Voters begin casting their ballots

Even though Election Day isn't until Nov. 8, residents start making their choices

Technically, the 2022 general election is still more than two weeks away; after all, Election Day is not until Tuesday, Nov. 8.

But in another way, the so-called "off-year" election began this week as absentee balloting began

on Wednesday, the same day the Chickasaw County Auditor's Office mailed out hundreds of ballots to county residents who requested them.

"We're ready to go," Chickasaw County Elections Deputy Commissioner Laura Wickham said. "We have had some people call wondering where their ballots are,

so just as a reminder, the law is we can't send them out until Oct. 19."

That's also the day that voters could start early voting at the Auditor's Office in the courthouse.

Voters can cast ballots during the office's regular hours, which are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays, as well as on Saturday, Nov. 5, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Wickham added that voters need to be aware that this Monday is the deadline both to pre-register for the election and to request a ballot and to be mailed to them.

She also reminded residents who want to cast

A UNIQUE ADDITION

GREENWOOD CEMETERY FIRST IN THE AREA TO INSTALL A COLUMBARIUM

A Nashua cemetery has become the first in Chickasaw County to install a columbarium; in fact, according to Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home's Andy Hugeback, it is the only columbarium in not only the county but in all the counties that directly surround Chickasaw.

The Greenwood Cemetery Board purchased the more than 8,000-pound columbarium in response to the increased use of cremation. The columbarium is 7 1/2 feet long, almost 3 feet wide and stands 6.5 feet tall.

And just what is a columbarium?

It is a structure for the reverential and usually public storage of funerary urns, holding cremated remains of the deceased.

"It's something you see everywhere in big cities," said Hugeback, who sold the monument to the Greenwood Cemetery Board. "With more and more cremations being done, it just makes sense."

The Greenwood columbarium has 48 "niches" and each niche can contain two urns. Each

Legislative candidates share views on issues

Four candidates for the Iowa state Legislature shared their views on a number of political topics during an open forum on Thursday, Oct. 13, at the Charles City Senior Center.

Seeking to represent Senate District 29 there is a race between Republican Sandy Salmon, who has served in the Legislature in the House since 2021, and Democrat Jenn Wolff, an occupational therapist who long advocated for disabled and elderly care and has now entered politics to further that cause.

Vying for House District 58 in this election are two political newcomers. Charley Thomson, an area lawyer and businessman, is running as the Republican candidate. His opponent is retired

teacher Dené Lundberg, running as the Democratic candidate.

The four candidates came together in Charles City where forum moderator Toni Noah presented them with a series of pre-selected questions on a wide range of political topics.

Rather than a debate, each candidate was given one minute of uninterrupted time to express their thoughts before moving on to the next person.

Kicking things off with a major political hot topic, the first question asked the candidates their position on legislation concerning abortion and reproductive choice.

Sticking to their respective party philosophies, the Democratic candidates expressed their support for women to control their bodily

panel will list the names of the deceased, their dates of their births and deaths and the names of their children.

Greenwood Cemetery is offering each niche for a special introductory offer of \$1,200 through Jan. 1, and Hugeback said the positive for families is the cost.

He pointed out that a couple who decides to purchase a niche rather than have a regular ground inter-

ment of their urns will save a minimum of \$3,000 when factoring in monument, grave digging and lot prices.

"They're a very nice option for families who are going with cremation," Hugeback said. "It's impressive to watch them bring it in and install it, and it's a really nice addition to Greenwood."

City Council will take up ordinance on ambulance

CITY COUNCIL: FROM 1

accidental excessive usage of water or sewer service:

- The amount of water used must be at least three times the average amount on the account. The city will calculate the average amount of water used at that resident's location.
- The excessive usage must have been caused by an identifiable problem – examples of that are a broken pipe, malfunctioning toilet, etc.
- The resident or owner of property must provide proof that the problem has been repaired, e.g., paid receipt from a plumber, receipt from a store for repair parts, etc.
- The city will only provide an adjustment under this policy once in a five-year period.

The city will then calculate the average amount of water used at the location for the prior four billings. If the resident has not been at that location for four billing periods, the city will calculate an average consumption based upon the number of people living at that location and a daily usage of 10 cubic-feet-per-day or 74.81 gallons per day.

The city then subtracts the amount of average usage it calculated from the actual usage for the period in question. The difference between the two will be called the average. The bill will be re-calculated for both water and sewer charges. The customer will be responsible for the charges from the average plus 25 percent of the overage. The city will forgive the charges for 75 percent of the overage.

Council members Tim Malven, Ernie Willsher, Rhonda Dean and Hal Kelleher all voted in favor of the current policy the city will implement. Samantha Johnson was the lone nay vote. Johnson wanted the policy form changed from five years to three concerning the time frame one has to contest an adjustment.

The City is also working on a snowbird policy for residents that go away for long periods of time. Ott has presented a form for the Council to review.

Nashua is hoping to have an ambulance service operational at the start of the New Year after the contract with its current provider runs out on Dec. 31, 2022. The town of around 1,500 residents has been in limbo and concerned about the future of its EMS (emergency medical services) after it chose to withdraw from the Chickasaw County proposed publicly-owned ambulance service that is still trying to get off the ground.

The Council discussed an ordinance establishing a volunteer ambulance service at the most recent regular meeting. The first reading for a public hearing on that EMS is scheduled for Monday, Nov. 7.

Nashua is also still in negotiations with Charles City, Floyd County and AMR (American Medical Response) about utilizing that EMS as a back-up for its volunteer ambulance service. Ott has stated that talks with city leaders in Charles City regarding AMR have gone well, but nothing at this time has been finalized.

