Nashua Area EMS staying busy

Director says the first six months of service has far exceeded her expectations

Let's put it this way: Nashua Area EMS in its first six months of operation has silenced its doubters. Since the city-owned ambulance service became operational on July 1, Nashua Area EMS has responded to 84 calls — much higher than

expected — but what really warms the heart of the service's director is the support she and her fellow paramedics, EMTs and drivers have received. "The support we've gotten from the fire department, from the community, and the gratitude of our residents, those are all really huge for us," Zenda Vikturek said. "Even

people who haven't had to use our service tell us, 'Just knowing you're here is comforting.' I'm incredibly proud of what we've accomplished in a really short time." Nashua, of course, opted not to take part in the county-owned ambulance service that made its debut on Jan. 1. Chickasaw County EMS serves rural residents and six coun-

ty cities — New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington. The other city that decided not to go with the county service was Alta Vista, which is using an ambulance based in the nearby Howard County

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Lack of a quorum keeps council from final 2023 meeting

Just two City Council members show up for meeting so no action can be taken on issues

The Nashua City Council is in dire need of a fifth member. That couldn't have been more evident at last Monday's regular scheduled City Council meeting that saw only two members attend. That meant the Council could not meet the quorum requirement of three members present to vote on agenda items and actually hold the meeting. Council members Tim Malven and Samantha Johnson were not present at the meeting — which left just two members present in Ernie Willsher and Jake Johnson. Newly-appointed Nashua Mayor Hal Kelleher vacated his Council seat two weeks ago to replace former Mayor Alex Anthofer — who resigned back in October. Ironically, the Council had planned on discussing appointing or holding a special election to fill that open Council seat. The next scheduled Council meeting was pushed back to a tentative date of Wednesday, Jan. 3. Kelleher held a roll call and asked if there were any citizen comments. He then addressed those in attendance at the Council meeting inside City Hall. "We do not have a quorum tonight," said Kelleher. "We won't be able to take any action tonight."

Samantha Johnson was re-elected, as was Jake Johnson, to the new council that currently only has four members to go along with its new mayor in Kelleher. Malven chose not to run for re-election. Jake Johnson was officially sworn in as a re-elected member of the City Council on Thursday, Dec. 7. Dan Zwanziger, who also won this bid to sit on the Council at last month's election, was also sworn in. The Council can appoint or hold a special election to bring the number of Council members back up to five. The Council will have 60 days to make that decision to fill the final Council seat. If a mayor is appointed, there can be a petition

Chamber Holiday Promotion comes with a twist this year

Nashua man wins \$200 but decides to 'spread the wealth'

They say it's better to give than to receive during the Christmas season, and on Tuesday night, Nashua resident Bruce Becker did just that. Becker's name was drawn as the big winner of the Big 4 Chamber of Commerce Holiday Promotion Contest during the basketball games between Nashua-Plainfield and Tripoli. That meant Becker was set to pick up \$200 in Chamber Bucks, but instead, he donated it back to the organization and asked it to hold five more drawings for \$40 apiece. "It was really a nice thing Bruce did for other residents in our community," Big 4 Chamber of Commerce President Val Johnson said. "It was really touching."

So on Wednesday morn-

ing, Becker got together with Johnson and drew five more names — Chris Botteroff, Paul Wegner, Austin Birmingham, Harold Levin and Zach Roslor — out of the "bucket." They joined the four other residents — Jim Johnson, Brian Pottebaum, Mike Conley and Martha Winters — who had their names drawn Tuesday night. Johnson and Pottebaum won \$75 in Chamber Bucks while Conley and Winters were \$50 winners. "It's something we can do during the season," Becker said before drawing the names. Supervisors hold off on EMS remodeling

County leaders want to make sure that not putting in sprinkler system still meets code

The "cluster," if you will, when it comes to remodeling the Chickasaw County EMS building so that it will have living quarters continued Monday during the Board of Supervisors meeting. First, Design Connections' Aaron Thompson was a no-show at the meeting, which meant supervisors didn't have a chance to talk to him about the two bids — one including a sprinkler system and the other including a fire-suppression wall — to make sure they both met state code requirements. "I don't think you can do anything until you meet with him and review the bids to talk about the numbers," County Attorney David Laudner said.

