Chickasaw **County EMS** all moved in

Ambulance personnel are now based at ambulance station 24/7

Chickasaw County EMS moved into its new living quarters at the ambulance station sooner than expected and save for a few "finishing touches," the project is complete.

And that means the county is no longer renting an apartment to house paramedics, EMTs and drivers who work on the main crew of the publicly-owned ambulance service.

During a department update at Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting, Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson told county leaders that his department "turned over the keys" to the apartment it had been renting on May 31 and moved into the living quarters that include a downstairs office and kitchen area and upstairs bedrooms and living rooms.

"It's worked out well, very well," Knutson said Tuesday morning, "and we just have a finishing touch here and there and we'll call it complete."

During Monday's meeting, board members acknowledged the use of donated funds to purchase two chairs for the living quarters from Dungey's Furniture and Flooring.

'We've had a sectional couch that was basically borrowed to us by one of our employees," he said, "and they've just moved into a new house and would like their furniture back."

The EMS director on Tuesday applauded the work done by a host of local contractors on the project and said that "it's nice to be here. We were close before, but now we're right here and as good as our response times, they'll get even better because we're sleeping right next to the trucks.

Chickasaw County EMS went into service on Jan. 1, 2023 and for the first nine months, the service rented a house on South Walnut Avenue and since last October, it has rented an apartment in a complex located just across the street

and diligence, God has provided for our growth and development. Despite our earthly fathers flaws and shortcomings, the Lord God has continued to raise up children throughout the



Dad's day has its roots in Christianity

Many of the world's most important holidays are tethered to Christian themes and events. This is obviously true of such days as Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. It is also true of Halloween (Hallowed Evening) which once was closely linked to All Soul's Day.

Father's Day, too, is linked to Christianity in that it was founded to celebrate the ideals of fatherhood set forth in Scripture.

The Origin of Father's Day

The first widely-promoted Father's Day celebration of modern America was held in Spokane, Washington on this day, June 19, 1910 (a father's day had been observed in Fairmont, West Virginia two years earlier with little publicity).

The Spokane event was the brain-child of Sonora Louise Smart (Mrs. John Bruce) Dodd envisioned an event as focused in special religious services and involving small gifts as well as loving greetings from children to their fathers.

She brought up the matter with her pastor and he communicated the idea to the local pastor's association. The mayor of the city and the governor of the state endorsed her concept and issued proclamations in support. The famed politician William Jennings Bryan weighed in with words of encouragement.

Mrs. Dodd dearly loved her tather. When his wife died in childbirth, he was left with six children. Somehow he overcame the difficulties of rearing them while operating his farm. His devotion to his children sparked Louise's gratitude.

Father's Day was slow to catch on. What Louise had done was not even well known in her own state despite the governor's proclamation. The idea of honoring fathers with a special day was actually reinvented independently in several other places, each locality thinking it was starting something

Curiously, circumstances led other founders to select the month of June. In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson had endorsed the idea and in 1924 Calvin Coolidge recommended national observance of the day "to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligation" and strengthen intimate ties between fathers and children.

The History of Father's Day

Despite these presidential pronouncements, it was 1966 before President Johnson established the third Sunday in June as the date of the celebration. Even so, this not made official until 1972 under President Nixon.

The ideals of fatherhood are strong in the Bible. Unlike the gods of other religions, the Christian God is portrayed as a loving Father. Christ described God as his own intimate Father and claimed to show in himself what the Father was like. God gave his beloved son for the salvation of the world.

Consequently, wherever the Christian ideal has prospered, fatherhood has taken on deeper and more lyrical meaning. The tender appeals of the apostles John and Paul to their "children" helped foster this attitude.

Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord.

Ephesians 6:4



William Jackson Smart's self-sacrificing love for his children led to a national day of recognition for all fathers. We have a grateful daughter to thank for that.







The Chickasaws placed 26th overall in state senior singles competition this year – which concluded on Friday for New Hampton. Swehla went back on Sunday to Cedar Falls to get his all-state

Swehla was one of just 21 individuals that recorded a 200 in the individual E-League standings, which placed him fifth. He placed sixth in the state individual standings with a 198 – meaning he missed just two clay targets in the 100round morning and 100-shot afternoon session that tabulate eight 25-round sta-

"I kind of wish the team would have done a little better," said Swehla. "The competition's gotten better. I started off pretty slow and then got my rhythm back. It turned out to be really good."

There were 11 seniors on Matthews' roster and they comprised teams like NH Red, which finished 10th overall with a 943. Humpal came up with a 187. Chickasaw seniors Isaak Schwickerath, Ashton Venem and Nick Brincks each tallied 186s.