Nashua has named a medical director for its volunteer EMS – Dr. David Schrot. He is employed by the Floyd County Medical Center and has verbally agreed to be Nashua's medical director on a volunteer basis.

The new interim crew chief for the Nashua volunteer EMS – Zenda Vikturek – was announced at the first Council meeting in October.

The name of Nashua's volunteer ambulance service is Nashua Area EMS.

based on population. Other PIE award winners were Des Moines (Largest Fifth City), Guttenberg, Milo, and Fostoria. Des Moines was honored as the overall "Best Performing City." The most improved city was Gilbertville, where Sand just left on Monday before heading over to Plainfield.

Sand also awards "PIES" to counties and school districts.

Sand created the program in 2019 to help public municipalities find new and innovative ways to cut costs.

"It's what we would call in our program a pie recipe. If somebody found a way to save some money or found a way to do something cheaper and more efficient – that's called a pie recipe," said Sand.

Towns filled out surveys and submitted them to the Iowa State Auditor's Office. There was more than a 55-percent compliance rate with the voluntary program. That meant 84 counties, 310 cities and 121 school districts submitted entries. The schools taking part in the program was new this year.

"We took most of the first year to develop the program and got it off the ground in 2020," said Sand. "The program's now in its third year. We wait until the year closes and then we announce the awards the year after."

Plainfield Mayor Tom Geise said he purchased laptops for his city officials – which helped reduce paper costs as well as saving time and energy to print documents.

"We focus on efficiencies. The little things that we do and I don't know that if it's necessarily captured in his survey that he does. We went to tablets this year for Council. When we have a tablet then we don't have to print off as much paper," said Geise.

That means less work for Plainfield City Clerk Brittney Lentz – who in previous years would spend a considerable amount of her day printing off agendas for the City Council or for any other interested party that wanted to read the minutes for a particular council meeting.

"The reason we went to laptops is it saved Brittney a bunch of time," said Geise. "She doesn't have to make cop-

ies of every single document. It's not just how much paper, because that's important enough and ink, it's the time of the staff that's very important and making them more efficient."

Paperless has definitely been the way to go – not just for Plainfield – but many other towns in the state of Iowa. Obviously, there's still "old-school" communities that prefer to keep the status quo and Sand says that's all right.

"Every community knows itself. There's some places where they're going to say, look, we know we have some very interested citizens who don't like doing computers and so they still want everything in paper. Certainly, you shouldn't make that kind of a change at the sacrifice of participation," said Sand.

That means citizens can still request a paper document or be directed to a place online where they can read city or government documents. Sand said sending PDFs forms of government or city reports is much more efficient.

Sand said his office saved over \$30,000 in the first year alone by

going paperless on a large portion of his auditor office's documents. The estimated savings initially was less than a third of that.

His PIE awards get the word out that towns and cities within Iowa are making an effort to change for the

better.

"One of the things I like about it, though, it's an opportunity for people in the public sector to kind of say, 'hey, we're doing a good job here. We're

County turned down again, makes third EMS director offer

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors learned Monday that yet another candidate has turned down the EMS director position, so board members switched gears and made an offer to "Candidate 2" for a part-time position.

After meeting in an "exempt" ses-

sion for more than two hours, board members reported to open session and approved offering the candidate a part-time position at 24 hours a week. The position would include an annual salary of \$35,000.

The exempt session came after Board Chairman Matt Kuhn announced earlier in the meeting that "Candidate 1" had "rescinded his acceptance of the position on Friday." Kuhn stressed

that the candidate was not backing out of the position because of anything "involving the county."

Still, that made the county o-for-2 when it came to hiring a EMS direc-

"Candidate 3" for an annual salary of \$75,000, but that candidate turned down the job. That led to "Candidate 1" being offered the job, and the way

Kuhn talked Monday, it sounds as if

that candidate first accepted the job last week before rescinding that acceptance on Friday.

That led to Monday's third offer, which was approved by a 4-0 vote.

saving you money," said Sand.

Sand, a Democrat and 2001 Decorah High School grad, defeated Republican nominee Mary Mosiman to take the title of Iowa State Auditor back in 2018.

"We've actually uncovered more misspent money than any other (Iowa State) auditor in their first term," said Sand.

Sand is up for reelection this November and his challenger is Republican Todd Halbur, a Clive realtor who was a former CFO of the Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division.

"The biggest reason I decided to run in 2018 was seeing that the Auditor's Office has a huge ability to promote efficiency but wasn't doing it," said Sand. "If I run and I win, I don't need to ask anybody's permission to go start saving taxpayer's money. I can just start a program that uses the authority the office already has."

Sand's PIE program has had such an impact that it's been adopted by another state.

"It's been so good at saving money that the state of Mississippi has copied the program," said Sand.

Other instances of cities saving money through the program are the usage of LED lights or having electronics unplugged overnight.

Sand said the program could be evolving soon.

"Our idea was let's get the program going and let's adjust it as we learn," said Sand. "We've been collecting pie recipes and handing out awards. In the future, I think what we'll try to do is have awards based on the amount of money actually saved. That can just be just super complicated to measure."

Sand said he conducts 100 town halls a year and gets to every one of the 99 counties in the state, regardless of it being an election year or not.

That equates to about 125 stops throughout Iowa when you throw in handing out the pies being awarded to various towns and school districts in Iowa.

After leaving Plainfield,

it was off to Cresco where he gave a "pie" to the Howard-Winneshiek School District.

