Board wants to know current jail site options

Supervisors pony up \$10,000 to
find out how much it will cost to
keep sheriff in current location

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors took another step Monday to "going it alone" when it comes to dealing with issues with its current jail when they voted unanimously to pay Samuels Group \$10,000 to come up with options with how it can use the property that houses the Sheriff's Office and jail.

The vote came a week after the board backed off on creating a Joint Authority Board with the city of New Hampton to build a \$13.2 million law enforcement center and 24-hour holding facility.

Instead, supervisors decided to contract with the Samuel Group, which came up with the recommendation for the center that would house both the Sheriff's Office and the New Hampton



PUTTING NEW SERVICE TOGETHER

NASHUA AREA EMS MAKING PROGRESS BUT STILL MUST OVERCOME BUREAUCRACY

Zenda Vikturek's answer came quick after she was asked what's been the biggest challenge she's faced since she was named the director of Nashua Area EMS?

"Because it's a start up, it's all the paperwork and dealing with the bureaucracy, and trust me, there's a lot of bureaucracy out there," she said. "That's been the frustrating part, but besides that, we feel good with where we're at."

Nashua Area EMS has an ambulance, has three EMS veterans if you will ready and is welcoming six residents who

recently completed their EMT training, but when it will be up and running remains the \$54,000 question.

Blame a scrap of paper. A snafu with the registration for the ambulance the city purchased last fall hasn't necessarily put the new volunteer agency on hold but it has delayed what will be a volunteer service from beginning to answer calls. That registration issue has slowed down the Nashua Area EMS's licensing process, but Vikturek is hopeful that the service will be up and running by July 1.

That date is important because that's when the

County service off to good start

Chickasaw County EMS Director says ambulances have been busy since Jan. 1

It's a Monday afternoon in the "EMS House" on South Walnut Avenue in New Hampton.

Carly Clinton and Joel Koehn are looking over paperwork in the spartan-furnished home while Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson works in his office, one that, save for a large wall calendar is about as bare bones as it can be.

As Knutson talks about the county-owned ambulance service's first four months in operation, he takes some good-natured ribbing from the paramedic and EMT sitting in the living room.

"It's one thing you learn about EMS right away," Knutson said with a laugh. "You're never safe from grief."

He paused for a moment and smiled.

"But this is a great group of people to work with," he said, "and I'd trust my family members with any one of our employees. We — and by that I mean our county — are blessed to have these people."

This isn't a story about the politics of the ambulance service, although it could be; after all, it seems to be a rare week in which Chickasaw County's ambulance issues haven't graced the front page of this newspaper.

However, today's story is — and yes, some will say that we're speaking too soon — about the success story that Chickasaw County EMS has written in a relatively short amount of time.

Knutson wasn't hired to run the ambulance service until Oct. 24, meaning that he had two months and a few days to make sure the ambulance service was up and running by Jan. 1.

He had plenty of help obviously.

There was the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors, who spent some of the county's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to purchase equipment ranging from

ambulances to bandages.

There was the Chickasaw County EMS Advisory Committee that put in countless hours coming up with recommendations and doing the "dirty work" needed to get a service off the ground in a matter of months.

And there were the legions of folks — many from near and some from far — who wanted to be a part of the new service that not only serves the rural areas of the county but also, through 28E agreements, takes calls in the cities of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

"They are the heroes to me," Knutson said. "A service can have all the equipment in the world, but if it doesn't have great employees, it doesn't matter. And we have great employees."

THEY'VE BEEN busy since Jan. 1, too.

Knutson said that Chickasaw County EMS has answered more than 300 calls in its first four months of service, with about 60 percent those being so-called "911 calls" and the rest being inter-facility transfers — mostly taking patients out of MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center to other hospitals.

But being a paramedic or an EMT is a different kind of job because let's face it, in a county the size of Chickasaw, it's rare to field calls throughout a 24-hour shift.

"It's 90 percent utter boredom," Knutson said, "and 10 percent sheer terror. Seriously, it's the nature of the business."

Some of the employees, especially the paramedics, work for other EMS services. Knutson, for example, is an air paramedic for Gunderson, flying out of Decorah.

