Wastewater plant cost goes up

Council learns price hike after approving final reading of sewer, water rate hikes

It was news that shocked New Hampton Public Works Director Casey Mai, and if the stunned looks on the faces of City Council members Monday night were any indication, it was just as stunning to city leaders.

During the "other business" portion at the end of Monday's meeting, Mai

told council members that during a third design meeting for the city's new wastewater treatment plant last week, engineers for the project said based on recent projects around the state, they were revising their "cost opinion."

Instead of the \$28.3 million they estimated two years ago, they told Mai the cost could be more than \$40 million to build the new plant that is being mandated by the Iowa Department of

Natural Resources so that the city's plant can meet federal nutrient reduction standards.

"My stomach dropped to the floor that day," Mai said, "and I haven't felt good since then. We explored what we can take out, but honestly, it's not much. ... This is obviously preliminary, and we knew the cost would probably go up, but this was a shocker. We're going to keep working on it."

He said he wanted to give the council a "heads-up," and that he would share details and more information during the council's July meetings.

Mai's news came less than an hour after the City Council unanimously approved the third and final reading of an ordinance that will substan-

tially raise water and sewer rates in the city, beginning on July 1.

The additional funds will be used

Insurance top issue at final meeting for superintendent

In rare 3-2 vote, School Board agrees to take part in pool to minimize 1% deductible risk

The New Hampton School Board bade its longtime superintendent farewell on Monday during a meeting in which insurance was the hot topic of conversation.

The meeting was the final one for Superintendent Jay Jurrens, who is retiring at the end of the month after serving as the district's top administrator for the past 13 years, and board members thanked Jurrens for, as Board President Jay Matthews put it, "your excellent guidance for not only our school district but for us as board members."

And while the meeting ended on a high note, board members and Jurrens had plenty of work to do, most notably when it came to insurance issues.

Board members approved spending \$512,055 to renew the district's property and casualty insurance and spent a considerable amount of time discussing signing a 28E agreement that will provide what board member Nate Schwickerath said looked like "a self insurance kind of deal."

Jurrens explained that two years ago, the


And then at 9:37 Saturday night — Zweibohmer documented the time — the heavens literally opened and delivered an absolute downpour.

Supervisors look like they'll check the 'TIF box' in December

Board members spend considerable amount of time discussing projects but leaning toward moving County Engineer's Office

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors appears headed to "check the box" on using tax-increment financing (TIF) to fund projects in the county.

Supervisors spoke out in favor of declaring that the county will use TIF revenue generated by the Chickasaw Wind Farm. If the county wants to use TIF dollars next year, it must make that known by Dec. 1.

If the board doesn't meet that deadline, the increased tax revenue from

the 66 wind turbines will go to taxing entities that includes the wind farm.

"We have to have these discussions out there," Board Chairman Jake Hackman said, "and government works quote, slow, quote, so it's important that we talk about it."

"I'd like us to push ahead with TIF,"

Supervisor Scott Cerwinski. "I think it's a great tool to get our infrastructure updated."

"I'll get back to you on that," Hackman said. "I think I'm with you on some projects."

"That's kind of where I am," Supervisor Travis Suckow said. "Some

projects, yeah; some projects, ahhh, I'm not sure."

And although the five supervisors reached a relatively quick consensus to capture about \$363,000 in TIF funds during the 2026-27 fiscal year, they

You have what you need in Jesus

Our Savior paid for our sins on the cross so we can reconcile with God

"You are perfect just the way you are." "You are enough." "Nothing can stop you from succeeding."

As statements meant to boost self-esteem, these are effective. Everybody likes to hear that he or she has great potential and is destined for great achievements.

But as theological or spiritual maxims, these statements are problematic. God's holy law does not cast us in such a glowing light.

God's law tells us that we are not perfect just the way we are. We are not enough to stand

before Him. Our sin stops us from being successful in everything we do.

Romans 3:22-23 sums up our condition in one statement: "For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." This passage tells us clearly that we cannot reach perfection or get ourselves to heaven. That is the message of God's law.

But God has another message for us — the Gospel message, His good news of salvation for everybody. Romans 3 continues with these words for all who have sinned and fallen short:

they "are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus."

We are not perfect just the way we are, so Jesus perfectly kept God's law for us. We are not enough, so Jesus became our Substitute; He paid for our sins on the cross, so we would be reconciled with the holy God.

We could not be successful in getting ourselves to heaven, so Jesus won the victory over death for us by His resurrection.

Now it can be said of all who trust in Him: "You are perfect in Christ Jesus." "You are

enough in Christ Jesus." "Nothing can stop you from succeeding in Christ Jesus." Thanks be to God for His gift of grace!

Changes coming to Good Shepherd Cluster

Father Jim Goerend, who has served as pastor of St. Boniface, Holy Family and Immaculate Conception parishes will soon be departing after being reassigned by the Archdiocese of Dubuque. On July 1, Goerend will take over as the pastor at St. Francis Parish in Barclay, and St. Athanasius Parish in Jesup after serving the Good Shepherd Cluster for the past three years. Goerend also served as the pastoral coordinator of St. John School of Religion and was the dean of the New Hampton Deanery while at Good Shepherd.