Tuesday's itinerary included travels to Maquoketa in Jackson County, Guttenberg in Clayton County and the MFL-Mar-Mac School District in Monona. Sand said the day would end in his hometown of Decorah and more than likely include a visit to Mabe's – the town's iconic and famous pizzeria.



Candidates discuss variety of issues at legislative forum

autonomy while the Republicans advocated for legal protections of the newly conceived.

"I don't believe that the government should interfere or intervene in a woman's right to choose her health care," said Lundberg. "We need to take the government out of women's health care. It's a very private and oftentimes a very painful issue."

"In terms of legislation, I think we're in a rather unclear and uncertain spot," said Thomson. "When we look at what the legislation should be, our first stop has to be the Iowa Constitution.

"We're finally having a discussion about abortion that we should have had in 1974, which is 'what are the rights of the parties involved?' We need to look at what due process protections and equal protection protections there are for newly conceived life."

BOTH REPUBLICAN candidates expressed their doubts that increased school funding would achieve the desired results, instead advocating for school choice, which would allow private schools to receive public funds as they take on public school students.

"I support the public schools, but I think we need to have some alternatives," said Thomson. "As far as taking the surplus toward it, I don't think it's a very smart move to say 'Let's just throw money at education.'"

"We have to think about the goal of what our money does," said Salmon. "This is where I think striking out with a school choice initiative would take us in a different direction and give us an opportunity to have families pick out what would be the best educational option for their child."

The Democratic candidates lamented the level of funding that public education has received in recent years and advocated for increases in funds for school resources and teacher compensation.

"They've been asked at 4% and it's been less than that for the last 10 years," said Wolff. "Schools are desperate."

"Our school system has gone from No. 1 in the country to No. 24. There's a correlation there."

"When we don't fund public schools at a level that are needed, we see them continuing to struggle to meet the demands of their students and community," said Lundberg. "I believe that the budget surplus should be used, in part, for public education."

THE KEY TO surviving inflation I think is increased productivity, which often means more efficiency in government," said Thomson. "If we become more efficient as a state government operation, the tax burden is lowered and productivity of Iowa industry and economy picks up."

Salmon reiterated policies that the state has already implemented, such as the recently passed flat tax legislation.

"We are lowering our tax rates to 3.9% over four years and exempting retirement income," said Salmon. "Tax structure affects a great deal whether people move here or not and it affects whether a company moves here or not."

The Democrats were more wary about lowering taxes at the expense of services, particularly for businesses and high-income residents.

"While tax cuts are great, and they sound great, they are also what funds our services and our services are being cut," said Wolff, who was particularly concerned about expensive budget items like education and Medicaid.

"If we don't have enough money to fund these services, how are we going to entice people to stay in Iowa?"

"Services to Iowans are essential and, like many others, we're struggling to make ends meet every single day," said Lundberg. "We need to lower taxes for working families instead of giving more handouts and tax breaks to large corporations, reducing our state income."

HALFWAY THROUGH the forum, the four candidates finally found themselves all on the same page with a question about the use of eminent domain for the construction of carbon dioxide pipelines.

Whether concerned about the use of eminent domain for private profit, the environmental impact, or the economic viability in general, all four candi-

dates declared their opposition to using eminent domain for the pipeline.

Moving back behind party lines, the next question asked the candidates what they thought of how the state has been financially managed over the last decade.

"I have had concerns with the taxation of middle class Iowans and the lack of taxation for those making large amounts of money in our country," said Lundberg, who attributed much of the current budget boon to federal COVID funds.

"I think we've done very well in the state management of the budget but I think we can do better. I think we can always do better," said Thomson, who suggested occasional "zero based budgeting," where the budget starts at zero and every dollar spent must be justified.

"I think it's a very healthy exercise and we haven't done it in a while."

Thomson also raised concerns about economic development in Iowa, particularly at the lowest levels.

I DO BELIEVE that, up until the most recent tax cuts, that some of the taxation things have been good for the state,"

said Wolff. "I think the most recent one, the flat tax of 3.9, is good for some of Iowans. It's not good for all of Iowans."

Moving back to schools, the candidates were asked if they believed that area schools were indoctrinating students with Marxist political doctrine, and if so, to cite examples.

Wolff began by denying that there was indoctrination happening, but that students do need to understand the country's complicated history and social systems.

"We have got to have youth that can critically think and can think about lots of different problems in critical ways," said Wolff. "That's hard when we come with our very hard history."

Both Lundberg and Thomson likewise dismissed the assertion, chalking the idea up to social media hysterics.

"As someone who spent 33 years in the public school system, I can tell you that a lot of what you're hearing about this is coming from social media," said Lundberg.

OF THE THREE, only Salmon expressed a belief that area schools were indoctrinating students in a political

doctrine.

"I do believe that in some schools Critical Race Theory is being taught and that is very unfortunate," said Salmon. "It may not be being taught here, but I have been made aware of by parents in my district that they have seen those kind of lessons."

On election policy, the candidates were asked if the measures in Iowa to facilitate voting were adequate.

Thomson answered first, declaring that he has high confidence in Iowa's election system, but would like to see greater restrictions on absentee ballots, limiting them to those that can show just cause.

"My preference is to have all ballots cast on the same day," said Thomson.

Salmon agreed with Thomson and recounted steps the Iowa Legislature has taken in recent years to regulate elections, such as passing a law to prevent private funds being used to administer elections.

For the Democratic candidates, Wolff and Lundberg decried recent efforts to reduce the length of time for people

to vote before Election Day, instead advocating for greater flexibility in the timeframe for people to cast their ballot.

"I think we've gone backwards in the last year or two," said Wolff. "It's not as easy to access. It was getting easier to access and vote and do your elected duty and your civil right."

