## Board rejects remodeling bids

Confusion leads to supervisors asking construction manager to return Dec. 18

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors will have to wait three more weeks to learn how much it will cost to remodel the Chickasaw County EMS' ambulance station so that it will have living quarters for its paramedics, EMTs and drivers.

That's because the board unani-

mously voted Monday to reject all the bids it received for the project; in fact, the supervisors didn't even open the bids it received.

The reason? Board members want to make sure that bidders weren't confused by the process — one in which the supervisors thought they would be receiving general contractor bids yet only received just one of those bids while receiving two "sub" bids for car-

pantry work.

Board members said they believed that Design Connections' Aaron Thompson would be serving as the "construction manager" of the project, but Thompson's Rochester, Minnesota-based company submitted a general contractor bid.

"My intention was to act as a construction manager," Thompson said, "but I wanted to make sure I provided

a number from that standpoint. I do understand wanting to make sure that everything is taken care of so that nothing comes back to the county as unfair or anything."

Supervisors held a special meeting last Wednesday on the matter, and on Monday, they again hashed over ways to come with grips with what has

becoming a confusing odyssey.

After a lengthy discussion — one that included making several changes

## Principal pumped for new apprentice welding program

School Board approves program; Manson says school hoping to establish similar ones

The long-held dream of New Hampton High School Principal Matt Manson has become a reality.

That's because the School Board last week approved his plan to offer a registered apprenticeship in combination welding, and Manson's hope is that this is just the beginning.

"It's important to serve all of our students," Manson said, "and not every student that walks through these halls wants to — or needs to — go to college. It's doesn't mean that it's not important, but apprenticeships certainly should be an option."

Under the plan approved by the School Board during its Nov. 20 meeting, students who are interested in the combined welding apprenticeship will take welding courses before moving on to more advanced courses. Then, they will move to spending partial days at Afinitas, formerly known as New Hampton Metal Fab.

"Basically, we are running the program, and Afinitas is serving as the work experience provider," Manson said. "We're incredibly grateful for their partnership, and honestly, we're hoping there will be more interest from other businesses as we get this going."

Manson said he hopes to have at least one student at Afinitas by the start of the second semester.

He said Iowa Works provided valuable assistance in writing the program.

"They're the ones who basically looked at it and said, 'You can do this,'" Manson said. "It's going to be a valuable experience for all of our students."

## School Board keeps gyms closed on Sunday mornings

Ministerial Association asked for three 'exceptions'

New Hampton Community Schools will keep its gyms closed to youth activities on Sunday mornings despite efforts by the New Hampton Ministerial Association to overturn a decision the association had lobbied the School Board to make in the mid-2010s.

At that time, the ministers asked board members to not allow youth activities to be held in the schools until at least 1 p.m. on Sundays.

Last week, Superintendent

Jay Jurrens told the current School Board that he had received a request from the association for "three exceptions" to be made so that youth activities can happen on Sunday morning at least three times."

Jurrens was lukewarm to the request, pointing out that since word had gotten out about the request, he had received two requests for Sunday morning activities "if this passes and this doesn't count the activity that promoted the request."

Take the day before Thanksgiving, for example, when the New Hampton Rotary Club filled the bell-ringing duties throughout the day. Taking the 5 to 6 p.m. shift was Bridget Edson, or maybe to be more precise, Ryan Edson, her 8-year-old son who is a second-grader at St. Joseph Community School.

That story was the proverbial music to Markham's ears.

The campaign also includes a day of bell-ringing in Fredericksburg, where the local Lions Club mans the kettle, as well as the mini-kettles that are placed at Casey's in New Hampton and Fredericksburg, as well as Klunder's Kafe in New Hampton.

The money raised goes to a variety of causes — from food for families to clothing for children to helping those who can't pay their power or heat bills. This past year, the Salvation Army unit was able to

present checks to schools that serve county residents to help families who were behind on their lunch accounts, and the unit also made a \$1,500 donation to the Chickasaw Pride Pantry that is available 24/7 in the front entrance at New Hampton High School.

"We're very appreciative of Fareway for letting us have the kettle there," Markham said. ## Can you make charitable giving less 'taxing'?

Once again, it's the season of generosity. In addition to considering gifts for your loved ones, you might want to think about charitable gifts as well. But what should you know before making gifts to charities? And what impact might these gifts have on your financial and tax situation?

First, you may want to create a gift budget by deciding just how much you will give to charitable organizations over the rest of the year.

