'THE DAY IS FOR THE FALLEN'

NASHUA VETERANS GET AN ASSIST FROM NATIONAL HISTORY DAY CHAMPION AS THEY MARK MEMORIAL DAY

Talk to a veteran – they won't be here forever.

Perhaps the greatest history lesson one could ever learn from is that of a living, breathing soldier.

Their story is one that must be listened to – and told.

And even when they're gone, remember the path they helped pave for freedom.

That was the message many veterans and a member of America's youngest generation made sure happen on Monday in Nashua.

The town of 1,500 that rests on Cedar Lake honored those Americans. Almost 650,000 United States military members have paid

the ultimate price for our country – with their lives.

"We see you. We will always remember you and we honor you," said Nashua-Plainfield sophomore Caleb Sinnwell.

Sinnwell – a National History Day two-time national champ – spoke at one of the three Memorial Day ceremonies in Nashua – the last taking place late Monday morning at Oak Hill Cemetery.

There, birds chirped on a bright and sunny day, trumpets sounded and the band played on.

"The day is for the fallen – Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, even the Coast Guard," said Nashua's Dan

N-P golfer puts rough start behind her, takes fourth at 1A state tournament

From 10-over after four holes to all-state run, Franzen already aiming higher in '24

If the "old" Paige Franzen had taken the links last Thursday at Boone's Cedar Pointe Golf Course, it would be anyone's guess what she would have shot in the first round of the Class 1A state tournament.

The Nashua-Plainfield sophomore had opened the tournament

with three double bogeys and one quadruple bogey, but the biggest improvement in Franzen's game this season has been an intangible – let bygones be bygones.

And she promptly strung together five straight pars, setting her on the path that would give her a fourth-place finish in the individual standings.

Supervisors vote 3-2 to OK 'option' to buy property to house EMS

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors took a big step toward finding a potential home base for its EMS (emergency medical services) on Tuesday.

The board voted to approve an option to purchase real estate in New Hampton that could house the Chickasaw County EMS, as well as two ambulances.

The vote, however, was far from unanimous.

The Board voted 3-2 to have Chickasaw County Attorney David Laudner prepare an option to purchase agreement for property at 259 E. Prospect St. in New Hampton.

That building is owned by Thronson and Thronson Inc. and would be at a cost of \$250,000. In that drawn-up agreement by Laudner, the county would have 30 days to determine whether or not they wanted to move forward with the contract to buy the structure that could house its county-run EMS.

"I just want to make sure we're

clear what we're doing here. So you're directing me to prepare an option to purchase this real estate in 30 days," said Laudner. "You're not committed to buying it. You're just basically saying we want 30 days to review the potential purchase of the property. We want you to hold on to it for at least 30 days. Again, he does not have to sign this. They can tell you they don't want to enter into an option with you."

Board member Steve Breitbach made a motion to move forward with the option-to-buy agreement for the property. His motion was seconded by

Scott Cerwinski. Breitbach, Cerwinski and Board Chair Matthew Kuhn voted yes to approve the motion. Board members Travis Suckow and Jacob Hackman were the dissenting votes.

Prior to the vote, the Board went into closed session to discuss the purchase of the property.

The County wants to use that 30-day window to be able to raise \$30,000 that would go toward the cost of the real estate in New Hampton.

Laudner made it clear to all members of the board what that fundraising effort in the allotted 30 days meant

toward the overall purchase of the property if that donated money failed to reach that proposed goal.

"So, if you do not raise that money in the next 30 days, you can still go forward," said Laudner. "Or if you don't raise the money in 30 days, you can say you don't want to actually make an offer. So it gives you the flexibility to make the offer. It's not conditioned upon you raising the money."

Kuhn then explained what the actual cost of the property would be should

VFW makes pitch for new members

Bilharz. "The Coast Guard played a big role in Vietnam."

Bilharz is Nashua's VFW Post 6792 Quartermaster and served in Vietnam from 1971 until 1973 while in the Army.

The sad reality is that U.S. Veterans are passing away at an alarming rate. That's affected his VFW's membership in Nashua.

