Council is set to name new mayor next week

Nashua has been without mayor since mid-October

By the end of the week, Nashua will have a new mayor.

Or at least that's the City Council's plan, which will meet on Thursday for its first meeting of the month. The council usually meets on Mondays, but because several council members had conflicts that night during their Nov. 20 meeting, council members pushed the meeting to Thursday.

During that Nov. 20 meeting, the council announced its intention to appoint a new mayor next week rather than hold a special election.

The city has been without a mayor since Oct. 16, when Alex Anthofer submitted his resignation, effective immediately. Anthofer, who had served on the City Council before being elected to Nashua's top post in 2021, cited family reasons for leaving the office less than two years into his term. During the Nashua Public Library's Meet and Greet that was held in October, Mayor Pro Tem Hal Kelleher III was the lone City Council candidate who expressed an interest in replacing Anthofer. Kelleher ended up winning a two-year term on the council during the Nov. 7 election. Former Nashua Mayor Butch Betsinger, who did not seek re-election in 2021 after serving one term, has also thrown his hat into the ring. Avenue of the Saints is almost back to normal

It took a little longer than expected until both directions to open on the 20th, which was of the new Floyd interchange on the Avenue of the Saints were opened, but for those taking the trip to and from Mason City, life just got a little easier.

The Iowa Department of Transportation had planned to open both divided highway lanes over the overpass bridges last week before Thanksgiving, with the westbound lanes opening first, followed a day later by the eastbound lanes.

But rain last week pushed the expected openings back a day,

said Jason Ruter, Iowa DOT District 2 construction technician supervisor.

"Originally it was supposed Monday," Ruter told the Press. "That day we got rained out. But then on Tuesday the 21st, we did open both lanes in the westbound direction. We were hoping to get that other one opened on Wednesday. They were out there and just couldn't get it done."

Ruter said the contractors had a breakdown on equipment, "and unfortunately, this is the time of year where they're

"My intention was to act as a construction manager," Thompson said, "but I wanted to make sure I provided a number from that standpoint. I do understand wanting to make sure that everything is taken care of so that nothing comes back to the county as unfair or anything."

Supervisors held a special meeting last Wednesday on the matter, and on Monday, they again hashed over ways to come with grips with what has becoming a confusing odyssey.

After a lengthy discussion – one that included making several changes to the drawings that Design Connections provided to bidders – supervisors decided to not open the bids. Instead, they asked Thompson to reach out to the sub-contractors to see if their bids would substantially change because of the changes and return on Dec. 18 with the bids.

"I don't think it was advertised enough, at least that's how I see it," Supervisor Travis Suckow said. "I'd rather not open these, because once the numbers are out, that's unfair, too.'

Supervisor Scott Cerwinske agreed. "There's been enough confusion that I think we just have to make sure we have it right before we move forward,' he said.

Board members also want Design Connections to "bond" the project, something that wasn't included in the bidding documents. Supervisors also told Thompson that they would like him to seek another bid for the electrical work. Other parts of the project, Thompson said, all had multiple bidders.

"The miscommunication came from the fact that I was looking to get all the subcontract bids," Thompson said, "so that ultimately I could present a construction manager cost today."

Supervisors purchased the ambulance station that is in his office no later than Dec. located near the intersection of Prospect Street and Water them before the Dec. 18 Board Avenue in New Hampton earli-

er this year for \$350,000.

Although Chickasaw County EMS' ambulances have been parked at the building since Aug. 1, the service is still renting living quarters for its main crew, most of whom work 24-hour shifts.

During Monday's meeting, Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson urged the board to move forward with employing Design Connections as the construction manager on the project and not seek more general contractor bids.

"I guess I keep coming back to where I don't know where it becomes advantageous for us to have a general," he said. "That's just going to charge us a percentage and in essence do the same thing he's doing for a lesser price."

"That's my thought, Supervisor Steve Breitbach said, and board members agreed.

Just how the county is going to pay for the remodeling, though, remained up in the air.

The plan had been to use the county's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to pay for the project, but earlier this year, board members voted 3-2 to give \$600,000 of ARPA funds to the county's Secondary Roads for a to-be-determined future road project. The county has about \$67,000 remaining in ARPA funds that have yet to be committed, but none of the supervisors or Knutson believe that amount of money will cover the entirety of the project.

