## Supervisors vote in new chair

Four of five members nominated; Cerwinske wins and will lead board in '24

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors has a new leader, but Tuesday's vote to elevate Scott Cerwinske to chairman had its share of "county intrigue."

Matt Kuhn, who had served as the board chair for the past two years, announced that he had no interest in

continuing in his position. "It's time for someone else to step up," he said and opened the floor for nominations.

And there were a slew of them, too, as Steve Breitbach nominated Cerwinske, who returned the favor and nominated Breitbach. Jake Hackman nominated Kuhn, and Kuhn nominated Travis Suckow.

Kuhn appeared to be taken aback

by his nomination, especially because it was coming from Hackman.

"You've never supported me before," Kuhn said and asked why Hackman had made the nomination.

Hackman's reply was quick. "Because I want you as a chair."

In the end, it didn't matter as the first three votes cast — by Breitbach, Suckow and Kuhn — were for Cerwinske. Hackman voted for Suckow

while the new chair voted for Breitbach, who was elected as vice chairman.

That vote was 4-1, as Hackman voted "no."

Hackman served as board chairman between 2018 and 2020 but his fellow supervisors elected Rick Holthaus to the position in 2021. After Holthaus

died on Jan. 2, 2022, both Hackman and Kuhn sought the chair position, and after a 2-2 vote, Hackman dropped out of the race, at

## A drought that won't end tops a newsworthy year

Despite lack of rainfall, farmers have decent crop but worry about 2024 growing season

A year that started out so promising ended maybe not as dry as a bone but parched enough that area farmers are heading into 2024 with more than a few concerns.

It's a drought that just doesn't seem to want to end, and in a newsworthy year, it's the top news story of 2023.

the normal 2.69 inches

And then it went south in a hurry.

Over the course of the last 10 months of 2023, only one, September, had above normal rainfall, and when the "ball dropped" at the end of the year, New Hampton had received less than 70 percent of its normal precipitation for the year.

New Hampton finished the year with 27.91

Yet, when the year that was began last January, we got off to a great start with precipitation as the first two months of 2023 had 4.53 inches of precipitation, far above we usually get during January and February.

They swore the oaths, signed the papers and all Steve Geerts, Joe Denner, Deb Larsen and Jason Speltz had to do was wait for midnight to strike on New Year's Day and they began their

four-year terms representing the residents of New Hampton.

Geerts, who was elected mayor in November, joined Denner and Larsen, both of whom were elected to the City Council, in taking the oath of office during a ceremony over the noon hour on Friday while Speltz did the same a couple of

hours later for his council seat.

"It's time to get to work," Geerts said, "and I think we're all looking forward to Tuesday."

## State representative says he'll work to amend HF 718

Thomson tells town hall meeting attendees that state leaders need to realize the differences between rural and urban Iowa

The man who represents New Hampton in the Iowa House of Representatives said last week that he's going to go to bat for the city's library and museum that would be adversely affected by a new law that was passed by the Legislature and signed into law last spring.

State Rep. Charley Thomson covered a lot of ground during a town-hall meeting at the New Hampton Public Library, one that was relatively well-attended considering it began at 5 p.m. on a Friday that kicked off a holiday weekend.

Thomson spent almost a

third of the meeting having a back-and-forth discussion about House File 718, a new law that contains some dramatic changes when it comes to how local government entities can tax property owners.

After hearing from Carnegie Cultural Center secretary Wally Murphy and New Hampton Public Library Director Carrie Becker, Thomson said he had issues with the new law, especially when it comes to "rolling in" voter-approved levies to city levies.


"They can say they preserved your freedom to have your library levy, but you just have

## Drought was big story in 2023 and hope is it won't be this year

inches of precipitation, far below the 40.12 inches it receives in a normal year.

And Chickasaw County's largest city, it could be argued, was almost an oasis. Just 20 miles away in Nashua, the city's National Weather Service recording station received just 55 percent of its normal rainfall.

Little wonder that the final U.S. Drought Monitor report showed an ugly picture as all of Chickasaw, Bremer, Fayette, Howard and Mitchell counties are suffering from extreme drought. The same is true in Winneshiek, save for a small sliver in the county's northeast corner.

The good news, if you want to call it that, is the drought didn't lead to disastrous yields in 2023, but ISU Extension Agronomist Terry Basol said farmers are gravely concerned

about the 2024 growing season. "We had a decent moisture content going into 2023, and obviously, we're not going to be able to say the same thing next spring if things don't change," Basol said in early November. "We desperately need rain before the ground freezes."

