Supervisors buy its EMS a new home

Board OKs purchasing McGrath's building; EMS department will take possession later this summer

Chickasaw County EMS has a new home, or at least, the county-owned ambulance service will as of July 31 as the Board of Supervisors on Monday signed off on a purchase agreement that calls on the county to pay \$350,000 for a building located at 204 E. Prospect St. in New Hampton.

The building, which is located near the intersection of Prospect and North Water Avenue, is currently owned by Jeremy and Lacey McGrath, who owned and operated the Chickasaw Ambulance Service that provided service to the county until Dec. 31.


The action came two weeks after the board agreed to explore purchasing a building from Thronson and Thronson Inc. that is located at 259 E. Prospect St., and a week after supervisors reversed course and offered \$350,000 for the McGrath building.

It also came after months of discussion about possibly basing Chickasaw County EMS at the Heritage Building Center, a proposal that Director Joel Knutson said would end up hurting the service attracting and retaining volunteers, as well as leading to increased costs for the department because backup crews would have to report to the Heritage as soon as the "first ambulance" was called out.

After last week's meeting, Jeremy McGrath said he was "undecided" about the purchase price, but on Monday, he accepted the county offer although he did ask board members to close on the building on Aug. 31, instead of July 31.

"I'm going to be gone for a week, and then I

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
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


Bearman said she also enjoys meeting new people at the different events.

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Special Needs Trust Could Ease Families' Stress

If you have a family member with special needs, you might face emotional and physical issues, but you also may be concerned about maximizing the financial support your loved one requires. Consequently, you may want to consider establishing a special needs trust.

This type of trust can help maintain the financial security and lifestyle of an individual with special needs. Furthermore, a special needs trust can allow the trust's beneficiary to receive financial support for supplemental needs without losing public benefits, such as Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Medicaid.

Here's how it works: You, as the trust's grantor, establish the trust and name a trustee who is responsible for managing the trust. You can fund the trust with gifts throughout your lifetime or from other sources, such as inheritances or court settlements. But another popular funding mechanism is life insurance, which the trust can purchase on the life of one or both parents of a special-needs child. And as long as the trust is also named the beneficiary of the policy, government benefits will be protected.

In a special needs trust, the role of trustee is important. A trustee must manage the funds within the trust and ensure those funds are used only to supplement SSI and Medicaid, the government programs that typically pay for food, housing and medicine. Instead, a special needs trust can be used for most other expenses, including transportation and travel, education, entertainment, professional services and personal items.

You could serve as trustee yourself or choose a relative or a trusted friend. Ideally, you want someone who's familiar with your wishes and the needs of your family member with disabilities and who is also competent at managing finances and staying current on SSI and Medicaid regulations.

As an alternative, you could hire a professional trust company to manage your special needs trust. This type of company has expertise in asset management



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and government regulations and can provide you with strict recordkeeping of all the financial transactions associated with your trust. If you go this route, you'll want to compare different trust companies' costs and services. For such a personal matter as administering a trust for your special-needs family member, you'll want to be sure you're comfortable with whatever company you select.

Also, you'll want to be familiar with some of the possible areas of concern regarding special needs trusts. For one thing, because the trustee totally controls when and how funds are distributed, beneficiaries can get frustrated if their requests for money are denied. Additionally, while third-party special needs trusts are funded by someone other than the beneficiary, first-party special needs trusts are funded by the beneficiary's own assets — and for these first-party special needs trusts, the trust must typically pay back Medicaid for money it has spent on the beneficiary's behalf after the death of the beneficiary. This repayment could deplete the trust, depriving secondary beneficiaries of any assets they might otherwise receive. Third-party special needs trusts do not require Medicaid repayment.

Consult with a legal professional before establishing a special needs trust to ensure this arrangement is appropriate for your family's situation. But if it is, and if it's managed properly, it can relieve you of some of the stress you may feel over the future of your loved one with special needs.



have a lot of state baseball and baseball tournaments, which I know is not your problem," he said although he added that "if it's a deal-breaker, we'll make it happen."

Board members appeared lukewarm to the idea of having the county take possession at the end of August, and McGrath asked about closing on Aug. 15 and allowing contractors in the building to work on building "living quarters."

Supervisor Jake Hackman wondered if the county could take possession of half of the building. County Attorney David Laudner expressed skepticism about the idea.