"We have four people that come to meetings," said Bilharz. "We're down to 40 members. We were up to 75 two years ago."

As time continue to pass, memories often fade.

That makes it all the more important to never forget the commitment made by veterans in wartime and they cost they encountered.

"I definitely think that there's people out there now that do understand, but I almost guarantee that there's a lot that don't understand and don't know the sacrifice that these men gave for freedom," said Sinnwell. "Every day, I'm sure, people take this for granted – not even knowing it."

Sinnwell said his great grandpa fought in World II, his great, great grandpa served in World I. He also mentioned his ancestors on the Sinnwell side of his family fought in the American Revolutionary and U.S. Civil Wars.

His military bloodline is obviously strong.

"I learned the importance of veterans at a very young age," said Sinnwell.

Sinnwell mentioned his grandfather, who fought in Vietnam, and informed the audience in attendance at Oak Hill what he now understands much better.

He thought he knew, but he really didn't.

"As a boy I often dressed as a soldier, decked out head-to-toe in military clothing," said Sinnwell. "In my mind, I thought I understood what it meant to be one of them."

Then he started to volunteer for his local VFW, where he placed flags on the graves of fallen soldiers. It started to make sense for him what selfless sacrifice meant for his country.

"I later learned their significance is much more than meets the eye," said Sinnwell.

Sinnwell will make his first trip ever to Washington, D.C. – specifically the University of Maryland – to attend the National History Day presentation in person later this month. The campus of the University of Maryland is 12 miles away from the nation's capital – where he'll also visit monuments at

the National Mall, walk through Arlington Cemetery and watch the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

For many – including Sinnwell – it's the experience of a lifetime to come face-to-face with America's storied military past and walk on hallowed ground.

"Each and every name has a place in the life they left behind," said Sinnwell about the names inscribed on monuments that comprise the National Mall.

On Monday, the Nashua-Plainfield Band performed at Veterans Park at 10 a.m. Then a ceremony was held at Oak Hill Cemetery. Earlier that day, folks gathered at Riverton Cemetery to recite the "Pledge of Allegiance." Wreaths were also placed near gravesites. One was also placed in the water at Veterans Park near Nashua's Hydro Dam.

The local American Legion and Auxiliary also took part in each of the ceremonies, which featured a 21-Gun Salute and Echo Taps being played by N-P students. Area Boy Scouts placed a wreath underneath a tomb at Oak Hill, as did Bilharz and a few others.

"Caleb does a good job. I think it went real well. Every year it goes good. If somebody goofed up, we don't care," smiled Bilharz. "It's just a matter of having us all here."

Leland Lumley, Commander of the Nashua VFW, served in the Navy from 1963 until 1967 and also fought in Vietnam. He spoke to the crowds gathered at Veterans Park and Oak Hill. He relayed his heartfelt message about his fallen comrades that are no longer with him.

"Young people gotta step up and ensure that this doesn't happen – that this land is never invaded," said Lumley.

It's Sinnwell's generation and those that have come before them that have continued to keep the legacy strong of military members that have perished over the course of hundreds of years in the United States.

That may be Sinnwell's greatest worry – that Americans won't remember the valor and distinction of serving one's country in battle, then dying for the cause they believed in.

"Those people – they gave a whole lot for this country and as the generations begin to fade away, unfortunately, it does happen," Sinnwell said.

Sinnwell's most important question on Monday was "what would our lives be like without veterans?" said Sinnwell.


Maybe the best solution is to ask a veteran and find out.

Cresco man drowns at Chickasaw County campground

Multiple agencies spend more than four hours Monday at Airport Lake searching for the body

The Memorial Day weekend turned tragic Monday afternoon when a Cresco man died from drowning at Airport Lake Park.

According to a press release from Chickasaw County Sheriff Ryan Shawver, divers from Iowa Search and Rescue recovered the body of Alvaro Vldiva Barranco, age 52, from the lake just before 6 p.m. at the popular Chickasaw County Conservation Board Park located northwest of New Hampton.

