Main Street building is torn down

City Council gets update on 223 Main, receives info on projects from city's Park Board president

The building at 223 Main St. in Nashua is no more.

The demolition of the property went down on Monday and Nashua City Clerk John Ott said the process to remove that building was moved up a day or two as it was originally planned to be taken down later in the week.

The city secured a bid of \$78,000 for DW Zinser Co., a demolition crew based out of Walford, IA, to do the demo work on that downtown property. The cost for the tear down does not include the removal of asbestos in the building and having to haul that hazardous waste to the Landfill of North Iowa in Mason City at \$90 a ton.

"It should be hauled away this week and filled

Nashua is dealing with wastewater main leak

Nashua city officials hope to have issues with a leak in a wastewater "force" main that runs under the Cedar River resolved by today, according to a press release put out by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources on Thursday.

According to the press release, DNR officials at a field office in Manchester were notified by the city of the leak on Wednesday evening after the discharge was discovered around 8 p.m.

City officials said actions were taken to minimize the release from the main, but DNR officials say it is estimated that nearly 16,000 gallons were flowing into the river.

The DNR press release said that repairs were underway.

Bacteria samples have been collected, and

Unique children's choir set to perform in Nashua next month

Group from Uganda to put on concert at Compass on Oct. 3

Drew McHolm can't wait, and he hopes the feeling is mutual among area residents.

In short, the Little Brown Church pastor believes we're in for a treat on Thursday, Oct. 3, when the Compass Outreach Center will host Watoto, a Christ-centered children's choir from Uganda, for a concert that he believes will provide area residents with an emotional journey.

"I'm really excited, and even though I've never seen them, everything I hear is out of this world," McHolm said about the concert at Compass, which is a ministry of the Little Brown

Church and is located near the intersection of Greeley and Woodbridge streets in Nashua. "The choir has a wonderful story that they will bring through their singing, dancing and their personal stories — ones that are filled with so much restoration and hope.

Watoto has visited twice before when the First Congregational Church hosted the group. That church merged with the Little Brown Church several years ago, and the building is now home to the Compass Outreach Center.

"Many of those Congregational members are now members of our church,"

in," said Ott. "Next week it should be barren ground."

Ott also stated that he has been working with David Doyle from the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) about a market analysis/reuse plan for that aforementioned vacant lot at 223 Main St. Ott said the EPA will hold meetings along with the city and different organizations, as well as business leaders, to review the results of the market analysis. They'll also discuss challenges and potential site programming that will all be incorporated into a redevelopment plan for that downtown property.

Nashua Park Board President Nate Sinnwell gave several updates on projects that his committee is working on.

He said there was \$10,000 that was approved by the city to pour the dance floor at the Baldwin Bandshell in Cedar View Park. Because the work to pour the concrete was done with subbed rebar instead of wire mesh, the cost came in quite a bit less. He said the total bill was around \$7,500.

Sinnwell said that volunteers from St. John Lutheran Church in Nashua, through a Sunday community service project, and students from Nashua-Plainfield High School helped with construction of the bandshell's retaining wall. There will also be landscape work done with leftover rock so that city workers can mow right up to that structure. The cost of the added work to the bandshell would cost anywhere from \$1,500 to \$2,000 according to Sinnwell.

The Park Board would also like to coat the bathrooms at the campground with an epoxy coating, which will protect the floors and make them less slippery. The Nashua Civic League has agreed to pay \$2,000 that would fund that project if the city would pay the remaining \$1,760. The leftover money from the bandshell dance floor pour, which was ARPA money, will constitute the city's portion of that money that will go towards the new bathroom floors.

Sinnwell also stated Pa's Playground, built in memory of Howard Schluter of Nashua, has poured a cement curb sidewalk and concrete pad for a picnic shelter. At the next Park Board meeting, Sinnwell said they should have plans for that picnic shelter, which will be donated by Lynne and Lisa Schluter.

Sinnwell also said there will be a bike path adjacent to the Avenue of the Saints, called Brahn's BMX Bike Path. He said St. John Lutheran Church planted some perennials as well on

the site to beautify the area.

