## Supervisors finally OK budget

It takes two tries, but board certifies 2024-25 budget that includes 14 percent tax-asking hike

Chickasaw County has a budget and tax levy in place for the fiscal year that begins on July 1, but for quite while Monday, the Board of Supervisors played the classic game of "chicken."

After months of working on the

county's 2024-25 budget, supervisors first rejected approving it during Monday's meeting, but after almost two hours of discussion and making one minor change, board members voted 3-2 to certify next year's budget.

The action came eight days before the state-mandated deadline for certifying county budgets and tax

levies, and although board members didn't wait until a stroke before midnight, for a while on Monday, those in the boardroom were wondering if the county was going to get a budget approved before April 30.

The approved budget that was supported by Board Chairman Scott Cerwinski and Supervisors Matt Kuhn and Steve Breitbach comes

with a 14 percent increase in the tax-asking for the three funds — General Basic (GB), General Supplemental (GS) and Rural Services Basic (RSB) — the supervisors oversee.

That's down from the

## Recent rains help out area's drought picture

There's still a long way to go, but 'extreme' drought area shrinking

In most years, the most recent U.S. Drought Monitor's map of Iowa — especially here in our neck of the woods — would look downright ugly.

In 2024, Thursday's report was, in a word, beautiful.

"We're making progress, and the moisture we've received this month and last month, that's helping the topsoil," said ISU Extension Agronomist Terry Basol, who is based at the Northeast Iowa Demonstration Farm located just outside of Nashua. "We have a long ways to go, but I'm cautiously optimistic, and 'cautiously optimistic' is a huge improvement over where I've been the last year or so."

Thursday's Drought Monitor report showed that the large area of Northeast Iowa that has been experiencing extreme drought is continuing to shrink.

Granted, the southern third of Chickasaw County and most of Bremer County are still in the extreme drought area while the rest of those counties, along with Floyd and Butler counties, are experiencing what experts call "severe drought."

## Relay to make history at Drake Relays

Nashua-Plainfield girls track team qualifies sprint medley for biggest meet of year

If Friday morning isn't a sign that Nashua-Plainfield has arrived — then they ought to dig up the track at Drake Stadium and start all over again.

The Huskies' sprint medley relay will be rubbing shoulders with former Olympians, college standouts and large-school class prep behemoths this week when Amber McCall sends her N-P girls track team down to Des Moines to run at the famed Drake Relays out on the blue oval.

Look out Johnston, Waukee and Dowling Catholic — the top three qual-

ifying times (all Class 4A squads) in the sprint med — because here these Huskies come with the foursome of sophomores Jayla Patten, Jalissa White, senior Ellie Eick and junior prep superstar Kadence Huck anchoring.

Almost all four N-P grades at the high school level will be represented in this history making Husky sprint med contingent and it's the only Class 1A school that will run in the event at 9:45 a.m. today (Friday).

Those impassioned and dedicated girls have become the first N-P squad (girls or boys) to run in a relay at Drake since the prestigious outdoor track and


field event implemented their current stringent standards that allow all four prep classes to compete for gold in front of a jammed-pack arena.

These Huskies hit the "blue standard" and then some this spring. N-P will attempt to show what they're all





Sharon graduated from Nashua High School in 1954 where she was a thespian, cheerleader, drum major, and National Honor Society member. Her mother attributed the latter designation to the fact she kept young Sharon from visiting her dad's main street barber shop where the conversations may have tainted her proper character.

Sharon planned to attend watchmaking school, but after her dad's sudden death, instead took a job in Nashua.

In 1955, Sharon met Mick Merfeld on a blind date and, despite her mother's warnings, married him on November 16, 1956, and moved to Greene. Sharon worked for Salsbury Laboratories in Charles City until 1960 when son Greg was born. In 1962, after son Tim's birth, they moved to Nashua where Mick ran the Nashua DX and Sharon ran the home.