"We're going to take possession of half the building do what with it? Start constructing before we close on the property? I'm not going to suggest that," he said.

In the end, McGrath said he would make July 31 work, and Laudner said that — unless some unforeseen legal issues arose — he saw no reason that the county couldn't have the building in its possession by the end of next month.

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn said that taking possession of building on July 31 was one reason he voted to make the offer to McGraths. He also pointed out that, unlike the Thronson building, there would be no need to construct an attachment to the building for living quarters.

He also expressed his appreciation that the board had listened to the EMS community when it came to locating the service outside of New Hampton.

"I was a little surprised that we went from having a split board to whether we were going to have it in town versus at the Heritage," Kuhn said. "I guess I'm glad that we're all in agreement on this."

THE COUNTY IS currently renting garage space from the city of New Hampton at the police department for its two ambulances, and crews, while on duty, stay at a rental home in the 200 block of South Walnut Avenue.

The plan is for the ambulances to be moved to the McGrath building once the county takes possession of it, and Knutson asked the board to approve hiring Jill Brincks to draw up blueprints

for the living quarters.

The director said he believes there is enough room to build a "second floor" in a portion of the building to serve as sleeping areas for crews.

"If we go up, we eliminate the need to have to eat up some of the garage space that we deemed pretty precious when we bought it," he said, adding that the downstairs portion of the living quarters would include a kitchenette, conference room and his office.

He admitted that with 16-foot side-walls, it would be a tight fit for the sleeping quarters.

"You're probably looking at 7-foot or so, which is doable," he said. "For taller people, it's not as friendly, but it is doable."

SUPERVISORS ALSO spent a considerable amount of time discussing a proposed mutual-aid agreement with Nashua Area EMS.

Nashua and Alta Vista opted out of being a part of the county-owned service. While Alta Vista decided to use a

Howard County ambulance housed in Elma for its service, Nashua set out on its own, purchased an ambulance and recruited volunteers.

Nashua also signed a six-month contract to be part of the AMR service that is supplemented by Floyd County and the city of Charles City, but Nashua balked at signing a new agreement which would cost the city \$41,500 for the fiscal year that begins July 1 and increase by 5 percent the following two years.

"They are very close to going into service," Knutson said. "They are waiting on a pharmacy agreement from [Floyd County Medical Center in] Charles City, and they should have that by now. And that is the last piece of the puzzle they're waiting for on their state license."

Knutson said he believes that signing a mutual-aid agreement — similar to the ones Chickasaw County EMS has with surrounding providers — was the best step forward.

"With their seven new EMTs and their existing providers down there that are very excited to run on the service

... I don't anticipate them having any lapses in schedule for at least the first six months," he said. "After that, when the newness wears off a little bit, kind of like everywhere, it may become a little less, but we don't know. Time will tell."

He also pointed out that Nashua Area EMS has a similar mutual-aid agreement with AMR, which means Chickasaw County EMS wouldn't be the sole provider providing mutual aid to the city.

Still, Kuhn said he would only be in favor of having a mutual-aid agreement for a "trial period" and only once Nashua Area EMS is up and running.

Knutson pointed out that if Nashua Area EMS doesn't receive its state license until July 15 or July 31, "the city of Nashua won't have any EMS service during that time."

Kuhn, though, replied, "I don't want this to sound bad, but it's an incentive for them to get it done" and board members agreed, approving the mutual-aid agreement, which won't go into effect until Nashua Area EMS is up and operating, on a unanimous vote.

Nurse will take over county environmental health duties

With the impending departure of Chickasaw County Environmental Health Director Penny Andorf, the Board of Health has devised a "split position" to replace Andorf and in the process, one board member told county supervisors Monday, save the county close to \$60,000.

During a discussion before the board acknowledged the change of status to environmental health specialist and LPN for Andrea Kime, Board of Health member Jeremy McGrath told supervisors that the county could see some major savings and lauded the work Public Health and Homecare Services Administrator Lisa Welter has done when it comes to "cross-training" employees in her department.

"With Penny leaving, we needed to think outside the box," McGrath said, "and I think it's one of the things Lisa has done very well. ... Plus, it could save the county something like \$60,000."

Welter said Tuesday that when Kime was hired in December 2019, it was with the idea that she would perform a number of job duties within Public Health.