A number of other employees work "day jobs" in and around the county.

Those that are on the first crew report to work for 24-hour shifts at 7 in the morning.

They do "truck checks" to make sure that the rigs are ready to roll and have all



the supplies they will need. And then they head to the house on Walnut and wait for the pager to go off, often completing paperwork and doing other duties.

If they get called, the backup crew becomes the main crew. Some who work in New Hampton keep working, but if their pager goes off, they're flying out the door.

And while most shifts are 24 hours, there are times that Knutson works in 12-hour shifts. The goal is to have paramedic coverage as much as possible, and he estimates the county service has been able to do so about 90 percent of the time.

"One hundred is the ultimate goal obviously," he said, "but at the same time, you do the best you can."

THE "ROSTER" at Chickasaw County EMS includes 30 names.

That's important because one must be on the roster to be able to provide care to those the ambulance services.

Some are full-timers; most are part-timers, some of whom work maybe just a shift or two a month.

Knutson said he would love to be able to hire a full-time paramedic and he says that his department's roster size is "adequate."

Would he like more? Absolutely.

"It's the reality of the world right now," he said. "When I first got started in EMS, I had to take two part-time jobs because you couldn't get a full-time job. Now, if you're a paramedic, trust me, you can pretty much go anywhere. We're off to a good start, don't get me wrong, but we'd love to see some of our EMTs become paramedics, we'd love more EMTs. If you're interested, we're willing to talk to you about it."

slow pace that is bureaucracy, Nashua Area EMS volunteers are not just sitting still.

"We've been having meetings, doing trainings," Vikturek said. "We've gone over the equipment, we've talked about what if this or that presents itself? Our goal is as soon as we get cleared to be up and running that we can take off right away."

contract the city has with AMR's Charles City ambulance expires.

For many years, Nashua was a member of the Chickasaw Ambulance Council and received its service from Chickasaw Ambulance Service, but when the county decided to start its own EMS department, the Nashua City Council balked at the price — more than \$158,000 a year — the city would have to pay as part of a 28E agreement the Board of Supervisors wanted the city to sign.

Instead, the county's second-largest city struck out on its own and decided to run its own service. The contract with AMR was meant to buy the city enough time to start its own service.

And save for that "B-word," Vikturek said the process has moved along well.

"The support we've received has been really nice," Vikturek said. "The fire department has been great to work with. They stepped in to really help. People are excited to get this going we feel like we're in a good spot, save for all that paperwork."

When the service does go into operation, it will have three residents — Vikturek, Cindy Shoemaker and Cheryl Dettmer — who staffed the rig that was once stationed in Nashua.

"The idea is that we'll start running to get them going," she said, "but we have a great group ready to volunteer and the plan is that they'll take over. We want it to get off to a good start and hopefully our experience will help."

Vikturek earned her EMT license in 1992 and became a paramedic seven years later. She worked for the Waverly ambulance service for more than 13 years.

"I've done my share of 24-hour shifts," she said, "and you know, technically I'm retired, but this is too important for our town not to step up and help out."

Once Nashua Area EMS is up and running, volunteers will take "on-call" shifts, and Vikturek will be the first to tell you that her service will not be in operation 24/7/365.


"We have a lot of people work out of town, you have farmers in the field, things like that," she said, "but we're going to provide as much service as we possibly can."

She said the service will have mutual-aid agreements with ambulance services around the area and that does include Chickasaw County EMS. Three of Nashua's volunteers are working part-time for that service that is based in New Hampton. Then again, EMS providers working for two dif-


ferent agencies is a common occurrence.

"It works both ways, if they call, we'll help out because we never know when a mass casualty incident," she said, "and that's why you have those mutual-aid agreements. All of us who get into EMS do so to help people. That's the same if it's here, Charles City, New Hampton, wherever."

And while they wait on the



The Chickasaw County Rescue Squad is a sub-agency of the Chickasaw County Emergency Management Agency and was started in the early 1970s.

The Rescue Squad is composed of approximately 50 paid-on-call volunteer individuals that are highly trained in specialty types of rescue including; hazardous materials, vehicle extrication, agriculture extrication, grain bin rescue and recovery, water rescue and wide area search among other specialties.

