## City Council receives EMS update

Nashua Area EMS director, councilman say ambulance has 'awesome group of people'

Nashua Area EMS Director Zenda Viktorek, along with the help of a whole host of volunteers and first responders, has put in countless hours to get an ambulance service up and running in the town of 1,500 that rests on the shoreline of Cedar

Lake in northeast Iowa.

So at Monday's regular Nashua City Council meeting she gave an update on the progress of the ambulance service that has been almost a year in the making.

With that excitement of providing life-saving care for people within the Nashua City limits that need it – has come tons of paperwork and

some headaches along the way.

But Viktorek and her crew have pushed through and made Nashua's volunteer EMS a reality.

"We had stock in Tylenol," joked Viktorek.

The Council officially approved the billing rates, a billing service agreement with PCC (an ambulance billing service out of West Bend,

Iowa) and several mutual-aid agreements with various EMS operators in the area that Nashua Area EMS will partner up with.

"We appreciate everything you do. It's amazing," said Nashua City Clerk John Ott.

## Three more cities ask supervisors for county ARPA funds

Board comes under fire for helping Nashua with dam; Cerwinske defends the decision

A week after the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors indicated that it will follow through on using \$50,000 of its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to help the city of Nashua with dam issues, three more Chickasaw County cities on Monday asked the Board of Supervisors to share some of the county's federal dollars.

Board members agreed to table the requests but only after a relatively lengthy discussion not only about the requests but also the dam project in Nashua.

North Washington and Lawler both made formal requests for \$50,000 of the county's ARPA funds while Ionia asked the county for \$30,000.

North Washington Mayor David Geerts, who attended Monday's meeting, said his city would use the funds to seal coat streets and told supervisors that the city's budget has been "depleted" after buying a water tank for the city, along with the added expenses of providing emergency medical services.

Lawler and Ionia, meanwhile, both made written requests to the county and although neither city had a representative at Monday's meeting, Lawler's letter stated that it would use the funds to help fund improvements to city bridges and city streets while Ionia wants the money so that it can continue to make improvements to its city parks.

Geerts brought up both the dam and Nashua's new ambulance service and asked two questions of supervisors.

"Who owns the Nashua dam, the Nashua lake and the generator? I would think that would be known before you give money away," he asked before diving into the EMS question.

Nashua last year decided not to sign a 28E agreement to be part of the county-owned Chickasaw County EMS ambulance service and instead struck out on its own and Nashua Area EMS went into service on July 1.

"Second question, have you signed a mutual aid agreement with the city of Nashua?," Geerts asked and pointed out if the county has, "then

# Nashua couple helps preserve firefighters' legacy

Everyone driving by the Nashua Fire Station last Friday probably had the same question — who in the heck is that masked man? Well, that man was Lee Kennedy of the Lewiston Monument Company, and he was in town to at least in a way chronicle the history of the Nashua Fire Department. "Every year, we have someone from Lewiston come down and etch the names of the new retirees," longtime Nashua resident Doug Strike said. "It's important to remember the people who have served as firefighters; they give up a lot to make sure we stay safe." A number of years ago, Strike and his

wife, Carol, donated the sign that includes the names of the firefighters and also donate the costs of the names that are added on an almost annual basis. Lewiston Monument is based in the southeastern town of Minnesota that is located about a little less than 40 miles east of Rochester, and it serves customers in Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin. The Strikes have served as area representatives of the company for years, and Doug Strike said one reason they have remained with Lewiston Monument for so long is the family-like atmosphere the company has. "They've been owned by the same family all of those years," he said, "and they put their customers and their needs above everything else."

He said etching the names on the sign that hangs inside the station is not a simple process. "Put it this way, they can't just show up, go to the wall and start etching," he said. "We have to take the sign down, get it outside and then they go to work. And when you see them working on it, trust me, they're all decked out." And Strike had the picture to prove it. The names etched this year included Charlie Westervelwt (21 years of service), Joel Betsinger (18), Jeremy Bilharz (10) and Tony Civarelli (10). "Hopefully, everyone appreciates the names on the whole sign," Strike said. "The volunteers answer calls at all times of the day and night and they never know what they're going to be dealing with, but they go anyway and that means a lot to us."

they are getting the same service the rest of the towns in the county are receiving without paying their fair share. It seems to me they are getting everything the rest of the towns are without paying anything, and there's no guarantee as to how many hours a week they will be in service."

