Elected officials get 9% raises

Supervisors nix Comp Board's recommendation to give county office holders 20% pay hikes

The smart aleck who attended Monday's Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors meeting might have said that "at least, it was something besides the ambulance that put the board behind schedule."

And that smart aleck would not be wrong as supervisors spent almost an hour discussing the county's Compensation Board recommendation to give all elected officials a 20

percent raise.

That recommendation had been made by a 5-2 vote during the board's annual meeting that took place on Dec. 7.

But almost from the start, there appeared to be little appetite from supervisors to accept the recommendation of the Comp Board, despite a spirited push by New Hampton attorney Mike Kennedy.

"All of us have got to do something," Kennedy said, "... to fill important slots. ... Sooner or later,

we have to recognize the worth of the people in this building and compensate them accordingly."

But Supervisor Jake Hackman almost immediately expressed concerns, saying the county could not afford the pay raises, especially in light of rumors that the Legislature is considering freezing county property taxes for two years.

In the end, supervisors agreed to cut the Compensation Board recommendation by 55 percent; in other words, it approved on a 3-1 vote to

raise elected official salaries by 9 percent. Supervisor Tim Zoll voted cast the lone dissenting vote, but Hackman said he wanted his vote as "present," in effect, abstaining.

That means if the new Board of Supervisors — Travis Suckow and Scott Cerwinski will replace Jason Byrne and Tim Zoll,

Council accepts deed to land for 'Pa's Playground'

Family honors memory of Howard Schluter during council meeting

Christmas came a little early for the Nashua City Council on Monday night.

At a regular meeting, all three council members present voted for the city of Nashua to accept a gift of land for \$1 from Jeanette Schluter in memory of her late husband, Howard "Pa" Schluter.

That transfer of property and acceptance of the deed is predicated on the ground to be used and maintained as a public park known as "Pa's Playground" – in memory of Howard Schluter.


The property where the park is planned to be located is in Lot 12, in Block A, Country Club Subdivision Plat Three.

Council continues to move ahead on EMS

CITY COUNCIL: FROM 1

"Pa" is what Howard Schluter was known as by his children and grandchildren. Howard was known to relish having a fun time with his family at various playgrounds available in the Nashua Park System.

"The Park will be a significant contribution to the quality of life for residents of the City," commented Mayor Alex Anthofer after the meeting.

According to the written resolution, it is also in agreement with both parties that should the city find a larger property for a park with more assets for the community (i.e., a pool) then the city shall be able to substitute this lot provided it be dedicated to the Grantor's late husband.

The Council also agreed to begin paying the Nashua Area EMS crew chief – Zenda Vikturek – back pay for the month of

November. The volunteer EMS (emergency medical services) is hoping to get up and running some time after the start of 2023. The agreed upon rate of pay for the crew chief is \$150 a month.

Nashua City Clerk John Ott has stated at earlier Council meetings that the labor costs to run Nashua's new EMS would run about \$10,000 a year based on the per-average call rate for a 12-month period from prior years.

Nashua has tentatively purchased an ambulance from Life Ambulance Network – a company based out of Illinois. The ambulance is a 2004 Ford Diesel with 85,000 miles on it.

Nashua has determined its suggested compensation for the EMS crew and that boiled down to a pay rate of \$30 an hour for an EMT (emergency medical technician), \$25 an hour for a driver, and \$20 an hour for an attendant. The medical director

and crew chief would each be paid \$150 a month.

The Council also approved the purchase of 10 pagers for the EMS at a cost of almost \$600 per pager and a desktop charger for \$85.

An estimate from Bobcat Wildlife and Pest Management to clean out damage created by raccoons at the Waste Water Treatment plant was approved for \$6,100. That estimate does not include the cost of repairs.

Council members also reviewed city logos that were submitted from the Chamber for the logo design contest. The winner will receive bragging rights and have their creativity displayed all over the community should their design be chosen as Nashua's new city logo. Citizens have the opportunity to vote for their favorite design. One can contact Val Johnson at the Big 4 Chamber for details.



He would then lead Nashua-Plainfield in 1992-1993 three years later as the two schools merged to share athletic teams.

Frost, who wrestled at the University of Iowa under the direction of Dan Gable, needed 14 wins at the start of this season to roll over his career win total to 500. He has guided N-P to two state dual crowns (2004, 2012) and several high finishes in the traditional state tourney during his tenure.

But Tuesday evening – right before Christmas and the holidays – was a perfect moment to celebrate Frost's lifetime commitment of guiding prospective young student athletes out on the mat. His sustained success has been icing on the cake.