Next, look closely at the groups to whom you wish to contribute. You can find many reputable charities, but some others may be less worthy of your support. One of the red flags of a questionable organization is the amount of money it spends on administrative costs versus the amount that goes to its stated purpose. You can check on the spending patterns of charitable groups, and find other valuable information about them, on the well-regarded Charity Navigator website ([charitynavigator.org](http://charitynavigator.org)).

Once you've established a gift budget and are comfortable with the groups you choose to support, you might turn your thoughts to another key issue connected with charitable giving: tax benefits. A few years ago, changes in the tax laws resulted in a large increase in the standard deduction, which meant that many taxpayers found it more favorable not to itemize — and lost the ability to take charitable deductions. But if you still do itemize, your charitable gifts or contributions to tax-exempt groups — those that qualify as 501(c)(3) organizations — can generally be deducted, up to 60% of your adjusted gross income, although lower limits may apply, depending on the nature of your gift and the organization to which you're contributing.

Other, more long-term avenues also exist that combine charitable giving with potential tax benefits. One such possibility is a donor-advised fund, which allows you to make an irrevocable charitable contribution and receive an immediate

tax deduction. You can give cash, but if you donate appreciated assets, such as stocks, your tax deduction would be the fair market value of the assets, up to 30% of your adjusted gross income. Plus, you would not incur the capital gains tax that would otherwise be due upon the sale of these assets. Once you establish a donor-advised fund, you have the flexibility to make charitable gifts over time, and you can contribute to the fund as often as you like.

Another possible tax benefit from making charitable contributions could arrive when you start taking required minimum distributions, or RMDs, from some of your retirement accounts, such as your traditional IRA and 401(k). These RMDs could be sizable — and distributions are counted as taxable income. But by taking what's called a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), you can move money from a traditional or Roth IRA to a qualified charitable organization, possibly satisfying your RMD, which then may be excluded from your taxable income. You must start taking RMDs at 73 but you can begin making QCDs of up to \$100,000 per year as early as age 70½. (This amount will be indexed for inflation after 2023.)

Establishing a donor-advised fund and making qualified charitable distributions are significant moves, so you'll need to consult with your tax advisor first. But if they're appropriate for your situation, they may help you expand your ability to support the charitable groups whose work you admire.

to the drawings that Design Connections provided to bidders — supervisors decided to not open the bids. Instead, they

asked Thompson to reach out to the sub-contractors to see if their bids would substantially change because of the changes and return on Dec. 18 with the bids.

"I don't think it was advertised enough, at least that's how I see it," Supervisor Travis Suckow said. "I'd rather not open these, because once the numbers are out, that's unfair."

Supervisor Scott Cerwinski agreed. "There's been enough confusion that I think we just have to make sure we have it right before we move forward," he said.

Board members also want Design Connections to "bond" the project, something that wasn't included in the bidding

documents. Supervisors also told Thompson that they would like him to seek another bid for the electrical work. Other parts of the project, Thompson said, all had multiple bidders.

"The miscommunication came from the fact that I was looking to get all the subcontract bids," Thompson said, "so that ultimately I could present a construction manager cost today."

Supervisors purchased the ambulance station that is located near the intersection of Prospect Street and Water Avenue in New Hampton earlier this year for \$350,000.

Although Chickasaw County EMS' ambulances have been parked at the building since Aug. 1, the service is still renting living quarters for its main crew, most of whom work 24-hour shifts.

During Monday's meeting, Chickasaw County EMS Director Joel Knutson urged

the board to move forward with employing Design Connections as the construction manager on the project and not seek more general contractor bids.

"I guess I keep coming back to where I don't know where it becomes advantageous for us to have a general," he said. "That's just going to charge us a percentage and in essence do the same thing he's doing for a lesser price."

"That's my thought," Supervisor Steve Breitbach said, and board members agreed.

Just how the county is going to pay for the remodeling, though, remained up in the air.

The plan had been to use the county's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to pay for the project, but earlier this year, board members voted 3-2 to give \$600,000 of ARPA funds to the county's Secondary

Roads for a to-be-determined future road project. The county has about \$67,000 remaining in ARPA funds that have yet to be committed, but none of the supervisors or Knutson believe that amount of money will cover the entirety of the project.

## Bassett mayor expresses frustration with supervisors

It turned out Bassett Mayor Jim Ashley had plenty on his mind during the open comment period of Monday's Board of Supervisors meeting.

