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## Public Health will stay put

Board passes on move after learning cost estimate is almost \$600,000

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors spent months talking about the possible move of Public Health and Homecare Services to the Heritage Center.

And in about five minutes during Monday's meeting, the board in effect

decided that Public Health would remain at its current location — the Community Services Building in New Hampton.

That's because once supervisors learned the estimated cost to move the agency to the former county home that is located just south of New Hampton, they experienced sticker shock.

Martin Gardner Architecture "pre-

liminary estimated opinion of probable costs" stated that the county could expect to pay \$538,500 for construction costs to prepare the Heritage for Public Health's arrival.

Throw in the "phase II" part of the project — estimated to cost \$61,200 — and the county would have to spend slightly less than \$600,000 to move Public Health.

The Heritage is currently home to the Chickasaw County Veterans Affairs Office and several non-profit organizations, and Supervisor Jake Hackman said he was having trouble coming to grips with estimated cost.

"It amazes me that we put in what,

eight or nine non-county departments

in that building for probably under the cost of \$3,000," Hackman said, "and they have not complained once about where

## Supervisors gear up for what will be tough budget year

Board members considering pay and budget freezes, move up this month's department head meeting to prepare for challenges ahead

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors want to give the men and women who head county departments some direction when it comes to preparing for the 2024-25 budgets.

But that's easier said than done, county leaders say, because of House File 718, a new state law that limits how much revenue counties and cities can raise.

Board members also don't know how union negotiations will play out with the two unions that represent some county employees, but they appear to be leaning toward supporting a pay freeze for those employees who are not represented by unions.

The bottom line, as Supervisor Jake Hackman put it, is that the county is in "for a very tough budgeting year."

He pointed out that under House File 718, a county's valuations could go up 3 percent, but that would mean the county would have to cut its levy rate by 2 percent.

The discussion began with Auditor Sheila Shekleton asking board members if they wanted to send out a letter to the department heads that would give them guidance as they prepare for their budgets for the fiscal year that begins on July 1.

Supervisors last month said they did not want the Compensation Board to grant them raises this year, and on Monday, the one thing they agreed on was that budgets needed to include a 6 percent increase for health-care costs.

"So basically we're recommending 0 percent, or a wage freeze," Chickasaw County Conservation Board Director Chad Humpal, "and then as far as capital expenditures or projects or improvement projects like that, [are you saying] kind of recommend [that we] freeze those as well? ... I don't want

NEW HAMPTON CLAIMS PROP CROWN TO WIN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP FOR A FOURTH CONSECUTIVE SEASON

New Hampton's dance team captains Olivia Horner and Emma Carpenter have been through enough seasons to know not to panic when it comes to unveiling a new routine.

But this year's prop routine — one that

included jump ropes and trampolines — may have taken the proverbial cake when it comes to the first time the team ran through it.

"Oh my gosh, it was awful," Horner said with a laugh. "We kept telling the other girls, 'It's OK, it's OK, it'll get better.' But it took a long, long time."

It was that routine, though, that allowed

Carpenter and Horner and their fellow seniors — Baylee Rapenske and Ava Thronson — to depart New Hampton as four-time state champions as the dance team claimed the state title with a convincing performance in the Class I Prop Division that included five teams.

## Dance team embraces pressure, wins another title

The judges gave New Hampton a final score of 361 points, 11.5 more than second-place Grundy Center, and helped coach Emma Schwickerath and her dancers to add another state championship trophy to its bulging trophy case. New Hampton also finished fourth in a highly competitive Class V Hip Hop Division.

In addition to the two team trophies New Hampton claimed at the Iowa State Dance and Drill Team Association's state competition that was held at Wells Fargo Arena in Des Moines last Thursday, it also celebrated a masterful performance by sophomore Kylee Junk, the school's first-ever state individual qualifier. Junk finished eighth in the Class V Solo Division.

"When you consider she was eighth out of 73 or something like that dancers," Schwickerath said, "it was just an amazing performance. The emotion she brings to her dance is just amazing, and I'm so happy for her."

The 10th-year coach paused and smiled.

"And knowing that I have her back for two years," Schwickerath said, "I'm really happy for me, too."

**SCHWICKERATH**, though, really wanted her seniors to go out on top.

New Hampton won a state title in hip-hop in 2020 and then went back-to-back with prop champions the past two winters.

But the New Hampton coach was the first to admit that she was fretting in the weeks before the state meet.

"I'll tell you the truth, we didn't really put it all together until the day before we went to state," Schwickerath said. "Jump roping together, jumping off trampolines together, making the dance moves, putting all that together was hard. It was an extremely difficult routine, and yeah, I was getting nervous."