The cost of the project is critical for the county because if it's more than \$196,000, then supervisors would have to go through what Laudner called a "full-blown" bidding process. The good news is that one of the two options Thompson gave board members is under that threshold. If the county uses a fire-suppression wall, Thompson said the cost to the county would be \$183,037, but if it installs a sprinkler system — which board members believed they had to do all along — the cost would be \$270,702, far above the threshold. "If we're over that number, then we need to find out if there are things they can jigger in there to get under that

for a special election – but that needs to happen within 14 days of the appointment.

There are stipulations for that petition. The number of signatures of eligible electors of a city for a valid petition shall be determined as follows: in a city of less than 10,000 people or less, at least 200 hundred signatures or at least the number of signatures equal to 15 percent of the voters who voted for candidates for the office at the preceding regular election at which the office was on the ballot, whichever number is fewer.

Also on the agenda last Monday were resolutions to appoint a Mayor Pro-Tem for Nashua and accept Kelleher's resignation on the Council. Kelleher held that position of Mayor Pro-Tem prior to becoming mayor.

Outside of the discussion on what route the current Council would take on filling the vacant Council seat, another important agenda item was an animal and protection hearing for two separate parties involved with dogs at large.

One dog owner in Nashua – Sara Loy – has repeatedly violated the city's ordinance concerning at-large animals from as far back as at least

four years according to records provided to the Council. Loy owns five dogs in the 800 block of Main St. and has received several complaints about those animals running loose and confronting citizens within the city limits.

Loy was present at Monday's meeting and discussed in private with Nashua City Attorney David Skilton on the plan moving forward as to what to do with two of the dogs that she owns.

Skilton said an agreement was made for Loy to remove two of the animals within 30 days and she's to report back to the Council about the progress made on the removal of the dogs within the city limits. Skilton said removing those two animals will reduce the number of dogs Loy owns to three.

"This is I think the second or third time there's been a problem with dogs at the property," said Skilton. "She understands that. She's going to try to work it down."

The second dog owner was not named on Monday by Council members, but it is believed the animal in question is a blue heeler that is running loose after getting past a gate that needs to be fixed on the property.


The dog hearings have tentatively been rescheduled to Monday, Jan. 15.

town of Elma.

Nashua, though, decided to go it alone and start its own service, one that detractors said was simply too ambitious for a city of a little more than 1,500.

"So far, we've had 84 calls, which is a lot," Vikturek said. "Years ago, when we had an ambulance here, we'd maybe go on a 100 calls for a whole year. So 84 in six months, that's quite a bit."

The service has about 20 active volunteers, including two nurses, one paramedic and seven EMTs.

Those volunteers are paid when they go on calls but are not paid for what are usually 12-hour on-call shifts.

"To me, they're volunteers because for those 12 hours – or however long their shift is – they're not necessarily tied to home," Vikturek said, "but in another way, they can't run to Waterloo or Mason City, they can't go to an away game or anything like that. We want them to be able to respond in about five to 10 minutes so

they're giving up a lot to serve our community."

Before Nashua Area EMS went into service, there were concerns that Nashua's small core of volunteers would not be able to keep the ambulance in service around the clock. For the most part, those detractors were wrong.

"We've had a couple of hours here and there where we haven't been in service," Vikturek said, "but it's a rare thing. Since we started, the county has taken one call in Nashua, and that wasn't even because we weren't in service, that was because we were on another call."

Vikturk added that the service, which has its ambulance parked at the Nashua Fire Station, has received "fantastic support" from city firefighters, who often serve as drivers when the ambulance is paged out on calls.

And she said that private donations of \$10,000 have been received in the past six months.

"We are in really good shape," she said, "and obviously, we'll always take more people, but I think, no, I know we have surprised a lot of people. It's been really great to see what happens when people come together for a good, common cause."