"I think that extending the hours of voting is just realistic in our society today," said Lundberg.

For the final question, the candidates were asked about their thoughts on legislative involvement in setting worker benefits, such as paid family, medical, and sick leave.

Salmon answered by discussing measures the Legislature have already put into place.

"Now, if you have a newborn child, there's a certain amount of time off that you are allowed to take," said Salmon. "And we've recently instituted that if you adopt a child there's a certain amount of time that you can take off as well."

For Wolff, the topic hit close to her primary reason for running, tying into her advocacy for greater community care resources.

and stuff," said Christensen. "It's just the way they did it, kind of like Grundy did it – slow."

The Huskies answered right back with an Aiden Gelner five-yard rush to paydirt. N-P also connected on the two-point run to take the lead at 8-7.

Then N-P faltered.

A dropped pass here, a missed block there, an interception that could have swayed the game and penalties – there were a lot of them.

Too many too overcome for N-P, especially in critical situations.

"Obviously penalties hurt us. We're not a team that can go 2nd-and-20 very often," said Christensen.

Hudson (4-4, 3-3) struck gold on a deep route in the end zone that saw Isaac Messmore burn the Husky secondary after he hauled in a 33-yard scoring strike from Davis with 1:34 left in the first half.

Davis and his Pirates played well out of Hudson's pro-style, shotgun offense that utilizes zone reads to free up space. Davis was 15-20 passing for 177 yards to go along with two touchdown tosses.

Hudson lost to No. 7 North Linn, 35-0, in its previous game coming into the Pirates close out to the regular season. The Pirates were also shutout by No. 2 Grundy Center, 47-0, and 10th-rated Wapsie Valley, 33-0. Each district foe ended up securing the top two seeds in N-P's Class A, District 3, with the Spartans claiming the district championship. Outside of a season-opening 37-0 win over Jesup, this had to be Hudson's best played game of the season.

You could make an argument – considering the opponent – this was N-P's worst. "We knew they were a good team," said Christensen.

The lone turnover of the evening was costly. A Gelner fumble with 46 ticks before halftime ended N-P's drive as it looked to be on the move to add some more points up on the scoreboard before each teams headed to the locker room.

N-P had reached the Hudson 44-yard line after a Bo Harrington scramble for 11 yards. Gelner would rip off another big chunk of real estate left side as he gained another first down after a 13 yard rush. The problem was somehow the ball came out of his hands and Hudson recovered.

"I think he just tried to cut. The ball is a little harder tonight. I don't know. That's the frustrating one," said Christensen.

"There's not too much between him and the end zone. He might have scored there. It's just one of those odd plays."

Hudson led 13-8 at the break.

There would be no scoring in the third quarter, but N-P most sustained drive of the game started in that period. A 15-play drive saw the Huskies take the lead right back at 14-13 after Gelner raced into the right corner of the end zone from 10 yards out on a sweep. Harrington converted a huge 4th-and-5 at the Pirate 10-yard line on a nine-yard scramble that put it down to the 1-yard line. N-P overcame two penalties in the drive after that to push the ball over the goal line on the first play of the final period.

A 15-yard face mask penalty on N-P during the kickoff gave Hudson the ball at their own 47 to start what would turn out to be the game's winning drive. Hudson's 10-play drive ended with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Davis to Lyle Olsen. Hudson converted on its own fourth-down play to keep

the drive alive.

N-P would have one last crack at pulling out the win.

An illegal hands-to-the-face call on the Husky kickoff would allow N-P to set up shop near midfield with a little over seven minutes left in regulation.

A 22-yard burst by Husky fullback Titus Evans had N-P smelling the end zone as N-P had reached the Hudson 28-yard line. N-P stared at a 4th-and-7, but Harrington once again came through with a 10-yard first-down run on a designed draw. The back-breaker on the 12-play drive that resulted in no points scored came on a seven-yard run by Gelner that would have put the ball down at the Hudson 5-yard line – first and goal. Instead, out came the yellow laundry for Husky holding and 2nd-and-22 at the Hudson 26-yard line instead. N-P got as far back to the Hudson 15-yard line. A back shoulder, fourth-down throw to Evans in the end zone was incomplete.

Hudson managed to run out the clock after that drive stalled.

Christensen talked about the Huskies mistakes and miscues that made it tough to overcome.

"Football is the ultimate team game. If one person is a little bit off, that can affect the whole team," said Christensen. "When we executed, they couldn't stop us. Something that didn't quite go right – that hurt us. A lot of little things added up to big things."

Hudson was sent to Mason City for its playoff game, where the Pirates will take on the Knights of Mason City Newman (7-1). The Knights lost to West Hancock, 42-7, in Week Two of the regular season.

The game time for N-P's seventh all-time postseason contest will be at 7 p.m. this Friday in Britt. West Hancock is 8-0 and has defeated its opponents by an average score of 46-8. WH has pitched three shutouts – the last two coming in the final two weeks of the regular season versus St. Ansgar (32-0) and North Butler (52-0). West Hancock's closest contest came on the road against Hartley-Melvin-Sanborn – a matchup the powerful Eagles won 31-18.

West Hancock has won three state titles. Britt also won a state championship in 1973. The West Hancock school district was formed in 1994 as Britt and the Kanawha districts merged.

Regardless of how big an underdog N-P will be Friday

night, these Huskies should come out scrapping like they always do.

"We just have to show up and play next week," said Christensen. "The worst part is we put ourselves in a situation where we just make it harder to keep the season going. I think that's the biggest thing. This senior class – I don't want them to graduate, because they're such a great senior class."

