## Supervisors reverse course on EMS building

Board offers former ambulance provider \$350,000 for his building at intersection of Prospect and Water

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors performed a complete U-turn Monday morning when it unanimously approved making an offer to purchase an existing building to house Chickasaw County EMS.

After meeting in closed session for almost an hour, board members, on a

5-0 vote, approved a motion to direct County Attorney David Laudner to draft an offer agreement for the property located at 204 E. Prospect Street in the amount of \$350,000.

That building is owned by Jeremy McGrath, whose Chickasaw Ambulance Service provided EMS services to the county until Chickasaw County EMS began its service on Jan. 1.

Monday's vote came a week after the board voted 3-2 to have Laudner prepare an option to purchase agreement for a building located at 259 E. Prospect St. that is owned by Thronson and Thronson Inc.

McGrath had the building constructed in 2017 to house a transport business he was hoping to start but also with the idea that it might one day become home to his ambulance

service.

He had offered to sell the building to the county this past fall as part of a proposal that also included his ambulances and equipment, but after the county decided to purchase new ambulances, McGrath said his interest in selling the building diminished.

"They contacted me months ago

[about just the building], and I wasn't really interested in selling," McGrath said. "At the time, I wasn't interested."

## New Horizon director ready for her first big celebration

Zweibohmer's first Heartland Days set to kick off on Friday

The "butterflies" still haven't materialized for New Horizons-Chamber Director Liz Zweibohmer; instead, she's as excited as ever to help New Hampton throw its biggest party of the year this weekend.

Heartland Days kicks off its two-day run Friday evening with its parade in the downtown area and "Family Night" at Mikkelsen Park, and Saturday's schedule is chock full of events at the park.

The 2023 version of New Hampton's annual celebration may not be Zweibohmer's first — after all, she grew up in the city and is a 2014 graduate of New Hampton High School — but it will be the first one that she will lead as New Horizon's director.

"I know last month I said I'd probably be more nervous as we got closer," Zweibohmer said Sunday afternoon, "and I really thought I would. But here it is Heartland Days weekend and I am as excited as a kid on Christmas morning."

"I think a big reason for that is we have so many people who have really stepped up. We can still use more volunteers, don't get me wrong, but save for a few little things, we're ready to go."

Friday evening's activities include the parade at 6; an appearance by The Dweebs, the band that will take the Mikkelsen Park Band Shell stage at 7:30; and the fireworks show that should begin around 10.

The parade route remains the same as it has for years as it will make its way north up Walnut Avenue, turns to the east on Main Street, heads south on Water Avenue and ends near Trinity Lutheran Church.

Saturday's events kick off with a host of morning activities — including a 3-on-3 basketball tournament, the Maker's Market, the CWC 5K Fun Run and Walk, the New Hampton FFA Kiddy Tractor Pull and the Show and Shine Car Show.

The afternoon schedule includes the Little Miss Heartland Pageant, a cornhole ("bags" for those who might be wondering what "cornhole" is) tournament, and a Tae Kwon Do demonstration.

Live music will be provided by New Hampton's own Madison Kolbet at 1 p.m. and the "happy hour" that begins at 4 p.m. will feature musician Bruce Day. The celebration will wrap up with the band Rhino taking the stage from 8 to 11:30 p.m.

## Latest weekly USDA crop condition report shows why drought concerns are growing in Northeast Iowa

This was spotty with a capital S.

Officially, New Hampton received .55 inches of rain last Friday evening when a thunderstorm that produced strong winds and some hail hit the city,

yet just a few miles to the west, not a drop fell.

In other words, it was a frustrat-

ing evening for area farmers, who are starting to grow concerned about the worsening drought conditions in the area.

According to the latest report from the U.S. Drought Monitor, which was released last Thursday, much of Chickasaw County is "abnormally dry" while the southeast corner of the county is now classified as experienc-

ing "moderate drought." Almost all of Bremer County is also experiencing moderate drought; in fact, only three counties — Worth, Mitchell and Howard — in the entire state were not listed on the most recent report.

