Ambulance Council explores funding public EMS

Members know costs will go up, at least initially, say they need to take it back to their respective cities

City representatives plan on providing their respective City Councils with adjusted contribution numbers to potentially fund a public-owned ambulance service.

That's the latest development after the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council met Tuesday evening.

It's an encouraging step forward by the county and the various cities within its border in an attempt to extend emergency medical services after the current private contract with the Chickasaw County Ambulance Service runs out at the end of the year on Dec. 31.

The owner of that private-run ambulance service, Jeremy McGrath, said he is not interested in extending the current contract

with Chickasaw County, but said he would sell the 3,000-square foot building that houses three ambulance. The price tag is \$1.725 million and that cost does not include operational expense such as dispatch service and a benefits package for staffing.

"I'm done with the politics part of this," McGrath said during a Board of Supervisors meeting on Tuesday morning. "That's why I gave a hard

stop date."

The county currently foots 40 percent of the bill for the EMS and the cities combine to pay 60 percent of that total. A public, county-owned EMS is expected to lose \$650,000 in its first year of operation according to estimated figures

REMEMBERING THE FALLEN

NASHUA RESIDENTS JOIN VETERANS IN OBSERVING THE REASON WE MARK MEMORIAL DAY

Even though it's been almost a half century ago, Leland Lumley remembers.

He'll never forget.

That's the reason he and millions of others Americans across the nation honored fallen comrades and heroes on a solemn and proud occasion like Monday morning at Veterans Memorial Park in Nashua.

There, near the beautiful Cedar Lake on a gorgeous spring day, soldiers and fighters for freedom that are no longer with us were given their proper respect on Memorial Day.

A trumpet played, guns fired into the air.

There were tears that were shed – there were memories relived.

The turnout in Nashua for the solemn salute to those that have fought for their country and paid the ultimate price for that bravery was substantially bigger than last

year.

Many of the patriotic mourners of military veterans that have since passed made the trek across the Cedar River over to Greenwood Cemetery where the Nashua-Plainfield High School band played. N-P history teacher Suzy Turner, along with one of her students, Caleb Sinnwell, also spoke to the audience.

Lumley served in the Navy from 1963 until 1967 and fought in one of America's most controversial wars – Vietnam.

"We're remembering the ones that didn't come back with us," said Lumley.

Lumley, Commander of the local Nashua VFW Post 6792, fought in Vietnam from 1966-1967. He was part of Naval Air reconnaissance missions in the Southeast Asian conflict.

The local American Legion and Auxiliary also took part in each of the ceremonies, which a featured

"Suzy is a superior project developer," LMC Executive Director Norm Conard said, "and will have much expertise to share with our 2022 Fellows team. We look forward to working with Suzy and learning from her vast array of successes and experiences."

Voters will head to the polls Tuesday to decide who will 'advance' to November

Republicans will have several contested races in primary that will also decide which Democrat will take on Grassley

Voters will head to the polls this Tuesday for a primary election that has some contested races on tap.

And that's especially true for Republicans, as the longest serving member of the Chickasaw County

Board of Supervisors is facing a primary challenge, three are seeking the GOP nomination for a redrawn Iowa House of Representatives seat and two more Republicans are vying for their party's nomination for Chickasaw County treasurer.

Early voting began on May 17, and will wrap up this Monday at 4:30 p.m.

at the Chickasaw County Auditor's Office. Through Tuesday morning, 255 residents had cast early ballots while another 64 ballots had been mailed out but not returned to the Auditor's Office.

"It's important that people remember that the ballots have to be back in our office by 8 p.m. on Tuesday," said

Deputy Commissioner of Elections Laura Wickham, "so it's just a friendly reminder to those we mailed ballots that they need to get them back to the Auditor's Office."

Auditor and Elections Commissioner Stephanie Mashek reminded voters that her office will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. this Saturday for those who

want to cast ballots in the primary.

In a primary, voters must declare either as Democrats or Republicans and can vote in only one party's primary.

Polls on Tuesday will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., and Nashua area

a 21-Gun Salute and Echo Taps being played by N-P students. Area Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts also helped place wreaths near a gravestone at the cemetery.

