## Sheriff to retire next month

Hemann says it's time for 'new chapter,' supervisors weigh replacement options

Chickasaw County will have a new sheriff next month, thanks to a decision by current Sheriff Marty Hemann to call it a career after 32 1/2 years of service to the county.

During Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting, Hemann submitted his resignation, effective Jan.

19, and for the third time in 16 months, board members were faced with filling a vacancy in an elected office.

In his letter to the board, Hemann said "it has been an honor and privi-

lege to serve the people of Chickasaw County for 32-plus years as a deputy, jail administrator, chief deputy and sheriff. The community should be proud of all the county employees for their ethics and cooperation between departments."

He went on to thank the Board of Supervisors — both current and past boards — and "the dedicated and professional group of deputies, dispatch-

ers, jailers and civil [employees] who serve the people of Chickasaw County 24/7."

But Hemann told board members the time had come for him to turn a page.

"I'll miss the people, I'm not going to lie," he said, "but it's just time for a new chapter in my life. I will work for

the next seven weeks to make it a smooth transition with the budget and everything else like that. ... I want to make sure whoever

Colin Larsen doesn't want to steal Jamie Ohrt's thunder; after all, the former New Hampton High School science teacher did lead her cross country team to a historic season this past fall.

But ... Maybe Larsen deserves a little credit, too. "I gave them a lot of good workouts this summer, and then you look at the season they had," the 2004 New Hampton High School graduate said. "You know, I'm just saying."

And with that, both Larsen and Ohrt busted out laughing.

Welcome to the PBL Courtyard, the brainchild of four educators — Jeff Monteith, Amanda Rogers, June Laures and Ohrt — to turn the "wasted space" outside the cafeteria into the PBL Courtyard.

When it's completed, the 77-by-77 foot area will include sidewalks, rock, a couple of ornamental trees, other plants and some artificial turf.

## Supervisors to wait on EMS funding resolution

Public hearing set for budget on Dec. 12, board holds off on deciding how county will fund its portion

The great debate never materialized during Monday's meeting of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors.

Board members did not take up a resolution they asked County Attorney David Laudner to draft that would have the county pay its

portion for Chickasaw County EMS — the new county-owned ambulance service that will begin on Jan. 1 — from its Rural Services Basic (RSB) fund.

That's because board members felt that Iowa law requires the county to first hold a public hearing on a budget amendment that will include the new service's budget for the remainder of the fiscal year that

ends on June 30.

"Public hearings always come first," Supervisor Jake Hackman said, "and I just don't believe we can talk about our funding until we get through this budget amendment."

The 2022-23 budget was certified last March, long before the county decided to start its own ambulance service, one that will not only serve the rural residents of the county but

also the cities of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

Each of those cities agreed to pay the county to provide the service to their residents while two cities — Alta Vista and Nashua — opted not to join the county operation.

The long and short of it, though,

# Sheriff grateful dream became reality

Hemann still fondly recalls day Bernatz called him and asked him to become a sheriff's deputy

Marty Hemann will never forget the excitement he felt 32 1/2 years ago when then Chickasaw County Sheriff Tom Bernatz called him to offer him a job as a deputy.

"It's a day that will always be one of the best ones in my life," said Hemann, who announced Monday that he will give up his sheriff position and retire next month. "It had always been my dream to be in a sheriff's office, and this was perfect for me. It was close to home but not home, if that makes any sense. I had been told a young officer should never work in their home area, but Chickasaw County is so much like Mitchell County, it was perfect."

And it turned out Hemann found a new home, for he stayed for more than three decades — serving as a deputy, jail administrator, chief deputy and finally sheriff.

Hemann graduated from Osage High School in 1985, and after working for a year, he enrolled at what was then called Hawkeye Tech to pursue a career in law enforcement.

While attending college, he also worked as a "marshal" for the city of Hawkeye, and after graduating, he worked for a year as a police officer in Fayette.

He had met Bernatz during an "interview day" at Hawkeye Tech, and Hemann thought the sheriff was "just being nice" when he told him that if his office ever had an opening, he hoped Hemann would apply.

An opening arose, Hemann applied and Bernatz called him to tell him he was hired.

"I remember he told me that I could live anywhere in the county as long as it was in Fredericksburg," Hemann said with a laugh. "But seriously, I'll always be grateful to Tom for giving me an opportunity."

For the first two-thirds of his

career in the county, he worked the night shift; in fact, when he finally switched to days, he joked he felt like the "new guy." During his tenure, he worked for four sheriffs — Bernatz, Bill Dean, Marty Larsen and Todd Miller — before becoming the department's acting sheriff when Miller was injured in the final year of his term.

Hemann won the sheriff's election in 2016 and claimed a re-election victory in 2020.

In an interview after Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting, Hemann said he began considering retirement this past spring.

"There has been so much change in law enforcement," he said, "and I probably put my job, frankly, ahead of everything else at times, and I didn't want to do that with my grandchildren. It was a hard decision in so many ways because I love the people I work with. They are as professional as they come, and I'll miss them dearly."

He paused for a moment and smiled.

"But it's time to put my family first. Like I told the board members today, it's time for a new chapter and for that I'm really excited."

Still, he said he will not coast into retirement; instead, he has plenty of work to do before he leaves his office for the final time on Jan. 19.

There's the feasibility study on the county's jail situation being prepared by the Samuels Group.

There's a 2023-24 budget that needs to be handed into the supervisors by Jan. 15.

And there's the everyday work that come with being sheriff.

"I'll be busy, and I'm going to fulfill my duties right up to Jan. 19," he said, "and that's good for me because as excited as I am for this new chapter to start, I know leaving my work family will be hard. They're good people — really good people."

fills my spot, they're up to speed and everything."

After the board "acknowledged" his retirement on a 4-1 vote — with Jake Hackman casting the lone dissenting vote — Board Chairman Matt Kuhn and fellow Supervisor Jason Byrne lauded the work Hemann has done for the county.

"It's been a pleasure working with you Marty," Byrne said. "You have done a lot for us and our citizens."

The options for the supervisors are the same as they were when they filled the county attorney position in 2021 and the auditor vacancy this past summer.

County Attorney David Launder told board members that they can either make an appointment or call for a special election, although he noted that if the board heads down the appointment road, voters can petition for a special election.

If the process is not completed by Hemann's exit, Laudner said Iowa code "specifies that the chief deputy then takes over in the sheriff's absence so there is a safety valve in place in case that doesn't all get sorted out in the next seven weeks."

During the discussion on how to fill the soon-to-be-vacant office, Hackman expressed some frustration.

"Just venting, I guess," Hackman said, "you know, not the best timing, Marty, OK? We

just had a general election. A special election in the amount between \$6,000 to \$10,000. At this point, I wouldn't like to see a special election, but the people have the right to do that. I think we have to appoint or the chief deputy takes over at midnight on Jan. 20."

