Virus vaccine boosters OK'd

County reports 30 new COVID cases, has some boost doses

After dropping for two weeks, the number of new positive COVID-19 tests inched up last week as Public Health officials began preparing to administer boost doses of vaccines.

Public Health and Homecare Services Administrator Lisa Welter, in her weekly report released on Friday, said 30 new positive tests of the virus were reported during the week, up from 25 the week before. The county had reported 61 positive tests Oct. 8 and 35 more positive tests on Oct. 15.

"It's not the direction we want to go, but it wasn't a big jump so I'm hoping we're still in that trend of seeing the number of positives drop," Welter said SEE COVID, 9

Laura Wickham and Donna Geerts turned on the voting machines Thursday morning, picked up a handful of ballots and went to work.

Some of the ballots were filled out correctly; some were not. Some were completely filled out; some were not. Some of the ballots didn't have votes cast in certain races; some had too many votes - three city council votes for only two city council seats - cast.

But then again, that was the point of this little exercise, for the two Chickasaw County Auditor's Office employees feeding ballots through the machines were conducting a state-mandated testing of the machines that will be used today (Tuesday) when voters head to the polls for the everyother-year municipal/school elections.

"We want to make sure that the machines aren't just


There will also be two-hour early dismissals both today (Tuesday) and on Thursday as conferences will run from 2:30 to 8 p.m. each day.

THE GOLDEN RULE

JESUS TEACHES US THE EMPATHIC ESSENCE OF MORALITY

The Golden Rule is the ethical principle of treating other people as one's self would prefer to be treated.

One of Jesus' most famous and impactful teachings, the Golden Rule can be found in the Bible verses Matthew 7:12 and Luke 6:31:

"So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 7:12

"Do to others as you would have them do to you." Luke 6:31 A simple notion about the ethical treatment of others that was profound in its origin and reso-

Meaning of the Golden

vail. Matthew's reference presents the Golden Rule as encapsulating the teachings of the law and the prophets.

Matthew 7:12 reads, "So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets."

Second, even though the Golden Rule addresses human interpersonal relationships, its message is additionally theological. That is, the very character of God guides how we should interact and relate to one another.

Importance of Following the Golden Rule

We are to follow and exercise the Golden Rule because God's heavenly wisdom teaches self-control, and his virtue teaches kindness. This proverb is appropriately called the Golden Rule, for it encompasses in its few words the underlying and guiding principle of all morality. It comprises all the rules of the law with regard to man and all the amplification of those precepts given by the prophets. It instructs us to put ourselves in our neighbor's place, and guide our behavior accordingly. It assumes, of course, that when we put ourselves in our neighbor's place, we are wise enough not to make any foolish wishes and good enough not to make any evil ones.

Examples of the Golden Rule

The Golden Rule has inspired several subsequent sayings and ethical declarations since its revelation by Jesus. Listed below are some examples of such inspirations:

• "Put yourself in their shoes" - Another call to empathy and understanding another's situation and point of view, this phrase calls upon us to picture ourselves as our fellow human and recognize the sovereignty and emotions of each individual.

• "Do not do unto others as you would not want done to



state senator, Waylon Brown, no longer lives in the district as his residence has been moved to Senate District 30, where the St. Ansgar Republican could face a matchup with another sitting senator, Democrat Amanda Ragan of Mason City.

New Hampton's representative in the Iowa House, Democrat Todd Prichard, also will see changes in his new district. Prichard currently represents all of Floyd and Chickasaw counties and the eastern quarter of Cerro Gordo County.

His new district is moving to the east and south. Gone will be Cerro Gordo County and the western part of Floyd County, replaced by much of Bremer County, save for the southwest corner that includes the

city of Waverlv.

"I support the process, even if it does come with some pretty significant changes for my district," Prichard said. "We do it right in Iowa, and I support that."

Still, there's little doubt that the new district has a more conservative lean to it, and Prichard said he has yet to decide if he'll run for a sixth term in the House.

"But that's no different than in a lot of other election cycles," he said. "I have plenty of time to decide, and I guess the best way for me to put it is that I will remain in politics in some capacity. I care about this state and its people."


He said he would make a decision by sometime early in 2022.

But the new State Senate District 29 that includes Chickasaw County, already has a candidate.

Current State Rep. Sandy Salmon, R-Janesville, said she will seek the senate seat that will represent all of Chickasaw, Bremer and Butler counties as well as most of Floyd County.

"It has been a humbling experience and an honor for me to serve Iowans in the House. I have worked to pass a fiscally responsible budget, income tax reform, property tax relief, education reforms, and pro-life and pro-liberty legislation but there is still much to be done," said Salmon in a press release announcing her campaign.