Friday's rainfall came after a tenth

of an inch fell on New Hampton Thursday. It marked the first time any rain had fallen on Chickasaw County's

largest city since May 14.

New Hampton received 2.19 inches of rain in May. It marked the second straight month the city had received less than half of its normal precipitation.

The latest USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service's Iowa

## Family keeps Dairy Days tradition alive

Staker's sons say they enjoy returning to hometown to run event that meant so much to their father

Last Thursday night, Linda Staker watched from the sidelines as kids ranging from 3-years-old to 12-years-old competed in sack races, the shoekick, the milk chug, the crab walk, and more, across the field named for her late husband.

And she couldn't help but wonder what it would be like if he — her late husband, Steve Staker — was still here.

"It's kind of bittersweet; I was standing here looking around thinking about, you know, if Steve was still here, but it's pretty awesome that the tradition continues..."

But even as she spoke those words under the setting sun, one of her grandchildren came up beside her, wondering about some of the weekends' activities. Across the grass, two of her sons, Tyler and Shane, were chatting with families after wrapping up the final Street Sports race of the evening.

Linda isn't sure if anyone headed up the Dairy Days tradition before her hus-

band, but they first came to Fredericksburg in 1968. After that, Steve either started or continued this Dairy Days staple which Tyler and Shane have continued since their father's passing in 2020.

"It means so much 'cause my husband did this, you know, for so many years," Linda said. "It was his thing kind of and now two of my boys are helping do it. It's so fun when the grandkids can come back and do it, you know, run the races ..."

Tyler said that his kids get really excited about coming to Street Sports each year.

"Because I remember when I was doing it when I was younger," Tyler said. "I remember the milk race and doing all the activities so it is fun to see ... my kids come back for it and they get really excited for it as well. You know whenever they hear ... 'Dairy Days' and 'Street Sports' they start getting out in the backyard and they practice their shoe kick, you know, getting ready for all the fun activities and the races."

After so many years of 40-yard dashes, wheelbarrow races, and milk chugs, it's hard for the Stakers to pick a favorite.

"Oh my gosh, just all of them, I don't think I have a favorite, every one is fun," Linda said. "...Yeah I don't know, I can't pick out one because they're all fun, you know, just the races

are fun, the shoekick's fun, the wheelbarrow, the crab race—it's all fun."

Shane would have to settle on the three-legged race for a couple of reasons.

"Probably the three-legged race. I thought it was pretty fun. It was good to work as a team, find someone you could get in sync with."

But he also loves watching the wheelbarrow race.

"I think probably the most challenging one that's probably the most entertaining one to watch is I would say the wheelbarrow 'cause they're either shoving them on their face or they're falling over top of them," Shane said with a laugh.

Tyler is a fan of the milk chug, but he thinks they have gotten a little too relaxed on the rules since he was a kid.

"And at that time you either had to drink all the milk or you had to wear all the milk, but it had to be gone before you could run back. So now we're getting a little softer I think."

His daughter, Avery Staker, likes the shoe kick because it's such an uncommon activity. Her cousin, Lucy Cook, enjoys the 40 yard dash, but both of them agreed that their favorite memory of Street Sports is the ice cream handed out at the end.

For Shane and Tyler, not only is it fun to see their kids take part, but being back on the field

also brings fond memories of the times spent readying it for Street Sports with their father.

"Yeah so when I was younger I would come out and help line the field with him and then, you know, help get it set up," Tyler said, "...and then when we were in Cedar Rapids he would come back for it every year and make sure it was lined and some years I'd come back and help him out."

"Oh yeah, we had the screwdrivers and the rope and we had to measure," Shane remembered. "He did a better job than we did because he took a 2+ b2 = c2 and made sure everything was [measured]. Tyler and I just kind of [said] 'Yeah looks good enough,' that's pretty good.' So yeah I remember doing all that with him. It was always very hot it seemed like but it was good."

For the boys, Linda, and the rest of their family, it's about continuing the tradition that Steve Staker began.

"Yeah it's just nice to come back and carry on the tradition ... just nice to come back and put this on for the community and for the kids," Tyler said,

"and Dad always, you know, was really generous with his time in regards to the community and activities for the kids, so just fun to come back and carry on that tradition."