Hemann, in response to a query from Byrne, said his current chief deputy, Ryan Shawver, is interested in the position.

"He's taken on a lot of additional duties since I appointed him about a year and a half ago," he said. "So he is willing to, yes."

When asked if other deputies were interested in taking over the office, Hemann told board members that "they haven't expressed that to me." Just Ryan at this point."

Hackman said he felt it was important that supervisors reach out to other deputies to gauge their interest in replacing Hemann.

"I'll talk to them. I've talked to one or two of them already," he said. "I think it's all of our jobs to talk to them. ... I'm willing to appoint someone, but I want to [vet] the licensed officers of Chickasaw County."

And while board members appeared to be leaning to going the appointment route — both Kuhn and Byrne joined Hackman in supporting that avenue — they did not make any decisions but instead will discuss the issue at their meeting this coming Monday.

## COLA is sweet for Social Security recipients

If you receive Social Security, you've probably already heard that your checks in 2023 will be bigger — considerably bigger, in fact. How can you make the best use of this extra money?

Here's what's happening: For 2023, there's an 8.7% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for Social Security benefits — the largest increase in 40 years. Also, the monthly Medicare Part B premiums are declining next year, to \$164.90/month from \$170.10/month, which will also modestly boost Social Security checks for those enrolled in Part B, as these premiums are automatically deducted.

Of course, the sizable COLA is due to the high inflation of 2022, as the Social Security Administration uses a formula based on increases in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). So, it's certainly possible that you will need some, or perhaps all, of your larger checks to pay for the increased cost of goods and services. But if your cash flow is already relatively strong, you might want to consider these suggestions for using your bigger checks:

- **Reduce withdrawals from your investment portfolio.** When you're retired, you will likely need to withdraw a certain amount from your portfolio each year to meet your expenses. A boost in your Social Security may enable you to withdraw less, at least for a year. This can be particularly advantageous when the markets are down, as you'd like to avoid, as much as possible, selling investments and withdrawing the money when investment prices are low. And the fewer investments you need to sell, the longer your portfolio may last during your retirement years.

- **Help build your cash reserves.** When you're retired, it's a good idea to maintain about a year's worth of the amount you'll spend from your portfolio in cash, while also keeping three months' of your spending needs in an emergency fund, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. Your higher Social

Security checks could help you build these cash reserves. (Also, it's helpful to keep another three to five years' worth of spending from your portfolio in short-term, fixed-income investments, which now, due to higher interest rates, offer better income opportunities.)

- **Contribute to a 529 plan.** You could use some of your extra Social Security money to contribute to a tax-advantaged 529 education savings plan for your grandchildren or other family members.

- **Contribute to charitable organizations.** You might want to use some of your Social Security money to expand your charitable giving. Your generosity will help worthy groups and possibly bring you some tax benefits, too.

While it's nice to have these possible options in 2023, you can't count on future COLA increases being as large. The jump in inflation in 2022 was due to several unusual factors, including pandemic-related government spending, supply shortages and the Russian invasion of Ukraine. It's quite possible, perhaps even likely, that inflation will subside in 2023, which, in turn, would mean a smaller COLA bump in 2024.

Nonetheless, while you might not want to include large annual COLA increases as part of your long-term financial strategy, you may well choose to take advantage, in some of the ways described above, of the bigger Social Security checks you'll receive in 2023. When opportunity knocks, you may want to open the door.

## Landscaper appreciates project's 'diversity'

"As far as a project, you can't get much more diverse than what this is," he said, "and you know, I have a 9-year-old daughter that will be here soon. The project, the fact that I went to school here, my daughter will be out here before you know it ... add it all up and it was a no-brainer."

The courtyard is basically where the old "U" was located before New Hampton built its new middle school that includes the cafeteria for both middle school and high school students.

"It was a space that never was going to be used for anything beneficial," Larsen said. "It was more of a pain in the butt for everyone. The janitors hated it, everyone hated it. ... Let's put it to good use."

Ohrt said that she and her fellow educators attended a class together and decided to take on the project, enlisting their students to help plan and design what will be a three-phase project.

"My students and I sent out

letters to all the community members," Ohrt said, "and they met with the School Board and City Council. It was really a short time and we had all the funds for Stage 1. We're working on Stage 2 and then we'll tackle Stage 3."

Stage 1 in many ways consisted of the prep work. Out came the sod and junk that was in the courtyard; in came 28 tons of rock, and remember, it's a courtyard. All that sod had to be hauled out in a wheelbarrow; all that rock had to be hauled in by the same mode of transportation.

"Best workouts we had all summer," Ohrt said with a laugh, "but seriously, students, my team, they all really came together to get it done."

When the reporter asked the two if they ever considered "parachuting" the rock into the courtyard, Ohrt and Larsen both looked at each other with mock despair.

"Dang it, we didn't think about that," Larsen said with a laugh.

But they got it done by working hard and smart.

"If it's a 100-degree day, you have to remember it's surrounded by brick walls so it's a 120 in there," Larsen said before Ohrt added, "Trust us, you cook in there."

So they worked shorter four to six-hour shifts and tried to go to work early in the day.

The two sidewalks that connects to the two doors that have access to the courtyard are basically completed, and Stage 2 will consist of hauling in more rock and getting the plants — low-maintenance plants at that — into the ground.

And then comes Stage 3, the installation of the artificial turf — hopefully late next summer — to add additional color and a different look to the courtyard.

Larsen estimates that turf could cost between \$15,000 and \$18,000, but he also said the investment the community has made into the courtyard is worth it.

"When we were kind of planning it, we wanted it to be as diverse of a spot as possible," the landscaper said. "Open it for lunch, take study hall kids there, use it for class. I found two studies — one from Harvard and the other from American Institute of Research. Both were done last year, and both found it incredibly beneficial for mental health an education when it comes to outdoor learning."

He paused and laughed, as did Ohrt.

"Hey, I'm not going to argue with Harvard."

Residents and businesses who would like to donate to the project can do so by making out a check payable PBL Courtyard and send it to the high school. The names of the donor will be put on a plaque that will be displayed in the courtyard for all visitors to see.

## Proposed ambulance budget cut slightly for budget amendment

is the current county budget did not include any money for ambulance service, which means the Board of Supervisors needs to get a budget amendment in place by the time the service is up and running on the first day of 2023.

Board members took the first step Monday when they voted to hold a public hearing at 9:15 a.m. on Monday, Dec. 12.

Before they did, though, Hackman pointed out one issue with the proposed budget, and that is the expenditures for the first six months exceed the revenues the service will have.

Those revenues include a little more than \$269,172 from the six cities as well as about \$243,600 from the county.