## N-P girls ready for 'exciting' experience at the Drake Relays

about for a brief moment when the gun goes off in the high school girls sprint medley relay and boisterous cheers envelop the stadium, which was first opened in 1925 – 99 years ago.

"It's exciting," said Patten.

You can try to use a GPS (Global Positioning System) to try to locate the communities of Nashua and Plainfield or you can just attend the track and field celebration this week and find out for yourself.

"No one ever knows where Nashua-Plainfield is," said McCall. "I was thinking about that this morning how cool it is...we're putting Nashua-Plainfield on the map, which is really awesome. For them to know who we are is just really cool."

N-P qualified with a 1:51.62 – the 21st-fastest qualifying time. Twenty-four relays will run in the event with squads like Cedar Falls, MOC-Floyd Valley, Sioux City East and Iowa City Liberty.

"We just want to go down and run our best," said Eick.

The sprint med for the Huskies will be just part of the fun as Huck returns to Polk County to run in her marquee events – the open 400 and 800. She just missed out on cracking the Drake field in the 1,500 run. She placed fifth in that last year at Drake and did the same in the 800 run. She was fourth in the 400 dash. She's got another great opportunity to medal in those two events this year and the five-time state champ is eager to show she's taken it to another level again as a Drake "veteran."

"I definitely think this is a starting point. Obviously, qualifying is a really big deal," said Huck about her lone relay. "No one from N-P has done it yet. It's really cool to be a part of that – kind of making that history."

N-P will look to shatter the "old" school record from back in 2022 when the quartet of Husky legends Abbie Hyde, Rylee Weiss, Makenzie Foelske and Huck produced a school record time of 1:51.44 to snare the blue ribbon at state in Class 1A. That relay win enabled N-P to claim its first ever state title in N-P track and field history.

Huck said she's talked to

Weiss and the response was 'go get it.'

"They know how it feels to get a school record, obviously, so they want that for us," Huck said.

Huck was quick to point out that while five N-P girls will head down to Des Moines this week – junior Marleigh Lowe is the relay's alternate – the relays' success and her own comes from a whole host of sources, specifically the entire team of 24 athletes that comprise the N-P girls squad.

"Even though we're down there and it's just us five and just us four running, it's important to remember we have a whole 24 people here. It's really cool to be able to do that for not only them, but our whole community," said Huck.

Whether that's N-P senior Maci Malven braiding the girls hair before meets or the N-P Athletic Booster Club providing meals for the Husky Drake Relays participants or N-P fans, parents, coaches and past alums.

They all matter.

"The list of those that we need to recognize and thank...it's just insane. It's so exciting to see these ladies reach their goals. They worked all year long for this stuff. I always tell them you're making my mom heart happy. It's hard not to get tearful for them because just to be able to see them be successful is a really proud moment," said McCall.

N-P's Drake Relays run will be sort of like icing on the cake for the Huskies or as Lowe put it best – what goes on top of that confectionery treat.

"I feel like some sprinkles maybe, too," smiled Lowe.

Lowe talked about what Huck will try to accomplish later next month in May that could well add to her state hardware total. Huck will gun for four more state titles in 2024 and give it her all – with the backing

of an entire community – to bring home another team title for the Huskies.

"She's an all-time great in our hearts," said Lowe.

Huck wanted to add that while Drake is a special place to run – there's still plenty of season left and very important goals still left to attain in 2024.

"Just because we qualify here doesn't mean we're automatically in at state," said Huck. "We're still going to have to work for it. This relay is one of many that can qualify and do good at state. I think it's important to keep that in mind and just remember the whole big picture at the end of the season."

What advice did Huck have for her teammates – who have never run at the Drake Relays before Friday?

"It's the same distance around the track," said Huck. "It's just painted blue."

White said running at state last year in the distance medley relay helped – which N-P finished fourth in and went a long way towards the Husky runner-up finish in the Class 1A team standings.

"Last year they helped a lot – just bringing me up and they just said 'go do what you do,'" said White.