"I mean I did this since I was a kid so a lot of nostalgia," Shane said. "Just I think everybody loved my dad, so it's fun to come back and have people thank us for just showing up and supporting Dairy Days and the kids events, and [I] just feel honored to be here and appreciative of everyone's kind words."

Along with the family's desire to carry on this part of their father's legacy, Tyler said he is glad the community continues to support it as well.

"I'm happy to see that it, you know, it hasn't just passed when dad passed," he said. "It wasn't like 'oh let's just be done with this' and, you know, the community still comes out to support it. It's just, it's cool to see that."

## Should You Consider 401(K) Loans or Withdrawals

At some point, you may have more money in your 401(k) than in any other investment. And even though your 401(k) is intended for your retirement, you may one day think you have to tap into your account early — but should you? And if you do, how should you go about it?

If it's possible to avoid taking money from your 401(k) before you retire, you probably should do so. You could spend 25 or more years in retirement, and you'll need to pay for those years, so you may want to look for alternatives to your 401(k). If you've built an emergency fund containing several months' worth of living expenses in cash or cash equivalents, you could use some of this money. If you have a Health Savings Account (HSA), you could use it to pay for qualified medical expenses. Or you could sell some of your taxable investments, rather than going into your tax-deferred 401(k).

But if you have determined that you must look at your 401(k) plan to meet a short-term funding need, you'll want to carefully consider how to go about it. You typically have two main choices: loans or withdrawals.

For plans that allow loans, employees can generally borrow up to 50% of the vested amount of their 401(k)s, up to a maximum of \$50,000 within a 12-month period. Administrative fees may apply, and interest will be charged, but it will be added back to the 401(k) account as part of the loan repayments. Except when they're used for a home purchase, loans must be repaid within five years, with equal payments made at least quarterly, unless payments are allowed to be paused temporarily. If you leave the company or don't repay the loan according to the agreement, the loan balance will likely be treated as a taxable distribution.

Now, let's consider withdrawals. For 401(k) plans that

allow current employees to make withdrawals, the withdrawal requests are usually considered either hardship or non-hardship. To qualify for a hardship withdrawal, you must demonstrate an immediate and heavy financial need to pay for certain expenses, including a home purchase, college, a medical issue or other specified costs, and your withdrawal is limited to the amount necessary to meet the need. Non-hardship withdrawals can typically be taken for any purpose but usually are not granted until you're 59½ or older.

Unlike with a loan, a hardship withdrawal can't be repaid, while a non-hardship withdrawal can usually only be repaid by rolling over the amount to an IRA within 60 days. But the bigger issue may be taxes. If you withdraw funds from your 401(k), any previously untaxed money is generally taxed as ordinary income and a 10% penalty will apply if you're younger than 59½, unless you qualify for an exception. Plus, your 401(k) plan typically must withhold 20% of the withdrawal for taxes, so you'd have to take an even larger withdrawal to meet your needs.

Before embarking on a 401(k) loan or withdrawal, you may want to consult with a financial professional and your tax advisor. Taking money from your 401(k) is a big move, so make sure you know everything that's involved.

## Building owner: 'We're close' on deal with county

But he said as time went on, he felt his building would be a natural fit for the county-owned service that has 28E agreements to provide ambulance services to the cities of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

McGrath said that when the building that has four garage stalls was constructed, it was built with the idea of being able to add "living quarters" at some time in the future and that he believes it will be a benefit to Chickasaw County EMS.

"They need a home, and they need it downtown," McGrath said, "and my belongings don't have to be downtown."

McGrath was asked if he would accept the county's offer.

"Undecided," he said. "We're close."

Currently, Chickasaw County EMS is renting space from the city of New Hampton at the Police Department for its ambulances and its crews are housed at a rental home in the 200 block of South Walnut Avenue, which is a little more than three blocks from the rigs.



# City Council puts off decision on stoplights

New Hampton leaders discuss possibility of removing Main Street lights at Walnut, Chestnut and Locust avenues

The New Hampton City Council tapped the brakes, at least for now, on fixing three controllers for the stoplights that are on the city's Main Street.

