## At long last, EMS remodel a go

Supervisors, though, quibble over using ARPA funds for \$175,000 project

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors finally gave the go-ahead to remodeling the Chickasaw County EMS ambulance station so that it will include living quarters for its drivers, paramedics and EMTs.

Stanton Electric, which will serve as the construction manager of the project, was approved by just a 3-2 vote because board members couldn't reach a consensus on how they wanted to pay for the almost \$175,000 project. None of the board members had issues with the contract that Stanton Electric owner Chuck Stanton and County Attorney David Laudner had drawn up, but the meeting turned testy

when it came to what funds would be used to complete the project. At a meeting earlier this year, board members had agreed to use a combination of the county's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and the EMS Department's budget to pay for the project, but after a motion was made to approve the contract, Supervisor Jake Hackman said he wanted the project to be paid for solely with EMS

funds. Asked by resident Terry Johnson what had changed, Hackman offered a quick and succinct reply. "I've changed my mind," he said. "All the time, as long as we've heard about this project, we were going to get ARPA funds," Johnson said, "but we keep reversing and kicking the can

down the road again and now you want to cut them out of the ARPA fund? I find that disgusting," Hackman, in reference to the fact

## NEW HAMPTON STUDENT MUSICIANS GO 'OUTSIDE THE BOX' AT DESSERT CONCERT

Ask Jenny Adam the difference between concert band and jazz band, and the New Hampton Middle School instructor has a quick answer. "If you think about music as a language," she said, "jazz is a different dialect." And for almost an hour, the instrumentalists of New Hampton Middle School and New Hampton High School showed they were quite comfortable speaking the dialect as they put on a rousing Jazz Dessert Concert in the competi-

tion gym lobby that makes for a cool venue for the event. The students also showed their versatility as a number of them played multiple instruments during the concert. But it's the jazz that attracts kids to what is basically an "extra-curricular" when it comes to band. Yes, concert band and jazz band both have "band" in them, but they are vastly different. As Adam put it, a concert band composer is "very specific" when he or she writes the music and expects the music "to be played a certain

way. "Jazz band offers a lot more creativity and outside of the box thinking. It is almost guaranteed that the same band will never perform the same chart exactly the same way." That's what Adam and her husband, Justin, who is the high school band director, love about jazz in general and the Dessert Concert in particular. They also appreciate the fact that they have multiple students who played more than one instrument on Friday evening, something Justin

Facility almost doubles in size with addition of former community room

The Lawler Public Library has a new and much "bigger" look these days. The library, which shares a building with City Hall in the small Chickasaw County town's downtown area, recently underwent an expansion that its director, Cathy Humpal, says has almost doubled the size of the facility. ## It's now official, New Hampton headed to UIC

After more than a century in the Northeast Iowa Conference, New Hampton is headed to the Upper Iowa Conference after superintendents in that conference voted Tuesday to accept the applications from New Hampton and Waukon to join the league at the beginning of the 2025-26 school year. "There is a sense of relief, I think you can say that," New Hampton Superintendent Jay Jurens said. "We know what we're doing, we know where we're going and who we're going to play. # Primary filing period underway for those seeking county offices

Three Board of Supervisors seats — currently held by Breitbach, Hackman and Kuhn — along with auditor, sheriff up for election in 2024

Those interested in becoming candidates for federal, state and county offices have a little more than two more weeks to get their names on the ballot for this summer's primary election.

The filing period for the June 4 primary, at least when it comes to county offices, began on Monday and runs through 5 p.m. on Friday, March 22, and those who want to seek their party's nomination must have their filing papers in by that date.

The filing period for federal and state offices began on Feb. 26 and runs through March 15.

Chickasaw County Deputy Commissioner of Elections Gina Fangman said Monday that residents who want to run in either the Democratic or Republican primary can stop into the Auditor's Office to pick up paperwork and added that candidates will also need to get the required number of signatures for the respective offices they are seeking.

"The number [of signatures] depends on the office," Fangman said and added that the signatures must

come from those who live within the county or, in the case of supervisor races, within the district.

This year's election will have a relatively healthy number of county offices up for election as three supervisor seats and two county-wide offices are slated to be on the 2024 ballot.

Supervisor districts on the ballot this year include the District 1 seat currently held by Democrat Steve Breitbach, the District 3 seat currently held by Republican Jake Hackman and the District 4 seat currently held by Republican Matt Kuhn.