The regular season is over, now it's on to the do-or-die format that can bring extreme exhilaration and the lowest of the lows. N-P's main goal is to finish strong and let the chips fall where they may. Christensen talked about nine seniors on his roster that don't want a productive season to end quite yet – no matter how long the odds are at advancing on to the next round.

"We'll probably have six kids academic all-state. They do awesome in the classroom. They're great leaders. They are just good, all-around kids," said Christensen. "I don't want to see them go. This team as a whole is so fun to be around and even when you return three-fourths of the team next year, no team is exactly the same. That's what I just hate to think about."

at Riceville in the opening round of Class 1A regional play – N-P found themselves after a rough start and set the tone for what should be an even better 2023 campaign.

N-P won 7 out of 11 matches to end the season – the final setback a four-game victory by Riceville in the postseason, 23-25, 25-23, 25-15 and 25-16.

Playing on the Wildcats' home court – N-P showed no fear from the get-go as it lassoed a 4-0 lead over Riceville in game one. A Myranda Webster kill, followed by a Hannemann ace, led to a timeout by Riceville head coach Melissa McElroy – N-P leading 7-2. A Paige Franzen ace and an Eiffler kill saw the Huskies continue to control the match, up 12-4. Husky senior Bailey Fisher's ace, followed by another Webster kill and an Eiffler slam to the hardwood, highlighted another impressive run – vaulting N-P to its biggest lead of the evening at 19-7. McElroy had already burned a timeout to stop the bleeding, so it was going to be up to her players to salvage game one.

While Riceville didn't win game one, an 8-0 run brought the home crowd back into the contest. Riceville narrowed the deficit to as close as 24-23 and did enough damage in the opening set to steal momentum and basically never give it back.

Things didn't start well in the ensuing set, either. The Wildcats rode a wave of energy to snare a 8-3 lead and Foelske had seen enough as she burned a timeout. A 6-0 run by the Wildcats pushed their lead to 15-7 and it looked like this match might be knotted up quite quickly.

Then N-P turned the tide.

All-conference senior setter Paige Ripley's ace helped the Huskies crawl closer, down just 20-19 after a 6-0 run of its own. The Huskies made it seven points in a row after a Webster kill and the contest was tied at 20-20. Hannemann's ace brought N-P back full circle as the Huskies took a 22-21 lead. Then a shot that was initially ruled in N-P's favor as being out and would have given the Huskies a 23-21 lead, was reversed and called good. Instead of a two-point lead and N-P also just two points away from a 2-0 lead in the match – the contest was tied once more at 22-22.

Riceville capitalized on that swing, continued to tighten the vice and applied pressure to N-P's defense in what was the most critical juncture of the match. The Wildcats closed out game two to tie the non-conference postseason battle, but once again was met with plenty of resistance from N-P in the ensuing set. There were seven ties in the first half of game three. After leading early in game three by as much as 6-2, back-to-back kills by junior outside hitter Jalynn Pratt knotted the match at 8-8. Ripley's winning point gave N-P a 9-8 advantage and the match was tied one final time at 14-14 before Riceville kicked it into high gear.

"We had a lot of looking at each other and I hate to say it this late in the season, but a lack of experience playing defense before we set up for offense," said Foelske.

The Wildcats ripped off a 12 consecutive points and closed the game on a 13-1 run to seize control of the match – up 2-1.

"Riceville started tipping and pushing corners and we did not respond well to it. I am sure they watched some film and that is one of the things we struggle with the most on defense," said Foelske.

A Fisher kill kept it as close as 7-5 in the final

set, but repeated strikes up front by Madison Mauer and Tillotti Fair kept the Huskies at bay. Mauer, a senior, managed 14 kills and the sophomore Tillotti cranked down 12 kills to the floor. Sophomore Samantha Wilberding also was a factor on offense with eight kills.

Foelske talked about a key difference in the elimination match that was going to end one team's season.

"They stayed composed with every play and we didn't. It was pretty clear that with each point a little more of our fire went out," said Foelske. "I went into the huddle and told them in game four that they had to fight and battle. Riceville wasn't going to give us points, but unfortunately a lot of their points were unearned."

Riceville (26-16) went on to defeat upset-minded West Fork on Wednesday in three sets – 25-10, 25-13 and 25-19. That meant the Wildcats advanced to the regional semifinals where they'll face No. 4 Gladbrook-Reinbeck (30-9) on Monday.

West Fork (6-16) shocked Rockford (13-11) on Monday by advancing to the quarterfinal round with a five-set marathon stunner over the Warriors. West Fork worked its way back from a 2-0 hole to outlast Rockford by scores of 19-25, 17-25, 25-21, 31-29 and 15-12.

Pratt led N-P in kills with seven, followed by Fisher (six), Webster (five) and Eiffler (five).

Ripley paced N-P in three categories – assists (24), digs (18) and aces (five).

N-P won 7 out of its last 11 matches after a 2-14 start. The Huskies finished the season with a 9-18 mark.

Foelske – obviously emotional after the final match of the season was put in the books – graduated two seniors. That pair – Ripley and Fisher – were recently named all-conference. Ripley was selected on the first team Top of Iowa East All-Conference squad, while Fisher was tabbed for the second team. Franzen, a sophomore, was selected on the honorable-mention TIC team.

"I cannot say enough about our seniors. The first half of the season we needed leadership and struggled to find it, but after Osage they stepped up. Knowing you have two freshman filling big spots, they really had no choice but to guide them on the court," said Foelske.

Foelske talked about addressing her squad for one final time in 2022 after the Riceville match. She also had a message for her players that will be back next season in attempt to climb the ladder and pile up more victories.

