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## Law may require lower county levy

Supervisors spend considerable amount of time discussing what could be challenging budget

Nothing is set in stone but in all likelihood Chickasaw County will have to lower its General Basic (GB) levy for the 2025-26 fiscal year.

In its penultimate meeting of 2024 on Monday, supervisors learned that valuations in the county appear to be increasing by 3.12 percent, and

that will trigger ramifications from a state law that proponents say will force counties and cities to be more watchful when it comes to taxpayer dollars.

If valuations increase by more than 2.75 percent, counties are required to lower their tax-levy rate, and although Auditor Sheila Shekleton was hesitant to give out concrete numbers on Monday until she can check more data, she did say “that’s a certainty

there,” referring to the county valuations being increased by more than 2.75 percent.

Under House File 718, a law that was enacted in the spring of 2023, counties that see an increase higher than that 2.75 percent threshold, must cut the levy rate by 2 percent.

Supervisor Jake Hackman said that according to his math, that means the county’s GB fund will receive an

increase of \$36,000 for the fiscal year that begins on July 1.

County Attorney David Laudner said that the idea behind the law was that counties with “explosive growth” in valuations were not passing on any savings to property owners.

“They’re growing 10, 20 percent and they’re keeping the levy rate the

same and using the extra money, and what the legislature is saying [is] you’re misleading the

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## Area gets first official snowfall

New Hampton gets 3 inches but it probably won't last long as 'warm-up' is on the way

Well, we got that first decent — if you call 3 inches decent — snowfall out of the way, and although we’re writing this story on Monday, it appears we had enough on the ground to call it a “White Christmas.”

But the chance for a “White New Year’s Day” look remote as temperatures are expected to be in the 40s for much of the upcoming weekend.

Still, for those who think we’ve seen very little of Old Man Winter thus far, Chickasaw County Engineer Roman Lensing offered a rebuttal during Monday’s Board of Supervisors meeting in which he told county leaders that Secondary Roads conducted some kind of winter operations for much of last week — beginning with the ice storm that hit on Dec. 14 and continuing through the snowfall that arrived last Thursday.

That storm dropped the 3 inches of snow on New Hampton and higher snow amounts were reported to the east and north of Chickasaw County’s largest city; in fact, the weather was inclement enough that several school districts, including Turkey Valley, dismissed classes early and called off evening activities.

Tammy Robinson — both in her roles as New Hampton’s economic development director and as a mother — is a big believer in the Opportunity Fair that Iowa BIG North students put on earlier this month.

“I can tell you right now that my son

found what he’s doing this year at last year’s Opportunity Fair,” she said of the apprenticeship Ty Robinson, who graduated last spring, is completing, “I think that speaks volumes about what those kids are doing. Until he went to the fair, he had no idea it even existed.”

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# Salvation Army unit blessed with plenty of bell ringers

Moving to an online sign-up system appears to have paid big dividends to the Chickasaw County unit of the Salvation Army when it comes to its annual Kettle Campaign.

The last bell was rung early in the afternoon on Christmas Eve and the unit's coordinator said virtually every shift was filled during the campaign that began on Nov. 20.

"We had maybe three or four 6 to 7 shifts that weren't taken," Kris Markham said, "but that was it. It's the best year we've had and like I always say, we can't raise any money when we don't have someone ringing the bell at the kettle."

She said the almost perfect "attendance rate" was due in large part because the Salvation Army used a Signup Genius page put together by New Hampton resident Jennifer Monteith.

"I can't thank Jenny enough because it made it so much easier for people to volunteer," Markham said. "They could go online and see what was open and a lot of people took an extra hour or two, too. And for us, it was nice because when we were trying to do everything by phone, you had to have everything — the schedule and all that — with you."

As in past years, Markham was effusive when it came to her gratitude to Fareway for allowing the unit to use its entry way for 11 hours a day, six days a week for almost five weeks.

She said she'll have the final numbers — the amount of money raised and the number of volunteers who worked at least one shift — next week.

The money raised is used to fund emergency situations throughout the county and in the past has also been donated to area schools to help purchase winter clothing and school supplies for students from low-income families.

