## City stays 'in' on new jail, center

Council members vote to pursue negotiations with county on forming Joint Authority Board

The New Hampton City Council on Monday agreed to "enter negotiations" with the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors to set up a Joint Authority Board, an action that would lead to a referendum on a new "holding" jail and law enforcement center that would include both the Sheriff's Office

and the city's Police Department.

The action came two weeks after the Samuels Group, during a joint meeting between the council and supervisors, recommended that the two entities spend \$13.2 million — actually more because that figure doesn't include bond costs or architect fees — to build the center.

The question for council members Monday was simple: In or out.

If the city's in, its residents would be responsible for the \$2.8 million part of the building that would house the police department. If the city's out, the county would have to decide if it wanted to proceed with a referendum to build the holding cells, booking area, dispatch center and a new sheriff's office.

Council members had a number of questions for both Board of Chairman

Supervisor Matt Kuhn and board member Jake Hackman, who were both in attendance and whose districts include the city of New Hampton.

The City Council was reminded that if a bond referendum passes with the city involved the tax impact for county residents would be about 66 cents per \$1,000 valuation while New Hampton

residents would see a tax impact around \$1.30 per \$1,000 valuation.

Council members also wanted to

## New police chief ready to go to work

City Council makes it official; longtime Harlan policeman set to begin new job on April 16

New Hampton's new police chief smiled when he was asked when he knew he wanted to be a law enforcement officer.

"I was probably 5 or 6 years old and that's all I ever wanted to do," Tim Pederson said Monday night after the City Council approved his hiring and he took the oath of office with his family in the audience. "Now, it took me a while, but I've always felt police work was my calling."

Pederson has served as an officer for the past 18 years in Harlan, and he has served as the department's K-9 officer since 2011 and been its sergeant since 2021.

He will take over as New Hampton's chief on April 19 and the council approved paying him an annual salary of \$69,518. The chief's position has been vacant since early March, when Zach Nobsch left the department to become the chief deputy at the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Office.

"I feel like I have the experience both with management and budgets," he said, "and I just felt like I was ready for this step in my career. It brings us closer to my family, and honestly, we've just been very impressed with New Hampton. We brought the kids up this last weekend, and my daughter told me, 'Everyone's so friendly.'

## A FAREWELL BANQUET

FFA MEMBERS, ALUMNI HONOR RETIRING ADVISOR AND WIFE DURING ANNUAL EVENT

It was the spring of 2004 when Jim Russ made the decision that would eventually bring him to New Hampton.

"I needed a break, I needed to get out and do something else," the New Hampton vocational agriculture and FFA advisor said. "I guess the best way to put it is I needed to rejuvenate a little."

Four years later, the rejuvenation process was complete, Jim Russ applied for an open position at New Hampton High School and, sorry for the cliché, the rest is history.

This past Saturday night, the man many kids know as just "Russ" and his wife, Sandra, were honored for their work the past 15 years that saw New Hampton's ag program take off and its FFA program become one of the best in the state of Iowa.

Technically, it was the annual meeting and banquet for the New Hampton FFA chapter, but make no mistake about it, this was a night to honor the Russes. When the 2022-23 school

## Supervisors willing to consider 'donated' building for ambulance

Chickasaw County EMS director says non-profit would raise funds, construct building and then hand over the keys to the county

The director of Chickasaw County EMS told the Board of Supervisors Monday that he believes a non-profit organization that has yet to be created could finance and build a new ambulance station within the city limits of

New Hampton.

He proposed the idea during an almost hour-long discussion on a permanent location for the county-owned ambulance service that began taking calls on Jan. 1.

And that discussion after county leaders learned it might cost \$1.9 million to move EMS, EMA and Public

Health to the Chickasaw Heritage Building Center.

The board has discussed a permanent home for the service a number of times, and despite objections from Director Joel Knutson, the board appeared to be leaning toward the Heritage just south of New Hampton.

Knutson has said housing the service outside the city would lead to fewer employees and higher costs because EMS personnel would not be able to respond from their places of employment and would have to report to the Heritage as soon as the "first truck" responded to a call.

"We have a lot of support in this community that want to help," Knutson said. "I'll just ask then, is there any, if

year ends in May, Jim and Sandra will walk out the doors of New Hampton High School for the final time. As teachers, at least.

But the story of Jim Russ is filled with plenty of twists and turns. He certainly did not take a nice, flat interstate highway to becoming one of the top ag teachers in the state.

