Kuhn stays in chairman's chair

In a surprise to some, Kuhn will continue to lead Board of Supervisors

The new Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors began 2023 with a surprise, at least to a number of courthouse observers.

The jolt, at least to some who follow county politics, came when the board, which includes new members Scott Cerwinski and Travis Suckow,

voted 4-1 to re-elect Matt Kuhn to the chairman position he first took over in 2022.

The one dissenting vote came from Jacob Hackman, who nominated him-

self for the position he held for three years, beginning in 2018.

Kuhn, a Republican, was nominated by Steve Breitbach, the lone Democrat on the board.

"I'm excited to lead the board for another year," Kuhn said, "and I look forward to doing the best for our county's residents."

Board members also elected Cerwinski, the lone nominee for the

position, on a 4-1 vote, with Hackman casting the lone vote against the new vice chair, who replaced Tim Zoll on the board.

Kuhn had said last month that he was interested in serving as the board chair for another term, but many observers felt that Hackman would make a run for the position.

With Cerwinski's win over Zoll in last June's primary and Suckow's victory over Jason Byrne in the November election, Hackman

Iowa farmland prices soar to new heights

Some are concerned high prices will shut young out of the market

The average price of an acre of Iowa farmland set a record in 2022 in more ways than one.

One year after skyrocketing 29 percent, the average value of an acre of Iowa farmland jumped another 17 percent, or \$1,660, to \$11,411 per acre.

The nominal value of an acre of farmland is again higher this year than at any point since Iowa State University began surveying values in 1941.

When adjusting for inflation, the 2022 average value surpasses the previous inflation-adjusted record value set in 2013.

Chickasaw County's average price per acre jumped from \$10,003 in 2021 to \$11,627 this past year, a jump of 16.2 percent. That came after land prices in the county jumped from \$7,602 to \$10,003, an increase of 31.6 percent.

The biggest jump in land prices in the Northeast District came from Allmakee and Clayton counties, which both saw 18.8 percent increases while Winneshiek and Fayette counties each saw 17.5 percent increases.

Farmland values in Iowa have increased more than 15 percent in a year a handful of times since 1941, most notably in 2011, when values rose 32.5 percent, and last year, when values rose 29 percent.

Wendong Zhang, an associate professor of economics and faculty affiliate of Center for Agricultural and Rural Development (CARD) at Iowa State University, said that inflation did not play as much of a factor as commodity prices, limited land supply and low interest rates through summer 2022 did this year. Zhang, who is responsible for conducting the annual survey, pointed out that the Federal Reserve has used aggressive interest rate hikes since this summer to curb the problem.

"The Federal Reserve seems to be determined to keep raising interest rates until they get a firm control on inflation," he said in the release of the annual study last month. "This is a tricky balance because larger and quicker interest rate hikes run

Treasurer is ready for her next chapter

Breitbach says key to the office's success in her 20 years has been her great employees

The countdown clock, if you will, was nearing zero last week for Chickasaw County Treasurer Sue Breitbach, yet in some ways, it was business as usual.

There was a semi-annual report that had to be filed, training to be done, licenses to renew, tags to be sold and maybe even a few taxes to collect.

In her office, Breitbach sat with the man who replaced her this week and went over the

details that had become almost second nature to her over the course of a 20-year career that came to an end on Friday, when work ended and retirement commenced.

"Oh, I'm ready for this new chapter," she said with a laugh, but for a moment the smile disappeared and Breitbach was lost in deep thought. When she began talking, the smile returned but there was a hint of emotion in her voice.

"It's been a wonderful 20 years, and you want to know

Supervisors want cities to pay more for law enforcement

Board reaches consensus to raise rate for Nashua and Fredericksburg by 9.2 percent and increase 'drive-through' cities by 50 percent

Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors on Monday agreed that the Sheriff's Office needs to charge more for providing law enforcement services to the county's municipalities, and they reached a consensus that the county should increase its charges considerably.

Board members agreed that the county should raise the amount it charges per hour to Nashua and Fredericksburg by 9.2 percent for providing coverage to those cities and to increase the costs of "drive-through" services for other cities by 50 percent.

