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Christmas to take center stage

Nashua and Plainfield to hold annual holiday celebrations a week from Saturday

Now that Thanksgiving has passed — although we're sure there are a few leftovers to be consumed yet — it's time to put the focus on Christmas.

Nashua and Plainfield will do just that a week from Saturday, Dec. 7, when the two cities cele-

brate Christmas with Christmas in Nashua and Christmas on Main.

The former is up first — with most of Christmas in Nashua activities taking place during the daylight hours — while Plainfield's Christmas on Main will be held in the evening.

"It's a great way to celebrate our small towns," said Big 4 Chamber of Commerce volunteer Val Johnson during a recent interview. "And it's

a great way to support our local businesses that support our clubs, our schools and our communities."

The chamber's Holiday Promotion will have a double-punch day on Dec. 7, meaning if you spend 50 bucks at a business, you'll get \$100 "punched." For each \$100 spent, a card will go into the Dec. 17 drawing for prizes totaling \$450 in "chamber bucks."

As for the events, there are a host of them.

Let's start in Nashua, which will also see a new business, Roosters on Main, opening.

Park will close next week for dam work

City clerk says \$763,000 repair job will lead to closing of Nashua's Veterans Park for undetermined time

Nashua City Clerk John Ott knows one thing for sure — Veterans Park will be closing on Monday.

What he and other city officials don't know

yet is how long the popular park will remain off limits to the public.

Monday is the day that workers from Boomerang Corporation, a civil contracting firm based in Anamosa, will begin working on fixing a "scour" on the Nashua dam, and Veterans Park will be a staging area for the project.

When that project will be completed, though, is up in the air. The completion date is largely dependent on Mother Nature and her old pal, Old Man Winter.

"It all depends on the weather," Ott said. "If

Supervisors tab auditor as county safety coordinator

Shekleton 'figured' her office would take over duties; board member says he looks at pay increase as a 'budget work session question'

Chickasaw County Auditor Sheila Shekleton had a feeling that it was coming, and that feeling was spot on Monday when the Board of Supervisors appointed her as the county's new safety coordinator.

The county's insurance provider mandated earlier this year that the county have a coordinator, and in April, supervisors gave the position to Ranae Carey, the administrative assistant for the County Engineer's Office and Secondary Roads Department.

Carey, though, resigned her position on Nov. 12, the same day that board members did not act on her request that the pay for the safety coordinator position be increased from 96 cents to \$5 per hour.

On Monday, Supervisor Jake Hackman said he supported appointing Shekleton and her office as the county's new safety coordinator.

"On the ISAC [Iowa State Association of Counties] website," Hackman said, "it says the county's auditor's office is the hub of county government. You are the custodian in absence of the board of supervisors. I think what this comes down to is that we're not here all day long if there is an accident."

He said before Shekleton took over as auditor in 2022, her office was the de facto safety coordinator, pointing out that the Auditor Office's sent out the weekly Heartland safety bulletins to

'Average' post-harvest year for area growers

Most area farmers have completed field work to put a cap on a challenging 2024

Post-harvest work seemed to be behind schedule this year, but the reality, a local crop specialist said this week, is that for the most part, farmers are wrapping up the 2024 growing season right on time.

"When you think about it, finishing up field work right around Thanksgiving is the average," said Corey Hackman, a certified crop specialist for AgVantage FS, "and we're there right now. We're actually finishing anhydrous today, the day before Thanksgiving, so we're right on target."

But because the harvest weather was dang near perfect, Hackman said a lot of area growers "feel behind" in 2024, but in some ways, that's a good thing.

Post-harvest field work — tillage, putting down fertilizer and applying anhydrous — was delayed by rainfall that began in late October and continued for a couple of weeks.


doubt about it, so maybe we probably feel a little behind," Hackman said, "but getting some rain certainly helped with things like tillage. The ground is still hard, but it's way better than it was in October."

And while the Nashua and Plainfield areas are still dealing with drought, the picture is much better today than it was a month ago.

In the latest Iowa Crop and Condition Report that was put out by the USDA on Monday, 25 percent of topsoil in the Northeast District, which includes Bremer and Chickasaw counties, was deemed either "very short" or "short" of moisture. That's down from 90 percent in the Crop and Condition Report that was released on Oct. 28.

Subsoil moisture profiles aren't as positive but still an improvement from a month ago as 50 percent of subsoils remain "very short" or "short," down from 87 percent in that Oct. 28 report.