Council members Monday discussed the issue at length and several ideas were brought up — ranging from putting new controllers in two stoplights on Linn Avenue, as well as those on Main Street, to removing the stoplights on Main Street at Walnut, Chestnut and Locust avenues.

"It was a good discussion, and the council wants to know their options before they proceed," City Clerk Karen

Clemens said. "We talked about a lot of different ways to proceed, and until they get more information, I think the council members feel like it's best to wait."

The city received a bid of \$5,626 for each of the three controllers that would be needed to "synchronize" the lights on Walnut, Chestnut and Locust, and Clemens told council members that the city has about \$14,000 in its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) account that hasn't been designated to be spent.

New Hampton Fire Chief Toby Schwickerath and one of his officers, Mark Andrea, asked the council to consider putting controllers in two

lights on Linn Avenue, citing safety concerns for both firefighters and motorists when department members are answering a call.

The controllers allow fire personnel to turn stoplights "red" with a touch of a button, but council members were unsure the city could afford the additional \$11,200 to replace five controllers.

Council members also brought up just taking out three of the city's stoplights, but to do that, the city would need to receive the OK from the Iowa Department of Transportation because Main Street in the downtown area is also state highway 24.

"It came down to do we have enough

information to make a good decision," Clemens said, "and the council felt they didn't and decided to hold off on making any decisions."

Also on Monday, council members discussed the issue of dead, dying and diseased trees on private property within city limits.

Under the city code, the city has the right to take down a tree if it creates "an imminent threat of harm or damage" and council members discussed the issue of how the city should proceed.


"We're mostly concerned about the safety of residents and the property damage that can occur if a tree falls," Clemens said. "The city will take out

trees if they're in the right-of-way, but it's the responsibility of the property owners to remove trees if they're not in the right-of-way."

No final decisions were made, but the council will ask the city's Tree Board to come up with a rubric the city can use to determine which trees present the most danger. Council members also said that they would consider giving residents up to two years to remove dead trees before the city would get involved.

"We know tree services are busy, getting them is really difficult," Clemens said. "We don't want to create a burden, but we also want to lookout for the safety of our residents, too."

## Area farm fields could definitely use a 'drink'

Crop Progress and Condition Report, which was released on Monday, painted a not-so-bright picture.

In the Northeast District that includes Chickasaw County, 9 percent of topsoil moisture is "very short" and 47 percent is "short" while subsoil moistures aren't much better, with 41 percent "short" and 3

percent "very short."

As one area farmer, Dave Leichtman, put it Monday morning, area fields could "use a drink."

The start of June has provided warmer-than-normal temperatures to start June — Tuesday marked the ninth-straight day in which temperatures had topped out in the 80s — which hasn't helped dry soils.

There was a chance of rain on Tuesday

night, but the rest of the work week looks dry but thunderstorms are in the forecast for Friday night and Saturday morning.

Temperatures will at least moderate somewhat as highs will be in the 70s today (Thursday), the lower 80s on Friday and Saturday and in the mid-70s on Sunday. And for those who want to give their air conditioners a break, the good news is that lows will drop into the 50s over the weekend.

## Floyd County commission: Go with AMR

Ambulance group to recommend city, county renew, waiting for an answer from Nashua

The Floyd County Ambulance Commission will recommend that the Charles City Council and the county Board of Supervisors approve a new three-year contract with AMR for ambulance service throughout the county.

What isn't known yet is whether Nashua will be part of that contract.

The commission at its meeting this week voted to recommend approving one of two different contracts. The first splits the annual cost to subsidize AMR service three ways, with Charles City and Floyd County each paying 45% of the cost and Nashua paying 10%.

The other version splits the cost between Charles City and Floyd County, 50-50.

The Floyd County Medical Center Board of Trustees has already agreed to pay \$100,000 toward the first year subsidy, reducing the other parties' costs, but the trustees have not

committed to additional years.