Sheriff Marty Hemann told board members that he would like to get some numbers "out" as cities begin planning their 2023-24 budgets and suggested that the county charge \$63.52 to the two cities that currently have a contract for the sheriff's office to provide a set number of hours that the Sheriff's Office patrols.

During this fiscal year, one that ends on June 30, the Sheriff's Office averages 85 hours per month in Fredericksburg and 240 hours per month in Nashua, the county's second largest city.

But Hemann's proposal to increase the fees to those two cities by 6.8 percent met with opposition from Supervisor Jake Hackman.

"Same issue I had last year, Marty, those are just the direct costs [of a deputy]," he said.

"What about all the indirect [costs] — county auditor, payroll, sheriff, chief deputy. ... What about all the other things the county does — with administration and payroll and staffing and HR service and all the other stuff?"

Hemann responded that "I guess maybe the cities would say well, we pay taxes too."

Hackman, though, didn't budge.

"Then why are they paying anything then? There are additional costs ...

that's what I'm saying."

County Attorney David Laudner, though, said he worried that the supervisors were setting themselves up for a repeat of last year when rates for the two cities increased by almost 5 percent.

That led the Nashua City Council to propose cutting back the number of hours it would contract for before the county basically said the rate it had agreed to was only "good" if the contract was for the same number of hours the city had contracted for the previous year.

"What happens if this board sets the

rate of X," Laudner said, "and Nashua and Fredericksburg say they're only going to pay a total of Y amount for the year so we'll just take just whatever hours we get divided by that number."

Laudner also wondered how it would affect Hemann's budget.

"It won't," Hackman said. "It will just put more deputies in the [rural areas] of the county. ... Your put more out in the county or you lay them off. ... Everything's going up. Wages and health insurance just keep going up."

Other board members said they felt the county needed at least the \$63.52 per hour, and both Steve Breitbach

and Scott Cerwinski said the rate hike might have to be steeper.

"I'd say we say \$65 and see how much push-back we get," Breitbach said, and the rest of the board agreed.

The Sheriff's Office also provides "drive-through" services for a number of smaller cities in the county and currently charges a "per capita" rate of \$10, based on the 2020 Census.

The issue, Hemann, said is that for a number of years the county did not increase the drive-through rate, and even after increasing the charge a year ago from \$8.56 to \$10 per resident, a 16.8 percent increase, Chickasaw

County charges far less to its cities than other counties do.

He pointed out that Mitchell and Howard counties two years ago were charging \$15 per resident to its smaller cities, and Hackman said "I'd be OK with \$15." The other supervisors didn't take issue with that proposal.

Finally, the county leaders also agreed to raise its dispatching fees for the city of New Hampton from \$15 per resident to \$15.75, an increase of 5 percent.

Hemann said that covers about two-thirds of the salary of one of the county's seven full-time dispatchers.

Chair gets same pay as other supervisors

is the longest tenured board member. He is in the middle of his second term on the board while Kuhn is in the middle of his first term.

Hackman served as the board chairman until 2021, when the late Rick Holthaus was elected

to the position less than two months after he was returned to the Board of Supervisors in District 1.

After Holthaus passed away before the first meeting of 2022, Kuhn and Hackman were both nominated by board members and the vote was 2-2 before Hackman said he would with-

draw his nomination.

The position of board chair does have some flexibility on setting the supervisors' agendas, but the reality is that it doesn't come with any extra votes or so-called veto powers. And the board chair also receives the same salary as the rest of the supervisors.

There's a new No. 1 in alcohol sales

Tito's Handmade Vodka tops Black Velvet as Iowans' favorite alcohol

Move over, Black Velvet. There's a new No. 1 liquor brand in the state, and its name is Tito's.

After holding the spot of top brand of spirits in Iowa for about 10 years, Black Velvet Canadian Whiskey gave way to Tito's Handmade Vodka, which outsold BV by about 40,000 gallons in the fiscal year ending June 30.