And the nine girls —



Rapenske, Madi Shawver, Carpenter, Horner, Belle Broughton, Junk, Cinetta Schwickerath, Thronson and Madison Roethler — who performed nailed it on Thursday.

"I knew when we got done, we had left it all out there on the floor," Carpenter said. "It was such a great feeling, because no matter what the judges said, I knew we had done it better than we had ever before."

Her coach agreed.

"So I sit in the corner and when they got done, I jumped out of my seat, was fist pumping and yelling," Schwickerath said, "and I never do that. OK, I had never done that before, put it that way."

But there is no scoreboard in dance; instead, the coach, her dancers and her alternates had to wait five agonizing hours to find out if the judges agreed.

It was worth the wait.

"You try to tell yourself not to get too nervous but it doesn't work that way all the time," Carpenter said, "so when they

ball games and also host its annual Dance Showcase — but the competition is.

Carpenter smiled when asked what was harder — dancing at state or dancing at their home school?

"I think I'm way more nervous when we dance at home," she said, "because you know everyone, you know what I mean?"

Horner does.

"I'm totally with Emma on that one," she said. "At New Hampton, everyone knows you. It's a lot easier dancing at state, as strange as that sounds."

**THE PRESSURE**, however, is off.

And make no mistake about it, the New Hampton dancers, especially the seniors, wanted to fourpeat.

"I'd say it was a good pressure," Horner said. "I think for all of us seniors, we were pretty motivated. I mean winning three state championships sounds pretty good. But winning four sounds way, way better."

Schwickerath admits she sets the bar high each summer when New Hampton's dance team begins preparing for state.

"Expectations are good," she said, "and I don't want to be mean or anything but I also don't want to sugar coat it, either. We want to win state championships, we want to bring home trophies, and to do that, you have to work hard. People don't get how hard these girls work to get to this point, and I'm so appreciative of the fact that they never complain about 6 a.m. practices."

For the seniors, though, the joy of leaving New Hampton as four-time state champions was tinged with a little sorrow.

"Knowing that was the last time I'd get to dance with these girls, it was kind of motivating to give it all I had," Carpenter said, "but when it was over, when we had finished the prop, I'm not going to lie, it was hard knowing that was the last time I'd dance with everyone I grew up with on that floor."

It's why Horner is looking forward to the dance team's second season — the basketball games and the Dance Showcase. It buys her more time.

"When the showcase is over," she said, "I'll probably definitely will cry. I'd do anything for these girls, and I know they'd do the same for me."

## Advent is our time to prepare for the birth of Christ

In Christianity, Advent refers to the period of four weeks leading up to Christmas. It begins on the Sunday closest to Nov. 30 (St. Andrew's Day) and ends on Dec. 24.

It is a time of anticipation and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ on Christmas Day.

Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story, but there's more to Advent.

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming" or "arrival," which translates to the Greek word *parousia*. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul,

Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1).

During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration; originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of the world. The Advent season was not explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas until the Middle Ages.

Advent symbolizes the church's present situation in these "last days" (Acts 2:17; Hebrews 1:2) as God's people wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate his eternal kingdom.

The church is in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament: in exile, waiting and hoping in prayerful expectation for the coming of the Messiah. Israel looked back to God's past gracious actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on this basis, they called for God once again to act for them.

In the same way, the church, during

For to us a child is born,  
to us a son is given, and the government  
will be on his shoulders. And he will be called  
Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God,  
Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.  
**Isaiah 9:6**

Advent looks back upon Christ's coming in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when he returns for his people.

In this light, the Advent hymn "O Come, O come, Emmanuel" perfectly represents the church's cry during the Advent season:  
*O come, O come, Emmanuel,  
And ransom captive Israel,  
That mourns in lonely exile here  
Until the Son of God appears.  
Rejoice! Rejoice!  
Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.*

While Israel would have sung the song in expectation of Christ's first coming, the church now sings the song to commemorate the first coming and expects the second coming in the future.

#### Advent Traditions to Celebrate the Coming of Christmas

Advent is a season observed in many Christian traditions as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ at Christmas. 

## City, manufacturer continue to butt heads over building permit

City Council rejects latest request from Precision after closed session; hiring of officer brings Police Department back to full strength

The New Hampton City Council and a manufacturer in the city remain at odds over the city's refusal to grant a building permit for construction in the city's west-side industrial park.

After spending almost an hour in close session Monday night, the council, according to City Clerk Karen Clemens, rejected a request made by Precision of New Hampton to revise an agreement the council had approved at the end of its Nov. 20 meeting.