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Supervisors do an about face, hires two new EMS employees

A week after voting against hiring paramedic, board members reconsider and make hires

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors turned on a dime — or shall we say in a week's time — Monday and hired two new part-time employees to work for Chickasaw County EMS, the county-owned ambulance service that provides service to rural residents and six cities.

A week after rejecting the hiring of Samantha Streeter as a part-time paramedic on a 3-2 vote, board members voted 4-1 to hire Streeter and a part-time EMT, Cally Mueller, for the service.

"I thought about this all week and over the weekend," Supervisor Travis Suckow said, "and the whole state is having trouble finding people. And we got them coming to us."

Suckow, along with Scott Cerwinski, had voted against the hiring of Streeter during the board's Dec. 11 meeting, but both joined Steve Breitbach and Board Chairman Matt Kuhn in voting for hiring the two new part-timers.

"We're in a very unique position in this county right now. We have people who want to work for us," Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson said before the votes were cast.

"With four of our part-time paramedic employees all working for the same company, if something would happen over there and they had two people get hurt or a massive walk off the job, we could really in reality lose four of our paramedics overnight. And that would really affect us."

The conversation about EMS staffing turned lively at times.

Fredericksburg resident Doreen Cook said she was concerned that the ambulance based in Fredericksburg didn't have the same "response time" required as the two rigs based in New Hampton.

And she added that "I'm already hearing up in New Hampton that they're talking about leaving."

That raised the ire of Knutson.

"Well, you'd be the first ... because in my [talks with an] employee and all of my crew, I've heard nothing but happy, satisfied employees with the service we're currently running," he said, "so please, if you have something otherwise to say, please encourage that employee to see their director or any of the Board of Supervisors."

Knutson said that the costs of hiring the two part-timers would be negligible.

"The only thing that's going to cost us more as a county or

my department more ... is if we continue to have these overages on the overtime," Knutson said. "Other than that, we're talking about a little bit of training."

He also pointed out that the hiring of Streeter would give Chickasaw County EMS 12 part-time paramedics, including himself. He pointed out that paramedics are required to work at least one 24-hour shift a month.

"If none of our paramedics are full-time, I think 12 is a pretty manageable number, especially when they're only working maybe one shift a month."

Kuhn said he favored the hiring of part-time paramedics in an effort to build the service.

When Supervisor Jake Hackman asked if the six cities — New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington — that signed 28E agreements with the county for ambulance service, supported hiring more employees, Kuhn said he felt the cities would be more in favor of hiring staff than using the cities' money to remodel the department's ambulance station so that it has living quarters.

"I'm not going to speak for the cities," Kuhn said. "The city council members I have talked to are in support of trying to build the service."

Hackman was the lone supervisor to cast no votes on the two hires, and New Hampton resident Terry Johnson asked Hackman to "explain" himself.

"Your pattern has been no on every vote, not every vote but mostly, on this ambulance," Johnson said. "Can you explain yourself why you keep voting no all the time?"

Hackman responded with "I see the numbers."

After the meeting, Knutson said that in both September and October, the service had a positive cash flow and that numbers for November were not yet available.

The EMS director was quick to point out that in the ambulance business, "you're always going to be three or four months behind, so those numbers in September and October aren't due to call volume but billings from the spring being paid."

During Monday's meeting, Johnson said he understands that a start-up service will experience, if you will, growing pains.

"This thing is not going to do very well in the first year or two," Johnson said to Hackman, "but you don't want to seem to support this ambulance ... and it looks like you don't want it. Do you?"

"I do," Hackman responded.

There is good news, at least for area farmers, as there are decent chances of rain on both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

And with the ongoing drought, that may be the best present Santa can deliver in 2023.

Extension program to provide crop production research updates Jan. 16

Extension specialists from campus and field specialists from Iowa State University will travel to Cedar Falls on Jan. 16, providing updated management options and recommendations on crop production issues facing Iowa growers.