Frost received a plaque commemorating the landmark

achievement that only a handful of coaches have been able to attain. He was also able to share in his team's success with all that have helped him establish a program and tradition that is one of the best in the state.

"That was cool – not that that was the main focus," said Frost about hitting win No. 500. "It was nice. I've got a lot of former wrestlers here, a lot of former coaches."

Coincidentally, head coach Brent Jennings of Osage – who guided his Green Devils to a championship at the Battle of Waterloo last weekend – also earned his 500th career win at that prestigious tournament.

The Battle of Waterloo – which saw N-P go 4-2 at and place 10th overall – was also where Garret Rinken broke Trey Nelson's all-time wins mark at Nashua-Plainfield. Nelson, a 2022 Husky grad, held the old

record with 174 career wins. Rinken now sports 179 career victories.

Rinken will try to become the only wrestler in Nashua-Plainfield history to become a two-time state champ this winter. He placed third overall at state as a freshman, won it all his sophomore season at 113 pounds and finished runner-up in the 120-pound weight class last year. Rinken is signed on to wrestle at the University of Northern Iowa.

Rinken talked about his head coach, who has been there for him at every turn during his illustrious career at N-P.

"He's just a really good coach – kind of a mentor I guess you could say," said Rinken. "He has a lot of good life lessons that he can teach me as well as other teammates. He's just very knowledgeable."

Frost's career record is cur-

rently 500-213-6.

Frost didn't take long to bask in the glow of his hard-working accomplishment. It's back to work next week where N-P will aim for the top in Class 1A. To hear Frost talk about the rest of the season offers a small glimpse of how he got to 500 career wins in the first place.

Determination.

"We've got some big stuff we got to look forward to this year," said Frost. "We got through tonight. We got to 500. That's all fine and dandy."

"Obviously, when we come back from the break on the 27th, we're gonna have the same original goals in mind that we need to get done. We still got two state trophies in mind. We gotta have 'em. We gotta shoot for the top three in traditional and obviously we gotta get back to the duals and make a run at thing, too."





Jerry D. Sudol, age 83 of Nashua, died Sunday, Dec. 18, 2022, at Floyd County Medical Center in Charles City.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 22, 2022, at The Little Brown Church in Nashua with the Rev. Drew McHolm officiating.

Interment was held at Greenwood Cemetery, Nashua.

Friends greeted the family from 4 to 7 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 21, 2022, at Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home & Crematory/Olson Chapel in Nashua. Visitation continues an hour prior to the service at the church on Thursday.

Jerry was born on Oct. 18, 1939, to Jake and Ethel (Chadwick) Sudol on the family farm near Nashua. He developed that Sudol work ethic from a young age, helping his parents on their farm, and he received his education first at a country school and then at Nashua High School, where he played the tuba in the band and was in FFA before graduating in 1958.

who had come to the alley to hang out with some friends and left with the man who would be her future husband. The two began dating, fell in love and were married on June 11, 1961, at the Congregational Church in Nashua.

Jerry and Barb had one heck of a run for 61-plus years. They welcomed two children — Steve and Lorrie — and eventually saw their family grow to include six grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren, and trust us, Jerry loved them all. Oh, how he'd tease him and joke around with them, but he'd do anything for them. He loved going to their sporting events and school activities.

Lorrie and Steve will tell you they had a hard-working father but one who also taught them to have fun in their lives and always, always be there for others.

He set one heck of an example for them.

In his younger days, Jerry umpired slow-pitch softball at the fairgrounds, and he loved to

take his family on fishing trips to the Faribault and Waterville areas in Minnesota. Over time, he went from coon hunting to deer hunting, but he never lost his zest for life or his sense of humor.

For years, like clockwork he brought cookies to S&T Collison, and folks made it a point to be in Nashua on Tuesdays for "Cookie Day" and he loved putting around at the farm, too. Jerry loved going to auctions, getting free apples and oranges and was always on the hunt for a good deal!

Jerry was a longtime member of the Little Brown Church.

One of his grandsons may have put it best when he said "Grandpa had a heck of a run for 83 years," and we couldn't agree more. He was the best and he will be forever missed.



Supervisors settle on 9 percent raises

respectively, on Jan. 1 — follows through with the raises, the 10 elected officials' annual pay will jump as follows:

- The five supervisors will go from \$31,148 to \$33,951.
- The auditor will go from \$6,367 to \$72,304.
- The recorder and treasurer will go from \$66,369 to \$72,342.
- The sheriff will go from \$91,391 to \$99,616.
- The attorney will go from \$111,598 to \$121,642.

Board members, though, took a while to get to the 9 percent vote.