"It does a lot of good and every little bit helps," Markham said, "and so a big thank you to all those who took a shift or two or three or more. We can't do this without volunteers, and we were fortunate to have so many this year."

said, "and I think we all thought it went really well."

Iowa BIG North students began planning for the Dec. 3 event back in August, and Thronson said that they became well-acquainted with the word logistics during the months-long planning for the fair.

"It wasn't a lot of work in some ways, but the logistics — contacting everyone, inviting them, making sure we had enough room, all that stuff — took a lot of time," she said. "Put it this way, we were never bored."

The fair ran for three hours and students from New Hampton, Turkey Valley, Sumner-Fredricksburg, Nashua-Plainfield and Riceville had a chance to explore different career, college and military options.

"I don't think we were nervous the day of the event," Weber said, "but at the same time, we all wanted it to go well. It was just nice to see that everything went smoothly and we didn't really forget anything."

At the same time, the four students recapping the Opportunity Fair say they learned a lot, and since they are all juniors, that means they believe they can improve the event next year.

They pointed out that students from a couple of schools found out they were visiting the fair just a day or two before the event.

"It helps if you come a little prepared," Weber said. "It takes two to have a conversation. It can't just be the business owner, you know what I mean? But we got a lot of compliments."

said that they received positive feedback from those representing businesses, as well as col-

lege and military recruiters.

"They appreciated that we had students there to help them

bring stuff in and get things set up," Larsen said, "and that was a real positive."

The students also said they are going to tackle the "parking issue" for next year's fair.

"It was pretty jam packed because we have all the students and teachers here, too, so we're going to try to figure out that so it's a little better next year," Thronson said.

The organizers of the event also are hoping they can extend the hours of the fair, pointing out at times the competition gym may have had too many people in it.

"The whole idea is to get one-on-one conversations between the businesses and students," Thronson said, "and we had, you know, like two groups in at the same time so that was a little harder. Maybe having it go longer would help."

Robinson, though, said what makes the fair worth it is that the Iowa BIG North students readily take feedback from those who attend.

"This year was earlier in the year and that was huge for the juniors and seniors," she said, "so that they could get some ideas. Not that they didn't last spring, but it worked a lot better having it when they had it this year. It's a worthwhile event. For the students, it's a chance to find out about a ton of opportunities here, and for our businesses, it's a way to showcase those opportunities. It's a win-win."

Mike Kuennen, the coordinator for the Iowa BIG North program in New Hampton, agreed.

"I'm proud of our kids," he said. "They stepped up and because it's student-driven, I think that creates a buzz and interest among all the rest of the students."

House Speaker Pat Grassley (R-New Hartford) announced committee assignments for the 91st General Assembly last week.

"I am honored that Speaker Pat Grassley put his trust in me to lead the House Government Oversight Committee," said Thomson. "I am eager to work to investigate any issues of concern to Iowans and make sure that our state government is working as intended for Iowans."

Thomson, who is beginning his second term in the Legislature after being re-elect-

Thomson represents Iowa House District 58, which includes all of Floyd County except the northwest Rock Grove and Rockford townships, all of Chickasaw County and most of Bremer County except for the western and southwestern townships including Waverly.

House Speaker Grassley said, "Iowa House Republicans will continue to deliver on the promises we make to Iowans. Our caucus represents part or all of Iowa's 99 counties, putting us in the best possible position to listen to Iowans and be their voice in the Statehouse. We're excited to get back to work in January."

Previously Thomson served as vice chair of the Economic Development Budget Subcommittee, as well as other committee assignments.

## How can Christians best celebrate a new year?

While many people are deciding how to celebrate on Dec. 31 and figuring out their New Year's resolutions, what should Christians be doing?

There might not be one "right" way to observe the transition from 2024 to 2025, but here are some thoughts to help believers stay Christ-focused.

Many people, no matter what they believe, look at Jan. 1 as a chance for a new beginning. If the previous year was disappointing or they made significant mistakes, they imagine wiping the slate clean and starting over.

Christians know that new starts are available any time, they are not dictated by the calendar. "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning" (Lamentations 3:22-23).

