

Farmers finally get a forecast they all can love

After weeks of both rain and cold, planting should be shifting into high gear this week

After a maddening slow start to the 2025 planting season, the pace is about to go into overdrive.

That's because Mother Nature is finally going to give area farmers a break.

"It's about time," Five Star Cooperative agronomist Bob Sobolik said Tuesday afternoon. "We really haven't had one of these 10- to 14-day windows in two or three years, so yeah, we've earned this one. Let's hope that forecast doesn't change."

How slow has planting gone thus far this season? A look at the three most recent Iowa Crop and Condition Reports, which are put out weekly by the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service, tell the story.

In the report released April 21, 11 percent of the corn and 8 percent of the soybeans had been planted in the Northeast District, which includes Chickasaw County. A week later, the report showed 14 percent of the corn and 12 percent of the soybeans had been planted. And in the most recent report released on Monday, those numbers had climbed to just 19 percent for corn and 17 percent for soybeans.

Blame a relatively cool and very rainy April, but finally, there is nothing but blue skies ahead.

In the seven-day forecast for Nashua put out by the La Crosse, Wisconsin, office of the National

Bench dedication for Plainfield officer killed in line of duty set for Saturday morning

Plainfield will honor one of its own, a law-enforcement officer who died in the line of duty more than 64 years ago, with a special ceremony Saturday morning.

A memorial bench for William L. Meadows, a Plainfield police officer who died while responding to a robbery on Jan. 23, 1961, will be dedicated at

10 a.m. at the city's Veterans Park.

The program will include opening remarks by Plainfield Mayor Tom Geise, vocalist Sherry Greenlee performing "God Bless the USA," Doug Strike and Kenn Deike offering up "words of remembrance" and current Bremer County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Robert Whitney reading the poem "American Died."

Following the dedication ceremony, refreshments will be served at the

Plainfield Public Library.

Strike and Deike, who led the fund-raising efforts for the bench and a permanent marker at Meadows' gravesite in Waverly, are hoping for a good turnout.

"Bill Meadows deserves that," he said. "He gave his life for the community, and we're so appreciative for those who have contributed funds — big and small — so we can make this a reality."





Nurse so happy she took her '180'

New Hampton Nursing and Rehab director of nursing loves helping people

It's a "180" that Mariah Riley will never regret. Back in 2016, she had a plan. She would graduate from Sumner-Fredericksburg High School and head to the University of Iowa and pursue a law career.

And then one day, her life turned on a proverbial dime. "I really did the ultimate 180, I decided I wanted to go into health care," she said. "I've always loved helping people, and I don't know what it was but I just decided I needed to go into health care. That's where my heart was taking me."

Fast forward nine years, and Riley is now the director of nursing at New Hampton Nursing and Rehabilitation. She took over the position on April 7 after spending seven years at Tripoli Nursing and Rehab, where she started as a certified nursing assistant (CNA), and then worked as a licensed practical nurse (LPN), became a registered nurse and eventually became the nursing home's assistant director of nursing.

"Honestly, I got homesick at Iowa," she said, "and so I transferred to Northeast Iowa Community College and took that job as a CNA in Tripoli. And I'm really not kidding at all when I say I fell in love with geriatrics immediately. Obviously in school, they train you in all aspects of nursing, but I knew I wanted to work in long-term care."

She loves the fact that she gets a chance to build long-term, meaningful relationships with residents and their families.

"If you're in a hospital or even a clinic setting, you might catch yourself thinking, 'I wonder how it all turned out,'" she said, "where in long-term care,

I know because I'm there every day. Those relationships, they mean the world to me."

Riley, who is engaged and has a 20-month-old son, said she was ready for a new challenge and has found one at New Hampton Nursing and Rehab. And she's appreciative that she has been welcomed with proverbial open arms by the staff at the facility located on New Hampton's east side between Mikkelsen Park and Garnant Pond.

"I loved my time at Tripoli," she said, "and I don't think you spend seven years in one place without making it a little hard to leave. But I was ready for something different; I just wanted it to be in long-term care. That's my passion, and I think it always will be."