From where the county attorney's office is to the possible move of Public Health and Homecare Services to the county-owned ambulance service to the fact that one supervisor is running for the Five Star Cooperative Board of Directors, Ashley spent more than five minutes bashing the ears of board members.

And during his rant, he hinted that he'd like to see the supervisors investigated by state officials.

"If you don't do something about that subsidy, after the first of the year, I think [New Hampton Mayor-Elect] Steve Geerts and I can get together," Ashley said, "and we'll proba-

bly get Rob Sand up here and the attorney general to see how much stuff is going on that you're covering up because that subsidy is way out of line. You don't need more than \$750,000 in that reserve; you really don't need \$250,000."

Geerts said Tuesday night that he has not talked with Ashley and that the first he heard about Ashley's comments was when one of the supervisors called him after the meeting.

The 28E agreements that each of the six cities — New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington — signed with the county stated that after the first year of operation, if the county had \$750,000 or more in its ambulance fund, the Board of Supervisors would "waive" the quarterly payments that cities make to the county.

But it wasn't just the ambulance that had Ashley irate.

He told supervisors that the

"county attorney can't go south of town," a reference to the Heritage Center that is located outside of New Hampton's city limits. Under state law, a county attorney's office must be within the city limits of the county seat.

However, county leaders have not talked about moving the attorney's office to the Heritage.

During the Nov. 20 Board of Supervisors meeting, Jake Hackman did state that if Public Health moved to the old county home, one possibility would be to move the county attorney's office to the Community Services Building that currently houses Public Health and is located just a couple of blocks from New Hampton's downtown.

Ashley also took the supervisors to task for even considering moving Public Health, saying "leave the public nurses where they're at; you're going to lose the whole damn department."



Students in the apprentice program will still need to complete the 48 credit hours that are required by the district to graduate, and they will also have to meet state standards that require students to have four years of English instruction and three years of science, math and social studies instruction.

"We're trying to help our students who want to go down this path," he said. "If you look, there are kids who, once they graduate, just want to go to work. Getting this on-the-job experience, we think, is critical. ... We want to help our employers and businesses, too."

Manson said he and his staff members will seek out other apprenticeship programs in the future.

"But we have to start somewhere, and thanks to this program and Afinitas, this is our starting point."

The School Board's approval of the combination welding apprenticeship program came on the same night in which they appointed the sponsors for career and technical student organizations.

April Schmitt will serve as the sponsor for the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) and Damian Spratt will fill the same roll for Skills USA, an organization designed for industrial technology students. Krissy Anderson and Lexi Farrell will serve as the co-sponsors for the Future Business Leaders of America.

Those student organizations are critical to the district because without them, after this year, New Hampton would not be eligible for federal Perkins funds.

"The apprenticeship, the organizations, it shows that our district is committed to career and technical programs," Manson said. "I keep saying it, but we want this just to be a start. We've got bigger and better

plans for down the road."

### Board holds off on vehicle purchases

The New Hampton School Board last week decided to wait a month before making a decision on purchasing a new school bus and an additional vehicle for its fleet.

Jurrens said that board members want more information before purchasing a bus, but that they appear to be leaning toward buying diesel.

"We are having some issues," Jurrens said, "and need to purchase one to stay on track with them."

He recommended that the district avoid buying a propane-powered bus because of some "quality issues" the district's current propane buses have and the difficulty of having them repaired.

# Chickasaw boys look to push tempo

New Hampton has more size than in the past but wants to play at a quick pace this winter

Let's be honest, the early schedule for the New Hampton boys basketball team can be described with two words — saw and buzz, not necessarily in that order.

After opening the season with a "rivalry game" at Turkey Valley Monday night, the Chickasaws host Osage tonight (Thursday), play a home game against Clear Lake Tuesday and three days later, hit the road for a contest against Waverly-Shell Rock.

The Green Devils, Lions and Go-Hawks share one thing in common: All were conference champions last winter.

"I like it, I like it a lot," said Ryan Rausch, who is entering his sixth year as New Hampton's head coach. "It's going to give us a gauge with where we're at, and playing teams like that out of the gate, it's going to make us better in the long run."

So far, Rausch likes what he sees from the 2023-24 Chickasaws, who welcome back five players who have at least some starting experience.

"We do not have to look for effort, we do not have to look for togetherness," he said, "and as coaches, that's so important.

