LOST vote key to city's budget

New Hampton asking voters to approve using fund for ambulance expenses

When New Hampton voters head to the polls in November, they'll have a slew of candidates to choose from, but they will also answer a question that could have serious ramifications for both city services and employees.

Voters in the city will be asked if they will agree to allow the city to use

local-option sales tax (LOST) dollars to fund ambulance service expenses, and if voters don't agree, city leaders say the city's ambulance funding will have to come out of its \$1.924 million general fund.

And because the city agreed to pay \$362,000 a year to join the new county-owned ambulance service, that would mean the rest of the city's budget would have to be reduced by 18

percent.

"It would be very, very hard on our general fund," City Clerk Karen Clemens said. "It would affect everyone — police, fire, parks and rec, library, the city clerk's office, every single city department would feel it."

Those pushing for the ballot measure say that if it fails, the city would in all likelihood have to cut staff and services and that even vital city services

would be negatively impacted.

To educate

voters, a committee of four residents, including Mayor Bobby Schwickerath, will hold three community meetings in coming weeks to help voters understand why the ballot measure is needed.

Those meetings will be held on Wednesday, Oct. 5; Thursday, Oct.

20; and Wednesday, Nov. 2, at the New Hampton Community Center, and all three will run from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

Supervisors make some EMS progress

Board hires medical director, moves ahead with plans to officially create department

In a Monday morning meeting where the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors discussed the county's new ambulance at length, county leaders spent the bulk of time discussing the possible purchase of used equipment from the owner of the current ambulance service.

In the end, they said no — at least figuratively — but supervisors did move forward on two decisions — hiring a pair of medical directors for what will be called Chickasaw County EMS and also moving ahead with setting up an EMS department.

Start with the medical directors for the service that is scheduled to begin operation on Jan. 1 and will provide ser-

vice not only to rural residents in the county but also to the cities of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

Board members unanimously voted to appoint Dr. Lucas Brinkman of Fredericksburg as the medical director and Dr. Jack Kline of New Hampton as the deputy medical director. Both will be unpaid positions.

"Both are willing to do it," said Chickasaw County EMS Advisory Council member Bridget Edson, "and to us, it's a positive to have two."

Board members also voted 5-0 to hold a public hearing on Sept. 26 to offer residents to comment on the ordinance that would allow the county to start a "department to provide

County will not share ARPA funds with cities

Supervisors vote 3-2 to reject giving Nashua and Alta Vista \$100,000 apiece for ambulance

Neither Nashua nor Alta Vista will receive any money from Chickasaw County's American Rescue Plan Act funds, thanks to a 3-2 vote during Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting.

Supervisor Jake Hackman pushed for giving some of the county's ARPA funds to the two cities that decided against joining the new county-owned ambulance service.

"I believe it should be used for the betterment of all county citizens," Hackman said. "To me, it's the right thing to do."

The question of sharing some of the county's \$2.3 million in ARPA funds was brought up by Board of Supervisors candidate Scott Cerwinski during a meeting last week. Cerwinski is

the lone candidate on the ballot for the District 2 seat, which includes the city of Nashua.

The county will receive \$2.318 million in ARPA funding, and it has committed only about \$200,000 to various projects, which means it has a little more than \$2.2 million to spend. Much of that, supervisors have indicated, will be used for start-up costs for the county-owned ambulance service.

"My thought is those cities had the option of going in on this," Board Chairman Matt Kuhn said, "and they chose not to. If we spent \$2.3 million on secondary roads equipment, hypothetically would the cities still receive money because we're going to use that money on secondary roads?"

“I want to emphasize that not a dime of city money is going into this,” Clemens said, “but as a group, we want to make sure people understand what happens if it passes and what happens if it doesn’t.”

The city receives about \$500,000 a year in LOST revenue, and currently, all that money is used for infrastructure — water, sewer, storm sewer and roads — but if voters approve the measure on Nov. 8, the city will use LOST to pay for ambulance service, with the balance being used for infrastructure.

the Class 2A 145-pound state championship, he could have sworn he was in New Hampton and not inside Veterans Auditorium in Des Moines.

“The sheer number of New Hampton fans on the matside section,” Speltz said, “made it feel like it could have been a home dual meet.”

Speltz not only had an outstanding prep career in wrestling — winning a pair of sectional and district titles and claiming a NEIC crown, in addition to his state title — he was an outstanding all-around athlete.

He was a first-team all-NEIC football player who was the Chickasaws’ MVP in 1988 and an all-state honorable mention selection a year later.

Today, Speltz, who wrestled and graduated from Iowa State University, is the bureau chief of the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals, Food and Consumer Safety Bureau.

He and his wife, Beth, have two sons — Jake and Ethan — as well as a daughter-in-law, Emily Dux Speltz.

Speltz thanked his coaches, teammates and the entire New Hampton Community for his success, and said he appreciates the support of his wife and two sons.

