Supervisors chip away at levies

Board reduces GS by 7 cents, cuts a nickel from RSB and sets hearing for April 14

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors agreed on Monday to cut a little from the max levy rates for two of the three funds it controls.

Board members spent about 20 minutes discussing lowering the levy rates for General Supplemental

(GS) and Rural Services Basic (RSB) and agreed to publish legal notices for an April 14 public hearing on the 2025-26 budget.

Last month, the board set its maximum tax levy rate for GS at \$1.92 per \$1,000 valuation and \$3.55 for RSB, and according to state law, once those levy rates are published, they can not be raised

but can be lowered.

On Monday, Board Chairman Jake Hackman asked his fellow supervisors to consider lower rates for both levies. The other main levy, General Basic (GB), is capped at \$3.50 per \$1,000 valuation, and supervisors have spent the past few months working on making sure that fund's ending balance would

meet the recommended 25 percent of expenditures.

Hackman, though, said he felt both GS and RSB were in a strong enough position to reduce the levy rate. He asked board members to consider dropping the GS

Governor signs bill banning cellphone use while driving

Beginning July 1, Iowa will become the 31st state to have a 'hand-free' law on the books

Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds signed into law Wednesday a measure banning drivers from using cellphones behind the wheel with the exception of hands-free or voice-activated modes.

Reynolds was joined by more than 50 people in her office Wednesday, April 2, many of whom were related to people who had died because of distracted driving. The governor recognized the names of many of the people who lost their lives due to distracted driving incidents before signing the measure into law.

"I want to extend my heartfelt gratitude to their families for being here today and for their tireless advocacy," Reynolds said. "I can't imagine how hard it's been to tell and to retell your stories, but your courage will save lives. So, on behalf of all the families across our great state, thank you."

With the bill's signing, the measure, which is an expansion from Iowa's current law banning texting while driving, will go into effect July 1. Law enforcement officers will give warnings for violations from July through the rest of 2025.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2026, using handheld personal electronic devices while driving will result in a fine of \$100. If the incident results in an injury, the fine is raised to \$500, and in incidents that cause death will raise the fine to \$1,000.

The governor said that Iowa has become the 31st state in the country to have a "hands free" law on the books, and that neighboring states like Minnesota and Illinois have seen major decreases in car crashes since enacting similar laws.

"I'm grateful, because this legislation will save lives," Reynolds said. "According to a recent study, a 10% reduction in distracted driving in Iowa will prevent over 1,200 crashes, 700 injuries and six deaths, as well as over \$50 million in economic damages."

Peter Bengtson, the father of Ellen Bengtson of Charles City, who was killed by a distracted

Slew of activities on tap for National Library Week

Nashua Public Library Director Heather Hackman is the first to admit that she loves a "packed" schedule when it comes to National Library Week.

Brock Schmidt touched so many lives during his all-too-short time on this Earth.

That's a given. It's been said by those who loved him, those who worked with him, and those who only may have only met him a time or two.

If anyone doubted the impact he made on Chickasaw County, they were proven wrong on Monday when Trinity Lutheran

Church was filled to the proverbial brim with those who came to offer love and support to his family during the funeral of the Chickasaw County EMT and Chickasaw County

Rescue Squad volunteer who passed away at the age of 41 on March 22 while on duty at the ambulance station.

Schmidt had grown up in Janesville and while he was a proud Wildcat graduate, he made New Hampton his home — serving for years on the city's Fire Department, joining the EMS

When the service ended, an extraordinary procession took place as emergency vehicles ranging from ambulance rigs to fire trucks to police cars to Rescue Squad vehicles made their way down New Hampton's Main Street to escort Schmidt to his final resting place.

The procession began in the sky, as a GundersenAIR helicopter conducted a flyover.

It was, as one onlooker so succinctly put it, "sad and beautiful."

For his family and for those who worked side-by-side with Schmidt — both at the Chickasaw Ambulance Service and Chickasaw County EMS — it had been an excruciating week since that Saturday morning when he was found unresponsive in the living quarter at the ambulance station.