She laughed when asked what a typical day is like for her.

"Well, for all nurses — it doesn't matter where you work — I don't know if there really is a typical day," she said. "It's one of the things I love about nursing. Every day is different. No two patients, no two residents, are exactly alike."

"One of the most important parts of nursing or any job in healthcare really is to understand that every patient reacts

A little primer on National Nurses Week

National Nurses Week begins each year on May 6 and ends on May 12, Florence Nightingale's birthday.

These permanent dates enhance planning and position National Nurses Week as an established recognition event. As of 1998, May 8 was designated as National Student Nurses Day, to be celebrated annually. And as of 2003, National School Nurse Day is celebrated on the Wednesday within National Nurses Week (May 6-12) each year.

The nursing profession has been supported and promoted by the American Nurses Association (ANA) since 1896. Each of ANA's state and territorial nurses associations promotes the nursing profession at the state and regional levels. Each conducts celebrations on these dates to recognize the contributions that nurses and nursing make to the community.

The ANA supports and encourages National Nurses Week recognition programs through the state and district nurses associations, other specialty nursing organizations, educational facilities, and independent health care companies and institutions.

The week traces its roots back to 1953, when Dorothy Sutherland of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare sent a proposal to President Eisenhower to proclaim a "Nurse Day" in October of the following year. The proclamation was never made.

A year later, National Nurse Week was observed Oct. 11-16. The year of the observance marked the 100th anniversary of Florence Nightingale's mission to Crimea. Representative Frances P. Bolton sponsored the bill for a nurse week.

A bill for a National Nurse Week was introduced in the 1955 Congress, but no action was taken. Congress discontinued its practice of joint resolutions for national weeks of various kinds, but in 1974, President Nixon became the first Oval Office inhabitant to issue a National Nurses Week proclamation.







Planting season to shift into high gear

Weather Service, there is not a single mention of rain until the middle of next week, and even that chance is minuscule.

That has area farmers positively giddy. So, too, does the fact that temperatures are expected to be in the 70s and until at least

the middle of next week.

"I'd say by mid-week, definitely later in the week, you're going to see a lot of planters in the field," Sobolik said Tuesday. "Then again, they're already out there. I had a guy in the office today ... he came from Rudd to Lawler back to New Hampton and he told me he saw 30 plant-

ers."

New Hampton received 5.24 inches of rain in April, almost an inch and a half more than the normal 3.79 inches Chickasaw County's second-largest city receives in the month. It marked the second straight month Nashua had received above-average precipitation. In March, the city's reporting station recorded 3.36 inches of rain, about 1.25 inches above average.

That has helped ease drought fears, even though the latest U.S. Drought Monitor report that was released last week showed that Chickasaw, Bremer and Floyd counties remain classified as "abnormally dry," but much of Butler County is off the report for the first time since last summer.

"We have enough moisture to get the crop in the field," Sobolik said. "I am concerned about a hot, dry summer that they're saying we might get, but for now, we're good."

Sobolik said he also has some worries about the level of sub-soil moisture in the area, but "you get down two feet right now and we're looking good ... It's the same thing every year; timely rains are going to be important."

For now, though, he's just happy for his fellow farmers; after all, they've been raring to go for a while now.

"They're getting that window, and after all the stuff we've been through the last few years," Sobolik said, "you know what? They've earned it."

Supervisors want to make sure courthouse is cool

County leaders want more information but know the time is nearing when they have to replace air conditioner on building's roof

As Chickasaw County head custodian Dave Gorman shared the worst-case scenario about the courthouse's aging air conditioner, one could almost see the cold shiver — or was that a hot flash — go through the members of the Board of Supervisors on Monday.

"Let's just say hypothetically, this air conditioner died in July, and we don't have anything planned out ahead of time," Gorman said. "We're basically done cooling for the rest of the season because it's going to take x amount of time to get a new unit spec'd out, ordered, get it here, get a crane service here and get it up on the roof and get it hooked up."