“Jake and Ethan ... furthered my love of wrestling by allowing me to teach and coach them and become their biggest fan.”

Raelyn (Webster) Rouser

There are few female athletes in New Hampton with a resume quite like Raelyn

Webster, a 2013 graduate who earned 15 letters while competing in softball, basketball, track and cross country for the Chickasaws.

She was an all-state softball player her senior year and was named to the all-NEIC team three times. In basketball, she earned all-conference honors three times. On the track, she helped the Chickasaws to two state meet medal-winning relay runs, and in cross country, she was a two-time all-NEIC finisher.

And she was a star in the classroom as well — earning academic all-state honors in three different sports.

Ask her about her favorite memory, though, and it’s the final season she wore the red and black for New Hampton.

“The 2013 softball season was my final sports season, but it also included one of the most selfless team atmospheres and the on-field results reflected that.”

Did they ever.

The Chickasaws caught fire midway through the season, winning 17 straight games, including an upset of Mid-Prairie in the first round of the Class 3A state tournament, where New Hampton finished fourth.

“We had so much fun playing that season,” she said, “and I took away lessons on leadership and teamwork that I still lean on today.”

A graduate of the University of Iowa, today she is married to Cody Rouser and lives in the Twin Cities, where she works as a financial analyst at Land O’ Lakes.

Alec Zwanziger

Back in the summer of 2012, New Hampton baseball coach Cory McDonald was asked to describe Alec Zwanziger, the Chickasaws’ senior catcher.

“He just looks like a baseball player,” McDonald said. “He lives and breathes it, and I like to think I’m competitive, but Alec is the kind of kid who would run over his mother if it meant winning a game.”

A three-year starter for the Chickasaws, Zwanziger had one of the greatest senior seasons in New Hampton history — recording a .457 batting average and an on-base percentage of .598, while hitting 16 doubles, two triples and a home run. He also stole 23 bases and threw out 8 of the 16 runners that tried to steal a base against him.

Yet, ask him about his favorite memory as a Chickasaw and it comes several years later.

“Having the to chance to give back and coach for the Chickasaws alongside coach McDonald for three summers provided countless memories and relationships that I will cherish forever.”

After graduating from New Hampton, Zwanziger attended Coe College, where he played baseball and helped Coe to the Iowa Conference tournament title in 2015.

It was at Coe where he met Mallory McArtor, a standout softball player for the Kohawks, and today, the couple lives in Decorah, where Alec works full-time for the Iowa Army National Guard, and the couple is raising their 2-year-old son, Crue.





Once again, it's the season for football games and back-to-school activities. And if you work for a medium-size or large employer, it will soon be open enrollment season — the time of year when you can review your employee benefits and make changes as needed. What areas should you focus on?

Actually, it's a good idea to pay close attention to all your benefits. Some of the offerings may have changed from last year — and you might have experienced changes in your own life, too, which might lead you to look for something different from your existing benefits package.

You may want to start with your health insurance. If you're satisfied with your coverage, and it's essentially the same as it's been, you may well want to stick with what you have. However, many employers are increasingly offering high-deductible health plans, which, as the name suggests, could entail more out-of-pocket costs for you. But high-deductible plans may also offer something of benefit: the ability to contribute to a health savings account (HSA). Your HSA contributions are made with pre-tax dollars, so they can reduce your taxable income for the year. Also, your earnings grow tax-free, and your withdrawals are tax-free, provided the money is used for qualified medical expenses. (Withdrawals taken before age 65 that aren't used for qualified medical expenses are taxable and subject to a 20% penalty; once you reach 65, the penalty no longer applies, although withdrawals are still taxable as income if not used for a qualified expense.)

Your next benefit to consider: Life insurance. Your employer may offer a group life insurance plan, but you'll want to evaluate whether it's sufficient for your needs, especially if you've experienced changes in your personal situation over the past year, such as getting married or adding a new child. There's no magic formula for

how much life insurance you need — you'll need to consider a variety of factors, such as your income, family size, mortgage and so on — but it may be necessary to supplement your employer's coverage with a private policy.

Your employer may also offer disability insurance as a benefit. Some employers' disability policies are fairly limited, covering only short periods of time, so you may want to consider a private policy.

Beyond the various insurance policies your employer may offer, you'll also want to closely look at your 401(k) or similar retirement plan. Typically, you can make changes to your 401(k) throughout the year, but it's important to make sure your investment selections and contribution amounts are still aligned with your risk tolerance and goals. Also, are you contributing enough to earn your employer's match, if one is offered? And if you've already receiving the match, can you still afford to put in more to your plan if such a move makes sense for you? Your employee benefits package can be a valuable part of your overall financial strategy. So, as open enrollment season proceeds, take a close look at what you already have, what's being offered, and what changes you need to make. It will be time well spent.

Big 4 Chamber of Commerce event faces challenges from Mother Nature, football

Corbin Johnson raised both hands on Saturday afternoon at Uncle G's Pavilion in Nashua.

