City Council OKs dam repair bid

City leaders vote 3-2 to offer Henningsen water/wastewater superintendent position

Nashua took a big step forward on Monday in the process to repair a hole in one of its crown jewels – the town's hydroelectric dam.

which was damaged because of flooding and added the potential risk of the structure failing. That low bid – one of three received and compiled by the engineering firm of Shuck-Britson – came from Boomerang Corporation, a site work civil contractor out of Anamosa.

dam came to the tune of \$763,000 and is the majority of the cost of the \$1.3 million project to get Nashua's century-old dam back to full strength. The city will utilize general obligation (GO) corporate purpose bonds to fund the project that has a completion date of January 17, 2025 set in its contract. "I'm just delighted that you're

able to get it done under a \$1 million, honestly," said Nashua City Attorney David Skilton. "That's great news. We were estimating quite a bit more." There were three bids submitted – one by Shift

After New Hampton says yes, county awards contract for Kenwood project

Twelve hours after city says yes to higher price, supervisors move road project ahead

The New Hampton City Council put the proverbial ball on the tee Monday night and a little more than 12 hours later on Tuesday morning, the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors hit it.

And one of the worst roads in Chickasaw County will get repaired, either sometime later this year or early in next year's construction season, as supervisors approved awarding a contract to Croell Inc. for a 0.7-mile paving project on Kenwood Avenue from Highway 18 south to 210th St.

Croell submitted the only bid on the project on July 22, and the \$797,120.71 price tag was 113 percent of the engineer's preliminary estimate. Because the Croell Inc. property along the east side of the road is within the city limits of New Hampton, the city is responsible for half of the costs for about 2,016 1/2 feet of the project, and the city's portion of the project will be \$211,479.53, \$36,507.57 more than the preliminary estimate.

New Hampton Public Works Director Casey Mai, though, strongly urged the council Monday night to approve the city's projected cost for the project.

"It's an additional amount, but I don't want to

County doesn't have to pay to send Patrie back to feds

Man who murdered retired Nashua resident in 2012 begins serving life sentence in state prison system

The man convicted of first-degree murder in May and sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole in July is now out of Chickasaw County's hair. County Attorney David Laudner told the Board of Supervisors during its Monday meeting that custody of 41-year-old Randy Patrie was hand-

ed over to the Iowa Department of Corrections last month. And Laudner passed out several thank yous, starting with the Chickasaw County Sheriff's Office. "I want to thank [Ryan Shawver] and his staff

for handling the prisoner that we brought in from the feds," Laudner said of Patrie, who in early 2022 was charged with the 2012 murder of 70-year-old Kenneth Gallmeyer that took place in Gallmeyer's home just north of Nashua. At that time, Patrie was serving a sentence in federal prison in New Jersey, which meant that the county had to pay the costs of bringing him back to Iowa.

In May, a Chickasaw County jury took less than an hour to find Patrie guilty of first-degree murder, and on July 2, District Court Judge Richard Stochl sentenced Patrie to his life sentence. The question then became would Patrie return to federal prison or go directly into state custody? The county attorney said there



Council still must OK water/wastewater superintendent contract

Companies out of Cedar Rapids for \$940,000 and the other by Newt Marine Service for \$1.5 million, over double the bid from Boomerang. Newt Marine Service is located in Dubuque.

"They didn't see any reason why the Council couldn't accept the lowest bid," said Nashua City Clerk John Ott about Shuck-Britson, who recommended the city accept the bid proposal from Boomerang. Shuck-Britson also conducted the bid tabulation and helped lay the framework and blueprint for helping fill the void in Nashua's dam.

Shuck-Britson, located in Des Moines, is Iowa's largest structural engineering firm.

The breakdown of \$1.3 million project cost is as follows:

- \$763,000 for dam project
- \$224,000 for engineering design and construction
- \$175,000 for other legal, geo-Technical, etc. expenses
- \$95,000 for contingency (unexpected costs)
- \$29,000 for cost of issuance to Speer Financial.

Underwater dive teams found extensive damage done to the hydro dam in 2022. The damage may have been caused by repair work done last fall by Minnowa Construction, a bridge and civil contractor based out of Harmony, Minn.