All those who confess and repent their sin can enjoy freedom from regret and shame. They can find courage to endure through trials. Joy and mercy are available for every believer, all the time. A new year, however, inspires this kind of thought process.

### New Resolution: Confession

Starting over often turns into making resolutions, but quitting smoking, starting a diet, or purchasing a gym membership is only the beginning of a "fresh start." If there is a sin issue in any person's life, he or she can address it right now.

In fact, peace awaits the one who is quick to confess and repent of sin. "Many are the sorrows of the wicked, but steadfast love surrounds the one who trusts in the LORD" (Psalm 32:10).

Bad habits and addictions are symptomatic of deeper issues. Rather than making a resolution to quit doing something or start doing something else, take advantage of this renewed impetus to face sin in your life and find freedom from its effects through the Father's loving direction.

For example, you might be the kind of person who seeks attention by causing drama. You might run from conflict by exercising too much and trying to control a painful situation by regulating calories carefully.

Fear could be driving you to drink or abuse drugs. These habits or addictions enslave a person; they rob peace because alcohol or exercise or drama becomes a focus of worship; an idol.

The New Year is a perfect time to dig up the roots of trouble by the power of the Holy Spirit, under the assurance that honest and whole-hearted repentance leads to life and peace (2 Corinthians 7:10).

Remember these words from the Apostle John: "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).

Jesus does not want his people to be burdened by their sin. He wants them to experience freedom.

Just remember that, although God's Word contains all the answers one needs to overcome addictions and work through conflict, gospel counselors provide direction and support, helping to connect the Lord's promises to one's unique emotional needs.

A responsible and discerning counselor will also suggest medical attention where necessary: certain habits and behaviors can be the result of a clinical issue or trauma and could require medication, at least for a time.

When one faces the turmoil of personal sin in response to sins committed against him or her, the New Year could be a time when both parties reflect and make changes.

But the work of the Spirit in each person's life is between him or her and God. Part of learning to overcome addictive behaviors is, potentially, finding the courage to walk away from an abusive marriage, friendship, or job. A counselor can help.

### Remember All the Lord Has Done

"Take care lest you forget the Lord, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery" (Deuteronomy 6:12). Christians are enjoined to never forget what their Lord has done for them.

A Christian who obtains his greatest joy from the Lord sees January 1 as a time to remember the goodness of God as it has unfolded across the past year. Sometimes the details of God's intervention are only obvious when one surveys his goodness over time.

We can never remember the Lord's grace and mercy and love towards us too often. Remembering Christ is essential; the more one does this the better.

But at the start of a New Year, one might reassess which direction to go with regard to career or a relationship, what his or her cross might be, and to either change course or stick with the established One.

If this is a difficult season, go back to Hebrews 4:15, "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin."

Recall that Christ knows the temptations you face, the suffering you endure. He is able to sympathize, so turn to him without fear.

### Celebrate the New Year

"This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalm 118:24). This is the Psalmist's exhortation for every day, not just New Year's Day; not only on good days, when we anticipate the company of friends and a great meal, perhaps music and dancing. Every day is the Lord's Day and every day we are his.

Christians do not need to avoid "fun" as though Christ was averse to it. God does

not demand that we be serious all the time.

Adrian Rogers explains, "Jesus was not a recluse. He performed His first miracle at a wedding, when He changed water into wine. He was so full of life that His enemies called Him a wine bibber and a glutton. He was not, but there was in Him a genuine joy, and if you don't have that joy, you're not like Jesus, for He is literally leaping with joy."

We are not called into debauchery, that is not joy; but we are encouraged by Christ's example to be filled with the exuberance for life, which is living inside of us by the Holy Spirit.

"For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, 'Abba! Father!'" (Romans 8:14-15). We have so much reason to celebrate.

### Christ Coming Closer

Every year, someone predicts the end of the world. This so-called prophet names a year and tells the world not only when but how the world will end. With each new catastrophe and major conflict between world powers, Armageddon seems nigh, but only God knows when the end will come (Matthew 24:36).

Yet, every Jan. 1, Christians wonder "will this be the year Jesus returns?" One thing is for sure: Jesus' return is sooner today than it was yesterday. With that in mind, we prepare.