"I just know we can't approve this with a negative number," Hackman said.

Supervisor Jason Byrne, though, proposed cutting the money that the service plans to set aside for future equipment purchases, at least during the current year.

"How about that first year take that \$25,000 to \$10,000 or \$15,000 just to make it flush until we know what the [insurance reimbursement] revenues will be," Byrne said.

Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson was agreeable and pointed out that the EMS Advisory Committee

Her focus was always on her family, and she was so happy that the farm she and Paul started so long ago is continuing to be worked by Grant, Brayden and Peyton.



Richard's long and amazing life began on Nov. 28, 1925, when his parents, Paul and Pearl (Brown) Helling, welcomed him into the world in Fort Madison, where he grew up on a small acreage on the edge of the city in southeastern Iowa.

He grew up during the Great Depression and that shaped his life. He sold things like apples and eggs to help his parents weather the hard economic times. Richard attended St. Mary's Catholic Grade School before moving on to Catholic Central High School, where he was a member of the Class of 1944.

After graduating, he was inducted into the U.S. Army during World War II, and by the end of the year, he was in Europe fighting with the Allied forces that would defeat Nazi Germany. Richard fought and was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge, the battle in which the Allies thwarted the final German offensive of the war. After recovering, he was sent back to the front lines and was wounded a second time near Bollendorf during American operations in the German Rhineland. Richard was awarded two Purple Hearts for his service, yet for many years, he rarely, if ever, talked about his service during the war.

After receiving his honorable discharge, Richard worked for the Santa Fe Railroad for six months, but his calling was always farming, and in 1947, his dream was realized as he began renting a farm near Fort Madison.

His farm was near one owned by his parents, and just down the road lived a beautiful young woman named Ann Kempker, who was working at the Schaefer Pen Company in Fort Madison and was living with her uncle and aunt. Richard often delivered produce and eggs to their home, and Richard always told the story that he made sure to deliver produce and eggs as often as possible because Ann was there.

They began dating, fell in love, and embarked on a wonderful marriage that lasted almost 71 years when they said

their "I do's" to each other on Sept. 10, 1949, at St. James Catholic Church in Ann's hometown of St. Paul, Iowa.

It was literally a match made in heaven, for these two did everything together — from farming to raising their five children to enjoying their grandchildren. The couple began their marriage farming near Fort Madison, but Richard's dream was always to own his own farm in an area of the state that didn't have the hills of southeast Iowa.

He found the perfect place in 1955 when the Hellingss purchased a farm near North Washington and made the move to northeast Iowa, despite the fact that they didn't know a soul in the area.

The family grew to include five children — John, Bernadette, Dale, Larry, and Leon — who had a father who was self-disciplined, highly organized, and had a work ethic second to none. Every night, Richard put together his "to-do" list for tomorrow, and more often than not, he accomplished it all.

He was a "cash-flow" farmer before the term was even born, and he was innovative when it came to farming. He also despised weeds of any kind in his fields, and the Helling kids will tell you that Dad had an "Eagle Eye" when it came to weeds. If he saw one on the way home from church, the car would stop and one of the kids would be sent out into the field to pull the dastardly milkweed. Even today, they remember trying to get Dad to take "this way" to church so they wouldn't pass an oat field they knew had weeds in it!

When the Hellingss first moved to northeast Iowa, they ran a dairy operation, but in the early 1960s, they switched to hogs and the Helling children still laugh that they received shovels and pitchforks for Christmas so that they could help Dad clean the hog barns.

Richard was a straight shooter. He didn't cuss, he rarely drank, he didn't smoke and he didn't gamble. He did, however, love his wife, his children, his grandchildren, and his great-grandchildren. They knew they could always — and we mean always — count on him.

In 1984, Richard and Ann moved to the farm just off Highway 18 near New Hampton that they would call home for many years, and even after he

retired in 1989, Richard stayed busy with his various landscaping projects. His flowers were beautiful and his lawn was always immaculate.

Over the years, Richard and Ann went from not knowing anyone in Chickasaw County to being pillars of the neighborhood. They, in short, loved their neighbors, and their social lives — including the card parties they attended — revolved around them.

He had a strong faith, and for many years, he was a member of the Immaculate Conception Church in North Washington. When the Hellingss moved to the farm near New Hampton, they attended Mass at St. Mary's Catholic Church, and when that church closed, they became members of Holy Family Parish.

Later in life, Richard was a member of the American Legion Fae Stine Post 38 in New Hampton and the VFW and he opened up a little more about his experiences during the war — sharing his story in a heartfelt keynote address during New Hampton's Memorial Day celebration in 2010, one in which he shared the story of reconnecting with a war buddy named Harry 43 years after the war ended. He was also a member of the DAV and Purple Heart organizations.

Yet, he was like so many of his generation. They went off to war, they fought and they came home to build a better life for their families.

Richard was a voracious reader. He loved a good western and read pretty much every war story that was ever written. He could finish a book in a day or two, and the librarians in the area would call him to tell him new books had arrived because they knew he had read everything they had to offer.

Mostly, though, we will remember Richard as a man who loved his family, his church, and his country.

He is one of the last World War II veterans to grace our presence, but he was more than just a member of the "Greatest Generation." He was a wonderful husband, father and grandfather, he was a fantastic farmer and he was a man of God.

They don't make them like Richard anymore, and although we are saddened to say farewell to him, we are comforted by the fact that today he is reunited with Ann in a far better place.

Survivors include one daughter, Bernadette (Dave) Christoph of New Hampton; four sons, John (Linda) Helling of Harlan, Dale (Jo) Helling of Des Moines, Larry (Jan) Helling of Marion, and Leon (Jean) Helling of Ankeny; 12 grandchildren; 17 great-grandchildren; brothers, Stanley (Lillian) Helling of Ft. Madison, and Joseph Helling of North Fort Myers, Florida; and sister-in-law, Charlene Helling of Kansas City, Missouri.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his wife, Ann on Sept. 6, 2020; two grandchildren; a daughter-in-law; Sharon Helling; and brothers, Eugene (Charlene) Helling and Edwin (Yevonne) Helling.

clock. Schmitt connected on two free throws to start the mini-string of points with 1:38 left on the fourth-quarter clock. Her bucket down low resulted in an and-one as she was fouled and went to the line for a 3-point play. Unfortunately for TV she missed the ensuing free throw.

That led to all-stater Carlee Rochford grabbing the rebound and promptly going coast-to-coast on the other end with a layup. She was also fouled and made her free throw for the conventional 3-point play with 1:01 remaining in the contest. Not even five seconds later NH forced a steal underneath its own hoop and Rochford made good on another layup to push the lead up to 10 points, NH now leading 50-40. Another steal led to a Cora Schwickerath layup with 42 ticks remaining. The biggest roar from the crowd on this evening came from Molly Wegner's transition layup after TV turned the ball over once more. She was fouled and made good on her 3-point play for the game's final score of the evening.