A structural engineer with Origin Design out of Dubuque consulted council members about what he thought may have been the cause of a large piece of concrete that is clearly visible above the water surface below the dam. The engineer thought at that time that the concrete that sits near the dam may have been a result of concrete over pours. That engineer gave that opinion prior to the city retaining a law firm.

The actual work to fix the dam will center around concrete blocks that will be placed in the dam's void and is what Shuck-Britson calls a "self-healing process."

"They are pouring 5x5x5 concrete blocks on shore. They'll be



lowered in and set in there," said Council member Jake Johnson.

The construction company will come in with rock (up to 18-inch boulders) and place that around the blocks.

"So everything will kind of move, so it won't be that head on top of concrete anymore. So that will all be below the water, so the water that sits on top of there will absorb the load when it comes over the dam," said Johnson. "There's sheet piling to hold everything in."

Johnson then went on to explain more in detail to those in attendance at the Council meeting about what the actual construction process entails and how it works to heal the dam - essentially.

"The part that was repaired before that didn't last, it's wider than that. So they're going to come in there and cut some more of the apron off that was damaged and let that fall down into the hole," said Johnson. "They'll use that as their fill, too."

ANOTHER BIG development at the regular Council meeting came in a 3-2 vote to rehire Nick Henningsen as water/wastewater superintendent for the city's water plant, although Henningsen has

not said he has accepted that job and there has been no contract that has been agreed upon.

The city of Nashua did not renew its contract last year with PeopleService - a water and wastewater company based out of Omaha.

Nashua unanimously voted in April of 2023 to create a full-time Public Works employee position that would replace Henningsen, whose contract with PeopleService was not renewed. Henningsen has been water/wastewater superintendent for eight years prior to Ion Environmental Solutions taking over on Aug. 1, 2023. Ion did not renew its contract with the city - which ran out on July 31, 2024.

Reece Reams, who has been filling in as Nashua's superintendent since Aug. 1 of this year, was also up for consideration of the full-time position that would oversee Nashua's wastewater treatment facility.

Council member Samantha Johnson made a motion to hire Reams, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem and Council member Ernie Willsher. Johnson and Willsher were the two ayes, while the dissenting votes came from Jake Johnson, Peggy Hall and Dan

Zwanziger. That motion failed, 3-2. Jake Johnson then made a motion to hire Henningsen, which was seconded by Zwanziger. Jake Johnson, Zwanziger and Hall all voted to hire Henningsen, while Willsher and Samantha Johnson were the nay votes.

The Council still has to determine a wage and contract for Henningsen, who was asked at the meeting when he could start.

"September 1st would probably be best," said Henningsen, who is currently the water and sanitary collection superintendent at New Hampton.

Skilton had this to say about the next step the city will take - more than likely at the next Council meeting on Monday, Aug. 19 - to fill the superintendent position.

"You have to come to a contract and that's beneficial for everyone," said Skilton. "Whatever the terms are, just let me know. I'll put something together once you put the approval of contract, have it circulated and approve it next Council session - so there's no misunderstanding."

The Council decided to pay Reams \$24 an hour, since he has been running the plant until Henningsen comes to agreeable terms with the city on his potential employment. Reams' pay rate will be retroactive to Aug. 1, which is when Ion Environmental Services contract extension ended.

OTT ALSO revealed six bids to demolish 223 Main St. - although that contract will be voted upon and awarded at the Aug. 19 Council meeting.

The low bid came from Burkle Landscaping out of Nashua for almost \$64,000. The next lowest bid was submitted by Zimmerman's Digging and Demo (Ionia) for \$67,500. D.W Zinser's (Walford) bid was for \$78,000, while KAM Excavating (Charles City) offered up a bid of \$101,350. W.S. Trucking and Construction (Caledonia, Minnesota) sent in a bid of \$142,475 and Lansing Brothers (Luxemburg) had a base bid proposal of \$165,450.

County attorney says AG, governor's offices help keep Patrie in Iowa

was a chance that the county would have to pay the costs of returning Patrie to federal custody, and that he appreciated the help his office received since Patrie's sentencing.