Concern over the air conditioner unit that sits atop the courthouse roof spiked recently, Gorman said, when

employees of Mick Gage Plumbing and Heating couldn't get the air unit to turn on.

It turned out that the Gage employees diagnosed the problem was that water flow switches on the unit had failed, and while they were able to find switches, Gorman was told that time may be running out when it comes to obtaining replacement parts.

"Within five years or so, they indicated to me that the parts were probably going to be hard to come by," Gorman said. "We should be past this issue ... and we're pretty confident that we're going to be fine for this season."

But because of the time it will take to replace the 25-year-old unit, Gorman brought the concerns to supervisors.

"It's something we should probably be planning for, start budgeting for," he said, "because let's face it, no air conditioning in a building like this,

we're probably going to hear about it."

Board Chairman Jake Hackman agreed.

"I think we'd definitely hear about it," he said. "It would upset the public, the staff, the court system staff. ... I think the best timing would be like in October or November."

The cost, Gorman said, could be anywhere from \$50,000 to \$100,000, and Hackman said he and Auditor Sheila Shekleton found about \$55,000 in the budget for the year that ends on June 30. He added board members could amend the 2025-26 budget or try to budget for a new AC unit in the 2026-27 budget.

Hackman's fellow board members said they would want a more concrete estimate of the cost before deciding which way to proceed, and Gorman said he felt the board had time to make a decision.

"We're pretty confident that the unit will last another year or whatever," he said. "We need a plan, though. It's one of those deals where you basically got to be proactive instead of reactive or you're going to be sitting without air conditioning."

Board members agreed to revisit the issue sometime this summer after the new fiscal year begins, unless, of course, new issues crop up.

Supervisors also gave Gorman the go-ahead to install new three parking stalls near the Heritage Center's entrance. He said Heritage custodian Deb Rosonke made the request because some residents who have appointments with the county's Veterans Affairs Office have difficulty with mobility.

Board members agreed to give the go-ahead for the new parking stalls, as long as they had signs marking them

as "veterans parking."

In other news from Monday's meeting:

- Board members unanimously approved the annual contract for County Engineer Roman Lensing, who will receive a 3 percent salary increase at the start of the 2025-26 fiscal year.

- Supervisors voted to proclaim May as Pioneer Cemetery Appreciation Month and thanked both commission members and volunteers for their work at some of the county's oldest resting spots.

- Board members also agreed to send out requests for proposals (RFPs) for both accounting and human resources services. Supervisors were quick to point out that they are not necessarily dissatisfied with the services they are receiving, but as board member Travis Suckow put it, "It doesn't hurt us to see what's out there."

The Board convened on Monday, April 28, 2025, at 9:00 AM with members Breitbach, Carter, Cerwinski, Suckow and Hackman present in the Boardroom on the second floor of the Court House, New Hampton, Iowa. Chairperson Hackman called the meeting to order. Also present were Board Secretary Sheila Shekleton, Attorney David Laudner, Bob Fenske, member of media, Sheriff Ryan Shawer, EMS Director Joel Knutson, Safety Coordinator Ranae Carey.

Motion by Suckow, seconded by Carter to approve the agenda for April 28, 2025 and the additional agenda. Roll Call: All Ayes: Motion carried.

Motion by Cerwinski, seconded by Breitbach to approve the minutes for April 21, 2025 meeting. Roll Call: All Ayes: Motion carried.

Motion by Cerwinski, seconded by Hackman to abate the property tax at 311 Main Street, Nashua which is owned by the City of Nashua.

Save the date! Scout Cabin to hold open house during Water Over the Dam Days

The restoration of Nashua's Scout Cabin is complete and those who had a hand in the project can't wait to show it off during the 2025 Water Over the Dam Days celebration.

That's when the Boy Scout Cabin will hold an open house to show off the improvements made with the \$88,000 project.

The event is set to be held from noon to 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 28, which means it will be open for tours just after the annual big parade is completed.