Little did he know at the time — but with his sauced-covered fingers signifying how many chicken wings he had just consumed — he was a champion.

Johnson won the first-ever kid's wing-eating contest at the 6th Annual "Best Dam BBQ Challenge" put on by the Big 4 Chamber of Commerce on Saturday.

Johnson — a seventh-grader at Nashua-Plainfield Middle School — tied with sixth-grader Allison Miller of Nashua as they both finished six wings apiece. Johnson won the tiebreaker as judges claimed he consumed more meat off the bone-in wings than his female counterpart did.

Each thought the other had won, but Miller still was able to bring home an apron for second place. Johnson raised his hardware near the grandstands in admiration of his chicken-wing conquest.

"I got the trophy," said Johnson, his answer to what was the funnest part of trying to consume as many wings in the two-minute allotted time.


Johnson's advice to wing lovers that may want to enter a competitive-eating contest? Don't choke.

"Make sure to swallow when you eat fast," smiled Corbin.

There was just a single entrant in the main wing-eating contest — which has been taking place since Nashua first started the barbecue challenge in 2017.

That was just part of the celebration that took place on the Big 4 Fairgrounds amidst an overcast sky and sporadic rain that came down throughout the morning and into the afternoon.

Of course there was the actual

barbecue competition that brought nine teams to Nashua to see who would claim first place in categories like "everything bacon," chicken, wings and ribs. Val Johnson, President of the Big 4 Chamber of Commerce and who also happens to be Corbin's mother, handed out prizes for grand champion and reserve champion.

The teams vying for the top prizes that helped the local fundraiser for Nashua came from as far away as Oskaloosa. Those barbecuers hailed from southeast Iowa and were named Smokin' Suckers. There were other competitive entrants that hailed from Nashua, Charles City, Mason City and even Des Moines.

The turnout — well, it wasn't

as good as it's been in prior years. One has to remember the Iowa-Iowa State football game was also taking place the same time the challenge kicked into high gear.

The soggy and damp weather didn't rain on this Nashua barbecue "parade," though.

"It will have some effect. We are up against the Cy-Hawk game, too," said Val Johnson. "We do have it on in here."

The first three years the challenge was held during the Big 4 Fair.

Now it's held the week after the fair, which has worked out well according to Val.

Eating and tasting good food was the main order of the day.

Everyone in attendance did that and then some at Nashua's barbecue get-together that is still going strong.

"Having the BBQ as a separate event was something else to look forward to," said Johnson. "It brings another thing back to Nashua and it gives the town something to do for another weekend."

Judges tasted the delectable concoctions and made their picks as to who had the best dishes underneath the grandstand of the fairgrounds.

Val said she was able to have four certified judges this year. She reached out to local first responders to fill the gaps so there could be as many palates as possible to deem who was "the best of the best."

"We talk to our local heroes. Whether they're a EMT, a nurse or fire department," said Johnson.

This wasn't the worst weather the challenge has experienced. Val said it was either 2017 or 2018 when the rain came pouring down.

"The ladies that are in there judging. They were here that year. It was like walking around puddles just to get to people," said Johnson. "It was craziness. We got here at six o'clock in the morning and we sat in our vehicles for 45 minutes before we got out because it was raining that hard."

Flatland Ridge, a band out of Independence, hit a high note with classic rock tunes, country and pop that kept VIP-ticket holders entertained.

And of course, Miller had perhaps the best answer to a query on what her goal was for the day.

"To eat something. I was hungry," said Miller.

ORDINANCE NO. 128 AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE "CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IONIA, IOWA" BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Ionias, Iowa, that:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to published notice and following public hearing on the 1st day of August, 2022, so required by Sections 362.3 and 380.8, Code of Iowa, there is hereby adopted by the City of Ionias, Iowa, the "CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IONIA, IOWA."
SECTION 2. All of the provisions of the "CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IONIA, IOWA," shall be in force and effect on and after the effective date of this ordinance.
SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts thereof in force on the effective date of this ordinance are hereby repealed from and after the effective date of this ordinance, except as hereinafter provided.
SECTION 4. The repeal provided for in the preceding section of this ordinance shall not affect any offense or act committed or done or any penalty or forfeiture incurred or any contract or right established or accruing before the effective date of this ordinance; nor shall such repeal affect any ordinance or resolution promising or guaranteeing the payment of money by the City or authorizing the issuance of any bonds of said City or any evidence of said City's indebtedness or any contract or obligation assumed by said City; nor shall said repeal affect the administrative ordinances or resolutions of the Council not in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of "THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IONIA, IOWA"; nor shall it affect the following ordinances specifically saved from repeal: nor shall it affect any other right or franchise conferred by any ordinance or resolution of the Council or any other person or corporation; nor shall it affect any ordinance naming, establishing, relocating or vacating any street or public way, whether temporary or permanent; nor shall it affect any ordinance amending the official zoning map, establishing building lines, establishing and changing grades, or dedicating property for public use; nor shall it affect any prosecution, suit or other proceeding pending or any judgment rendered on or prior to the effective date of this ordinance.
SECTION 5. The following ordinances, passed subsequent to the preparation of this code but prior to adoption of this code, are hereby adopted and made a part of this code. Said ordinances shall be codified and incorporated in published copies of this code as supplements thereto following adoption of this ordinance.
SECTION 6. An official copy of the "CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IONIA, IOWA," adopted by this ordinance, including a certificate of the City Clerk as to its adoption and the effective date, is on file in the office of the City Clerk, and shall be kept available for public inspection.
SECTION 7. The City Clerk shall furnish a copy of the "CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF IONIA, IOWA," to the Judicial Magistrates serving the City of Ionias.
SECTION 8. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the publication of this ordinance, as required by law. Passed by the City Council of the City of Ionias, Iowa, the 1st day of August, 2022.