Regardless of how it is funded, the subsidy cost for the first year of the new contract with AMR would be \$415,000, more than double the \$200,000 subsidy cost in the third year of the current three-year contract that ends June 30. Years two and three of the new contract would see that cost increase by 3% each year, to \$427,450 in year two and 440,273.50 in year three.

Splitting the remaining \$315,000 for the first year 45-45-10 would mean total payments of \$141,750 each for Charles City and the county, and \$31,500 for Nashua.

If Charles City and the county have to split the total subsidy between themselves the cost would be \$157,500 each, plus the \$100,000 from the medical center.

John Ott, the Nashua city clerk, was at the county Ambulance Commission meeting Tuesday evening, and said the Nashua City Council had not yet decided whether to be a party to the new AMR contract.

Nashua is in the process of forming its own ambulance service, but it could require additional support from area ambulance services such as AMR or Chickasaw County EMS.

Ott said the Nashua council is still weighing the difference between signing the AMR contract and calling other ambulance services under mutual aid agreements when needed.

"Once we have our own service we have no idea how much other services will be needed," he said, adding that finding people to staff the Nashua ser-

vice during weekdays will likely be the most difficult.

Charles City Police Chief Hugh Anderson, a member of the Ambulance Commission, said that sounded like the Nashua council was looking for a way to get additional service without having to pay for it.

Charles City Administrator Steve Diers, an advisor to the commission, said it would be nice if the commission could decide that night to make a recommendation to the City Council and Board of Supervisors, because the current contract will expire at the end of June.

Dawn Staudt, station supervisor for AMR, said there have been probably 20 to 30 calls into Nashua since the first of January, when a six-month agreement began where Nashua paid \$5,000 each (\$10,000 total) to Charles City and Floyd County to be included in AMR service.

When asked where those patients were transported, Staudt said many of them requested to go to Waverly because that's where they usually get medical care.

County Supervisor Jim Jorgensen, the chair of the commission, asked why people would be transported to Waverly when the Floyd County Medical Center was offering to chip in \$100,000 toward the Floyd County ambulance service cost.

Dawnett Willis is the CEO of the medical center and a member of the Ambulance Commission, and she commented, "I was wondering the same thing."

Staudt said the state guideline is that patients be transported to the closest facility with the appropriate level of care. Patients can request to go somewhere else, but they are told that if it's farther than some other appropriate facility, then their insurance will not cover the cost of the extra mileage, which can be significant.

In the end the commission voted to recommend both contracts to the Charles City Council and Floyd County Board of Supervisors, with those bodies signing whichever contract is appropriate based on whether Nashua wants to be part of it or not.


"Nashua needs to make a decision," said Diers.

One of the changes in the proposed new contract compared to the current contract is that either party can get out of the contract with 180 days notice. The current contract required a payment to AMR if the city and county would have terminated early.

The city and county are still looking for alternatives to AMR service because of the rapidly increasing subsidy cost. One option would be to start a public ambulance service, but funding to start that could depend on successful passage of an emergency medical services levy in the county.

County residents turned that levy down in the last election, in November 2022. Floyd County supervisors have started the process of again declaring EMS an essential service in the county, which could lead to another EMS levy vote in the coming election this November.

festivities.

As a father, he and his wife, Mary, got their children a new outfit and new pajamas every year for the town's celebration. As a grandfather, he always made sure his grandkids had tickets for the midway activities.

And as a Fredericksburg resident for many years, during Dairy Days he always had food ready to share from the porch and garage of his and Mary's Main Street home—from ice cream cones to his famous malts.

"He put a lot of heart and soul into it," his granddaughter Lucky Franzen-Ackerman said.

Franzen was a man who loved his job, his family, his Fredericksburg, and, of course, his Dairy Days. And this year marked the first one he had missed in close to half a century.

Franzen passed away from leukemia on May 25, but his family and his town made sure that he was not forgotten after his years of Dairy Days' service and celebration.

His daughter, Lauri Ackerman, and Lucky, who is her daughter, sat outside his home on Main with an empty seat in between them. Only, the seat wasn't completely empty—within the folding chair was Larry Franzen memorabilia, from his sunglasses to a "World's Greatest Dad" baseball cap to a collection of can koozies. And of course, a piece of candy.