HE WAS A "town kid" for a good chunk of his life. Growing up in the Delhi area, his family lived on an acreage and his dad did some chores on the farm to help pay for the rent.

But when Russ was in the sixth grade, the family, which included eight children, moved into town, where he attended Maquoketa Valley schools.

"I took the ag class to fill my schedule, and I fell in love with ag and FFA," he said. "Actually, I always loved ag — I helped on a lot of farms — but that class really changed my life. There was something about it, about FFA, that reached me. It put me on the path, I guess."

He went to Iowa State University, earned a degree in agriculture education and, just as importantly, he met his wife in Ames. The two were married in August 1983, just a couple of weeks before Jim Russ would begin his teaching career.

OVER THE NEXT 21 years, the Russ family grew to include Jessica, Chris, Brett and Elisa.

Russ taught at Edgewood-Colesburg, building strong ag and FFA programs, but as the new century began, he wasn't quite sure if he wanted to remain in the classroom.

"I probably should have done it three or four years before I did it," he said of his "break" from teaching.

Finally, in 2004, he took the plunge. Russ resigned and, for the first time since 1983, when August rolled around, he wasn't heading back to class.

Four years later, he was helping his oldest daughter, Jessica, who was applying for ag education jobs, and the itch to return to school came on strong.

"Once Jessica got her job, it was like, 'Dang, I think I can get back into this,'" he said, "so I decided to see what was left."

He learned about an opening in New Hampton, applied and got the job, although he'll tell you, he was the second choice. But when Steve Pfaffle, who now teaches at Turkey Valley, turned down the job, Russ landed in New Hampton.

But Brett Russ was heading into his senior year of high school so the family decided to "split up." Sandra would stay in Edgewood, and Jim would head to Charles City and be Jessica's "roommate" for a year.

"That was interesting to say the least," Sandra recalled with a laugh. "One minute, I'm taking a call from him complaining about her and then the next minute I'm taking a call from her telling me 'Dad's impossible sometimes.' I finally told them they had to learn to get along and to leave me out of it."

**HUSBAND AND WIFE,** along with

youngest daughter Elisa, who was then an eighth-grader, reunited in the fall of 2009 when Sandra accepted a special education teaching position in New Hampton.

And for 15 years, the team of Jim and Sandra built a powerhouse FFA program.

Over and over Saturday night, as speakers stepped to the microphone, they lauded both.

"You couldn't have asked for two better people," FFA Alumni President James Frantzen said. "They've really brought a lot to our school. They've re-energized this program."

From the greenhouses to the vineyard to "the mule" to the community involvement to the annual 100-plus membership in FFA, it's been quite a ride.

Two New Hampton students — Michael Tupper and Elisa Russ — served back-to-back presidential terms for the Iowa FFA. The chapter brought home a state championship in horse judging. And there's plenty of pride in wearing the blue corduroy.

So what makes Jim Russ the most proud?

"Shoot, I knew that question was coming one of these days," he said with a laugh.

For a moment, he pondered the question before coming up with the answer.

"I just look at the changes in the program," he said. "To see the kids proud of all that history, that means a lot. I guess

the best answer is there isn't one thing, it's everything put all together."

For 15 years, the "town kid" has made FFA a home to everyone at New Hampton High School. The kids who have spent their entire life on the farm sit next to some kids who live smack dab in the middle of town and rarely see a farm.

Maybe, that's what means the most to Russ. FFA is as inclusive group as there is at New Hampton High.

"There is a place for everyone," he said. "That was our goal when we came here, and I hope we achieved that, I hope kids know that."

**IN MANY WAYS**, this was a typical FFA Banquet; after all, awards were handed out, officers were installed, thousands of dollars was raised during the auction and the food, well, the food was dang good.

The FFA members gave "Russ" — as in Jim; not Sandra — the appropriate amount of grief, which is a common occurrence at every FFA Banquet.

But the words spoken, the gifts given and the tears shed reminded everyone in the banquet hall — OK, the old high school gymnasium — that this one was a little different.

Jim Russ, though, has no doubt, none at all, that he and his wife are leaving FFA in good hands.

In January, he welcomed a student-teacher, Rachel Bauer, to his classroom. A month later, the Iowa State University student's hiring as Russ' replacement was made official by the New Hampton School Board.

Bauer played a key role in Saturday night's event, and the confidence Russ has in his replacement is high.