Other county offices on the 2024

ballot are auditor and sheriff.

Auditor Sheila Shekleton, a Republican, won an uncontested election in 2022 to fill her office's vacancy, while Ryan Shawver, also a Republican, was appointed to the office in January 2023 after then-Sheriff Marty Hemann retired.

Both state legislators — State Sen. Sandy Salmon, R-Janesville, and State Rep. Charley Thomson, R-Charles City — have announced that they intend to seek re-election.

And while 2024 is a presidential election year, this is once-every-six-years in the election cycle that will see

Iowa without a U.S. Senate race.

That means the only other federal office, besides president, that will be on the ballot in Chickasaw County, will be the U.S. House of Representatives seat that is currently held by Republican Ashley Hinson.

As for the county offices, those who enter the primary will basically cast their lot with the June 4 election.

That's because under Iowa law, those that file for the primary can not file as an independent for the same office when the non-party filing period opens up later this summer, although they can seek another office.

programming," Humpal said. "We were really a room crammed full of books, and now, look around, we look like a library."

Late last year, Humpal and the Library Board approached the City Council about taking over what had been a community room in the back of the building and incorporating the room into the library.

"One of our board members, Renea Huinker, she's really a visionary and I think once she suggested it, we thought this would be perfect," Humpal said. "Obviously, we're landlocked when it comes to expanding the building but that room would add so much to our facility."

The community room had served a variety of purposes over the years. It was where, for years, Lawler residents cast ballots during elections and was also used for things like showers, group meetings and the like. But in recent years, it has been rarely used.

Council members agreed to turn the room over to the Library Board, with the condition that funds for the "expansion" would have to come from the library budget and donations.

The wall between the library and community was removed, a window was added, new flooring was installed and after being closed for about three weeks last month so that the renovation could be completed, the library reopened last week.

"The community room, without a window, it was dark, it wasn't very airy, if you will," Humpal said. "It's amazing to me how much one window can make a difference."

Then again, the same can be said for the entire library, which has undergone a major transformation over the past month.

It looks — heck, it smells — new.

"Every time I walk in here, I feel so blessed," said Humpal, who serves as the library's director since 2008. "It's like we have a new building."

And it's not done yet. Humpal and her board members hope to develop a "STEM corner" and are looking forward to celebrating the renovation during an open house this spring.

"Libraries are so important, and I know I'm supposed to say that with my job but it's true," she said. "People do rely on us — not just for books but for a lot of other things. Our computers get used, people find so many answers in this little building and that's why we're excited to start really what is a new chapter for us."

She said even when the library was closed during the renovation, patrons stopped by needing help they couldn't anywhere else in the small town.

"People would come in, 'Cathy, I really

need copies,' things like that," she said. "We're here to help, and now, we can offer more things. The people who met in the community room, the [Legion] Auxiliary, for example, they can still meet here. We have the room to do it. We'll have the room to have programming and still have people able to come and do what they need to do at the library. We were so small, it was almost claustrophobic."

The Lawler Public Library this week has returned to its "spring hours," meaning it is open Mondays from 1 to 6 p.m., Tuesdays from 1 to 5 p.m., Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to noon, Thursdays and Fridays from 1 to 5 p.m. and Saturdays from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m.

that ARPA funds were used to purchase ambulances and equipment for the county-owned ambulance service that began running on Jan. 1, 2023, offered his rebuttal.

"Mr. Johnson, our ARPA funds have funded this EMS from the start," he said.

Supervisor Matt Kuhn, who made the original motion to approve the contract, said he found it interesting that not only did supervisors agree to allocate \$600,000 of ARPA

funds to the Secondary Roads Department but that another \$217,000 of ARPA funds were used to fund the rural portion of the ambulance service costs for this fiscal year.

"What's funny is that doesn't get brought up," Kuhn said.

Board members then voted 3-2 — with only Hackman and Travis Suckow voting in the affirmative — to reject Hackman's amendment.

Kuhn then clarified his motion to approve the contract with Stanton Electric — using \$64,000 of ARPA funds with the EMS Department budget covering the rest of the costs.

The contract requires that sub-contractors Country Carpentry, Mic's Plumbing and Heating, Stanton Electric, Midwest Floors and TSI Iowa be employed on the project, and their costs, along with interior finish work and other project costs — like a dumpster, clearing, storage trailer and blue prints — add up to \$156,414.

The contract also calls for Stanton Electric to receive a 5 percent construction management fee of \$7,821 and a 3 percent bond of \$4,927 for a total of \$169,162.

