Third ambulance for county service remains on track

Supervisor's motion to rescind purchasing remounted rig fails with lack of a second

Chickasaw County EMS will get its third ambulance, although for a while Monday, it looked like the Board of Supervisors might back off from its decision made the week before to buy a remounted rig from Klocke Emergency Vehicles.

After New Hampton resident Jeremy McGrath — the owner and operator of Chickasaw Ambulance Service, the county's previous EMS provider — questioned if the county had followed its requests for proposal (RFP), Supervisor Jake Hackman made a motion to rescind the previous week's motion.

The key questions McGrath brought up were did the county purchase a vehicle at a higher cost than the RFP requested and did a remounted vehicle count as used as the RFP required?

Hackman, however, said his motion was based on the fact that because there was a lower bid for the power-load system — by \$525 — than the county received from Klocke, the purchase did not follow the county's procurement policy.

County Attorney David Laudner, though, said his legal opinion was that the board could legally purchase the 2009 ambulance box on a 2023 chassis, the power-load system and a cot for \$204,415. Of that cost, Klocke officials said \$150,000 was for the ambulance itself. The RFP specifications were for used ambulances for up to \$180,000.

McGrath said it would be as if two car dealers

... lows that accompanied those 14 years, which almost certainly included plenty of smiles, hugs, tears and all the emotions in between.

County attorney says supervisors followed RFP rules

had been asked to submit bids for used vehicles and one of the dealers "also bids a new truck in there, even though it's not in the bid specs but that's the one you choose. I don't think it's fair because Arrow Manufacturing's main line of business is remounts. I think you were asking for a bid on a remount, they would have bid it. And it's over the dollar amount."

Laudner, though, said the board was definitely within its rights to purchase the remounted vehicle.

"I don't know how you can say this is considered a new vehicle when it has a used component to it," Laudner said. "New, to me, means brand new. It's new box, new chassis. This has a used component to it."

The county attorney also said he had no issue with the price paid by the county for the ambulance, which will serve as a backup rig to the new rigs that were purchased last fall before Chickasaw County EMS went into service.

"I think both the bids you got interpreted the exact same way. That's why when you got the bids, it was broken down between the price of the rig, the price of the cot and the price of the power loader," he said. "Had they interpreted it as, 'Hey, the total price is no more than \$180,000,' why would they be broken down that way? They would have submitted one

bid, here's the grand total price ... they broke it down because they interpreted it the same way I interpreted it."

After the short discussion, Hackman made his motion, but after Board Chairman Matt Kuhn asked three times for a second, none was forthcoming and the motion died.

The decision to proceed with the purchase came on the same day in which supervisors again went into closed session to "discuss the potential sale or purchase of real estate" for a permanent home for the county's EMS department.

But after meeting in closed session for about 45 minutes, supervisors, just as they did the week before, came back into open session and said no decisions had been made.

And board members also conducted the review for Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson, which was tense at times, especially when Hackman questioned the director on why a county ambulance took part in a send-off to the state meet last week for the New Hampton girls track team? Knutson replied that it was no different than sending an ambulance to events like Dairy Days in Fredericksburg, Alta Vista Days or any other community event in the county.

Board members also passed on giving Knutson a raise because his contract with the county isn't up until the end of the calendar year.

Huskies off to a decent start at state golf

Paige Franzen sits in fifth place in individual standings while Nashua-Plainfield's 405 good for seventh place at 1A tournament

The Nashua-Plainfield girls golf team has been an incredible story this spring. Now the Huskies need to finish what they started. N-P – an improbably state qualifier in the small-school class – finished Day 1 of the Class 1A state golf meet at Cedar Pointe Golf Course in Boone on

Thursday. The Huskies currently stand in seventh place with a 405, but are in striking distance of several teams ahead of them, mainly fourth-place West Branch (393), Newell-Fonda (400) and Easton Valley (402).