emergency medical services.” County Attorney David Laudner said that while he believes the county leaders can create the department by resolution, which would not require a public hearing, “I think the ordinance is the best avenue.”

He added that a number of ambulance decisions can be made through resolutions, but “think about it as a house. You need to build a basement and put the sidewalls up with an ordinance and then you do the shingling, the siding and decorate it with the resolutions. That needs to be done at some point, in my opinion.”

But when it came to equipment for the ambulances that the county has already ordered, supervisors made no decisions.

Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath offered to sell the county a variety of used equipment for \$42,970, and although the advisory council voted to remove some of those items from purchase, Edson said that she felt it was important that the county move forward.

“If we don’t purchase Jeremy’s equipment, we need to know today,” said Edson, who added that some new equipment is “12 weeks out” in the supply chain. “I’m trying to have as much equipment here as possible now. It’s good equipment. It works. I feel that public perception is important, too, that we’re being responsible.”

Emergency Management Agency Director Jeff Bernatz asked the board to hold off on purchasing ventilators — either new or used — because he is working on the possibility of

getting ventilators through the federal Homeland Security Department.

“I understand that,” McGrath said, “and if there is a chance to get them for free, I totally think that’s what you should do.”

McGrath said his calculations showed that the county would pay about 58 percent of the cost of new equipment.

“[The price] is so close to new, I don’t know why we wouldn’t go new if we can,” Supervisor Jason Byrne said. “We’re only talking \$10,000 to have new equipment.”

McGrath countered that Byrne’s figures were off, and Board Chairman Matt Kuhn said he figured the county would save a little less than \$12,000 by purchasing used equipment.

The discussion on purchasing equipment from McGrath dragged on for more than an hour, but in the end, despite Kuhn asking three times for a motion, no board member made that motion, effectively killing the deal.

And while supervisors also approved allowing the advisory council to start a Facebook page, as Edson pointed out, “get the word out about our service,” they received a push from their legal advisor.

“You guys have been talking budget amendment for six weeks now, and we still haven’t gotten anywhere,” Laudner said. “We’ve had the meetings the last six weeks and talked about, ‘We need a budget amendment, we need a budget amendment, we need a budget amendment’ and here we sit. We’re talking about \$45 CPAP machines and replaceables and looking up prices in the meeting. I think we need to focus on the large things here.”

Hackman said he understood Kuhn’s point, but reiterated that he felt the county should help the two cities with their ambulance situations. Nashua is exploring starting its own service or joining with Floyd County for EMS services while Alta Vista is going to contract with an ambulance service that will be stationed in Elma, a Howard County town that is located just 4.3 miles away.

Supervisor Jason Byrne pointed out that cities also received ARPA funds.

“They all received money, too, so are we asking for some of that money back from them? They have just as much as right their money as they want, it’s their money,” he said. “This is considered our money. They got their money in my book to help them out, and they could use their money anyway they wanted to, just like we can.”

Kuhn also wondered what happened if the two cities eventually join the county ambulance service, asking “then do they pay us back that ARPA money?”

Hackman, though, persisted, and at first said that the county could possibly look at using a “per-capita” formula to help the two cities that opted to strike out on their own. But in the end, he made a motion to give

each city \$100,000, despite the fact that Nashua has a population of 1,551 while Alta Vista’s population is just 233.

He also pointed out that if a rural resident near Alta Vista, for example, needed an ambulance, they should be able to use the service the city is using.

“I hope we can work together,” he said, “and serve our citizens of the rural part [of the county] with a closer rig.”

But New Hampton resident Terry Johnson expressed his opposition to sending any of the county’s ARPA funds to the two cities.

“Nashua got their ARPA money, [and this] doesn’t say you’re not going to service the rural area around Nashua,” Johnson said. “They’re the ones that opted out — not the rural area. So it’s like getting your cake and eating it, too. From the taxpayers’ standpoint, they got their money, you’re going to service the rural area so why give those two cities more money?”

Byrne added that “I think this is the most appropriate to help the most people in the county, doing it this way.”

