Desk purchased for dispatch under sheriff's office remodel

Laptops Ok'd for board of health

Chickasaw County 911 coordinator Austen Seely has been researching a new dispatch desk since last April, he told Board of Supervisors on Monday. The current desk dates from the 1970s and is crammed into a 12-by-10-foot

There are supposed to be two positions at the desk. "Essentially right now one (position) is functional where a dispatcher can sit... The second one is so discombobulated and it can't be modified really with the current desk," Seely said.

Communications supplier RaCom through Evans Furniture delivered a quote for a vertically adjustable custom desk for dispatch consoles one and two, at \$46,542. Seely said the desk would be removable if a new sheriff's building were built.

"It's the only desk in county that's staffed 24/7," Seely said.

There was a \$438 savings if county staff removes abandoned equipment, which Seely advocated doing.

"The dignatch space wo're

"The dispatch space we're working in is so small that this is a custom desk," he said.

Seely reached out to a few companies after a local contractor said the project was beyond his scope. One company had insufficiently sturdy desks, he said. Another quote, for two desks, would have caused the dispatchers' chairs to collide when they backed up in the small room, he said.

"Show me what we're getting for (the price)," Supervisor Dan Carolan said. Seely showed him the documents.

"Ten thousand for a setup fee?" Carolan said, shaking his head at the \$10,345 estimated for "installation and freight." Seely said the brand of desk

was used in Fayette, Bremer and Howard counties and that he had received good reports from other purchasers. "I've been working with the

dispatchers and this is what they want," Seely said.

There was sufficient funding

There was sufficient funding in the 911 budget to cover the entire quote, but the desk was not expected to be ready until fall. Board members suggested paying part of the price now and part on delivery as allowed by the company.

"The other reason I believe why we have to move on this, if we move on this, is the remodel is in this year's budget," Board of Supervisors Chairman Jacob Hackman said. "(The sheriff) did not budget it for next year."

A motion to approve purchasing the dispatch desk from Evans Furniture at \$46,542 from the capital projects fund passed without contest.

• To purchase six Surface

Pro laptops for about \$11,722 from the data processing budget, to be used for the Board of Health, was approved by the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors on Monday. This year's data processing budget includes the funds to pay for it, said Ray Armel, who handles data processing. The budget covers hardware, software and service contracts. Software is expected to arrive in early June. The plan is to have the machines in use for a June

training session

Some of the oldest computers in the courthouse are in the process of being replaced, as budgeted. When complete, there will be two replacement computers in the assessor's office, two in the recorder's office, and one in the treasurer's office, he said.

• The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors accepted three resignations on Monday.

Jail administrator Keri Stepan resigned effective May 22 to take a job in the Fayette County Treasurer's Office, citing changes to the county family health insurance coverage.

"While the decision to leave the Sheriff's Office has been one of the hardest I have faced, the upcoming changes to our family health insurance coverage has made the decision a bit easier. It is my hope that the Board of Supervisors will realize that these changes are not in the best interest of the people who serve Chickasaw County," Stepan wrote.

on its website.

"I feel I ...only can handle my department for (HIPAA) compliance," Public Health Administrator Kathy Babcock wrote. "This position (requires to) devote ... more time than I have available to fill the needs of compliance with training and education."