The day was packed with emotion for many, especially for Lumley and his friend – Dan Bilharz – who is VFW Post 6792 Quartermaster and served in Vietnam from 1971 until 1973 while in the Army.

Lumley spoke about the horrible loss of life he witnessed while engaged in a war that killed almost 60,000 young Americans during a turbulent time in the 1960s for the United States.

“When I went in – Dan was 20 years old. You’re not going to die. That’s the feeling you have. That’s the thought you have,” said Lumley. “I’m not going to die, not me. You end up four hours later and your friend is dead and you’re not. It’s not easy.”

Lumley said it’s difficult to put into words what took place over 45 years ago in a foreign country such as South Vietnam that was fighting communism along with the U.S. He has sense of togetherness with all who have fought in any war throughout history. That will never leave him.

“It’s a feeling of camaraderie and a feeling of loss,” said Lumley. “It’s all the same emotion. If you can understand that. It’s hard remembering people. It’s many years ago – everybody thinks you forget.”

Turner, an N-P History teacher and Natural History Day Advisor, has been an educator for 29 years – 18 of those with N-P Schools. She spoke about how she became involved with Monday’s Memorial Day observances in Nashua.

“I must admit that I was a little surprised when Dan Bilharz called me and invited me to speak today. After all, I’m a teacher and I’ve never served in the military,” said Turner. “However, after some reflection, I realized perhaps I do have an important message to share today.”

Tuner talked about getting

involved with the Normandy Sacrifice for Freedom Institute in January of 2016. That program – sponsored by NHD – allowed her to travel to Normandy, France, where she visited Omaha Beach and was able to see firsthand the sites where the historic D-Day landings took place. Fourteen other student-and-teacher teams from the across the nation took part in the amazing life-changing research project.

Her student at the time – Caleb Lines – studied a local fallen hero – Ervin Westendorf of Waverly. Lines delivered a eulogy at Westendorf’s gravesite.

“I have had some unique experiences studying local, silent heroes who lost their lives in military service to our country, which profoundly deepened my own understanding of sacrifice and provided me with some tools to aide the next generation and have a better understanding of it as well,” said Turner.

Two years later in 2018 Turner was able to eulogize a fallen World War I U.S. soldier. In 2019, Turner eulogized Harvey Eugene Wilson Jr. at Luxembourg American Military Cemetery. Wilson Jr. was a soldier who died in WWII’s Battle of the Bulge

“It was such a powerful experience listening to the students deliver their eulogies and give voice to the sacrifice for silent heroes they’ve never met, but to

whom they felt so connected,” said Turner.

Sinnwell won the 2021 Junior Individual Website first place award for his World War II Ghost Army project, which made him a national champion in the NHD contest.

Sinnwell, an N-P freshman, read aloud to the crowd from Logan’s Orders, which is a Union Army directive issued during the American Civil War that helped pave the way for Memorial Day to become a federal holiday on the last Monday in May.

General Order No. 11, recited by Maj. Gen. John A. Logan on May 5, 1868, “designated May 30 for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during their late rebellion.”

Lumley said there are around 60 members of his Nashua VFW Post.

“With active members, it’s hard to get ‘em to come,” said Lumley. “A lot of them work nights and most of them have families.”

That’s why he’s making a concerted effort to the younger generation that have served in the military to join his long-standing organization.

“We’re slowing getting younger people to join. That’s what it takes,” said Lumley. “We don’t want this to die out – remembrance. That’s all it is is remembering.”

Speaker touts organization that gave him his life back

Former soldier who fought in Afghanistan shares the story of how Retrieving Freedom helped him

As Trent Dirks told his incredible story — one that started years ago as a seventh-grader in Grundy Center — his service dog nestled against the back of his friend’s legs.

Dirks told the large crowd gathered for New Hampton’s annual Memorial Day observance about the paper he wrote for a social studies class, one that urged residents of his hometown to donate their time and money to the building of a veterans memorial.

He shared how he grew up and became a soldier and how he and his unit were deployed to Afghanistan during the War on Terrorism.

He remembered his friends, his fellow soldiers, who fell in battle.