The press release stated that the Chickasaw County Medical Examiner's Office "determined the cause of death to be consistent with a fresh-water drowning" but added that the medical examiner has requested a full autopsy be conducted by the State of Iowa Medical Examiner.

Authorities were called to Airport Lake at 1:40 p.m. and were told that a male had reportedly gone under water and did not surface in the lake that is the centerpiece of the 57-acre park.

"Our 911 call came in just before 1:40 p.m. stating that there was a male that had been under the water for a minute at that point. So they got resources paged," said

Bridget Edson, public information spokesperson for Chickasaw County EMS.

A witness to the incident – Larry Reams – was actually one of several individuals that tried to save the drowning victim.

"His arms went up in the air, then he went under. Then he came back up and a kayak was almost there and then she lost him," said Reams. "We were out there searching for a good 20 minutes on kayaks. We had like 10 of us out there."

Reams said the group the drowning victim was with did not speak English and that two males from that party had tried to swim the length of the lake. Edson said the current water temperature of the lake near New Hampton's airport is 70 degrees.

"From what I heard he swam across there once and then he was going to do it again. Then he didn't make it back a second time," said Reams. "There were two of them. The other one about drowned, too. Another lady with a kayak took a life jacket out to him."

This is the second drowning victim in the last three days in the state of Iowa as a Johnston man was reported to have drowned Saturday night at Lake Red Rock near the southern Iowa towns of Pella and

Knoxville, according to the Marion County Sheriff's Office.

"It's just kind of that time of the year that these things start firing up," Edson said. "It's unfortunate. We just ask that people are just very mindful and aware of their surroundings. People need to wear life jackets and take care of each other."

Edson said the lake's depth is about eight feet, but that can be deceiving.

"I think it drops off pretty quick and that can surprise people," added Edson.

Shawver's press release stated that "there is no foul play suspected and the death is ruled as accidental at this time."

A number of agencies were on the scene Monday afternoon, and they included the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Office Iowa Underwater Search and Rescue (out of Mason City), Iowa DNR officers, Chickasaw County Medical Examiner, Chickasaw County EMA, Chickasaw County EMS, Chickasaw County Rescue Squad, New Hampton Fire Department, Ionia Fire Department, Chickasaw County Conservation, New Hampton Police Department and the Hugback-Johnson Funeral Home.



U.S. Drought Monitor June 1 Report

Drought in Iowa

Area farmers could use a little rain

Drought situation worsens in Nashua area, but this week's rainfall proves to be spotty at best

It isn't necessarily time to panic, but then again, our farmers could use a "time-ly" rain soon.

"I'd say the guys are a little worried," ISU Extension Agronomist Terry Basol said, "especially the ones that planted later because we haven't had much rain. It's not dire by any means, but at the same time, just look at our lawns. Some of them look like it's more mid-summer than late May."

In the Nashua area, the last half of May was, in a word, dry.

Yes, it rained a little Wednesday evening, but the key word is "little" as .06 inches of rain fell on Nashua. And Thursday saw a few isolated — emphasis on isolated — showers in the area.

That was the first measurable precipitation the area had received in 12 days, but since three-quarters of an inch of rain was recorded on May 14, Nashua received barely a tenth of an inch of rainfall since. The

latest USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service's Crop Progress and Condition Report, which was released on Tuesday, showed the lack of rain has started to affect soil moistures.

In the North Central District that includes Floyd and Butler counties, 30 percent of topsoil moisture and 27 percent of subsoil moisture are either "short" or "very short."

In the Northeast District that includes Chickasaw and Bremer counties, 36 percent of topsoil moisture and 25 per-

cent of subsoil moisture is either "short" or "very short."

As recently as three weeks ago, those numbers were less than 10 percent.

It marks the second straight month that Chickasaw County has been "dry" for in April, New Hampton received 2.38 inches of precipitation, almost two inches less than normal.

In April, the Nashua reporting station recorded 1.85 inches of precipitation, less than half of the normal 3.79 inches that usually falls in April.