Stanton told supervisors he also had a \$5,500 contingen-

cy fee, and the contract calls for the construction manager to return to the supervisors if that contingency is exhausted.

Board Chairman Scott Cerwinski also read a letter from Fredericksburg resident Doreen Cook, who voiced her opinion that those on the first crew should be required to be at the station and not at their homes when they are on duty.

Hackman also had questions about a recent social media post on the Chickasaw County EMS Facebook page in which the department acknowledged receiving a \$5,000 donation from Milkhouse Candles that "will go towards the construction of living quarters for our hardworking staff."

Hackman said he believed that \$5,000 should be accounted for in the project cost, but in the end, the board decided not to include that donation and further investigate the nature of the donation.

Finally, board members voted on Kuhn's clarified motion, with Kuhn, Steve Breitbach and Cerwinski voting for it while Hackman and Suckow cast dissenting votes.

Stanton said work would begin on the project soon and that he expects no issues with the contract's call for a completion date of July 15.

## Versatility key for New Hampton jazz bands

Adam says usually makes them stronger all-around musicians.

"They use their base musical knowledge that they already have about how music works and they learn the new skills to make sound and play their other instruments," he said. "A lot of times I compare learning an instrument to lifting weights. We're using muscles, air, and body parts in ways we're not used to. We do regular short interval training to start to strengthen those muscles and movements. You don't start your training running a 5K... you have to work up to it."

So how long does it take for a student to learn a second or, in some cases, a third instrument?

"It usually depends on the student and how much they practice," he said. "Some kids get it right away, but most it takes some persistence and time to train the muscles and the brain."

But it wasn't just the older kids — i.e., the high school students — who picked up multiple instruments Friday night.

Jenny Adam's middle school students, too, showed some amazing versatility Friday night.

The middle school band director says she equates playing two instruments to playing with a ball.

"The foundation is learning how to recognize the ball and understand what can be done with it," she said. "When you apply that to an instrument you are learning a specific skill for a sport like to play catch. When you learn a secondary instrument, the foundation is already there — you know what a ball is and you know how to play catch. Now you are learning how to throw



the ball into a basketball hoop or pass to another player."

But she also believes that students who play more than one instrument also gain an intangible that helps the band program as a whole.

"Often, students will have a greater appreciation for their peers," Jenny Adam said, "after learning a second instrument."

Friday's concert, though, was just the start of what will be a busy couple of weeks for New Hampton band students, who are scheduled to perform at the annual Parade of Bands Concert that will be held this coming Monday.


The concert will include performances

by the two schools' four concert bands — Fifth Grade, Sixth Grade, 7-8 Grade and the high school's Concert Band.

The concert will include the 7-8 Band performing "Another Day," which was written and will be conducted by 2022 New Hampton High School graduate Abigail Holschlag and conclude with a combined 7-12 band performing "Unleashed."

"It has a lot of interesting rhythms," Jenny Adam said, "and the kids have really stepped up to the challenge of learning new counting this year."


Monday's concert begins at 7 p.m. and will be held in the competition gymnasium.

affected just that asset class. But by owning a mix of stocks, bonds, government securities and other investments, you can help reduce the impact of market volatility. (Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't protect against all losses.)

Still, before deciding on what to do with extra money you might have in your emergency fund, how will you know if you indeed have too much? ## City Council approves selling land, purchases used snowblower

In a relatively quick meeting Monday night, the New Hampton City Council approved the sale of city-owned land and gave the go-ahead for the Street Department to purchase a used snowblower to replace one that is more than 45 years old.

Start with the land sale, which consists of the city's right-of-way that extends from Gardner Street to Spring Creek located to the east of the dead-end street.

Earlier this year, council members agreed to accepting bids for the little more than a half-acre of land, but despite one resident, Bill Prouty, requesting that the right-of-way be divided into three parcels during a public hearing on Feb. 19, the council moved forward to accept bids on the entire parcel of land.

Council members set the minimum bid for the parcel at \$8,500, which they said took into account the value of the land as well as the city paying for the survey of the area.

On Monday, the city opened two bids — one from Kelly O'Donnell; the other from Bill and Mary Prouty, both of whom

own lots adjacent to the right-of-way.

O'Donnell's bid was for \$12,500 but also stated that he would go \$1,250 higher than the highest bid. The Proutys also put in an "escalation bid," one with an original offer of \$16,000 that could increase by \$2,561 over the highest bid. But the Prouty offer was capped at \$18,561.