The Rescue Squad responds to nearly all incidents within Chickasaw County to supplement the response of local agencies. Rescue Squad is the home base for the county-wide First Responders in Chickasaw County.

As listed below, there are state-certified Emergency Medical Responders in or around every town in Chickasaw County. First Responders are the ones that show up in your time of need before the ambulance arrives.

little extra special, for 2023 marks the return of an in-person national contest for the first time since 2019.

"It's about time," said Caleb Sinnwell, a two-time national champion who has qualified for the national contest the past three years, but all of them were held "virtually" because of the COVID-19 pandemic. "I'm so ready to go."

Sinnwell, Levi, Huck and Franzen joined Grace Dietz, Alison Mehmen, Elexa O'Neill and Ava Kirk as national qualifiers after Monday's state contest that was held in Des Moines.

Sinnwell's senior individual website "With the Flip of A Switch On the Rural Frontier: REA Lights the Way;" the senior group documentary "Forging a New Frontier for Female Athletes: Dr. Christine Grant's Relentless Pursuit of Gender Equality" put together by Levi, Franzen and Huck; and the senior group website "Females in FFA: Forging New Frontiers in Farming and Beyond" created by Dietz and Mehmen all claimed first place in their respective divisions to earn trips to the National History Day contest that will be held June 11-15 in suburban Washington, D.C.

O'Neill and Kirk took second for their senior group website "Leaving the Past Behind: The Orphan Train Forges New Frontiers for Child Welfare" to earn a trip to nationals.

"It really is weddings and funerals at state," longtime Nashua-Plainfield NHD advisor Suzan Turner said. "Obviously, you're so happy for the ones that made it, but for the ones who didn't, you feel every ounce of pain they're going through. But I can't say this enough, I'm proud of all of our students. They poured their hearts into their projects."

in National History Day contests; instead, students must wait for the awards ceremony to find out how they did.

Past success doesn't mean one iota.

"At state Monday, there was a girl who won nationals last year not qualify this year," Turner said. "I've been doing this long enough so that I think I know what a good project is, but I also know it's very subjective — maybe the topic really catches a judge's attention, for instance — so we talk about controlling what you can control. You can't worry about other projects; you just have to do your best on yours."

Still, that national champ was "bounced" from the competition pretty early in Monday's awards ceremony, and that gave Sinnwell pause.

"Both Kadence and I are female athletes and Cal also plays sports," Franzen said, "so it really resonates with us on a personal level."

"Allison and I picked females in FFA," Dietz said, "because we have shared interest in FFA. We also care deeply about women's rights."

it's one project with two or more voices.

"Elexa and I divided our work about 50/50," Kirk said. "When conflicts would occur, we would always check in on each other, conquering them together."

The trio of Franzen, Huck and Levi have been History Day partners, as Levi put it, "forever," and they all have their separate duties.

"I'm kind of the writer, Paige is the narrator and Cal always puts the video together," Huck said. "We all research and cite together ... and honestly we

don't have that many conflicts." And if there is a conflict?

"That's when we go to Turner," Levi said, "but seriously, we don't have that many."

THE PROJECTS, though, are not done, for just as they did after the district contest in March, the students will take the feedback and make changes.

Those changes can range from the dramatic to the massaging, but it's rare, if ever, that Nashua-Plainfield students take the exact same project they took to state to the national contest.

For now, though, the stu-

dents — and the advisor — are just excited that they're going to Washington.

"Not that people do this just for the trips," Turner said, "but it is a nice reward. I'm sure they'll tell you how much they like going to contests, but it's really exciting for them to get to go to Washington. ... We always have a lot of fun with the Iowa contingent — we're all in this together, really ... but in the past, our kids have met people from all over the county and the world, for that matter, and that's the memory they take with them."

Still, there's a nagging ques-

tion that has to be asked. Why National History Day, an extra-curricular activity that is basically homework?

O'Neill and Mehmen have the answers.

"I love NHD, for it gives you free range to indulge in the topic you choose, the topic that means a lot to you," O'Neill said. "It is fun to learn these stories and tell them through our eyes."