The good news was that both November and December were relatively mild, meaning rain would have soaked into the ground.

The bad news was, save for an inch of rain that fell Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, Mother Nature didn't cooperate.

Instead, November was the driest month of the year as just .21 inches of rain fell on New Hampton, barely 10 percent of the normal 2.07 the city receives. And December was better, but just 1.15 inches of precipitation were recorded, down from the normal 1.67 inches.

# EMS garners plenty of headlines in 2023

In both 2021 and 2022, our top news story of the year revolved around the ambulance issue, and truth be told, EMS made another run for the top spot in our 2023 listing of top-10 news stories.



### The Top 10 stories of the year that was

Alas, this year, it had to settle for second.

Not that it wasn't a year in which Chickasaw County EMS made for plenty of headlines, beginning on Jan. 1, when the county-owned ambulance went into service for the first time. And it's been a busy year for EMS Director Joel Knutson and the paramedics, EMTs and drivers who man the rigs. The same can be said for the Board of Supervisors, who are in charge of the service that provides ambulance coverage to the rural parts of Chickasaw County and, through 28E agreements, to the residents of New Hampton, Bassett, Fredericksburg, Ionia, Lawler and North Washington.

The service took hundreds of calls throughout the year, and Knutson said that had at least two months — September and October — that produced positive cash flow.

During the year, supervisors OK'd the purchase of a third ambulance, a used rig that is housed in Fredericksburg and also purchased a building just off New Hampton's downtown district to serve as an ambulance station.

But the first year of the service saw controversy, most notably with a remodeling project that would lead to living quarters being added to the ambulance station. For months, many assumed that the Board of Supervisors would use American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for the remodeling project, but this summer, supervisors voted 3-2 to designate most of its remaining ARPA funds to a Secondary Roads Department.

Board members have yet to sign a contract for the remodeling project, but near the end of the year, they said they would use the EMS budget — i.e., money provided by the county and the cities with 28E agreements — to complete the remodeling project if or when it is approved.

As for the rest of the top-10 news stories ...

**3. Election gives New Hampton new mayor:** Lifelong New Hampton resident Steve Geerts won a relatively easy victory in a three-way race for mayor as he unseated incumbent Bobby Schwickerath and challenger Melanie Schmitt.

The election also was noteworthy in that two races — for the Ward 1 and Ward 3 council seats — had no candidates while the at-large council race was an uncontested affair as just incumbent Joe Denner filed nomination papers.

That led to two write-in candidates — former Mayor Deb Larsen in Ward 1 and

incumbent Jason Speltz in Ward 3 — winning council seats in Chickasaw County's largest city.

**4. Searching for a jail answer:** After beginning the year partnering with the city of New Hampton on building a joint law-enforcement center and 24-hour holding facility, county leaders switched gears in April and decided to go it alone.

That led to a proposal to remodel the current Sheriff's Office building, which also includes the current jail, and build a 24-hour holding facility next to it.

The almost \$7 million plan, though, drew opposition and supervisors have yet to decide if they will use tax-increment financing (TIF) revenue or put the question to the voters in the 2024 general election.

**5. Wind farm constructed, goes on line:** That TIF money will come from taxes generated by the Chickasaw Wind Farm and its 66 turbines that went up throughout the year. The farm went "on line" on Dec. 20.

**6. Daycare in school:** Less than a year after Little Sprouts Daycare opened, daycare proponents worked out a deal with New Hampton Community Schools to use space in the elementary school for a "wrap-around daycare" — one that school-age children attend before and after school.

Little Sprouts officials said the daycare was needed to create more "openings" for infants and toddlers at its New Hampton Methodist Church location, and after the School Board approved the project, a busy summer of construction ensued and the daycare opened at the start of the 2023-24 school year.

**7. New sheriff in town:** When Sheriff Marty Hemann announced in late 2022 that he would retire in January 2023, his chief deputy at the time, Ryan Shawver, said it was no secret that he hoped to be appointed to the position.

But supervisors ended up going through an interview process before they named Shawver as the county's new sheriff. A little more than a month later, Shawver tabbed New Hampton Police Chief Zach Nobsch to be his chief deputy. Nobsch was eventually replaced by Tim Pederson, a longtime officer with the Harlan Police Department in southwest Iowa.