"I also wanted to thank publicly the Attorney General's Office, and the Governor's Office actually got involved," he said in the efforts to have Patrie go directly into state custody.

"It made a lot more sense economically and practically to send him straight to state prison, as opposed to the taxpayers of Chickasaw County paying to send him back to federal prison to finish his sentence and then to come back to the state in five more years."

According to the Iowa Department of Corrections website, Patrie is currently being held at the Iowa Medical and Classification Center in Coralville.

Former EMS provider tells board its county-owned service not self-funding

McGrath makes comments during open forum of meeting where supervisors discuss implications of new state law

The former ambulance provider for Chickasaw County asked county and city leaders on Monday to be more transparent when it comes to the balance sheet for Chickasaw County EMS.

During the public comment portion of Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting, Jeremy McGrath emphasized that he supports the county-owned ambulance service that replaced the Chickasaw Ambulance Service he owned on Jan. 1, 2023.

But at the same time, he decried those who are claiming Chickasaw County EMS is self-funded.

"Don't get me wrong, the ambulance service, they're doing good," McGrath said. "I just think we need to be honest to the taxpayers what it's actually costing us. I figured they lost \$398,000 last fiscal year, which is fine because I think it's always going to cost us something but let's be honest with what it's costing us."

He said the recent waiver of the cities' quarterly payments illustrated his point.

Under the 28E agreements that New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington — Nashua and Alta Vista opted not to use the county-owned service — the county is required to waive the cities' quarterly payments if the EMS fund has more than \$750,000 in it for two consecutive quarters.

McGrath pointed out that in a letter the county sent to the city on July 15, it stated that the fund had \$1,001,392.83 in it on April 15 and \$1,003,589.59 in it on July 15, which would seem to indicate that the service had "made" \$2,000 over the three-month period.

"That was sent out hours after you guys approved \$81,000 worth of expenditures so that wasn't factored in there," McGrath said. "It's giving the cities — at least the city of New Hampton — a false sense of hope that they had an increase

in revenue over expenses. Self-funding was the word that was used."

County Auditor Sheila Shekleton said she understood McGrath's concerns but added that the quarterly balance is simply, as she put it, a snapshot.

"All that is stating what the balance is at the end of the day on July 15," she said. "We certify the fund, the checkbook and we say there's this much in the checkbook at that exact moment."

McGrath's comments came in a relatively brisk one-hour Board of Supervisors meeting in which county leaders discussed a new law that requires governing bodies must make a form of remote access to each board meeting.


County Attorney David Laudner said that he believes the county meets the requirement of the bill that was passed by the Iowa Legislature this past spring and signed into law by Gov. Kim Reynolds because supervisors can "call in" and take part and vote in a meeting.

He said one of the biggest changes in the new law is that a quorum doesn't necessarily have to be in the same place for a meeting to be held.

"It used to be before this law was passed that unless it was impractical or impossible — a tornado wiped out the courthouse or each of you [were ill] and self-isolating for three weeks — you had to have a quorum here in order to have someone patch in remotely," Laudner said. "That got eliminated."

"So now, in theory, you can do a virtual meeting whereby each of you is in five different states across the country and each of you patch into a Zoom call and have an actual meeting so long as the public has access to the meeting, to the conversation that takes place in the meeting."

Supervisors spent about 10 minutes discussing the new law and also talked about possible ways to enhance the technology the county uses to offer even more transparency to the public.

Ionia Library has lots to celebrate during festival

Director who led the library for 44 years takes center stage at '50th Anniversary Bash' held during Fun Days

Much has changed since 1974, when a new car could be had for \$4,250, gas was a mere 36 cents a gallon, a loaf of bread cost 28 cents and a letter could be mailed for eight pennies.

One thing, though, hasn't. Jane McGrane is still a feisty advocate for the Ionia Community Library, the facility that held its 50th Anniversary Bash during the small town's annual Fun Days celebration this past Saturday.

At the center of it all was McGrane, who served as the library's director for more than 44 years before retiring in October 2018.