“They’re all chompin’ ready to get back out there,” said N-P head coach Jeff Trost. “They’re ready to go get ‘em.” Competing in its first state meet since 2016, some seven years ago, N-P’s No. 1 golfer, Paige Franzen, got off to a rocky start and was involved in a scary situation on her first hole of the day on No. 9. After a trio of players teed off – including Franzen, along with Katie

Johnson of Akron-Westfield and Alex Poppen of West Branch – the last thing on anybody’s mind was the game of golf. Johnson collapsed on the course after hitting four shots out of bounds. She was rushed off the course by ambulance and did not finish her first round (18 holes). “She fainted and dropped over on the golf course,” said Trost. “It was in Paige’s group, so they ended up playing a two-some all day.”

Franzen shot a double-bogey (seven strokes) on that Par 5, No. 9 hole. Her first four holes went 7-8-6-7, but Trost said she played to a five-over par card the rest of her 14 holes to finish in a tie for fifth place with an 87. Sophomore Faith Franzen (100) sits in a tie for 32nd with a 100. N-P senior Autumn Nelson carded a 106, followed by junior Natalie Sinnwell’s 112. Payton Howland shot a 145 and Ellie Woodman fired a 148.

HUCK WINS 800; N-P FINISHES AS RUNNER-UP AT 1A STATE TRACK

class state standings.

Dynasty? Let's not get too far ahead of ourselves quite yet.

Nashua-Plainfield – aided by the stunning theatrics of Kadence Huck, who can now be rightfully considered an all-time great in the state of Iowa – came oh so close to repeating as Class 1A champs on the big stage.

But Calamus-Wheatland has another sophomore legend that is rewriting the record books in Des Moines as well in the form of Noelle Steines. Steines and her Warriors took home the 1A crown – 38-33 – and prevented N-P from making it back-to-back championships after Nashua-Plainfield won its first state team title ever in any girls sport last spring.

“Last week we talked about a trophy being in the picture,” said N-P head coach Amber McCall. “We needed everything to play out just right and we did that.”

Steines locked horns with Huck and the two best runners in their respective class absolutely thrilled a record-breaking crowd that witnessed a rivalry take shape right before their very eyes.


Huck – now a five-time state champ – led the charge for McCall's Huskies. N-P and Calamus-Wheatland brought four runners apiece down to Polk County and the must-see drama that unfolded between each of the two school's superstars started on Thursday.

Husky boys get their elusive podium finish

Nashua-Plainfield shuttle hurdle relay team gives its coach his first state meet medalists

The Huskies got their medal. The third time was a charm at state for the Nashua-Plainfield boys shuttle hurdle relay squad.

The shuttle hurdle foursome of seniors Kaden Wilken, Aiden Lamborn and Bo Harrington – and anchored by junior Titus Evans – ripped off a season-best clip in the prelims on Thursday at the state track meet.

That meant the Husky crowd, positioned near the first turn on the blue oval at Drake Stadium, went absolutely bananas.

Lamborn jumped high into the air to collide with Evans in a wild celebration past the finish line.

Team members ran each other down on the infield. Smiles were a mile-wide on faces that kept beaming from ear-to-ear.

A group hug was of course in store and customary after such a fantastic finish to vault into the finals.

“We were awfully excit-

ed about that,” said N-P head coach Chase Sudol. “We had high hopes after that, obviously. They got that medal around their neck and that summed it all up for ‘em.”

This stellar parting gift for all seniors involved in the relay race was a long-time coming for this group of hurdlers that had experienced heartache and frustration in two previous runs at state prior to placing seventh on Saturday in the finals.

Evans was a freshman in 2021 when the Huskies ran in the rain and placed 21st at state. The following year the Huskies finished a spot lower in Des Moines with a 22nd-place finish.

Not this year as the group placed seventh in Class 1A with a final run of 1:02.13.

“Just the fact that we were finally able to take that next step and bring home some hardware was huge for – not only the kids that got it – the track program itself. It's a huge accomplishment,” said Sudol.

