## Board moves to appoint sheriff

Supervisors are asking those interested and qualified to apply by Dec. 22

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors moved ahead Monday with its plan to appoint a replacement for retiring Sheriff Marty Hemann.

The board voted 3-0 — both Chairman Matt Kuhn and Jason Byrne were unable to attend the meeting — to publish a "notice of intent to

fill upcoming vacancy in the office of the Chickasaw County sheriff" in this week's Tribune and Nashua Reporter.

Hemann announced last week that he would retire, effective Jan. 19, a

little more than halfway through the term he won in the 2020 election, and on Monday, supervisors learned that they actually can't make the appointment until Hemann leaves office.

"I don't think you think you can appoint someone until the vacancy actually occurs," Laudner said. "The code section says the board may make an appointment to fill the vacancy after the notice is published or after

the vacancy occurs, whichever is later. ...

You can not actually do it until you come into an open session after Marty officially retires."

During a meeting on Nov. 29, Hemann said his chief deputy, Ryan Shawver, had expressed interest in the position, but during the same meeting, Supervisor Jake Hackman said

he wanted to talk to other deputies to see their level of interest in replacing Hemann.

He said Monday that he had talked

## Dance dynasty continues with third straight state crown

New Hampton wins prop title, brings home 'Be Bold' award

They went to state dance and put on one heck of a puppet show.

They came home, for a third year in a row, as state champions.

In other words, the New Hampton dance team dynasty is doing just fine.

Coach Emma Schwickerath's team claimed the Class I prop state title, finished fourth in Class V hip-hop and had three girls perform solos at the Iowa State Dance Drill Team Association's state meet that was held in Des Moines last week.

And they also brought home a coveted "Be Bold Award" — one of just nine given out in a field of 620 teams.

"I can't tell you how proud I am of these girls," Schwickerath said. "They worked so hard, and they were fierce. I love this team with my whole heart."

Schwickerath was a student on New Hampton's state-title hip-hop team back in 2012, and she is now a three-time state champion coach. New Hampton won the hip-hop crown in 2020 and has back-to-back state championships in prop.

A year ago, New Hampton's prop routine centered around basketball; this year, it changed it up and went to Des Moines as "puppets."

"We used a lot of elastic and surgical tubing to get it just right," Schwickerath said, "and you can't believe how far we came from when we first started this past summer."

Her two captains busted out laughing at their coach's comment.

"She's not lying," senior Annala Elliott said. "It was awful ..."

## City Council goes to other 'extreme' during latest meeting

New Hampton city leaders approve budget amendment during two-hour meeting that covers lot of ground

After its last meeting covered just nine minutes, the New Hampton City Council rolled up their sleeves and tackled a busy agenda Monday night.

Add it all up, and the latest council meeting lasted 1 hour and 50 minutes longer than the previous

one.

"There's got to be a middle, right," City Clerk Karen Clemens said with a laugh, "but they had a lot on their plates."

By the time Mayor Bobby Schwickerath gavelled the meeting to a close, the council had approved an amendment to its 2022-23 budget, "terminated" one of the city's urban renewal areas, terminated

one garage lease, approved two others, and held off on making decisions on several issues.

Start with the budget amendment, which was needed because the city's cost for ambulance service will rise dramatically with the start up of Chickasaw County EMS, which is scheduled to begin service on Jan. 1.

In November, New Hampton

voters approved by a large margin using the city's local option sales-tax, commonly referred to as LOST, fund to pay for the increased costs, but the city needed to approve the amendment so that it can spend the \$160,000 it didn't have for ambulance service in the budget it approved last spring.

If elementary school concert is any indication, Kloster definitely realizes her aim

Call her the Energizer Bunny of music directors, because trust us, New Hampton Elementary School music teacher Erica Kloster just keeps on going and going and going and ...

Well, you get the idea.

And if you don't believe us, Exhibit A would be New Hampton Elementary's Winter Music Festival that was held Monday night before a packed house at the district's competition gymnasium.

"The enthusiasm I have is what I take with me everywhere I go," Kloster said. "I have a love for life, this job and these kids, so it's hard not to just be excited especially when we are all together and performing for people!"

"Jesus says that we should all be like little children and I think enthusiasm for everything, love for people, and just excitement for life is one of the traits of children, so if I can get that I'm doing good!"

That excitement was on display during what turned out to be a fun — and yes, cute — concert.

Granted, the age range — kindergartners through fourth-graders — presents some challenges for Kloster, but one of the things she's learned during her teaching career that also included a stint at a Waterloo elementary school is that different age groups have different needs.

