## Supervisors bite bullet, give OK to sheriff's vehicle

Board members concede public perception might not be on their side but say law enforcement needs 'tools'

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors Monday morning wrestled with how the public would react to the Sheriff's Office receiving the OK to purchase a new vehicle in light of the fact that the coun-

ty's budget process that ended last month included eliminating a number of jobs.

Sheriff Ryan Shawver, citing the fact that he is "confident" he will have enough money remaining in his 2025-26 budget, asked board members to approve the purchase of a 2025 Tahoe that he learned

has just become available from Karl Chevrolet.

The Sheriff's Office at the end of April still had \$799,000 in its 2024-25 budget, and Shawver pointed out that he did not have a vehicle purchase in the budget year that ends on June 30 and that he also does not have a vehicle purchase in the 2025-

26 budget.

"There are so many unknowns in this profession but I feel comfortable with purchasing this if that's the direction you want to go," Shawver said. "The fleet still

## Memorial Day weekend event to kick off busy summer for Park Board

Blues, Brews &amp; BBQ hopes to take advantage of busy campground for annual May event

The Nashua Park Board's goal is to have one "special event" each month.

Some are big; some are small.

This month's is most definitely the former as the Park Board is gearing up for its annual "Blues, Brews & BBQ" that will be held a week from this Saturday, May 24, at Cedar View Park.

The event was held a year ago, but Park Board President Nate Sinnwell said board members "moved" the event to the Memorial Day, in part, to take advantage of what is usually one of the biggest weekends of the year for the campground that is nestled along the lake.

resting place in a Waverly cemetery.

"I think Uncle Bill would be deeply touched by all this," said his nephew, Larry Carlson, after the ceremony. "He really did love this town, he loved Iowa and he loved small farming communities. It's been so long, but I will never forget the day when my mother told us what had happened. He was such a good man."

Meadows grew up in the Seattle area and served his country in both World War II and the Korean War. In 1949, he moved to Iowa to work on the farm and lived with his aunt, Edna Voss, on a farm her grandfather owned.

He also became the Plainfield Police Department's only officer, a job he took seriously in a town he

## Wonderful way to honor real hero

When one has worked in newspapers for 40 years, one thinks he's seen it all.


One would be wrong.

I was reminded of that this past Saturday in Plainfield, where a beautiful memorial bench in honor of William "Bill" Meadows was dedicated at Veterans Park.

Meadows, of course, was Plainfield's town marshal who lost his life 64 years later while, as current Plainfield Mayor Tom Geise said, "performing his duties to serve and protect the citizens of Plainfield."

I was four years and 10 months from being born on that winter's night when Meadows responded to a report of a burglary and was

And now they have one job — walking across the stage and receiving a diploma — remaining.

"They're all done, and they're all graduating," Nashua-Plainfield High School counselor Jenn Kalainoff said. "Like every year, some of them made it interesting and gave us a few more gray hairs, but they made it and we're all proud of them."

Sunday's commencement ceremony will begin at 2:30 p.m. and be held in the Nashua-Plainfield High School gymnasium.

shot and killed by one of the perpetrators carrying out the crime.

Yet, over the past few months and then again on Saturday, I've felt connected to the Seattle native, World War II and Korean War veteran and Plainfield town marshal. He, like too many before and after him in law enforcement, made the ultimate sacrifice.

And on Saturday, the good folks of Plainfield and law enforcement came together on a beautiful, sunny morning to dedicate a memorial that will make sure Bill Meadows is never forgotten.

Some in the crowd knew him; most didn't.

Yet as Peter Wenzel, the pastor of First United Church of Christ, Pleasant Valley, the church Meadows attended so many years ago, succinctly put it: We all felt connected to this man whose image adorns the bench that now sits in Veterans Park.

"It just amazes me how our lives touch one another," he said. "We are definitely connected to one another, and that's obviously from all of you here. Sixty-four years later, his story has touched me in a profound way."

I've been to what seems like countless ceremonies like the one that took place on Saturday. As long as man inhabits the

earth, I'm guessing reporters will continue covering stories like this, for there will always be "good guys" and "bad guys" and sometimes the latter kill the former.

For some reason, though, this wasn't a ho-hum, another-bench-dedication ceremony.

I can't put a finger on why this one touched me so.

Maybe it was Meadows, himself. His story interested me almost from the first time Doug Strike, who helped secure the funds for the bench, shared it with me. He may have been Seattle born and raised, but the reality is that he was a stereotypical Iowan in that he always put others first.

Maybe it was the fact that so many people came together to make sure that Bill Meadows will be forever remembered. Eighteen major donors and 11 in-kind contributors gave their money and talents so that both the bench and a gravestone could be purchased.

Maybe it was the beautiful rendition of "God Bless the USA" sung by Sherri Greenlee and the reciting of the haunting poem "America Died" by Bremer County Sheriff's Chief Deputy Robert Whitney.