Black Velvet took over the No. 2 position, followed by Captain Morgan Original Spiced Rum, Fireball Cinnamon Whiskey and Hawkeye Vodka.

The Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division (ABD) annual report contains a wealth of information about the people of Iowa's choices for what and where they buy their potent potables, sales and profit figures, as well as statistics on enforcement of Iowa's liquor and beer and wine laws.

Iowa is one of 18 states that directly controls the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages. The ABD governs state and federal laws and regulations related to the sale and use of alcohol and tobacco products. Profits made on the sales are used for specific purposes with the rest returned to the Iowa General Fund.

ABD Administrator Stephen Larson said the division generated a record \$150.1 million in revenue that went to the state general fund (\$149 million) and the Iowa Economic Development Authority (\$1 million).

As is typical, the total annual sales of liquor increased in the 2022 fiscal year, although at a slower rate than in previous years.

\$431,426,201 in liquor sales for the 2022 fiscal year. That's up 3.75 percent from the previous fiscal year's sales of \$415,835,178. But fiscal year 2021 had increased 13.22 percent from the previous year, fiscal year 2020 had increased 8.17 percent and fiscal year 2019 had grown 6.09 percent.

Despite the greater sales, the actual amount of liquor, beer and wine sold in the state were all listed as down from the previous fiscal year, although some of that may be a matter of bookkeeping rather than actual sales.

The report says that total gallons of liquor sold was down, from 6,501,295 gallons in fiscal year 2021 to 6,473,520 gallons in fiscal year 2022, a decrease of a little under half a percentage point.

Beer volume appeared to fall as well, down almost a full quarter from 96,980,405 gallons in fiscal year 2021 to just 72,940,379 gallons in the latest fiscal year, a decline of 24.79 percent, and total wine volume sold appeared to decline even more sharply, from 6,457,789 gallons in fiscal year 2021 to 4,763,223 gallons last fiscal year, a fall of 26.24 percent.

For the beer and wine sales, the amount of gallons sold is calculated by the amount of tax collected. Since the Iowa governor ordered that during the pandemic taxes and tax reporting could be deferred, that resulted in an increase in gallons report in 2021, artificially inflating that fiscal year's numbers.

In Chickasaw County, sales of alcohol were \$611,808, which ranked 79th in the state.

why? Because I’ve had a great staff, employees who have not only helped me but, more importantly, helped the residents of Chickasaw County. I’ve been blessed with great employees, that’s what gets all of us [elected officials] through the tough days.”

Her career in public service began when she ran for the open treasurer’s position in 2002 after spending a number of years working at Security State Bank, the Rigler family-owned bank that sits across the street from the courthouse.

“Blame the Kennedy boys,” she said when asked how she found her way into politics. “Mike and Kevin came to see me one day and said they thought I should run. I thought about it and threw my name into the ring.”

She won that first election and then claimed re-election victories in 2006, 2010, 2014 and 2018, but as 2021 came to an end, Breitbach knew that she would not seek the

office for a sixth term.

“I wanted to finish out my term,” she said, “but I also knew that it was time. I was ready to retire, and I made up my mind that nothing would change my mind.”

And nothing did.

So for the first time in this century, she wasn’t on the ballot in November when Republican Matt Ysbrand and Democratic Keith Hoey squared off to become the county’s next treasurer.

And for the past couple of weeks, Ysbrand was a constant in what would soon become his office. Although Breitbach was elected to five terms as a Democrat, she doesn’t believe in partisan politics, especially in an office like hers.

“Our job is to follow the [Iowa] Code and do what we’re supposed to do,” she said. “It doesn’t matter if you’re a Democrat or a Republican, we’re here to help all the people of Chickasaw County.”

Ysbrand, meanwhile, has appreciated Breitbach’s goal to make the transition an easy one, or at least as smooth as possible.

“I’m learning a lot, and trust me, Sue would be a great teacher if she wanted a second career,” he said.

That isn’t going to happen.

“I’m retiring,” she said with a laugh, “but I appreciate that Matt wants to be ready to go, too.”