TV didn't seem to know what had hit them as New Hampton grabbed hold of the momentum late and never gave it back.

"The big thing is - our overall team effort was through the roof," said Leichtman. "I'm looking forward for that to continue."

TV, who throttled Kee High, 52-27, in its season opener last week before Thanksgiving break, led 8-2 early against the Chickasaws after Mariah Thronson's 3-pointer.

New Hampton held a 12-10

"I say Carlee reads the court as good as anybody around," said Leichtman. "At the start of her senior season, she has understood where she needs to be all the time. She gets herself in that position for the team's success."

New Hampton had its own troubles in taking care of the basketball as well as the







ROCHFORD LEADS THE WAY FOR A NEW HAMPTON GIRLS TEAM LOOKING TO IMPROVE WIN TOTAL THIS WINTER

Do the math, crunch the numbers or break down the statistics.

However you want to slice it, dice it or even julienne it – the New Hampton girls basketball team needs to score.

Obviously, that's the ultimate goal of any hoops team that takes to the hardwood this winter.

How that scoring is accomplished can be done in a variety of ways.

For the New Hampton Chickasaws – a large bulk of putting the leather inside the round, orange rim is going to come from all-state senior guard Carlee Rochford, one of the state's most prolific scorers.

That's a fact. How much help Rochford gets in the scoring department to relieve some of the pressure thrown at her is the big question this winter for the Chickasaws – which are now in year two of the David Leichtman era.

That added scoring from a slew of returnees back would open up the court even more for Leichtman's rotation and potentially lead to the win total heading north – not south.

"That's one thing that I've preached from day one – ladies, we gotta knock down shots," said Leichtman. "If we knock down some shots, pretty soon the pressure starts to come off us."

Rochford was the third best scorer in the state last year – regardless of class. She clipped out at 24.5 points per game and

accounted for almost 50 percent of New Hampton's offense. While Rochford is extremely adept of getting her shot off and working her inside-outside game amongst plenty of contact – she needs help.

Plain and simple. In New Hampton's opener at home against a quality Class 1A squad in Riceville – Rochford scored 36 points. She was 11-20 from the floor and drained four

3-pointers in 14 attempts from beyond the arc.

The problem – at least for New Hampton's offense – was the rest of the team was a combined 3-24 from the field and 0-17 from long range.

That type of shooting equated to a 56-47 loss to the Wildcats.

But that's just one game and an awfully small sample size with Christmas, New Year's and several holidays still yet

to be marked off the calendar before the state brackets are set and games are played in Wells Fargo Arena in Des Moines.

"Early on, I've seen us be a little more confident in our shot," said Leichtman. "Last year some gals were new to the varsity level. In practice, they're ready to take their rhythm shot."

New Hampton's going to have to if it wants to improve on its 7-14 record from a year ago. The Chickasaws won two games in 10 tries in the tough NEIC.

While the state implemented a 35-second shot clock for the first time – passing the ball around and looking for the open look is going to be of the same importance as it always is.

"It's amazing how five passes can end up with an open shot for anybody on the floor," said Leichtman.

The Chickasaws graduated just one senior last year – senior guard Emily Jackson. The Chickasaw starter averaged over two points a game, but did possess a gritty, all-around game that helped win contests.

Just the single graduation of Jackson means Leichtman has almost his entire roster back with the addition of some newcomers.

"We have more numbers that are ready to go on the court," said Leichtman. "That's a big factor of traveling through the first year and getting into the second year."

Joining Rochford back as starters are senior guard/forward Kandice Eggerichs (7.3 ppg, 5.7 rpg, 1.5 spg), junior guard Molly Wegner (4.9 ppg),

senior forward/center Elaina Rosonke (2.2 rpg), senior guard Gracie Reicks (2.2 ppg) and sophomore guard Taylor Ries (3.8 ppg).

All of those aforementioned Chickasaws started games last year.

Kirsten Reicherts, a 5-7 guard/forward, started against Riceville and scored two points. Sophomore Cora Schwickerath, another guard for NH, is another underclassmen to watch and has plenty of potential.

"Kandice, Kirsten, Elaina and Gracie are some very, very tough, scrappy give-it-100 percent athletes," said Leichtman. "They are showing the underclassmen that they are some tough individuals."

The leader of the Chickasaw girls hoops program said he's really happy about his team's upbeat, up-tempo approach to game play and practice. He is also confident his key returnees will improve from last year and fit right into the mix to increase the win total from 2021-2022.

"When players know their roles, they know how far their ceiling is and how to get there to it," said Leichtman.

"We have a lot of people that can push through and achieve beyond their goals and their ceiling."

Leichtman is confident his Chickasaws will gel once the season gets rolling and the scoring will be more balanced.

"The great thing going into this season is we have a lot of athletes stepping up and it's given Carlee and our team ample places to attack on the offensive end," Leichtman

added.

Braelyn Rosonke, Elaina's cousin and a sophomore forward/center for the Chickasaws, could see some playing time this year, although she did not log any minutes against Riceville.

"Those two cousins work well together in practice," said Leichtman. "They push each other. That will help the future of Chickasaw basketball."

NH junior Megan Pickar (guard), as well as sophomores Jackie Pickar (guard) and Josie Speltz (guard), comprise the rest of the Chickasaws' roster.

"We sat and talked about a lot of goals that we need to accomplish – where we need to be," said Leichtman. "We know there's stepping stones that have to be in place in order to get those. The season is a long season. We go through four holidays."

Leichtman said there will be JJV games this year. He said he has 23 girls out for his program – varsity, junior varsity and JJV.

"That's a huge deal," said Leichtman. "That's been a big push for us."

As far as the shot clock – it sounds like New Hampton's in the same boat as the rest of the state is – which means there may be a learning curve in acclimating one's offense and style of play to the change.

"It's different. It's new," said Leichtman. "Whether a player, coach or spectator – we have to adjust to the shot clock."





170 while Howe came on strong late in the year to earn his first trip to Des Moines at 182 pounds.



Reicks, like several other Chickasaws, is battling early season injuries, but Paulus said the goal is to get his wrestlers healthy later in the season.

Meanwhile, Fettkether is back on the mat after spending the last two winters playing basketball.

And the Chickasaws do have experience in its younger classes, too.

Start with Landon Bruess, NH/TV's 106-pounder the past two years. For those who haven't seen young Mr. Bruess, they're in for a surprise because this year, he's a legitimate 106 pounds after wrestling at around 85 pounds as a freshman and in the 90s last winter.

"He looks huge compared to the last two years," Paulus said, "and I'm excited for him. Giving up 20 pounds at 106, I mean that's a ton."