Maybe it was the fact that I knew how much time and effort folks like Strike and lifelong Plainfield resident Kenn Deike put into this endeavor.

Maybe it was just having the chance to talk with folks like Larry and LaDonna Carlson and Wayne Soeder. Larry is Bill Meadows' nephew, and he and his wife traveled by train from Seattle to be at the event. Wayne was a longtime state trooper who was one of the officers to respond to that horrific scene so many years ago, and even though he's 92, nothing would have stopped him from being in Plainfield on Saturday morning.

From Geise's opening remarks to Todd Becker playing "Taps," the ceremony lasted all of 30 minutes, but it will stick with me for as long as I walk this Earth.

God bless of all of you for pulling this off. You did well. You did exceptional.

I often write in my columns that my favorite part of newspapering is writing about ordinary people who do extraordinary things. And Bill Meadows was one of those ordinary folks who did those extraordinary things.

Maybe Wenzel said it best in his prayer at the beginning of the ceremony.

"His life still has meaning and will continue to have meaning — to the community, to those who knew him and to those who will hear his story. May his memory be a blessing to all of us and may his blessing be one that we carry with us wherever we go."

Amen.

She was preceded in death by





## State Auditor announces governor candidacy

Auditor Rob Sand, the only Democrat to currently hold statewide office in Iowa, announced his campaign for governor Monday.

Sand was widely expected to run for the position as a Democratic nominee, having raised more than \$8 million in the 2024 calendar year, according to the Des Moines Register. But Sand is facing a different playing field for governor than predicted heading into the 2026 election cycle: Gov. Kim Reynolds announced she will not seek reelection in 2026, meaning Republicans are also facing an open primary in the gubernatorial race.

Several Republican elected officials, including Attorney General Brenna Bird, House Speaker Pat Grassley and U.S. Rep. Randy Feenstra have said they are considering a campaign for governor. Iowa Sen. Mike Bousselot, R-Ankeny, has launched an exploratory committee for the governor's race, and former state Rep. Brad Sherman entered the race in February.

needs to be maintained."

He said the Tahoe would cost \$51,464.20 and that he estimated that it would cost in the "high 20s" to outfit it.

Board Chairman Jake Hackman said he was "on the fence this morning" about the issue, and Supervisor Isaac Carter wondered aloud about how county residents would feel about purchasing a new vehicle so soon after eliminating positions from the Auditor's, Treasurer's and Sheriff's Office, as well as three positions from Chickasaw County Public Health and Homecare.

"My only concern is the public [perception]," Carter said. "We're laying all these people off and cutting things. In my opinion, it's not going to be a good look. ... I understand that vehicles need to be replaced."

His fellow supervisors understood Carter's concern, but they also understood the needs of the county's law enforcement department.

Shawver expressed concerns about the two oldest vehicles — a 2018 and a 2019 Charger — in his fleet. The Tahoe would replace the 2018 vehicle that has 160,000 miles on it, and he told board members that the 2019 Charger has 125,000 miles and will be going in for a repair next week that he estimated would cost \$4,000.

He also pointed out that his office must be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and

needs reliable vehicles to respond to calls.

"Phones need to be answered, things need to be dispatched out and staff needs to be out there," he said. "When I have staff [off], I can't just say, 'Sorry, we're closed today.'"

Hackman agreed. "I think the public needs the sheriff's department in an emergency situation," Hackman said. "It just seems like we spend a lot of money on repairs with some of the older vehicles they have."

Cerwinski said he understood the concerns Carter expressed.

"At the same time, when somebody calls the Sheriff's Office, they want somebody to respond and we need vehicles," he said. "To me the vehicle is no different than the gun or the

vest or anything else — it's all part of the tools they need to do their job."

Supervisor Steve Breitbach wanted to know if the county had the option of waiting to purchase a vehicle next month when supervisors would have an even better idea how much Shawver would have remaining in his budget.

"Based on history and experience, if I don't give him an answer in the next week, then it's probably going to be gone," Shawver said. "There are a lot of agencies in the same boat. I wouldn't bet on it, put it that way. I'm not a betting man, but I wouldn't bet on it if I was."

And supervisors appeared not to want to take that bet either as they approved the purchase 4-1, with Carter casting the lone vote against.





Sudol feels his squad's got what it takes to break on through to state in four relays – that aforementioned 4x400 relay, the distance medley, 4x800 and shuttle hurdle relay. The 4x400 relay has the 34th-quickest time as of Wednesday afternoon in Class 1A.

"In year's past that would have been pretty dang good and I would have no question about it. Shuttle times are just fast right now," said Sudol.




"She's one of the top golfers ever at N-P," said N-P head coach Jeff Trost.


"It's baffling. I told them out on the green, now that's the group that's been




## 1A state qualifier: The goal is Des Moines