An Iowa DNR (Department of Resources) grant that saw the city plant trees at Cedar View Park back in October has enacted a warranty for two of the trees, which have died. Sinnwell said another tree got backed over and is not covered by the warranty. The warranty will cover 50 percent of the cost of the trees that will be replaced. He said the cost of the trees was \$300 after the warranty from Tiedt Nursery, where the trees were purchased.

Sinnwell made a recommendation that the Park Board take over control of the firewood sales at the campground, something the Boy Scouts had done in the past.

"This has kind of been an ongoing issue. We stock it, there's other folks that stock it - city guys stock it a lot," said Sinnwell. "Money doesn't get picked up. You never see anybody else work for it. We'd like for 2025 to take over the firewood sales itself and then use the money that we generate towards fireworks."

Sinnwell said he has a small group of folks - around four or five - that want to just focus on

the campground.

"I'd like to add a campground committee underneath the Park Board. I'm thinking maybe that would be a good use of our structure," said Sinnwell.

Sinnwell also addressed the camp host position at the campgrounds, which he feels should be taken over by Shea Gerber, the Parks/Maintenance Director for the city. He said that would make more sense because Gerber has access to the money box, which would make it easier for him to follow up with campers that haven't paid.

The Council was okay with that decision, as long as Gerber agreed to take on that responsibility.

Halloween in the Park will take place on Saturday, Oct. 5 in the park and Sinnwell said a tentative date of Oct. 14 is the plan to close the campgrounds for the season.

Nick Henningsen officially started his job as Water/Wastewater Supervisor this past Monday for the city of Nashua.

Council members voted 3-2 last month to approve the terms of hire for Henningsen.

Those ayes came from Council members Jake Johnson, Peggy Hall and Dan Zwanziger. The nay votes were from Samantha Johnson and Ernie Willsher.

Henningsen's pay rate is \$43 an hour - over \$89,000 annually.

The City hired Henningsen to replace Ion Environmental Services - a water and wastewater company based out of Muscatine that did not renew its contract with the city this year.

Henningsen had been Nashua's Water/Wastewater Superintendent for eight years prior to Ion taking over on Aug. 1, 2023. Ion's contract with the city ran out on July 31, 2024.

Nashua unanimously voted in April of 2023 to create a full-time Public Works employee position that would replace Henningsen, whose contract with PeopleService was not renewed.

Henningsen was the Water & Sanitary Collection Superintendent at New Hampton prior to returning to his job at Nashua.

Samantha Johnson and Jake Johnson were also appointed to the Chickasaw Cedar Lake Improvement Council.

Auditor: Voter must request absentee ballot, can't make request for others

Those who want to call their local auditor's office and request an absentee ballot request form can only request a form for themselves.

Ditto for those who go to an auditor's office.

During the open comment period of Monday's meeting of the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors, Auditor Sheila Shekleton said that her office received a reminder from the state Secretary of State's office

that "we can only send out an absentee ballot request form if it's requested from the person who is the voter."

So that means, she said, that if, say a husband calls her office and wants to request forms for himself and his wife, it's a "no go."

Shekleton pointed out that

However, under state law, auditor offices can't actually mail ballots to homes until early voting starts on Wednesday,

Oct. 16. The general election is set for Tuesday, Nov. 5, when polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Please contact your local electric cooperative/utility if you plan to build a grain bin in the vicinity of an electric distribution line or electric transmission line.

Dairyland Power Cooperative owns and operates transmission lines in Northeastern Iowa, which provide electrical energy to local rural electric cooperatives and municipalities. Those transmission lines are operated at voltages that greatly exceed local distribution and service lines that may be located on your property. Dairyland will provide assistance in planning the placement of the grain bin near our transmission line to provide a safe environment for everyone working and living around grain bins.

The State of Iowa requires specific clearances for electric lines around grain bins, with different standards for those filled by portable and permanent augers, conveyors and elevators. The drawings show specific clearances required for each scenario.