The Nashua-Plainfield softball team is on the board – and in a big way.

The Huskies and head coach Jessica Stastny-Hall earned their first win of the year in a 10-0 shutout of Northwood-Kensett this past Wednesday.

N-P freshman first baseman Elayna O'Neill went 3-4 with a double and run knocked for the Huskies – which lost to Rockford (14-0) in the season opener Monday and No. 3 Central Springs on Tuesday by a score of 12-0.

“I see good things coming for her,” Stastny-Hall said of O'Neill.

N-P (1-2, 1-2) will have played five games in five days in the first week of the season after tonight's (Friday) game with Mason City Newman is officially put in the books. N-P played at Hampton-Dumont-CAL on Thursday.

“It's a very busy week. The girls – I know they're tired and school's still going on – they're trying their best,” said Stastny-Hall. “We are a super-young team.”

N-P freshman Hannah Brahn worked five scoreless innings in her first career varsity win over the Vikings on Wednesday. She fanned four batters, allowed five hits and walked four.

“Being a freshman on the varsity level – that's a big, big win for her,” said Stastny-Hall. “I know she was a little frustrated against Rockford, but she came back last night even better and stronger.”

N-P freshman Lily Eiffler went 2-4 at the dish with an RBI and a run scored. Eden Lamborn, the Husky's

N-P opens baseball season with three impressive wins

So far, so good.

Now comes the real challenge tonight in Nashua for the Huskies and Levi Miller.

After outscoring its first three over-matched opponents by a score of 39-8 – the big boys will roll into town tonight (Friday) to take on Miller's talented Nashua-Plainfield baseball squad.

Those “boys” would be the No. 2 ranked Mason City Newman Knights (8-1).

“We need to be tested,” said Miller. “Newman's always been our fourth game of the season and that's always a good measuring stick to where we are.”

N-P has started out 3-0 in the 2023 campaign after walloping Rockford in the season at opener at home by a score of 14-0. Then it was the come-from-behind win on Tuesday over Central Springs (5-3), followed by the 20-5 shellacking of Northwood-Kensett (20-5) on Wednesday.

“Our pitching has carried us through three games,” said Miller. “We know we have the arms to compete against

the best teams.”

One of Miller's arms – his senior ace in the form of Bo Harrington – shut down the Warriors in Game No. 1 of the summer.

Harrington no-hit the Warriors over five innings and fanned 13.

“Our pitching has been outstanding. Bo Harrington was obviously electric – absolutely dominant in the opener on Monday,” said the N-P head coach. “He was unhittable. We're expecting a big, big year out of Bo.”

N-P's No. 2 hurler – sophomore Dawson Glaser – overcame some trouble early against Central Springs, but settled down to strike out 12 batters in over six innings on the hill. He allowed just three hits, but did walk four.

“Dawson is a very talented athlete and the thing is – he's hungry,” said Miller.

Miller said senior second baseman Kendrick Huck made a full-extension play to lay out and snag a line drive in the fifth inning against Central Springs. That clutch play help thwart a Panther rally.

“I'm confident in this group. There's

A Memorial Service will be held at 7 p.m. following the visitation with the Rev. Drew McHolm officiating.



moved from Indianola to Charles City to be closer to their daughter and her family in 2019. Gary soon picked up his church activities with Trinity United Methodist Church again serving as a church trustee.

During his last days, Gary mentioned how surprised he was about how many prayer chains he was on and the number of people that reached out to him. He was the only one surprised. Gary lived an exemplary life of service to his country, church, and community.

Gary was preceded in death by his parents, Aaron and Goldie Denniston of LeMars; father-in-law, Ralph White of Indianola; mother-in-law, Dessa White of Indianola; sister-in-law, Louise Denniston of Virginia Beach, Virginia; brother-in-law, David Hawkins of Orange City; and sister-in-law, Jeri Denniston of Kempner, Texas.