The Chickasaws also welcome back wrestlers like Leander Reicks, Burke Busta and Karson Kolbet, and Paulus said he believes there are some talented freshmen who can make an impact on the mat this winter.

The one thing the Chickasaws don't have is a heavyweight, but Paulus earlier this week said he was still talking with a number of New Hampton students.

"It's huge not giving up a forfeit," he said, "and we have some kids out there that I know are better than just getting a forfeit. We'll see."



## Trojans welcome back plenty of vets

Turkey Valley boys coach wants his team to take get out and run this season

John Izer doesn't have to scour the gymnasium anymore with a fine-tooth comb at Turkey Valley High School in order to start basketball practice this year.

He now understands the layout of the school located at Jackson Junction much better in Year Two as TV boys hoops coach.

"I know where we kept the balls at the first practice," said a smiling and obviously joking Izer.

In all seriousness, Izer – in his second year of guiding the TV boys basketball program – is much more comfortable headed into his second season of aiming for the top of the league standings in the Upper

Iowa Conference.

"We're more prepared. I'm way ahead of last year. I imagine that's something every second-year head coach can say," said Izer.

His athletic team – blessed with speed, strength and quickness – likes to get out and push the pace. That shouldn't be a problem again this winter as he returns nine players from his 11-man varsity roster – only graduating two. Although those skilled hoopsters were each all-conference honorees in Dylan Reicks and Garrett Kurtenbach.

"The only way we can replace those two is by the nine people we have returning. That's how I look at it," said Izer. "I don't think we have individuals to replace 'em, but I like our numbers to replace them."

Getting the round piece of leather to go through the nylon-netted hoop was somewhat of a tall task a year ago for TV.

That's the key to this season, according to Izer.

"We have to improve the shooting. But I think we have to improve in taking good shots," said Izer. "I think we took a lot of bad shots that made us have a worse shooting percentage."

That shooting clip was 36 percent overall and that means the goals are bigger this year with a renewed sense of optimism.

"The expectations from me are higher this year than they were last year," said Izer. "I've got different personalities than last year. Everybody this year is accepting what we're trying to do."

Izer does have an all-con-

ference player back in senior forward Calvin Bodensteiner – who can bury 3's and plays much bigger down low than his 6-3 frame. He was third on the team last year in made treys (22) and averaged 7.2 points-per-game to go along with almost averaging five rebounds a contest.

"Calvin's got a motor. He's hit a lot of outside shots for us," said Izer. "I think Calvin will play more relaxed this year. He's got good ups. He dunks the ball."

Bodensteiner is a three-year starter – like senior point guard Noah Hanson – and is one of many in Izer's rotation that is a multi-sport star that can do a lot of good things out on a basketball court.

## New coach takes over reins for Trojan girls

Former South Winneshiek coach replaces ultra-successful Nymeyer at Turkey Valley

Carla Nymeyer consistently won at Turkey Valley during her almost decade run for the Trojans.

Not just a little – a lot.

Nymeyer put a wrap on her nine-year tenure as Trojan girls hoops coach last March – a tremendous run that included two-state runner-up finishes in 2016-2017.

In steps her assistant the past couple of years on the Trojan bench – Steve Hoffert.

Hoffert is no stranger to success out on the hardwood as he has guided the girls and boys basketball programs at rival South Winneshiek for a combined 12 years.

"It's tough to replace a legend," said Hoffert. "She's a legend here. She did a lot of great things here. We're going to do a lot of the same things."

Hoffert – like Nymeyer – wants to get the absolute best out of his players.

That almost assuredly will be one of the keys to success for a TV team that must replace key starters from a season ago.

"The first day we had a meeting I said I was very demanding and I'm very demanding," said Hoffert. "I need you to do this, this and this. If you can't do this, this and this like I ask you to – then we have problems. I'm a demanding person. I'm going to try to squeeze every little bit of talent you have out of you and I'm going to challenge you everyday in practice."

Hoffert – a 1989 South Winn grad and the father of TV's all-time leading scorer in Ali Hoffert and last year's

starter, Aubrey Hoffert – was straight and to the point on how this winter's team will feature some of the same similarities as Nymeyer-coached teams. By that same token – Hoffert will also put his own unique imprint on this 2022-2023 bunch.

"It's up-tempo, it's up-tempo," said Steve Hoffert. "On the offensive end, I'm a little more detailed on offense. Instead of free-flowing – we like to do a lot of pick-and-roll things. In the half-court set with the 35-second shot clock, it's going to be screen, go, go. Gotta do it again."

Turkey Valley went 16-7 a year ago and finished third in the Upper Iowa Conference with a 12-4 mark. Gone this year are two all-conference performers who definitely made their mark in their time out on the court for Nymeyer. Those seniors that graduated last year are point guard Kara Reicks and guard Jalyssa Blazek. Both were front and center at the head of Nymeyer's trapping press that caused countless teams fits. The multiple-year starters were defensive stoppers and reliable perimeter players. TV also graduated Hailey Elsbernd, who was a 3-point threat that will also be missed.

That means new faces will have to fill those voids.

"In small schools, you got what you got," said Steve Hoffert. "You have to rely on younger kids."

That means newcomers like freshmen Maici Weber (5-10 forward), Addison Steinlage (5-6 guard), Haylee Hanson (5-10 center) and Annika Bodensteiner (5-6 guard) will have to rise to the occasion if the Trojans want to continue to pile up the wins like they have for the last decade.

"That's where the younger girls are going to have to step up," said Steve Hoffert. "The girls have put their work through in the summertime. Unfortunately for us, we don't have a

primary ballhandler, so it's going to be kind of group thing."

Hoffert does have a solid base back – at least down low.

Back this year is first-team all-conference senior standout Jacqlyn Schmitt. Although an undersized center at 5-9 – the lefty withstands the physical rigors of playing on the blocks with a soft touch near the rim and a penchant to draw contact and knock down her free throws. Schmitt is also a good rebounder and passer.

Schmitt averaged 16 points a game last year and was also named to the all-district team. She averaged 6.7 rebounds a contest as well.

Aubrey Hoffert – another lefty for TV – can knock down mid-range jumpers and hit from beyond the arc. She scored over six points a game at her guard/forward position.

Brianna Busta, one of four seniors on TV's roster – also brings back





"I think the guys felt a little snake bit last year because it seemed like someone was always getting 3's against us," said Rausch. "But, high school teams make more 3's than they ever have."

New Hampton shot just 23 percent from beyond the arc as a team last year. Decorah - which qualified for the state tournament for the first time since 1977 - buried 12 treys in an 88-38 blowout win on the Vikings' home floor over the Chickasaws.