A day after his last banquet, as an advisor at least, he talked about the future of the program that he and his wife have thrown their lives into the past 15 years.

"She's going to do a great job, she has that rapport with the kids," he said. "I know she's going to make changes, and you know what? That's great. I'll be here rooting for her, supporting FFA and the kids. Because that's what we do in FFA."

He attended Saude country school and graduated from New Hampton High School in 1954.


He married Janet Hoppe on September 5, 1959, in Northwood.




Gene joined the Navy during WWII. After the war he returned to Iowa and graduated from Gates Business College in Waterloo in 1947.



I pray that you will become such a community of faith to save souls and transform the world with the love of Jesus Christ.



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# Bickering ends busy two days for supervisors

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors covered a lot of ground during a pair of meetings that were held on Monday and Tuesday, but the final four minutes of the board's week was, in a word, strange.

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn and Supervisor Jake Hackman argued back and forth over comments that Kuhn said Hackman made — with the latter denying most of them — during a recess Monday.

"You were yelling at me after the meeting when nobody else was in here," Kuhn said.

"That was just discussion," Hackman replied.

"You were calling me names," Kuhn said, and Hackman quickly denied the accusation. "I never called you names," he said.

"You kept saying you're a crappy chair, you're a crappy chair," Kuhn said.

"That's not facts," Hackman said, and Kuhn cut him off and said, "You said you're running out on the county. I don't even know what that's supposed to mean."

Back and forth, the board chairman and the man who served as board chairman from 2018 to 2020.

The exchange was the second of the week between the two. On Monday, Hackman chided Kuhn for allowing MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center CEO and President Aaron Flugum to talk for "15 minutes" and told him that Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath should get the same time allotment.

"You're not the chair now," Kuhn said to Hackman Monday morning. "I'll handle the meeting the way I want to."

Tuesday's bickering back and forth didn't end when Kuhn asked if there were any other "future agenda items" to be considered. Hackman said he wanted to talk about "rules of conduct of the Boards of Supervisors."

"Does that include swearing at board members," Kuhn asked.

"Yeah, go ahead and add that. ... You've got to be con-

sistent when people talk, too, from the public. Sometimes you allow two minutes, sometimes you allow 15. Let's have that in the rules of conduct for Board of Supervisors meeting."

After a few more barbs, the board finally adjourned, ending a week in which board members discussed a potential grant that Chickasaw County and Alta Vista are in the running for that would be a part of Engineer Roman Lensing's proposal for major work on County Road V-18 from Highway 18 to the Chickasaw County line and into Howard County.

The board also met for more than an hour with department heads to discuss the county handbook with the county's HR attorney, Ann Smisek of Ahlers and Cooney.

That meeting was held in exempt session, even though the week before in open session, board discussed issues some members had with department heads giving new hires vacation even though the handbook says the county will only grant vacation days after one year of service.

After the exempt session, which Kuhn opposed, Smisek summarized the discussion.

"Because, in my opinion, things have been brought up to the public already," Kuhn said before the session, "I feel like we're giving the appearance of trying to hide something if we do that."

Smisek said the current vacation policy in the handbook was discussed.

"We got feedback from the department heads on whether the vacation policy should be changed going forward," she said, "and to reiterate to all department heads and elected officials that they should follow the current policy as written, unless and until the board adopts a change to vacation policy and that goes for all policies in the handbook actually."

She added that the board was receptive to department heads approaching the supervisors when they have a "difficult-to-fill" position or a lack of applications where they think deviation from the current policy would be beneficial.

### Prichard new Floyd County attorney, to stay on as city attorney

Floyd County's new part-time county attorney was sworn in last Wednesday morning at a special meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

Todd Prichard, a Charles City attorney, former Iowa legislative leader and Army Reserve colonel, took the oath of office after the board took two actions — passing a resolution changing the county attorney position from full time to part time and setting the salary, then making the appointment.

Prichard stressed in his interview for the position Monday that part time did not mean half as many hours as full time. The main distinction is that designation allows him to maintain a private practice, which by Iowa Code a full-time county attorney cannot do.

He said he would limit his private practice to things like probate work and business law that can be scheduled around his county attorney duties, and he would be available for whatever amount of time and whenever the county job requires.

Prichard, who also serves as New Hampton's city attorney, said Monday he planned on remaining with the city.

The topic of full versus part time came up again Wednesday morning, as supervisors were discussing the appointment before making it official.