And a majority of the board agreed as Kuhn and Steve Breitbach, whose district includes Alta Vista, voted with Byrne against the measure and just Hackman and Tim Zoll voted for it.

Mayor Taylor, Council Members

Day, Geerts, and Havner. Clerk Donna Geerts, Wastewater/Water Superintendent Jerry Heying, and Isaiah Corbin-INRCOG were in attendance. The Project was identified as a result of needs assessment, DNR requirements, and engineering reports and was discussed at numerous Ionia City Council meetings. The project was also addressed in an independent engineering report (facility plan) which was completed in February 2022. Low and Moderate Income (LMI) Needs were identified through a local income survey, conducted in July 2022. Said LMI percentage was determined to be 62.1 percent of persons in the community.

As identified in the engineer's facility plan, the proposed project will include controlled discharge lagoon improvements, lagoon control structures, pipe-work improvements, sludge removal, as well as sanitary sewer improvements including slip lining, manhole rehabilitation, and pipe repairs.

Funding sources: Estimate Budget
CDBG (Administration)..... \$ 30,000
State Revolving Loan Fund \$441,300
Total Est Cost of the Project \$667,300
Total requested amount of CDBG federal funds: \$226,000
Estimated portion of federal funds that will benefit persons of low and moderate income: \$500. The City has applied for \$663,300 in SRF (State Revolving Loan Fund) loan for this project which will be used as local match.

The project allows for new and expanded service to the low and moderate-income families in the region, including senior citizens and persons with fixed income.

Construction would begin in Spring 2023. Project is estimated to be completed by Fall 2024. No one is expected to be displaced by the CDBG activities. If there were anyone being displaced the city would follow the HUD Relocation and Displacement Policy. Project application will be submitted on or before

October 1, 2022.
Community Development and Housing Needs Assessment of Low- and Moderate-Income Persons:
Sanitary Sewer Improvements. City received notification from Iowa DNR that City would need to create a compliance strategy to take steps to address high levels of ammonia and concerns with E. Coli, repair of underground sanitary sewer main and lining of sewer mains to eliminate inflow and infiltration. (I/I).

Housing Rehabilitation. With a high percentage of low to moderate income residents within the community the City feels a need to encourage and help residents with improvements to their homes. Needed improvements include exterior maintenance needs, energy efficiency improvements, and accessibility enhancements Develop Trail Network. The City currently has limited recreational resources and the development of trails are becoming more popular. The potential for a local trail network that could in the future connect with a more regional trail would be a good community asset.

Other Community Development and Housing Needs:
Rehabilitation of Downtown Buildings. As part of a desire to see reinvestment in the City's downtown are, the City would like to see the restoration and rehabilitation of the existing buildings in the downtown area.

Library and City Park Improvements. The City's library and park needs improvements and some rehabilitation to ensure the long-term use of the facility and community park.

Planned or Potential Activities to Address Housing and Community Needs:
Sanitary Sewer Improvements: Apply for CDBG funds to match with funds provided by FEMA to replace pipe and structures at the existing 3-cell lagoon; and any necessary connections. Additionally, sewer rehabilitation work will occur throughout the City. This rehabilitation will utilize slip lining or other methods of pipe rehabilitation as

well as manhole rehabilitation with sanitary sewer collection system.
Housing Rehabilitation. Apply for funds to assist low-to-moderate income families who own their homes with rehabilitation.

Develop Trail Network and Library and City Park Improvement Committees. Work with residents and regional authorities to develop a plan for trails, library and park improvements in the City and regionally. Research and identify potential funding sources for expanding trails and improving library and park.

ORDINANCE NO. VII-3 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A GENERAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM IN CHICKASAW COUNTY, IOWA

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Iowa:
SECTION 1. POLICY FOR GENERAL ASSISTANCE

1. Iowa Code Chapter 252 imposes duties upon the counties of Iowa regarding County General Assistance (also referred to as General Relief). The Code directs the Board of Supervisors to provide assistance to poor persons lawfully in Chickasaw County, enables the Board of Supervisors to provide for the assistance of needy persons, and requires the establishment of general rules as deemed necessary to properly discharge the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors.

2. Pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 252, the Board of Supervisors hereby establishes a General Assistance Program for the benefit of poor and needy persons residing in Chickasaw County. General Assistance is a short-term emergency assistance program that is understood to be the "last resort" form of assistance, as applicants are expected to apply for and accept assistance from all other resources prior to receiving General Assistance. Financial limitations on personal income, personal resources, and property ownership and other eligibility requirements for the General Assistance Program as well as the amounts and duration of General Assistance, unless specifically set out in the following sections, shall be established by the Board of Supervisors by separate Resolution. The Director shall manage the General Assistance Program.

SECTION 2. CATEGORIES OF GENERAL ASSISTANCE

There shall be two categories of General Assistance in Chickasaw County, including:

- 1. Assistance for poor persons; and
2. Emergency Assistance for needy persons.