"I just think it speaks volumes about our little town that they started the library and have supported it so well for so long," she said. "This has been a really fun day, a really good day. To look back on the history, it's quite a story, don't you think?"

It sure is, and although she has been retired for almost six years, her legacy lives on at the beautiful little library nestled on the corner of South Center Street and West Iowa Street in the town that around 225 souls call home.

Just ask current Director India Watson, who sums up McGrane's contribution to the library in four words. "She set the standard."

None of that, McGrane said Saturday. "Our town set the standard," she said. "It has taken a lot of people to get us to today. I'm just one of many."

THE LIBRARY WAS established in April 1974 and opened in an old church that faced Center Street, the north-south county highway that cuts through the small town.

"We were three steps down and to the highway," she said.

The facility opened in August of that year, and Jane McGrane and her growing family that included husband Merle and

three children — Molly, Jerry and Charlie — considered the little library a second home. "We spent more time here than we did at home," Molly Pins said Saturday, "and mom had all three of us in a playpen at one time or another. She threw her heart and soul into the old library and then this one, the new one."

Ah, the new library, which was completed in November 1988 and had an open house celebration on June 25, 1989.

McGrane was a tireless fundraiser for the building the library has called home for the past 35 1/2 years, and to this day, she celebrates all the donors who made it possible to not only move into a new, modern building but also to get it away from the highway.

"The front door was, let me look here," she said as she glanced at a photo that was part of a display marking the history of the library, "just 31 feet from the highway and all that traffic. When we built new, I wanted it facing [Iowa Street] so it would be safer for our patrons, especially the young kids."

McGrane shared the story of Vern and Leota Bierbaum, a New Hampton couple that bequeathed a generous sum to the fundraising campaign to build a new library in Ionia.

"Mrs. Bierbaum needed large-print books to read," she said, "and I told her I would get them for her. I had no idea that when she passed away, she would leave us such a gift. That didn't matter. Getting her the books that she needed was all I really cared about."

But McGrane also remembers an Ionia resident who did not, as she put it, "have a lot of money."

The two came up with a novel idea. The resident was a baker and her bread was, in a word, delicious.

"She loved our little library and wanted to help in some way, in any way really," McGrane said. "I asked her, 'How about baking bread and donating the proceeds?' She just jumped at that and I think she

contributed \$99. To see the look on her face when she made that donation, it was just wonderful."

MCGRANE, FOR ALL, practical purposes is an Ionia "lifer."

She grew up in the small town and graduated with the five-strong Class of 1959 at St. Boniface School.

After moving to Waterloo to work for a credit company, which she did while attending classes at the University of Northern Iowa, she obtained her bachelor's degree in family consumer science.

In a 2018 story, she said she went on to teach for four years — two in Iowa and "a very interesting two years" at a school for juvenile delinquent girls in Denver, Colorado.

But Ionia called her home when she met and fell in love with Merle McGrane.

They were married in 1971 and Jane worked as a substitute teacher for a few years before the library beckoned.

"Best decision I ever made," she said. "I love to read, I'm still a vivacious reader, but one thing a lot of people don't know is that I really struggled with reading when I was young. ... I had so many people who helped me when I was a child, to be a librarian and help people find a love for reading, that was important to me."

FIFTY YEARS LATER, the Ionia Community Library is still going strong.

In between talking to the myriad of folks who attended Saturday's bash, McGrane looked over the table filled with old newspaper articles and paper that detailed the library's history.

But she also wanted a message sent loud and clear.

"It isn't me," she said, "it's the people of Ionia who made this party possible."

So let's compromise and say Jane McGrane has had one of the starring roles when it comes to the first 50 years of the Ionia Community Library.

see it kicked down the road, either, because we know what's been taking place the last how many years," Mai said. "The cost of infrastructure and everything keeps going up, especially concrete. It is what it is."

Under an agreement reached between the county and the city earlier this year, the city will receive an interest-free

loan from the county and pay it back through five equal annual installments, beginning on July 5, 2025.

The county is paying for its portion of the project with its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and using its Infrastructure Fund to front the city's portion, but because the county had only budgeted \$200,000 for the project this year, supervisors will have to

adopt a budget amendment to move forward.