“It is an absolute terrible feeling,” he said, “when you know that your friend is not going home.”

And then he told the story of how he and many of his fellow soldiers came home filled with depression, anxiety and post-traumatic stress disorder.

“Twenty-two veterans a day commit suicide,” he said and then paused for a moment to let that number sink in. “You heard me right, 22 veterans a day.”

Since coming home from the Middle East in 2011, he knows first hand the pain that comes with those suicides. Dirks talked about Doc Hutchinson and Ryan Witt — friends and fellow soldiers that ended their lives. He talked about the tragic deaths of Carlos Puente and Lindsey Stupp, and he shared that he was at the point where he, too, thought about ending his own life.

“I was at the point where I was self-medicating and ... honestly ... I thought about taking my hands off the wheel,” he said.

And then Tracer stepped in.

His service dog, provided by Retrieving Freedom, was with him on that fateful day. He jumped into the front seat, put his paw on one of Dirks’ hands and the eyes of dog and master

met.

“Those eyes looked deep into my soul,” Dirks said during his keynote address at the Memorial Day program, “and told me, I needed to get help.”

On that day, that beautiful labrador knew his friend was at a proverbial T in his life.

One turn would have taken Dirks to suicide; the other, the one he took, was a chance at life again. Tracer, Dirks said, helped him make the correct turn.

The former soldier went through an intensive four-month treatment program and began rebuilding his life. Tracer, he said, was at his side the entire time.

Today, he serves as the resource development director for Retrieving Freedom and is based in Waverly. He said Tracer has not only helped his depression, anxiety and PTSD but he has also given him a chance to be “a good father to my son” and a productive member of society, one who takes great pride in raising funds so that the organization can provide service dogs to veterans like himself.

Following the program, he was asked about speaking in front of hundreds of people.

“If you had told me I’d be doing this six, seven years ago,” he said, “trust me, I would have thought you were certifiable.”

He paused for a moment, looked down at Tracer and smiled.

“He’s the reason I’m here,” he said, “and he’s the reason I will continue to tell my story. He gave me my life back, and I want other veterans going through the same pain I went through to have that same chance.”

Dale Allen Poe was born March 20, 1953, in Charles City, to parents Harold and Florence (Howe) Poe.

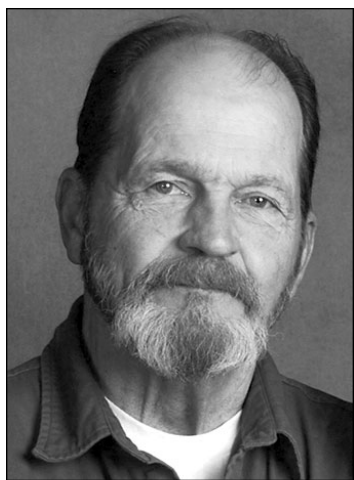
He grew up in Nashua and was raised to be a hard worker. Early in his life Dale spent time drawing, carving wood and etching glass. He was very talented as an artist.

Supervisors may have erred in approving new elevator

County attorney brings up concerns; board members also discuss potential of selling Heritage property

The item — “amend the motion made on May 16th, 2022, for the purchase of an elevator for the courthouse” — on the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors’ agenda Tuesday morning seemed pretty straight forward.

Last month, on a 4-1 vote, supervisors had approved spending a little more than \$207,000 to put in a new elevator at the courthouse because of maintenance concerns about the current elevator, which led to concerns that if parts couldn’t be obtained for it, the courthouse would not be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

But because one of the payments for the new elevator needed to occur before the fiscal year ends on June 30, supervisors on Tuesday considered using American Recovery Plan Act funds for the almost \$52,000 that Schumacher Elevator required before starting the installation.

Not so fast, said County Attorney David Laudner, who pointed out that the supervisors, according to state law, should have put out bids for a new elevator.

“Anything north of \$100,00 needs to be bid out,” Laudner said.

Supervisor Jason Byrne, though, said it was his understanding that Schumacher is the only elevator in company in Iowa, but

Laudner said his interpretation of the code is that is not one of the extenuating circumstances that allows government entities to not go through a bidding process for a project of the elevator’s scope.