One last go-around for legendary coach

Frost says he is enthused and energized to lead Huskies' wrestlers for one final season

Al Frost had a plan; he just failed to execute it.

"The idea was that I would totally retire after last year," the longtime Nashua-Plainfield wrestling coach said, "and that meant teaching, coaching and everything. ... Oh sure, I was going to sub, drive bus, find something to do but I figured last year was it when it comes to this."

This, of course, is coaching, and no matter how you slice it, Frost put together a legendary career.

Almost year in and year out, Nashua-Plainfield has been a wrestling powerhouse in the state of Iowa.

Frost led the Huskies to two state duals titles — claiming the Huskies' first in 2004 and the second eight years later. The Huskies also had a three-year stretch between 2008 and 2010 when they were the state duals runners-up.

Five times, Nashua-Plainfield has finished in the

top-three at the traditional state tournament, and Frost has coached seven individual state champions — Mitch Norton (2005), Cody Johnston (2008), Caleb Wilken (2010), Andy Glaser (2012), Garret Rinken (2021), Garret Rinken again (2022) and Jayden Rinken (2022).

Frost swears he was ready to hang it up after the 2023-24 season, but one thing led to another, and here he is, back in the wrestling room at the Husky Wellness Center for what he vows is one last go-around.

"I don't know if I have quite the stamina I used to," he said. "I'm enthused, I'm fired up, I'm excited about having the opportunity to coach again and you know what? Whoever we got out, we're bound and

Low-income heating assistance available

Northeast Iowa Community Action Corporation (NEICAC) is taking applications for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) through April 30, 2025.

LIHEAP customers will need to provide the following when applying for LIHEAP:

- The social security number of each household member, regardless of age, must be provided for that household member to be eligible. At least one household member must provide a social security number documentation for the household itself to be eligible.
- A copy of their most recent heating and electric bill.
- Documentation of gross income for everyone living in the home for the previous 30 calendar days, the most recent 12 months or for the previous calendar year.

There are income maximums to be eligible for the program. For a household of one, the annual gross income must be at \$30,120, and for each additional member of the household, add \$10,760 to calculate the income maximum.

Park will reopen once dam repairs are complete

The city received two other bids — one for \$940,000 and the other for \$1.5 million — for the work, and Shuck-Britson officials told council members in August that they saw "no reason" not to accept the bid. Ott said city leaders understand that Veterans Park is a popular destination for city residents, especially anglers who like to fish near the dam, but that closing the park is a must.

"It's as much for the safety of people as it is for the people who are going to work on the repairs," he said. "We'll definitely let people know when it's reopened but we're asking people to respect the barricades and stay out of the area until they're done."

The Nashua City Council awarded a \$763,000 contract to Boomerang in August after it submitted the low bid — by far — to place concrete blocks in the dam's void that officials from Shuck-Britson, the city's engineering firm, called a "self-healing process."

The work that will start next week makes up the majority of the \$1.3 million project to fix Nashua's century-old dam, which creates Cedar Lake.

Area farmers are hoping for normal to roll around in '25

The U.S. Drought Monitor, meanwhile, has downgraded the drought conditions in the area from "severe" to "moderate."

Farmers in the area also found themselves in what Hackman called a "pocket" in which at least some field work could be done.

"We were able to run when a lot of other places [in the state] couldn't," he said. "Did it slow down? Sure, it did, but it didn't come to a stop, either."

Considering the challenges — and there were many —

Since farmers planted their crops back in the spring, Hackman said farmers remain fairly optimistic.

"I think the mood out in the country is a lot better than people think," he said. "Between all the rain we got last spring, the no rain we got at the end, it's been a decent year. Yields were better than expected and it was a decent year."

Still, Hackman said growers are hoping for some normalcy in 2025.

"These days it seems like it's all or none," he said. "We'd kill for normal one of these years."

Frost pumped up for final year of coaching

determined to make them the best damn wrestlers for now and in the future. I'm going to have fun this year, and I'm going to have high expectations for our kids — just like I've always had."

Frost won a state championship for the then-Nashua Bulldogs when he claimed the Class AA 145-pound title in 1979.

"That was just a few years ago, right," he asked with a laugh.

He would go on to wrestle at Iowa and became an educator, teaching and coaching in Plainfield before Nashua and Plainfield came together.