Cerwinske said, "but I would say at the end of the day, the city of Nashua is going to fix that dam — whether they own it or not. I believe the property values that lie in the county along that lake and in the city are well worth the \$50,000. ... There are numerous people outside the Nashua area that use that lake that are Chickasaw County [residents]."

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn, referencing a six-month mutual aid agreement the county has signed with Nashua Area EMS, said that the deal represents "a trial to see how it works."

County Assessor Ray Armel said he had done research on the dam's ownership and said that the documents he has been able to locate are "up for interpretation."

It was the county's contribution to the dam project, however, that took center stage for much of the discussion. Nashua spent about \$1.2 million on a dam repair project in 2020, but issues have arisen since the project was completed.

In Ionia's request, meanwhile, city officials sounded much like Cerwinske when they pointed out that out-of-town residents use the city's park. They wrote that the New Hampton Parks and Recreation Department, for example, uses the Ionia ballfield for youth baseball and softball games and that events like family and celebrations mean "many people from other communities are visiting our park."

Earlier this year, Nashua Mayor Alex Anthofer approached the Board of Supervisors and requested that the county help the city with engineering costs and board members agreed to use \$50,000 of the interest its ARPA funds have earned to help the city.

Supervisors have a public hearing set for 9:10 a.m. this coming Monday to consider a budget amendment to the county's 2023-24 budget. That amendment includes the funds for Nashua, but does not include the requests from North Washington, Lawler and Ionia. If those funds are eventually OK'd by county leaders, they would need to be part of a future budget amendment.

Supervisor Scott Cerwinske, whose district includes Nashua, stood by the board's decision, even though he conceded on Monday that who actually owns the dam remains up in the air.

"I believe there's some question on whether or not some paperwork was filed properly to determine who actually owns the dam at this time,"

### Park Board exploring ways to have more events at bandshell

Those mutual-aid agreements were signed on the dotted line earlier this month and include Chickasaw County EMS, Waverly Health Center Ambulance Department, AMR Ambulance (Charles City, Floyd County) and Plainfield First Responders. Vikturek said there is also a possible mutual-aid agreement that will be signed off on with Bradford Township (areas near Nashua out by the Little Brown Church and south of town). "It's nice to be back together again," said Vikturek. Jake Johnson, the newest member of the Nashua City Council and a member of Nashua's Volunteer Fire Department, made it clear what the overall intent is for the Nashua ambulance service moving forward. "I wanted to just make sure that you guys know ... we're not here to make money. Money's great, but we want to provide the service first," said Johnson. "If we can keep it afloat, perfect." The startup ambulance service has hit a few bumps in the road according to Vikturek in trying to get off the ground — but it's been a relatively smooth process to get the ball rolling and help save lives. Johnson agreed.

"We've got an awesome group of people. We've had a couple trainings with them and they are very engaged. They do a very good job," said Johnson. Vikturek described her brand new EMS's first call — which took place earlier this month. If that initial response by the Nashua Area EMS to that call is any indication on how the service could run — it bodes well for the small, yet dedicated contingent of EMT's, paramedics and firemen — and most importantly, the citizens of Nashua. "The first call — every single person was there," said Vikturek. "The lady's like, 'there's so many people.' We said, 'you're our first official call,' and she goes whoopee. She's 92-years-old. She thought that was kind of cool. She's fine. She came back home." Nashua Mayor Alex Anthofer let the Council know that he has submitted a request to the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors for \$50,000 in aid to help with repair work on Nashua's hydro dam. He said he will be present at this coming Monday's supervisors' meeting when the board holds a public hearing on the budget amendment that includes the money for the dam project. Ashley Ludemann, a member of Nashua's Park Board, informed the Council that the newly-constructed Baldwin Bandshell

could possibly have many fun and exciting events planned in the near future for the rest of 2023. Members of the Park Board are considering renting out the bandshell, she said. "We have a lot of ideas that we are working on to utilize the bandshell more frequently," said Ludemann. One such suggestion that came up was to have a "Nashua's Got Talent" at the bandshell, where contestants can sign up to either play an instrument, sing or do a trick, etc. Ludemann also said that local bands, singers or songwriters could also perform at the bandshell. "There would be a lot of calendars that we would need to correspond with that," said Ludemann. "Once we get that more set in stone and figure out what we want to utilize it for, then we will proceed with renting it out and coming up with a price." Ludemann also stated that an area of land in front of the bandshell could also be leveled out and built into a dance floor. "We still have lots of finishing touches and ideas of utilizing it," said Ludemann. The Baldwin Bandshell was donated by the Baldwin Family and was used at last month's Water Over the Dam Days. And finally, the City Council approved the retirement of longtime city worker Dan Zwanziger.