"And we all know what happened a few months later," she said, referring to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, "and she spent a lot of time on COVID. Now that COVID's over, we've kind of focused on finding ways to be even more efficient. There's always room for cross-training in any organization, and Andrea was definitely interested in taking on a new role."

Although Andorf reported to Welter, Public Health and Environmental Health have their own budgets, and supervisors questioned just how the breakdown would work. Welter told board members that Kime will in effect fill out two different timecards — one documenting her time working as an environmental health specialist and the other taking into account her nursing duties.

Welter said that Kime's benefits — like insurance — will be split 50-50 between the two budgets.

"The big thing we want people to know is that she's going to be available by phone, even when she's doing her nursing work," Welter said. "We know it's a little different set up, but we're excited to try it. It helps that Andrea's enthused about the changes."

The Public Health administrator said that one advantage of Andorf, who has worked for the county since 2019, giving the county plenty of notice before departing her position is the fact that Kime has spent several weeks training with the woman she will replace.

"Penny's done a great job, don't get me wrong, and we're going to miss her," Welter said, "but I also believe this is a good move for the agency and Andrea's going to fit well in the position."

The board did acknowledge the change in status for Kime and also acknowledged that she would be paid \$25 per hour once Andorf departs.


Extension study: Area farmers living in a 'high-rent' district

Iowa farmland cash rental rates have reached record levels this summer, according to survey results released by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

The report showed that cash rental rates for Iowa farmland shows that rates increased by 9% in 2023 to the highest average value on record — \$279 per acre. This new peak rent is 3.3% higher than the previous one of \$270 per acre observed in 2013, but does not take into account inflation rates over the past 10 years.

Iowans supplied 1,306 usable responses about typical cash rental rates in their counties for land producing corn and soybeans, hay, oats and pasture. Of these, 42% came from farmers, 37% from landowners, 9% from professional farm managers and realtors, 7% from agricultural lenders, and 5% from other professions and respondents who chose not to report their status. Respondents indicated being familiar with a total of 1.4 million cash rented acres across the state.

According to a recent survey conducted by ISU Extension and Outreach, the cost of renting farmland in area counties — Chickasaw, Bremer and Butler — is far above the state average.

The survey showed that the highest rental rates were in District 3, which covers Northeast Iowa and includes Chickasaw and Bremer counties. The survey showed that the average rent for corn and soybean acres in the district was \$307. District 2, which covers North Central Iowa and includes Butler and Floyd coun-

ties, had average rents of \$285 per acre.

Of the seven area counties, Bremer had the highest rental rates at \$325 per acre. Allmakee and Winneshiek came in at \$307, Butler's average was \$298 and Fayette was at \$297.

Chickasaw County's average rate was \$294 and Floyd County's average was \$256.

Alejandro Plastina, an ISU Extension economist who conducted the survey, said that there was considerable variability across counties in year-to-year changes, as is typical of survey data, but 91 out of the 99 Iowa counties experienced increases in average rents for corn and soybeans.

Only Des Moines, Jefferson,

Lucas, Muscatine, Van Buren, Wapello, Warren, and Woodbury Counties experienced declines in their overall average cash rents.

Besides typical rents for ground on corn and soybeans, the report also shows typical rents for alfalfa, grass hay, oats, pasture, corn stalk grazing, and hunting rights in each district.

Trojans blister softball in three wins

Turkey Valley coach also pleased with pitching trio in Upper Iowa sweep of Postville

Junior Hackman has been around sports his entire life, and he isn't quite sure he's ever been part of a game like the one that saw Turkey Valley and Kee High go toe-to-toe for seven innings last Wednesday before the Trojans finally pulled out a 19-15 win.

"It was a 2 1/2-hour softball game, and that's long — really, really long," he said. "I think those girls wore out the coaches. We did a lot of pacing, changing pitchers and trying to figure out a way to get the other team out."

But that game was part of a past week that Hackman hopes is the "turnaround" for his Trojans, who started the season 0-8 but have now won four of their last six games. After beating Kee 19-15, Turkey Valley dropped the nightcap 12-6 last Wednesday and then was throttled by a solid Riceville club 12-0 on Thursday.

But the Trojans rebounded in a big way this past Monday night when they swept a doubleheader from Postville, winning the opener 16-2 and then claiming the second game 18-2. "I hope last night helped build up our confidence," Hackman said. "We came out and really hit the ball, and I liked what I saw from all three pitchers we threw. I was happy with all of them. I'm hoping we're turning this around."

