel with Flege to meets, where Denner handled the JV matches and Flege called the varsity ones.

"I was lucky, too, because it wasn't just Arlo but I had a great number of officials in Northeast Iowa to draw on and work with," said Denner, as he ticked off names that included Bill Rothes, Mike Exline and Mike Allen, just to name a few. "There were a lot of people I could watch and learn and understand how things were. We talked about a lot of things, and it helped me out a ton. I was willing to be patient and get experience."

Denner is quick to say that he's grateful that he began officiating in the 1980s and not today, when young, inexperienced officials often are on the mat for varsity matches.

"I found out really quickly, it isn't as easy as it looks," he said. "It was a lot harder than I thought so I had a real big wake-up call. ... Me doing a varsity meet my first year, there's no way I could have done it. My head was spinning just enough doing JV matches about trying to get position and what to call and looking for this and looking for that."

But over time, the matches did "slow down" for him and he moved up the ladder.

He said the heroes in his story include his wife, Sharon, and his two sons – Craig and Justin, the former played basketball while the latter wrestled for Waverly-Shell Rock.

"My family sacrificed a lot for me," Denner said. "Everything that I've ever gotten – every award, everything that I have won – I owe to them, and I've told people that."

In high school, Denner was a two-year starter for the Chickasaws and compiled a 35-17-1 record. He was a two-time Northeast Iowa Conference tournament place-winner and a state tournament qualifier in 1975.

As an official, however, Denner's trip to Des Moines became an annual affair, and as much as he enjoyed calling matches on the mat at the best state tournament in the nation, his fondest memories are with his "real small fraternity."

"It's one like no other," he said, "and some of the best times I've had is being in the locker room, the dressing room. The throwing crap at each other, the picking each other's brains and all that is what made it such a great calling for 35 years. You've got to have fun doing it because if you make it all work, you're not going to get out of it what you want."

Although this upcoming wrestling season will be the seventh that he won't take the mat, Denner has remained active in the wrestling community. He has been a volunteer at the state duals and traditional state tournament weigh-ins, he's mentored new and inexperienced officials and he's served as an evaluator of officials.

"It's in my blood," he said of the sport, "and it's the relationships I've built with officials, coaches and even some wrestlers that I'm still in touch with. It's so meaningful. I'm glad I got mad that night, I'm glad I took the plunge because it's kept me involved all these years with a sport I love."

NOT THE RACE SHE WANTED, BUT GLASER BUILDS ON STATE MEET EXPERIENCE

This is not a news flash to those who know her, but New Hampton's Sophie Glaser is a competitor.

But she's also just a sophomore, so while she wasn't thrilled about her performance Saturday at the Class 2A state cross country meet, Glaser and her coach are focusing on the future.

"Definitely not the time or the place I wanted," she said when asked how her day at state went, "but it is what it is and I guess knowing that I have two years left kind of takes the sting away a little. ... I'm learning how to run at state and hopefully that pays off more next year."

Glaser finished in the middle of the pack in the race that was held at Lakeside Golf Course in Fort Dodge as she covered the course in 21:23.3.

The Chickasaws' lone state participant came into Saturday's meet with high hopes of surpassing her 2023 time and placing, when she finished 58th with a time of 20:49.2, but on a cold, damp day in Fort Dodge, it wasn't meant to be.

Glaser ran the first mile in 6:22.8 and was in 58th position, but that was her high-water mark for the day.

"It is a little frustrating, but it was still a really great experience," she said. "I'm learning the course, I'm learning where I have to get to. ... State is really a lot different than any other meet."

It's been a fruitful journey for Hall of Fame mat ref

Denner has no regrets about decision to become an official

Mike Denner chuckled at the question — how did he go from a solid high school wrestler to one of the best mat officials in the state?

"I have to tell you the truth, I was at a meet and I didn't really like the calls I was seeing," he said. "I got in it for all the wrong reasons, maybe you could say, but boy oh boy, I'm glad I did. It was one of the best decisions of my life."

And now he's a Hall of Famer. Denner, a 1976 graduate of New Hampton High School, was inducted into the Iowa Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame last month during the Iowa Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association Convention.

For 35 years, from 1983 to 2018, Denner traveled to pretty much every nook and cranny in northeast and north-central Iowa, becoming one of the best officials in the state. He worked 20 Northeast Iowa Conference tournaments, 10 Upper Iowa Conference tournaments, 31 sectional and district tournaments and 26 state tournaments. In 22 of those, he worked finals matches — both at Veterans Auditorium and at the Wells Fargo Arena.

But, at the start, Denner was