Huck is scheduled to begin the 800 run at 1:46 p.m. on Friday (today) and the 400 dash at 5:26 p.m. Friday night (this evening).

There will be several celebrities floating in and around the blue oval this week at Drake – mainly Des Moines Roosevelt alum and Olympic hurdler Lolo Jones, who will be inducted into the Drake Relays Hall of Fame.

"They didn't even know who Lolo Jones was," laughed McCall.

Maybe Jones will find out who these Huskies are.

munity volunteer who exuded competence and confidence, which she instilled in her children as well. She was president of Junior Federated, P.E.O. ## Cities won't have to pay ambulance bill next quarter

Six Chickasaw County cities received some welcome – albeit not unexpected – news during Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting when board members approved waiving the cities' first quarterly payment of the 2024-25 fiscal year for the county-owned ambulance service.

Board members unanimously approved waiving the payments that New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington were scheduled to make by July 5.

Supervisors in all reality had no choice when it came to waiving the payments because the 28E agreements that the county and the cities signed require the county to waive a quarterly payment if Chickasaw County EMS has \$750,000 or more in its account for two consecutive quarters.

County Auditor Sheila Shekleton said that the EMS Dedicated Fund had a balance of \$954,963.29 on Jan. 15, and that balance rose to \$1,001,392.83 on April 15. If that balance is above \$750,000 on July 15, the cities will then have their October quarterly payments waived.

The six cities would have paid the county a total of \$141,315.30 on July 5.

The 28E agreements were signed in 2022 by the six cities who wanted to be a part of the county-owned ambulance service that began taking calls on Jan. 1, 2023. Nashua and Alta Vista did not join the new service.

# After lengthy discussions, supervisors vote 3-2 to adopt 2024-25 budget

almost 19 percent increase in tax-asking that board members presented to the public late last month for its max-levy budget hearing but remained problematic for the board.

"I'm still getting phone calls that tax-asking's too high, but what do you do? I've asked to cut expenditures out of EMA, sell a building, check out this health insurance issue," Supervisor Jake Hackman said. "Yes, we're under a million dollars now in new money coming in from last year on that tax-asking, but 14's a lot."

"I've been getting a lot of questions, too, and concerns as well," Kuhn said.

Breitbach, as he did last week, pointed out that Chickasaw County's tax-levy rates will be on the "low end" when compared to surrounding counties, and while he understood the angst over the tax-asking increase, he wanted to protect services that he said his constituents value.

"I talk to a lot of people out there, too, that complain about tax increases, too," he said, "but when I ask them what services are you prepared to cut, they don't want any services cut."

Rural New Hampton resident Terry Johnson, who is seeking the District 4 seat currently held by Kuhn, said he wasn't concerned about what other counties are doing.

"Whatever the other counties are doing, that's fine. This is Chickasaw County. I don't care what they're doing. I care about Chickasaw County," he said. "When I'm out doing my campaign thing, all I get is taxes, taxes, taxes. It's all they want to talk about. They're pretty upset. ... I guess it's a situation that if you have to cut some services, you have to cut some services."

During the first discussion on the budget Monday, Hackman said that "unless we can find the magic eight ball of tax growth," the only options available to the county were to "consolidate, [have] less hours of operation," but he also wondered if the county needed to look at stopping to provide services that "are not core related that we don't have to," pointing out, as just one example, that "I don't think the law says we have to provide home care [but] we do."

And Kuhn was frustrated that the work board members have done since the max tax-asking hearing seemed to be for naught.

"Going back to last week's discussion, it appeared to me that discussion was that we had enough money in our ending fund balance that we could cut general supplemental," Kuhn said, "but now we're back to discussion of hiring freezes and that we don't have enough money."

After Breitbach made the motion to approve



"I can agree to going with the 95-5. The 70-30, to me, we're sending the message to the employees that we're going to change your benefits every nine months so I hope you're comfortable with what you have today because it may change tomorrow," Cerwinski said. "If the goal is to hire the best people we can hire and keep them, every time we make an adjustment to benefits, you're risking losing people."