He will replaced by Father Christopher Podhajsky, whose present assignments include pastor of the Basilica of St. Francis Xavier in Dyersville and St. Paul Parish in Worthington, as well as the pastoral coordinator for St. Francis Xavier School and Beckman Catholic High School in Dyersville.

Also included in the latest round of official appointments for the archdiocese is the retirement of Father Mark Osterhaus, who served as pastor for the Good Shepherd Cluster parishes for six years in the 2010s. Osterhaus most recently served as the pastor of St. Matthias Parish in Cascade, Sacred Heart Parish in Fillmore, St. Patrick Parish in Garryowen and St. Peter Parish in Temple Hill.

Steps to take following a job loss

Perhaps you've heard the expression: "Life is what happens when you're busy making other plans." It's certainly true about an unexpected job loss. And it may cause stress over your financial situation. Here are a handful of steps you can take shortly after the loss of employment to help put yourself in the best financial position. Some of these are time-sensitive, so the sooner you act, the better.

File for unemployment — While unemployment insurance typically covers less than half of your previous paycheck, it can provide some financial relief — generally up to 26 weeks. Since filing a claim can be time-consuming, file immediately so payments begin as soon as possible. There are eligibility requirements, including your unemployment being involuntary and through no fault of your own, and meeting your state's time worked and wage requirements. You can learn more about your state's unemployment insurance program online.

• Adjust your budget and spending — You'll likely require some changes to your budget, at least temporarily. Try to focus on the essentials, like housing, utilities and food, and see where you can cut costs — or find cheaper alternatives — on non-essentials, like coffee shops and entertainment. If you're saving for longer-term goals, like retirement or college, you may want to pause those contributions temporarily.

• Evaluate other sources of income — In addition to any severance and unemployment payments, you can consider cashing in emergency or other savings and investment accounts. You could look for part-time work, which generally does not affect your unemployment insurance income as long as you're earning less than your unemployment benefits. Other possibilities are cashing in the value of insurance policies or annuities outside of surrender charge periods, accessing retirement accounts early, selling investments without taxable gains and borrowing money. Be aware that some of these options come with tax implications and fees. A financial advisor can help you navigate the trade-offs.

- Understand your HSA and FSA options — You'll want to get the maximum benefit from your flexible spending account (FSA) and health savings account (HSA). The funds in an FSA are subject to a "use-it-or-lose-it" rule, generally within 60 days from termination. Consult your Summary Plan Description to understand how your FSA works and how to use your funds. Your HSA is yours to keep after leaving a company, and there's no deadline to use the funds. While you typically can't pay health insurance premiums from an HSA, there are exceptions for

COBRA premiums and some other health insurance premiums if you're receiving federal or state unemployment benefits. Your plan administrator can help guide you.

• Ensure you have health insurance coverage — Find out if your health benefits continue for any period and what is included. You generally can extend your employer's coverage up to 18 months under COBRA, though it's often expensive because you are liable for all monthly premiums. Joining your spouse's or partner's workplace plan could be an option, but you may only have 30 days to enroll. You can also look for coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace, a function of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), where lower-income households may qualify for subsidies. Learn more about ACA coverage at healthcare.gov.

Whether your next step is moving into early retirement or finding new employment, working through these steps may help you feel more confident in your financial position and more prepared to take on whatever comes next.

The session will provide a candid look at how traffickers operate—especially how they target our youth—and what trafficking looks like locally. With the right knowledge, we can make our communities safer.





Supervisors have lengthy TIF discussion**SUPERVISORS: FROM 1**

spent more than an hour talking about possible projects that could be paid for by TIF.

In the end, while there appeared to be agreement among most of the supervisors to build a new office for the county engineer at the main shop of the Secondary Roads Department, the discussion was wide-ranging.

When the county's TIF Committee first made recommendations on how to use TIF funds last year, the first project recommended was going to be a new storage building for the Chickasaw County Conservation Board, but as experts point out, urban-renewal plans are ever changing.

Hackman said that, as of now, the Conservation Board would rather not put up a new building on the site of the old landfill because of a lack of water and other utilities.

Board members then discussed having the County Engineer's Office move from the courthouse to the shop that is located at 1990 Mission Ave. One of the recommendations from the committee was to spend up to \$1.6 million to undertake improvements and/or construct replacement buildings at the shop.

"I personally think it would be beneficial to have our office located with our department," County Engineer Roman Lensing said. "I believe I'm the only department head not under the same roof or on the same parcel as their employees. We have a fairly big department. I think it would help efficiencies out there."

Supervisor Issac Carter, though, said he wasn't sure he could support having the county construct another building when so many believe the county already has too many buildings and that it should sell at least one or two of them.

Still, although no final decisions were made on Monday, the remainder of the board seemed to like the idea of kicking off the TIF projects at the county shop.

Among the other projects recommended by the TIF Committee last fall were \$9.59 million for road projects for work on V18 from the south city limits of Alta Vista to the Chickasaw County line, reconstruction of North Linn and South Linn and two bridge replacements—one on 170th Street and one on B57 and using up to \$20 million for the renovation of the current Sheriff's Office building and the construction of an adjacent new 24-hour holding facility.