That Kee game, thought, was something else.

The Hawks jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the first inning before Turkey Valley scored five in the bottom half of the frame and added six more in the second to take an 11-4 lead. Kee responded with a seven-spot in the third and added three more in the fourth to take a 14-11 lead.

Back came Turkey Valley as the Trojans scored five in the fifth and pushed across three more in the sixth to pull away for the win.

"I liked that game because I felt, at the plate at least, we were very patient," Hackman said, referring to the 16 walks Turkey Valley took. Not that the Trojans didn't hit the ball as Clare Courtney had a double and Maici Weber added a home run to pace an attack that produced nine hits.

In the nightcap, Courtney and Alison Leibold each dou-

bled while Olivia Snyder smacked a home run, but Kee cooled off the Trojans enough to salvage a split.

After having its bats silenced against Riceville — Maici Weber was the lone Turkey Valley player to come up with a hit — the Trojans had a power surge Monday at Postville, cranking out 10 extra-base hits in the doubleheader.

In the opener, Jacqlyn Schmitt had two doubles, Weber and Snyder had one apiece and Courtney tripled. In the second game, Leibold smacked three doubles and drove in seven runs while Abigail Schmitt also had a two-bagger while Weber contributed a triple.

But it was the work done by the Webers — Maici and Halle — and Sierra Morris that had Hackman especially pleased. Maici Weber got the win in the opener and all three pitchers took the circle for an inning each in the second game and threw a combined one-hitter with seven strikeouts and just two walks.

"We're getting there, I think," Hackman said. "We're definitely playing better than we did at the start of the season and hopefully we can build some momentum."

Turkey Valley played at Central Elkader Wednesday night and then has a couple of days off before heading to New Hampton for a Saturday tournament that, in addition to the Chickasaws, includes Denver and Nashua-Plainfield.

New Hampton misses out on E-League title by one target

over, and it's always tough to say goodbye to kids who have represented our team, our school and our community so well."

New Hampton is one of the pioneering northeast Iowa teams in 2006 that first competed in the sport that is not yet sanctioned. That means the final trap meet of the season at Cedar Falls allows all participants that wish to compete at state. There is no qualifying round.

And New Hampton shot well — very well, Matthews said.

"Unfortunately, we were almost perfect at a meet where perfection was needed to bring home hardware," Matthews said. "I can't fault our effort. I mean if you look at our state score — (a 958) — that's a pretty dang good score. No, that's a great score."

But it wasn't quite enough as New Hampton finished 22nd in the final team standings as Ankeny Centennial put up a 984.

"That's a mind blowing score," Matthews said, "but we had a great season with a great group of kids."

To give an outsider an idea of how talented and successful New Hampton is — there were 129 teams that competed over the course of the regular season to see who would nab the first-place trophy in the E-League standings. Thousands of shooters enter into the three-day state event that featured over 800 competitors on Friday and culminates the season.

So that means New Hampton was in the top one percent of the state when it comes to E-League — which is a compilation of the regular season that tallies up the four best scores at a meet from a team's five-best shooters.

Pleasant Valley and Wilton tied as co-champs in the E-League standings with identical scores of 995. New Hampton was third with a 994.

"Isn't it always just one tar-

get? The last three years it's been just one target," said NH junior Rickey Pauley about the razor-thin margin to determine an E-League champ.

Pauley, like many of his New Hampton teammates, is more comfortable out on the range this year at Cedar Falls — where the Chickasaws compete at during several meets in the regular season. Pauley improved from last year at state as he fired a 185.

State competitors fire 100 rounds at clay-pigeon targets that rocket out from trap houses in the morning and finish with another 100 during the afternoon.

"I felt more calm, more relaxed. I didn't have so much anxiety this year," said Pauley. "I think it's more experience."

The weather was almost pristine on Friday — with a slight breeze, sunny sky and temps in the low 80s in the afternoon.

That pleasant climate condition was in stark contrast to last year's state meet.

"The weather's a lot different. Last year it was cold and rainy," said Hunter Humpal, the son of assistant coach Chad Humpal.

Chickasaw senior Layne Nehl gave his take on the inclement weather last spring that drenched fans and all competitors at state — at least early on.

"Last year it downpoured on us and then it was humid," said Nehl.