Weather delays opening of Avenue of Saints interchange

stretched pretty thin as well, trying to get other roads open at the same time."

All summer and fall, both eastbound and westbound traffic had been running head-on for 21/2 miles by Floyd, with traffic from both directions using the westbound lanes and ramps that were constructed last year.

All traffic was diverted down the ramps to a traffic signal to provide access to 218/Monroe Street headed north through Floyd and County Road T44/Quarry Avenue headed south from Floyd.

In order to open up the eastbound lanes, the dividers that were used to direct the two-way traffic flow had to be removed, then the lanes correctly painted for one-way traffic headed east, Ruter said.

The dividers were screwed into the pavement, so they had to be removed then the screw holes filled with epoxy, Ruter said. The existing lane marking paint was removed with a water blaster, then the new lane markings painted on.

By Thursday morning, enough work had been completed that one of the two eastbound lanes was open

"We're doing the best we can, especially this time of year with the cold temps and stuff, too," Ruter said. "Plus we are using a water blaster so that does mean that there's going to be water on the road. They do their best to get that done when it's not freezing," he said, noting that the forecast is for highs in the 40s.

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Huskies look to take next step

For the love of the game. That in and of itself will get you places out on the hardwood.

Throw in some talent, hard work, patience and a little luck and winning basketball may become a possibility – if all the chips fall the right way.

But it's that passion to play that has Matt Mueller feeling pretty good about his team's chances this year in his second year at the helm of his Nashua-Plainfield Husky boys basketball squad.

"We have so many guys that just love being on this floor and love playing. I'm not going to say that we're going to be world beaters, but hey, when you got that – you can get better," said Mueller. "That makes it fun. It makes it easy to coach.²

Veteran squad has Nashua-Plainfield aiming to bring home two state trophies for second straight year

Not too many wrestling teams could absorb the graduation "hits" that Nashua-Plainfield took this past spring.

The Huskies saw five state tournament qualifiers — including state champion Garret Rinken and state placewinner Kendrick Huck – walk across the stage and receive their diplomas in May.

again. Nashua-Then Plainfield wrestling is a different animal, and that's why longtime Husky coach Al Frost and his veteran assistant coaches are heading into the 2023-24 season with high hopes; in fact, the Huskies want to experience a little deja vu this winter.

A year ago, Nashua-Plainfield brought home trophies from both state tournaments - taking third at the Class 1A state duals and then securing a thirdplace trophy at the Class 1A traditional tournament a couple of weeks later.

"We have set our goals high and have set them to bring home a couple of state trophies again this year," Frost said. "We've got some challenges, no doubt, but we feel like with the combination of all these guys we have coming back, we should have quality experience in our lineup.

Frost has built a 514-215-6 mark in 34 years as a head coach — one at Plainfield and 33 at Nashua-Plainfield – and there's no reason to believe that record will become even more sterling over the next few months.

The Huskies have eight wrestlers – Nic Brase, Jayden Rinken, Hayden Munn, Jackson Carey, Eli Kalainoff, Titus Evans, Tate White and Aiden Sullivan — who qualified for the 2023 Class 1A state tournament back in the room this year. Rinken is coming off a season in which he went 47-2 and claimed the 106-pound state title. The talented junior will bump up to 120 this winter, but he's far from the only Husky veteran. Nic Brase took fifth at 113 a year ago, and the junior will stay at the same weight this and will wrestle at 215.

"We're right around 30 wrestlers in the room, and that is a really healthy number for a 1A school," Frost said. "There will be some tryouts at a few weights, which will help us be even stronger. Good competition in the room is critical if you're going to chase state trophies, and, for the most part, we have that kind of competition."

The challenge will be getting all the Huskies to "slot" into their weights.

'We have a few guys that are going to have to cut a fair amount of weight," Frost said. 'They've done the body-fat testing, but now we have to get them there and keep them there."

Nashua-Plainfield is ready to embark on what is a solid schedule that includes solid Top of Iowa Conference opponents especially East Division rival and Class 2A state power Osage - as well as tournaments ranging from this weekend's Chris Davis Invite at Wapise Valley to the Battle of Waterloo.

'The conference will be tough again this year," Frost said, "and we'll see some good competition at all our tournaments. But that's what you want. You don't get better without wrestling good kids, and we'll see plenty of them.'