"It was hard in the locker room after the game... knowing it's over and you're not walking back in the gym for practice the next day," said Foelske. "This was not the ending I wanted for these seniors or this team. I don't want my underclassmen to dwell on the loss – live and learn through the pain of the loss and want it more next season. I want my seniors to know that they both had amazing careers as Huskies and they will be missed next season."

Breakfast Egg Rolls

INGREDIENTS

- 8 eggs
 - 1/3 cup half and half
 - 1 teaspoon black pepper
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 pound ground mild pork sausage
 - 4 slices bacon, diced
 - 2 cups shredded cheddar
 - 2 tablespoons diced chives
 - 10 egg roll wrappers
- SAUCE INGREDIENTS (OPTIONAL)**
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 - 1/2 cup sour cream
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
 - 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 tablespoon chopped chives

DIRECTIONS

In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, half and half, black pepper; set aside.

In a large skillet over medium heat, brown the sausage and cook the bacon pieces until brown and crispy.

Pour the egg mixture into the skillet and cook until the eggs are done.

Remove the skillet from the heat and stir in the eggs and chives.

Spoon about 1/3 cup of the filling into the center of an egg roll wrapper.

Fold one corner in toward the center and then bring the two side corners into the center.

Dab a little bit of water onto the remaining corner of the egg roll wrapper. Roll it up and then repeat with the remaining egg rolls.

Preheat about 1/2 inches of vegetable oil in a large skillet until the oil reaches 350 F.

Fry the egg rolls (about 1 to 2 minutes on each side); remove from the oil and enjoy warm with chipotle dipping sauce.

For the (optional) sauce – Combine all the ingredients and then serve with the hot egg rolls.

TO MAKE AHEAD


Filling can be prepared in advance and kept refrigerated until you're ready to form and fry the egg rolls. We don't recommend frying egg rolls ahead of time and reheating, as they'll lose their crunch.

SUBSTITUTIONS

While this recipe calls for sausage and bacon, you can opt to use all sausage (use 12 ounces), all bacon (use 12 slices), or even diced ham (use about 1 1/2 cups).

Add a little spice with pepper jack cheese in place of cheddar.

Try dipping in salsa or fresh guacamole instead of chipotle sauce.



The Best Pork Chop Marinade

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Tbsp brown sugar
- 1/4 c. extra virgin olive oil
- 1/4 c. reduced sodium soy sauce
- 2 Tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp salt

- 1/2 tsp ground black pepper
- 3 cloves garlic minced
- 4 bone-in pork chops

DIRECTIONS

Mix Marinade – First, grab a small bowl and whisk all of the ingredients except pork chops together.

Marinade – Next, grab a resealable zip lock bag and large bowl and place the pork chops in it. Pour the marinade you prepared into it. Squeeze as much air out of bag as possible and seal. Marinade for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Grill – When you are ready to grill the pork chops preheat grill or grill pan to medium heat. Place pork chops on grill or in pan. Discard remaining marinade. Grill the pork chops over medium heat for 4-5 minutes on each side or until a thermometer inserted in the middle of the meat reaches 145 degrees F. Remove from grill or grill pan.

Rest – Let pork chops stand for 5 minutes before eating to let juices redistribute. This gets you that super juicy, delicious pork chop!



Sausage Stuffing

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 c salted butter
- 1 c diced apple
- 1 c diced celery
- 1 c diced onion
- 1 lb ground pork sausage
- 8 c bread cubes
- 1 egg
- 2 1/2 c chicken broth
- 1/4 c fresh parsley
- 1 tsp ground sage
- 1 tsp thyme leaves
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp salt

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350F.

In a skillet, melt butter on medium high heat. Add apples, celery and onion. Sauté until tender,

about 6 minutes. Remove to a bowl.

In the same pan, add the sausage and brown until done.

Combine all ingredients and pour into a greased 9x13" baking dish. Bake for 60-65 minutes.

Top with additional fresh parsley, if desired.



Grilled Pizza

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tube refrigerated pizza dough
- Cooking spray
- Sauce and toppings

DIRECTIONS

Cut dough into 6 equal portions. Lightly spray each piece of dough with cooking spray.

Pre-heat grill to medium low.

Lay the dough pieces (cooking spray side down) directly on the grill.

Cook for 3-5 minutes or until the bottom is golden brown.

Flip the pizzas and top the cooked side.

Close the grill and cook an additional 2-3 minutes or until cheese is melted.

VARIATIONS

BBQ Pulled Pork: BBQ sauce, pulled pork, red onions, cheddar & mozzarella cheeses, and cilantro.







Waukon restaurant wins IPPA pork tenderloin contest

A car dealership-turned-restaurant is where you'll find Iowa's Best Breaded Pork Tenderloin for 2022.

Lid's Bar & Grill in Waukon, in the northeast corner of the state, has won the 20th annual contest, presented by the Iowa Pork Producers Association (IPPA) and managed by its restaurant and foodservice committee.

"Obviously we enjoy highlighting our state's delicious pork," said Kelsey Sutter, IPPA's marketing and programs director. "But this award also forever transforms local Iowa businesses, as tenderloin enthusiasts look forward to the announcement every year, and are known to travel lengthy distances to try a variation on this Midwestern staple."

Each third-pound tenderloin is cut and twice tenderized at Quillin's Food Ranch in Waukon. At the restaurant, the never-frozen meat is hand-breaded to order—dipped in milk then dredged through a seasoned breading.