Two of New Hampton's top dogs — junior Ethan Swehla and Nehl — were part of a select group of just 16 individuals in the entire state that fired a bare minimum of four perfect 50-round scores this year during the regular season.

That means the sport is not only growing by leaps and bounds, but the state's best are getting better. The state meet's entrant total has risen each year. Swehla said there were just six perfect 200 E-League individual scores last year.

"It's way harder this year. The competition's stacked," said Swehla. "A couple years

ago there was only a couple perfect 200s. If you had a perfect 200 you were placing for sure."

Swehla came up with one of those perfect 50 rounds on Friday. He finished with a 196.

"We were one behind for trying for first this year," said Swehla about the E-League standings. "It really hurts. That's how crazy close it was."

While Nehl wasn't all that happy about how he performed at state on Friday, he was able to put into perspective just how great of a season it was for him personally and his Chickasaws.

"If you don't shoot good your first 100, it's gonna drag. It breaks you down mentally," said Nehl. "I had a good comeback and I met my goal in E-League. That last week of E-League we gained a lot of targets. It was pretty impressive what we put up."

Of course having success and maintaining it doesn't happen overnight. That ability to rise to the top of the ranks in any profession takes plenty of hard work and dedication from a slew of contributors that offer up their time and energy. As the saying goes, it takes a village.

"The businesses in our community that support us, individuals — all the alumni of this program — you couldn't ask for better support," said Matthews. "From my standpoint, you couldn't have a better group of kids. It's an awesome group of coaches to help. I'm the one that gets all the interview time, but there's a lot of people it takes to make this thing all work."

The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) serves as the state advisor for the SCTP. There were over 4,000 young adults that competed in the sport of trapshooting in 2022 in Iowa. There has been talk of adding another day to the state meet according to one DNR official.

The memories and bonds created in the sport of trap for NH's nine seniors — Josie Fuerstenberg, Teigen Howe, Joshua Scott, Daniel Orthaus,

Nehl, Tanner Njus, Kendra Pickar, Jaiden Fettkether and Noah Eichenberger — will be cherished for quite awhile.

"Some of those are friendships that will last for a long time," said Matthews.

And despite being blanketed at state, New Hampton still brought home plenty of hardware in 2023.

In addition to the E-League senior division third-place trophy, New Hampton also was third in the E-League intermediate (junior high) entry level division.

Those junior high kids, competing for the first time in 2023, also brought home some individual awards as Wyatt Schwickerath was first in the boys standings while Jackson Kellogg was fourth. In the intermediate enrgy level girls division, Harper Humpal was second while Danielle Ellingson was third.

And the New Hampton quintet of Schwickerath, Jaylen Shekleton, Ellingson, Carter Dreckman and Kellogg finished fourth at the state meet with a score of 859 — 16 shots back of champion Alta-Aurelia.

"Those kids had a great first year," Matthews said. "We couldn't have asked for a better intermediate team to start with."

Carter Stochl and Mya Anderson of New Hampton placed third in 2017.

Seven out of the top 10 teams all came from northern Iowa as Clear Lake was crowned the champion in 1A with the pairing of Meghan DeLong and Elijah Anderson (76). Sumner-Fredericksburg's Chloe Bolte and Jaymison Howard (78) finished second. Clear Lake rounded out the top three with the tandem of Rebecca DeLong and Taylor Plagge (78), who carded their score for a third-place finish.

Dahl and Shawver finished a stroke better than Grundy Center's Abby Lindeman and Judd Jirvosky (82), who finished 10th. Each of the Spartans' linksters won the individual state titles on the girls and boys side in Class 1A. Grundy

"I'm just really proud of the way both teams played," said Olson. "It's a tough format. They both played really good, really solid golf."

The coed state golf meet is capped at 68 pairings and is an alternate-shot format. The girls teed off on odd-numbered holes and the boys on even.

"Then it's on every other shot until you hole it out," said Olson.

Olson led New Hampton to its sixth-consecutive state tournament last month. New Hampton placed third in Class 2A at the American Legion Golf Course in Marshalltown.

Nuss and Dahl were named first team all-state by the Iowa High School Golf Coaches Association (IHGCA). Nuss earned first team all-tournament at the state meet with a sixth-place finish.

The New Hampton boys squad qualified for district competition at Fox Ridge Golf Course in Dike. The Chickasaws placed ninth as a team.

Olson said the front nine at Cedar Pointe has a traditional, albeit tight layout and the back nine is a links-style, wide-open course that runs through a housing development.