But the forecast doesn't offer a lot of hope, unless, of course, we get the scattered thunderstorms that are in the forecast for today (Friday) or Monday to actually have their rainfall hit our area.

Still, Basol is hopeful that rain will fall soon.

"It would definitely give soybeans and corn a nice shot in the arm if we got some rain," Basol said. "We know it's a long season, but it would be nice to get those crops off to a good start."

Floyd commission to recommend signing deal with AMR

The Floyd County Ambulance Commission will recommend that the Charles City Council and the county Board of Supervisors approve a new three-year contract with AMR for ambulance service throughout the county.

What isn't known yet is whether Nashua will be part of that contract.

The commission at its meeting this week voted to recommend approving one of two different contracts. The first splits the annual cost to subsidize AMR service three ways, with Charles City and Floyd County each paying 45% of the cost and Nashua paying 10%.

The other version splits the cost between Charles City and Floyd County, 50-50.

The Floyd County Medical Center Board of Trustees has already agreed to pay \$100,000 toward the first year

subsidy, reducing the other parties' costs, but the trustees have not committed to additional years.

Regardless of how it is funded, the subsidy cost for the first year of the new contract with AMR would be \$415,000, more than double the \$200,000 subsidy cost in the third year of the current three-year contract that ends June 30. Years two and three of the new contract would see that cost increase by 3% each year, to \$427,450 in year two and 440,273.50 in year three.

Splitting the remaining \$315,000 for the first year 45-45-10 would mean total payments of \$141,750 each for Charles City and the county, and \$31,500 for Nashua.

If Charles City and the county have to split the total subsidy between themselves the cost would be \$157,500 each, plus the \$100,000 from the medical center.

John Ott, the Nashua city clerk, was at the county Ambulance Commission

meeting Tuesday evening, and said the Nashua City Council had not yet decided whether to be a party to the new AMR contract.

Nashua is in the process of forming its own ambulance service, but it could require additional support from area ambulance services such as AMR or Chickasaw County EMS.

Ott said the Nashua council is still weighing the difference between signing the AMR contact and calling other ambulance services under mutual aid agreements when needed.

"Once we have our own service we have no idea how much other services will be needed," he said, adding that finding people to staff the Nashua service during weekdays will likely be the most difficult.

Charles City Police Chief Hugh Anderson, a member of the Ambulance Commission, said that sounded like the Nashua council was looking for a way to get additional service without having to pay for it.

Charles City Administrator Steve Diers, an advisor to the commission, said it would be nice if the commission could decide that night to make a recommendation to the City Council and Board of Supervisors, because the current contract will expire at the end of June.

Dawn Staudt, station supervisor for AMR, said there have been probably 20 to 30 calls into Nashua since the first of January, when a six-month agreement began where Nashua paid \$5,000 each (\$10,000 total) to Charles City and Floyd County to be included in AMR service.

When asked where those patients were transported, Staudt said many of them requested to go to Waverly because that's where they usually get medical care.

County Supervisor Jim Jorgensen, the chair of the commission, asked why people would be transported to Waverly when the Floyd County Medical Center was offering to chip

in \$100,000 toward the Floyd County ambulance service cost.

Dawnett Willis is the CEO of the medical center and a member of the Ambulance Commission, and she commented, "I was wondering the same thing."

Staudt said the state guideline is that patients be transported to the closest facility with the appropriate level of care.

Patients can request to go somewhere else, but they are told that if it's farther than some other appropriate facility then their insurance will not cover the cost of the extra mileage, which can be significant.

In the end the commission voted to recommend both contracts to the Charles City Council and Floyd County Board of Supervisors, with those bodies signing whichever contract is appropriate based on whether Nashua wants to be part of it or not.

"Nashua needs to make a decision," said Diers.





"We're positive, when we're enthusiastic, when we're playing focused and we're just enjoying ourselves – that's the key," said Miller. "On Friday we focused too much on who we were playing."

The Top of Iowa Conference clash with St. Ansgar (5-3, 2-2) started out well for the Huskies as they plated two runs in the first frame.