"The tenderloins are actually fairly thick, so you can taste the pork instead of just breading," said Dan Liddiard, who co-owns Lid's with his wife Kelly. Lid's is a shortened version of the couple's last name.

The deep-fried favorite is served with lettuce and mayo on a lightly buttered and toasted bun, baked fresh daily also at Quillin's. Sandwiches include a side of crinkle-cut French fries.

Chef Phil Carey, a tenderloin finalist judge, describes the sandwich as having "great pork flavor, with a wonderful breading that greatly complements the overall sandwich," as well as a "perfect size of bun-to-pork-tenderloin ratio."

The Liddiards are Waukon natives who opened the eatery in July 2020. Dan Liddiard had operated West Side Auto Sales on the site for nearly a decade.

However, when car sales plummeted during the early months of COVID-19, he reduced his inventory and renovated a portion of the office, showroom, and shop for the restaurant. The Liddiards had no prior experience in food service.

"Nope," Dan Liddiard admits. "Not till after the day we opened."

Since being named among the top five tenderloin finalists earlier this month, tenderloin fans have been flooding in from all over the state, the Liddiards said. The business went from selling about 25 pounds of loins per week, to 35 to 40 pounds a day. A drive-up window accommodates carry-out customers.

"To be nominated for this was absolutely incredible," said Dan Liddiard, choking back tears. "To win is 10 times that. It's pretty great."

IPPA's restaurant and foodservice committee officially present ed the best tenderloin award at the restaurant on Tuesday,

Lid's will receive \$500, a plaque, and a large banner to display.

This year's runner-up is Ludlow's Steakhouse in Corydon, about an hour and a half south of Des Moines.







Pork industry makes huge impact on Iowa economy

Iowa Pork Producers Association says it's not just the 5,000-plus pig farms, but it's the almost 150,000 jobs pork creates in state

The work of Iowa's pig farmers is the core of a vital pork industry in the state, says a new study released by the Iowa Pork Producers Association (IPPA).

Iowa's 5,418 pig farms generate work not only in pig production, but also in hog harvesting and pork processing. In all, there are 147,105 Iowa jobs created by the pork industry through direct, indirect and induced jobs. The jobs break out this way:

- Pig production on the farms generates 46 percent of the jobs.

- The state's 14 commercial hog harvesting facilities create 45 percent of the jobs.

- Commercial pork processing contributes another 9 percent of jobs.

A study provided a year ago by the Coalition to Support Iowa Farmers showed that livestock production was the only agriculture sector that was increasing the number of jobs in Iowa.

In the three areas of the pork industry, labor income from those Iowa jobs is \$6.84 billion, according to Decision Innovations Solutions (DIS), an economic research and analysis firm that conducted the study for IPPA. DIS used a 2018 Iowa dataset, data from the USDA 2017 Census of Agriculture and other USDA/NASS sources and used IMPLAN modeling to project data that would reflect 2019 numbers and dollars.


The three pork industry sectors generated \$40.8 billion in sales.

Pig production accounted for 34 percent of the total, or \$13.9 billion in sales from Iowa's pig farms.

Hog harvesting facilities had 55 percent of the sales, and pork processing accounted for 11 percent of sales.

Using Local Feedstuffs

There are several reasons that Iowa



In addition to analyzing state data on the impact of Iowa's pork industry, additional analysis was conducted on 35 counties in Iowa to review local economic contributions. (The data from these counties will be released soon.)

Adding Barns is a Jobs Benefit to Counties

The DIS study also included information about the economic activity in a community when a new 2,400-head finishing barn is built.

This part of the study considered the construction and first year operations of a barn this size, which is typical for Iowa.

Building the barn would create 12 jobs (half in construction and half in operations) and sales activities of \$2.5 million.

A new pig barn sources about 35 percent of inputs locally. The construction of a new pig barn requires several purchases such as steel, concrete and equipment.

Once construction is completed, pig farms purchase feed, veterinary and other professional services, and many other inputs to produce market hogs for sale.

is the nation's number one producer of pork.

The state's pig farmers not only have a proud heritage, they have built upon the experiences of that heritage and combine it with using new research and technology to become more efficient in producing nutritious, safe and delicious pork.

Another reason is the availability of key feedstuffs for raising pigs.

A balanced pig diet contains energy and amino acids, which come from corn and soybean meal diets. From weaning to reaching market weight, an average pig eats 12 bushels of corn and 2.5 bushels of soybeans.

Over the course of a year, Iowa pigs

consume corn that is the equivalent of 22 percent of the state's corn production and 23 percent of the state's soybeans. That means nearly one-fourth of Iowa's row crops are marketed for near-by use, thus reducing the cost of grain transportation.

Pigs and Farms, Increasing and Decreasing

The number of pigs in Iowa in December 2019, was 24.8 million hogs. Ninety-five percent (23.79 million) of those hogs are market animals, which have increased by three percent annually for the past decade. Iowa holds 32 percent of the U.S. hog inventory.

Conversely, Iowa's breeding herd

(1.01 million head) has been declining slowly despite growth (1.2 percent) in the national breeding herd (6.46 million).

The size of pig farms is increasing, 69 percent of Iowa's hog inventory is now on farms with 5,000 or more pigs (20 percent of all pig farms). However, the most common commercial-size hog farm (32 percent) in Iowa is in the category of 2,000-4,999 head. Farms with 1,000-1,999 pigs are 13 percent of Iowa's pig farms.

The top five counties in pig inventory are Washington, Sioux, Lyon, Hamilton and Plymouth counties. Each of these counties has more than 1 million pigs.

The members of the Chickasaw County Farm Bureau would like to wish all pork farmers and those in the industry a Happy Pork Month.