On a 4-1 vote at a July 29 meeting, board members indicated they would be in favor of amending the 2024-25 budget to green light Kenwood.

Supervisor Jake Hackman said Tuesday morning that the project was a must.

"It needs to be done," Hackman said. "That road is one of the worst roads we have

left in the whole county."

He did say that a county resident had reached out to him and asked him why the county hadn't considered taking asphalt bids for the road.

"I just don't think asphalt withstands the traffic and the heavy loads on that road," Hackman said, and County Engineer Roman Lensing said while he considers that a fair question, he said he was com-

fortable with how the county and city are proceeding.

"With the subgrade issues that we have — that is asphalt right now over concrete — I don't think it would have had the longevity," said Lensing, who added that "we'd probably would have to go with 10 or 12 inches of asphalt new, your costs probably would have been very similar, if not maybe even a little bit more."

"If the road was in a good condition where I didn't think the subgrade was the primary issue, I probably would have been more enticed by asphalt as well as the concrete overlay."

Supervisors, in the end, voted 4-0 to award the contract to Croell. Matt Kuhn, the lone supervisor to vote against seeking a budget amendment, was unable to attend Tuesday's meeting.

German American Museum will present program on mills Aug. 14

Shay Gooder of Bear Creek Archaeology will present on Winneshiek County Mills at the German American Museum in St. Lucas during a program that will be held from 6 to 8 p.m. next Wednesday, Aug. 14.


Gooder's historic mill presentation will be followed by an informal discussion along with refreshments, fruit and cookies.

The Winneshiek County mill project (2022-2024) represents an "intensive" reconnaissance-level investigation merging archival research, Geographic Information System (GIS) analysis, and non-invasive archeological survey techniques in the identification and evaluation of mill sites within the county. The project was developed in coordination with the Winneshiek County Historic Preservation Commission (WCHPC) based on a concern over the lack of information regarding these mill sites and their current status.

Utilizing historic-age maps, newspaper archives, county histories, and previous survey work, a comprehensive dataset was generated of 71 unique locations pertaining to sawmills, grist mills, woolen mills, and other water-powered industries that once operated within Winneshiek County.

Where accessible, mill locations were subject to field investigations implementing visual assessments, digital photography, GPS-mapping, soil profiling, and landowner interviews.

The result of this survey work

was the documentation of a surprising amount of evidence pertaining to these mill sites despite a majority being abandoned for well over a century.

roof was put on the old church, the interior was completely remodeled and when the project was done, the old church in the vale looked as much as possible as it did when it opened more than a century and a half ago. McHolm told those gathered — both inside and outside the church — for Sunday's worship service that it took a desire, "a want to change things," honesty, planning and a "whole lot of sacrifice from a bunch of people" to make the investment into the church building so that it would remain strong and viable for another 100 years.

"The end result was the same building," McHolm said, "the same building but refreshed. ... People said it looks the same but just fresher."

He urged those couples who came to renew their vows to do the same with their marriages.

To do so, they must have the desire to strengthen their marriage and that takes honesty, planning and sacrifice.

"Good couples are the ones who say, 'OK, tell me, because I can make those adjustments and I will because it's more important that I please you, than myself,'" McHolm said. "That's marriage."

McHolm shared the story of a British couple who were married for 70 years, a milestone that the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) documented in a story.

The reporter asked the couple what the secret was to their 70-year marriage, and the husband's response was, well, in a word, golden.

"When we got married, we started this game, and the game was simple. The game was this: We're going to out-love and out-give each other."

And McHolm said the couple had played the game for 70 years.

"The BBC guy says, 'Well, who won?' 'Nobody, because we're not finished yet.' That is marriage," McHolm said.

He asked both the church members and the scores of visitors to remember that if they don't know where to start improving their relationships with their spouses, ask God.

"He'll set the way for you," McHolm said, but added that it will take sacrifice.

"It's going to take sacrifice, but let me tell you, it's worth it — no matter whether you've been married for 10 years or 68 years. ... The end result will be the same marriage, with the same two people ... but a new and refreshed beautiful relationship."