For years, he taught physical education at the high school and, of course, save for the first year of the whole-grade sharing agreement, serving as the Huskies' head wrestling coach.

His intensity matside remains the same

— Al Frost videos celebrating a Husky victory are must-see — but a few things have changed over the years.

"I feel good, and I've been showing moves right and left," he said after the Huskies wrapped up a practice on the day before Thanksgiving. "But I'm not wrestling anymore, I gave up that crap two, three years ago. I'd get done, and every party of my body hurt, my shoulder ached, I had lost some muscle mass. Those younger guys, they're the ones who go out and roll around with the guys."

And he's appreciative of those younger guys — his assistant coaches, guys like Ben Kalainoff, Shane Huck, Jason Fisher and Taylor Wedeking.

"I say it all the time, but I mean it. We've had a lot of great coaches in the room over the years," he said, "and I appreciate them all."

And Frost is pumped up for what's to

come during the 2024-25 season, even if he's not sure about the rule changes coming to prep wrestling this season.

One of them is that takedowns is now worth three points, not two.

"I've already screwed up so many times ... coaching 40 years with a two-point takedown, you're not going to teach an old dog new tricks," he said. "Even though it's a three-point [move], I'll be messing up and yelling 'two' a lot. I'm the old dog, right?"

The goal remains the same — make each and every wrestler better as the season progresses.

"The guys who come out, we can make them successful," he said. "Whatever that is based on a kid's ability, that's what I want. If that's winning a state title or just getting a takedown on a Saturday in some gym, that's always been the goal. Always has been; always will be ... at least for one more year."

Grants selections are made in an effort to create a better quality of life for people in these counties. A local impact committee reviews the applications

from charitable organizations serving their community.

The CCCF that affiliates of the Community Foundation of Northeast Iowa (CFNEIA) is also seeking new volunteers to serve on their impact committees beginning in March 2025. The impact committee position description and volunteer interest form can be found at www.cfneia.org/volunteer. Individuals may complete a volunteer self-interest form or may nominate someone else, such as a colleague, community leader or friend, to connect the Community Foundation with to explore their interest in serving as a volunteer. various county departments. "You are the payroll, human resource manager for the county," Hackman said, and Shekleton said that "I know it falls on my shoulders. You can talk all you want but I know, I figured, this is where we are going." Hackman added that he looked through job descriptions for those working in the Auditor's Office and all of them contain the verbiage "other duties may be required or assigned."

pay one now," he said. Board members eventually approved naming the auditor as the safety coordinator, but they didn't take any action on a possible pay increase for whoever in the Auditor's Office becomes the safety, as Shekleton called it, "front person." Because the county has a safety coordinator, it will receive a 10 percent discount on its workers' compensation insurance, which works out to a little more than \$10,000 a year. Hackman said he had discussed that discount with County Attorney David Laudner last week. Laudner, Hackman said, asked "if they're going to give

us 10 percent, why can't they take that \$100,000 insurance wide and have that person in the counties twice a month, or once a month, to do this." Hackman said he appreciated the discount but thought that "maybe Heartland should take more of a stand on it ... helping all counties so that the same person is the go-to for all 10 counties and the landfill that they represent and have one person who Sheila would talk to." The supervisors also discussed other possible options for a safety coordinator but eventually settled on Shekleton and her office to take over the position.

Jayden Rinken, Nic Brase, Jackson Carey and Isaac Jones. Rinken, who will wrestle at 132 this year, has had a brilliant career and only a shoulder injury suffered last winter has kept him from heading into the season aiming to become a four-time placewinner at the

state meet. He finished third at 106 in 2022 as a freshman and then won the 106-pound title in 2023 as a sophomore. He made the state meet a year ago but was forced to default out of the tournament because of a shoulder injury. "He's looked really good so far, and I don't see him favor-

ing it at all," he said. "He seems to be healthy and it's going good. He went through surgery and a hell of a lot of rehabilitation ... He's fully ready to go, and that's good for us." Brase, meanwhile, is aiming for a third trip to the state tournament stand as he finished fifth at 113 in 2023 and seventh at the same weight a

year ago. He'll begin the season at 120 but may find his way to 113 before the end of the season. "Good, solid kid," Frost said, "and he tested so that he could go down to '13 so that might be a good option for him." Carey and Jones, meanwhile, made their first state tournament appearances a year

ago, and Carey made his way to the stand at 157 with an eighth-place finish at 157 while Jones picked up valuable experience in Des Moines at 285. Two other Huskies — Connor Sullivan and Devon Blanchard — also made trips to state last winter as Sullivan, now a sophomore, qualified at 106 while Blanchard, now a junior, made it into the 144 field.