The cabin was constructed during the Great Depression by the WPA, probably the most famous of all of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal programs. Roosevelt's work-relief program employed more than 8.5 million people at its height.

For years, the cabin that is owned by the city of Nashua has been home to the city's scouts, but in recent years, it had fallen into disrepair.

Originally, the plan was to

start with the 17 log replacements, clinking removal and replacement and additional repairs needed to allow the building to continue to stand.

But due to the severity of the roof issues, Phase I and Phase II traded places and the new roof moved to the top of the priority list.

The third included the installation of new windows and a door, as well as interior work that will include connecting the cabin to electricity and wifi.



fishing pier at the end of the park.

"The concept is, in lake communities there's a restaurant on the lake that people pull their boat up to and they go and get something to eat when they're having fun on the lake. This is pretty common in lake communities," said Skilton.

The Council unanimously agreed to Skilton's plan, which would not cost the town of Nashua any money and all funds would be donated to a city fund that would go toward construction of the lakeside attraction.

"That would allow then for this part of the park to be seen by the road for activities on a Saturday for a short period of time to have food vendors in pads established with power, for them to plug and serve a hot dog, a hamburger, something," said Skilton.

Skilton said the most expensive part of the project – which would include boat slips – is the docking system and a pier for wheelchairs to roll down safely. He said that dock area could be added on to with possible expansion.

"I think it can be done in chunks," said Skilton.

Skilton said he has been in contact with many clubs and organizations about the exciting idea, as well as the local VFW.

"They don't have any objections to changes to the park. But they do have an objection to funds being used because there aren't a lot of funds," said Skilton about the VFW's blessing to use the land for the project.

Skilton said each improvement would be submitted by a building permit when all the funding is complete.

"I've worked with the music boosters – they have all of this stuff, the food, the machine, whatever," said Skilton. "That would be a place that maybe kids could man to run a food stand for two hours."

The Nashua City Attorney said "gravel pads," hooking up electric and getting food vendors on board would not be a problem and are relatively cheap.

"It's a wonderful lake that we have and the more opportunities that we have to do things – not in conflict with other activities...I think that's good for the community," said Skilton.

A DECADE AGO back in 2015 the city of Nashua, through the Vision Iowa Program, conducted a feasibility study that looked to revamp and revitalize the downtown area as well as make major upgrades and enhancements along the lakefront of Cedar Lake.

That proposed project – on a much more in-depth and wider scale – was part of the study that included the creation of a waterfront restaurant/marina complex at Veterans Park and condominium development along the shoreline of Cannon Park. Under that plan, Veterans Park would have been relocated to a vacant lot north of the post office and across from the VFW.

Those proposed plans by the Visioning Committee never came to fruition.

There has been much discussion concerning that area near Veterans Park below the dam.

Nub Ronnei, owner of Nub's Bait, Tackle and More in downtown Nashua – which is stone's throw distance from Veterans Park – continued to inquire and ask questions to the city about a pathway that is no longer accessible after repairs where recently made to the hydro dam that sits right next to the park.

The longtime downtown business owner said the lack of access to the water below the dam hurts his business, specifically his bottom line.

"There's always been a path down there," said Ronnei. "There's a sign up there that says portage for down below the dam and there isn't none. I don't understand why we can't have it to make it easier for people to come here and go below the dam and fish?"

Boomerang Construction out of Anamosa was the earth-moving firm that placed gigantic rocks near the shoreline of the river below the dam to fix a hole

in it.

Ronnei is not happy that his customers don't have a safe way to cast their line into the river without traversing over large boulders and potentially injuring themselves.

"An hour and it would all be done," said Ronnei. "When they were taking the rock out of the road out of the river, if they would have just put it up on both sides on the road going up, instead of covering it up, it would have all been done."

Skilton, Nashua Mayor Hal Kelleher and Johnson had much back-and-forth about the topic with Ronnei. Skilton stated the city has to follow any and all guidelines before any construction is undertaken to build a walkway for fishermen at that location.

"Any pathway on a dangerous site has to be approved by an engineer to make sure it's ADA compliant and we've got to dot the I's and cross the T's," said Skilton.