"We had a lot of things go right, but our kids earned it," said Miller. "I'm incredibly proud of how they responded from a tough defeat. That's what this team's all about."

Glaser's RBI smash of a single to left scored leadoff man Eli Kalainoff for the game's first run. Tucker Franzen made it 2-0 in the same frame after he scored on a wild pitch.

What's Glaser's status for the rest of the week? He said there should be no worries on that injury front and he's ready to suit up to help get the Huskies another victory.

"I'm doing fine. Coach asked if I was going to play tomorrow, and I said don't even worry about it," said Glaser.

Kalainoff, N-P's freshman centerfielder, ripped an RBI double into the left-field corner to plate N-P's final run in the fifth inning.

N-P took on Belmond-Klemme at home on Wednesday and finishes the week in Nashua against Osage tonight (Friday).

N-P sits in second place in the league with a 4-1 record – a half game ahead of Osage (5-3, 3-1) according to the TIC East standings as of Thursday afternoon.

Don't tell Miller that.

"We're telling them not to focus on the record – don't focus on the results. Focus on each inning, focus on each day – just go compete and we'll be good," said Miller.

For Nelson and Sinnwell, the state tournament was a reminder of how far a team can go in just two years. In 2021, they represented two-thirds of the Huskies' girls golf program, which means Nashua-Plainfield couldn't record a team score at any of their meets.

"Autumn was a freshman when we lost the [2020] season to COVID," Trost said, "and so she lost a whole year. You know, though, she golfered a lot – what else could we do, right? – and has worked really hard. I love seeing a kid like that get to go out at state."

Sinnwell, meanwhile, transformed herself into a solid contributor for the Huskies this year.

"She was in the 70s, maybe sneak in the 60s every now and then," Trost said, "and finally, she told me, I'm not going to worry about my care today, I'm just going to hit every shot as well as I can. And she comes in with a 58. ... It was kind of her breakthrough and she never really looked back."

Throw in Faith Franzen, who has been the Huskies' No. 2 pretty much the entire season, and the Huskies have three of their four "scorers" back in 2024.

"Faith, I think, played with

more and more confidence as the year went on," Trost said. "It's been fun to watch, it's been a lot of fun to watch. Then again, like I said, the thing about all these girls that I'll remember this year is that growth."

Paige Franzen, though, said she and her teammates want more. One of her goals is to join Sarah McMichael, who won three state titles from 2013 to 2015, as an individual state champion.

The other, however, is even more important to her.

"I want us to go as a team again," she said, "and if we work on our games – and I think everyone will – we can do it again next year."

holes," she said, "but I also knew it wasn't like I could do anything about it, either. I just told myself, 'OK, now it's time to play golf.' I just went out and played, and then you get a par and then you get another and then all of a sudden, it's back-to-back-to-back pars and I felt like I had the momentum."

Franzen certainly used it, as she finished the round with an 87, matched that score on Friday and posted the highest individual state tournament finish by a Nashua-Plainfield golfer since Sarah McMichael won her third-straight title in 2015.

"She's always had a really nice golf game," Nashua-Plainfield coach Jeff Trost said, "but the biggest change between the Paige of this year and the freshman Paige is she's matured a lot. She used to 'hang on' to her bad shots. She's learned to put those behind her, and if ever you needed proof, it's the state tournament. A lot of kids would have folded with a start like that, but Paige isn't a lot of kids."

Grundy Center's Abbie Lindeman won the tournament title with a 159, one shot better than New London's Taylor Phillips. Avery Lichter of Garrigan finished with a 168 while Franzen bested Riverside's Addison Brink by three shots for fourth.

Asked if she thought at the beginning of the season that she could become an all-state golfer this year, Franzen couldn't help but laugh.

"Probably not, if I'm going to be honest," she answered. "But after conference [where Franzen finished second in a playoff] and the regionals, I started to believe."

During the first round of the regional she finished second to North Butler's Reagan Mulder, the same girl who had beaten her in the TIC East playoff, but in the final round of the regional, Franzen blew away the field with an 80, beating Mulder by nine shots.