For Carol Juliar, that made the trip back to the Upper Midwest — both she and her couple are Minnesota natives who lived in Waterloo when they were married — worth every penny.

"It was an amazing message to hear," she said. "I think every one of us in the service realized that marriage is worth the work

the pastor said we have to do, that we can make our marriages even stronger."

IT WASN'T ALL deep and thoughtful Sunday; after all, McHolm flashed his sense of humor during the service, which was followed by not only lunch but also live music by Sugar & Spice, and plenty of fellowship between couples who traveled near and far to attend the reunion.

McHolm shared some wisdom with the husbands in the crowd.

He shared that he and his wife, Jesse Boatright, recently renewed their vows after 10 years or marriage and then Boatright spent a couple of weeks in Texas.

When she returned home, she asked the pastor what he missed the most while she was gone.

"I miss holding your hand I told her, and she asked me why that was so important to me," McHolm said, "and I said, 'As long as I'm holding your hand, you're not shopping.' There's a lesson for all you guys out there."

He also shared nuggets like the one from Agatha Christie, who once said an archaeologist is the best husband a woman can have ... the older she gets, the more interested he is in her.

And there's the one in which husbands should remember that "one person is always right and one person is you. Always remember you married Miss Right, you just didn't know her first name was 'Always.'"

But his favorite one was this gem. "If you forget all the other ones, you remember this one," he said with a mischievous smile forming, "remember if your wife says, 'Honey, I don't need a gift, guys it's a trap.'"

MCHOLM, THOUGH, SHOWED his serious side, too, both before and during the reunion; after all; he is a believer in the institution of marriage.


When it comes to his church where 75,000 weddings have been performed and its annual reunion, he is adamant that the latter is not just for those who said "I do" in the vail.

Just ask Robert and Judith Wise of Cedar Falls and their daughter, Julie, and her husband, John Nyystrom of Palmer, Alaska.


The Wises were married 64 years ago at the Little Brown Church; the Nyystroms were married in 2009 but not at the Little Brown Church.

6 ways to tame nerves before a job interview

Interviews are an integral component of the hiring process. According to Zippia, the average corporate job opening garners 250 résumés. Among those, only four to six people are likely to be interviewed.

With such competition for jobs, landing an interview is an opportunity to be cherished. Furthermore, candidates should do their best to ensure interviews go as smoothly and effectively as possible. Nerves can derail an interview. Nervous energy is a byproduct of humans' "flight or fight" response in stressful situations. 3. BE PREPARED. Prepare for the interview and conduct a trial run with a friend or family member. Research commonly asked interview questions but be prepared to answer more job-specific queries as well. Preparation can help you feel less nervous and more in control.

4. CLEAR YOUR MIND. Figure out which relaxation method works for you and employ it. Some find taking a short stroll outside enjoying nature clears their mind, while others prefer deep breathing and meditation. Some people may feel more relaxed after an exercise session. Build these coping mechanisms into your schedule on the day of an interview.



5. CHANGE YOUR PERCEPTION. An interview is a conversation and not an interrogation. Certainly you are selling yourself to the recruiter, but the company also has to sell itself to you. Interviews are two-way streets to determine if the employer-employee dynamic is the right fit. Remembering that you are on somewhat equal footing can make the interview less nerve-racking.

6. MAKE SMALL TALK. While waiting to be called into the interview, speak with others, such as the receptionist, other employees walking by or even people in the elevator. Small conversations can shift your focus from internal thoughts to external stimuli.

Job interviews can drum up nerves, but there are strategies to help candidates overcome their nerves.

How to negotiate a job offer

How to navigate a remote interview

Not so long ago, job interviews were conducted almost exclusively in person. Hiring managers were able to assess candidates during these interviews, getting an idea about everything from the applicant's skill set to how he or she affected the energy in the room to body language and the confidence of a handshake.

Today a growing number of interviews are virtual. Many are conducted via popular video conferencing apps like Zoom. In a recent survey of talent leaders and recruiters conducted by the tech firm Talview, 80 percent of respondents said their hiring process is now fully remote.