That action came three days after the city was notified that Precision notified city officials that it would not sign the agreement that would have ended a more than year long legal battle between the city and the manufacturer.

The city filed suit against Precision in November 2022 over the construction of an "add-on" to a building owned by Precision that city officials said violated the terms of a storm sewer easement.

City officials contended that Precision's building violated the terms of the agreement and on Nov. 22, 2022, the city issued a stop-work order alleging violation of the conditions of a building permit that

had been issued earlier that fall. The city specifically cited that the building permit required that "no concrete be poured in the stormwater easement area."

Last month, Chickasaw County District Court Judge Laura Parrish agreed that the city had the right to deny the issuance of the building permit, but she also ruled that Precision was not guilty of a "municipal infraction."

After Parrish made her decision, the City Council on Nov. 20 approved an agreement that would have the city and Precision, at Precision's expense, "remove and relocate the storm sewer pipe that cross the landowner's land to a mutually agreeable location either to the south of landowner property or to an adjoining property owned by a third party."

The agreement also states that the parties will attempt to salvage and reuse the existing pipe "to the extent reasonable and possible," but if that any section of the pipe requires replacement with a new pipe, such cost will be paid for by Precision.

Once the easement and pipe relocation have been completed, the city would issue a building permit to Precision for the construction of the new building as long as it "abides by and meets any and all relevant building code and zoning require-

ments."

Clemens said on Monday that basically Precision wants to have the city issue a building permit and have the Iowa Supreme Court decide the legality of New Hampton's easement ordinance.

But the council remained against the building permit and the two sides remain at an impasse.

Also on Monday, the City Council approved the recommendation of Police Chief Tim Pedersen to hire a new officer. Cory Frank will begin work for the city on Dec. 22, but will have to attend the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy soon after.

The hiring of Frank will bring the Police Department back to "full strength" for the first time since this past May.

In other news from Monday's meeting:

- The council approved selling the city's old tornado siren. Two bids were received, and the council accepted the high bid for \$1,250.

- Council members also approved the request for Full River Fabrication to have a designated temporary parking spot to be used for loading and unloading.

- Council members OK'd the fire department wages of \$48,938 that cover calls the department received between Dec. 1, 2022, and Nov. 30, 2023.

they're at. This price is a lot higher than I expected, along with a lot of the other projects that I've been hearing about."

Hackman, who has supported pursuing the idea of moving Public Health, said that "I think this time without the funding, you can't move forward with this."

Several times over the past few months, Hackman has suggested that one idea he'd like to explore if Public Health moved to the Heritage was moving the county attorney's office to the Community Services Building, relocating the Emergency Management Agency either to the Heritage or the Community Services Building and selling the building that houses those two offices.

But the move has been met with opposition from both Public Health officials and the Board of Health that oversees the department; in fact, the board last month voted on a motion stating its opposition to having the department relocat-

ed to the Heritage.

The county has about \$67,000 remaining in uncommitted American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and about \$475,000 in its capital improvements budget, but supervisors are facing questions on how the

county will pay for the remodeling of the Chickasaw County EMS ambulance station so that it has living quarters. And board members also considered spending more than \$200,000 to hook the Heritage into the city of New Hampton water system.

Board members are expected to learn the costs of the ambulance station remodel during its Dec. 18 meeting, and the county and city are at an impasse when it comes to the terms the city wants the county to accept to have city water at the Heritage.

## Can Life Insurance Help Provide Retirement Income?

If your children are grown and your mortgage is paid off, do you still need to carry life insurance? It depends on your situation, but for many people, a cash-value life insurance policy, such as whole life or universal life, can be a valuable, tax-efficient source of retirement income.

And by drawing on the cash value of your policy, you might be able to temporarily reduce the amount you take out from your retirement accounts, such as your IRA and 401(k). This ability could be especially important when the financial markets are down — you'd probably like to avoid liquidating your assets when their prices have dropped.

Basically, you can use the cash in your policy in these ways:

- Withdrawals – You can typically withdraw part of the cash value of your life insurance without losing coverage. You generally won't incur income taxes on these withdrawals, up to the amount you've put into the policy — that is, the premiums you've paid. Once your withdrawals exceed this amount, you would generally owe taxes. Also, keep in mind that any withdrawals will reduce your policy's death benefit and the available cash surrender value.

- Policy loans – Rather than taking a withdrawal from your policy, you could take out a loan. You won't have to go through an approval process or income verification, and policy loans typically have lower interest rates than bank loans and don't assess closing costs. Plus, because your insurer will be lending you the money and using the cash in your policy as collateral, your policy's cash value can remain intact and still potentially grow.