"Kindergarten needs you to have lots of energy in order for them to follow what you're doing. They need movement and



they need quick changes so I try to give them that," she said with a smile. "Fourth grade gets to work on longer and more difficult songs, which is super fun too."

Directing a concert featuring five grade levels and hundreds of kids might seem stressful to some, but it helps that Kloster, as she put it, a "go-with-the-flow" person.

"Getting stressed out about things I can't control is absolutely pointless," she said. "The kids feel that stress too, and I want this experience to be all around fun and


enjoyable to them as it ends up being for me."

And in the end, her goal is the same for the shy kindergarten boy as the outgoing fourth-grade girl. She wants them to find a love for music.

"I want the experiences to be unforgettable," she said Tuesday, "and with concerts like last night with so much fun happening, I'm hoping they see that, feel that, because music can be with them their whole life. If I'm having fun, those kids hopefully do too."




## A little primer on the season of Advent

Advent is the season of reflective preparation for the Nativity of Christ at Christmas and the expected return of Christ in the Second Coming.

The season of Advent lasts four Sundays leading up to Christmas. Each year, Advent will begin on the Sunday between Nov. 27 and Dec. 3.

Advent 2022 began on Sunday, Nov. 27 and will end, as it does each year, on Christmas Eve.

#### What Is Advent? History & Meaning

Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think that it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas.

This is part of the story, but there's more to Advent.

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "coming," which translates to the Greek word *parousia*. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1). During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration; originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the

manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of the world. It was not until the Middle Ages that the Advent season was explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas.

#### Advent Symbolism

Advent symbolizes the present situation of the church in these "last days" (Acts 2:17; Hebrews 1:2) as God's people wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate his eternal kingdom. The church is in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament: in exile, waiting and hoping in prayerful expectation for the coming of the Messiah.

Israel looked back to God's past gracious actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on this basis, they called for God once again to act for them. In the same way, the church, during Advent, looks back upon Christ's coming in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when he returns for his people.

#### Advent Liturgy and Practice

To balance the two elements of remembrance and anticipation, the first two Sundays in Advent (through Dec. 16) look forward to Christ's second coming, and the last two Sundays (Dec. 17-24) look backward to remember Christ's first coming.

Over the course of the four weeks, Scripture readings move from passages about Christ's return in judgment to Old Testament passages about the expectation of the coming Messiah to New Testament passages about the announcements of Christ's arrival by John the Baptist and the Angels.

#### Advent Wreaths and Candles

The Advent wreath first appeared in

Germany in 1839. A Lutheran minister working at a mission for children created a wreath out of the wheel of a cart. He placed twenty small red candles and four large white candles inside the ring. The red candles were lit on weekdays, and the four white candles were lit on Sundays.

Eventually, the Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath. Additional decorations, like holly and berries, are sometimes added. Their red color points ahead to Jesus' sacrifice and death. Pinecones can symbolize the new life that Jesus brings through His resurrection.

#### Advent and Christian Life

While Advent is certainly a time of celebration and anticipation of Christ's birth, it is more than that.

It is only in the shadow of Advent that the miracle of Christmas can be fully understood and appreciated, and it is only in the light of Christmas that the Christian life makes any sense.

#### Advent Readings

Advent readings are themed Scripture readings for each Sunday of Advent. The four weeks of Advent are broken down into the themes:

- Hope (or promise)
- Preparation (waiting or prophecy)
- Joy (peace)
- Love (adoration)

One of the beautiful things about the Advent readings above is that they offer churches the opportunity to include both young and old in their services.

## Advice can help when making charitable gifts

Now that it's the holiday season, gifts are probably on your mind — and you might intend for some of those gifts to go to charities. Although your intentions are good, you could be shortchanging both your recipients and yourself with your method of giving. But with some guidance, you can make choices that work well for you and those charitable groups you support.

Of course, you could simply give money to these groups. However, by donating other types of assets, can you increase the value of your gift and gain greater tax benefits, too?

It's certainly possible, but your ability to gain any tax advantages depends somewhat on whether or not you can itemize deductions on your tax return. Due to legislation passed a few years ago that significantly increased the standard deduction, many people may no longer be itemizing. But if you still itemize, you can generally deduct up to 60% of your adjusted gross income for cash donations to IRS-qualified charities.