There are many advantages to remote/virtual interviews. They tend to be more convenient for screening applicants for remote positions because the appli-

cant pool may be coming from anywhere around the world. Remote interviews also can be less time-consuming.

As useful as they can be, remote interviews are not fool-proof. Technical snarls or uncooperative conditions at home can affect remote interviews. Virtual interviews also may not give candidates an accurate idea of the culture at a given firm. But remote interviews are likely here to stay, so here's how candidates can put their best (virtual) foot forward.

TEST THE TECHNOLOGY

Open the conferencing app and test links to make sure that you can get on the service and understand how it functions. Log in early, even if it means sitting in a virtual waiting room until the meeting organizer ar-

rives. At least you'll be ensured of being on time.

HAVE A CHEAT SHEET AT THE READY

A remote interview gives candidates a distinct advantage, as they can utilize notes without it being obvious. Place them just above the device camera or off to the side slightly so you can refer to them like one may read a teleprompter or cue cards on television.

USE YOUR SPACE WISELY

If you'll be on video, set up your space and your appearance so that it is professional but engaging. Use your home office environment to make a strong impression. Keep background clutter to a minimum. If necessary, use a virtual office backdrop, which was preferred by 97



percent of the 513 recruiters that Harvard Business Review observed and interviewed over an eight-month period in 2020.

ENGAGE WITH THE INTERVIEWER AND AVOID DISTRACTIONS

Distractions can knock you off of your game and make you

come across as less engaging to recruiters. Ask housemates to make themselves scarce during the interview and lock pets out of the room. Silence your phone (if it isn't the device being used for the interview) and look into the camera while speaking. Maintaining eye contact is a sign of respect and confidence.

If the interviewer is speaking at length, utilize the mute button on your phone or conferencing app to silence ambient noise.

Remote interviews are a large part of modern working environments. Mastering an ability to interview remotely can help candidates ace their next interview.

How to navigate salary inquiries during the interview process



Navigating a job search can be exciting. As professionals look to take the next, or even the first, step in their careers, they may encounter numerous opportunities that will allow them to make the most of their talents and fulfill their potential.

The excitement of a job search is sometimes accompanied by nerves. Nervousness often fluctuates during the hiring process, and salary is one area that can cause some anxiety. As candidates progress through the interview process, salary can seem like the elephant in the room. No matter how great an opportunity may be, professionals still want to ensure their salaries are commensurate with their experience and reflective of their talent.

In an ideal situation, hiring managers will discuss salary early in the process. In fact, many job postings list salary range in the job description.

However, that information may not be as readily available when professionals earn interviews through networking. That's a significant distinction, as surveys have indicated that networking is how many experienced professionals find new jobs. In fact, a 2012 analysis of data from sources such as the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and Glassdoor conducted by Interview Success Formula concluded that as many as 80 percent of job openings are never advertised. So it's often not as simple as scouring a job listing to determine salary range.

Candidates should not interpret a failure to broach the topic of salary as a firm having something to hide. A lack of salary information in a job posting might be related to potential legal concerns. In an effort to combat pay discrimination, a growing number of state and local governments

now forbid employers from asking about candidates' salary histories. The human resources experts at HR Dive note that 21 states in the United States have state-wide bans that prohibit employers from asking about salary histories. Those bans are not in place in Canada, but in 2019 Ontario became the first province to pass pay transparency legislation that mandated all publicly advertised job postings include a salary range. Various firms in the United States insist they are committed to transparency and will list salary ranges in job listings. But even those that do not list salary range in a listing may reference it during an initial interview. Candidates in the early stages of the hiring process can therefore benefit from being patient.

If salary still hasn't been brought up after an initial interview or a second interview, candidates can request

a range. An initial interview is not the appropriate time to do that, as it can make candidates appear overeager about salary. However, requesting a range after a first or second interview indicates to a firm that candidates are still interested in the position. And though it can spark some nervousness on the part of candidates, it's entirely reasonable to request a salary range before committing any additional time to the interview process, especially since that process may require travel and time off from work.

Salary can be the elephant in the room during a job interview. A patient and delicate approach to salary discussions can reflect positively on candidates and ensure they get the information they need to make the most informed career decision.