"I look forward to meeting with new citizens as well as those I currently represent and earning their vote to continue my work on their behalf."

counting votes correctly," Wickham said, "but we also want to make sure that they're counting them correctly, that they're reading 'overvotes' and things like that." So as they made their way through the testing, the voting machines spit out "receipts" telling the testers — like it will tell voters today - what they did wrong. Those mistakes – the over voting for a city council race, for example – can be corrected by a voter today because he or she can "revote," if you will. "Only one of their ballots will count obviously," Wickham said, "but the point of today is to make sure that the machines are doing what they're supposed to do, and we'll test every one of the machines that we'll use on Tuesday so that we're ready to go." testing of voting The machines before every election is required by Iowa Code, Chickasaw County Auditor Stephanie Mashek said. Auditors are also required to notify the Republican and Democratic chairpersons and invite them to the testing, and they also must publish a legal notice telling the public the date and place of the testing. "It is open to the public," Mashek said, "and it's another way that we can show the integrity of our elections. We want the public to know that the votes are being counted correctly, that the machines are doing what they're designed to do." As they tested the machines, Wickham and Geerts were asked about how write-in votes are counted during an election, which will be especially important in some of the races that will be decided by today's voting. In New Hampton, for example, there are in effect two offices that have no candidates on the ballot, although Kalista Porath-Daly has announced a writein campaign for a City Council Ward 2 seat and Kyle Anderson has done the same with an open Park Board seat. "The way it works is the PEO [precinct-election official] makes that call. It's not up to me or Donna or Stephanie," Wickham said. "The PEO

makes that judgement call that if you spell Kalista with a 'C' or something like that, they have the final say on write-ins.

As the reporter readied himself to leave, the two women kept feeding ballots through the machines and checking the results.

"If you get bored," Wickham said, "we'll be here a while."

In fact, she said for a municipal/school election, testing can take up to four hours and for a general election in which more machines are used, testing takes all day.

"It's worth it to me," she said, "because hopefully people understand how importantly we take elections. We want people to have confidence and understand that our elections have integrity and this is a good way to show that."

Polls opened today at 7 a.m. and will close tonight at 8.

Mashek said that her office has "combined" several precincts for today's election for a couple of reasons. First, finding precinct-election officials has become a more difficult task in recent years, and second, it does save the county money.

She also reminded voters they must have a valid ID to cast a ballot.



Multiple agencies work together to nab suspects

Three Minnesotans charged with offenses after two high-speed chases in Howard, Chickasaw counties

Three Minnesota men are in jail after two separate highspeed chases took place across two counties this past Thursday. According to a press release from the Howard County's Sheriff's Office, Devlaeminck, Jesse 42, from Rochester, Minnesota; Thompson, 36, Nathaniel from Mankato, Minnesota; and Eleana McDonough, 38, of Willmar, Minnesota, were arrested by law enforcement personnel after a day in which officers from multiple agencies responded to calls that began around 7:30 a.m. on Thursday. That's when the Howard County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call from a citizen who was following three pickups, whose occupants allegedly attempted to steal a trailer from Elma.



She said that the county does have boost doses available for those who received the Johnson and Johnson and the Moderna vaccines but that Public Health doesn't have Pfizer booster doses available because her department gave out relatively few vaccines made by Pfizer.

"I think one of the things that is important for people to understand is that you don't have to get the boost dose from the same place you received your vaccine," she said. "Just because you got the vaccine from us doesn't mean you can't go somewhere else to get the boost."

Under the guidelines put out last month, those eligible for the Johnson and Johnson boost dose must be 18 or older and have gone at least two months since they received their vaccine. For both the Moderna Health at 641-394-4053 to

Bowling alley overcomes pandemic challenges

Bowlaway Lanes owner and his family appreciative of the fact that leagues growing, sport gaining popularity

Bowling is in Josh Novak's blood.

One isn't able to rack up sixty-eight 300 perfect games if you're not passionate about the pin game.

"I think I was about three when I started bowling," said Novak with a playful smirk as he made sure his daughter ate her lunch Friday afternoon at the bowling alley he helped remodel and transform.

Novak owns Bowlaway Lanes in New Hampton and has made his business work despite bowling alleys across the nation closing their doors because of hard times.

"After COVID - that was our best year," said Novak.

Novak runs the business which he purchased from Maxine Skoda in May of 2017 with his wife, Laura, and his mom, Judy.

"There's just three of us," smiled Novak.

Oh, you can't forget about part-timer John Dreckman - a 20-year old who is one of the vounger members of Bowlaway Lanes' Wednesday night men's league.

"He's a go-getter," said Novak.

Part of the reason Novak and his family have made these lanes in New Hampton a success is well, because of the community itself.