"I've received some pushback on the part-time piece of it," said Supervisor Dennis Keifer. "I think the public doesn't necessarily understand. They think you're limited to 20 hours a week and I don't know what you or we can do to help clarify that."

"I think, do the job," Prichard said, is how you prove it can be done.

Cerwinski said having the ambulance at the Heritage — or at least not in the middle of New Hampton — would allow the service to be "closer to a lot of the communities."

New Hampton resident and MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center CEO and President Aaron Flugum vehemently disagreed.

"No, it's not," he said. "That's a lie. It's not closer to all the communities. ... From what I've listened to all your meetings, that's not the data that's been shown."

Flugum was referring to a presentation Knutson made during a March 13 meeting in which the EMS director told supervisors that a software program he used showed that the "county would have a 74 percent slower response time for

67 percent of our calls if the station" is built at the Heritage.

"You've guys have been able to do an amazing thing here," Flugum said, referring to the start-up of the county-owned service.

"But you hire people in these departments to be experts in what they do. And that's what Joel is; he's your content expert on EMS, just like [Engineer] Roman [Lensing] is your content expert on roads ..."

Flugum took the supervisors to task for micro-managing EMS to the "point where you're logically impossible to make it a successful business."

Supervisors, though, did remain open to the idea of exploring the 501c3 option and agreed to talk with County Attorney David Laudner, who was unable to attend Monday meeting in person.

He said he's looking forward to engaging with the community — both in and out of uniform. He has spent a number of years coaching youth baseball and football.

"I think a really important part of police work is building relationships," he said. "We're in this not only to protect but to serve. I can tell you almost every officer I know didn't get into this to write tickets and make arrests, they got into law enforcement because they wanted to help people and they want their communities to be safe."


• Attitudes toward money

know when the referendum would be held, and while Kuhn said that he has been told there is enough time to put the question on the ballot and "educate" voters for a September question, some council members, especially Cory McDonald wondered why the vote couldn't be had in November during the municipal-school elections.

"They were saying that if it goes to a special election," Councilwoman Katie Fisher said, "it's the only question, voters can focus on it and people are usually well informed about that."

McDonald, though, said he struggled with the county spending between \$12,000 and

### Council OKs budget, levy on 5-1 vote

The New Hampton City Council voted to approve its 2023-24 budget and tax levy, although Monday's approval did not come with unanimity.

The council voted 5-1 to approve the budget that will see the city bring in \$1.85 million in property taxes during the fiscal year that begins on July 1. That's a decrease of 6 percent from the \$1.97 million the city expects to receive in property taxes this year.

No one spoke at the public hearing or offered written comments, but Councilman Cory McDonald shared that he had taken calls concerned about the budget. He ended up casting the only no vote.

Under the approved budget, the estimated levy on property will be \$12.40801 per \$1,000 valuation while ag land within the city will be taxed at \$3.00375 per \$1,000 valuation.

\$15,000 for voters to cast ballots in September when there is already an election set for two months later.

"We as a council, and we've been looking underneath every rock for this dollar and that dollar for this past year for [the] budget," he said. "For \$12,000 to \$15,000 ... I guess I don't understand why we wouldn't have it in November."

Sheriff Ryan Shawver said that after talking to Samuels Group owner Sid Samuels, he felt confident that the prices quoted at the March 20 joint meeting would hold through the end of the year.

"March would be iffy," he said. "November of 2024 they'd have to go back to their estimating team."

Shawver also said that if the city would choose to move forward, "we'd like to get the Samuels Group back here to help us with the education portion of this," for a cost around \$35,000.

"We've got one chance to do this," the sheriff said, "and we need to put every foot forward that we can to get the best education out there, whether people want to vote no, we want to make sure they understand why they're voting no and what that means. And if they want to vote yes, they fully understand what that means."

He said if the city would pay 25 percent of those education costs, which would work out to \$8,750, and City Clerk Karen Clemens said the city does have enough ARPA funds to cover that costs if the council wants to

go that route.

Former Police Chief Zach Nobsch, who is now Shawver's chief deputy said he understood the angst some residents have over building a new jail, but he also pointed out that the current jail no longer comes close to meeting state standards.

"You're always going to have those individuals that it's going to be hard on," Nobsch said. "I mean we're never going to get away from that, but eventually, like now, comes the time where you have to do something, especially on the county side, but the city has the opportunity to maybe save a little money actually moving out there as well."