The 2024 Crop Advantage meeting will give producers a solid foundation of current research-based crop production information to help make smart, informed decisions for their farming operation.

The meeting is an opportunity for farmers and crop advisers to hear current research and crop production information. Meetings include continuing education credits for Certified Crop Advisers (CCA).

Private pesticide applicator continuing education will be available and will require a separate fee payable at the location.

"There is no other program in our crop production education year where we are able to bring this many extension specialists together to sites across the state. We're excited to provide quality, in-person education farmers and ag retailers have come to expect," said Terry Basol, who is a field agronomist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach and based at the research farm located near Nashua.

The Cedar Falls location will be held at the Bien Venu Event Center at the Holiday Inn and Suites on Jan. 16. Registration check-in opens at 8:15 a.m. and the program runs 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

Program highlights for the Cedar Falls location include Entomology speed topics; Managing persistent herbicides (carryover) and weeds (waterhemp), and the impacts of cereal rye on nitrogen cycling and crop production.

number," Laudner told board members. "If not, then we're back to square one."

"They're going to have to hire a licensed architect, an engineer, and go through the entire full bidding process."

Stanton Electric owner Chuck Stanton said the process has left him and other contractors frustrated.

"The smart way to do it would have been in the very beginning to take electrical bids, plumbing bids, carpentry bids, flooring bids and been done and never involved anyone else," he said. "That's the smart way to do it any time. That's how you're going to get your best deal."

But Thompson, who drew up the blueprints for the project, submitted a general contractor bid on Nov. 27, and after a lengthy discussion, he agreed to serve as a "construction manager" and bring back a final bid at the Dec. 18 meeting. "What we were told at the beginning wasn't exactly what was going on and then we thought we had it taken care of and things still weren't matching up," Board Chairman Matt Kuhn said. "It has been a cluster, and I'll be the first to admit that."

Supervisors on Monday said they couldn't take any action on the bids until they could talk directly with the Design Connections president, even though Laudner said that "we operate under the presumption that what he is presenting to us complies with state code. That's what we hired him for, or you guys hired him for."

But board members were wary, because they know if the cost of the project comes in higher than \$196,000, they would in effect have to start over and go through the process mandated by

state law.

Supervisors also discussed how they would pay for the remodeling, and Supervisor Jake Hackman said he believes that the county can use money it generates through the 28E agreements it has with six county cities — New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

That brought a quick response from Bassett Mayor Jim Ashley, who said the money from the cities that receive ambulance service from the county is "just for labor, not equipment."

"It's not in the 28E that way," Hackman said.

The county purchased much of the equipment, including three ambulances, for the service with its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and seemed destined to use those funds to pay for the remodeling of the building the county bought this summer for an ambulance shed.

But supervisors then voted to designate \$600,000 of its ARPA funds to Secondary Roads, leaving just \$71,000 of those funds remaining.

Supervisor Steve Breitbach said he favored using money from the county's capital projects fund, while Supervisor Scott Cerwinski said "I think capital projects or/and some of the 28E agreement" should be used.

Hackman, though, said some of the money in that fund has been generated by general tax revenues and "how is that fair to the two cities [Nashua and Alta Vista] that didn't sign up" to be part of the county-owned service.

In the end, board members made no decisions on either the bids or how the county will pay for the remodeling; instead, Kuhn will try to set up a meeting with Thompson so supervisors can have their questions answered.

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Undermanned Huskies take 12th at 32-team Battle of Waterloo

The Battle of Waterloo isn't for everyone. Only the strong survive and get to claim themselves as one of the better squads in the super-talented field of 32 teams that take to the mat in Black Hawk County. Nashua-Plainfield is getting there. Check back in late January or early February when it really matters, because Al Frost's fifth-ranked Huskies may be even more dangerous later this winter when the meets really start to count.

Despite missing two of its key returnees — state qualifiers no less — from a squad last year that earned two third-place trophies at each state meet (dual, traditional), N-P made some noise in Waterloo — just maybe not as much as the Top of Iowa Conference squad wanted to. N-P (9-5) placed 12th overall and defeated quality squads like No. 15 Iowa City High and Wapsie Valley on Friday. That earned them third place in Bracket B (Magnum Bracket).