They first, on a 3-2 vote, rejected a motion by Hackman to take up the Compensation Board's recommendations on Jan. 9.

Board Chairman Matt Kuhn was torn, saying his concern "is that we're only getting further behind ... trying to catch up with other counties and that sort of stuff. I will also state that I can't support 20 percent."

County Attorney David Laudner said that in the 17 counties that make up District 1 and its adjoining district to the west, the median wage increase over the past five years has been a little more than 21 percent while his position, which he took over in September 2021, has received a 14.18 percent increase during that time.

"That's the second lowest of my peers," he said.

Hackman said supervisor pay for Chickasaw County ranks 82nd out of the 99 counties in the state.

And then there is the matter of what the state code says when it comes to acting on a compensation board recommendation.

"I don't think the code section is as clear and as practical as it should be," Laudner said. "I think it's clunky, for the lack of a better term."

The county attorney pointed out that on one hand, the code seems to be telling counties it shouldn't act on a compensation board's recommendation until the public hearing is held on the budget, yet it also states that wages should be set before putting the budget up for the public hearing.

But several elected officials — Laudner, Recorder Shirley Troyna and Treasurer Sue

Breitbach — said they needed some kind of hint on what the supervisors were thinking so they could put together their proposed 2023-24 budget.

"The real problem to me is that unless you give guidance on this," Laudner said, "we have no way to set our budgets and then you have no way to set your budget."

Byrne, who attended the meeting via phone, made a motion to reduce the Compensation Board's recommendation by 50 percent; i.e., giving elected officials a 10 percent raise.

"I think we need to keep them all together and I think we have to realize that we fall farther and farther behind every year," he said. "I know it's a lot of money, but it's where we're at right now."

His motion, though, failed on a 3-2 vote as Kuhn joined Hackman and Zoll in defeating the proposal.

Kuhn asked both Cerwinski and Suckow, who attended Monday's meeting, if they wanted to offer any thoughts on the issue and they both demurred.

Earlier in the meeting, Supervisor Steve Breitbach said that "I know the largest employer in northeast and north-central Iowa was over 9 percent this year and there was a good increase last year, too."

He said he did feel the county needed to increase the pay of elected officials by at the very least 8.7 percent, which is the cost-of-living increase that Social Security recipients will be receiving.

After Byrne's motion was defeated, Breitbach made the motion for the 9 percent raises and it was approved.



Huskies cruise in quadrangular as former teammates share special moment

On a night where their head coach was honored for a remarkable achievement – Trey Nelson and Garret Rinken shared a moment that few teammates get to experience.

Tuesday night's home dual for the Nashua-Plainfield Huskies had a little bit of everything right before the Christmas break.

This was a treasured gift received by Husky fans that they won't soon forget.

Longtime N-P head coach Al Frost earned his 500th career victory in the quad that saw his proud wrestling community mint a newly-crowned all-time victory leader.

The third-ranked Huskies had no problem disposing of North Union (55-21), Rockford (81-0) and Forest City (66-8) on this prolific and emotional night.

Rinken – the top-ranked wrestler at 126 pounds in Class 1A – broke Nelson's all-time win mark. Or at least they celebrated the accomplishment at home.

Nelson – a 2022 N-P grad – climbed out of the stands to give Rinken a hug after he pinned his Forest City opponent in the first period of his final match of the evening.

The record was already broken – but who's really counting when there's a large crowd to make sure there was plenty of applause to put a bow on that hard-earned present.

"I actually broke it at the Battle of Waterloo. We actually didn't realize it until we added 'em up yesterday," said Rinken.

Rinken's all-time wins mark – which includes a state title his sophomore year and a win streak of over 100

victories – now stands at 179.

Nelson – who placed at state twice – finished his career with 174 wins versus 38 losses. The old record holder was Mitch Norton – a 2005 Husky grad – who piled up 167 all-time wins. Trey also had to pass his dad, Kurt Nelson, to claim the top spot for the most wins at N-P. Kurt produced 161 wins, but out-pinned Trey 113 to 109.

"Garret and I have been practice partners for two years in a row," Trey said. "He made me better every day. I think that I got him better, too."

While Nelson only held the all-time wins crown at for about half a year – the top mark may get one-upped relatively soon as well.

"I knew it was going to get broken this year. It's going to get broken again pretty soon by his brother," said Nelson about sophomore Jayden Rinken, who well could topple his brother's all-time

wins record if he keeps up his current pace."

There were plenty of exciting matches – none more so than Titus Evans' clash with No. 4 ranked Kellen Moore of Forest City at 170 pounds. Moore is a two-time place-winner and seemed to want no part of Evans late in the match as the Husky 40-win wrestler from a season ago was frantically chasing Moore around the mat.