We are God's children now, and [...] we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure (1 John 3:2-3).

### Why Does This Matter?

New Year's Day is no different from any other day as far as Christ is concerned. For the believer, however, the very idea of throwing out an old calendar and starting with 12 clean pages is a poignant reminder that the pages, like our lives, quickly become messy.

New Year's Day is a day of resetting hearts, which have wandered, and of restoring the habit of turning to Christ every day for a fresh start, not in a new relationship, but in a relationship with Jesus, which is always growing.

## County looking for contractor to get rid of Heritage's walk-in cooler

Members of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors are looking to get rid of a walk-in cooler at the Heritage Center, and they'd like to see it gone sooner rather than later.

During Monday's meeting, board members agreed to seek bids from a contractor to remove and dispose of the cooler after the former county home had a frozen pipe burst earlier this month.

The county's insurance adjuster has told the county the cooler needs to be removed and that ServicePro, which is fixing much of the damage caused by the burst pipe, will not remove the cooler that hasn't been used since Inspiring Lives moved out of the old county home several years ago.

Supervisor Jake Hackman asked County Attorney David Laudner if the county needed to seek bids or if it could declare an

"emergency" and hire a contractor without going through the bidding process that county policy normally calls for.

Laudner said he was uncomfortable with having the board go through the emergency route, pointing out that the pipe burst on Dec. 6.

But he said the board could move rather quickly on bids and county leaders decided to seek bids from a contractor for "removing and disposing all electrical, plumbing and mechanical equipment associated with the walk-in cooler" by Jan. 23.

Bids are due by this coming Monday and will be acted on during the regularly scheduled Board of Supervisors meeting.

Supervisors on Monday also received a 2025-26 funding request from Northeast Iowa Community Action (NICA) Chief Executive Officer Trisha Wilkins, who asked the county to provide \$35,306 in funding. That's the same request NICA made a year ago.

Wilkins told county leaders that NICA had served 817 individuals in Chickasaw County during the past year and provided assistance in the amount of \$256,732.

She said that 262 county residents received low-income home energy assistance in the amount of \$143,800 but also touted NICA's work with the Head Start preschool program, weatherization assistance, crisis assistance and housing.

NICA said the county had 24 students in Head Start, had provided eight residents with \$95,061 for weatherization needs, handled 55 crisis assistance cases in the amount of \$17,871 and helped purchase four lease purchase homes that have a combined assessed value of \$511,800.

"I understand the challenge counties and cities have with budgeting," Wilkins said. "We have kept the request the same this year, not that we don't need additional funding but I understand budget constraints you're facing."

taxpayers perhaps if you say, 'Hey, we've kept our levy rates the same for the last 15 years.' Well, you have, but the valuations have gone up 70 percent in the last 15 years."

Still, counties like Chickasaw that barely exceed the state's threshold will face challenges. Hackman pointed out that a county "to the south of us" will see valuations go up 10 percent next year but even with cutting its tax levy rate, Shekleton said that it will receive about 6 percent more in revenue.

"The smaller counties are really going to suffer with this," Supervisor Steve Breitbach said.

A year ago, supervisors were just beginning a budget process that ended up leading to a 14 percent increase in the so-called "tax-asking" from its three major funds — GB,

General Services (GS) and Rural Services Basic (RSB). That was considerably lower than the 19 percent increase that supervisors first considered.

On Monday, Hackman said he believes the county will end this budget year with strong ending fund balances — pointing out that as of now GB and GS currently have \$3.8 million in the bank.

Laudner, though, asked if one took the ending fund balances out of the equation "is what we're bringing in enough to fund for the county?"

"I would say yes," Hackman said, but he added that it's complicated and that the board that convenes in 2025 will have its work cut out for it as it begins crafting the 2025-26 budget and tax levy. "We're going to have to be more efficient ... if they're going to keep ratcheting down our GB levy rate, what's going to happen?"

Laudner said he believes county leaders will have to continue to deal with state mandates even after House File 718 "sunssets" in 2029.