CITY OF NEW HAMPTON ORDINANCE NO. 901 SUMMARY ORDINANCE AMENDING SEWER AND WATER RATES AND INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION FEES

SECTION 1: SEWER SERVICE CHARGES REQUIRED, Section 99.01 of the City Code is repealed, and the following is adopted in lieu thereof:

SEWER SERVICE CHARGES REQUIRED. Each residential and commercial/industrial contributor shall pay a sewer rental based on the amount of water used by said contributor in accordance with the following schedule:

A. Each contributor shall pay a fee for a minimum of 1,000 gallons regardless of usage per month as follows:

1) Effective July 1, 2025, \$3.03 per 1,000 gallons used; and

2) Commencing July 1, 2026, \$3.12 per 1,000 gallons used; and

3) Commencing July 1, 2027, \$3.21 per 1,000 gallons used; and

4) Commencing July 1, 2028, \$3.31 per 1,000 gallons used; and

5) Commencing July 1, 2029, \$3.41 per 1,000 gallons used.

B. Water Service Fee. Effective July 1, 2025, in addition to the water usage rates provided for in Section 92.02 of the City Code, each residential dwelling unit and commercial/industrial user, as defined in the City's Zoning Ordinance, shall pay a water service fee in accordance with the following schedule:

1) Effective July 1, 2025, each user shall pay a \$12.00 per month basic service fee.

C. The rate per 1,000 gallons used and the water service fee will increase 3.0% per year annually thereafter, unless changed by resolution of the council.

SECTION 2. INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE. Section 92.03 of the City Code is repealed, and the following is adopted in lieu thereof:

INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE. In addition to the rates for water and sewer services provided for elsewhere in Chapter 92 & 99 of the City Code, each residential dwelling unit and commercial/industrial contributor, as defined in the City's Zoning Ordinance, shall pay the amended monthly fee for the maintenance, improvement, and operation of the City's infrastructure. Effective July 1, 2025, the infrastructure maintenance and operation fee shall be as follows:

A. Road Maintenance, Equipment, & Stormwater Infrastructure - \$12.00 per residential user and \$15 per commercial/industrial user.

B. Sewer Service Fee. Effective July 1, 2025, in addition to the water usage rates provided for in Section 92.02 of the City Code, each residential dwelling unit and commercial/industrial user, as defined in the City's Zoning Ordinance, shall pay a water service fee in accordance with the following schedule:

1) Effective July 1, 2025, \$25.00 per residential user and \$49.00 per commercial/industrial user; and

(b) Commencing July 1, 2026, \$29.00 per residential user and \$58.00 per commercial/industrial user; and





Extra work pays off for Chickasaw batters

freshman Carson Laures combined on a five-hitter in an 11-1 win before Braxton Bundy picked up a complete win in a 5-1 victory over Central Springs later that night;

And on Friday, freshman Drew Kipp got his first varsity win as he gave up three hits, walked three and struck out six in 5 2/3 innings during a 6-4 win over Turkey Valley while another freshman, Kye Rausch, pitched the final 1 1/3 innings to seal the Chickasaws' third victory over the Trojans this season.

All told, New Hampton has used 13 pitchers this year, and despite only having Eckley and Rochford on the mound for 28 2/3 innings, the Chickasaws have posted a sparkling 2.04 earned-run average.

Not that pitching has been the only story for New Hampton this season.

Chickasaws get back on track

New Hampton's pitching staff shines despite losing top two hurlers to injuries

New Hampton, if you will, righted the ship this past week on the baseball diamond.

After dropping its third straight Northeast Iowa Conference game last Tuesday evening, the Chickasaws got a brilliant pitching performance from senior Landon Marr to beat Waukon 9-1 and salvage a split of the league doubleheader and then went on to post three solid non-conference victories.

That gave the Chickasaws a 16-3 overall record and 5-3 NEIC mark, and at the start of the week, those 16 wins were the most recorded by any Class 2A team in the state.

And New Hampton's doing it short-handed, too, as its top two pitchers — Jaxon Eckley and Caden Rochford — remain on the shelf, at least when it comes to mound duty, because of injuries.

"I guess what I don't think a lot of people realize is that we've played half our season without our No. 1 and No. 2 pitchers," New Hampton coach Cory McDonald said, "and I'm not sure most schools could be able to pull off what these boys are pulling off."

And it's affected every hurler — from the JV to the JV to the varsity pitchers — on the Chickasaw roster.

"We've had to shift everyone up in the rotation," he said. "It's affected everybody in our rotation, all the way down to our eighth-graders. ... I'm incredibly proud of all of our pitchers — from eighth grade to 12th grade — because we're asking them to do more than they were expected to do at the beginning of the season and they have performed outstanding."

Marr certainly was dazzling in that nightcap against Waukon as the senior tossed a one-hitter while striking out seven and walking just two, and he started a parade of excellent pitching for the Chickasaws.

Against Nashua-Plainfield in a game that started on Wednesday, was suspended because of lightning and resumed on Thursday, senior Tate Schwickerath and