He is survived by his wife, Judy, of 53 years; his son Mark and his wife Christie and their son Anders of Ogden, Utah; his daughter Laura and her husband Tim Paplow and their children Luke, Rachel, and Joel of Nashua; his brother, Larry Denniston of Virginia Beach, Virginia; sister, Judy Hawkins of LeMars; and brother, Don Denniston of Kempner, Texas.

Nashua man faces charges over incident with fireman

A Nashua man charged with sex crimes involving young children has been arrested again and charged with assault on a firefighter after allegedly spraying the firefighter with fuel.

Ethan Vorhes was free on \$70,000 surety bond on 10 charges involving allegations of sexual abuse and lascivious and indecent acts with two young girls between November 2018 and June 2022.

According to documents filed last week in Floyd County District Court, Vorhes was conducting a controlled burn on a cornfield about 2 miles east of Marble Rock that was reported by a passerby as a fire, resulting in the Marble Rock Fire Department being dispatched.

After Marble Rock firefighters arrived at the scene and began to extinguish the fire, Vorhes sprayed a firefighter with fuel, the criminal complaint alleges.

Vorhes was charged with assault on persons in certain occupations, a serious misdemeanor.

At Vorhes' initial appearance Thursday morning on the new charge he was ordered released

under supervision of the Iowa Department of Correctional Services, but about an hour later the Department of Correctional Services filed a pre-trial report of violation, alleging Vorhes violated the terms of his original release by being charged with another crime.

Early Thursday afternoon, District Court Judge DeDra Schroeder issued a bench warrant for \$100,000 cash, name only, for Vorhes' arrest.

As of Monday evening the Floyd County Jail reported Vorhes was not in custody.

Vorhes, age 39, had originally been charged with two counts of sexual abuse in the second degree, Class B felonies; two counts of sexual abuse in the third degree, Class C felonies; two counts of lascivious acts with a child, Class C felonies; two counts of indecent contact with a child, aggravated misdemeanors; one count of indecent exposure, a serious misdemeanor; and one count of disseminating or exhibiting obscene material to a minor, a serious misdemeanor.

Vorhes was arrested Aug. 31 and was initially being held on \$57,000 cash only bond. At a bond review hearing in September District Court

Judge James Drew ruled that the \$57,000 cash bond should remain.

In October, Vorhes, with a new attorney, again requested a bail review hearing, arguing that the Iowa Constitution requires bail to be set to allow a surety bond.

At the second bond review hearing, District Court Judge DeDra Schroeder ruled that the bond would remain.

Vorhes' attorney then filed a motion saying that the constitutional question he raised in his previous motion had not been addressed, and that no ruling had articulated why a cash-only bond was necessary to ensure Vorhes' future court appearances.

A third district court judge, Judge Chris Foy, held a bond review hearing in November and raised the amount of bond to \$70,000, but allowed a surety bond, where a bonding company posts the bond in return for a fee from the defendant. Vorhes posted the surety bond Nov. 30 and was released from custody under the supervision of the Department of Correctional Services.

The original sexual charges case is set to begin trial on June 13.

"To just run his best down they're at the state meet - it's hard to ask for much more out of the kid than that," said Sudol. "We thought going down he had a chance to maybe squeak in for a medal or something like that. To get a medal for all the work he's put in for the shuttle - I know since Coach (Jay) Conner has seen him since he was a freshman, he was going to be something special."

The Husky 4x800 relay of Harrington, junior Dylan Blanchard, as well as freshmen Jase Hansen and Eli Kalainoff, placed 18th on Thursday in a season-best time of 8:38.

The group PR'd by over 20 seconds to qualify for state at the district meet in Northwood. "To think you're going to go down there and take more time off, sometimes is a little bit unrealistic," said Sudol. "The fact that we still ran well and

along," said Sudol. "They competed against Saint and Central Springs all year long. You can't be too disappointed in the group. You just gotta continue to move forward and look to do better next year."

Lamborn, the school-record holder in the high jump - failed

to clear the opening height of 5-11 three times and was eliminated from competition on Friday morning.