"If you read the comments from the new Legislature that is coming in, I think property tax reform — which has been a bedeviling problem for years and years and years in this state — is a No. 1 priority. I think they're going to have to massage it a little bit and figure it out better."

But, as he put it, it's not going to go away, and supervisors conceded that they have their work cut out for them in the next few months.

They will begin that process in the first full week of January when they hear budget proposals from the four autonomous county boards — Public Health, Emergency Management, Conservation and Veterans Affairs. A week later, the coun-

ty will begin budget proposals from the other nine county departments.

Left undecided Monday is if county leaders will set pay increases before that.

More than half of the county's employees — those represented by unions — will receive 4 percent raises as part of their contracts, and Hackman said it was his understanding that the autonomous boards for the most part have included pay increases in their budgets.

New Hampton resident Terry Johnson, who made a bid for the District 4 supervisor seat but lost in the Republican primary in June, urged board members to not only be looking at the 2025-26 budget but also future years' budgets.

"Sooner or later, those fund balances, if that's all you're using, are going to go away," he said. "You've got to have a plan and it can't be just looking at one year."

The 1984 graduate of Waldorf continued his collegiate playing career at Iowa State where he earned a business degree in business and marketing.



in the second half, the Chickasaws closed the gap to four with a 16-0 run that was capped by an old-fashioned three-point play from Jordan Thronson.

But Crestwood took control of the game with a strong third quarter, outscoring New Hampton 16-9 to take a 52-41 lead into the final quarter.

"We probably ran three different defenses against them, saw different stuff," Leichtman said. "Our girls do a good job of, you know, trying to work that out ... They fight hard. If you watch our girls, I mean effort is not an issue."

Ava Leichtman led the Chickasaws with 20 points, but she was the lone New Hampton player in double figures. Thronson finished the night with seven points and six rebounds.

The loss to Crestwood was an improvement from the game at Grundy Center, when New Hampton fell behind 21-3 after a quarter play and saw the Spartans take a 59-22 lead into the final quarter.

"I know that score looked ugly," coach Leichtman said, "but at the same time, the effort was there. It's easy to roll over and give up, but our girls, they're not like that. They play hard to final whistle."

His daughter led the way against the Spartans with 15 points and six rebounds.

New Hampton won't play again until a week from Friday, when the Chickasaws travel to Sumner-Fredericksburg to kick off the 2025 portion of its season.

"Because of the season and how long it is and you're going into mid-February and you'll hopefully want to be playing in

March, it's good for these kids," Leichtman said of the holiday break. "They just had semester tests. It's nice to keep playing, but on the other hand, it's time for these kids to be out of school — to get some family time, get some fresh air and be themselves. ... We're going to have a lot of games in the second half, and we can hit the reset and be ready for them."

said after his team fell to 0-4 in conference games, "but we felt like we could get them sped up a little bit and we did."

Down 60-43, New Hampton started its final push with a Caden Rochford 3-pointer. A Kye Rausch bucket, an old-fashioned Adam Ewert 3-point play and four points from Carson Laures brought New Hampton within 61-55 with three minutes remaining.

Crestwood would respond and build the lead back to 10, but New Hampton wouldn't quit and when Ethan Carter hit a 3-pointer with 15 seconds left, New Hampton trailed 72-68 but it would be as close as the Chickasaws would get.

"I'm really proud of our effort. I had a bunch of former players grab me on the way into the locker room and they just said, 'Geez, you guys can play.' So we have to keep doing it. We're close, we are. I know people are tired of hearing it, but I don't really care what everyone thinks. They're not coaching this team."

Ewert led the Chickasaws with 17 points while both Bundy and Carter had 12 apiece, and New Hampton's coach said it was Bundy that in many ways sparked the comeback with those two 3-pointers late in the third quarter.

"Bundy got us going," Rausch said of the junior who went 4-for-6 from beyond the arc, "and I think he was like a lot of our guys. They weren't going to get buried, they were going to fight back. I told you the other night [after a loss to Charles City], we're not just going to get buried anymore and they showed it tonight."

The New Hampton coach

was also pleased with how his team handled what turned out to be an intense game that included two technical fouls — both called on Crestwood.