Top of Iowa teams like Osage and Lake Mills to contend with but also wrestle in a number of quality tournaments, including the Battle of Waterloo where they routinely see Class 3A and 2A teams. We have to go into the postseason with a lot of confidence," Frost said. "We have a very good opportunity to win the district title and send a fair amount of guys to the traditional tournament. ... Having 14 in the lineup, that's huge, but we're going to have to avoid injuries, especially at some weights where we only have one or two guys, but if we can field a full lineup, that's always big for schools our size." The schedule is as always, only have some powerhouse

A variety of rule changes are coming to high school wrestling this year, and they include takedowns scoring three points, the chance to pick up four nearfall points and a change in the out-of-bounds rule that will see less stoppage of action. "You know, I can't see the advantage either way or the disadvantage either way," said Frost, who enters the season with a 546-224-6 coaching record compiled in 35 years of being matside. "You're going to see a lot of fast, quick scoring situations that are going to take place. If a kid doesn't get a pin, tech falls are going to readily come quickly but at the same time, if you get down by five points, you're not out of the woods. You still have an opportunity and you get a takedown and get a quick two-point near-fall you're right back in the money."

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



She's been named a two-time second team all-league performer for Smith and was one of the leaders in steals amongst all classes as a junior. Huck was the third-best steals leader in all five classes in the state with a 6.6 average during her junior campaign. Jaelah Stanford of Waterloo East (7.2 spg) was No. 1 followed by Coon Rapids Bayard's Anna Hart (6.9 spg).

alum Jennah Carpenter, who held the old record with 104. Carpenter also holds the all-time steals mark at N-P with 306. Huck now has 242 steals and needs 65 steals to break that mark.

Carpenter is in her first-year on Smith's coaching staff as an assistant.

Franzen was an honorable mention all-conference pick as a junior. She averaged 4.8 ppg, 3.5 rpg to go along with 2.2 apg and 1.9 spg. Her ability to play sound defense and contribute in all areas out on the floor is her most valuable asset. "We actually have some movement with those three," said Reams. "Most likely we'll have two 170 pounds. One will be a non-scoring JV-type and the other will be varsity."

Reams likes his team's chances this year to come out on top in several duals and tournaments.

"The expectations are to end down at the tournament and hopefully get on to state if possible," said Reams. "I don't think that's out of the question, especially for a few of them. We have freshmen coming in that have good experience. They got good speed, good skill to want to learn and win - a good competitive mindset."

One key element that Reams is stressing with his wrestlers is learning through adversity and picking yourself back up off the mat after encountering setbacks.

"That's what we tell 'em a lot, is if they lose, it's hard - but it's probably the best experience because you don't learn from pinning somebody in 20 seconds. You learn from those six-minute matches and the ones that you either just nipped in the bud or the ones that just get ya," he said.

The Huskies will host two home meets this year. The first one comes on Tuesday, Dec. 17 against the likes of New Hampton/Turkey Valley, North Fayette Valley and West Fork. The second home meet is scheduled to take place in Nashua versus North Butler/Clarksville and Riceville on Thursday, Jan. 16.

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Nashua-Plainfield girls blast Don Bosco in season opener

Nashua-Plainfield clamped down its full-court press in the season opener at Don Bosco on Tuesday. The result was a resounding win for Josh Smith's Huskies as his TIC East squad rolled to a convincing road rout by the score of 48-26 over the host Dons. The Huskies excelled in more areas than one in addition to Smith's tenacious press that forced 37 Don turnovers and 34 points from transition buckets. N-P was also adept down low

with 36 points in the paint. N-P led by as much as 29 points in the contest and held a 41-13 lead after three quarters of play. Half of Don Bosco's scoring output was tallied in the final period, long after the game had been decided. "I thought we played well for our first game. There are obviously things we're going to address before our next game and stuff that we'll need to clean up, but it was a good first game and I'm really proud of our girls," said Smith. N-P's leading scorer was senior guard Kadence Huck. Her stat line read 14 points, seven rebounds and

five steals. She was 6-15 from the field and spearheaded N-P's press, which gave the Dons fits all evening. Huck – the single-season record holder at N-P for steals – wasn't the only one coming up with steals after picking the Dons' pockets. N-P junior forward Elayna O'Neill led the team in steals with eight, followed by Huck's five. N-P senior center Josslynn Glaser also produced five steals, as did senior guard Marleigh Lowe. "Everyone was making their impact felt on the defensive end," said Smith. O'Neill hit for 10 points on 5-10

shooting and Glaser recorded 11 points. The low-post tandem combined to net 21 points and tally 14 rebounds. "I can't say enough positive things about either of those two. They were our first options all night and our 36 points in the paint really starts with those two," said Smith. Bloker takes fourth as Husky girls open mat season