"I enjoy learning about history," Mehmen added, "and the importance of events that I didn't know anything about until I started my project."

Huskies work on 'little things' leading into two biggest meets of season

That happened in Winters' freshman season — a year that was wiped out because of COVID-19. That didn't mean the season didn't start, though, as Sudol had Winters tentatively scheduled to run indoors as a freshman in the open 400 at the Dickinson Relays.

Which he did, then the state pulled the plug on all 2020 spring prep sports in Iowa after the pandemic took over and life was altered for all across the board — nation by nation.

Sudol can laugh about his miscalculation now on where he should have put Winters in his lineup — but he's glad to have him for one final push to help reclaim Husky glory in the coming weeks.

"He hates short races, so it was all my fault that he didn't go out until now," smiled Sudol.

Winters shaved almost 24 seconds off his previous career best in the 3,200 run at the Cougar Invite last Monday. His time of 11:42.9 was good for third place. Winters was fourth in the mile run (5:32).

Winters relayed his thoughts on one of his favorite races.

"It's an 11-minute, 12-minute run, so it's not very long — it's temporary," said Winters about the 3,200 run. "Just give it your all."

N-P has its sights set on big things after running at the Cougar Invite in Sumner. The Huskies placed runner-up to BCLUW with 124 points. The Comets won the meet with 155 points.

The regular season is winding down with just two regular season meets to go before the state qualifier takes place at Northwood on Thursday, May 11. N-P competed at the Simon Relays in Dike on Thursday. The Top of Iowa Conference meet is slated to run on Thursday, May 4, which is hosted by the Huskies. That comes off the heels of the Cowpath Relays in Nashua this coming Monday.

Sudol wants a conference crown — bad. He said it's been 19 years since N-P has been able to claim the league title — back in 2004.

Which in the grand scheme of things is what N-P is gearing up for and of course to send as many events down to the state meet as possible.

"It's time to make this thing happen," said Sudol. "We're trying to get things rolling right about now. I feel good with where we're at. It's just getting the boys to have the confidence that they need within themselves to make it happen. That's the next step, because with the conditioning right now it's you are what you are at this point."

Sudol is in his seventh year of guiding the N-P track program and his Huskies have already reeled in two first-place team trophies — but they want a little bit more.

"I think we're going to have a combination of trying to win the district meet and conference," said Sudol. "We just gotta see what it's going to take to do that as well. This meet tomorrow and Monday are huge meets for us, just to get us finalized where we want to be. We have a pretty

good idea."

Another senior for N-P — Bo Harrington — PR'd in the open 400 with a first-place time of 53.91. He's a key relay runner for Sudol and led off the 4x800 at Sumner, which took first place in a season-best time of 9:07. Harrington handed the baton to Joel Winters, who then gave it Jase Hansen before it ended up in the grip of Dylan Blanchard.

Harrington described this year's team — which has around 40 members out for the sport.

"We're big goofballs. We bond together that way," said Harrington. "We're a close team."

While the Huskies have plenty of fun when they're not winning races or placing near the top of the team standings — they're also committed to improving.

"Hopefully we're all just building towards our best times of the year," said Harrington. "We should be able to send a good amount of guys down (state meet) if we just keep competing well and perform well at districts."

N-P senior Aiden Lamborn won the high jump (six feet) and is looking to crack the state field for the third year in a row in that event. He also placed third in the 200 dash (24.22).

N-P senior Kaden Wilken ran to a runner-up finish in the 110 hurdles in 16.57. Wilken led off the winning shuttle hurdle squad that ran 1:05.79. That squad is also looking to compete down in Des Moines at the state meet for the third consecutive year and is comprised of Wilken, Lamborn, Harrington and junior Titus Evans.

"We just got to go out and perform now," said Sudol. "It's a matter of getting the little things lined up right and making sure things are hitting on all cylinders. We'll be fine."







Huck – Nashua-Plainfield's star sophomore runner – will look to tame the blue oval today (Friday) at the prestigious Drake Relays. The school record holder at N-P in a slew of events will look to continue to shine amongst the best of the best on the prep level in the sport of track and field.