Figure 234-4(a)—Clearance envelope for grain bins filled by permanently installed augers, conveyors, or elevators




Figure 234-4(b)—Clearance envelope for grain bins filled by portable augers, conveyors, or elevators

Rule 234F. This Paragraph "b" shall apply only to grain bins loaded by portable augers, conveyors or elevators built after September 9, 1992, or to grain bins loaded by permanently installed augers, conveyors or elevator systems installed after December 24, 1997. (As adopted by the Iowa Utilities Commission)

Dairyland Power Cooperative is required by the Iowa Utilities Commission to provide this annual notice to farmers, farm lenders, grain bin merchants, and city and county zoning officials. 

Crash course in safety, on and off the farm

Chickasaw County ISU Extension annual Farm Safety Day draws kids from five school districts

Jacob Fritcher couldn't help but smile as he was peppered with questions at his tractor safety station last week at the Big 4 Fairgrounds.

"They have a lot of questions, but they're good ones so that's a plus," the Bodensteiner Implement employee said. "We just want them to be safe when they're on the farm and around tractors so the more questions, the better."

It was that kind of Wednesday in Nashua, where Chickasaw County ISU Extension and a plethora of partners put on the annual Farm Safety Day that brought together students from five different schools to learn about safety both on and off the farm.

"It is Farm Safety Day, but really, it's about being safe everywhere," said Makaela Kime, the youth coordinator for Chickasaw County. "It's kind of geared for farms, but it's really more than that with the EMS, the Rescue Squad and people like that sharing their time, too. And that's good because kids need to know that those folks are going to be there to help them no matter where they are."

Students from Turkey Valley, Nashua-Plainfield, New Hampton, St. Joseph Community School and Sumner-Fredericksburg took part in the morning-long event, and the list of presenters that were spread out around the fairgrounds was long.

From Chickasaw County EMS to Nashua Area EMS to Chickasaw County Conservation Board to Butler County Rural Electric Cooperative to Operation Lifesaver to New Hampton FFA students to the men and women of AirCare Air Ambulance to Bodensteiner's Fritcher, the "experts" if you will made their safety

itches to elementary-aged students.

One reason Farm Safety Day is held is that relatively few students — at least compared to years ago — live on working

farms. Kime said that means when kids are at their friends' house on a farm, they need to know the dangers that are inherent to farm life.

"I think that's a big thing," Kime said. "Even though we live in a farming area, there are kids that are hardly ever on a farm so when they do go hang out with a friend on a farm, they need to know what to be careful about and how to make sure they stay safe."

She said one of the highlights for the youngsters came when the University of Iowa's

AirCare ambulance flew into the fairgrounds. "Hopefully, they'll never have to be on that helicopter," Kime said, "but if they do, they're going to know that the paramedics and the nurses and the pilot are there to help them."

And as much as the kids enjoyed the first field trip of the school year, i.e., they weren't in class, the presenters had just as much fun.

"It's great to see the kids and talk to them about what we do and why we do it," Nashua Area EMS Director Zenda Vikturek said. "Plus, I know they're young, but maybe we get some kids who are interested in working with us down the road, right? At least we planted some seeds today."

As important as the farm safety stations were, so, too, were those that dealt with situations that can happen anywhere.

Take the Butler REC station, where employees talked to students about what they should and should not do in situations like having downed power lines land on, say a school bus.

"They got a lot of good knowledge throughout the day," Kime said, "and hopefully, they'll never have to use it but just in case, hopefully they'll remember something




Numbers are better, but farming's still dangerous

Tractor accidents, grain entrapment and injuries from ornery livestock are just some of the dangers agricultural workers face every day. In fact, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health says agriculture is one of the most hazardous industries in the United States.

In 2016, the agricultural industry had a rate of 21.4 deaths per 100,000 workers, and each day agricultural workers experienced 100 non-fatal, lost-work-time injuries.

The good news is those numbers have declined in recent years, but farming remains a dangerous business.

In 2022, workers in the agriculture still had one of the highest fatal injury rates (18.6 deaths per 100,000 full-time equivalents), compared to 3.7 deaths per 100,000 FTE for all U.S. industries.

Transportation incidents were the leading cause of death for these farmers and farm workers. Other leading causes were violence by other persons or animals and contact with objects and equipment.

In 2022, over half (56%) of deaths in the agriculture industry occurred to workers 55 years of age and older.