So what she will be doing this week, her first without a job in decades?

Well, she’ll have more time to devote to family — her husband Randy and she have two grown children, Amber and Tony, both chiropractors by the way, and an 8-year-old granddaughter — and she won’t have to worry about meetings, taxes, licenses and, most of all, those pesky software programs that, as she puts it, “are always changing at the worst possible times.”

Still, she’s going to miss some things about coming to the courthouse every day.

“I’ll miss the people more than even I think I will,” she said. “Like I said, it’s because of the employees and the people who come into our office every day that I’ve enjoyed my job. And I’ll miss them.”

Chickasaw County EMS off and busy

Director of county-owned ambulance service says many deserve credit to make deadline

It was Wednesday, Dec. 28 — 8:33 a.m. to be exact — when Joel Knutson was asked if Chickasaw County EMS was ready to roll in four days.

“We will be,” he said with a smile. “We’re not quite there yet, but trust me, we will be there when we have to be.”

And at midnight that started the year 2023, Chickasaw County EMS proved him right.

“I don’t even know where to start,” he said last week when asked about how Chickasaw County managed to get its ambulance off the ground in such a short amount of time.

“You know, there are so many people who came together to make this happen,” he said. “You have the supervisors and the cities that came together to come up with a plan. You have the EMS Advisory Committee that put in countless hours to make sure we had everything we needed. I’m excited for Sunday, because it’s the start of something new, something we can all be proud of in the county.”

It’s been a ride, that’s for sure, but once it got going, Chickasaw County EMS was busy.

This past Tuesday, a little more than 2 1/2 days into its existence, the service had responded to eight calls — including a transfer to Blank Children’s Hospital in Des Moines.

“We’ve had two rigs out at the same time already,” Knutson said, “and obviously, you hate to use the word exciting when it comes to an ambulance because someone’s hurt, someone’s sick. But a lot of work went into this and we want the people of our county to know we’re there for them.”

About the only thing that still isn’t clear — at least to some in county government — is if Knutson technically has a contract to serve as the director.

After it appeared that the Board of Supervisors and Knutson had reached an agreement on a contract that calls for the longtime critical-care paramedic during a meeting on Dec. 27, Supervisor Jake Hackman during a special meeting on Friday questioned allowing Knutson to receive holiday pay — or at least the amount — if he works on one of the 11 holidays designated by the county.

Supervisors voted 2-1 to approve the contract as Board Chairman Matt Kuhn and outgoing Supervisor Jason Byrne voted to approve the contract while Hackman cast the lone dissenting vote. Supervisor Steve Breitbach abstained from the vote because he’s related to Knutson while Tim Zoll was not at the final meeting of his three-term career.

Hackman on Tuesday argued that the contract needed three votes to be approved, but County Attorney David Laudner disagreed.

“You had a quorum,” he said, “and the majority of the people who cast votes approved it. ... In my opinion, that’s approved.”

But that same day, Knutson was focused on the future of the service that will serve the rural residents of the county and the residents of the cities of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

“Things are going well,” he said, “and I think, sure there’s always nervousness about something new, but we’re out of the gate well. ... We have a great group of employees, whose only concern is making sure people are well taken care of.”

Strange men and a star

The Wise Men story reminds us of Bethlehem's treasure

On January 6, the Christian Church celebrates perhaps the most unique event of Jesus' childhood. Strange men arrived from the east in search of the "king of the Jews."

These men had some knowledge of constellations. They explained that they set off on their journey, because "we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him" (Matthew 2:2).

They thought they would find this king in Jerusalem, the capital city of Judea.

But they were directed to a town nearby.

About seven hundred

years earlier, the prophet Micah said this about the little town of Bethlehem: "from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old, from ancient days" (Micah 5:2).

When the men left Jerusalem, the star they had been following went before them (what a mystery!) and guided them to the house where Jesus was.

"And going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh" (Matthew

2:11).

They wouldn't worship a little child unless they were convinced He was more than just a child. They believed He was the fulfillment of God's promise to send a Savior for the whole world of sinners.