What concerned Rausch at the beginning of pre-season workouts was his team's depth, but he said he's been pleasantly surprised with the players who will come off the bench this season.

"That was probably our No. 1 concern," he said, "but we've had some guys really step up and basically show us, 'Hey, we're ready to play at the varsity level.' You can't win high school basketball games — especially in our league — with just five guys."

He said players like senior Carter Newbrough, juniors Jake Schwickerath and Ryan Willadsen and sophomores Caden Rochford, Dylen Schmitt and Jacob McDonald have all had their moments during pre-season workouts.

"Cade shoots it really well, and Big Jake and Dylen give us some nice size," he said.

McDonald stands 6-foot-5, Schmitt is 6-2 while Laures is 6-3, which gives New Hampton decent size, which has been a rarity for the Chickasaws in recent years.

"They're all pretty long, too," Rausch said. "You take Cael; he plays bigger than 6-3 in my mind. Dylan's athletic, and Jake, if he gives us two, three minutes here and there, that's

averaging 5.8 points and 4.9 rebounds a contest last winter. And both junior Reid Rausch (2.2 points per game) and senior Nick Brincks (2.0) also saw plenty of playing time a season ago.

"I think this is the best overall shooting team we've had in a while," Rausch said. "Reid, Ben and Adam all have really good shots, and Cael really has come a long way with his shot, too. You look at conference games [last year] and our opponents are hitting, seven, eight, nine 3-pointers and we're hit-


ting them."

going to be huge."

You can't run just to run, you have to believe in it, you have to know when it's there and when it's not. And I think our guys have that basketball IQ to do that."

Still, the schedule — as already mentioned — is daunting, especially when it comes to the Northeast Iowa Conference.

Rausch called Decorah and Waverly-Shell Rock the favorites, but he added that there will be no such thing as a night off in the NEIC. Charles City shared the title with Decorah last winter and welcomes back several veterans while Crestwood and Waukon also have plenty of weapons returning.



Ava Leichtman proved she's got plenty of talent and sank three 3-pointers during a three-minute stretch in the second quarter versus Riceville where it was readily apparent she can score from anywhere on the floor.

She led New Hampton in total points with 11.

In addition to playing an up-tempo game this year, the Chickasaws will also need to play well on the defensive side of the ball in order to pull out victories.

"We're going to have to slow down some of the other team's scorers — there's no doubt about it," said Leichtman.

The rest of the Chickasaw lineup includes senior center Amiya Kellogg, freshman guards Caycee Crawford and Kayme Hackman, as well as sophomore guard Tegan Dungey.

of focus that they're using now towards bowling compared to last year."



Some day the girls could well have separate classes for its state brackets. Now it's all just one class — but the sport has grown by leaps and bounds in a relative short amount of time.

Aleah and Keira are hopefully just going to pick up where they left off last year. They will be looked at as leaders and I expect with a lot of work that they can improve their state qualifier status from last year to a state placewinner this year," said Ciavarelli.

Eichenberger, a junior, qualified for state last year at 170 pounds. She worked her way to a 28-20 record — which included suffering two pins in the third period at state.

Eichenberger has raced out to a 6-2 mark this year at 190 pounds — with five of those wins coming by fall. She placed 11th in her weight bracket at a loaded and extremely difficult Independence Invite on Saturday, Nov. 18.



## NH/TV ready to make a run

Roomful of Chickasaw boys taking aim at wrestling's state duals, traditional tournament

New Hampton/Turkey Valley boys wrestling coach Matt Paulus loves a drama-free preseason, and his Chickasaws delivered him one over the past two weeks.

"Our numbers are back up, and that's great," Paulus said Saturday morning as his wrestlers warmed up for the annual first-of-the-season "tryouts" in New Hampton High School's wrestling room. "We started with 38 guys, and everyone's still here. That's been really nice, and I think it shows the mentality we want in our program. Put your head down and go to work. That's what these guys have been doing since we started practice."

The Chickasaws are coming off a season in which they went 15-10 in dual meets, finished a strong third in the Northeast Iowa Conference tournament and claimed the runner-up spot at the Class 2A district meet.

And of the 13 wrestlers who competed at the district meet last February, 10 are back this season, one in which a plethora of new weight classes will be on the docket.

Every 10 years or so, the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) studies demographic data and comes up with weight

classes that reflect that data. Nothing changed between 106 and 138, but the middle and upper weights are now 144, 150, 165, 175, 190, 215 and 285.