SECTION 3. DEFINITION OF TERMS

As used in this Ordinance, the following terms are defined as such:

- 1. "Poor Person" is a person who has

no property, exempt or otherwise, and is unable because of physical or mental disability, to earn a living by labor. Iowa Code § 252.1.

2. "Needy Person" is a person with limited means, but not a poor person as defined herein that meets eligibility requirements set out herein for aid. Iowa Code § 252.1.

3. "Disability" shall mean the existence of an impairment or illness, either mental or physical, which has a demonstrable effect upon the applicant's ability to perform work tasks. The incapacity, when not evident to the Director, may be supported by medical statements supplied by a health care provider. Any person not disabled may still be considered a Needy Person.

4. "General Assistance" means a county payment or payments made on behalf of an eligible person or household for food/personal hygiene, clothing, rent, utilities, medical supplies and services, medical appointment transportation, and burial expenses.

5. "Net Worth" includes income or monies from any source, bank deposit accounts, stocks, bonds, real estate, cash value of life insurance policies, jewelry and the value of all other real and personal property.

Exempt: household furniture and personal possessions, tools and equipment used for home and family maintenance or support, burial lots and funeral trust funds, household vehicles with total value less than \$3,000, and a homestead value not to exceed \$40,000.

6. "Household" means those who dwell under the same roof; a social unit comprised of those living together in the same dwelling with verification of residence in said dwelling.

7. "Liquid Assets" means cash or any other item of net worth of the household that can be readily converted to cash within seven days.

8. "Awaiting Approval and Receipt" means a poor person who has applied for assistance under any state or federal law, who has pursued that application with due diligence, and who has not had the application denied. This does not include an appeal of the denial of benefits. It does

include a person who has had an application denied.

9. "Director" means the General Relief Director of the Northeast Iowa Community Action Corporation, who serves as the manager of the General Assistance Program as designated by the Board of Supervisors, and his/her staff. Iowa Code § 252.6.

SECTION 4. ELIGIBILITY FOR GENERAL ASSISTANCE

To be eligible for General Assistance, an applicant must meet the eligibility requirements and not exceed the financial limitations set forth in Resolution No. 05-31-22-35.

SECTION 5. LEVEL OF BENEFITS

The types of and maximum level of benefits to be provided for each item of General Assistance for each person or that person's household shall be consistent with those set forth in Resolution No. 05-31-22-35.

SECTION 6. APPLICATION FOR GENERAL ASSISTANCE

Initial contact may be made by telephone, online, or office visit to the Chickasaw County Family Services Office at Northeast Iowa Community Action Corporation in New Hampton during regular business hours Monday-Friday. A completed and signed General Assistance Application must be submitted along with any requested supporting documentation. If an applicant cannot come to the office, the Director may mail a General Assistance Application to the applicant. If the applicant appears to be eligible for assistance from any other source, they will be provided a referral to that source. Failure or refusal to make an application to other sources of assistance may be grounds for denial of General Assistance.

An individual who knowingly provides false information to the Director when submitting a General Assistance Application or who fails to disclose the nature, value, and location of property or other information will be denied General Assistance. The Director shall suspend General Assistance benefits for any such individual for a period of no less than 30 days and no more than 360 days. The length of suspension shall be based

upon the nature of the false information included in the General Assistance Application. In the event General Assistance benefits have been paid prior to the discovery of the false or omitted information, payment of further benefits will be immediately suspended and the individual shall repay all benefits he/she had received within 30 days. The Director will notify the individual of any action taken under the terms of this paragraph and advise the individual of the right to appeal the decision.

SECTION 7. DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY

1. The Director shall make an initial determination of the eligibility and needs of the applicant within five working days upon receipt of the General Assistance Application and all requested supporting documentation. Upon the determination, the applicant shall be notified of their eligibility status.

2. If the initial eligibility determination cannot be made within five working days, the applicant shall immediately be informed by telephone or mail stating the reasons why such a determination cannot be made.

3. If an applicant has been previously found to be eligible and their situation has remained the same, they may not need to submit a new application during a 12-month span. However, supporting documentation for current need must be provided by the applicant.

4. If an emergency need is present, the Director may provide verbal authorization to avendor to furnish an amount of General Assistance for the benefit of the applicant. The applicant subsequently must provide any documentation of eligibility and determination that is requested. Failure to provide requested information shall cause current General Assistance to be discontinued and future General Assistance to be denied.

5. If an applicant is not eligible for General Assistance, the General Assistance Application will be reviewed by the Director and a letter explaining ineligibility will be sent to the applicant.

SECTION 8. REIMBURSEMENT

Chickasaw County may seek reimbursement for General Assistance pro-

vided to a poor person from those persons or entities obligated for their support. Iowa Code § 252.13.

SECTION 9. APPEAL PROCESS

Applicants shall be informed of their right to appeal their eligibility for General Assistance or the amount of General Assistance. The applicant shall be informed of the process to file an appeal and their right to represent themselves or obtain a representative of their choice.