The board chairman added that "we're going to change that insurance and we're not changing the levy and we're not changing the tax-asking, what are we really doing?"

Johnson asked board members to consider not only foregoing a scheduled 3 percent pay increase on July 1 but also suggested that board members forego their salaries all together in 2024-25, which would save the county more than \$160,000.

He said it would allow the supervisors to help "more people," referring to county employees, but Johnson's proposition was met coolly by supervisors.

"I'm not doing this for the money," board member Travis Suckow said, "but ... at the same time, my time is worth something."

The board floated other ideas — including cutting the amount of funding to the Emergency Management Agency — but in the end, the lone savings they came up with was saving \$10,000, when Suckow said he would not opt to take health insurance from the county.

Breitbach again motioned to adopt the 2024-25 budget and levy — with the only change being Suckow not taking insurance from the county — Kuhn seconded it and the vote was 3-2 — with Hackman and Suckow both voting against.

students to the school district. He said the move closer to the Mississippi River was an opportunity to be located near family, while not moving farther away from his parents.

"I will also be working in the building, which was a draw," said Christensen about his new teaching role at Maquoketa Valley.

Christensen took over the N-P football squad in a precarious time in the world during the COVID pandemic. The Husky squad before him went 1-8 and although his first year at the helm in 2020 was tough sledding – the Huskies went 1-7 – his staff and players persevered to break on through to the playoffs in 2021 with a 4-5 record.

All prep football squads in the state had a chance to play in the postseason during the 2020 truncated COVID year. N-P played at South Winneshiek and lost, 42-0.

"My goal when I took this job was to make N-P football relevant and be something that the community could get behind. The first year was a struggle. I didn't get to meet any of the kids until July. There were so many weird things happening," said the former N-P coach. "But after that I feel like the football program has been one that has achieved at a high level. There were a few goals that we had that weren't achieved, but I think overall every year we grew as a program and with that came success."



## Nashua-Plainfield girls take second at Sumner-Fred meet

Most high school track followers realize how adept at scoring points at the state meet the Nashua-Plainfield Huskies have been the past two seasons.

A state title and runner-up finish down at Drake Stadium is proof alone that the Husky girls track team has climbed the mountain top on more than one occasion.

Winning an actual regular season meet has been elusive so far in 2024 for head coach Amber McCall's squad.

N-P came close to reeling in a team title this past Monday at the Sumner-Fredericksburg Co-Ed Invite. The host Cougars edged N-P by nine points – 126 to 117 – to snare the No. 1 spot in the standings.

"Nine points – that was a stinger," said McCall.

N-P ripped off a season-best time in the distance medley relay to claim a blue ribbon. The time of 4:29.71 is currently the fifth-best time in the small-school class.

## Husky boys look to 'step up' before the postseason begins

The clock is ticking and the stopwatch doesn't lie.

That's why Nashua-Plainfield boys track coach Chase Sudol isn't concerned so far this spring for his runners out on the oval – but he's anxious to see his Husky athletes perform up to their capabilities.

"It's time for guys to step up. We've always done it in the past and we've placed a huge emphasis on district track and stuff. Kids gotta understand what we're trying to accomplish here. We don't have time to wait anymore. Our times have got to start coming down," said Sudol.

After last Friday's meet at North Butler was cancelled because of inclement weather, N-P was still able to compete in the Sumner-Fredericksburg Invite on Monday.

N-P ran at Dike-New Hartford on Thursday and hosts the Cowpath Relays on Monday at home.

Those are ample opportunities for the Huskies to dip lower and gain some momentum for the stretch run – which is fast approaching. N-P's Top of Iowa Conference meet will

be held at St. Ansgar on Thursday, May 2. The host Saints will host the Class 1A state qualifier the following Thursday where N-P will be at gunning for state berths and a repeat district championship for last year's storied run.