Agricultural dangers are not limited to North America.

In Ireland, farm accidents have increased by 13 percent in the last five years and by 31 percent in the last decade, according to a national survey of farm accidents conducted by the Teagasc National Farm Survey. Furthermore, 97 percent of all farm accident victims required medical treatment.

Farms are dangerous places, and while carelessness can and does contribute to many incidents, accidents also take place during routine, seemingly safe activities.

These farm safety guidelines can help lower the risk of injuries.

Know farm equipment

Read and follow all instructions in the equipment operation manuals. In addition, attend local farm safety workshops to learn more about specific equipment and products.

Conduct routine safety checks

Look around buildings and grounds for obvi-

ous hazards, such as fire hazards and hazardous materials, including farm chemicals that are not stored correctly.

Practice cleanliness

Maintain clean and neat work areas with tools stored properly and out of the way after use.

Be mindful of your clothing and hair

Many accidents involve a power take-off system, or PTO, which is a common component of large rotary mowers, tractors and forage choppers.

Clothing can easily get caught in an engaged but unguarded PTO stub. It's easy for laces or coveralls to become wrapped around a spinning stub shaft. The PTO driveline and other protr-

sion points also can be dangerous if people do not pay attention.

Use rollover protection structures

ROPS can be used on tractors and other equipment to prevent injuries. In addition, wear seat belts and employ other safety equipment as advised.

Avoid extra passengers

It can be tempting to take the kids for a spin, but do not allow additional passengers to ride on agricultural equipment.

Exercise caution when handling chemicals

Take extra precautions when handling any chemicals, including pesticides.

Wear protective gear

Wear appropriate gear and equipment as outlined by NIOSH or the Mine Safety and Health Administration. Make sure the skin, feet, ears, eyes, and hands are protected at all times.

Employ lock out/tag out control

This is a process where one can work on equipment only after every energy source has been controlled, such as hydraulic, pneumatic, mechanical, and electrical, according to Rural Mutual Insurance Company. Turning off equipment and using certain controls or locks on devices can prevent equipment from restarting before it is safe to do so.

Farm safety should be a priority for owners, their families and employees so that agricultural injuries can be reduced.

As harvest season approaches, let's put safety first

Six tips we should maintain throughout the season

Safety should be a major concern for all farmers during harvest, but as the season goes on, it can be easy to miss details or neglect safe practices that can put you or others at risk.

Here are six simple safety tips offered by Iowa State University Extension to maintain throughout the season to keep yourself and your crew out of harm's way.

1. Keep your machine's safety features, mirrors and windows clean both in and out of the field

Grain carts are one of the most commonly used pieces of equipment during harvest, but they also have the most potential for blind spots. With few lights on the back of the cart and large areas of obstructed visibility, it's important to keep the safety features available in good working order. Check your cart's turn signal and brake lights prior to leaving each field to ensure safe operation down the road.

Be sure to regularly wipe any dust or debris from safety reflectors, lights and mirrors on your grain cart both in the field and on the road, as well as those on your combine, tractor and gravity wagons. If your cart or wagon doesn't come with turn signal lights, a backup strobe like this one can be used to make your implement more visible in low light situations. Keep glass cleaner and paper towels or rags in your cab to clean your machine daily, and prevent accidents that can occur from not seeing a car or other obstacle on the road.

Replace any reflectors that are not in good condition at the start of harvest season and clean reflectors and lights regularly.

2. Inspect your PTO's safety shields for all operation

The Power Take Off (PTO) can cause severe injury without proper safety precautions. NEVER step over the PTO shaft, either while it is running or when it is not in operation. This includes a tractor and grain cart combination as well as a tractor attached to an auger against a grain bin. It is always better to take few extra seconds and walk around the equipment.

Inspect the guards on the PTO shaft every season. With the tractor turned off and the key stored in the operator's pocket, use one hand to spin the shield 360°. If the guard can spin without stopping or turning the power drive train, the shield is working properly. If the guard does catch or rub at any point in time, the guard should be repaired or replaced before being put back into service. Don't forget to check the PTO shafts on the combine head as well to prevent crop from getting tangled around the shaft.