Ronnei also wanted to know about the sequence patterns of the gates on the dam that open and close to keep water in Cedar Lake and allow it to flow downstream.

The concept is simple to Ronnei – heavy flow means less fishing and that hurts his sales. He's also concerned about safety if would-be fisherman risk it and walk on the rocks to snag a bluegill or largemouth bass.

"What happens when somebody slips on those rocks?" said Ronnei.

Skilton said the city could arrange a conference call with the operator of the dam that controls the water flow.

"When there's too much water, it automatically kicks that north gate – drops that gate open and there is absolutely no fishing on that whole north side," said Ronnei. "Believe it or not, it puts a big bump in my income. If Dwight (dam operator) is willing to listen, I'd gladly hear it. I don't really see what the problem would be."

FOUR COUNCIL members – Jake Johnson was absent – also voted on whether to accept the final construction report from Shuck Britton Engineering concerning the dam repair. The city received a second opinion outside of Shuck Britton's report and that engineering firm agreed with the first report.

The issue with the report has been the appearance of a boulder/s – that weigh nine tons apiece – that have floated to the surface of the water below the dam. Those huge stones were put in place underwater to fix the gaping hole in the middle of the dam.

"So those blocks are supposed to move?" asked Council member Dan Zwanziger. "They're starting to move already and we haven't had high water yet. You wait until all the gates are open."

Skilton and Kelleher said they were told that was normal for the boulders to move somewhat as that was part of the process that allows the large rocks to fall in place.

"The blocks will have some movement and the revetment is moving around and settling these things in," said Kelleher. "That would be in the normal parameters of what it's supposed to be doing. That's what we were told."

"Apparently, that's part of the design," said Skilton. "We were all hoping that this thing works."

Nashua City Clerk John Ott said each nine-ton boulder has a GIS (Geographic Information System) location on them.

Samantha Johnson made a motion to approve the final construction report. Peggy Hall seconded. Zwanziger, along with Ernie Willsher, voted no, while Hall and Johnson were the nay votes – meaning the motion failed as the vote was deadlocked at 2-2.

BIDS WERE UNVEILED for demolition of property at 1020 Greeley St.

Those bids came from Ben and Ashley Caster (\$650) with Cole Excavating, Hannemann Construction (\$1,500) and Rod and Dorlary Bigelow (\$5,000).

Ott said the winning bid would be announced at a future Council meeting.





A place on the map

Pleasantville bar and grill named home of this year's Iowa's Best Burger

On the square in Pleasantville, family, community and Iowa's best burger intersect at Halftime Bar & Grill.

The Iowa Beef Industry Council and Iowa Cattlemen's Association have named Halftime Bar & Grill – and its owners, the DeHeer family – the home of Iowa's Best Burger for 2025.

As long-time residents of Pleasantville, Kevin and Kathy DeHeer, along with their children, Amanda and Tyler DeHeer, have owned and operated Halftime Bar & Grill for just over two years.

Kathy was the one to steer the family down the path of restaurant ownership and going into business as a family. She has worked for Frosty's, a restaurant where Halftime Bar & Grill is now. The owners were looking to retire and approached Kathy to see if she was interested in buying them out.

"I had always wanted to run a café," said Kathy. "I talked with Amanda, who also worked part-time for Frosty's, to see if she wanted to be a part of it, too. We both kind of had this restaurant dream, so we thought, why not?"

Pleasantville is known for its school sports and the community had expressed the need for a local sports bar. As the DeHeers made the restaurant their own, they went with it. TVs are spread throughout the restaurant and tuned to major sporting events and the décor definitely gives a fun sports bar vibe.

Some might wonder if a sports "bar" is for kids. Halftime Bar & Grill is family-friendly and kids are always welcome. In fact, Kathy said that they have been known to turn a TV or two to cartoons when kids are in. There are coloring books and crayons available, plus a menu just for the kids. And yes, there is a burger option for them, too.