Because O'Donnell had not capped his bid, City Attorney Todd Prichard told council members that O'Donnell's final bid was \$19,811 — the \$18,561

the Proutys had bid, plus \$1,250 — and council members voted 5-0 to accept the offer on the land.

Also on Monday, council members gave Public Works Director Casey Mai the go-ahead to purchase a 2007 snowblower for \$70,000 to replace the 1978 snowblower the city currently uses to remove snow from the downtown area.

But council members agreed with Mai to exclude the \$2,500 trade-in on the city's current snowblower.

"I think we can get more for

that just selling it for parts," Councilman Joe Denner said.

Mai said the city's current snowblower has had a number of issues in recent years, and after the meeting, he said the piece of equipment is vital to snow removal.

"I know we haven't had much snow this year, but we've still had it out five times," he said. "If we couldn't blow the snow into trucks, it would literally take us days to clean out the downtown after a snowfall. That's not good for anyone — the businesses, the residents, anyone."

## Students to have 'shorter' weeks

New Hampton Community Schools and St. Joseph Community School students will have a couple of "less-than-full" weeks.

Students will be dismissed an hour early next Tuesday and Thursday because of the parent-teacher conferences. Friday is set to be a comp day for teachers, and with professional development set for Monday, March 18, there will be no classes that day.

Or the people in countries who fight against each other. All are part of the world that God made.



## Exploring the traditions that come with Lent

The Lenten season marks a period of 40 days when faithful Christians prepare for the glory of Easter Sunday. Easter commemorates the miracle of Jesus Christ's resurrection, which is foundational for the Christian faith.

Lent is a season when Christians reflect and prepare to celebrate Easter. Lent is a period of spiritual purification that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Thursday. Fasting, giving alms and prayer are some of the hallmarks of Lent.

Many Lenten traditions are well known, but others are not. Here's a glimpse at some of those traditions.

### The first 'Lent'

Lent is based on the 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert in preparation for his public life. Matthew 4:1-11 shares that Christ was led into the desert by the Holy Spirit for a period of fasting and prayer, where He constantly encountered the devil and his temptations.

Lent also mirrors the period of time (40 days) that the Israelites spent in their journey from slavery in Egypt to the promised land of Israel.

### Black fasts

While certain Lenten restrictions have lightened up a bit in recent years, it once was the norm to consume a single meal per day of bread, water and herbs after sunset on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, which was known as a black fast. During the other days of Lent, no food was allowed until 3 p.m., which Christians believe was the hour of Our Lord's death.

### Piñatas for Lent?

The Lenten tradition of hitting a papi-



er-mâché creation filled with candy originated in Italy. Eventually the idea was picked up by the Spanish and brought to Mexico, where the familiar piñatas now known to partygoers across the globe appeared.

Professor Michael Foley, author of "Dining with the Saints," says the original piñata had seven cones to represent the seven deadly sins. Hitting the cones and defeating the sins revealed the heavenly reward in the form of candy.

### Prayerful pretzels

In the early Middle Ages, when other foods were not allowed during Lent, pret-

zels became popular. The twisted shape of the pretzels was associated with arms entwined in prayer.

### Hot cross buns

Hot cross buns are synonymous with Easter. Although they may predate Christianity and might have been a tradition adopted to make Christianity more relatable to the masses, one legend suggests they originated with a 12th century Anglican monk.

This monk reportedly baked the buns and marked them with crosses in honor of Good Friday. These yeasted sweet rolls have since become a popular treat during Lent.



"We're still working on confirming a few more and if anyone's interested in being a part of this, we're going to work with them to get them here," said Holly O'Brien, the college and career coordinator at Northeast Iowa Community College. "I've been so impressed with how these kids have really taken this on and made sure those who come out will see how many different options they have."

# Supervisors move ahead with city water to Heritage

Board OKs three road projects, express support for allowing New Hampton to have five years to pay its portion of Kenwood

Chickasaw County leaders moved ahead Monday with the plan to bring "city water" to the Heritage Building Center.

Supervisors voted 3-2 to continue the process of awarding a contract to connect the county-owned building located just south of New Hampton's city limits to the city water supply during a meeting in which they also authorized the county engineer to move ahead with three road projects and discussed what's next if they decided to proceed with using tax-increment financing (TIF) funding of future building and road projects.