Lamborn was a three-time state qualifier and wasn't even going to go out for track his freshman season before Sudol

convinced him to do so.

"He's one of my favorite kids and favorite stories," said Sudol. "What a waste if Aiden never would have given me a chance to coach him in track. Just the fact that he trusted me and other coaches just to come out is what made it special."

The state meet put a wrap on an N-P boys track season that saw the Huskies win the district title for the first time in school history.

Yeah, it was another landmark year for Sudol and his Huskies - just two seasons removed from taking down all but one of the seven relays that compete at state.

"We just continue to build and the kids continue to buy into us," said Sudol. "We won districts - something that's never been done. Now we want to look for what's next in our program. It's going to take lots of work from the kids again. We'll be back, there's no doubt about that."

And don't expect the Husky fans that have pretty much placed "dibs" on Section Q at Drake Stadium, just down from the finish line at the blue oval,

to remain quiet for future state events.

Let's just say that section is reserved for N-P faithful to cheer on their Huskies for a long time.

"We packed that corner. Just the support that parents and fans that everybody gives our kids is just awesome. It's something special. For a small school we take a lot of pride in that," said Sudol.

Huck started the week by repeating as the state title holder in the 400 dash. She won that race in 55.94 – almost breaking the state record in 1A. That record of 55.75 still stands – which was accomplished by Ellie Herzberg of Manson-Northwest Webster in 2013.

Steines won the 3,000 and that set the stage for showdown No. 1 in a battle between the two schools for small-school class supremacy.

“They’re good for each other. Obviously they push each other to be the very best,” said McCall. “They motivate and drive each other to continue to work hard.”

In the first race of Friday morning in heat three, the first blow was struck by the Warriors in the distance medley (4:10.65). Steines reeled in another state title for Calamus-Wheatland – a race N-P finished fourth in with a clip of 4:13.34 and was the defending state champ in.

“We won it last year with a 4:13. I couldn’t be more proud of each and everyone of these girls,” said McCall.

N-P junior Jordyn Frost led off the race, followed by junior Ellie Eick and freshman Jilissa White. Huck grabbed the baton in dead last with two laps to go and made a frenzied push to track down the leaders. Exerting every ounce of energy she could muster in her lone race of the day – there was just nothing left in the tank in the last 100 meters.

It was still a championship jaunt around the track for Huck – regardless of the fourth-place finish.

“Two girls passed me at the end. No matter how fast I run – you never want to do that,” said Huck.

Huck ran an opening-leg sub-minute 400 (59 seconds).

“That was not the best decision on my part,” smiled Huck.

Saturday was pure gold for Huck – even though she came up short by one-hundredth of a second to Steines

in the mile run – a race that will easily go down in history as one of the most memorable finishes in Iowa prep track and field lore.

“It was only .01. It was literally just who would have leaned farther,” said Huck.

Huck won the 800 run earlier in the day that morning by out-running Steines for her second blue-ribbon finish of the week – 2:11.75 to 2:13.93.

Then four hours later the pair put on a show in the 1,500.

“The last lap or so she got a step or two ahead of me,” said Huck. “The last 200 I started my kick and got back up with her at probably the last 50 meters.”

Both standouts broke the state record in the mile run – Steines just nipped Huck at the tape, 4:35.43 to 4:35.44.

“There was kind of few seconds there where we both looked at the screen, because neither of us knew who won,” said Huck. “I don’t know. It’s fine. I’ll get her next year.”

Amberley Gerholdt – a sophomore state alternate on the d-med for N-P – summed up the feeling in the crowd, which was almost stunned silence in the packed house because nobody knew who won.

“Everyone was holding their breath. It was crazy,” said Gerholdt about the amazing finish of the Class 1A mile run.

Huck knew Steines was the favorite headed into the mile run as she won the Drake Relays in an event Huck placed fifth in. Steines also topped Huck in the mile run at the Eastern Iowa Track Festival in Iowa City.