The following day on Saturday, the Huskies were placed in Pool 3, where N-P took on the likes of proud and tradition-rich programs like No. 4 West Delaware and No. 17 Ankeny. Then there was the rematch against No. 4 Lake Mills to end the evening. While the Huskies went 0-3 against those aforementioned teams — Frost said his Huskies shouldn't hang their heads one bit.

"We did take on some pretty good teams," said Frost. "That's why we go down there to get some good competition. We're just a little short-handed yet, but it is what it is."

N-P opened the tournament with a solid win over Class 3A Iowa City High, which the Huskies won 51-22. Then it squared off against Linn-Mar — another Class 3A squad that is ranked No. 7 in the first dual rankings released by the IWCOA (Iowa Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association) this past Wednesday. The Lions won that dual by a score of 53-22.

The Huskies took on a familiar foe in Wapsie Valley, ranked No. 11 in Class 1A, to end Friday afternoon's festivities. N-P — which defeated Wapsie at state duals last year — won in the rematch, 45-32.

Linn-Mar was definitely a solid team. They had every opportunity to win the whole thing," said Frost. "The other two wins on Friday were pretty nice."

West Delaware slipped past N-P by a score of 37-28 in the Huskies' first bout on Saturday. Ankeny won 53-24 over N-P and Lake Mills made it 2-2 versus the Huskies this year with a 41-34 triumph. Lake Mills topped N-P in the season opener, 46-30.

"On Saturday you get matched up with teams that are about the same equality. We had an opportunity to be in everyone of those duals and we were except for Ankeny. For some reason we didn't match up with Ankeny very well," said Frost.

N-P sports a full lineup, but was without one of its star performers in senior 175-pounder Titus Evans — who is ranked third by IAWrestle and placed fifth at 170 last year as a junior. Evans is 6-0 this year — all of his wins have come by pin except one.

"One guy that we're missing for sure made a big difference," said Frost. "Right there with him in it, we've got a winnable situation."

Frost said Evans was sick all of last week and missed school. The talented football player is having a hard time shedding extra pounds he gained from the football season.

"He was actually sick all last week and wasn't in school. He'll make a comeback here, hopefully," said Frost. "We're not going to cut him back down to 175 for Thursday duals."

The Huskies could get sophomore 165-pounder Eli Kalainoff back in mid-January if all goes well as he is recovering from a injury sustained last fall in football. Kalainoff's broken ankle is healing — but it's just a matter of if doctors feel he's suitable to hit the mat and contribute with pins and wins. Kalainoff went 13-6 last year as a freshman at 160 pounds and was one of 13 Husky wrestlers that competed individually at state.

"We're still playing it by ear whether or not he's going to be able to make a miraculous comeback and get back in the

lineup or not. Time's going to tell on how he actually does on that leg after he is cleared to go," said Frost.

No. 1 ranked Jayden Rinken (126) and No. 4 Nic Brase (113) — both juniors — continue to roll for the Huskies at the lower weights. Each standout Husky won all six of their matches and both sport records of 20-0.

Rinken won in sudden victory, 5-3, with a takedown in the first overtime period to defeat No. 5 ranked Truman Folkers of Ankeny.

Brase won by a 3-0 decision over No. 7 Kendall Kurtz of City High.

Tate White, a senior rated ninth at 190 pounds, came up with a 10-8 decision over No. 8 Jeryn Funke of West Delaware. White won all six of his matches over the weekend and is now 21-2 on the year.

Jackson Carey, a junior ranked 10th at 157 pounds, had a productive two-day tournament despite getting tech falled (16-1) by No. 1 ranked Kael Voinovich of City High. Voinovich is transfer from the state of Oklahoma where he was a state finalist last year in the Sooner State. Carey also got pinned by No. 9 Teagen Peiffer of Ankeny in 1:45.