"We don't have anyone bitching at officials, we don't have anybody hanging their heads," Rausch said. "That was a competitive game, and I think it shows we're heading in the right direction."

Unfortunately, the late-game run on Friday didn't carry over to Saturday's Upper Iowa University Holiday Showcase game against Independence as the Mustangs took a 17-8 first quarter lead and continued to pull away for a 69-43 win.

them do what they did last night," said Arias.

Arias talked about witnessing his team's historic performance with his own two eyes.

"It was even better in person," said Arias.

NH senior Landon Marr bowled the game of his life thus far in his alley career with a school record series toss of 511 – which bested the previous high series mark of 495 set by senior Jamison Porath earlier in the year.

Arias helped Marr – a standout pitcher for Cory McDonald's defending state runner-up baseball team this past summer – fine-tune his game and the results paid off big time. So much so that Marr almost broke the school record high game of 278 that was set in the Waukon match last week by senior Kody Kleen. Marr rolled 276 in his second game after a stout 235 in his opening 10 frames.

"We've been working on some things with him to get him in a better pace as far as his approach and his arm swing. We've also been working on getting him to slow the ball down just a little bit so we can get the ball to read the lane correctly," said Arias.

"The work that he's been putting in as far as doing that obviously showed at this meet."

New Hampton had three bowlers roll over 470 as junior Jaxson Porath collected a 482 and his older brother Jamison finished off his impressive individual round with a 473.

"He bowled outstanding. He's actually scored very well there," said Arias about Jaxson's numbers at Crystal Bowl.

NH sophomore Charlie Kriener

wound up with a 446 and rolled a lights-out 258 in his second game. Chickasaw senior Gabe Macon tallied a 408 and Kleen hit the lanes with a cumulative individual total of 408.

In four meets New Hampton has never had the same person be the low man out score (individual round one total is comprised of the top five bowlers out of the six that are allowed to compete on the varsity level).

"They're definitely picking up each other at the right times and running with it as they go," said Arias.

Is there a ceiling to just how great New Hampton can be this season?

We'll find out after Christmas break as New Hampton hosts three home meets in a row, starting with a date at Bowlaway Lanes on Tuesday, Jan. 7 versus West Delaware.


"I don't think words can describe how high they can go," said Arias.

Arias also reminded his bowlers to remain grounded and keep grinding away despite having so much success so early on in 2024-2025.

"As far as putting the cart in front of the horse, we still need to take it one meet at a time," said Arias. "Anybody can have a good meet – anybody can have a bad meet. It's just a matter of them now still staying the course, doing what we're doing and just keep working hard like they have been."

The other school record broken by New Hampton last Thursday in Grundy Center was the individual total of 2,320 before the baker round starts. That was 243 pins higher compared to last week's 2,077 – which was the old all-time best achievement at New Hampton.

The New Hampton girls rolled a 1,243 to Grundy Center's 1,590.

# NH/TV's Cajthaml, Bucknell both go 6-0 at the Battle of Waterloo

daunting because after wrestling in a Tuesday quadrangular at Nashua, the Chickasaws were scheduled to take on Crestwood on Thursday but that meet was called off because of the weather.

The next morning, NH/TV headed to Waterloo and received a rude awakening in the so-called Al Frost Bracket – falling to Ankeny 68-11, Cedar Rapids Prairie 51-24 and Cedar Falls 58-18.

It was a, in a word, nightmare for every Chickasaw wrestler not named Carter Cajthaml or Jayden Bucknell. Those two won all three of their matches on Friday; the rest of the Chickasaws went a combined 3-24.

"It's disappointing whenever you lose," Paulus said, "but considering who we had available, we knew it was going to be a tough day. We were in a tough bracket, we're giving up three weights [for forfeits] and it's just what it is right now."

NH/TV, though, regrouped somewhat for their final day of wrestling in 2024.

"We talked a lot about the little wins we could get – the take-down here, the escape there, stuff like that," Paulus said. "When you're as green as we are, the wins aren't always getting your hand raised. I thought we came back better – granted, we wanted to win all three but yeah, I think we improved and that's what mattered."