Board members discussed the situation, and while Board Chairman Matt Kuhn expressed concerns because “we have a signed contract with Schumacher,” he said he would contact the company to see if the county could put the project on hold.

Supervisors then voted 4-0 — with Jake Hackman, who voted against the May 16 resolution, casting a “present” vote — to “rescind” the resolution to purchase the new elevator.

Also on Tuesday, board members learned that Inspiring Lives, which has leased the county’s Heritage Property just south of the New Hampton city limits for the past nine years, will vacate the property by June 30, which would meet a deadline set by supervisors after the county and the mental-health organization could not reach an agreement on a new lease.

Kuhn said the county has been contacted by a party that is interested in purchasing the property. “The party did not disclose a price, it was just an expression of interest,” he said, “and I said I would bring it to the board’s attention.”

Kuhn added that he told the potential buyer that the farm ground that is connect-

ed to the Heritage property is not for sale.

But the rest of the board had a number of concerns — ranging from the pioneer cemetery on the grounds to if the county would want to keep the cold-storage building on the site.

Hackman said he felt that the property should be surveyed and first suggested breaking the property into three parcels — the farmland, the Heritage building and the area around the cold-storage building.

Laudner told supervisors they had a couple of options if they want to move forward with the sale — one, finding out the price from the interested party and then holding a public hearing or two, publish it for sale and accept closed bids. He pointed out that just because the county put up the property for sale did not mean that the supervisors would have to accept any of the bids.

Board members then returned to how many parcels should the property be divided into, and after discussion about the difficulties in obtaining easements for the cold storage building, they decided to have it broken into two parcels — the farmland and the rest of the property.

And while they didn’t indicate how interested they were when it came to selling the Heritage property, minus the farmland, they did agree that an easement would be needed to allow the Pioneer Cemetery Commission to maintain the cemetery.

Changes may have to be made to ambulance 28E

provided to the Council.

"The first couple years will be rough. Any startup is," said Ionia Mayor Randy Taylor. "But I think if everybody sticks together, after those first years – numbers start staying together. It will probably end up costing less than it does now."

NOW FIVE AMBULANCE Council representatives that represent the cities within the county – New Hampton, Alta Vista, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler, Nashua and North Washington – will adjust financial numbers to bring forth to their City Councils to possibly amend their budgets that could signal a new service could possibly be up and running at the start of the year.

For instance, if Lawler contributed \$20,000 yearly to the EMS in a proposed contract, that figure would have to be inflated three-fold to \$60,000 with the new estimates for cost according to some city representatives in attendance.

That increased city contribution would of course require a vote by each City Council to approve the new amended totals that could extend service.

"I think the only way this works in this time frame is to purchase the current provider out," said Fredericksburg Mayor Jimmy Mitchell.

"The projected cost of this thing is a lot bigger than what we're probably allowed to commit to. Not only that, we have the question of funding 28E. That all needs to be answered."

CHICKASAW COUNTY Attorney David Laudner let the Council and those in attendance know that the deadline for any city to back out of the current 28E

Agreement that binds both city and county to the current contract with McGrath's ambulance service has since passed. There needs to be a 180-day notice before the start of a fiscal year if an entity wants to back out of the 28E.

"The 28E is going to stay in place until something happens to it. Anybody that wants out has to give 180 days notice before July 1 (2022)," said Laudner. "The bottom line, anybody that wants out can not get out until July 1, 2023."

Laudner said there are what he termed "escape hatches" to the 28E. One such instance is to exceed the budget cap, which is \$250,000 for the fiscal year that ends June 30 and then per the agreement, that goes up 5 percent each following year. Can mean the cap, under the current agreement at least, is \$262,500 for the fiscal year that begins July 1.

"The other way you can get out is if everybody wants out," said Laudner, who said EMS is not an essential service like fire.

That means the city or county is not obligated to provide its citizens with an EMS.

"We need to start moving. Otherwise we're just kicking the can down the road like we have been for how many years?" said Taylor.

MCGRATH SAID A director should probably be hired and on staff by Oct. 1. He said that director can also be a part-time staffer that helps out with shifts.