Carey (7-4) proved he's tough as nails, though, with a 4-2 victory by decision over No. 5 Grant Boddicker of Linn-Mar and a stunning pin over No. 11 Kanen Decker of Wapsie.

Frost described Carey's match against Decker, which saw his win by fall materialize in what amounted to a blink of an eye.

"That Decker deal is a solid kid. He's the real deal," said Frost. "They were scrambling and they were battling it out. The guy was actually in on a double leg and Jackson throws



a nice side cradle on at the same time and just kind of hee-haws him over his head off his right side over his shoulder. He had him completely off the mat and kind of did a suicide and put him on his back and pinned him."

Aiden Sullivan (16-5) went 5-1 at 215 pounds and came away with three pins and a major decision. The Husky senior's lone loss was by pin at the hands of No. 11 Griffin Schultz of Linn-Mar.

The Huskies will be hoping to have Evans and Kalainoff back sometime after the holidays. In the meantime, several of Frost's newcomers and those wanting to really make their mark are gaining valuable experience and toughening up for a postseason run — which will be here before you know it.

"We've gotta have guys that are going to fill in those spots," said Frost. "They gotta step it up, too. I keep telling my JV guys all the time, you gotta train just like the varsity guys because you never know — you're going to be the man. You're going to be the one that's going to need to step into this spot. That's

half the battle in dual meets in depth and being able to interchange guys and move kids around a little bit so they make up a strong lineup depending on your competition."

The Top of Iowa Conference implements a "Dead Week" from Friday, Dec. 22 to Tuesday, Dec. 26. That time off period for student athletes prohibits all activities, practices, open gyms, workouts, ADP and use of school athletic facilities during that designated period.

Frost doesn't mind the decision by the league office one bit — at least this year.

"We need some time off. They really do," said Frost. "They need to spend some time with families. They gotta enjoy the Christmas holidays a little bit before we get back to the grindstone."

N-P wrestled on Thursday at Rockford versus North Union, Forest City and the host Warriors in the last competition of 2023. The Huskies get back out on the mat after that in a few weeks on Thursday, Jan. 4 in a triangular against Osage and St. Ansgar in a meet that will be hosted by the No. 1

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N-P girls break losing skid, beat Tripoli for second time

Down four starters this week – these Huskies almost pulled out two victories.

Now it's time for some rest, relaxation and hopefully some repair.

The short-handed Nashua-Plainfield girls basketball team came up just short on the road versus North Butler (38-35) Monday night and earned win No. 2 on the season at home versus Tripoli on Tuesday by a score of 42-21.

N-P (2-5, 0-4) played without starters Ava Kirk, Jalynn Pratt, Myranda Webster and Paige Franzen in the game versus Tripoli – whom N-P beat 59-25 on the Panthers' home court in the season opener.

Kirk missed the second half of the North Butler game with a knee injury and she did not play against Tripoli. That left seven players on N-P's roster. That meant junior reserves – Bailey Bond and Kristen Lee – saw extended minutes.

"They battled to keep us in those games," said Smith.

Two of those seven players – senior Maci Malven and junior Marleigh Lowe – never left the court. N-P sophomore forward Elayna O'Neill is close to a breakout performance at her forward position according to Smith and seldom-used bench player Jennifer McLeland even got considerable court time against the 2-8 Panthers.

"To battle with North Butler (who was full strength) and to beat Tripoli by 20-plus, I think speaks a lot to the commitment of those six. I've been coaching girls basketball for 12 years and have never experienced anything like the first half of our season this year. Those six really haven't blinked and haven't made any excuses," said Smith.

One Husky player that has really made an impact this season and leads the entire state (all five classes) in steals-per-game (7.7 spg) is junior guard Kadence Huck.

Huck – who has helped the Huskies become the fifth-best steals leader in the state with an 18-per-game average – regis-

tered a triple double in the win over Tripoli. Her 25 points, 13 rebounds and 10 steals couldn't have come at a better time. The tour de force by Huck helped snap a five-game losing streak and sent the Huskies into the winter break with plenty of momentum.