Start with the water at the Heritage, which is currently home to several county and non-profit organizations.

For months, board members have been divided on hooking into the city of New Hampton's water supply.

During its Feb. 26 meeting, the board receive six bids for the project, with the low bid of \$143,838.75 coming from Popp Excavating, an Osage firm.

During the public hearing on Monday to discuss the public improvement project, both Sheriff Ryan Shawver and resident Terry Johnson spoke out against proceeding with the project. Shawver said "something needs to be done, but at what level is my only question?"

He pointed out that putting a water filtration system into the building would be between \$12,000 and \$15,000 a year.

Johnson questioned the need for the project, but Supervisor Jake Hackman once again expressed his support for the project.

"So I put this public hearing to the test of a county purpose," he said, "and I 100 percent agree that there is county purpose for this low bid ... Anybody needs to go tour the storage tanks for the sprinkler system, all the pumping system for that system would be eliminated. The well would be eliminated, the three pressure tanks would be eliminated. A lot of the plumbing would be eliminated. They are corroded, they are probably at their time of aging out of usage."

He also said that the bid received from Popp "shocked all of us" and that the county would be foolish to not move ahead with the project.

Fellow supervisor Steve

Breitbart continued to voice opposition to the project.

"I've voiced my opinion before on this," he said, "and I don't think a wise choice of taxpayer money at this point in time. I think the water's fine, and we have a lot other things we need to use the money on."

After a discussion that lasted for almost 20 minutes, Hackman moved to have County Attorney David Laudner draw up the contract with Popp to move ahead with the project, and Hackman, Travis Suckow and Board Chairman Scott Cervinske voted to move ahead while Breitbart and Matt Kuhn casting the two no votes.

**BOARD MEMBERS** did receive some welcome news when County Engineer Roman Lensing reviewed bids for three projects as two of them came in well under estimates.

Lensing said that the low bid of \$1.22 million to replace a bridge on 310th Street that runs over the East Fork of the Wapsipinicon River on the county line with Bremer came in at just 67.7 percent of the estimate.

"This is good news," Lensing said of the low bid for the project that will be a joint one with Bremer County. "Basically, we saved \$300,000 roughly that would have been coming out of our bridge program. Now, we can carry that on to future bridges."

Lensing also shared that the bids for LED stop signs to be placed at select spots in the county also came in lower than expected. He explained that the county had received a grant for up to \$90,000 to install the stop signs, but the low bid came in at just under \$66,000.

"We got some insanely low bids," Lensing said. "In hindsight, I wish we would have added more locations but that's too late to do. Our estimate was just over \$90,000 or just under \$90,000, depending on which one you looked at. ... Still, I was very happy with that letting as well."

The third bid, though, wasn't the charm, but Lensing said he felt it was important that the county accept the low bid of \$171,833.10 for a paving marking program, which was about 5 percent over the estimate.

Supervisors agreed, and like the bridge and stop sign bids, they unanimously agreed to award the pavement marking contract.

Lensing also updated the Board of Supervisors on the proposed Kenwood Avenue reconstruction project that would run from Highway 18 south to 210th Street. The engineer has expressed his support to using the \$600,000 of ARPA funds that was designated to Secondary Roads for the project.

But because the city of New Hampton owns a portion of the road, it would have to be a joint project between the county and city. New Hampton Public Works Director Casey Mai has said that the city is willing to work with the county, but it would need to have an agreement in place to pay back the county because it has other projects already in the works.

Supervisors agreed Monday to send a 28E agreement to the city in which the county would agree to the city paying for its portion of the project over a five-year period with no interest.

Supervisors learned that three of the four buildings that had been part of a blight study were found to qualify as "blighted." The three buildings include the Sheriff's Office, a county shop and the old landfill building located near Twin Ponds Nature Center.

Board members have discussed the possibility of using TIF funds to pay some or all of the costs to remodel the current Sheriff's Office building and construct a new 24-hour holding facility.

Comisky reminded board members that whichever way they proceeded, they would need to receive approval from cities if the buildings or roads that TIF money is directed to are within a two-mile radius of the cities.

Board members agreed to have the county's TIF Committee meet and bring back recommendations to it at a later date.

**SUPERVISORS ALSO** spent a decent amount of time Monday talking with Ahlers & Cooney attorney Jason Comisky about setting up an urban renewal plan that could lead to TIF funds generated by the new Chickasaw Wind Farm being directed to road projects and several county-owned buildings.