3. Look out for stray metal and other debris

Be observant as you harvest your fields and watch out for large debris that could seriously damage your machines and slow down your harvest. If you do experience a plug in your corn head, follow this procedure to safely remove it.

A farmer brings in beans during the 2023 harvest season, and as our growers get ready for another harvest season, this is just your friendly reminder that we all need to be safe as farmers bring in their crops.

- Bring the combine to a stop and back up a few feet so the head of the combine is located over harvested crop.

- Bring the combine's threshing element to a slow speed on idle.

- Open the deck plates as wide as they will go.

- Using the reverser switch for the head, lightly bump the switch in reverse a few times to see if the plugged material becomes dislodged. If the material does not become dislodged, stop running the head. Constant running of the head can cause damage to the slip clutch, making it weak and creating excess heat.

- Follow the combine lockout procedure before ever working around or under a raised combine head. Make sure all hydraulics and shafts are removed from the combine and safety cylinder block/stops are applied.

- Using cut resistant gloves, grab a handful of material at a time and slowly begin pulling it out of the snapping rolls. Be careful; there is likely to be something lodged in the snap rolls and it could be sharp objects such as nails or sheet metal.

4. Be aware of your crew's location

A good practice is to honk the horn of the combine or tractor three times before starting the machine or engaging the components so other members of your crew know the machine is moving, and to give them time to move out of the way and remove themselves from moving parts.

5. Check your tow ropes and chains when extracting stuck equipment

While not every area in the state may have this problem each season, it's important to know how to stay safe when pulling out a stuck tractor or combine.

When possible, use tow ropes in good condition instead of chains. If only chains are avail-

able, inspect them to make sure both ends are in good condition and the chain itself does not have any broken, bent or weak links. Be sure that the machine you pull with and the chain are large enough to tow the weight of the stuck machine.

Never stand between a stuck vehicle and the implement towing it. Chains and ropes can break and will seriously injure anyone in their path. It's best to stand far way and communicate with the operator of the equipment using either cell phones or two-way radios.

6. Be conscious of your mental health and seek help when necessary

There is a growing concern about mental

health in the agriculture and farming community, and a harvest season with unusual circumstances like this year can cause additional stress.

Be mindful of your own mental health, as well as that of your employees, co-workers and family.

Continue to keep up with these practices as you go through the harvest season. By using these tips and maintaining awareness of your surroundings, you can protect yourself, your investment and others on the road and in the field for a safe harvest season.

Huskies come alive in second half

FOOTBALL: FROM 13

...there we go -- off to the races," smiled Gelner.

N-P (3-0, 2-0) was a heavy favorite in this one, but they didn't look like it after the game's first possession.

Emmitt Petermeier, who wears a lineman's number of 58, blasted his way through a gaping hole right sideline for 62 yards all the way down to the Husky 2-yard line. Comet quarterback Carson Wayman worked off the productive drive with a one-yard plunge for paydirt and suddenly the Huskies were trailing for the first time all year.

Could it have been the Friday the 13th jinx? Pfft!!!

"It just seemed odd at the beginning of the game. You could see it in our guy's eyes. We just didn't play the way we wanted. We didn't come out ready to play football," said Sudol. "At halftime we had some talk and came out and responded. It's the team that we thought we were."

The team Sudol knows he has is one of the better ones in the state that will have another underdog come to town tonight (Friday) in the form of one-win AGWSR (1-2, 1-1). Win that game and it sets up a potential showdown at seventh-ranked St. Ansgar (2-1) in a whopper of a non-district game on Friday, Sept. 27.

St. Ansgar was barely nipped -- 21-20 -- by top-ranked West Hancock (3-0), the newly-christened No. 1 team in Class A according to the first prep poll released by the Associated Press this week.

That Saint-Husky game will have to wait, as the Cougars won't be favored to win, but they'll be a distinct underdog. AGWSR was drilled last week by North Tama, 38-9. N-P topped those same Redhawks, 27-6, on the road in Week 2.

That's all on paper. Case in point, the first 24 minutes of the contest at home last week against the Comets saw N-P only lead 14-7 at the break. Gelner and his coaching staff had a heart-to-heart talk at half to get better. The words of wisdom worked.