"I've shot the best that I've ever shot," said Humpal, who managed a 184 last year and shot 50 in a row to start his morning round.

Jackson Kellogg, a freshman, shot 75 straight to begin his round and wound

Windy conditions on Friday were about the only thing shooters could complain about during the week – which featured doubles, handicap and skeet competition, three of eight disciplines the attendees of the state meet can take

There were 204 teams competing in varsity senior singles competition on Friday and 120 separate teams that competed during the state run according to Iowa DNR spokesman Marty Eby. He said there were well over 3,100 athletes that vied for a trophy at state this year.

Two of those competitors were Chickasaw seniors Grace Maloy and Tori

Maloy shot a 174 – Bearman a 172. Those scores mattered for the recent New Hampton grads, but they weren't the end all, be all.

"He always says we're like a family," said Maloy, about what her head coach says is just as important as the scores they post. "The scores aren't really what matters, it's the friendships you make

Bearman felt fortunate to take part in the sport of trapshooting.

"It's been a long four years, but it's also been enjoyable," said Bearman. "Everyone put their best effort in this year. We're lucky to have this sport with our school. A lot of schools in Iowa and around the United States don't have this sport offered to kids."

Rhiannon Ellingson, another senior for New Hampton, shot 25 in a row at one point, just like Maloy, as well as juniors Karla Pickar and Aleah Eichenberger. NH senior Trinity Schwickerath also shot 25 in a row, as did Wyatt Schwickerath and Venem.

Ellingson, who said she makes it a point every year at state to get strawberry ice cream, competes with her sister, freshman Danielle Ellingson.

"It made the season go by fast," said Rhiannon Ellingson. "I liked her shoot-



New Hampton earns a slit in a key conference doubleheader with W-SR

It was mano a mano Monday evening at Wartburg College's Hertel Field Monday night, and New Hampton's "mano" won.

The Chickasaws' Kael Meyers won a battle of aces with Waverly-Shell Rock's Grant Parker in the opening game of a doubleheader and although the Go-Hawks salvaged a 5-0 win in the nightcap, the split kept New Hampton atop the Northeast Iowa Conference with a 9-1 league record.

"Kael was lights out on the mound tonight with full command of his arsenal and showed everyone why he is the best pitcher in the conference and one of the best in Class 2A," New Hampton coach Cory McDonald said after Meyers starred on both the mound and the plate in a 7-4 win.

Meyers picked up the complete game victory as he scattered five hits, gave up just two unearned runs while striking out 11 and walking four to improve his pitching record to 5-0 this season. Meanwhile, the Chickasaws

offense was humming as Meyers and Jaxon Eckley had three hits apiece to lead a New Hampton attack that finished with 10 hits, including doubles by Eckley and Braden McShane. It was McShane's RBI double

in the fifth inning that chased Parker, who McDonald called 'one of the best pitchers in Class 3A" and who will be a teammate of Meyers next season at junior college powerhouse Southeastern Community College in Burlington.

Meyers also got plenty of help from his defense, especially catcher Talyn Bohaty who threw out three would-be base

"He had his best game of the season against the most aggressive baserunning team that we have faced this summer," McDonald said. He answered quickly, then let a mischievous grin envelop his face.

Swehla, who capped a tremendous athletic career at New Hampton in the sport of trap, will have to rank his sixth place individual state finish at the Iowa SCTP (Scholastic Clay Target Program) Championships that he accomplished last weekend as a secondary memorable moment.

Flashback two years ago down in Cedar Falls at the Iowa SCTP Championships when New Hampton was once again wrapping up an outstanding season - albeit in a muddy, muck of a mess on the grounds of the Cedar Falls Gun Club, the shooting range that hosts the state meet every year along with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).

Swehla stood near the Chickasaws' home base camp setup at the state meet on Friday afternoon along with his fellow Chickasaw senior – Hunter Humpal - and both shared stories about their time touring northeast Iowa with their shotguns and then knocking down as many of the orange clay targets as they could.

Inevitably, one moment stood out. The time Ethan's mom - Janell Swehla – got the bus stuck in the mud at state in 2022.

FYI – she's got an award to prove her driving skill and prowess behind the wheel is secondary to none, considering the circumstances and level of difficulty in order to get the big rig unstuck and back out on the road.

"At our awards banquet that year she got a "bad ass bus driver" award," said Swehla, back when he was a sophomore. "There was tons of mud. We had to all get out of the bus and watch her just slide backwards, forwards. She