Jason Byrne, a member of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors, said the director should also be an employee of the county.

"With this agreement, Jeremy has agreed that he would help us get all of our certifications and get everything in line so it's a turn key by January 1st," said Byrne.

Former Nashua councilman challenging Zoll in primary

voters will cast their ballots at the Gateway to Northeast Iowa Welcome Center.

Among the races on tap for Tuesday are:

• Three term District 2 Supervisor Tim Zoll, who represents the Nashua area, is being challenged by former Nashua City Councilman Scott Cerwinski in the Republican primary.

Cerwinski, who served on the Nashua City Council for three terms before declining to run for re-election this fall, said he believes that the district needs a representative who will better represent the interests of "our part of the county. I had some people tell me I should run, and the more and more I thought about it, the more and more I felt like it was time for a change. We have a lot of issues with the county and I think with my experience, I'd be a good fit

for the seat."

Zoll, meanwhile, has touted his experience, pointing out that he has served on the Board of Supervisors since replacing longtime Supervisor Arnie Boge on the board in 2011.

• Two Republicans, Matthew Ysbrand and Jackie Bohr, are seeking the GOP nod for county treasurer, and the winner will face Democrat Keith Hoey in the general election this November. Sue Breitbach, a Democrat who has held the office since the early 2000s, is retiring at the end of the year; thus, she did not seek re-election.

• Republicans also will have a choice to make for House District 58, which includes all of Chickasaw County and large chunks of Floyd and Bremer counties. The three Republican candidates are Charley Thomson of Charles City, Sean Gallego of Fairbank and Jim Wright of Sumner.

Current State Rep. Todd

Prichard, D-Charles City, announced early this year that he would not seek re-election after the re-districting process was completed, and no Democrats filed candidate papers during the filing period in March.

• Democrats, meanwhile, do not have any contested county races, and the big story on primary night for the party will be who will take on longtime U.S. Charles Grassley this November.

Three candidates — former U.S. Rep. Abby Finkenauer, retired Admiral Michael

Franken and Glenn Hurst — are seeking to take on Grassley, who was first elected to the Senate in 1980.

A number of Chickasaw County candidates will run unopposed in Tuesday's primary.

In addition to Hoey, they include incumbent County Attorney David Laudner, a Republican; incumbent County Recorder Shirley Troyna, a Democrat; incumbent District 5 Supervisor Jason Byrne, a Democrat; and Travis Suckow, a Republican who is running for Byrne's seat.