Another contribution strategy involves donating other assets, such as stocks. You could donate stocks directly to a charitable group, but you might gain more benefits by making an irrevocable contribution to a donor-advised fund (DAF). Again, assuming you can itemize, you can deduct the full fair-market value of the asset, up to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income, and your contributions can be invested in mutual funds or similar vehicles. The contributions have the opportunity for growth, and distributions to the charity are tax-free. You can then decide, on your own timetable, which IRS-qualified charitable groups you would like to receive the money. Furthermore, if you donate stocks that have risen in value, you won't incur potential capital gains taxes that you would have when you eventually sold the stocks. These taxes can be considerable, especially

to several deputies, none of whom expressed a desire to be appointed.

Still, Hackman said he felt that it was worth opening up the position to gauge interest from outside Chickasaw County, although Laudner did point out that to be eligible for appointment, a potential candidate would need to live in Chickasaw County for at least 60 days.

"If those candidates are the best candidate," Hackman said, "you won't know that until you interview them."

Laudner said the board has options and wouldn't be left without a sheriff because state law requires the chief deputy to be the interim sheriff.

"So if someone from Plymouth County or Cass County applied, they could come up and interview with you and if you thought they were the best candidate, then they're going to have to move here and you're going to have to wait at least 60 days after they relocate here before you can appoint them," Laudner said. "But you

do have the safety valve in place that the chief deputy assumes the office as soon as there is a vacancy, which would be Jan. 19, so it's not like you're going to go without someone."

The county attorney reminded the board that it can only appoint candidates who meet the requirements, i.e., be at least 21 years of age, be a certified peace officer and not have been convicted of a felony.

The other two supervisors, Steve Breitbach and Tim Zoll, agreed with Hackman to at least gauge interest with the position and voted to file the notice.

Supervisors set a deadline of 4 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 22, for those interested to submit their names to the Chickasaw County Auditor's Office.

The news, though, that the vacancy can't be filled until it actually occurs means that the new Board of Supervisors — which will include Scott Cerwinski and Travis Suckow, who are replacing Zoll and Byrne on the board in January — will have a vote when it comes to selecting the county's next sheriff.

Board of Supervisors acknowledge hiring of 19 employees for ambulance service

Come Monday, Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson won't be the only employee of the county-owned ambulance service that begins operation on Jan. 1.

That's because the Board of Supervisors acknowledged the hiring of six paramedics and 13 EMTs during Monday's meeting and all 19 new employees will begin work next week.

Chickasaw County Advisory Committee

member Bridget Edson told board members that all 19 new employees are currently classified as part-time employees, but that Knutson has said that three of the new hires will move to full-time status when the service actually begins answering calls.

Edson said Knutson and the advisory committee wanted to get the new employees hired so that they can begin training and be ready to go on Jan. 1.

The paramedics hired included Jeremy Davis, Barry Koehn, Joel Koehn, Bo Gaudineer, Jessica Durnan and Josh

Powers. EMTs who will begin work next week include Brannon Anderson, Brock Schmidt, Carly Clinton, Tyler Sedivy, Nickolaus Jurgensen, Edson, Anthony Jeffrey, Sharon Robert, Garrett Raum, Adalberto Uribe Vazquez, Dawn Heying, Tami Pries and Ed Haisly.

Edson told board members that she expected Knutson, who was picking up the county's "loaner ambulance" in Cedar Rapids on Monday, to have more hires to acknowledge at next week's board meeting.

## City agrees will lease garage space to county for ambulances

"but we'll have to see what the next six months bring."

City leaders also approved terminating the Melrose East Urban Renewal Area, but council members had to wait for Katie Fisher to arrive from the New Hampton Elementary School Holiday Music Festival.

Because ending an urban renewal area requires a super majority, five votes, and because Councilman Joe Denner was not at Monday's meeting, Fisher's vote was crucial for both repealing the ordinance and waiving the second and third readings, which the council both did on 5-0 votes.

Clemens said the urban renewal area has had all of its tax-increment financing agreements completed, and the issue came up because a property owner wanted to combine two lots, one of which is just a small strip of land in the TIF area, for

the purpose of selling.

"If we keep the area — and there's no reason to do so — you can't combine the lots," she said.

Also on Monday, the City Council agreed to allow the Chickasaw County Ambulance Council, which currently rents two garage stalls for the current ambulance service, to terminate the lease as of Dec. 31 despite not giving the required 180-days notice.

The council then approved a lease with the county-owned ambulance service, beginning Jan. 1, for the same rental fee — \$1,250 a month — that it was charging the Ambulance Council.