The Huskies hit the mat last Saturday in the first official competition of the season in a tournament at Decorah. Everyone of Reece Reams' wrestlers showed positive signs amongst a loaded field – notably, junior Nevaeh Bloker's fourth-place finish at 155 pounds, which featured four pins from the standout Husky. N-P finished in 15th place with 28 team points. Cedar Falls ran away from the field with 537.5 points to best last year's state champion – Decorah (223 points) – for first place. Crestwood placed third with

207.5 points. "Decorah went good. Move-wise we are starting to get more comfortable on our feet and getting shots in," said Reams. Bloker, who went 19-19 a year ago and won two matches in the super regionals, should surpass that record and then some after her impressive performance at her middle-weight bracket. After getting pinned by Piper Kjeldahl of Lake Mills in her first match of the season in 3:21, Bloker ripped off four-consecutive pins to vault herself into the third-place medal match. Remarkably, all of Bloker's pins came in underneath a minute. "I'm really excited to see her this year,"

said Reams. Afton Dean of Lake Mills topped Bloker in that placing match by fall in 3:10. Two Husky freshmen with big goals this season – lower weight wrestlers Makynlee Dana (100) and Adiley Gerholdt (110) – demonstrated they could be hard to handle for many would-be challengers this winter. Dana won her first match by fall over Waukon's Sophia Stone in just 19 seconds. Gerholdt also won the first varsity match of her career as she stuck Emma Schmitt of Charles City in 2:49. N-P freshman Hailey Wilkens won by

consistent basketball as they all have a year under their belts. "In what we are doing this year, they will have more defined roles that will play to their strengths," said Mueller. Malven was second on the team in made 3-pointers with 38, while Hansen was a close second with 37. Malven also led the team in steals with 37 and averaged five rebounds a game to go along with over four assists per contest. He started all 22 games the Huskies played and shot 38 percent from the field. Another intriguing player for N-P is Mueller's son – junior forward Avery Mueller. Avery played in 20 games and scored all of 25 points last year, but his contribution to the team's overall effort will be essential. Along with Smith, who started three games – that junior pair is ready to make their presence known this winter. "They are both showing their capabilities in practice. They are two of our better shooters in drills and defensively they are solid players. It's a matter of time before it all comes together in games," said Mueller. Mueller said his starting rotation will fluctuate and his bench players that could see plenty of minutes are seniors Cal Levi and Ty Berger, along with juniors Braeden Mitchell and Navarii Williams. Junior newcomer Tucker Jacobs will also log valuable minutes for N-P. Husky senior Tucker Roberts and junior Brexton

Bird will also don the N-P jersey in 2024-2025 and look to make a positive impact. One of Mueller's top goals this year is to improve defensively and play unselfish basketball. N-P's lack of height at times was a problem in games last year as the Huskies were oftentimes out-rebounded in key clashes. Mueller isn't anticipating that to be an issue this season. "We've had some guys grow and don't anticipate height is a major worry," the N-P head coach said. Mueller added 2023 N-P alum Bo Harrington to his coaching staff in the offseason. Harrington is third all-time in Husky scoring with 1,266 points. He came within four points of breaking the single-game N-P scoring record of 42 points – still held by Mitch Fonley (1996). That scoring output of 39 points came in the postseason win over Waterloo Christian his senior season. "Bo is a great addition to the program. He has the respect from the players and is always the last one to leave practice. I don't know what his plans are for future years, but he has all the qualities of being a great coach," said the N-P head coach. Also on Mueller's staff are William Kerr and Drew Wilken. Wilken is a 2022 N-P graduate and starred for the Huskies hoops program. The Huskies open the season this Monday at Rockford. N-P's home opener is slated for Saturday, Dec. 7 at 5:30 p.m. versus Clarksville.