N-P placed third (122 points) at the S-F Invite. The host Cougars won the meet with 155.5 points and Janesville was second (140 points).

"Here's the deal. I understand our relays...we haven't had some of the best nights to run. At this point I really don't care. We gotta get going," said Sudol, in his eighth season as Husky head coach.

One such relay Sudol would love to see run down at Des Moines in the state meet next month is the 4x800 relay. That squad of Jake Smith, Dylan Blanchard, Braeden Mitchell and Avery Mueller finished just a mere three-one-hundredths back of first place Turkey Valley in the event – 9:17.48 to 9:17.51.

"I thought Braeden (Mitchell) ran exceptionally well with the wind – just the way he fought back on a kid he was trailing pretty good. Then he got us back in the lead," said Sudol.

Christensen resigns at Nashua-Plainfield to take job at Maquoketa Valley

Andrew Christensen brought forth a winning attitude amongst his players and most people would agree he changed the culture of Nashua-Plainfield football for the better.

In his four years at the helm of the Huskies, he led N-P to three-consecutive playoff berths and just last fall his squad was ranked by almost every media publication in the state.

It was a great run for the 2005 South Tama High School alum, where he brought a winning brand of Husky football back to Lloyd Koob Field in Nashua with his wing-T offense and mentorship both on and off the grid-

iron.

But his time at Nashua-Plainfield as leader of the Husky football program has come to an end as Christensen confirmed on Tuesday of this week that he's leaving to accept a teaching position in the Maquoketa Valley School District and become the new head football coach of the Class A Wildcats over in Delhi.

Obviously, it's never easy to say goodbye, especially when you were as invested in a program as Christensen was. But that's what he'll have to do before he moves his family to Delaware County over in far eastern Iowa after the school season ends in Charles City, where he's a seventh-grade social studies teacher.

"It wasn't an easy decision to take the job at Maquoketa Valley. I have had the opportunity to coach a great group of kids and work with great coaches in my time at N-P," said Christensen. "This was in no way a move away from N-P, this was more a move towards family."

Christensen has taught at Charles City for the last 12 years, the first three at the high school and the last nine at the middle school. He said his future teaching position at Maquoketa Valley has not been finalized yet.

Christensen said his wife's parents live in the Delhi area, where Maquoketa Valley draws a large portion of its

# SALUTING EVERYDAY HEROES

## It's tall task to maintain MercyOne New Hampton

For the trio that makes up hospital's Maintenance Department, best days are when they go unnoticed

The three MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center Maintenance Department workers, as is their daily custom, were on break in the hospital's cafeteria Tuesday morning when they were asked about the number of toilets and sinks in the facility.

And there was Russ Dreckman mentally taking a walk through the hospital and adjacent clinic.

"Twenty-eight in the hospital and six in the clinic," he said before adding with a quick smile, "but I might be missing one or two or a few. So let's say three dozen."

The department's supervisor, Steve Kurash, chuckled.

"And every one of those has a sink and you throw in all the other sinks in the exam rooms and well," he said before pausing for dramatic effect, "there aren't too many days where we don't have water leaking somewhere."

But in all seriousness, Kurash, Dreckman and Chad Stange — along with the six "housekeepers" who are part of the department — are the unsung heroes of Chickasaw County's only hospital.

Don't take our word for it; just ask MercyOne New Hampton CEO Aaron Flugum.

"We've always had great maintenance mechanics here that I have admired for their dedication and skills," Flugum said. "They are so important to providing an excellent patient

experience. The amount of skills and knowledge it takes to do their job is very impressive. They do a lot of preventative maintenance."

And their best days are the ones when no one knows they're there.

"That means everything's working," Stange said, "and that's obviously the goal for us, right?"

The trio came prepared for Tuesday's interview; well, pretty prepared.

Kurash had to run back to his office for the sheet that listed the duties the Maintenance Department performs.