"We had the North Tama game and we won it by a lot. We felt pretty confident in ourselves, so we came out of here just thinking we're the hotshots and they kind of took it to us," said Gelner about the BCLUW game. "After halftime, I told

them to get some energy and get back to being us."

N-P's Eli Kalainoff -- perhaps the Huskies' best all-around player on both sides of the ball -- set the tone early on. He banged out tough runs to set up the Huskies' first score, which was sent home by Gelner on a four-yard run with 44 ticks left in the first quarter.

Sudol credited his newly-seasoned guards -- junior Trent Rodruck and senior Isaac Jones -- for another dominating night on the ground for the Huskies.

"The line blocked hard -- that was the biggest thing," said Sudol. "When you have guys that you lose like we had last year, you knew it was going to take a little time. Rodruck and 'Jonesy' are coming and our other few linemen are doing a really nice job. The new pulling guards were huge."

Kalainoff would have to sit the rest of the game midway through the second quarter as he hurt his ankle.

"Hopefully, it's nothing major," said Sudol about Kalainoff's injury right after Friday night's win.

It's not the ankle that Kalainoff broke last year and saw him miss the last three games of the regular season, in addition to the postseason game at home versus Lake Mills. That's a positive. But it won't be a surprise if he doesn't play against AGWSR tonight, as Sudol and his staff will want him healthier for the St. Ansgar road test.

Kalainoff gained 74 yards on eight carries and looked every part of the all-state player that Sudol and his coaching staff knows he can become in this junior year.

Gelner had this to say about Kalainoff's injury -- which gets to the larger picture of the Huskies' 2024 season. That's basically keep your head up and grind and grit your way no matter the circumstance or what the scoreboard reads.

"The best thing he can do is just stay positive. If you're negative, things go downhill -- just like our game. If we're not up on the energy level, it will go downhill," said Gelner.

Gelner would score the last points of the first half on a seven-yard plunge into the end zone. That score was setup by junior Devon Blanchard's interception, who returned it 30 yards to the Comet 20-yard line.

Let's backtrack for a second. After a Comet squib kick, N-P set up shop at its own



42-yard line midway through the first quarter. N-P got down to the Comet 11-yard line (Kalainoff 24-yard run key run of the drive), but senior fullback Jackson Carey's fumble with 6:45 left in the first gave the ball back to the Comets.

Carey would redeem himself in a big way on a 33-yard touchdown scamper left side where there wasn't one Comet that laid a hand on him. That made the score 21-7 in favor of the Huskies with 9:23 left in the third.

N-P was just getting started. A fake punt extended BCLUW's seventh possession, but a Miles Carpenter pick with 5:50 to go in the third quarter thwarted that drive.

"On that play I was the left outside linebacker and I looked over and saw a wide receiver coming from the opposite side of the field on a drag," said Carpenter, who is just a sophomore. "He was wide open. I knew by the time I'd get to him that the quarterback would probably throw the ball and it was a perfect time. I stepped up and got that pick and made

that play." Gelner ended up stiff-arming his way for a 13-yard score to ratchet up the score to 27-7.

A 30-yard punt return by junior Landon Foelske put the ball all the way down to the BCLUW 29-yard line after a penalty was enforced. A 15-yard personal foul was tacked on to the end of the run after the Comet tackler ripped Foelske's helmet completely off during his tackle attempt.

On the very next play, Blanchard -- under center at quarterback -- danced into the end zone on a designed run from 14 yards out with 1:10 left before the final quarter.

Carpenter's recovery of a fumble on a Comet kickoff -- knocked out and forced by junior Tyler Zimmer -- was recovered by Carpenter at the Comet 23-yard line.

Gelner went untouched right sideline 23 yards for his final rushing score, 54 seconds before the start of the fourth. That meant N-P scored its last two touchdowns of the evening nine seconds apart.

Sudol talked about Gelner

who has been the starting tailback at N-P since his sophomore season.

"He just needed tonight -- the confidence. He was loose," said Sudol. "Gelner's a goofy kid. He's gotta be loose, he can't be serious. He's gotta just be having fun. He had fun tonight. You could see it in his eyes he was going to have a big night."