The Chickasaws opened the eighth-place pool with a 48-15 win over Charles City as NH/TV took advantage of four forfeits, got pins from Cajthaml (138), Bucknell (144), Mason Nelson (157) and Jarrin Robinson (190).

NH/TV then rolled to a 65-6 win over Waterloo Columbus as Xander Meyerhoff (126), Braiden Schaufenbuel (132), Bucknell (144), Tate Schwickerath (150), Nelson (157), Cade Carpenter (165) and Caleb Utley (175) all got pins while Cajthaml picked up a technical fall at 138.

But the magic ran out against Waterloo West in the pool's de facto title dual.

NH/TV jumped out to a 23-6 lead strengths to pins from Ty Moudry, Schaufenbuel and Bucknell and Cajthaml's team-leading technical fall and a Carpenter pin at 165 and a forfeit to Utley at 175 gave the Chickasaws a 35-17 lead.

The Wahawks, though, reeled off five straight wins – the final two coming on forfeits – to rally for the win.

Both Cajthaml and Bucknell had perfect tournaments as Cajthaml, ranked 11th by IAwwrestle at 138, improved to 22-3 and the 12th-ranked Bucknell ran his mark to 21-5.

Now, it's time to get healthy.

Kuehner has yet to get on the mat this year as he continues to recover from an ankle injury, but he should be back on the mat early in 2025. Paulus believes Kuehner's return will give the Chickasaws a strong nucleus that would include Cajthaml, Bucknell, Kuehner and Shekleton, who is 14-1 at 150.

"Those are leadership guys," Paulus said. "I've said it all along, we knew we might take our lumps and we have, but the whole point of December was to improve and hopefully we've done that and will be a different team in January."



Steinlage scores career-high 22 to lead Turkey Valley girls to a rout

Your first hint that Turkey Valley may vie for a league title in 2024-2025 was when Steve Hoffert’s Upper Iowa Conference squad knocked off defending champ MFLMarMac in the first week of December.

Fast forward three weeks later and the Trojan girls hoops team is right in the thick of things in the race for conference supremacy after a shellacking of Clayton Ridge at home on Friday night in Jackson Junction.

That 61-20 blowout of the Eagles in the last game of 2024 before TV went on Christmas break is a good indicator that the Trojans are here to stay – at least in terms of who is in the running for a UIC championship banner.

“This was a good way to go into break. We played really well defensively for four quarters and that will need to continue as the season progresses,” said Hoffert.

TV was led by junior Addison Steinlage, who pumped in a career-high 22 points on 8-17 shooting. The left-handed guard produced a stat line that will surely make her a candidate for first-team all conference this winter as she came up with seven steals and six assists.

Steinlage is the league’s fourth-best scorer currently through seven games played with a 14.6 average.

Speaking of leaders in the conference, Trojan sophomore Bella Stika leads the league in rebounds (13 rpg) and is second in steals (4.4 spg). Still, it might have been a defensive change that was the key as New Hampton put on a press in the final quarter that seemed to get the Cadets out of sorts.


"That was good for us because sometimes I've been a little reluctant to press because our guys play so hard that you want them to still have some legs," Rausch

Now the most important part of the season will take place when the Chickasaws and head coach Caleb Ciavarelli hit the mat back from Christmas break in January.

That means a Jan. 2 date at the Osage Invite will loom large for a squad that will aim to reach its full potential when regionals roll around later that month in 2025.

"The biggest thing is we're not ready for regionals today and we shouldn't be. We should be constantly looking to get better and training for regionals so we're peaking at the right time," said Ciavarelli.

Ciavarelli, in his third year at NH/TV (the same number of seasons the sport of girls wrestling has been sanctioned by the state of Iowa), spoke those words in Nashua last week Tuesday at the conclusion of his team's last meet of 2024.

That was a battle against North Fayette Valley – a contest that saw the Chickasaws reel in win No. 2 on the dual season by a score of 30-24. A scheduled bout with the host Huskies was forgone as N-P had a few wrestlers that suffered injuries that evening and both head coaches decided there would be too many open weights to continue.

Ciavarelli talked about where his team