“I was only three seconds off of her at Drake,” said Huck. “I just knew I was going to have to stick with her. That’s what I tried to do the whole time. I tried to have a kick there at the end – I just didn’t lean far enough.”

Who is the clear-cut favorite headed into next spring – Steines or Huck – in the mile run is anybody’s guess? Hard

work in the offseason will surely play a part – you can definitely count on that from Huck.

“Well, I think Noelle knows that she’s coming for her next year,” said N-P sophomore Marleigh Lowe, another state alternate on the distance medley. “She has something to be scared of now.”

McCall talked about the commu-

nity support and the tireless dedication of the N-P girls track squad that helped make this state meet another award-winning memory for the Husky fanbase.

“I would like to thank our community. There’s always a lot more people that go into getting a second-place finish and getting that second-place trophy. Obviously, we had some great

athletes down there, but we also had 23 other athletes on the team that helped push us at practice and help us with our mindset,” said McCall.

Huck summed up another fantastic finish at state for her Huskies.

“It’s really important to know that you have people supporting you and you know people have the same dreams and goals as you,” said Huck.





Saluting Our Servicemembers



Return of fallen veteran moved Nashua couple 19 years ago

EDITOR'S NOTE: Nineteen years ago, Nashua resident Sue Baldwin and her husband, Dick, attended a military service and rites, and the event moved her so much that she wrote a letter to the editor that appeared in the Nashua Reporter in May 2004.

As Memorial Day nears, Baldwin re-submitted her letter because she felt it was "appropriate" for the holiday that we will mark on Monday.

And we couldn't agree more.

My husband, Dick, and I felt privileged to attend the homecoming and military service and rites for Col. Lester Holmes on Saturday, May 22, 2004, at Greenwood Cemetery in Nashua.

Col. Holmes, who was a highly decorated pilot, was shot down in North Vietnam in 1967, and for years, his family lived in limbo not knowing if his status was that of MIA or POW.

One of his sons, Tommy, eulogized his father and gave those in attendance a real insight into this great man — not only as a seasoned and highly-decorated Air Force veteran due to retire in 1968 but also as of a loving husband, father and friend.

The service was conducted by the U.S. Air Force Honor Guard from Offutt Air Force Base of Omaha, Nebraska, and was a most memorable event that included the four-plane flyover that went into the "missing man" formation.

It was truly an honor to be present as this Great American Hero was finally laid to rest.

Sometimes special people touch our lives and hearts, as in this case. Although we did not know Col. Holmes or his family, we felt close to them that day as part of the bigger picture — as part of the American family.

May the Holmes family find peace and comfort in knowing that in last, Col. Holmes is truly home — not only on American soil but in Nashua, Iowa, resting next to his loving wife, Norma.

We are sincerely thankful to have been a part of this special event and cherish the memories of that day.

It is not the best photo I've ever taken; in fact, it's not even close.

It's not sharp. I shot it "against" the light. I did a lot of things we're taught not to do when we first pick up a camera.

But the picture that accompanies this column is — hands down, no questions asked — my favorite Memorial Day photograph I've ever taken.

Maybe it's because the lone solitary veteran in the photo is Ben Ryan, one of the first people to greet me when I moved to New Hampton. Maybe it's because it was taken on Memorial Day, a holiday that holds special significance in my heart. Maybe it's because it was taken in 2020, the year of COVID and the year our veterans held a program that was closed to the public. Maybe it's the salute, one that, at least to my eye, is full of conviction.

Maybe it's all of the above.

But I do know every time I see it, I get a shiver and the goosebumps magically appear on my arms.

It is, for me, Memorial Day — a holiday that is too often confused with Veterans Day. On the latter, we celebrate all those who have served our country. Memorial Day isn't Veterans Day, my father taught me long ago.

Memorial Day is sacred.