His town honored him during Street Sports on Thursday evening at Steve Staker Field. Franzen worked with Staker and used to take care of the field. After Staker passed away, Franzen and Lauri's nephew, Blake Steege worked together to line the field in his honor.

Now it's his family's and his town's turn to do the same for him.

"He would be so honored that they made that banner and thought of him," Lauri said, "like he's the VIP."

Franzen had been looking forward to this Dairy Days in particular because of the return of the tall slide to the midway. He and Mary have two

great-grandsons that are two years old and almost two and he couldn't wait to go down the giant slide with them like he had done with his grandkids in the past.

When Franzen worked various jobs, including for Harvey Drewlow, before becoming a custodian for 27 years, Lauri remembers how he would come home from work as fast as he could during Dairy Days so that he could take her and her siblings on the tilt-a-whirl and bumper cars. He would even sneak down and come back with a surprise funnel cake for Mary.

When they moved to their house on Main he was so proud of their ideal view of the parade route. His family remembers how he was always "drowning in stuff" at the parade because of how many people he knew who were in it.

"He was a guy that knew everybody," Lauri said, "and I don't know anyone that didn't love him."

Mary said that they could barely go to other towns, even Waterloo, without him running into someone he knew in almost every store.

Yet, Franzen always made sure those kids who weren't so popular in the schools knew they had a friend in "the candy man." His family remembers how he would find ways to get those kids out of class to help him with various tasks.

"He could make fun out of nothing," Lauri remembers. "He could walk in a room and make anybody smile, and have a nickname for anybody, and make the worst situation better."


She also remembers how teachers would say the attitude of the room shifted when he walked through the door. Franzen knew how to make anything fun and Dairy Days was certainly one of those moments.

"He looked forward to Dairy Days," Lauri said.





# Trojans stick together, get first win of the year

versus Class 4A Decorah where the Trojans lost by 14 runs. Then came a 12-0 setback to Springville. No. 4 North Linn topped TV by that same score a day later at home last week.

Turkey Valley (1-7, 1-1) took on four teams – Don Bosco, Independence, No. 12 Clarksville and traditional power Charles City over the course of the two-day weekend tournament at North Fayette Valley in West Union this past Friday and Saturday. The final scores weren't pretty and didn't go in TV's favor.

But with eight seniors on his roster from an 18-8 squad from a year ago – Hackman was confident his team could win two against the Bulldogs. That didn't happen, but now that victory No. 1 is on the board, don't count these Trojans out quite yet.

"I expected to win two tonight. The first game we just didn't come out with urgency. We were kind of going through the motions," said Hackman. "It feels good to finally get one – hopefully we build on it."

TV is tasked with replacing all-conference pitcher Josie Weber, who graduated last summer. Weber was a starter inside the circle since her eighth-grade year.

"Our pitchers have come a long, long way from the beginning of the season," said Maici Weber, Josie's younger sister that catches and is also one of TV's best hitters.

Weber smashed her first

home run of the season in the bottom of the seventh in Game 1 against MFL. That blast could well have set the tone for the nightcap.

"Having to go from a loss to the next game you have to go into a reset mind and think about it completely differently," Weber said. "Our team definitely has a good way about taking a bad situation and turning it into a funnier or humorous one."

Weber's other older sister, Halle Weber, also pitches. She pitched the opener and encountered a rough patch in the later innings. But the Trojan junior is just getting warmed up in the circle after overcoming an early-season injury.

"It's definitely hard to lose so many games by so much," said Morris. "I think we've done a really good job of pushing through it and having the right mindset."

Morris allowed just two hits and struck out three batters in her four innings of work versus MFL (3-9, 3-1). She said the unspoken bond between her and Weber is strengthening.

"We just had really good communication tonight. I feel like we have really good chemistry tonight, which is something I felt we might have been lacking," said Morris. "We do make good plays. It really does boost us a lot."

TV senior second baseman Alison Leibold smashed two doubles in the opener vs. MFL and came away with three hits. Leibold is batting .450 through eight games this summer. Olivia Snyder, another senior

complete-game win that saw New Hampton turn back Decorah, 5-4. She also walked six batters, but the Chickasaw defense had her back and only committed one error in the nightcap that ended around 10:45 p.m.