"We're fortunate that we're growing. I've heard of other bowling alleys that lose five to six teams a year," said Novak.

Novak said his five league nights - which includes a youth league on Saturday - are thriv-

"When we first bought the place there were 16 teams and we're at over 30 now. We've almost doubled," Novak said.

So life is good for Josh and so is business for his bowling family.

It sounds like there will be plenty of turkeys rolled at Novak's family-run lanes, especially with Thanksgiving just around the corner.

The contest pushed up towards three hours of completion and the reason was simple - scoring, more scoring and wouldn't you know it, more touchdown celebrations.

Kee's quarterback, senior Damon Weber, threw for 299 yards and accounted for all of Kee's six touchdowns. He netted five TD scoring strikes and regrouped his troops after TV led 40-28 with 7:26 remaining in the game. Kee High's aerial assault rained down on TV's secondary, exploiting one-onematchups - the biggest dagger coming on a 3rd-and-8 from the TV 37-yard line where Weber found a wide open Dalton Dibert for a 37-yard scoring strike just underneath a minute to play (0:59).



Northeast Iowa Community Action Corporation (NE-ICAC) Family Service offices are taking applications for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

All homeowners and renters are eligible to apply.

LIHEAP customers will need to furnish a form of identification for all household members, a copy of their most recent heating and electric bills and proof of ALL household members' gross income for the past 30 calendar days, the most recent 12 months or for the past calendar year.

Residents who have a household income that doesn't exceed the 200 percent of the federal poverty level are eligible to apply. That threshold is an annual income of \$25,760 for a one-person household and an additional \$9,080 for each additional household member. That mans a family of four's household income must not exceed \$53,000.

Community action officials emphasize that the program is not designed to pay a household's total energy costs. The program will provide supplemental assistance based on several factors. Those factors include total household income, household size, dwelling type, and type

of heating fuel, among others. Those who would like to apply for the program should call their local community action offices. Chickasaw County residents can call 641-394-2007, Howard County residents should call 563-547-4413, Winneshiek County residents should call 563-387-4958, Fayette Countv residents should call 563-422-3354 and Bremer County residents should call 319-352-4532.





that in about the first 100 yards.

But Anderson stuck to his plan, made a big move over the second mile up to 71st and cruised home in a time of 17:59.74.

"It seriously was a lot of fun," he said, "and I'd love to get back here. I learned a lot, I think, and ..

His voiced trailed off and a mischievous smile crossed his face.

"Heck, even the running was fun."

Ohrt said she was ecstatic with how her first-time state qualifiers handled the atmosphere and competition in Fort Dodge.

"It's like a totally different meet," she said, "and sometimes you see kids get here, look around and they're done. Or they get started running and then they're done. Natalie and PJ, I figured were the kind of kids that could handle all that, and I'm so happy that they proved me right."

And then there was Usher, the senior who has faced so much adversity.

Along with the rest of his fellow track athletes, he lost his sophomore season because it was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

He came back to have a 2020 strong cross country season a year ago, making the state meet but finishing a disappointing 58th. He then missed all of this past spring's track season with a stress reaction injury to his knee.

For a kid who lives to run, the months of inaction, as he put it, sucked.

Usher, though, came on strong this season and ran a career-best time on his way to a fifth-place finish at the state qualifying meet. One of his goals heading into Saturday was to end what he "Usher Family Curse" at state.

"We always seem to have good seasons and then we get here and it never goes well," he said.

And it wasn't going exactly peachy for Usher Saturday, although it wasn't as bad as he thought. He was 36th after a mile and hadn't improved much in the next half mile.

Then he made "the decision."

"I just kind of relaxed and it worked well," he said. "I love running and I can tell you that may have been the most enjoyable mile and a half run I've ever had. I've loved being a Chickasaw in cross country, and I just wanted to make sure I gave it all I had and end it on a high note."

He did, passing more than a dozen runners and finishing in a time of 17:09.24, just five places from the top-15, which is

considered all-state.

"It was weird," Usher said when asked how he felt late in the race. "I obviously wanted to get done as fast as I could but I also didn't want it to end, either."

His coach felt the same way.

For nine years, Ohrt has had an Usher in her lineup. Dylan's cousin, Jake, ran for the Chickasaws between 2013 and 2016, while his older brother, Nolan, ran cross country for New Hampton from 2015 to 2018.

As the "Usher Era" ended on Saturday, Ohrt was asked about her senior star. For the longest moment, she said noth-

ing; instead the sunglasses she wore hid the tears.

"I'm so happy for him because he really

deserved a day like today," she said. "Top 20, people don't realize how hard that is to do in this sport."