"Even if a team only makes five or six of them....if you make zero or only one per game it seems like they made 10. The 3-pointer needs to be an equalizer for us and if we shoot it well, hopefully it can become a separator for us. Heck, last year we only made 61 as a team and only shot 23 percent from 3. That might be the worst in the universe. We're hoping to change that."

Rausch said keys to better perimeter play are passing and spacing out on the floor. If the shots from deep start falling, that opens up the lane and the inside a lot more for Steinlage and Laures.

"We have to shoot the ball better. Period. I think we have a team that can push the ball, attack, will share the ball and rebound," said Rausch.

While the Chickasaws want to limit their opponents success from long-range, New Hampton is also looking to improve on its free-throw percentage (58 percent). NH averaged 52 points of scoring a contest last year.

"I think that there are a number of guys who have an opportunity to step in and help us. I

think that from a depth perspective this might be the deepest team I've had in five years. There are a lot of guys that feel like it is their time to shine and time to prove themselves," said Rausch.

Steinlage is a valuable, versatile weapon for Rausch. The 6-3 forward was second-team all-conference a year ago and averaged 14 points. He netted over five rebounds a game as well.

"Carter is a great passer for a big and really understands the game," said Rausch. "He may be the quickest player end-to-end in the NEIC."

Shekleton, a senior 6-2 guard, came into his own last year as a junior and averaged eight points a game.

"Shek" can really go," said Rausch. "When he plays aggressively and under control - he is tough to stop."

Those two returning starters are in store for big things as this will be their last go-round for the Chickasaws in their senior seasons.

"Carter and "Shek" are really going to have a big year," said Rausch. "They can score at all three levels. We expect a lot from them."

Laures could be ready for a breakout year. The 6-3 junior forward might not have produced a flashy stat line (5.6 ppg, 4.5 rpg), but he's got plenty of potential and a high ceiling.

"I'm very excited for Cael. He had a great offseason. If he can really get comfortable with how aggressive we as coaches

and his teammates want him to be, then I think he will be an all-conference player," Rausch added. "We are just scratching the surface with Cael from an athletic standpoint."

Ben Gilbert, a junior guard, battled injuries last season, but will be a pivotal player in Rausch's rotation.

"Ben is a real key for us this year. He is much stronger, which helps a smaller player," said Rausch. "If he can step into his shots and knock them down and take some pressure off of "Shek" handling the ball, that will help immensely."

Junior forward Nick Brincks also contributed to New Hampton's success and should be improved from a season ago. Rausch likes his workman-like play and blue-collar mindset.

"He is tough as nails and every good team I've even been on or coached had a player like him," said Rausch.

NH senior forward Aiden Roberson saw floor time as well last year and will look to also solidify the low post area on offense and defense.

Sophomores Adam Ewert and Reid Rausch will also log plenty of minutes at their guard positions. Each logged minutes in varsity competition last year as freshmen.

The rest of Rausch's roster looks like this - seniors Brady Speltz, Hunter Serie, Evan Knowlton, Carter Cahoy, Noah Nosbisch and Carsyn Leistikow. Junior Carter Newbrough rounds out New Hampton's varsity lineup.

Confident, battle-tested and talented. That's Carter Steinlage, Gannon Shekleton and Cael Laures.

Those three returning starters for head coach Ryan Rausch are primed and ready for a breakout season for the Chickasaws.

Each of those aforementioned stars for Rausch - entering his fifth year as Chickasaw head coach - will need to be counted on if New Hampton wants to climb over the hump and come up with a winning season in 2022-2023.

New Hampton will be without the services of one of the best ever to grace the court in a Chickasaw uniform - Drake Wemark.

Easily one of the best players in the NEIC the past three seasons - Wemark has seen his eligibility expire, as he's taken his considerable talent to the football field up at Morningside University in Sioux City.

His departure because of graduation is a big void to fill. The 6-2 forward started since his freshman season and finished with 1,195 career points. His all-around game and floor presence is almost irreplaceable.

"It is obviously hard to replace Drake and all that he did for us. He's just a great all-around player," said Rausch. "But we have several guys who collectively will work to replace that production and hopefully go above and beyond that as a group."

Wemark led NH in virtually every category his senior sea-

son - 17.4 points, 7.5 rebounds, 4.2 assists and 4.3 steals. Those marks were in the top three of every category in the league.

Also graduating last year was 6-2 guard/forward Mason Lane, who averaged just over four points a game.

In order to better an 11-12 overall mark and 4-6 record in

the conference - New Hampton is going to have to improve its shooting percentage from outside and defend the perimeter better.

If not - with the style of basketball that is being played nowadays - the Chickasaws will more than likely encounter their fair share of struggles.



Esports is so much more than – Hold A, tap B repeatedly, then simultaneously press L1/R1, all the while holding left shift. Not that the first ever New Hampton Esports team won't utilize a similar maneuver on their video game controller to claim themselves victorious in competition that has a definite 21st Century vibe to it.

The future is now at New Hampton High School as head coach Justin Adam and his newly-formed Esports squad will field a team this winter.

While there's no running or throwing involved like in traditional athletics – Esports is, for lack of a better phrase – a sport. "It's growing a lot right now," said Adam, also New Hampton High School's band director and Designated Esports Coordinator for the Chickasaws. "There's way more teams than there ever has been."

New Hampton will play the popular video game, Rocket League, online against opponents in its inaugural season.

"It's essentially soccer with race cars," said Adam. "They have to learn a lot about the physics of the game and speed – and the teamwork, defense and offense."

That's where the stereotypes and misconceptions are broken from way back when a large contingent of naysayers felt all video game players were just rotting their brains and staring at a TV screen all day long.

Esports is something all together different and helps gets kids that might not normally participate in extra-curricular activities to get involved and be a part of something larger than themselves.

"We know statistically that students that are involved in activities or other things do better academically," said Adam. "Our goal with starting the program was to help engage a group of kids that doesn't do anything right now."

"They aren't interested in traditional activities, so really, we're taking something that they're already doing and adding structure to it. Because many of them already play on their own."

Video gaming has come a long way since the late 1970s

and early 80s when Atari was all the rage. Joysticks have now been replaced with controllers and technology has transformed a once thought of leisure activity that was played in basements across the nation into a profitable lifestyle where professionals can make millions of dollars.

"I was not one that liked to play online and like multi-player stuff, but I've really come around to it," said Adam. "The professional Esports scene is really growing. Colleges are getting in on that and offering scholarships."

New Hampton will not travel to play games and take part in-person competition this winter.

"We're not planning to travel unless we make finals," said Adam.

Three vs. three is the playing format in Rocket League – which begins regular season competition in the first week of December and ends with the finals in late February and early March.

There are three different seasons – fall, winter and spring. The length of the season is just like their athletic counterparts – an eight-week regular season with four additional weeks of postseason play for teams that qualify.

At least in Rocket League – the first team to win three, five-minute matches wins the overall competition according to Adam.