Huskies head to the mat with questions

N-P welcomes back six state-meet wrestlers but will lack experience at some weights

Nashua-Plainfield's Al Frost knows there are plenty of wrestling coaches in the state of Iowa who would gladly trade rosters with him; after all, the Huskies have six wrestlers returning this winter who ended their 2023-24 seasons at the state tournament in Des Moines.

But the Huskies lost five talented starters — including three who wrestled at state last winter — to graduation, and Nashua-

Plainfield had a couple of wrestlers decide not to go out this year.

That means as experienced as the Huskies are, they're going to be green — real green — at some weights.

"I'd put it this way: We don't have enough guys with quality experience," Frost said Wednesday after putting his 24 wrestlers through a pre-Thanksgiving practice. "We're going to be a little inexperienced in some weight classes ... but hopefully, those guys grow as the season goes on. ... You know us coaches, we could

have 14 guys all returning one year, and we'd still want more experience, but we'll have some weights with growing pains this year, no doubt about it."

Still, the Huskies' cupboard is far from bare.

Start with those six wrestlers who completed their seasons at Wells Fargo Arena — which will be re-branded as the Casey's Center next summer.

Those veterans include four seniors —

Huskies have 10 hard workers taking to the mat

In Nashua-Plainfield's third season of competing in girls wrestling, Reece Reams' bunch has come a long way.

That means several of his Huskies are already past the intermediate stages of learning new moves and on to more advanced techniques out on the mat.

That bodes well for any amount of success in the sport of grappling, which requires extreme discipline and the ability to overcome pitfalls in order to rise to the top.

"We took a different approach this season. We focused more on moves and shots and skill, where usually we start the first two weeks of just straight conditioning," said Reams, a 2015 N-P alum. "We're trying to get so we can get to new moves quicker, so we can get the basics down and get 'em knocked in tight."

Reams has nine wrestlers that could see mat time this winter and leading the way is junior 155-pounder Navaeh Bloker. She went 19-19 a year ago and is primed for an even better season if she can keep climbing the ladder of success. She'll compete at 155 pounds, but her end goal is to get down to the 145-pound weight class, where she wrestled at in the post-season as a sophomore.

"She's experienced. She's seen what it takes to wrestle and very much wants to win and she knows what it

takes to win," said Reams. "She takes it one bite at a time and just pushes through."

Bloker went 2-2 at the super regionals last January, the state of Iowa's qualifier which had no class distinction. This season the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union (IGHSAU) has broken the girls sport into two classes — 1A and 2A. The Huskies will compete in the former class and that's where Bloker wants to shine and prove her mettle. The state tournament in Coralville is where she wants to be — not in the stands, but competing for a shot at a medal.

"She's looking very strong here," said Reams. "We're starting to get past the new moves, I would say."

Bloker has polished standard grappling moves like head and body locks. That means she can get to her arsenal of finishing moves much quicker.

"She's getting real comfortable taking shots," said Reams. "Her favorite move is the cement mixer, which plays right into her because she's a

Whether or not the Husky boys hoops squad gets out of the gate clean and can run with the pack this season in the always tough East division of the Top of Iowa Conference remains to be seen.

But N-P head coach Matt Mueller sure likes his chances this season despite losing key starters Trae Geise and Tucker Franzen to graduation from a season ago.

— returns a bevy of talent on his roster this winter from a squad that produced a record of 8-14 overall in 2023-2024. N-P played to a mark of 4-12 in the league — which was controlled by TIC East stalwarts West Fork (league champs), Osage, St. Ansgar and Mason City Newman. That conference record tied the Huskies for sixth place along with North Butler and Central Springs.

While N-P will miss the scoring production from Geise (guard/forward) and Franzen (guard) — they accounted for 38 percent of N-P's scoring last year — there's plenty of Huskies to pick up the slack.

"They have the talent if we can gel as a team," said Mueller.

A strong junior class dominates Mueller's roster in the form of Matthew Malven (guard/forward), point guard Landon Foelske, Jase Hansen (guard), Trent Rodruck (F/C) and Jake Smith (forward). All those Huskies started at least three games last year with Malven the top returning scorer at 10.6 points per game. Hansen almost hit double-figure scoring with a 9.8 average and Foelske netted 5.4 points per game. Rodruck clipped out at 4.1 points per game and Smith averaged 4.3. Each of those aforementioned standouts for Mueller showed flashes of amazing potential in games last year. Now the task at hand is to take their games to the next level and play much more