"A lot of golf is mental," she said, "and I think that final round of regionals, that gave me a lot of confidence going into state."

And not even a rocky start could shake that confidence.

Her opening round of 87 put her in a tie for fourth place, yet she slept like a proverbial baby Thursday night.

"I was pretty tired, and seriously, I just wanted to go to bed," she said with a laugh. "I wasn't nervous at all. ... Friday was fun. It really was."

Franzen has definitely put herself on the girls golf radar, and with two years of her prep career remaining, she has set some lofty goals.

"I definitely want to finish higher. I'd love to win it," she said, "and I know I have some things to work on. And I will work on them. Trust me on that, I know golf is one of those games you have to do a lot to be good at."

Her coach has no doubt about his star's work ethic.

"The key for Paige will be working on her short game," he said, "and with Paige, who's a perfectionist at heart, you know she's going to put the time into it. She was an awfully good freshman last year, but she wasn't satisfied. She worked hard on her game, and I'm just so proud of her – not just because she finished so high at state but because she earned it with the work she put into her game."

Although this year's Dairy Days grand marshals are not farmers, the theme "Home is Where the Herd Is" still applies to Richard and Kathy Schmadeke.

Since their home is on Fredericksburg's main drag — near all the action and on the parade route — it has a way of accumulating friends. And, sometimes strangers. But generally, a whole herd of people.

Richard, who is in the parade honor guard, admits he's marched by and wondered who those people were on his lawn.

"And once when it rained," said Kathy, "I came home and there were all these senior citizens settin' in my garage eating popcorn."

For the most part, they take the company in stride, but this time around, they'll be toward the front of the parade, riding in their son Brent's 1972 Cadillac convertible as grand marshals of the 99th annual celebration.

Lifelong Fredericksburg residents, the Schmadekes have only missed a handful of Dairy

Days in their lifetime; Richard missed three when he was in the navy. He served from 1966 to '70 and was in the reserves '72 years, retiring in '93.

Both Richard and Kathy started going to the celebration at a young age and have many fond memories.

"My cousin Brenda and I would wash dishes all day," Kathy said, "at 25 cents an hour, so we could go on rides."

Richard, who grew up on a farm, recalls marching in a parade with a calf when he was young.

"We showed cattle at Dairy Day, the show was in the morning and I thought I needed to lead one of the calves in the parade. My dad told me, "Whatever you do, don't let loose of that rope."

He didn't, but the calf bolted. "Drug me about two blocks."

Then there was the year KWWL's Ron Steele was a judge.

"One of our board members was in charge of his kids when we had our dinner. She took all three kids on the rides and all three kids got sick and threw up."

Dressed up another year like Disney characters — Kathy was Goofy — some Jaycettes hitched a ride on the back of the fire truck shortly before the truck received a call.

"The sirens went and here we were on the back of this dang truck," she said. "Luckily we only went a block, someone had their foot caught in a storm sewer."

The couple served a term, plus an extra year, on the Dairy Day board. "It took that long to





The Dairy Day parades are scheduled for 10:30 a.m. and 7 p.m. Friday.







Huskies wrap up 'fun' season ninth at state golf

Nashua-Plainfield caps 2023 season of 'growth' with strong showing at Boone's Cedar Pointe Golf Course

As the last Nashua-Plainfield golfer walked off Boone's Cedar Pointe Golf Course last Friday, Jeff Trost couldn't help but smile.

The Huskies weren't going to win a state title, the veteran coach knew, but the fact that the Huskies ended their season in Boone at the Class 1A state tournament was enough for Trost.

"It was a tremendously rewarding season for us," said Trost, who wrapped up his 43rd year of coaching golf. "Just to see the growth was enough. You look at what we were shooting early in the season and no one would have figured we'd end up where we did. The work they put in, the dedication they showed, the belief in each other ... it was just a really fun season."

The Huskies ended up finishing ninth in the 10-team race, shooting an 820. Grundy Center won the title with a 706, besting runner-up New London by 23 strokes.