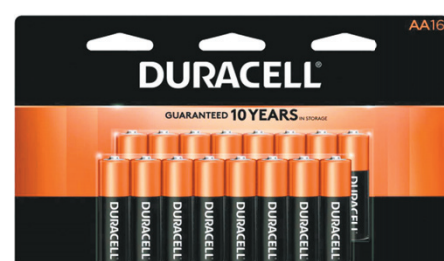

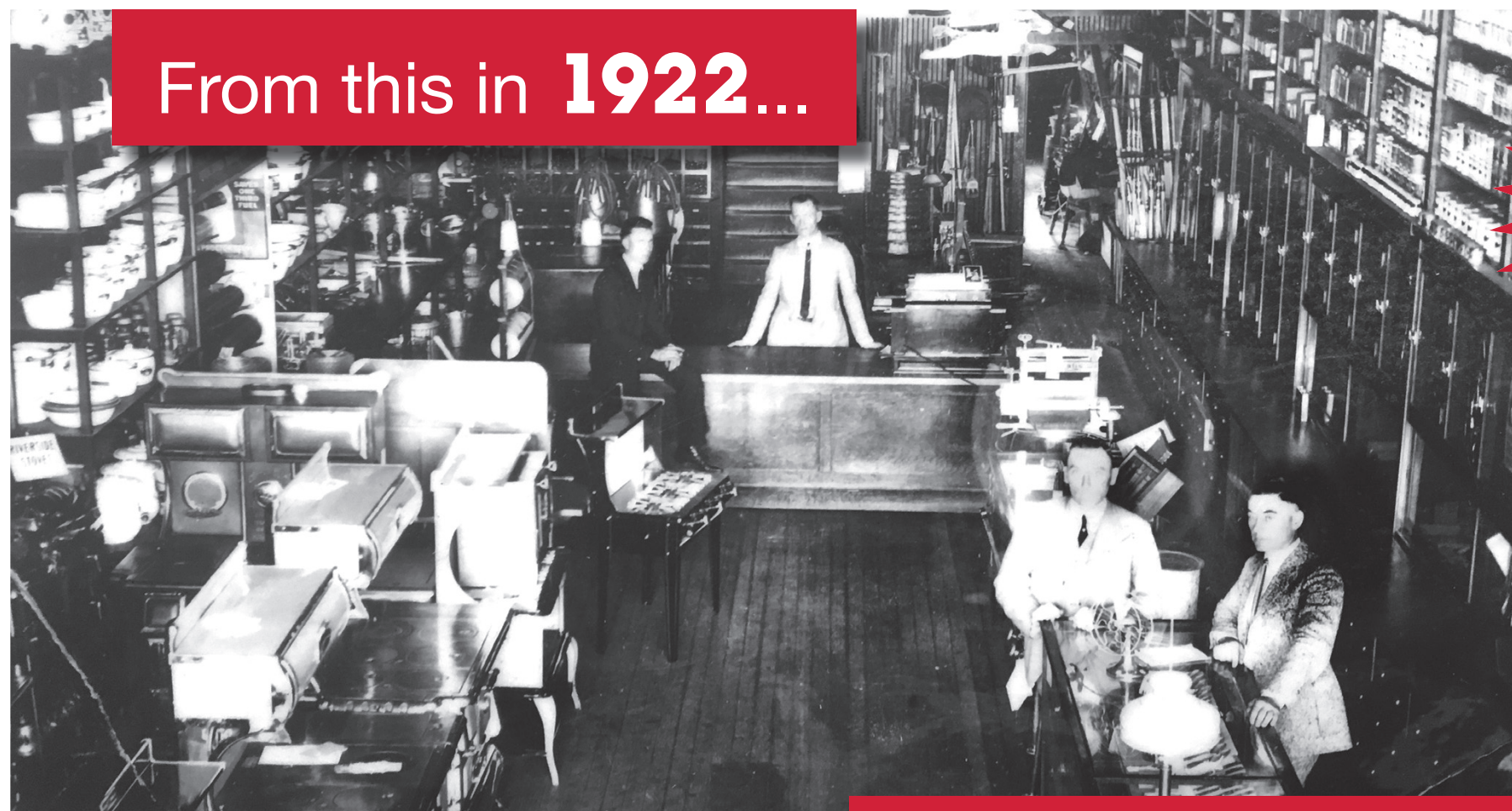

Work on Avenue of Saints to cause ‘detour’ near Floyd for a week

Shoulder work along eastbound U.S. 18 in the current work zone near Floyd will require closing the roadway to eastbound traffic beginning on Monday, June 6, the Iowa Department of Transportation announced.

The detour will continue for about a week, until 5 p.m. Monday, June 13, weather permitting, according to the Iowa DOT’s Mason City construction office.

During this project, eastward bound motorists will be detoured around the work zone by turning south on Floyd County Road T38/Lancer Avenue to Iowa 14, then east to U.S. 18/U.S. 218 at Exit 212. Southbound U.S. 218 traffic wanting to travel east will have to turn west at Floyd and also follow the detour.

In 11-foot lane width restriction and 15-foot height restriction will be in place during this project.

The work for 2½ miles on U.S. 18/Iowa 27 – the Avenue of the Saints – south of Floyd is being done this year and next year to build an elevated interchange to get rid of the at-grade freeway entrances and stop signs that have been the scene of many accidents over the years, including some fatalities.

The Iowa DOT reminds motorists to drive with caution, obey the posted speed limit and other signs in the work area, and be aware that traffic fines for moving violations are at least double in work zones.

As in all work zones, drivers should stay alert, allow ample space between vehicles, and wear seat belts.