It is the day we remember those who died serving our country, those who put the truth behind the words "freedom is not free." Hundreds of thousands of Americans have died in far-off places — Europe, the Pacific, Korea, Vietnam, the Middle East, just to name several — to protect not only our freedoms but also to rid our allies of the

yoke of tyranny.

It was a rare year that Mel Fenske and I didn't attend a Memorial Day observance or two or three or ... you get the idea.

Dad's best friend died on a hill in Korea in 1951. We went to Memorial Day programs to remember the ultimate sacrifice Archie made so long ago. We went to Memorial Day programs to remember all those like Archie.

My father died in 2004. The Memorial Day tradition, though, did not end with his death.

So three years ago, I asked American Legion Fae Stine Post 38's commander, Brian Quirk, if "closed to the public" meant "closed to the media."

Even if it did, he said with that wry smile Brian has given me countless times over the years, would it matter?

Nope.

our local radio station and broadcast by the Tribune on its Facebook page. The veterans were there, but the band wasn't; instead, the music was played via tape.

As I walked around the Veterans Memorial taking pictures, I spotted Ben standing on the road near his car. During Rotary Club meetings years before, he had told me about serving in the armed forces, and almost always, he'd tell me how he was a special agent in the U.S. Army's Counter Intelligence Corps.

Almost always, he'd end the story with a mischievous grin. "The Army put me in intelligence," he said. "Can you believe that?"

But there was no doubt that Ben Ryan was proud of his service. He may not have walked around telling everyone what a patriot he was.

But he was. He, like so many before and after, answered the call of this country. Ben came home, thankfully, but so many didn't.

On that gray, dreary Monday morning back in 2020, we talked for a few minutes, trying to practice this new-fangled thing called social distancing. "I can't miss a Memorial

Day," he said. "Too many fellas didn't come home, and if we can't remember them at least one day a year, it wouldn't say much about us, would it?"

It wouldn't. Ben Ryan did come home and led a wonderfully successful life.

He was a wonderful husband to Mary for decades. He was a fantastic father to Ron, Tom and Ann.

I'm sure he was a great grandfather before he officially received the title.

And he did so much for our community. He wasn't just a stellar businessman, he was the consummate volunteer.

As his obit said, "There wasn't a parade, fish fry, pancake breakfast, or church supper that Ben would miss."

Ben passed away on May 6 at the age of 94.

In some communities, the veterans group that puts on the Memorial Day program not only honor those who died serving our country but also read a list of names of the veterans who passed away in the preceding year.

So on Monday, as I do my job at the Veterans Memorial, I will take a moment to remember Ben Ryan, the man who reminded this old reporter why Memorial Day is much more than just a holiday.

And I'm proud to be an American, where at least I know I'm free

Saluting Our Servicemembers

Memorial Day began as 'Decoration Day'

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2023 will occur on Monday, May 29.

Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

The Birthplace of Memorial Day and Early Observances

The Civil War, which ended in the spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries.

By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. And some records show that one of the earliest Memorial Day commemorations was organized by a group of formerly enslaved people in Charleston, South Carolina less than a month after the Confederacy surrendered in



1865. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo — which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866 — was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

Decoration Day
On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades

who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary

of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Civil War soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held

similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor the dead on separate days until after World War I.

History of Memorial Day
Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War.

But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars, including World War II, The Vietnam War, The Korean War and the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

For decades, Memorial Day continued to be observed on May 30, the date General Logan had selected for the first Decoration Day.

But in 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which estab-

lished Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees. The change went into effect in 1971.

The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

Memorial Day Traditions and Rituals

Cities and towns across the United States host Memorial Day parades each year, often incorporating military personnel and members of veterans' organizations. Some of the largest parades take place in Chicago, New York and Washington, D.C.

Americans also observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries and memorials. Some people wear a red poppy in remembrance of those fallen in war—a tradition that began with a World War I poem.

On a less somber note, many people take weekend trips or throw parties and barbecues on the holiday, perhaps because Memorial Day weekend unofficially marks the beginning of summer.