## Bigger NEIC schools still without a home

superintendent at Turkey Valley, which is a member of the UIC, and he said the lone UIC school to vote against New Hampton and Waukon was West Central, the smallest school in the conference.

The NEIC is the oldest conference in the state of Iowa, and New Hampton was a charter member of the league when it was formed in 1920.

From 1969 to 2021, the membership remained steady at seven, but Oelwein left the league in 2021 and joined the North Iowa Cedar League.

The remaining six schools then voted to remove Waverly-Shell Rock, by far the NEIC's largest district, from the conference in the hopes that it would make the NEIC more attractive to potential expansion.

But not a single school expressed interest in joining the NEIC and with Waverly-Shell Rock departing the conference after this year and Crestwood leaving after the 2024-25 school year, that left just four schools — one less than state law allows for conferences to exist — in the NEIC.

During a meeting early last month in which the UIC accepted Crestwood's appli-

cation, superintendents also extended an invitation to apply to the conference. On Tuesday, those applications were accepted but UIC superintendents did not make any decision on Decorah's application to the conference.

"A lot of school boards haven't met since we got Decorah's application," Jurrens said, "so we really couldn't have a vote. Ultimately, it's up to the school boards."

Although it hasn't officially been voted on, the UIC will in all likelihood break into two divisions — one for larger schools and the other for smaller schools.

The NEIC schools will join North Fayette Valley, MFL MarMac and South Winneshiek in the large-school division while Central Elkader, Clayton Ridge, Kee High, Postville, Turkey Valley and West Central will make up the small-school division.

"We haven't officially voted on that," Jurrens said, "but I do know that's the intent."

He said in addition to athletics, the Upper Iowa Conference also offers other programs for its schools. Jurrens said the conference currently has music, art and speech festivals.

"Quite honestly, they have a few more things like that than we did in the NEIC. ... That's important because you want your conference to be about more than just sports."

What remains to be seen is where the NEIC's three largest schools will end up.

Waverly-Shell Rock will compete as an independent next year but has applied to the WaMaC for the following year. Decorah has its application into the UIC while Charles City's hopes of joining the North Central Conference were dashed Monday night when two of that conference's schools voted against bringing the Comets into the NCC.

Charles City Superintendent Anne Lundquist, during a board meeting on Monday, said the next step for the district will be to examine the reasoning behind the denial and work toward a resolution or explore options for another conference altogether.

Meanwhile, work on the new, expanded UIC will begin almost immediately.

"The ADS will start meeting now to get the 25-26 schedule ready," Jurrens said. "It takes time to get everything together and I'm sure we'll use it wisely."

Go back in time a year ago and tell then-New Hampton High School junior Megan Pickar that she would be heading to Wartburg College to run cross country and track after graduating from high school and she probably would have laughed.

A year ago, Pickar ran on the New Hampton's 4x800 relay team that finished 12th at the Class 2A state track meet, and this past fall, she decided to double up and play both volleyball and run cross country.

She had a banner season in the latter, earning all-conference honors at the NEIC meet and just missing a trip to the state cross country meet. In the process, she found joy in long-distance running.

"I just really like the feeling after running of accomplishment," she said, "and just the fact that you have teammates supporting each other. Everything just makes me really happy when I'm running."

Pickar said she looked at several different colleges and felt more comfortable at Wartburg.

"I've been to a lot of places touring, and they just really stood out to me," she said. "They all support each other and it's just like family. It really felt like family when I went."

After a solid senior season on the

basketball court, she's ready for her last season as a Chickasaw. New Hampton opened the track season on Tuesday when it traveled to the new Mason City Fieldhouse for an indoor meet.

And then she'll be off to Wartburg, where she plans on majoring in biology, but her long-term goal is to become a physical therapist.

"My recovery, that really opened my eyes to physical therapy," she said, "and I'm so thankful to everyone who helped me get to this point. I want to help people who have to go through something like I did."

She says that long-ago injury, though, has taught her some valuable lessons. "I've learned things like patience and

hard work and dedication," she said. "I've learned how much hard work I do need to accomplish a goal, but I've also been super supported, too, by my family, my coaches, my friends."

"I wish the injury had never happened obviously, but in some ways, it's made me the person I am today, the person I want to be."

## Former NEIC student-athlete aiming to umpire in 'the show'

Theo Arndt knows the maxim by heart.

"Don't make the game about you," he says about the responsibilities and rigors that come with being an umpire.