### Area farm fields get some much-needed rain

Even though the U.S. Drought Monitor's Iowa map remains "ugly," its "looks" improved Thursday afternoon when the weekly report was released. Gone is the big "blotch" hovering over Chickasaw and Bremer counties that showed much of the area dealing with "severe drought" conditions. Granted, we're still enduring "moderate drought," according to the weekly report, but thanks to last week's rainfall — Nashua received precipitation

five straight days, beginning Tuesday, July 11 — the situation is improving. The rainfall in Chickasaw County over the five-day period ranged from around 2 inches in the Nashua area to 3.49 inches in New Hampton. That rainfall also led to improvement in the latest USDA Iowa Crop and Condition report that was released on Monday. Just 3 percent of farmland in Iowa's Northeast District, which includes Chickasaw and Bremer counties, was "very short" of topsoil moisture while

34 percent remained "short." Two weeks ago, the USDA report showed that 11 percent was "very short" and 46 percent was "short." This week's report showed that 37 percent of subsoil moisture was "very short" or "short," down from 59 percent just before the Fourth of July holiday. Iowa, though, remains dry; in fact, all 99 counties according to the Drought Monitor, are either "abnormally dry" or are experiencing some kind of drought conditions. Parts of southeast Iowa and

### Grants open to those who provide food, shelter

Agencies providing emergency food and shelter programs in Chickasaw County can apply for federal funds to assist their efforts.

The county has been awarded \$5,561 through the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency under the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program.

A local board will determine how the funds, appropriated by Congress, are to be distributed among emergency food and shelter program run by local service agencies in the area.

Eligible local service agencies must be private voluntary nonprofits or units of government eligible to receive federal funds; have an accounting system and practice non-discrimination; have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food or shelter programs; and have a voluntary board if they are a private voluntary organization.

Agencies interested in applying for EFSP funds should contact Sheri Alldredge, Iowa Northland Regional Council of Governments, at (319) 235-0311 for an application.

Applications must be received by August 4, 2023.

Mayor Anthofer asked for consideration approving the regular agenda. Willsher/M, Kelleher/S, M/C to approve the regular agenda after removing item (6) Val Johnson insurance provider discussing health insurance continuation after retirement and 8 setting public hearing vacating Woodbridge St. RC: all ayes.

Mayor Anthofer called for a motion to approve the consent agenda: Minutes from the Special Council Meeting June 27, 2023; Building Permits: 514 Cedar St., 59 Monroe, and 104 Bradford Parkway; Payment of Claims (see claims report); Total Claims to be Paid \$60,253.19 + Wages \$8,683.89. Mayor Anthofer asked if anyone had any public comments. There were none.

Mayor Anthofer asked Attorney Skilton to lead the discussion on a hearing regarding a dangerous animal. Skilton informed the council that the owner of the dog had stated that they were going to put the dog down after its quarantine period and if that were still the case there no further discussion were needed. The dog owner explained to the council that they have decided that they no longer feel that putting the dog down was what they wanted to do and they were asking the council to please allow them to keep the dog. He stated that they would cooperate in any way that that meant supervising the dog when it went outside, keeping it on a leash, etc. After listening to the resident who stated that they felt horrible about the situation and in no way want people to not feel safe in the neighborhood, decided that they would allow the owner to keep the dog. # County will move ahead with purchasing building for EMS

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors want to move ahead with finalizing the purchase of a building that will permanently house the Chickasaw County EMS, despite an offer from the building's current owner to delay the sale so that he could put the living quarters for ambulance personnel into the building before the county takes ownership.

Supervisors, though, were lukewarm to the offer, especially after County Attorney David Laudner told the board it would be walking a legal tightrope on some of the language that might be included in a new purchase agreement.

Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson said the idea of having the building's living quarters ready for the county came up recently during a conversation with Jeremy McGrath, who along with his wife Lacey, own the building at 204 E. Prospect St. that the county has agreed to purchase for \$350,000.