Schmidt had grown up in Janesville and while he was a proud Wildcat graduate, he made New Hampton his home — serving for years on the city's Fire Department, joining the EMS

world in 2015 when he was hired by Chickasaw Ambulance Service owner Jeremy McGrath as a driver and then becoming one of the first employees hired by Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson.

He was one of three full-time employees at the ambulance service that began running on Jan. 1, 2023.

"I don't think the ache's ever really going to go away," Knutson said Tuesday, "but I know the amount of support that was there yesterday was really impactful for all of us. Knowing Brock, he's looking down and saying something like 'for me?' But he deserved it, he really deserved it."

Every law-enforcement and rescue agency in Chickasaw County turned out for the funeral. So, too, did ambulances from outside the county, including those from Waterloo, Decorah, Sumner, Tripoli and More.

They all came to pay tribute to a true public servant, one who was always there to help those in need, and when the sad and beautiful procession was complete, a MercyOne Waterloo rig manned the ambulance station where Schmidt worked and served the people of Chickasaw County.

On that MercyOne crew was Jim Stanton, a New Hampton native.

"The support we've received, the support I know Marea and the family has received has

just been utterly amazing," Knutson said. "I think of the people like [Jim], who were willing to do anything for us the last week. It was comforting to know that someone who knew the area was here."

Then again, those who knew Brock Schmidt will tell you that if the roles were reversed, he would have done the same thing.

They say life moves on, and maybe there's some truth to that.

But on a gorgeous early spring Monday, when sirens filled the air on Main Street in New Hampton, those who knew him best joined those who just knew of him to bid Brock Schmidt a sad and beautiful goodbye.

ing, and finishing will be discussed. A refreshment on carcass value and its relationship to price will be included.





rate from \$1.92 to either \$1.87 or \$1.80.

"I think either one of those would be a very good, conservative balance for next June," said Hackman, pointing out that GS expenditures will be lower because the county is moving forward with eliminating six positions. Because GS pays for employee benefits like IPERS, FICA and health insurance, its proposed expenditures will be dropping.

GS, though, needs an ending fund balance higher than the 25 percent recommended for the other funds because in addition to using that fund balance to cover costs for the first three months of the fiscal year until property taxes are collected, it also must pay for a full year's worth of property and casualty insurance.

Hackman said although he understands that Auditor Sheila Shekleton has said that she needs at least \$890,000 to cover those costs, he believes that figure should be lower.

"Is it 820? Is it 850? I don't know, but I know it's lower than 890 with what we've done," he said.

If the county set the GS levy rate at \$1.87, its ending fund balance in June 2026 would be around \$1.06 million and if the rate was \$1.80, that fund balance would be just a shade under \$992,000.

Supervisor Steve Breitbach, though, wanted to know if the \$80,000 the county had projected to spend on unemployment claims would be enough to cover the positions eliminated.

"It all depends on, first of all, who applies for it," Hackman said, "and how long they're on."

Breitbach said he'd be in favor of setting the GS levy rate at \$1.85, saying that "we'd still be over that million and have a little cushion just in case," and the rest of the board agreed.

The supervisors then moved to RSB, which this year was set at \$3.52 per \$1,000 valuation. Board members bumped that up a smidge to \$3.55 for 2025-26, but in recent weeks, they have discussed reducing the rate.

Hackman confirmed that the county would be only about \$4,000 from having that 25 percent ending fund balance with a \$3.50 rate and reminded board members that the county may not have to use RSB funds for its share of the costs for Chickasaw County EMS.

He said that, as of Monday, EMS has a fund balance of \$836,000, which means in all likelihood the county will again be required to waive the next quarterly payment that will be due in July from the six cities that contract with the ambulance service.

"I think that's where we're going to, my opinion, stay the next many years," he said. "I

think \$750,000 to \$850,000 is where we're going to be at, but then again, are we going to trigger a payment at \$749,000?"