However, policy loans do carry some issues of which you should be aware. For one thing, while a loan usually isn't taxable, you could end up owing taxes on any unpaid loan balance, including interest. And if this balance exceeds the policy's cash value, it could cause your policy to lapse. Also, outstanding loans can reduce your



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death benefit.

- Cashing out – If you cash out, or "surrender," your policy, you can receive the entire cash value, plus any accrued interest. You will have to subtract any money needed to pay policy loans, along with unpaid premiums and surrender fees, which can be significant. Also, any amount you receive over the policy's cash basis — the total of premiums you've paid — will be taxed as regular income.

- 1035 Exchange – Through what's known as a Section 1035 Exchange, you can transfer your life insurance policy to an annuity, which can be structured to pay you a lifetime income stream. The exchange won't be taxable but surrender charges may still apply.

Given the potential tax implications of the above options, you may want to consult with your tax advisor before making any moves. Also, be sure you are comfortable with a reduced or eliminated death benefit. Specifically, you'll want to be confident that your spouse or other family members don't need the proceeds of your policy. This may require some discussions about your loved ones' plans and needs.

And don't forget that life insurance can help your family pay for final expenses, such as funeral costs and unpaid medical bills.

Whether it's providing you with needed retirement income or helping your family meet future needs, your cash-value life insurance policy is a valuable asset — so try to put it to the best use possible.

There's no doubt, however, that New Hampton showed dramatic improvement in some areas after a disappointing loss to Turkey Valley in its season opener.

After hitting just 21 percent of their shots against the Trojans, New Hampton hit 55.6 of its shots (25-for-45) against Osage. Laures led the way, going 12-for-16 from the field, as he scored a career-high 26 points. Ewert finished with 13 points while Reid Rausch had 10.

"Cael, I've been telling him all along, that he can be a freakazoid," coach Rausch said. "I've told him so many times that if he plays aggressively, no one can stop him, and he's proving me right so far. His shot is so much better this year, but it's more than that. He's making his mind to get to the rim, and he's getting there."

The Chickasaws also got a solid night from senior Nick Brincks. Although he had just two points, he tied Laures for the team lead in rebounds with eight and led New Hampton with four assists.



**New Hampton's Jordan Thronsdson plays strong defense in last week's game against Osage.**



of their 50 shots.


New Hampton did win the turnover battle, 24-19, but the Chickasaws, who are going to be at a height disadvantage every night this season, were outrebounded 37-21.

David Leichtman liked his Chickasaws' fight and intensity on Tuesday night at home versus No. 10 Clear Lake.


It's one of the reasons his New Hampton girls basketball squad cut the favored Lions' lead down to five at the start of the second half.

That's definitely a senior trait, a veteran trait, to not be satisfied. That, to me, is a huge positive and speaks volumes about what kind of kid Braden is. He knows what a crazy sport we're in and that you can never think you're there."

Swhela went 6-1 during the two-day tournament — his only loss was to Demaris Henderson of Waterloo East — and sent a message that he's a 190-pounder to be reckoned with this season.

"Ethan surprised some people, I'm sure," Paulus said, "but we knew if we could let him just settle in at a weight, he has the drive and work ethic to be really good."

Kolbet finished fourth — losing to two out-of-state wrestlers — while Bruess finished seventh.

Paulus, though, wasn't just pleased with his gold bracket wrestlers.

Six Chickasaws — Ty Moudry (113), Cargin Robinson (126), Braiden Schaufenbuel (132), Burke Busta (157), Leander Reicks (175) and Gatlin McCumber (285) — finished the tournament with flourishes as all six won their final three matches Saturday.

Reicks joined his fellow four seniors as top-10 finishers at the 33-tournament with a championship, good for ninth place overall, in the silver bracket.

"We had a lot of conversations yesterday," Paulus said on Sunday, "and you could see the confidence growing. After the pools, we said you can't change anything and you're going to be wrestling guys your own caliber so get after it. And we had a lot of guys get after it."

And that's a positive heading into a grueling week that included a triangular at Osage against the host Green Devils and Union, a triangular Thursday against host Decorah and Minnesota power Kasson-Mantorville and a Friday evening trip to Decorah for the South Winneshiek Invitational.

"It's a tough week, no question about it, but we have to keep grinding and work through it," Paulus said. "We're going to see some pretty good competition — that's an understatement — but that's how you get better and we have a room full of guys who want to get better."

eled to Independence and, at least to some, took a surprising fifth at the two-day Cliff Keen Invitational.