"Kadence is definitely our engine," said Smith. "I can't speak highly enough about what it means to have Kadence in a Husky jersey every time. She's a special athlete."

Huck's career-high of 30 points came against Tripoli in the season opener. She had 15 steals and four rebounds in that game.

The Bearcats (3-5, 1-2) outscored N-P, 26-18, in the second half. North Butler scored just 12 first-half points.

N-P coach says his team 'competed hard' in loss to Osage

She first hurt the ankle a year ago as a sophomore playing volleyball against, you guessed it, Osage.

"I was fine my sophomore basketball year. I just pushed through it," said Glaser.

Then this past volleyball season the ankle started to cause pain for the N-P standout. She missed the rest of the season in volleyball her sophomore year in 2022 after hurting her ankle, but played through the pain near the net last fall.

"I was really struggling," said Glaser.

So Glaser did something about it and had surgery this past Monday. So if you see her on crutches, you'll know why.

"I got an MRI and long story short I found out I'm getting surgery," said Glaser. "Basically, that means my basketball season is getting cut short just like my volleyball season did. All I can say is I hope I can be back. I don't really know for sure, obviously. If my recovery goes as planned, hopefully I'll be back."

Give credit to the Huskies, which never led in the game but it tied it at 31-31 after Glaser put a bunny through the net for two points with 4:57 left in the third period.

"They shared the ball well.

Ball movement in the first half and right away in the second half was really crisp and really good. We just made the right read and the right play possession after possession," said Smith.

Then the Green Devils responded to N-P's challenge by going on a 17-0 run inside that larger string of points with no answer by the Huskies to lead, 58-36.

Just like that – N-P's best first half start of basketball played was wiped out. That doesn't mean the Huskies can't take positives from the game, because there were plenty of those to work off of and get better.

"We played really well together. We played very unselfishly," said Smith. "We played very hard, I think."

Here's the rundown of what N-P was dealing with before the Osage game even tipped off.

The Huskies were down three starters because of injury – seniors Jalynn Pratt (shoulder), Myranda Webster (ankle) and junior Paige Franzen (ankle).

"We literally lost Myranda last night at her dance practice," said Webster. "She rolled her ankle there."

To make matters worse – N-P's leading scorer, Kadence

Huck – did not feel 100 percent. "Kadence is sick right now – absolutely gutted her way through it," said Smith.

And speaking of pesky ankle injuries, the problem flared up again for the Huskies as starting sophomore point guard Ava Kirk rolled her ankle in the first quarter against Osage.

"We taped it up and she went right back out there and competed," said Smith.

Huck – who averages over 15 points a game – had a tough night shooting (2-16 FG), but finished with nine points.

Smith shifted his lineup around to compensate for the absence of his starters. Each and every one of his players that hit the hardwood on Friday came to play and gave it their all.

"We competed hard. That was all it comes down to," said Smith. "Being out those three starters, I told them before the game if we go out there and compete as hard as we possibly can we'll live with whatever the result was. In the first half it was unreal."

Glaser summed up what her Huskies are currently dealing with and how they've responded to the challenges that have been set before them.

"We grow every game and that has shown," said Glaser.

"It's just a growing process every game."

Osage is now 7-3 overall on the season and 4-2 in the league. N-P is 2-5 overall and 0-4 in the TIC.

Win or lose, Glaser will be there for her teammates – even if she won't be able to catch a pass or grab a rebound – or put the ball in the hoop like she did on Friday night.

"All I can really do is be there for my team. I love these girls and I wouldn't trade them for the world," said Glaser. "I love playing with them. They make the sport fun. I just want to be able to be their biggest cheerleader and let them know that even though I won't be able to be on the court with them, I'll be on the sideline cheering them on no matter what."

we're overmatched. Next year, the year after, it's going to be different, but confidence wise, oh yeah, we needed a win to give us a little momentum going into break."