Under the terms of the 28E, the county is required to waive the payments if the fund balance is \$750,000, but Hackman and other supervisors have said they could also waive payments even if the fund balance drops below that figure.

"I'd say \$600,000, maybe is when we start thinking about it," Hackman said.

"I think that 750 is a high number, but we didn't know back then," Breitbach said. "I think now that we've done this for a few years, we have a better handle on it."

And Hackman also pointed out that even if the county has to make one ambulance payment during the fiscal year that begins on July 1, supervisors could elect to use local-option sales tax dollars instead of RSB funds.

"I'd be comfortable with \$3.50," Supervisor Scott Cerwinski said, and Breitbach pretty much verbatim said the same thing.

After board members reached the consensus to lower the RSB rate by a nickel, Hackman said he was appreciative of the board's action.

"The taxpayers are struggling, too," he said. "We know some of them are on fixed incomes, and I think that's what we heard last week, but I think we're providing a very good service yet with these levy rates. We still have some very good ending fund balances for GS and RSB."

The county's latest notice of the public hearing appears in this week's edition of the Tribune, and the hearing is set for 9:10 a.m. on Monday, April 14.

Board members on that day are expected to hold the public hearing and then hope to certify the budget and tax levy. Technically, the county has until April 30 to cer-

tify, but because the county must certify its Secondary Roads Department budget

Charles City man says new cellphone law 'good first step'

driver while biking in 2020, said that the years of the bill failing to advance felt like a "kick to the gut," but that the law being signed Wednesday was a "good first step" toward preventing distracted driving deaths.

Bengtson was in Des Moines Wednesday for the bill signing, and he said the law will allow law enforcement officers to start educating and informing people about the dangers of using phones while driving, and is an important start in stopping preventable deaths on Iowa roads.

Peter and JoAnn Bengtson of Richland, Washington, have been ardent supporters of changing the law, including coming to Iowa to testify to the Legislature in previous sessions.

Ellen Bengtson was killed Aug. 2, 2020, while riding her bicycle on Shadow Avenue south of Charles City, when a man looked down at a Facebook notification on his cellphone and struck Bengtson with his pickup.

A charge of vehicular homicide filed in Floyd County District Court against the man was dismissed in a directed verdict by a district court judge after she ruled that Iowa law did not prohibit what the man did with his cellphone.

"This is an experience you don't want to have," Bengtson said. "You don't want to be on the side of the situation where you lose a loved one, and I can't imagine you want to be the person behind the wheel who knew that you made a bad choice and you killed other people or maimed them. ... This is an epidemic beyond compare for public safety. We need to do something about it, and this legislation gets us closer."

The measure had received support from Reynolds at the beginning of the session, when she mentioned the proposal in her January Condition of the State address.

Part of the governor's push came in part after meeting the family of Roland Taylor of Terrell — a victim of a distracted driving crash in 2023. The governor said she signed the measure into law, nearly two years to the day of the crash "in his memory, and we'd do the same for every Iowan killed due to distracted driving."

Angie Smith, the daughter of Taylor, said she and her family met Reynolds at the Clay

County Fair in 2024 and talked to her about her father's death.

"My mom stated to the governor, 'We need to do something about a handsfree bill,' and it caught her attention, and it was very emotional for the governor also," Smith said. "So (she) reached out to us and has been pushing and supporting ever since."

Smith said "there's not a better way that we could have honored dad today," saying Taylor would have been proud to see the law being signed and save lives.

"When the governor called me personally last week and said ... that it was passed, I just broke down in tears," Smith said. "And I called mom immediately, so happy to just know that this is going to save someone else's life, hopefully that these families will not have to go through this."

Senate File 22 was an effort that advocates have pushed lawmakers to pass for almost seven years. While in previous sessions the measure failed in the Iowa House, the chamber passed the 2025 bill in a 84-11 vote in late March.

Luke Hoffman, executive director of the Iowa Bicycle Coalition, said, "This legislation will save lives and make our roads safer for all Iowans. This was truly a team effort. We are grateful to Governor Reynolds for taking a stand against distracted driving this legislative session and promoting public safety on our shared roadways."