N-P also had several near misses in the passing game that could have went for touchdowns.

"We need to come together, just make plays and it happened in the second half for us," said Sudol.

BCLUW scored twice in the final quarter against Husky reserves.

Carpenter, who also registered five tackles, talked about his team's mindset after getting punched in the mouth on the game's opening drive.

"(Jason) Fisher had a little talk with the defense. Our word of the week was focus and that we needed to bring the focus, run the right stuff -- make the tackles and win this game," said Carpenter. "That's exactly what we did."

In order to reach the playoffs for a fourth-straight year, the Huskies will need to stay together if times get tough -- just like last Friday -- and maintain a cohesive bond that seems to be strengthening from week to week.

"We love these kids. The kids love us. They respond to it and they know we care," said Sudol. "That's how we built this team is just on a lot of care and love

for each other."

(I did not write or submit this request.) I know a council member had the specific information requested about the cement poured, prior to the first meeting, and a second witness was aware of the fact. All we received at the 8/19/24 meeting was an explanation of why the change(s) were made. What was said at the meeting: "We wanted to save the kitchen window, so we moved it over five feet. I didn't even think about the set-back line." Who was speaking was not identified. We were not told of his relationship to the contractor. His explanation was not included in the minutes of the meeting. Furthermore, the actual change to the west is eight feet from the north/south line of the existing house. Also, the 60' length shown on the plan, also includes an additional 20 foot porch on the north end of the addition (this porch was not noted on the original plan)." The property owner for 216 Main St. requested that the council consider offering some tax relief for putting in a business in the community. He mentioned two ideas. A city abatement and free water for 1 year.

City Clerk Ott stated that he was pretty sure that the city couldn't do anything about the water, but he would check into it, and he also mentioned that there are some tax abatements available for improvements to a property.

Hearings/Resolutions
There was discussion about 228 Sam-

ple St. After discussion, J. Johnson/M, Hall/S, M/C to set two public hearings for October 7th. One public hearing was for consideration of a special permit allowing the property to be used as a home business and short-term rental and a separate public hearing for consideration of a special permit allowing a variance to the setback requirements for an addition to the house that has already been started and is in non-compliance with the city's Code of Ordinance's setback requirements. RC: all ayes.

The council also considered rezoning some properties. J. Johnson/M, Willsher/S, M/C to set a public hearing for October 7th to discuss zoning reclassifications. RC: all ayes.

The council had a hearing on setting bids for corrective action for 123 Lexington Ave. The council was not ready to start with the bidding process as the city is currently in the middle of demolishing 223 Main St. and would like to know the final costs of the current demolition project before moving any further with any more demolitions. J. Johnson/M, Hall/S, M/C to table setting bids for corrective action at 123 Lexington Ave. RC: all ayes.

RC: all ayes. 24-65 Resolution Appointing Amand Theilen to the Library Board. J. Johnson/M, Zwanziger/S, M/C. RC: all ayes.

Business of the Mayor:
Mayor Kelleher proclaimed September 23-29, 2024 as National See Tracks? Think Train Week and encourages all citizens to recognize the importance of rail safety education. He also mentioned that he would like to talk with the school superintendent about a program called "If I Were Mayor" if it were OK with the council. The council supported him talking to the school about the program.

Department Reports:
City Clerk Ott informed the council that the bank reconciliation and monthly financial reports for August were not finalized because he hasn't received the receipts from the Nashua Civic League for the Water Over the Dam Days transactions. He informed the council that the demolition and removal of 223 Main St. has started and the building is down and the contractors will be working on getting the site cleaned up.

City Council:
Council Member Hall stated that the school had been doing a lot of community service and she wanted to thank them as they worked on a lot of different projects throughout the community.

Heather Hackman Library Director

shared her monthly report with the council.