At this family-owned business, the staff feel like family,

too. Andy Moen, one of the cooks, said that the restaurant can be hectic, but everyone in the family throws their backs into the restaurant's success. They are quick to help and treat the team like family.

Amanda commented that taking over the restaurant has been life-changing and that it is a lot harder than they thought it would be, but she said it is rewarding.

"I remember thinking one of the most rewarding times was when we first opened and I was in the kitchen working," Kathy echoed. "There was a game going on and a bunch of people in here. Everybody was laughing and having a good time and I could hear it in the kitchen. That moment – hearing laughter fill the restaurant – was when I knew we had created something special."

Halftime Bar & Grill has nine burger offerings on its menu featuring combinations of toppings for every palate. From their classic Bacon Cheeseburger to their Sriracha Bourbon Burger and the Over-The-Top Beer Cheese Burger to the Barnyard Argument Burger, the DeHeers have amped up the tasting experience, providing patrons with a variety of options to choose from.

After several years of the trendy smash burger claiming the Iowa Best Burger crown, Halftime Bar & Grill returns us to an original grilled patty. Sourced from a local meat locker, their all-beef patties are 8 ounces of fresh, never frozen beef. You can decide



if you want one or two patties (a whole pound of beef) for each burger selection.

A fan favorite and one that the Iowa Best Burger judges mentioned was the Humpback Burger, which features an 8-ounce all-beef patty topped with ham, pepper jack cheese, bacon and sautéed onions, drizzled with Halftime's smoky house sauce. Burgers are served with your choice of fries or a premium side for an upcharge.

This contest has already made a difference in sales. Before Halftime Bar & Grill was announced as one of the Top 10, they were selling approximately 170 burgers in a week. Following the announcement, burger sales increased to 392 burgers at their peak.

Amanda also said they've seen increases among all sales

within the restaurant, not just the burgers.

The purpose of Iowa's Best Burger contest is to promote beef and the producers who raise it. The DeHeers had several examples of guests who came in, not knowing that Halftime Bar & Grill existed, but had heard radio advertisements about the contest and stopped in for a burger.

Kathy and Amanda watched the Iowa's Best Burger contest unfold last year and dabbled with getting Halftime Bar & Grill into the contest, but fell short of the Top 10. This year, Amanda said that they focused more on the promotion and concerted effort to see what they could do.

"We got on and printed

materials provided for the contest," said Amanda. "And we told our staff if someone is eating a burger and enjoying it, ask them to vote. We used the QR codes provided and even showed some of our older guests how to use the code to vote."

Another area of focus for the DeHeers is quality and consistency. Tyler said that they care about the quality of their food because if they serve bad food, people won't come back. He expressed that repeat business in a smaller community is crucial. If they are busy, it isn't just about getting the food out, they are honed in on quality, he said.


"People kept telling us that we should enter the contest and that our burgers are the best thing ever," said Kathy. "When the contest started, we had regulars say that we were going to be No. 1. Making the Top 10 was our goal and winning was just icing on the cake."

Both Amanda and Kathy said there were happy tears when they found out that they had made the Top 10 and then even more when they found out they'd won.

The family said they appreciate the outpouring of local support and will always be grateful to the community regulars. But winning this contest and the exposure it generates to a larger audience will help their restaurant thrive.

Cattle have taught high school senior plenty of lifetime lessons

SCHWICKERATH: FROM 11

"I wouldn't be where I'm at today without cattle."

Her parents, Tony and Janet Schwickerath, nodded their heads in unison as their youngest daughter spoke those words.

"It's true," Tony said. "She's learned the value of hard work, I can tell you that. As a parent, we couldn't be prouder of our girls — both Carrie and her older sister, Beth. They are kind, they have great work ethics. That's what you want as a parent, right?"

Beth graduated from New Hampton in 2021; Carrie will take the same walk across the stage a week from this coming Sunday. And in a way, it will be the end of an era — one that revolved around cattle — for Tony Schwickerath.