The child Jesus did not look like much of a king, but He was the Son of God in the flesh who had come to destroy the devil's power and make atonement for every sin.

The visit of these men to Jesus is called the "Epiphany," from a Greek word that means to manifest or make known. Jesus was man-

the risk of slowing down the economy, potentially to a recession."

Zhang said that although higher interest rates put downward pressure on the land market, the effects typically don't show up in land prices for one or two years. While the Federal Reserve has been raising interest rates, Zhang said that 81 percent of Iowa farmland is fully paid for, so the higher interest rates don't always affect farmers' land purchasing decisions.

This is especially true when high inflation makes the real interest rates negative or low, which tends to incentivize more borrowing and investment.

"Farmers have a lot more cash on hand and supply chain issues led to a shortage of equipment," Zhang said, "so the money that farmers normally spend on equipment is now devoted to land."

As for commodity prices, Zhang said they have been strong this year and yields

have been higher than expected, despite the weather challenges that included many parts of Iowa facing drought conditions during the growing season.

"Not only are crop prices much higher, livestock and poultry prices are also significantly higher, translating into higher farm income and profits," Zhang said.

For the first time, this year's survey asked respondents' views of current farmland values. Zhang said that 70 percent of respondents feel that current land values are "too high" or "way too high."

"The higher land values do create an even higher entry barrier for beginning farmers," he said, "and the following increase in cash rents along with higher input costs could negatively affect producers, especially those with a lot of rented ground."

Zhang said that 48 percent of respondents forecasted an increase in farmland values one year from now, while 24 percent forecasted no change and 28 percent expected lower values.

For the second year in a row, all 99 of Iowa's counties showed an increase in land values.

However, for the first time in almost a decade, Scott County in east-central Iowa did not report the highest overall value.

O'Brien County in northwest Iowa topped the list this year, reporting a 20.6 percent increase, or \$2,818 per acre, to \$16,531. Decatur County again reported the lowest value, though land values there increased 10 percent, or \$505 per acre, to \$5,566.

Mills, Fremont, Page and Montgomery counties reported the largest percentage increase, 21.6 percent, while O'Brien County saw the largest dollar increase, \$2,818 per acre.

Wayne, Lucas, Appanoose, and Decatur Counties saw the smallest percentage increase, 10 percent, while Decatur County saw the smallest dollar increase, \$505 per acre.

Outside of a few cosmetic updates, the Novaks don't have any major changes planned for the Comet Bowl in the immediate future. They've talked about adding some new synthetic lanes in the next couple years and adding some "cosmic" black lights, but otherwise they expect business to operate as usual.

"There's a little bit of work

that we need to do, but nothing we can't handle," said Laura Novak. "They've ran a pretty good business for us to come in and take over."

Barry says that he and his sister are looking forward to slowing down to spend more time with children and grandchildren, though he intends to keep working at Comet Lanes for as long as the new owners will have him.

"I am extremely confident and happy. I know that they're the right people to run with it and we're going to do everything we can to make it a positive transition and help them out as much as we can," said Barry. "We think they're the perfect fit for what we were hoping to see after us."



NH/TV sends two to finals at Osage

Russler wins weight class, Myers second; Chickasaws finish ninth at girls tourney

Ali Russler is definitely making her mark this season and her Chickasaw teammates seem to be following her lead.

Russler, a New Hampton/Turkey Valley senior, took first place at the Osage Tournament last Monday after another rock solid performance.

Russler, ranked fourth at 145 pounds by IAWrestle, pinned two rated opponents as she zoomed to the top of the podium stand to secure her gold medal amongst a slew of top-notch competition.

"There was a lot of high-caliber girls there that were ranked," said NH/TV head coach Caleb Ciavarelli. "It's hard to say that that was one of the deepest tournaments we've been to because we've been to the Donnybrook - we've been to some pretty tough tournaments."

NH/TV placed ninth overall in the team standings with 79 points, just a single point back of South Winneshiek and Central Elkader at the 17-team tourney.