Nate Sinnwell Park Board President shared his monthly report with the council and talked about several projects that they have been working on. Nate mentioned the retaining wall at the Baldwin Bandshell, progress at Pa's Playground with landscaping, picnic shelter pad, and Brahn's BMX Bike Course. He discussed reallocating the remaining budgeted ARPA funds from the bandshell project that won't be needed because the project is coming in under budget. The Park Board would like to coat the bathroom floors at the campground with a Poly Urea coating which will protect the floors and make them less slippery. The Nashua Civic League has agreed to pay \$2,000 if the city would pay the remaining \$1,760. The council agreed to use the ARPA funds that were remaining from the bandshell project that came in under budget to coat the floors of the campground restrooms. City Clerk Ott will draft a resolution reallocating the ARPA funds. Nate talked about having to replace 3 trees that died. The city received a DNR grant for the trees and the grant required the city to replace any trees that die within the first couple of years. The cost will be \$300 after the 50% warranty from Tiedt Nursery where the trees were purchased from. He talked about firewood sales at the campground. The Park Board asked the council about taking over the firewood sales in 2025 and using the money generated for fireworks. He talked about the structure of the park board which has a committee for Water Over the Dam Days. He mentioned that there is a small group of individuals who would like to focus only on the campground. They are not all currently members of the Park Board, so J. Johnson recommended adding them to the Park Board and forming a subcommittee under the Park Board for the campground. Nate also talked about the camp host. He stated that there is some confusion as to responsibility as to who does what, etc. He thinks that the Park Board should be out of the camp host business. He mentioned that he had talked to City Clerk Ott, Street Supervisor Zade McCall and She Gerber Parks/Maintenance. His idea was to have Shea be the point person for the camp host. He said it would make more sense because Shea has access to the money box and it would be easier to follow up with campers who haven't paid. The council said that was fine if Shea was OK with it. He also mentioned a couple of upcoming dates Halloween in the Park October 5th and the tentative date of October 14th to close the campground for the season.

Water/Wastewater:
Nick Henningsen water/wastewater supervisor gave a brief update to the council as this was his first day as a City of Nashua employee. He informed the council that the filters for the blowers hadn't been changed in quite a while, so he ordered some filters. He noted that the influent meter isn't working. City Clerk Ott informed him that a new one was ordered on September 4th. Nick also mentioned something about the rotameter not working and he was hoping it would not need to be replaced. He also noted that we were low on chlorine

and sulfur dioxide, so he ordered some. He stated that he can switch some tanks around until we get some if he needs to. He informed the council that the water loss was 44%, but he hasn't been here long enough to know what is going on. The city did have a large leak that is now fixed. He stated that he likes how Chad from Ion had set everything up for reports, so he will probably continue to use what Chad set up. He also said that there is something going on with the LaBounty lift station. The hours are off, what he means the hours are low compared to what they should be pumping. He noted that it is connected to a 12" or 16" pipe that was completely clogged with grease. One concern is whether Kwik Star has a grease trap. Nick also mentioned that he would like a cell phone so that he doesn't have to use his personal phone, especially if the city has him start checking building permits to make sure that the setback requirements are being followed. He inquired about the hierarchy if he was a department head or under Zade or how it worked. S. Johnson stated that when it comes to water/wastewater he is the head of the department, but if he is helping with streets or something than Zade would be the Department Head. He was inquiring because when Zade and him were going through some stuff Zade said he would need to have his vacations approved by Zade. J. Johnson stated that he didn't know if the city could have Zade supervise him because of the certifications that Nick has to have. Nick said that he knew that if they were working on streets, plowing snow, etc. Zade would be his boss, and he understood that 100%.

Discussion/Action:
The council discussed and/or acted on several items.

J. Johnson/M, S. Johnson/S, M/C to table discussion on compensatory overtime.

The council discussed the Outdoor Siren Alert system and after discussion, the council wanted City Clerk Ott to research funding sources.

City Clerk Ott informed the council that he has been working with Dvid Doyle from the EPA about a market analysis/reuse plan for 223 Main St. They will be working with the city in organizing a meeting involving different organizations and business leaders to review the results of a market analysis and discuss challenges and potential site programming to incorporate into a redevelopment plan.

Other Business:
There was no other business:
S. Johnson/M to adjourn, J. Johnson/S, M/C. RC: all ayes. The meeting adjourned at 8:17PM.