Olson said more than likely New Hampton's two teams that played at the state coed meet in 2023 will be back next year in an attempt to place even higher at the final golf meet of the season.

"They're going to get three years to play together now," said Olson about Ewert and Nuss. "Hopefully both can improve on where they were at."

a stretch quite like this one. I'm just so dang proud of our guys. They have really fought hard, really hung in there through a lot of different things. Like you said last week, we're a M*A*S*H* unit, yet here we are."

And that's in the hunt for their first NEIC title since 2019. Waverly-Shell Rock leads the conference with a 9-3 mark, Decorah is at 8-4 and New Hampton is 7-5 in league games.

The Chickasaws may not be doing it with mirrors, but then again ... two pitchers with zero varsity experience — Aiden Roberson and Talyn Bohaty — started key NEIC games last week. And New Hampton won them both.

"What's that say about these guys? I'll tell you what it says," McDonald said. "They play baseball hard. I can go up and down the last week and give you an example after example. Heck, we were down 5-1 to Waverly last night and we fight back. Maybe we didn't win that game, but it shows you they don't know the meaning of quit."

It was a whirlwind several days for New Hampton.

Start with the Turkey Valley game in which Eckley tossed a two-hitter — striking out 10 and walking four — and Bohaty and Kael Meyers both hit homers.

The following night, Roberson gave his coach five strong innings on the mound and Gannon Shekleton finished off a 7-6 win that included a Shekleton home run and two RBIs from Meyer.

After dropping the nightcap 13-6 to the Go-Hawks, New Hampton regrouped. Bohaty gave up just one earned run in 2 2/3 innings while Ty Robinson and Braden McShane were masterful in relief before Eckley's double scored pinch-runner Tate Schwickerath to give the Chickasaws a walkoff win. Robinson pitched 3 1/3 innings of hitless relief, and McShane got the win with a 1-2-3 seventh.

But New Hampton's bats — save for a homer from Eckley — went silent in the nightcap, and the Chickasaws had to settle for a split.

"We've won a lot of first games, and we've got to find a way to buckle down and start getting sweeps," Eckley said. "We know we're capable. We just got to figure out how to get it done."

The Chickasaws came close on Monday, but once again had to settle for one up and one down.

Aiden Roberson's two-run triple staked New Hampton to a 2-0 lead in the opener against Waverly-Shell Rock, but the Chickasaws uncharacteristically gave the Go-Hawks seven unearned runs to keep the game close, but a strong relief performance by McShane — two hits and one earned run in 2 1/3 innings — proved to be the difference.

But the nightcap bugaboo hit New Hampton again; in fact, Waverly-Shell Rock jumped out to a 5-1 lead after two innings before the Chickasaws battled back. When Evan Knowlton singled home a run, New Hampton had fought all the way back to tie the game at 9.

seniors — both on and off the field but especially when it comes to the latter.

"Those were really two quality wins for us," Hofmeister said. "We pitched well and we hit well. Extra-base hits in softball are huge, and we're starting to show a little power."

They certainly did in Plainfield, where Cora Schwickerath and Geerts both doubled while Geerts, Eggerichs and Caycee Crawford all homered in a 24-7 rout of the Huskies.

"That was the first homer I've ever hit," Eggerichs said. "I've had some in practice but not in a game. ... I knew when I hit it, I really did, and I was super pumped."

But the Chickasaws' three-game win streak came to an end on Friday in a 5-4 loss to the Go-Hawks. Down 4-0, New Hampton got RBI singles from Geerts and Rosonke that sparked a four-run sixth inning, but the Go-Hawks answered with a run in the seventh to pull out the win.

Monday's outcome wasn't much better despite an outstanding pitching performance by freshman Chloe Weigel, who gave up just four hits, struck out 10 and walked one, but South Winneshiek pushed a run across in the top of the third inning that held up as the game-winner.

"You're going to have nights like that in this sport," Hofmeister said, "where it's just tough to come up with hits when you really need. We just have to get back to playing like we did last week. The effort's certainly there, now we need to make it pay off."

New Hampton will travel to Decorah on Friday for a single NEIC game before hosting its tournament on Saturday. The Chickasaws will play Nashua-Plainfield at 9, take on Turkey Valley at 11 and close out the tournament with a game against Denver at 1 p.m.