"We have girls with different goals in mind. From that perspective, there was a lot of positives that came out of yesterday in my opinion," said Ciavarelli.

Russler pinned No. 9 Aubrey Chapman of Osage in the quarterfinals in 1:21 and advanced to that round with another super fast win by fall over Addison Temp of South Winn in 46 seconds.

Russler earned a hard-fought 5-1 decision over Lauren Rodgers of Perry in the semis, only to rocket all the way to the top with another first-period pin over eighth-ranked Tayla Stiefel of East Buchanan in the

finals in just 54 seconds.

Russler is 23-3 on the season and competed at state last year, but did not place.

Hard work and dedication has transformed Russler into one of the state's best at her weight class.

"A big factor was she wrestled all summer long while doing other sports. She continued to be in the room. She continued to go to camps," said Ciavarelli. "She put in the time. She's a very competitive person that doesn't like to lose. She's able to learn from her losses and get better. All those little details like that - they go a long way."

Kiera Myers, just a freshman, also had a great afternoon in the Chickasaws' first action back out on the mat since Christmas break started.

Myers (14-9) placed runner-up at 140 pounds. She pinned her first two opponents in the second period. That pitted her up against No. 7 Andelyn

Save for injuries, Blazek off to solid start with Hawkeyes

Former Turkey Valley star gets some varsity cross country time at the University of Iowa

Jalyssa Blazek thought the analogy fit her current situation pretty well. She used to be a big fish in a small pond, now she's a small fish in a big pond. But with plenty of room to grow.

The former Turkey Valley track star and '22 graduate has state titles and school records under her belt, including state championships in the 800- and 1,500-meter runs her senior year, and the best times in Turkey Valley's history in those events, along with the best ever cross country time.

That gathered attention from the University of Iowa, where the Lawler native became a Hawkeye last fall.

"It's been a pretty smooth transition," she said while on Christmas break recently. "There are so many great athletes coming from great schools it was a little bit intimidating at first, but the girls are great to be around and everyone's looking out for each other."

Blazek's cross country season started off well. Running a 5K in high school, she made the switch to a 6K at the U of I. "I don't think that a 6K is much harder than a 5K since we prepare through training," she stated. "It's just a few more minutes and when you're racing you are just as focused to get to the finish and time blurs."

"I started off competing well within my team, I was in the top five in my first four races," she continued.

Her best time came at the Gans Creek Classic in Columbia, Missouri, where she finished fourth among her team members - 61st overall among 240 runners - with a 21:45.

A 6K is just over 3.7 miles,

and Blazek had more company at the finish line than she's used to, as 60 runners came in within a minute 24 seconds of the winner.

"But toward the end of the season I developed shin splints and was diagnosed with a grade 2 stress fracture."

She therefore missed out on conference and regional runs. For the past 8-9 weeks she's been resting and cross training. "A lot of treadmill work and a lot of biking. I think the goal is to have a similar mileage for training, but it's the impact on ground that really inflames it, I suppose."

While the indoor track season is underway, Blazek isn't sure when she'll have the chance to compete. "They're taking a pretty moderate approach to getting me back to running."

The switch from high school to college has had its perks. While Turkey Valley does sport a nice fitness facility that Blazek still utilizes when she's home, a Division I college, obviously, has the kind of equipment athletes dream of. Travel times to meets take a little longer as well.

"The longest bus ride was to Ann Arbor, Michigan - that was eight hours if I remember correctly - and we had a flight to Stillwater, Oklahoma, with a lot of layovers, that took all day."

While the track transition was smooth, splitting time between sports and studies in college has been challenging.

"I think that's the hardest part, balancing athletic and academic schedules, getting to meetings... time has definitely been a big thing for me."

Athletes also have the opportunity to eat with a nutritionist. Blazek couldn't guarantee, though, that she would avoid the dreaded "freshman 15."

"I don't know, the dining room food's pretty good, I do miss my home-cooked meals though."



"It's always a hectic — real hectic — but fun day," Pagel said. "We're busy, but the kids have a blast, or at least a lot of them, being part of a great sport."