The county is expecting the sale to be finalized by Aug. 1, and the city of New Hampton has already agreed to let the county out of its lease for the two Police Department garage spaces

and then pay extra," he said. "That's very clear in the law."

The issue with collecting donations is that it may take months before a non-profit organization – a "Friends of Chickasaw County EMS" – can be formed, and Board Chairman Matt Kuhn wondered if the board would be setting a precedent.

"Are we going to start asking every other department to come up with donated funds," Kuhn asked his fellow board members. "Why do we single out one department?"

But Supervisor Scott Cerwinski said supervisors only began thinking about using private donations after Knutson brought the idea to the table.

"I don't think we've necessarily singled out this department," he said. "I think this department said way back when that they could get donations."

Supervisor Steve Breitbach said he was in favor of using the county's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to build the living quarters in the East Prospect building.

"I think there's some money out there that could be donated," Breitbach said, "but it's going to push this project back so far that I think we want to get that building done

sooner."

Supervisor Jake Hackman, too, was in favor of taking possession of McGrath's building sooner rather than later, although he also didn't commit to spending ARPA dollars for the living quarters.

"To stop the purchase agreement that we all agreed to, and now that this is happening, what are we telling the people of this county? I don't think we can wait for the association to get started," he said. "We need to get the staff where the trucks are. I just think we should just move forward with the purchase agreement that we both agreed [upon] and get the building bought."

The biggest hangup, it appeared from Monday's meeting, was a price quote the county has received from an architect that is also helping the county with cost estimates on remodeling parts of the Heritage Building Center.

The architect is charging the county a little more than \$10,000 for the work at the Heritage but has quoted the county a price of \$35,500 for the work at the East Prospect building.

"Do they really understand what we're looking for," Hackman said. "I think we need to go back to them and see why there's such a big difference."

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

And the show, a rite of July here in our little corner of the world, had plenty to proclaim Saturday.


There were awards to hand out, Clover Kids to graduate,

# Celebrities help support county's 4-H programs

Goddard's response to Krug's query was to playfully plead the Fifth.

"I said the heifer's name was Beth Dutton. He asked what Beth Dutton likes to do in her free time and I utilized the right to remain silent," smiled Goddard.

It's those witty back-and-forth moments that highlighted the celebrity beef show. Those light-hearted moments also provided spectators in attendance a few laughs as well as showcased some pretty prime, Grade A beef that entered the show arena.

Think ribeye, sirloin or filet mignon — medium rare, of course.

"It's more for the crowd. It's fun just to make it comical a little bit," said Megan Bierschenk, who advanced to the finals of the celebrity show with her heifer named "Blackstone" — named after one of the best-selling outdoor cooking grills on the market.

All entrants were sponsored for \$100 by businesses or organizations like Chickasaw County Youth Development, Bank Iowa, Little Wapsie Legends or the Fredericksburg Futures — to name a few.

This year's celebrity show was beef. In prior years it's been swine, sheep or horses. This was the fifth year the celebrity show has taken place. Last year's proceeds from the sheep showmanship competition bought valuable equipment for 4-H and FFA members to utilize.

"The sheep one was awesome last year," said Bierschenk, who along with her husband, T.J., helps run Bierschenk Club Lambs. She's an N-P grad and is currently a grain merchandiser manager for POET — a bioprocessing plant in Shell Rock.

There was \$2,300 raised last year courtesy of the celebrity show and that bought a new scale for the sheep and pigs to be weighed on this summer.

"It's a good fundraiser for the 4-H program," said Goddard, a Sumner-Fredericksburg High School grad, who also advanced to the final round with her show heifer — of which there were nine finalists.

Megan, Jada and another celebrity handler — Mary Wards — all grew up together showing animals in FFA and 4-H. Those aforementioned supporters of those agriculture organizations, which help instill many positive attributes in youth growing up, all graduated high school in 2009.

"We have a lot of youth, but you don't have to be a farm kid to be involved in this," said Jada Goddard. "We have some of the best producers in the world that are willing to help city kids out. This is all for the kids."

The achievement livestock shows often pit familiar faces and families against one another to see who can reel in the most blue or purple ribbons.

"We used to show here. Now all our kids are showing here," said Megan Bierschenk.