But before the council voted to move forward on creating a Joint Advisory Board — which would include one representative from the city, one from the county and one jointly agreed to by both entities — one resident asked city leaders how long they thought the city of New Hampton "will be able to justify its own PD?"

Nobsch said the biggest issue in the past for the police department had been the relatively low wages the city paid and the fact that the city required employees to live within 10 miles of the city, but last year, the city upped wages and increased the radius to 50 miles, and "we were able to hire officers pretty quickly."

New Hampton Mayor Bobby Schwickerath, meanwhile, said he did not see a day when the city wouldn't have a police department.

"I don't think the discussion's been had [of having the Sheriff's Office cover the city] outside of looking into the possibility of it," he said. "I don't see us going that route just because of the expense and with more expense, we'd have less coverage. I'm not speaking for the council, but I will speak for myself and say I don't see us doing that within the 20 years."

After he made his comments, the City Council unanimously moved forward with setting up a Joint Authority Board.



he PR'd for the season at least and beat a kid from MFL who finished 10th at cross country. That's a nice win."

The same goes for the 4x100 that saw Carter Cahoy anchor the Serie brothers — Beau and Hunter — and Braden McShane to a win in 45.14 seconds, the fastest time New Hampton has recorded in the event in eight years.

It also gave the Chickasaws the 47th fastest time in the state as they eye qualifying the relay for the Drake Relays, which brings the top 96 teams to the meet that will be held later this month.

"We can get better, but that was a really good race for our guys," Jenkins said. "Our hand-offs were much better and win-

ning a 4x1 in Decorah, with that many fast teams, that was definitely a highlight."

The coach, though, was hoping for more than 49 points and a fifth-place finish. Going into the meet, he knew teams like Mason City, Decorah and Clear Lake were probably out of reach, but Jenkins thought his team could battle Waukon for fourth. Instead, the Chickasaws' NEIC rivals outscored New Hampton 58-49.

A disqualification in the 4x200, in which the Chickasaws crossed the finish line second, didn't help. Neither did a tough night in the field, where the Chickasaws scored just seven points, all of which came in the discus thanks to a third-place

throw from Marshall Zeien and a seventh-place toss by Carsyn Leistikow.

"We found a lot of things to work on," Jenkins said, "but at the same time, it can only help us running against the Mason Citys, the Decorahs and the Clear Lakes."

Russler took a visit to the Waverly campus to talk with coaches there about the potential of her suiting up for the Knight's softball squad. Wartburg has shown keen interest in Russler's athletic prowess out on the ball diamond. 
The first of Broughton's penalty kicks was made good at the 10-minute mark, New Hampton now up 6-1.

the injuries and illnesses afflicting his team ... well, Jenkins will take it.

Start with the field events. It's where New Hampton got its only win of the night as junior Marshall Zeien came up with a PR of 133-8 in the discus.

As a coach, to see our guys so willing to help the team, that meant a lot."


Anderson, who had already finished second in the 3,200 and run the 800 in the distance medley, came up with a split of 57 seconds in the meet's final




event to help the Chickasaws secure a fifth-place finish in the relay.





## FLYING OUT OF THE GATE!

CHICKASAWS OPEN SEASON WITH 10-3 ROAD VICTORY

Carter Broughton got the party started and his New Hampton Chickasaws kicked off the 2023 season in fine fashion at Charles City on Thursday night.

This was a feel-good celebration from the get-go.

While the weather was not ideal — it often never is this time of the year in Iowa — New Hampton's offense was on-point in another dominating effort over the Comets.

New Hampton — in its third year of competition — once again bested Charles City, this time by a comfortable margin of 10-3.

New Hampton — which officially entered into competition in sanctioned organized soccer on the prep level in 2021 — has now beaten Charles City in four out of the last five meetings. Charles City defeated New Hampton, 8-0, in the Chickasaws' first ever match two years ago.

NH topped CC, 3-2, for one of its two wins in that inaugural season. New Hampton swept the Comets last year by scores of 8-0, 4-0 and 7-5. Four of New Hampton's six wins in the past two spring campaigns have come at the Comets' expense.

New Hampton's other talented striker up top — senior Victor Montiel — demonstrated what he's all about on the pitch as well as he weaved and darted his way past the Comet defense for three goals of his own.

"I feel like we have a strong squad this year. We'll let our game speak for us," said Broughton, a junior who has started for New Hampton since his freshman year.