"He stuck in there and battled hard," said Frost. "I got my hats off to him. He kept his composure. He came on strong in the third period, just got a little bit behind. Obviously, the kid went into stalling mode."

Evans closed to as close as 9-7 before the clock ran out on his upset bid – if you want to call it that.

"We really wish Titus would have got that win, but he was right there," said Garret Rinken. "You could tell

with how tired that Moore was. Titus – you could see the gas tank's still left. That's the thing you work on."

N-P will take a 14-2 dual mark into the Christmas break and hope to get healthy. Senior Kendrick Huck (132) – a two-time state place-winner – and Tate White (182) did not wrestle in the quad.

White won over 40 matches last year as well. Landon Pratt – who started at the upper weights as a junior – is also looking to get back into action after the holiday break as he is recovering from a knee injury.

"We just got done with first season, I call it. Now we got the second season, which is going to obviously be just as important, if not more," said Frost.

LATE-NIGHT HEROICS

O'NEILL'S PIN GIVES N-P VICTORY OVER INDIANOLA, CAPS SOLID BATTLE OF WATERLOO

J.R. O'Neill isn't the best wrestler around – but he's all heart.

Al Frost's 138-pounder – who wrestles mostly junior varsity matches – was the hero of the day for the third-ranked Nashua-Plainfield Huskies at the Battle of Waterloo on Saturday.

Make that late Saturday evening – around 10 p.m.

"They had six mats already rolled up and we're still the last team there," said Frost.

That meant most of the 32-team field at the top-notch tournament that sports some of the best talent in the state had long since hit the road after the two-day battle was almost complete.

That gave O'Neill the chance to bring the Husky crowd to its feet with a stunning pin to wrap up a thrilling dual win over Class 3A and 10th-ranked Indianola.

N-P – tied for third with Lisbon in Class 1A according to the most recent dual rankings released by the IWCOA (Iowa Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association) – led by 11 points over the Indians with two matches left.

"All we gotta do is not give up more than a major decision," said Frost. "What you tell kids, when you're down on the bottom, you never reach back. That's J.R.'s specialty. He actually got the reversal and the kid on his back and gets the pin. The crowd – what was left – went nuts. The team actually carried J.R. off the mat – which I haven't seen happen in a long time. Basically, he won the dual."

O'Neill stuck Cael Meyer at 138 pounds in 5:20 in the second-to-last match of the evening after trailing 6-1. Indianola won the last bout by fall.

O'Neill swung for the fences in a risky move and came up roses.

"Everyone's yelling no and somehow he pulls it off," said N-P senior Landon Pratt, who is hoping to get back out on the

mat for the Huskies after the Christmas break.

It was an overall pretty good day for the Huskies and his coaching staff – which helped guide N-P to a 4-2 record among the six duals it competed in.

N-P started off the day on Friday morning with a tight, 38-33, victory over No. 8 Wapsie Valley. There could definitely be a rematch in the cards in this one if both teams earn the right to crack the eight-team, small-school class state dual field at the beginning of February.

The match came down to the last weight class – 106 pounds – where second-ranked Jayden Rinken tech-failed Kaiden Belinsky, 20-4, to seal the deal. WV trailed 33-15 but tied the match with three-straight pins prior to Rinken's big win.

N-P – wrestling without two-time state place-winner Kendrick Huck (132) – just slipped past the Warriors at the Chris Davis Invite earlier this month to the win that team title.

Top-ranked Garret Rinken once again defeated Dawson Schmit at 126 pounds, 10-5. Rinken defeated Schmitt, 11-7, at WV's home invite back in early December.

"Schmit didn't gain any real momentum in this match like he did the first match," said Frost.

Husky senior Kaden Wilken (138) came up with a big pin over Wapsie's Kanen Decker.

"Decker's a good kid," said Wilken. "We got down about 4-1 before we got moving. Then Wilken just kind of got a fire going."

Aiden Gelner (145) and Tate White (182) each avenged losses from the Chris Davis Invite to their Warrior opponents the second go-round.

Gelner defeated Dallas Tisue 13-8 after he lost to him in overtime, 14-12, in Fairbank.

"This was a knock-down, drag out, too," said Frost.

White pinned Cannon Joerger in 3:51. Joerger beat White, 7-4, a few weeks ago.

In N-P's second matchup on Friday, the Huskies took on Class 2A defending state dual champ West Delaware.

"They were down four or five kids Friday and we knew that," said Frost.

Regardless, this battle came down to the last matchup as