1. An applicant wishing to appeal may file with the Director a written request for review of the General Assistance Application. The appeal must be filed within ten days of the notice of decision and include the applicant's name, current address, telephone number, and reasons for the appeal. The Director shall review the General Assistance Application and issue a subsequent Director's decision within five business days of the receipt of the written request for review. If the applicant provides a valid mailing address, the decision will be mailed to the applicant. Otherwise, the decision shall be held for at least one week at the office of the Director for pick up by the applicant.

2. An applicant wishing to appeal the Director's decision may file a written request for review within ten days of this decision. The appeal shall be forwarded by the Director to the Board of Supervisors and placed on the agenda for the next regularly scheduled meeting. If the applicant provides a valid mailing address or telephone number, the applicant shall be informed by the Director either by telephone or mail of the date and time of the hearing before the Board of Supervisors. Otherwise, the date and time of the hearing shall be available to the applicant at the office of the Director.

3. The Board of Supervisors shall hear the applicant's appeal at the time scheduled unless a continuance is requested by the applicant (said requested continuance may be granted at the discretion of the Chairperson of the Board of Supervisors). The applicant shall be permitted to present evidence in support of the appeal including testifying, offering documentary evidence, and cross examination of other witnesses. Technical rules of evidence shall not

apply. The Board of Supervisors may set a reasonable length of time for presentations by the parties. The Board of Supervisors may question the applicant, and the Director shall present the reasons for the Director's determination. The hearing shall be recorded. The hearing before the Board of Supervisors will be closed in accordance with the Iowa Code §§ 21.5(1)(a), 217.30, and 252.25. Information about the applicant which is disclosed during the hearing shall remain confidential. Applicant's failure to attend the meeting at which the applicant's appeal is heard by the Board of Supervisors may result in dismissal of the applicant's appeal.

4. The findings by the Board of Supervisors shall be based solely upon evidence presented at the hearing. The Board of Supervisors shall issue its decision in writing, as promptly as possible, but within five business days of the hearing date. If the applicant provides a valid mailing address, the decision will be mailed to the applicant. Otherwise, the decision shall be held for at least one week at the office of the Director for pick up by the applicant.

SECTION 10. ACTION BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The Board of Supervisors may review the actions of the Director in allowing or disallowing General Assistance benefits and may approve or disapprove of such actions consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 11. APPLICABILITY AND EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon final passage, approval, and publication. Any other Ordinances and Resolutions or parts thereof in conflict with this Ordinance hereby are repealed.







leave defenders in the dust. "That's the only time in my career where I've ever seen open field and just ran," said Steinlage. Speltz was an efficient 4-for-4 passing for 104 yards. His favorite target against the hapless Huskies was senior receiver Hunter Serie, who hauled in three passes for 36 yards. Speltz, who also played some receiver last year for New Hampton, talked about the big play. New Hampton scored on three touchdowns of over 50 yards. "It was a drag, so he was like the last option. I rolled out left and there was a dead-end right there, so I rolled to the right and threw it. I got a little excited and probably over threw it a little bit, but he caught it, went up for it and he went 70 yards," said Speltz. The game was – for all intents and purposes – over at halftime as New Hampton cranked up chunk after chunk of yardage on the ground. New Hampton led 40-0 at intermission. New Hampton bulldozed its way 378 yards on the ground. This physical effort in the trenches where New Hampton once again owned the line of scrimmage came a game after NH piled up over 350 rushing yards in a Week 2 romp over Charles City. Once again, junior all-state running back Braden McShane put on a clinic of how to run the ball between the tackles. Whether it's juking, stiff-arming, shucking, running over or around defenders – McShane is a treat to watch and a beast of a back. McShane scored four times – the last two on electrifying runs of over 50 yards. He even had a 70-yard jaunt into the end zone where he made a cut reminiscent of Steinlage's called back because of holding. McShane rolled up 161 yards on the ground on just 10 carries. He has now accumulated almost 500 yards of rushing this fall and leads Class 2A in rushing touchdowns with eight. His first touchdown scamper came from four yards out and gave NH a two-touchdown lead on the second play of the second quarter. His 24-yard scamper and ensuing two-point run made it 20-0, NH just eight seconds later. McShane's fumble recovery on a lateral pass led to that third score of the night for New Hampton. New Hampton scored on its first seven possessions and McShane went untouched straight up the gut for a 51-yard blast to paydirt on the first play of New Hampton's fourth drive. Steinlage's catch and run vaulted the scoreboard up to 34-0. Ethan Praska bolted past the goal line from 10 yards out with 28 ticks before half. That final score of the second period – 34 of them in all – made sure the clock would run continuously in the second half as the 35-point rule was engaged. The final score of the second half was perhaps the most impressive. McShane shook a would-be tackler right sideline and ran past all defenders for a 52-yard burst toward the pylon. McShane ran into the end zone standing up as he capped his night with yet another score. "He's unreal," said Speltz. "He's doing good. As long as McShane keeps doing what he's doing and everyone keeps playing 100 percent, we should be fine." Not to be outshone, senior fullback Ben Tenge swallowed up plenty of real estate