"It was always me-and-the-girls' time," he said. "We go out when it's 10 below out and whatever, we'd spend one hour out. That's when the girls could talk ... it's barn talk and I loved every minute of it."

Janet smiled as her husband talked.

"I'm pretty sure that was the favorite part of his day, no matter how much work had to be done," she said. "It was cool to see how they bonded together."

CARRIE SCHWICKERATH was just 6 years old when she bought her first cow.

New Hampton farmer Garth Griffin took her and her father out to a pasture and told her to pick one.

"He said whichever one I wanted I could have," she said, "and I found this one that was

really friendly, really nice and I just had to have that red Angus cow."

She named it C6 — C for Carrie; 6 for her age at the time — and she was hooked on cattle for life.

Over the years, she's shown cattle both at the Chickasaw County 4-H and FFA Achievement Fair and the Iowa State Fair. She's had good days and not so good days, but the former far outnumber the latter. That trailer is Exhibit A.

A work ethic was born the day C6 came to her farm.

"They have to be fed twice a day, and so even if you have after-school activities and you're involved in things like that," she said, "you always have to come home and do the chores — no matter if it's light or dark out, you still have to get them done."

And as fairs drew near, she was constantly washing and cleaning her cows, working on halter breaking them and gearing up for another trip to another show ring.

She also learned that cows are ... well, they're a lot like people.

"They're more comfortable at home so sometimes the show ring can be a scary place for them," she said. "They have their good days and they have some bad ones, too — just like me, just like everyone, I guess. But it's been so worth it. I've met so many people from so many places. I just feel lucky that I got to do this."

NOT THAT SHE isn't involved in other activities.

Her senior bio that is, in a word lengthy.



She has been the president of the 4-H County Council, a Little Wapsie Legend 4-H officer and served on just about every 4-H committee that exists. She's been an active member of the New Hampton FFA and served as its president this past year. She's the senior class treasurer, member of Core Interact, C.L.A.S.S. and the National Honor Society. She's also the Iowa Junior Red Angus Association Northeast District representative and has worked at the New Hampton Veterinary Clinic for the past five years.

Does she sleep?

"When I can," she said with a laugh, "but I'm glad I've had all these opportunities. It's made me who I am today."

Garth Griffin remembers that 6-year-old well, and he and his wife, Nancy, have



grown very fond of the young lady they helped turn into a cattleman.

Did he see the makings of a cattle showing champion 12 years ago when he first took her and her dad out to that

pasture?

"Absolutely not, and I don't want that to sound bad, but Carrie was the quietest, shyest little girl," he said. "She hid behind Tony's leg, but that's the beauty of this. Look at her now. Look at how much she's grown. It's been amazing to watch her, and we feel like we almost adopted her. We're so proud of her."

And she has continued to grow in high school.

"You would look at me as a freshman or sophomore, and see I was not outgoing or talkative or any of that jazz," she said, "but through a lot of the clubs and everything ..."

She paused and laughed.

"And I'm not quiet anymore."

IN SOME WAYS, though, she is a typical high school senior. She's ready for commencement, ready to end this

chapter and move on to the next.

She will head to Ames and Iowa State University this fall and begin working on a pre-vet degree. She'd love nothing more than to one day return to New Hampton and work as a veterinarian.

But there are still a few more "lasts" to experience.

She remembers the first time one of her animals was sold at the fair auction and loaded on a trailer.

It was 2018, and she won't lie, she cried.

She found a friend in Barbara Schwickerath, who had graduated from New Hampton that spring.

"When it was my first year, I was crying because I just put my animals on the trailer," she said, "and Barbara was a senior, and it was her last year so she was loading her very last steer and she was crying, too."

It's a memory that Tony and Janet Schwickerath will have for the rest of their lives. There was Barbara, the high school senior, consoling their daughter, Carrie.

"And now it's going to be your turn," Tony said to his daughter, "to do the same thing for someone this year."

For a moment, the garage was quiet.

And then Carrie Schwickerath smiled.