The winner of the celebrity show this year was its elder statesman — Garth Griffin, aka "Garth Brooks." The judge gave him that name, by the way. His heifer — "Top Gun" — bested the other 15 cattle vying for first-place honors. Griffin owns and operates Griffin Red Angus Farm in New Hampton and raised "Top Gun."

"I told Will Maurer, three guys and all these girls — it's just a funeral. The girls were our pall bearers," said Griffin jokingly about alluding to the fact that he was older than all of the celebrity handlers.

Griffin was gracious in accepting the judge's decision — which selected his cow as top heifer.

"It was definitely my skills," he laughed. "It was a thrill and an honor."

The celebrity show's runner-up — Craig Kolthoff with his heifer "Phyllis" — offered another take on getting older and still being involved in shows like this one so future generations can benefit from the rewards of grooming and taking care of livestock.

"He's just "seasoned," said Kolthoff, a 2003 New Hampton

High School grad who works at P&K Midwest, a John Deere dealership in nearby Sumner.

Kolthoff also cut to the chase when it comes to how the Big 4 Fair Board is attempting to expand the structures on site to house the animals. The goal is to keep the fair's buildings modern and up to date so it can handle all the livestock that make its way to the fairgrounds every year.

"The fair board has been very proactive to where it's not letting this fairgrounds go," said Kolthoff. "We show quite a bit and we've been to plenty of fairgrounds that you can tell when there's a fair board that gets after it. That is building buildings, that is fundraising and is giving back to their communities. When you give back to the community, the community gives to them."

To give you an idea as to the participation numbers for Chickasaw County and its FFA and 4-H programs — they're running out of room according to Megan Bierschenk.

"This barn is so full, we can't fit any more pins in here. We're at max capacity," said Bierschenk.

That's why the fair board and others have hatched a five-year plan to build two new buildings on the property owned by the county. That proposed idea would build a brand new 4,800 square foot open-air show ring and a 12,000 square foot beef barn.

"The fair board has to be commended on where they've gone with this. There was a point in time where they could easily just said, you know what, use the buildings we got and it will be what it will be," said Kolthoff. "There was a handful of them that just absolutely refused to allow that to happen."

Kolthoff said he grew up at this county



fair. He mentioned the numbers as far as participation are concerned have gotten bigger every year — whether that's at the achievement shows in the summer or the actual fair in the fall.

"Getting to show at this one was kind of fun," said Kolthoff. "The kids thought I needed to, so."

While participation numbers might be dwindling at other county fairgrounds across the state, Chickasaw County remains strong.

"I think we're lucky here in this area, it's really growing and it's become stronger," said Griffin. "It's generation after generation. We're still against you and you're still against me. It's a friendly competition."

Asked for the meaning behind Kolthoff's heifer name — "Phyllis" — and he said that it's her registered name. He then added this well-intentioned barb to finish off his sentence.

"Her barn name is something else, but you probably shouldn't put that in any paper," laughed Kolthoff.

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# Four Huskies are named to 1A all-district squads

Nashua-Plainfield's big season on the baseball diamond continued to reap rewards as four Huskies have been named to all-district teams.

The Iowa Baseball Coaches Association placed three Huskies — senior Bo Harrington, sophomore Dawson Glaser and freshman Eli Kalainoff — to the Central District's first team. Junior Tucker Franzen was named to the second team.

Nashua-Plainfield finished the season with a 17-8 record and finished second in the Top of Iowa Conference's East Division with a mark of 12-4.

Harrington was selected as a shortstop after a year in which he posted a .462 bat-

ting average. The multi-sport star had a team-high nine doubles and four triples and led the Huskies with 31 RBIs. In the field, he made just four errors and had a fielding percentage of .947, which is outstanding for a shortstop. And on the mound, he posted a 2.72 earned-run average, striking out 60 in 36 innings of work.

Glaser, a utility selection, had a 7-1 pitching record with a 1.91 earned-run average, and when he wasn't on the mound, he was one of the top catchers in the area. He also wielded a potent bat, posting a .385

average, tying for the team lead in doubles with nine and driving in 28 runs.

Kalainoff, the lone freshman on the team, was selected as an outfielder after batting .388 and leading the Huskies in both runs (28) and home runs (4). He also had a solid season on the mound, going 2-2 and posting a 3.23 earned run average.

Franzen was selected to the second team as a pitcher as he went 5-1 with a 3.23 ERA. He also had a solid year at the plate, hitting .284.