New Hampton is part of the Iowa High School Esports Association, which broke ground with its initial beta season in 2019.

Then COVID-19 struck the following year.

"It actually lent itself pretty well to all of our troubles with COVID and playing online and

kids could still do an activity," said Adam. "A lot of them were able to play from home instead of school."

The first full-length season took place last year in the state of Iowa.

"We offer titles year-round," said Adam. "Each season has different games."

This coming spring New Hampton will compete in Mario Kart.

NH will play seven different schools in the regular season with one bye week. The Rocket League playoffs start on Thursday, Feb. 16 with the finals taking place in West Des Moines at the MidAmerican Energy Company RecPlex.

In addition to working as a team, hand-eye coordination is also sharpened while competing in Esports.

"There's a lot of focus that goes into that," said Adam. "A lot of these competitive games are high speed so you have to be able to make decisions very quickly and work on your reaction times and things like that."

Esports team members are also bonding and developing positive relationships – all the while being competitive and having fun.

"We can still work on all those core fundamentals of teamwork and communication and strategy and things like that," said Adam.

Adam's varsity roster is comprised of Paul Schwier, Noah Nobsisch, Jamison Porath, Landon Marr, Carlos Ortiz, Gabe Macon and Trenton Horner. NH's junior varsity squad is made up of Reece Luna, Dakota Amfahr, Tyler Thiele, Eric Plagman, Ben Schuchhardt, Adam Gambelin and Riley Scheidel. Team managers this winter are Sydney Hyer and Shelby Springer.

## 13-1 late run lifts Chickasaws to win

thought we had control of the game," said Trojan head coach John Izer. "We let them cut it down. It got away in the fourth quarter."

The Chickasaws trimmed that margin to 23-17 at intermission and continued to roll in the opening stages of the third period. Ben Gilbert's trey from the wing, followed by Gannon Shekleton's driving layup, gave New Hampton its first lead since the game's first few minutes, up 24-23 with 6:52 left in the third. That barrage of points equated to a 12-0 run for New Hampton that was carried over from the end of the first half.

TV would grab the lead back and push its advantage to as big as 34-26 after a Noah Hanson tip-in with 2:30 left in the third period. Calvin Bodensteiner – the team's top returning scorer – nailed his only field goal of the game that would maintain that eight-point edge at 36-28 underneath a minute to play before the final stanza.

"We came to win. We came fully expecting to play a good game and win," said Izer. "We didn't come over here to go through charades."

That would be as good as it would get for TV as the Chickasaws finally started taking care of the basketball. To make matters worse for TV – the Chickasaws ratcheted up the pressure and it paid off. Shekleton's steal at mid-court and electric drive to the rim right before the horn sounded cut TV's lead to 36-34.

"We just knew that even though we want to push tempo, we still gotta be on two feet and slow down," said Rausch. "I felt like in the first half we didn't do a very good job of using our ball fakes. We were staring passes down and we were throwing it where we were looking. I just said, 'settle down.'"

Adam Ewert's wing 3-pointer sliced TV's cushion to a single point at 39-38 with 6:12 remaining in the contest. Shekleton's putback capped the 13-1 run, NH now leading 47-40 at the three-minute mark.

Prior to the second big run of the game, TV led, 39-34, early fourth quarter after a made Caleb Kurtenbach free throw at the 7:29 mark of the final quarter.

Carter Steinlage – New Hampton's top scorer returning this winter – did not make good on a field goal, but his free throws down the stretch proved pivotal.

"We couldn't hit them. They were making them," said Izer about his team's free-throw

TV made just 7-19 from the charity stripe. The Trojans shot right at 30 percent (17-56) from the field.

Hanson hit for 10 points and Oliver Schmitt netted nine points.

"We're going to go from baseline to baseline on offense and defense. We are loaded with speed," Izer added.

Hanson (5 ppg, 3.1 rpg, 2.9 spg) is a two-time all-state football player and the quarterback for Mark Scott's Trojans out on the gridiron. He's also the quarterback of the hoops squad as well at point guard and like his team – will look to get the ball in the hoop more consistently.

"His shooting has improved immensely," said Izer.

Fellow senior Carson Busta is another primetime player for Izer and is the top returning long-range threat back with 24 three-point makes. The guard averaged 4.5 points per game his junior season. Busta – like Bodensteiner – started all 23 games last winter.

TV senior forward Chase

Hayek started four games last year and averaged just over three points of offense in 2021-2022.

Oliver Schmitt, a junior, averaged over three points of offense last year and is also penciled in as Izer's last starter. Schmitt was an all-state full-back and linebacker for the TV Trojan football team this past fall.

Caleb Kurtenbach, a junior, averaged almost four points a season ago and also looks to up those numbers this year.

TV (12-11, 8-8) finished the season strong despite losing to Edgewood-Colesburg in the second round of the postseason. The Trojans won six out of their

last eight games.

"We never peaked. We needed that finish to walk out feeling decent about ourselves," said Izer.

New this year is the 35-second shot clock for girls and boys basketball in the state of Iowa.

You'll only need to watch a few minutes of Izer's bunch to know that the up-and-down pace of his team's game shouldn't see that new-fangled piece of technology enter into the equation of his team's success.

"I hate to show my hand right now, but if we ever need the 35-second clock – we're in bad shape," said Izer. "We're gonna run."

# Fearsome all-state foursome

## New Hampton's McShane named to first team; Tenge is second-team pick

Where Ben Tenge went, Braden McShane was sure to follow.

Or vice versa.

Those two exceptional football players for New Hampton were honored with elite distinction recently as the pair of Chickasaws were selected for the Class 2A all-state team.

McShane, arguably the best running back in the class, headlined the Class 2A first-team squad. Tenge, a tenacious linebacker and fullback, cracked the second-team squad.

Hall of Fame coach Scott Frerichs, who put his 30th season in the books this past fall after guiding New Hampton to a 6-3 mark, listed a few of the superlatives and reasons why two of his top players were honored as some of the best the state has to offer.

"Both Braden and Ben are humble and hard working. Both are in the weight room more than most and are coachable and team-orientated," said Frerichs.

McShane — a second-team all-state pick last year as a sophomore — ran roughshod over opponents this fall. He was NH's workhorse as he carried the load for the Chickasaws — piling up 1,733 yards on the ground.

That was the top individual rushing total in Class 2A and McShane's 1,998 all-purpose yards was also No. 1 in the class.

"Braden has above average speed and size. He is a legit 205 pounds during the season and is bigger than a lot of the people trying to tackle him. He has some great vision, a real feel for running the ball, and always finishes runs," said Frerichs.

McShane also led 2A in rushing touchdowns (22) and amassed 138 yards receiving on 13 catches. At his linebacker slot, he tallied 38.5 tackles and led NH in fumble recoveries (4) and interceptions (3).