Maybe Nashua-Plainfield wasn't in the hunt for a team title, but considering the Huskies began the season shooting a nine-hole 240, Trost is right — they came a long way in a short

amount of time.

"They were such a fun group to coach," Trost said. "They got along great, they worked hard, they were everything a coach wants from a team. Ninth in the state, you know, that sounds pretty good, doesn't it?"

The Huskies were paced by Paige Franzen, who finished fourth in the individual standings with back-to-back 87s, but as nice as the medal that was hanging around her neck, there was something better. It was that trophy that she and her teammates brought home.

"To go as a team, that was the best," she said. "Last year, we didn't even get out of the first round of regionals, and then this year ... to get to play at state, that was so cool. We had so much fun together, and that's what I'm always going to remember about this year."


And while Franzen was stellar, one golfer does not make a state tournament team. Her cousin, Faith Franzen, fired a two-day 195 to finish 28th while senior Autumn Nelson had a 224 and junior Natalie Sinnwell finished with a 227. Payton Howland added a 297 and Ellie Woodman, the Huskies' other senior, finished with a 301.

AFTER BLOWOUT LOSS TO NEWMAN, N-P REBOUNDS AND BLANKS ST. ANSGAR

The feeling at Stan Burkle Field in Nashua on Friday night against No. 2 Mason City Newman was not a good one for Husky fans.

Fast forward to this past Wednesday night on the same ball diamond and Levi Miller's bunch had a pep in its step and a fire in their eyes.

Dawson Glaser throwin' darts across the plate didn't hurt, either.

Glaser came up big on the hill for N-P and helped his Huskies' cause with a bad-hop, bases-clearing single over the shortstop's glove in the fourth inning to propel the Nashua-Plainfield baseball squad to a solid and convincing 7-0 win over rival St. Ansgar.

"We made the easy plays and we made the hard plays," said Glaser. "We put everything together like Nashua-Plainfield knows how to do."

N-P, 4-1 on the young season, did not commit an error versus the Saints — which only managed five hits against Glaser.

Call it a value pack of pitches for Glaser, who economy-sized this gem out on the bump with just 75 pitches in his complete-game shutout.

Yeah, he was humming on this his second start of the season. The sophomore hurler did not issue a free pass and blew fastball after fastball past Saints hitters en route to seven strikeouts.

"Seventy-five pitches is unbelievable for seven innings," said Miller. "It's very rare to see that at any level and he was just magnificent. Kudos to him because he loves baseball and he works his tail off, like a lot of our guys do."

The flip side to Nashua-Plainfield's two games in the past week was not a pretty one as the power-packed Knights rolled into Nashua last week and put the hammer down — early and often — in a 16-0 shellacking of the Huskies in just five innings.

It didn't help matters that the Huskies committed nine errors in the field against Newman (12-1, 4-0) and all-stater Max Burt had the catcher's mitt popping. Burt — one of Class 1A's best players and a University of Iowa recruit — struck out 11 Huskies and did not walk one batter. Bo Harrington's single was the only hit N-P could muster all evening.

"I think with Newman we were just scared to get in the box and hit," said Glaser. "We were just scared and it was all in our head."

Harrington — N-P's senior ace — saw Newman collect just five hits against him. The 12 runs he gave up — two of them were earned. He walked three and hit three batters.

Miller talked about his team's mindset — which is critical in terms of how the Huskies perform on a nightly basis.

N-P freshman first baseman Elayna O'Neill doubled and scored a run in the road contest versus the Bulldogs.

"She's going to have a powerful bat," said Stastny-Hall about O'Neill's production at the plate this year.

N-P junior third baseman Jalynn Pratt collected a hit and RBI. Husky shortstop Ryan Reams also garnered a hit and run knocked in.

Pratt came up with N-P's lone hit versus St. Ansgar — a contest that saw the Saints score seven runs in the second second inning.

N-P freshman second baseman Kami Hannemann collected N-P's other hit versus Newman.

The Huskies defense played better in the last two games than they did in the season opener versus Rockford — which amounted to a 13-0