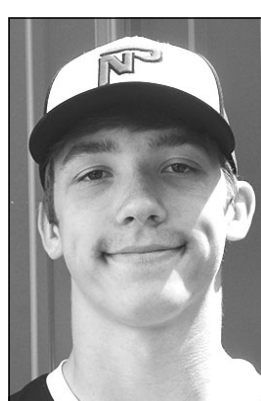

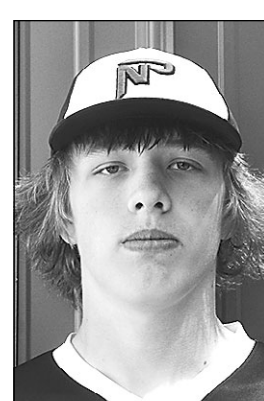

Coach says team needs to be more confident

"We have a talented group. They just need to stick with it and have confidence in themselves to go the full seven innings and finish it," said Stastny-Hall. "Stick behind your pitchers, stick behind your hitters – communicate on the field."

While on paper some opponents might look past N-P and deem the Huskies an easy victory in matchups this season – Stastny-Hall is looking to use that to her team's advantage.

"We can be that underdog. We can be that Cinderella story. They just have to have the confidence that I see that they could have themselves," said Stastny-Hall.

One bad inning has been N-P's bugaboo so far this year in its five games thus far. N-P (4-1, 1-3) won its opener over Rockford, 13-9, but have struggled inside the pitcher's circle and in the field in games that have ended early because of the 12-run rule.

Hampton-Dumont-CAL (2-1) scored all of its runs in the second inning in a 12-0 victory last week Thursday. Newman, now 6-1, plated seven runs in one frame in a 15-3 triumph on Friday over N-P. Just this past Wednesday, St. Ansgar ended the two team's TIC tilt in the fourth inning – a game where the final scoreboard read 12-0.

Stastny-Hall looks at the silver lining in each of N-P's setbacks so far.

"We have to look at the pro's and the con's. We're going in the right direction. We always have one bad inning," said Stastny-Hall. "We just need to clean it up and stick with the

N-P rapped out eight hits in the Newman game, led by all-conference shortstop Lainie Bouillon's two hits.

The junior, who is also batting from the left side of the plate on occasion this season in attempt to play small ball, leads the team with five stolen bases.

"We can hit. We strand our runners," said Stastny-Hall. "Either going back to small ball or figuring out how to score those runs – that's something I'm going to have to look at."

N-P senior hurler Brynn Wright, who has slammed two home runs already this year, has struggled inside the pitcher's circle. She collected two hits at the plate versus Newman, but surrendered 12 earned runs

to the Knights.

"Brynn's a really good pitcher. We've had some tough games the first week of the season," said Stastny-Hall.

Jalynn Pratt, a sophomore, had N-P's lone hit against Hampton-Dumont-CAL.

St. Ansgar freshman pitcher Josie Juhl only allowed two base runners and limited the Huskies to zero hits in her shut-out effort inside the circle.

N-P freshman catcher Paige Franzen threw two base runners out in the St. Ansgar (4-3, 1-3) conference tussle.

"I do want to give Paige praise. She got her first runner caught stealing. That's a big confidence booster for her," said Franzen.

N-P played Osage at home on Thursday and plays in the

Hudson Tourney on Saturday.

muscles with a 14-4 victory over N-P last Friday. St. Ansgar, now 7-1 and also 4-0 in the league, won an exciting affair over the Huskies in the bottom of the seventh, walking off N-P with a run in the final frame to claim a 6-5 victory.

"It was a back-and-forth battle. Any time we play St. Ansgar, that's just kind of how it goes," said Miller. "They came out on top. A couple small things went their way."

St. Ansgar used four pitchers to claim the key conference win. N-P cranked out seven hits, including two doubles by sophomore shortstop Tucker Franzen.

"We didn't hit with runners in scoring position as well as we should have," said Miller. "We've got two good teams going against each other, it's going to come down to who hits with runners in scoring position and who makes spectacular defensive plays."

N-P all-conference third baseman and hurler Max Hillegas also collected two hits against St. Ansgar. Hillegas is red hot at the plate as he is batting .538 on the young season. He is 7-13 at the dish with five RBI and three doubles.