"I said it a couple of weeks ago, but yeah, I would have liked to have seen a bigger weight class up there," Paulus said, "especially when it comes to our team this year. We've got a ton of kids in the middle

and the upper weights. I mean, we've got six guys at 150 right now, and we have multiple kids at every weight above that, too."

Still, he's not complaining because once the Chickasaws complete their weight cutting, NH/TV will be able to fill every weight, although Paulus' "smaller boys" will have to stay healthy.

"We've got a few lower weights where we got one kid,"

there, that's a concern, but then I look at it, and we've got three heavyweights and that hasn't happened here in quite a while."

And he really likes the fact that Senior Night will take a while this season because NH/TV has 11 seniors on its roster.

The "old guys" are led by two returning state tournament qualifiers — Braden McShane, who finished third at 220 last winter, and Karson Kolbet, who earned his first trip to Des Moines at 160.

"Two exceptional kids right there," Paulus said. "Braden's Braden. He's got the talent, and he's got the drive. You see that in every single sport, and everyone knows his goal is to be on top of that podium down at Wells Fargo. ... And the thing I love about Karson is that he really put the work in over the summer. He wasn't just content and satisfied to make it to state last year; he wants more."

Two other returning seniors, Landon Bruess and Ethan Swehla, finished third at last year's district meet. Bruess will move up from 106 to 120 this winter while Swehla, after a season in which he was Paulus' ultimate utility wrestler, will settle in at 190.

"Ethan last year did everything for us. He wrestled all over the place," Paulus said, "and if that meant going up against guys 20 pounds heavier, he did. And he never complained. That's just the kind of kid he is, and I can't wait to see what he's going to do settling into a weight."

That quartet will be joined by classmates Quinlan Mahoney (106), Hunter Humpal (144), Ethan Praska (157), Burke Busta (157), Leander Reicks (175), Olandreon Saunders (190) and Gatlin McCumber (285).

Reicks and Busta both finished fourth at the 2023 district meet while Humpal was also in the lineup.

McCumber, meanwhile, wasn't out a year ago, but Paulus said the heavyweight, who weighs around 270, could be an X factor for the Chickasaws.

"He's so strong, he's very athletic, and man, I can't wait to see what he does out there," Paulus said. "We've got a lot of guys like Gatlin on this team, though. We've got guys who got a lot of potential, in my mind, and I think they're going to surprise some people."

Other wrestlers who competed at districts last year include Ty Moudry (113), Braiden Schaufenbuel (132) and Jayden Bucknell (138).

"We've got a lot of guys with experience," Paulus said, "but the best part of having 38 guys in the room is that they're getting pushed every day in practice. That's what makes you get better."

The Chickasaws, meanwhile, have switched up their schedule a bit. They'll wrestle a Friday

night tournament at South Winneshiek, and for the first time in years, they won't be heading to southwest Iowa as NH/TV will head to Maquoketa Valley instead of Atlantic in January.

"South Winn got with us and said let's try a Friday night," Paulus said, "and it's really basically because of the official shortage. You're seeing more and more Friday night tournaments, and hey let's give the kids a Saturday off, and me, too."

As for discarding the trip to Atlantic?

"We went there for state seeding purposes," Paulus said, "and honestly, it wasn't helping us all that much so we're going to stay closer to home. It's still a dang good schedule."

Indeed, it is as the Northeast Iowa Conference looks as tough as ever and the non-conference duals include match-ups against state heavyweights like Osage and Nashua-Plainfield.

And NH/TV, as it always does, has big goals. The Chickasaws want to end their state duals drought; they haven't qualified for the tournament since 2018. And NH/TV wants to take a busload of wrestlers to Des Moines for the traditional state tournament.

That's the reason Paulus likes his team's conference and non-conference slates.

"Waverly lost a lot of horses but you know they're going to be good," Paulus said, "and with the Crescos and Decorahs, the NEIC just tough, man. But wrestling good competition — both in and out of conference — that's what gets you ready for February so we're excited to get after it."



## NH/TV boys commence season with three wins

McShane earns 100th career win with quick pin over South Winn state qualifier

The parking lot was full on the campus of Turkey Valley High School on Tuesday night – and for a good reason.

The New Hampton/Turkey Valley wrestling squad opened the season in Jackson Junction for a home quad and Chickasaw fans came out in droves.

What those devoted grappling followers witnessed was a pretty good start to the season as NH/TV rolled to impressive dual victories over Central Elkader (78-6), South Winneshiek (52-27) and Clear Lake (51-23).