Her voice trailed off and she was asked about entering the 2022 season without an Usher to pencil into the lineup.

Again, it was a good thing that it was a brilliantly bright day in Fort Dodge. The sunglasses once more hid the tears.

"He's irreplaceable," she said quietly. "It's not his times, as good as they've been, it's just Dylan. He's everything you want in a senior athlete. He's a team guy ... he's a leader ... he's a guy you just can't replace."

She paused one more time and her face broke out in a wide smile.

"And I was lucky enough to coach him."

So did Blazek, and indeed, she did cut three seconds off Steines' lead over the last 1.1 miles, but that second mile proved to be the difference.



Trojans' magical season comes to an end

Turkey Valley falls to Kee 42-40 in an eight-man playoff shootout

One of two very talented teams was going to have to make the long haul down south this Thursday near the body of water that separates the border between Iowa and Illinois.

And that pigskin squad was the prolific passing of the Kee High Hawks - which play its home games just a stone's throw away from that second longest river in the United States.

A few short miles from the Mississippi River in Preston will be the destination of those pass-happy Hawks as they eliminated seventh-rated Turkey Valley (9-1) last Friday night in Jackson Junction in what was an absolute barnburner of an 8-Man shootout.

The only thing missing in this duel were some shiny six

shooters and a corral to stop these high-scoring teams from entering the end zone.

After the dust cleared in this back-and-forth showdown, it was a shame one team's season had to end. But Kee (9-1) was the resilient squad left standing as it rallied and raced past TV to lasso a victory by the score of 42-40.

"They made more plays than we did. We made more mistakes than we needed to make," said TV head coach Mark Scott, who ended his 19th season as the Trojan front man and put a cap on a season in which TV accomplished a perfect regular season for the seventh time in school history.

This heart-stopper put a blemish on that undefeated season and more importantly,

She ran the race of her life, and it still didn't give Turkey Valley's Jalyssa Blazek that elusive first state cross country title.

And you know what?

Because of the first part of the opening sentence of this story, she's OK with that.

Blazek burned up the Lakeside Municipal Golf Course Saturday at the Class 1A state meet with a time of 18:36.25. That was good enough to shatter her previous career-best time by more than 10 seconds. That was good enough to set a Class 1A state cross country meet record.

Except for one thing - or shall we say one person, Noelle Steines of Calamus-Wheatland, the freshman who claimed the 1A title with a run of 18:20.91.

"I just told her thank you for pushing me to a time I really didn't know I had in me," Blazek

said. "I can't be disappointed with that time, and as much as I wanted to win, I'm happy. How can I not be?"

While Blazek was making her run to a fourthstraight state cross country medal, her teammate, fellow senior Cambree Kruse, capped her career with a strong run to finish in the top half of the 1A field. Kruse covered the 3.1-mile course in 21:52.58, good for a 60th-place finish in the 152-girl field.

It was a fitting end for a Kruse, who had experienced so much disappointment at the 2020

About halfway through the race at Saturday's Class 2A state cross country meet, New Hampton senior Dylan Usher made the decision.

He was going to enjoy the last mile and a half of his high school career.

"I felt like I was so far back, maybe in the 50s or something like that," he said, "and it's like just said to myself that this is

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it, I'm going to run, I'm going to have fun and I'm going to enjoy it." There was a lot to enjoy for

New Hampton on Saturday as the Chickasaws may not have recorded any career-best times but all three New Hampton athletes placed higher than their seeds as they showed off some mid-race brilliance.

When it was over, Usher had a 20th-place finish, Peyton Anderson was in the top half of the boys field with a 65th-place finish and Nosbisch, the quiet, shy freshman, claimed a 35th-place finish in the girls race.

"I can't be prouder of these three," New Hampton coach Jamie Ohrt said. "Natalie handled the big stage, and so did PJ. And Dylan ... well, Dylan was just Dylan. He's gone through so much the last couple of years and he finished on such a high note."

Let's start with Nosbisch.

After a mile, the Chickasaw freshman was mired in 71st place in a large pack, and then made a dramatic move over the second mile at Fort Dodge's Lakeside Municipal Course. By the time the runners reached the mile two mark, she had moved up to 39th place. She kept a strong pace to finish with a time of 20:38.66.

The girl of very few words said she wasn't nervous heading into her first state meet, and her reaction after finishing in the top 26.5 percent of the biggest meet of the year?

"I just wanted to go as fast as I could and get it done," she said. "It was fun."

Like Nosbisch, Anderson was running in his first state meet, and the junior was way back as runners reached the first mile marker; in fact, the Chickasaw junior was 101st.

"I knew I couldn't kill myself going out, but it is kind of hard because everyone here's so fast," Anderson said. "State's definitely different, I learned