"Jenna pitched phenomenally for having her first pitching appearance of the season," said Hofmeister. "She did her job."


The Vikings were down 5-3 and had a runner on third with one down in the top of the seventh in Game 2, but could only narrow the margin to a single run.

"In my eyes it was kind of a game to see where we're going to be at — at least this early in the season" said Hofmeister. "On paper, Decorah's probably the best team in the conference. They lost one girl last year and return everybody."

NH second baseman/shortstop Kandice Eggerichs collected two hits in the nightcap triumph. Along with Rosonke, those are NH's two seniors on the roster.

"They're the perfect examples that you would want from seniors. They're always positive throughout practices and games," said Hofmeister. "The ones I can always count on. They're great leaders and they're great defensive players. They've also brought their hitting into play this year. That's awesome to see."

Charles City entered last Thursday night's home contest with the Chickasaws sporting just one win in seven tries. The Comets weren't stuck on one win for very long as CC thumped NH, 10-3, and capitalized on 10 Chickasaw errors. "We didn't play like ourselves

and what we're capable of," said Hofmeister. "Obviously, I give Charles City the credit of winning. They are not a 1-6 team. They are Charles City softball and they're good."

Weigel allowed seven hits and 10 runs (four earned). She walked five and struck out three. She is 1-2 on the year with a 2.33 ERA. She has struck out 15 and also walked that many batters.

"She's our best pitcher. She's the backbone of our team when it comes to that position for us," said Hofmeister.

NH sophomore Cora Schwickerath doubled in the CC game and came away with two hits. So did Eggerichs, as she went 2-2 at the dish. Rosonke and sophomore left fielder Jackie Pickar also doubled in the loss.

Hofmeister talked about the Charles City game, which saw the Comets rack up 15 stolen

bases and were not thrown out.

"It was our first moment of going through adversity," said Hofmeister. "We did a little bit through Decorah, but it's not like we're down five or six runs throughout the game. I think having a game like this early in the season is good for us."

Schwickerath — who caught last year behind the plate and also roamed the outfield — should be Hofmeister's everyday third baseman, a position he said is one of the most challenging in the game of softball.

Schwickerath leads the team in average through four games with a .533 clip at the plate. Eggerichs is batting .462.

New Hampton's eighth-grade starters are centerfielder Sophie Glaser, Crawford at first base and designated hitter Ava Leichtman.

"That eighth-grade group is very talented as a whole," said Hofmeister. "As an eighth-grad-

er coming into a varsity team — it's not easy. It's a big jump. Being around them everyday — you know their work ethic."

New Hampton played at Waukon in an NEIC double-header on Tuesday, then it was off to take on the Nashua-Plainfield Huskies on the road Wednesday evening. NH hosts Waverly-Shell Rock on Friday night at Mikkelsen Park.

"Obviously going into the season we didn't know what to expect with girls not going out and what not," said Hofmeister. "These first two weeks when practice started was kind of all about finding who would fit well with the varsity team and if they could step up."



## Chickasaws stay in the hunt

New Hampton sweeps Crestwood, splits with Decorah during a 4-1 week

There is no truth to the rumor that guys like Hawkeye, Trapper John, B.J. and Col. Potter are hanging around the New Hampton baseball team's dugout.

Those fellas, of course, are characters from the long-ago television series M\*A\*S\*H\* but then again, if they were keeping tabs on New Hampton, it would be understandable.

Yet, despite a rash of early season injuries, the Chickasaws — after splitting a doubleheader with Decorah that was played over two days — were 9-3 overall, 4-2 in the Northeast Iowa Conference and ranked 10th in Class 2A by the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association.

"I'm incredibly proud of this group of boys," New Hampton coach Cory McDonald said after his team beat Decorah 7-0 before dropping the nightcap 7-3. "We're doing this with a torn UCL, a pulled hamstring, a guy on crutches and now seven stitches. But these guys just go back to work, step in where they are needed and win ballgames."