"Max is tearing the cover off the ball right now," said Miller.

Franzen pitched in the Newman game, where the Knights jumped on top of N-P with six runs in the opening frame. Franzen struck out four batters, but walked six over four-plus innings of work.

"He gave up six runs in the first inning and kept on battling," said Miller.

Bo Harrington, a junior, pitched six innings against St. Ansgar and allowed four earned runs. He fanned five and issued two free passes. Harrington has struck out 16 batters in 12-plus innings on the bump the year.

Glaser has fanned 13 batters in just under seven innings of work on the mound.

McKade Munn, another senior for Miller, tripled against

N-K (0-4) and was one of three other Huskies – Hillegas, Landon Pratt and Kendrick Huck – that touched home plate twice.

N-P is now 1-4 overall, but that doesn't have Miller worried one bit.

"None of our guys are down," said Miller. "We're finding our rhythm. Defensively and at the dish, we get that stuff figured out, we're going to be good. We're going to start winning those games instead of losing 'em once we find our groove."

N-P takes on North Butler on the road on Monday and will look to topple perennial-power Kee, ranked second in Class 1A, at Upper Iowa University on Tuesday. The Huskies also play at Don Bosco on Thursday before hosting a twinbill with West Fork on Friday, June 10.

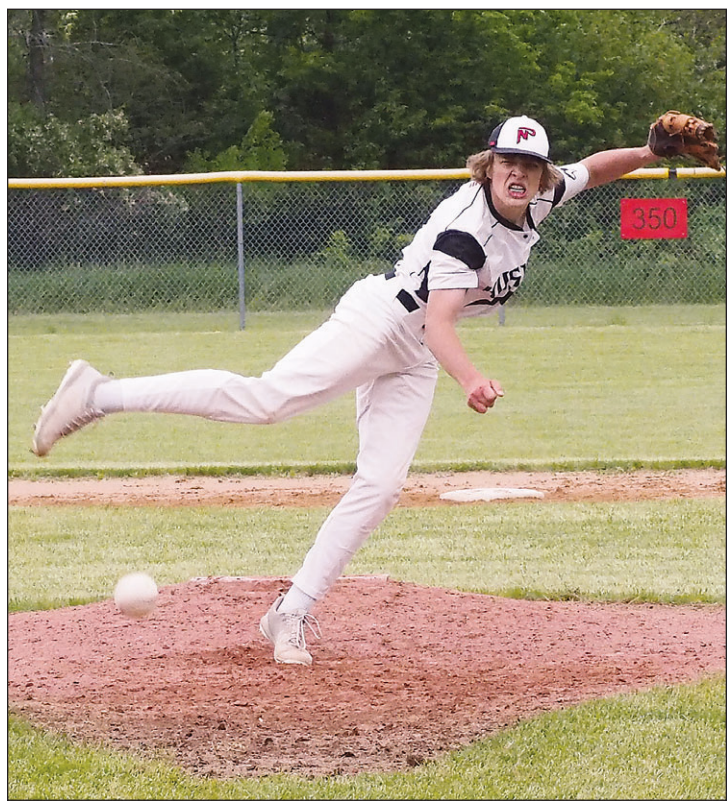
The solution to becoming more competitive may just center on trusting in one's ability to turn the tide.

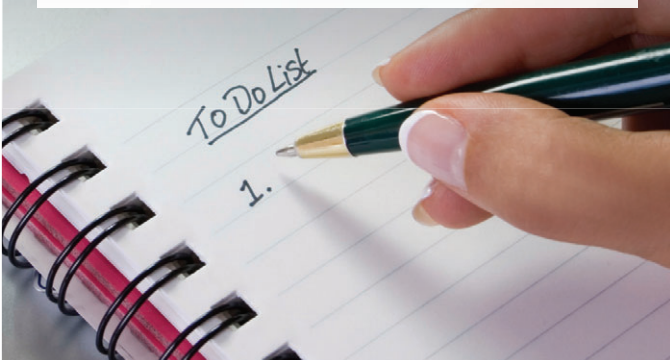