Basically, the department is charged with maintaining the structure, equipment, HVAC,

mechanical and electrical systems, as well as the grounds, at the hospital to make for an efficient and safe working environment.

That means maintaining and operating critical mechanical systems, provide logs that can range from daily to annual for state inspections, fire marshals and boiler inspectors.

That means maintaining boilers, generators, chillers and cooling towers.

That means making repairs to plumbing fixtures, lights, switches and motors.

That means mowing the grass in the summer and clearing snow in the winter.

That means doing carpentry work and painting.

"We want to provide the best possible experience for our patients," Kurash wrote in his "what-we-do" report, "by providing a clean, safe, pleasant environment where doctors, staff and

patients excel."

Stange is the "rookie" among the group; he began working at MercyOne a year and a half ago. Kurash, after spending 25 years at Con-Agra in Fredericksburg and 18 years at Luther College in Decorah, took over as the Maintenance Department supervisor in 2021.

Dreckman is the veteran. He's been at the hospital for 33 1/2 years.

"It's a good place to work," he said. "I mean I've been here forever so I should know, right?"

They each have their strengths — Dreckman is the carpenter and painter, Stange handles a lot of the mechanical chores and Kurash's strengths are with the boilers and chillers.

"But we all can do everything," Kurash said, "and I think we make a pretty good team."

Asked if he has any regrets about leaving Luther for MercyOne, he laughed.

"Let's see, I only have five miles to drive to work versus driving 40 miles to Luther," he said. "No regrets, trust me on that."

Now, for all three, there are duties they like performing, and then there are duties that, well, are tolerated.

"Weed-wacking the grounds," Dreckman said as his co-workers nodded in agreement, "I don't think any one of us looks forward to that. You'd be surprised at how much weed-wacking you do here with the sidewalks, the signs, the building and all that."

And they also have to take turns "on call," and that means dragging themselves out of bed and heading in to work to fix this or that.

Their efforts are appreciated.

"We have a great group that is willing to do anything to support the team," Flugum said. "They fill many formal and informal roles in our organization."

The hospital's top administrator went on to list some of those roles — ranging from helicopter ground crew to security to patient transport to telecommunications expert to express courier.

"I can't explain how grateful we are to have these gentleman," Flugum said. "They are worth their weight in gold."

"We are very blessed."



## Nashua area is on track for its second-straight above-normal precipitation month

Still, as Basol said, "we're moving in the right direction" as the planting season shifts into high gear.

"The guys have made a lot of headway this week," he said Thursday morning, "and with the rain forecast for the weekend, I'm guessing they're going to be at it hard until the rain chases them away."

The Iowa Crop Progress and Condition Report released by the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service on Monday showed that 3 per-

cent of corn had been planted in Iowa's Northeast District and 10 percent of corn had been planted in the North Central District.

"Those numbers, I'm guessing, are going to change dramatically when the new report comes out this Monday," Basol said. "Traffic tractor, if you will, has been pretty heavy this week."

The USDA report also showed signs of optimism for area growers when it came to moisture content as 59 percent of farmland in the Northeast District has adequate topsoil moisture while that percentage is 70 in the

North Central District.


But subsoil moisture content remains short in many parts of the area as 59 percent of the subsoil moisture is either "very short" or "short" in the Northeast District while 56 percent of subsoil in the North Central district is below adequate.

The good news is Nashua is on track to have a second straight month with above-average rainfall. After receiving 2.51 inches of rain in March, about a half-inch above normal, the city has seen 2.97 inches of rainfall so far in April, slightly above the 2.77 inches

of rain that usually falls in the first 24 days of the month.

If the rain in the forecast for today and this weekend becomes a reality, Nashua will have a second straight above-normal precipitation month for the first time since January and February of 2023.

"We always talk about timely rains, I know that," Basol said, "but they're going to be critical this year. We're off to a good start. Obviously, we have a long way to go to get out of this drought, but you have to start somewhere, right?"