The doubleheader with Decorah — one that started

Friday, was interrupted by a thunderstorm and completed Saturday — ended a 4-1 week for the Chickasaws. New Hampton blew away Crestwood 15-0 and 10-3 on Tuesday and then routed Denver 12-2 on Thursday.

The split with Decorah left the Chickasaws just a game behind Waverly-Shell Rock and the Vikings in the NEIC standings heading into a key NEIC week for New Hampton. The Chickasaws played host to the Go-Hawks on Tuesday, have a home doubleheader with Waukon on Friday and travel to Waverly on Monday.

Still, heading into the week with a 9-3 record and an appearance in the state rankings for the first time since 2019 left McDonald feeling pretty good about his Chickasaws.

New Hampton's ace pitcher, Kael Meyers, can't take the mound because of a torn ligament in his elbow while junior Braden McShane has been out since May 27 with a pulled hamstring.

"You're talking about a first-team all-conference pitcher [in Meyers] and another first-team all-conference player [in

## Trojan girls rebound to get first 'W' of 2023

The sting from repeated losses tends to go away when smiles envelop the ball diamond.

TV can say good-bye to that 0-7 start to the summer and start focusing on the real task at hand — winning ball games on a consistent basis.

A 13-1 shellacking of MFL-Mar-Mac in the second game of a doubleheader in the UIC opener sure won't hurt that cause. The Trojans are moving on from a Game 1 loss that saw the Bulldogs pile on nine runs in the top of the seventh to win handily, 16-8, and run TV's losing streak to seven games.

That was then, this is now.

"We had to go after each game and just keep our head

up. As much as it might have been hard, we had to definitely keep doing that," said TV senior pitcher Sierra Morris. "You can't be in a bad mindset."

Morris pitched her best game of the year in the four-inning rout and her Trojans also came up with their most productive outing in a clean and crisp victory — just one of what should be many for the defending Upper Iowa Conference champs.

"If we want to win conference, we probably gotta sweep Kee High on Wednesday night here," said TV head coach Junior Hackman.

That's the squad from Lansing that shared the UIC crown with TV last summer. Each went 14-2 in league play and the two rivals squared off prior to this paper going to print.

TV's non-conference schedule prior to the start of league play was in one word — difficult.

## New Hampton splits with Decorah, falls to Charles City in NEIC play

After losing marathon NEIC opener, Chickasaw girls bounce back to beat Vikings before dropping road tilt against Comets

Don't tell Tate Hofmeister and his Chickasaws to wait around for success this summer, because that's not in the New Hampton coach's DNA.

That's why the future is now for his New Hampton softball team.

If there's one team in the Northeast Iowa Conference that could surprise foes in 2023 — it could well be these Chickasaws.

New Hampton — which went 9-16 and 5-10 in the NEIC last summer — sport three talented eighth-grade starters. Throw into the mix another young hurler in Chloe Weigel — with already a year of varsity experience under her belt — and Hofmeister

is confident his ever-improving squad can rack up the wins this year.

"Just looking at what we have — even though we're young — the future is definitely bright in my opinion," said Hofmeister, in his second season as leader of the Chickasaw softball program.

New Hampton (2-2, 1-2) opened the league portion of its slate last week Tuesday in the first game of a doubleheader against Decorah (5-3, 2-1) that could aptly be described as drawn out.

Fans definitely got their money's worth in the opener as the game lasted 11 innings or two hours-and-forty-five minutes if you were paying attention to your watch. Decorah ended the tilt in the top of that 11th frame with two runs to survive and

overcome an early NH lead and senior right fielder Elaina Rosonke's home run to straight-away center field in the fourth inning — NH up 3-1 at that point.

"It was long," said Hofmeister about the extra-innings contest.

New Hampton didn't stay down for long after the Game 1 setback as the Chickasaws played stout defense behind the game-pitching of junior all-conference performer Jenna Heeren. Heeren — Hofmeister's star NEIC shortstop — stepped inside the pitcher's circle and came away a winner.

She impressed in her first varsity start of 2023 as she allowed five hits, three earned runs and struck out six in her