The Huskies took control from the start as they raced 22-13 lead after a quarter before coming up with its best frame of the season as they outscored the Panthers 26-10 in the second to take a 48-23 lead at halftime.

Nashua-Plainfield didn't let up; in fact, Tuesday's game marked the first time this season the Huskies "won" all four quarters.

"We had a lot of guys do a lot of good things," Mueller said. "Sometimes, you just need a game like this to get guys to get some confidence and realize that they have it in them."

Senior Tucker Franzen had 24 points on a night when he hit 6-of-16 shots from 3-point range while Jase Hansen came off the bench to score a season-high 17 points. But there was more.

The Huskies got eight points

apiece from Matthew Malven and Landon Foelske, and the latter grabbed a team-high six rebounds. Senior Hunter Hackman came off the bench and had five boards.

"I wanted Tucker to have a night like that," Mueller said. "He shot pretty well from 3, but they were all good shots, even the ones he missed. ... And Hunter gave us some really nice minutes, he's probably a guy who can play a little more for us."

The win against Tripoli wrapped a three-game, five-night stretch as the Huskies fell to unbeaten Osage on Friday and then couldn't overcome a hot-shooting North Butler team on Monday night.

Franzen led the Huskies with 14 points while sophomore Trent Rodruck added 10 in the loss to Osage, but the Green Devils broke open the game with a 26-10 third quarter.

"They and West Fork, they're the class of the league right now," Mueller said. "And I think our 'middle' is pretty good, too. But honestly, I think we can play with a lot of teams. We just have to get stronger, get quicker and definitely play with confidence."

The North Butler game turned on 3-point shooting. The Bearcats came into the game winless, but went 10-for-20 from beyond the arc in a 59-44 victory while the Huskies were just 4-for-19 from downtown.

"For a while, it seemed like they couldn't miss," Mueller said. "I thought we were right there with them, but those 30 points on 3-pointers, that was tough to overcome."

Trae Geise, Malven and Rodruck led the Huskies with seven points apiece.

And while a two-week break from games will be nice, Mueller said his team has a lot of work to do when the Huskies return to the court after the TIC-mandated dead week ends next Wednesday.

That's because Nashua-Plainfield's 2024 schedule is

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

Nashua-Plainfield steps out of rugged Top of Iowa East to blow out Tripoli, 76-39

Nashua-Plainfield boys basketball coach Matt Mueller will be the first to admit that the level of competition for his Huskies considerably Tuesday night.

The Huskies stepped out of the rugged Top of Iowa Conference East Division to close out their 2023 portion of the schedule against a Tripoli squad that came into the non-conference winless in its first seven games.

But a win is a win, especially for a young team like the Huskies, who clicked on all cylinders in rolling to a 76-39 victory to snap a five-game losing streak and head into the Christmas break on a proverbial high note.

"We needed a night like that," Mueller said after his team improved to 2-5. "If you look at us, we're playing a lot of sophomores, and right now, athletically, we're playing teams where at times

If indeed this was the last game of the year for the N-P six-foot, junior center – she picked the right opponent to muster up a career high against.

Glaser pumped in a career-best 23 points to go along with nine rebounds to highlight an inspired performance by Josh Smith's Nashua's Plainfield Huskies against the Green Devils of Osage last Friday night at home.

Even in loss – and despite a late 27-2 Green Devils' run that produced an Osage 59-42 victory – the Huskies can hang their hat on a gutsy and game performance in the Top of Iowa East tussle.

Glaser played remarkable and poured in 10 buckets down low on 16 tries. That was one of the reasons Nashua-Plainfield stuck with Osage – despite missing three starters due to injury and the Huskies' leading scorer battling sickness.

"Josslynn played unbelievably," said Smith.

If there was a M*A*S*H unit on Friday – it was definitely these Huskies, which dressed just nine players due to injury.

Glaser will soon be added to that list.

You won't see Glaser on the sideline this season at N-P games sporting pompoms. But she may well play the role of cheerleader the rest of the way for her Huskies this winter after having surgery on an ankle that has bothered her this season.