Council members also approved a temporary lease that will allow the county to house its two ambulances for free in city garages once they arrive. The first will go in a

garage at City Hall that is used for Christmas decorations while the second would be at the Parks and Recreation Department garage in Mikkelsen Park.

"Obviously, the Christmas lights are not in there right now," Clemens said, "and it was a way, we can help out for the short term."

But council members held off on a request by the New Hampton Fire Department to increase wages for volunteers from \$15 to \$17 per hour and also did not act on a bid for cleaning services.

The lone bid was submitted by Darcy Fairholm, who was requesting \$25 per hour to provide cleaning and custodial service to city buildings like the Community Center, the library and fire station. Council members, instead will seek new bids with a pay range of between \$16 and \$20 per hour.



comments made at the County Board of Supervisor meetings about the county not having responsibility for their portion (40%) of the 28E agreement. Mitchell also reminded everyone that this agreement was based on respect and trust that everyone would participate. Mitchell believes that an advisory council should remain for a platform to communicate between the cities and the Board of Supervisors regarding EMS.

McGrath advised the council that the last months payment hasn't been made yet, Kuhn agreed and advised that this number is after two months of garage rent and one payment to Northeast Iowa EMS.

When Kuhn spoke with (Jim) Ashley on the phone, Ashley felt that this council could not disband until proof of the new county owned ambulance is in service.

Kuhn advised the council that the city is working with the City of New Hampton to rent the same garage space that CCAC is renting for ambulance parking, but would like the CCAC garage lease to terminate so the county can start their lease agreement on January 1, 2023.

Mitchell reiterated the need for a platform of communication between the cities and the Board of Supervisors.

Dettmer questioned what the county's risk is if all they are going to do is run this business off of what the cities pay in, he was under the understanding





# Trojan boys split pair of UIC games

Turkey Valley wins 'ugly' against rival before falling to North Fayette Valley

John Izer called his team's win over rival South Winneshiek last week Tuesday "ugly."

Twenty four turnovers committed by his ball club will have a way of eliciting that response from the Trojan boys basketball coach.

It was a win nonetheless for Turkey Valley, as the Trojans nipped the Warriors, 52-51.

"He's one of our motors," said Izer.

TV senior guard Noah Hanson collected eight points, distributed nine assists and came up with six steals.

Conversely, in a 42-35 loss at North Fayette Valley on Friday, Izer thought his team played its best game of the year – despite shooting 23 percent from the field. TV only turned the ball

over 13 times.

"We played smart. It was our best game of the season – win, lose or draw," said Izer. "They're a big team and we rebounded with them. We played hard. We were there. We just can't get that round ball to go through that round hoop right now. It's that simple."

Hanson paced the Trojans' offensive attack with 15 points and 11 rebounds.

TV's leading returning scorer from a year ago – senior Calvin Bodensteiner – has yet to get on track early on in 2022-2023. He scored five points against South Winn and two against NNFV.

"I rode the bus home with Calvin and I point blank said, 'help me help you,'" said Izer. "I said, 'you've got to be there.'"

## Wartburg playoff ride continues for NHHS grad

Knights pick up Division III playoff win over Aurora; Winter prepares to take team where it has never gone before

The run continues down the road from New Hampton for a former Chickasaw, and now, Chris Winter has led Wartburg football into uncharted territory.

The 2000 New Hampton High School graduate who is in his second year as the head coach of the Knights is headed to Ohio this weekend, and

he's bringing his undefeated football team with him.

"It's been crazy," Winter said Monday, two days after the Knights beat Aurora 45-17 to advance to the semifinals of the Division III playoffs for the first time in school history. "To have been a part of this program as a player and coach for more than 20 years and now to be part of team that is raising the bar, it's just been an incredible run. But I know our guys

aren't satisfied. If we've gone this far, why not go to the national title game?"

After all, this has been a historic season for the Knights. They have won a school-record 13 games. That win over Aurora on Saturday came on a cold, blustery day at Walston-Hoover Stadium and marked the first time Wartburg had ever hosted a Division III quarterfinal game. And now the Knights are on their way to a semifinal

date with Mount Union this weekend.

For a while on Saturday, though, the dream season looked to be in jeopardy as Aurora raced out to a 10-point first quarter lead, but Wartburg righted the proverbial ship with a 21-point second quarter, capped off by a Parker Rochford 70-yard interception return, and pulled away in the second half.

"It took us a minute for us to get going," Winter said before adding with a laugh, "well, maybe more

than a minute, but our guys responded pretty well. It didn't take long for us to get back to our game plan and get it going."

The victory will take the Knights to Alliance, Ohio, where they will meet