New Hampton and Turkey Valley joined forces for the start of the 2017-2018 wrestling season – the same year the Chickasaws put the finishing touches on back-to-back state dual crowns in Class 2A.

So NH/TV's home dual on Tuesday – roughly 16 miles away from New Hampton in



Jackson Junction – was an homage of sorts for TV wrestlers and fans that pour their heart into the sport that has produced a whole host of champions in Chickasaw wrestling lore.

"Our Turkey Valley athletes buy into our program a lot. They gotta do a lot of driving and spend a lot of long nights and early mornings. We love having them on our team," said NH/TV head coach Matt Paulus. "We

love the culture and fans over here, too. We're trying to bring the communities together."

One such legend of the mat for NH/TV – senior 215-pounder Braden McShane – earned his 100th career win with a dominant pin over South Winn's Parker Timp. Timp qualified for state last year in Class 1A, but he was no match for McShane as the Chickasaw put the hammer down early and drove Timp into the mat for a fall in just 57

seconds.

"That was awesome. I'm really proud of him," said Paulus. "He was a little bit excited about it, but in straight-Braden fashion, he's like that's just a small stepping stone for what he wants to do this year. It doesn't seem like a big deal to him, but some day it will."

McShane has his eyes set on a state title for NH/TV this winter. He placed third at state last year and fourth the year before.

"There's been thousands of wrestlers in New Hampton/Turkey Valley history that haven't got to a 100 wins," said Paulus. "Of course he did it in McShane-fashion and absolutely dominated."

Karson Kolbet, another senior on NH/TV's roster and a state qualifier last season at 160 pounds – earned a satisfying pin over South Winn's Kyle Kuboushek in 1:26 at 165 pounds. Then Kolbet gutted out a tough 4-3 win over Clear Lake's Christian Dunning.

## New Hampton's McCumber, Turkey Valley's Schmitt end careers on all-state teams

Chickasaw lineman, Trojan linebacker both named to their respective second teams by Iowa Print Writers Association

Ask New Hampton's Gatlin McCumber and Turkey Valley's Oliver Schmitt their favorite memories from this past football season, and they're quick to point to team accomplishments.

Don't get them wrong, both seniors take pride in being named to their respective all-state teams by the Iowa Print Writers Association, but what they will remember about their final seasons of prep football are the playoff teams their respective teams made.

"I think what I'm most proud of is just the way we turned our season around," McCumber said. "I mean we were 0-4 and a lot of teams would have just given up, but to get to the playoffs and get a [postseason] win, that was pretty special."

"Making the playoffs was one of our goals this season so you have to be happy with that outcome," Schmitt said. "Of course we didn't win the first round but making the playoffs isn't an easy accomplishment so I think that speaks words for what we were able to achieve this year. My favorite part was definitely the week 8 game against Riceville."

"When you have to play to get into the playoffs, that's a whole different feeling and then the way we were able to pull out with a W makes it ten times better."

McCumber was named to the Class 2A second-team as an offensive lineman by the IPWA while Schmitt was a second-team linebacker on the all-state eight-man teams.

Start with the big fella from New Hampton, who had another outstanding season on both sides of the ball. McCumber was

named the Class 2A, District 3 offensive lineman MVP as he and his linemates overcame a slow start to finish the season with an outstanding rushing attack.

During a five-game stretch in which New Hampton went 4-1 — the only loss was in overtime to Waukon — the Chickasaws rushed for 1,340 yards, an average of 268 yards a game.

That run coincided with the return of Braden McShane, the 2022 all-state running back who missed 3 1/2 games on offense with an injury.

"You know, when Braden's getting those yards — really when anyone's getting yards — we take a lot of pride in that," McCumber said. "We don't really have stats as offensive linemen, but that rushing yards, that's our big one, you know?"

On defense, McCumber played a solid defensive end and finished the season with 23.5 tackles, including 3.5 for loss.

The only downside to the announcement of the all-state teams was the exclusion of McShane, who gained 995 yards despite missing 35 percent of the season.

"Braden should have made it," McCumber said. "Ask anyone and he's the best running back we saw all year. I'm glad he was on our team, put it that way."

Still, McCumber said one of his goals heading into the season was to be among the state's best.

"Yeah, I put it down, but the important goals were the team ones," he said. "We wanted to win more than four games obviously, but like I said, getting a playoff win was huge. It had