on the ground. He scored the game's first touchdown on an 8-yard run and amassed 80 yards on just six carries. "We have good speed. Braden knows when to stretch and when to put a foot in the ground and make his cut," said Frerichs. "Half of running a good offensive play is running a play that your kids understand." Frerichs – coaching in his 30th season at the helm of his Chickasaw program – talked about his two-headed monster that is sure to keep giving fits for opposing defenses the rest of the season. "The thing I like about those two guys is neither one will say a thing. They're just football players," said Frerichs. "They're humble and they work hard. They don't take things for granted. They work hard every day of the week, not just on Friday night." The game didn't start out the way New Hampton had planned. On the first series of the game – Oelwein chewed up almost six minutes of clock and converted a fourth-down play to the extend the drive. The NH defense forced a turnover on downs with 6:04 remaining in the first quarter. "They took up a good six minutes. It's frustrating standing on the sideline that whole time," said Frerichs. "Oelwein did a good job using all four downs to get a first down. You gotta settle in. You see the things and it takes a series or two for the boys to really settle in and feel good about what they were doing." Ethan Detemmerman's 56-yard kickoff after New Hampton's first score gave Oelwein a window of hope. The Chickasaw defense backed up the Huskies a good six yards on that drive and forced yet another turnover on downs with just over a minute before the start of the second period. Steinlage talked what he likes the most about his 3-0 Chickasaws after New Hampton finished off non-district play and now the games really start to matter. "It's unreal chemistry," said Steinlage. "We all love each other." What was the message leading up to the Oelwein game?

Steinlage had an answer for that, too. "All we said all week was stay humble," said Steinlage. "We kept that mindset up until we were in the locker room coming up. We said, 'stay humble the whole time.'" New Hampton has tallied 892 yards on the ground as a team – the top total in the Chickasaws' class. Two southern Iowa teams – Clarke of Osceola (825) and Red Oak (824) – are the second and third-best running teams, respectively, in Class 2A. It's homecoming week for New Hampton next and the game on Friday night will be against the 0-3 Garner-Hayfield-Ventura Cardinals.

Chickasaws sweep Crestwood and remain unbeaten in conference play

The New Hampton Chickasaws had plenty of gas in the tank on Tuesday night at home versus Crestwood.

But sometimes any team has to make a pit stop now and again to check the tires and clear the windshield of any debris that may hinder a volleyball team's cruise around the corner to victory lane.

That turn took a few detours, but Jess Geerts' Chickasaws got right back on the beaten path to sweep the upstart Cadets - 25-23, 25-10 and 25-11.

It was New Hampton's second win in as many tries in league play after sweeping Charles City last week in the league opener.

New Hampton found itself in an 8-2 hole early, but reclaimed its mojo and dominated the rest of the way.

NH sophomore middle Braelyn Rosonke talked about New Hampton's slow start, which soon transformed into a pretty good all-around effort for the Northeast Iowa Conference squad that is playing one of the toughest schedules in the state.

"We weren't really like together at first," said Rosonke. "As the game went on we just figured out what we needed to do and came together and got our energy back."

NH (10-10, 2-0) chipped away and finally gained enough speed to crank out a 6-0 run to close to 21-20 in game one. New Hampton tied it at 23-23 and senior Carlee Rochford's powerful kill ended New Hampton's game one the right way - with a Chickasaw victory celebration.

"We fought back. We definitely didn't give up, so that's good," said Geerts. "It's good to see a little fight. We just kind of

had to get in our groove."

New Hampton has an active middle with several interchangeable parts. That includes Rosonke - who is first cousins with senior middle Elaina Rosonke.

"We're best friends," said Braelyn.

Rochford and all-state middle-outside hitter Marissa Cahoy also take turns slamming shots down near the middle of the net for kills.

Cahoy's kill ended the match. But it's been the emergence of Braelyn Rosonke - seeing the first varsity action of her prep career - that's been a key cog for the Chickasaws, which are searching for their second state berth after cracking the state field for the first time in school history four seasons ago in 2019.

"Our passing was pretty strong tonight so we were able to hit her a lot more," said Geerts about Braelyn Rosonke. "It's what we need and want, for sure."

New Hampton pushed the pedal to the metal in the second game and jumped out to lead 18-4. The Chickasaws put it on cruise control from there to win by 15 points.

Game three saw several ties early before New Hampton raced away from the Cadets to lead 17-10 after an Elaina Rosonke ace. By that time, Crestwood was almost in New Hampton's rear view mirror and looking to warm up the bus.

"We just hyped each other up and stayed together. It brought our energy, which helped us to win the game," said Braelyn Rosonke. "It's the most important thing in volleyball because it's a mind game."

Nine out of the Chickasaws' 10 losses have come at the hand of ranked teams.