Thank you for your time and hard work to not only put pork products on our plates, but many other things.

Pork is not only tasty, but it's great for you!

Pork has many beneficial qualities that make it easy to incorporate into a balanced menu.

The variety of options range from decadent and flavorful to lean and nutrient-rich cuts that are affordable, easy to make, and enjoyable to people of all ages.

Both the pork tenderloin and pork sirloin roast meet the criteria for the American Heart Association Heart Checkmark, which means they contain less than 5 grams of fat, 2 grams or less of saturated fat, and 480 milligrams or less of sodium per label serving. Pork is also packed with protein (46 percent of your daily needs can be found in just a three-ounce pork serving), making it easy to include in a health-forward and balanced diet.

Here are other key nutrients (and their percent of daily value provided by a 3 ounce serving) in pork:

- Without Thiamin (50 percent), metabolism of carbohydrates, protein, and fat would be significantly compromised. Animal protein is one of the best sources of this nutrient, and among the choices, pork is tops.

- Niacin (34 percent) is an important for the normal function of many enzymes in the body and involved in the metabolism of sugars and fatty acids.

- Vitamin B6 (30 percent) is important for the normal function of enzymes and co-enzymes, which are needed to metabolize protein, carbohydrates, and fats. Plus, it plays a critical role in the regulation of glycogen (stored carbohydrates) metabolism.

- Zinc (25 percent) is a component of more than 70 enzymes, zinc is a key player in energy metabolism and the immune system.

- Vitamin B12 (25 percent) helps build red blood cells and metabolize carbohydrates and fats.

- Next to milk, few foods have as much riboflavin (20 percent) per serving as pork. Riboflavin has an important role in the release of energy from foods.

- Phosphorous (15 percent) helps strengthens bones and generates energy in cells.

- Potassium (6 percent), a mineral also known as an electrolyte, plays a major role in water balance and helps maintain normal blood pressure. This is considered a nutrient of public health concern.

- Iron (6 percent) is a mineral we need for growth and development. Our body uses it to make hemoglobin, which is a protein in red blood cells that carries oxygen from the lungs throughout the body, and myoglobin, a protein that provides oxygen to muscles. Your body also uses iron in hormone production. Iron in food comes in two forms: heme iron and nonheme iron. Meat like pork, seafood, and poultry have both heme and nonheme iron.

- Magnesium (6 percent) is an important for the normal function of many enzymes (catalysts for the body's chemical reactors), glucose and muscle action.

In other words, that pork chop, that pork tenderloin, that bacon ... you get the idea ... is not just tasty but it turns out it's also pretty dang healthy for you.

So enjoy pork; after all, it's good.

RICEVILLE RALLIES TO END SEASON IN WHICH N-P TOOK GREAT STRIDES

There came a critical stretch of the season last month when the Nashua-Plainfield Huskies had to dig deep – much more so than at any point before that.

In a loss at Osage – where head coach Mindy Foelske's squad played its best volleyball of the season against the powerful Green Devils – N-P lost a key component of its offense due to injury.

The meant the Huskies had to regroup and were forced to essentially reinvent themselves on the fly.

Playing without one of its tallest players in the lineup and most productive hitters in sophomore Josslynn Glaser – who was lost for the season because of an ankle injury – N-P found a way to do just that.

"When Josslynn went down at Osage it definitely shook

things up for us. We had just found a little bit of chemistry on the court and were just starting to get comfortable with each other. Osage was kind of the turning point in our season," said Foelske.

The results spoke for themselves, as anybody that watched the young and rebuilding Huskies could tell the team got better as the season entered the final weeks of the 2022 season.

"Kami (Hannemann) and Lily (Eiffler), both freshman, kind of got tossed in to the varsity lineup full-time and not necessarily into positions they had previously played. Once everyone started to trust that they could play with them – we really started to click," said Foelske.

While the Huskies' goal of making a deep run in the post-season was halted last Monday

Frustrating loss sends Huskies to West Hancock

Nashua-Plainfield falls to Hudson in regular season finale, will take on top-ranked Eagles

A knockout punch it was not, but this blow definitely left a mark.

Plain and simple – Hudson outplayed the Nashua-Plainfield football team on the

That means – as a No. 4 seed – Nashua-Plainfield plays a district champion on the road in the first round of the postseason in Class A.

That opponent?

None other than top-ranked West Hancock – the defending state champ and winners of two out of the last three state titles in one of Iowa's smallest classes in prep football.

That's definitely a downer for the Huskies – but a season filled with promise and countless triumphs isn't over yet.

"We're gonna show up. We're gonna fight," said N-P head coach Andrew Christensen. "We're going to give it our all."

N-P was vying to become just the third team in N-P school history to end a regular season with just two losses, but Hudson started strong, kept N-P off-balance all night and did not commit a turnover.

N-P is 5-0 when winning the turnover battle and 0-3 when it does not.

"They came out a little more fired up to play," said Christensen. "We didn't quite have enough tonight."

N-P, which caused 10.5 tackles for loss a week ago in a 42-8 win over AGWSR, only managed two against the Pirates. That meant junior quarterback Camden Davis had time to throw and he seemed to not miss a beat on this evening – the coldest night of the fall as temps dipped below 40 degrees.

"We couldn't get pressure on the quarterback all night. That killed us," said Christensen.

Davis was methodical in the marches he led Hudson down-field – yet the junior Pirate signal caller also had a flair for the dramatic.

Both teams scored on their first possessions of the game – Davis on a read-option run straight up the gut from 23 yards out.

"The toughest thing was I don't think we could ever time them up with the snap count