"One thing that makes Braden an all-state player is his ability to be both a physical runner and equally physical on defense," said Frerichs.

"It takes a special player to do that. He recovers quickly and doesn't really get too sore. You tell him something once and he will take it and work with it."

Tenge, who blew open holes for McShane as the Chickasaws' lead blocker and played a huge role on defense at middle linebacker, was a tremendous asset to have for Frerichs and his coaching staff.

"Ben is just such a physical presence," said Frerichs. "He is a really good tackler with a nose for the ball. Ben brings a lot of intensity that you need in football. Ben was the leader of our defense that was first in the district against the run."

Tenge, one of four second-team all-state linebackers, came up with a team-leading 48.5 tackles, with 9.5 of those being tackles for loss. He also registered four sacks. He led his team in those respective categories.

Tenge, a senior, also rushed for 188 yards and found the end zone twice.

"Both of these athletes have dedicated themselves to being the best football player they can be. They work at getting stronger and faster," said Frerichs. "They compete! They work on their skill set. They work to know their opponents' strengths and systems."

Frerichs has produced 56 different all-state players in his three decades of leading the Chickasaw program. Nine of those New Hampton standouts have been repeat all-state selections.

Frerichs earned his 200th career victory this season and was inducted into Iowa Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2011.

## TV's Bodensteiner, Schmitt land on 8-man second team

Calvin Bodensteiner's stat line might not jump out at you, but he's one heckuva of an athlete and a lock-down cover corner for Mark Scott's Turkey Valley Trojans.

Bodensteiner — as tall as a defensive back as you're going to see in the state of Iowa for prep football — stands 6-3 and was also one of TV's top receivers in a season that saw the Trojans play to another fine season in 2022.

For all of Bodensteiner's exploits out on the gridiron, he was awarded with second-team all-state distinction after the Iowa Print Sports Writers Association and Iowa Football Coaches Association released its all-state squads recently.

"He's actually probably our best receiver but he didn't get the ball thrown to him quite a bunch," said Scott.

Joining Bodensteiner on the second team was junior fullback/linebacker Oliver Schmitt — who was one of the top all-around players in his class.

Bodensteiner, a senior, helped Turkey Valley go undefeated in district play and advance to the second round of the 8-Man playoffs. Turkey Valley played to a 7-2 record and came up just short of advancing to the quarterfinals after losing a 30-28 thrilling second-round matchup with Gladbrook-Reinbeck.

Bodensteiner — who was one of four defensive backs in 8-Man that made the two all-state squads — picked off two passes and registered 34.5 tackles (22 solo).

"He didn't have a lot of interceptions. People didn't throw at him because of his height and his ability to slap balls away," said Scott.

Bodensteiner caught nine passes for 159 yards. Almost half of his receptions went for touchdowns as he found the

## NH/TV kicks off season with pair of mat victories

Chickasaws roll past Central Elkader, dominate meet against South Winneshiek

Landon Bruess isn't so little anymore.

Bruess — a rising 106-pounder for Matt Paulus' Chickasaws — shot out of the gates on Tuesday in Calmar en route to an impressive two pins on the mat in a double dual versus Central Elkader and the host South Winneshiek Warriors.

Bruess' New Hampton/Turkey Valley teammates also came up big as the Chickasaw wrestlers flexed their muscles with two imposing victories — 60-13 over Central and 54-25 over South Winn.

Bruess — who went 11-26 last year at 106 pounds — gained muscle and weight in the off-season and looked impressive in pins over Jonah Burns of Central in just 22 seconds and South Winn's Jamison Zweibahmer in 1:27.

Starting out on the varsity level two years ago as a freshman, Bruess weighed all of 85 pounds — soaking wet. He looked the part of a legitimate 106-pounder in the season opener — which will surely help the Chickasaw's confidence

when he faces more challenging foes.

"Even last year he was about 90 pounds, so he's grown a ton," said Paulus. "He's a physical wrestler and he's finally big enough for the weight class. He's a strong kid and he's been cutting weight well. He's doing the right thing and I think it really showed tonight. I think he's going to surprise a lot of people."

With a marquee tournament in Independence just around the bend on Friday and Saturday — Paulus was happy to get off to a flying start. His wrestlers picked up 12 pins on the evening — six in each dual over the two schools which possess the same nickname.

"I told the guys I think it's a good start. We needed to have competition before the Independence tournament. We needed to make weight. We needed to get the atmosphere and that type of thing. I think the guys responded well and we just gotta keep moving forward here and roll into the weekend," said Paulus.

The bodies hit the floor on Monday night.

In an area clash that was as physical as they come — New Hampton outlasted Turkey Valley in an up-tempo slugfest that left both teams a little battered and bruised.

The Chickasaws and head coach Ryan Rausch survived, though, and were the vic-

tors on this evening in each team's season opener.

A 13-1 run midway through the final period helped New Hampton prevail over the Trojans — 51-44.

"It was a cross between a track meet and a wrestling match," said Rausch about his team's first win of the season.

The win by New Hampton (1-0) helped avenge a loss at the hands of Turkey Valley in last season's showdown in Jackson

Junction won by the Trojans — 62-53.

Turkey Valley had New Hampton out of sorts and completely disrupted in the first half as the athletic Trojans forced the bulk of their 22 turnovers in those first 16 minutes of play. TV led by at 11 at one point after a 10-0 run — up 23-12 with 4:15 left in the second period.

## New Hampton girls pull away late to get win

Rochford's big night helps Chickasaws top the Trojans

A close game got away from Turkey Valley on Monday night.

In what was a frantic and frenetic 30-second stretch in the final minute of each team's non-conference rivalry matchup in New Hampton, David Leichtman's Chickasaws seized control of the contest to win going away — 55-40.

The game was a lot closer the final tally up on the scoreboard — that's for sure.

"We just panicked. We had a lot of young girls on the floor," said TV first-year head coach Steve Hoffer. "We didn't get the ball in the right place."

NH turned a 45-40 game into a track meet in no time as the Chickasaws' defensive pressure frustrated the Trojans into committing several turnovers in crunch time that led to a game-closing 10-0 run for New Hampton.

Second-year Chickasaw coach David Leichtman was proud of his experienced New Hampton squad that forced 21 turnovers — none more important than the miscues created by NH's ball-hawking and trapping pace that sped up TV into throwing the ball away.

Leichtman said New Hampton, now 1-1 on the season, created 15 tipped passes that often helped create easy buckets on the other end.

"A lot of those defensive tips led to really good offensive possessions for us," said Leichtman.

TV senior Jacqlyn Schmitt — who paced the Trojans with 16 points and eight rebounds — scored four points in a row to trim New Hampton's lead to 45-40 with 1:07 left on the