"I will because that's what I've loved about cattle ever since C6," she said. "It's not just about the cow; it's about the people."



likely need to improve on that 4x400 PR if it wants to take the team down to Des Moines. That clip is registered as the 34th-best time in the event according to the Bound website.

The state of Iowa accepts a district champ in Class 1A and on to the state meet in running, throwing and jumping events, then it's a crapshoot to fill out the state field. The next best 14 throws, jumps or leaps comprise the 24 entrants into each state event, which will be held down in Des Moines from May 22-24.

"Every 10th of a second, every lean matters," said Sudol. "You gotta keep battling. Even if you're in second place you gotta be pushing it just to get in on time. You don't want to take anything for granted."

That 4x400 squad is one of several relays that N-P head coach Chase Sudol has high hopes for when the state qualifier rolls around this coming Thursday at Northwood. That qualifying site is where the Huskies won the first district team title in school history back in 2023. So needless to say Sudol's Huskies will have good vibes next week when they step on the track – regardless of what Mother Nature dolls out as far as weather conditions.

"We always run well at Northwood. It's a well-run meet," said Sudol about districts. "The way we run our program, this is what we aim for. This is our big meet and what we always talk about all year long. We're always striving for districts. Our goal is to get these kids down to state. They have bought into that ever since I've become a track coach."

N-P hit on its 4x800 relay at Dike as it placed third, but more importantly the time was a season-best in 8:41.45 with the contingent of Mitchell, Hansen, Smith and junior Brexton Bird. That's currently 17th-fastest in 1A as of Thursday afternoon.

The shuttle hurdle relay would have more than likely produced a top-24 time in the small-school class on Monday with the team of Foelske, Blanchard, Clayden Gerholdt and Tyler Zimmer. Sudol said they ran a 1:05.47. The problem was the relay got disqualified as one of the runners left early. Sudol is still scratching his head as to how that happened and why that time didn't count.

Huck won the 400 dash, 800 and 1,500 run on Monday. The eight-time state title winner didn't PR in those events but she'll more than likely compete in them at the qualifier.

Although the 200 dash is the wildcard for N-P, as Huck broke the school record (26.19) in that event earlier this year and sports the second-quickest time in the small-school class in that sprint event.

N-P's distance medley team of Foelske, White, Cerwinski and Huck ran a 4:29.74, good for first place at the North Butler Invite last week Friday. That's the second fastest clip for N-P this season.

The Huskies placed fourth at North Butler with 52 team points. Huck once again won her marquee events (400, 800, 1,500).

Gerholdt PR'd in the 3,000 run (fourth place) in 14:19 and placed fourth at North Butler. Lowe did the same on Monday in the 400 hurdles (1:22.85), where she placed eighth.

N-P's 4x800 shaved off more than 30 seconds off of their season-best performance with an 11:18 in Nashua on Monday. That squad of Cerwinski, fresh-

Regardless, the point is Sudol feels confident he may be able to get four relays down to Drake Stadium at the state meet next week.

"I want four relays. That's what my goal is," said Sudol. "It's gonna be a lot of fun. The excitement's amazing."

That includes the distance medley squad of Navarii Williams, Kalainoff, Smith and Hansen. That group finished second at the Cowpath in 3:46.81. Currently that time is 27th-fastest in 1A.

One thing is for certain, Kalainoff, who represents the second-best toss in the discus (167) and came awfully close to medaling at the Drake Relays last month will be a favorite to win a state championship in the field event. He tossed 161 on Monday, which amazingly didn't win the event. North Fayette Valley's Cael Reichter heaved a 170-1, which is now the third-best toss in Class 2A.

N-P junior Devon Blanchard was medalist runner-up with a 41, a testament to his athletic prowess as he also competes in track and field during the spring.


"He's slowly getting there," said Trost about Blanchard. "It's just repetition, repetition."

"For all the Paige's and Faith's that I have, it means just as much to see William work his way from where he was at," said Trost.


The N-P girls didn't shoot its best round of the year at Round Grove on Monday and finished third with a 206. The Franzens – who are cousins – each carded rounds of 46.