"Know your role and respect the game."

Arndt has grown up respecting the game. He has been involved with baseball for most of his life, dating back from his formative youth league playing days and through his prep tenure as an all-conference outfielder/pitcher for the Charles City Comets that led to him signing to continue his career at Wartburg College.

Even during his scholastic playing days, Arndt would often volunteer umpire for local youth play, and then later for

high school.

Now, Arndt is umpiring at the professional level.

It got to this point after Arndt made the brave call to more vigorously pursue his passion to stay in the game when he enrolled at a prestigious umpiring school in Vero Beach, Florida last spring.

"I learned so much that I didn't know before," Arndt said. "Little things ... like how to position yourself before cleaning the plate ... how to project confidence whenever you take the field and whenever you make a call."

The experience paid off as Arndt was subsequently hired by Minor League Baseball in conjunction with the MLB to umpire for the California League, which includes Class A and Rookie level affiliated teams.

Arndt obviously has the dream of reaching "the show" like the players he presides over. But his path to the majors may be even more difficult. Major League umpires have a strong

union and — once they reach the "big" — are often able to retain their jobs due to far less turnover compared to that of players and coaches, thus openings occur less frequently.

"It usually takes about 8 or 10 years to reach the major league level," Arndt said. "The youngest (MLB) umpires are around 32 years old."

But though the MLB doesn't often open doors for young umpires still in their 20s, the level Arndt is now working can come with the fraught warning: No Country for Old Men.

"With two-men crews in Rookie ball, you've got to cover a lot of ground," said Arndt, who exercises and watches his diet in the same pious manner as during his playing days.

"As you move up, the less ground you have to cover. But you've got to be able to move if you want to move up."

And you've got to love the game, even though the game — or rather players/coaches/fans — don't always love you back.

"I try to be decisive with my calls ... go with my first instinct," he said. "If I miss a pitch or call, I try to put it behind me before the next pitch."

"Many games are ball, strike, out, safe to where most anyone can umpire them. Much fewer games have those crucial calls or rulings that cause controversy and arguments. But if the

worst thing that happens to me during a day is getting yelled at a baseball game ... I can live with that."

Still, the abuse can be daunting, especially with such over-the-top episodes getting played more regularly on social media. Such a trend may be the prime reason fewer people want to "step to the plate" to become umpires, but Arndt counters with some of the positives.

"For any high school or college student who wants to earn money during the summer, I can't think of a better summer job," he said. "Not only can you make good money, but you learn so many life skills ... how to take control of a situation while staying in control yourself ... how to deal with people."

Arndt, who umpired numerous high school games before heading to the pros last summer, comes from a baseball-laden family. He and his younger brother, Tait, were teammates at Charles City and were briefly teammates at Wartburg. When asked if he tried to recruit his brother to the umpiring ranks, Arndt said, "He was more of a pitcher, so he doesn't like umpires that much. He's more into coaching."

Talk of umpires being replaced in some capacity by artificial intelligence periodically becomes the "rhubarb" of the day. But Arndt makes a case for

the reliability the human eyes and the human ears working in concert with each other in determining a "bang-bang" call.

"For a close call at first base, I don't just look at the foot hitting the base and the ball hitting the glove — I listen for them."

Arndt will have some "Northeast Iowa company" this year when it comes to working minor league games.

That's because earlier this year, former Riceville athlete John Miller — who like Arndt, worked a full load of high school baseball games — was named a minor league umpire for the 2024 season.

Miller, who worked several New Hampton baseball games the past few years, said he was excited for the opportunity that awaits him.

"It's been a hectic past couple of days," Miller said early last month after he received the call to "go pro."

"I'm glad I had a chance to work with a lot of good people over the past few years," said Miller, who also been a basketball referee since graduating from high school in 2018. "Umpiring and refereeing has been a great way to stay involved in the game, and I hope more people my age will see that and officiate."

The Iowa Utilities Board designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$32.50 per month and business services are \$49.50 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in the Lifeline program, which makes residential telephone or qualifying broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers may qualify for Lifeline discounts of \$5.25/month for voice or bundled voice service or \$9.25/month for qualifying broadband or broadband bundles. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying broadband service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload to qualify.

A household is defined as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Services are not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in these programs. Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain these discounts can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from these programs.

"Now I am looking forward to all the activities I haven't been able to do comfortably. My husband and I are planning a trip to Florida soon and I am excited to being able to get out and walk in the nice weather."