Huskies ready to tee it up

N-P girls look to make another run at state, boys focus on consistency

Nashua-Plainfield golf in a nutshell: New year; same storylines.

While the Husky girls appear to once again be a contender to make the Class 1A state meet for a third year, the boys will look to find something that has eluded them in recent years — consistency.

"It really is a lot like how we went into last season," veteran Nashua-Plainfield coach Jeff Trost said. "We have to find a 'fourth' for the girls, and we have to find a way to be more consistent for the boys. But overall, I've liked what I've seen so far. We have a bunch of kids who are playing the game, and that's probably the most important thing."

After three weeks of practice — a good portion of which has been outside, thank you very much, Mother Nature — the Huskies are set to open the season on Monday when they play in a triangular in Charles City.

Nashua-Plainfield's girls have advanced to the past two state tournaments, and the Huskies welcome back one of the area's best golfers in Paige Franzen. The senior has qualified for state as an individual the past two seasons and is the defending Top of Iowa Conference East Division medalist.

Franzen is looking to close out her prep career with a bang before she takes her clubs to Coe College this fall. As a sophomore, she finished fourth in the state, and a year ago, she rallied from — for her, at least a dismal first round at the state tournament to fire a closing 80 to finish 11th.

"Paige is just a competitor who is really a student of the game," Trost said, "and obvi-

ously, just look at what she's accomplished, she's talented, but she also really puts time into her game. She's worked at it. When you have a Paige, that really helps your team score. You know she's going to give you some room to work when it comes to the team [score]."

And she has plenty of company returning, too.

Senior Faith Franzen, Paige's cousin, has been a solid player for the Huskies during their recent runs to the state tournament, and junior Paisley McCain had a breakout season a year ago.

"I think the big thing for Faith sometimes is just going out, playing and staying out of her head," Trost said. "She can play this game, and she's shown that the last couple of years. ... With Paisley, you know, she got her game into the 50s pretty consistently and I think she can take that next step."

In high school golf, a team consists of six players, with the four lowest scores "counting," and the challenge heading into the season for the Huskies is to find that fourth score. The past two seasons, one of the Huskies' consistent "counters" was Natalie Sinnwell, who graduated last spring.

The Huskies welcome back another veteran in junior Elayna O'Neill, who like McCain improved by leaps and bounds in 2024. Other Huskies vying to be that "counter" include junior Ava Kirk and freshmen Natalie Feldman and Addison Drewelow.

"Ave's a newcomer, but she's played a lot of golf," Trost said. "Same for Natalie, so I think we have potential."

On the boys side, the Huskies certainly have numbers with 14 on the roster, and they're not lacking in experience, either.

Nashua-Plainfield welcomes back four players — Dawson Glaser, Tyler Zimmer, Devon Blanchard and Cal Levi — who played at the Top of Iowa East tournament and in the Class 1A sectional meet last spring. A fifth, Trent Rodruck, will miss the season after undergoing surgery recently.

The Huskies, though, must find a way to get off golf's version of the roller coaster.

Take last year's final week of the season when the Huskies finished last in the Top of Iowa tournament with a 413 and then fired a 368 in the Class 1A sectional tournament.

"We have guys who will go 39, 40 and then the next day go 50," Trost said, "and it doesn't take a genius to realize that's a tough way to build a consistent team score. Trust me, we're working on it, but if we're going to find some success, we've got to find a way to get to a score and stay there."

Levi, Glaser and William Lindeland are the team's three seniors while Kaden McMichael joins Zimmer and Blanchard as the juniors on the squad. Sophomores Christopher Kalvig, Kolbie Vance, Dawson Peterson and Titus Cervinske and freshmen Jackson Mehmen, Ethan Franzen, Lincoln Huck and Jagger White round out the roster.

"We have some freshmen who have played a lot of golf," Trost said, "and that's a real positive. The trick is to get them into competitive golf where every single shot counts. The numbers on the boys side are good, now we just have to go out and find that consistency."