**8. Kuhn keeps his chairman post:** A row with fellow Supervisor Jake Hackman in March has at least one other supervisor, Travis Suckow, broach the subject of having the county undergo a rare mid-year chairman change.

But less than a month later, board members didn't make a motion to remove Kuhn, and for all practical purposes, the issue was dead.

**9. City wastewater plant:** This is a story that almost undoubtedly will remain on top-10 lists for years to come as New Hampton city officials in 2023 continued to grapple with how they will come up with the \$27.5 million to replace the city's aging and out-of-compliance wastewater treatment plant.

**10. Hugeback-Johnson merges with Conway-Markham:** New Hampton became a one funeral home city in June when Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home and Crematory purchased the Conway-Markham Funeral Home.

## Arrival of Maji still remains a mystery

The order of events following Christ's birth to the time He went to reside at Nazareth is much disputed.

The chief point of controversy is respecting the time of the visit of the Magi. If this can be determined, the other events may be easily arranged.

An early and current tradition placed the coming of the Magi on the 6th of January, or on the 13th day after His birth. In that case, supposing that the star announced His birth, and that they left soon after its appearing, they were only some ten days on their journey.

This day was early celebrated as the feast of the Epiphany, or the manifestation of Christ, and originally had reference to the visit of the Magi and to His baptism; and later, to His first miracle. It is now observed both in the Greek and Roman Churches with reference to the two former events, of which the adoration of the Magi is made most prominent.

This is also the case in the English and American Episcopal Churches. But the tradition did not command universal assent.

Eusebius and Epiphanius, reasoning from Matthew 2:16, put the coming of the Magi two years after His birth. And others have thought the 6th of January selected for convenience, rather than as having any direct chronological connection with the event.

If we now ask the grounds upon which, aside from this tradition, the coming of the wise men is placed so soon after the birth, and before the presentation in the Temple, the more important are these: first, "now when Jesus was born" (Matthew 2:1), implies that the one event speedily followed the other.

Second, directly after the presentation, Jesus went with His parents to Nazareth (Luke 2), and that therefore the presentation must have been preceded by their visit.

Thirdly, at the coming of the Magi, Herod first heard of the birth of Jesus, but if the presentation at the Temple had previously taken place, he must have heard of it, as it had been made public by Anna (Luke 2:38).

But none of these reasons is decisive. There is nothing that proves that they came as soon as He was born, or that an interval of two months may not have elapsed.

The opinion of many of the fathers that they found Him still in the manger, or stall, may be true if the manger was in a cave in the rear of the house.

The statement of Luke, that "when they had performed all things according to the law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee, to their own city Nazareth," has often been interpreted as affirming that they went directly from the Temple to Nazareth without any return to Bethlehem. But this interpretation is arbitrary.

It is apparent that Luke does not design to give a full history of Christ's infancy. He says nothing of the Magi, of the murder of the children, of the flight into Egypt.

Whatever may have been the motive of this omission, which many critics ascribe to ignorance, nothing can be inferred from this concerning Luke's accuracy.

County, Alta Vista have to regroup after not getting road grant

Engineer tells supervisors that federal rural grant goes to interchange in Cedar Rapids; V18 project from AV to Elma imperiled

It was the federal government's version of coal in the stockings of Chickasaw County and the city of Alta Vista, and it is sending county and city officials back to the drawing board.

Chickasaw County Engineer Roman Lensing told the Board of Supervisors Tuesday morning that the county and city will not be receiving a portion of a federal Rural Service Grant that would have helped pay for a much-needed road construction project of County Road V18 from the south limits of Alta Vista to the Howard County town of Elma.

"The feds' opinion of rural is an interchange by Cedar Rapids," Lensing said, "[so it's] back to the drawing board on that — figuring out how we're

going to foot the bill for that cost. Alta Vista, of course, is in the same boat. ... We need to have some discussion with the city at some point."

Not getting the grant won't affect a road project that will be done this year on V18 from Highway 18 to the south city limits of Alta Vista that will include concrete overlay and about 2,600 feet of total road reconstruction in North Washington.

That project is still set to be let sometime this month.

The bigger project, though, is on hold, although Lensing said preliminary engineering on the project will continue through March.

"It's going to have to be addressed whether or not the county wants to assist the city with payment or what we want to do there," he said. "Everything technically outside

the center 22 is their baby." Lensing was referring to the fact that the county is responsible for the center 22 feet of V18 as it passes through Alta Vista. The city is responsible for any other items that are not in the county's jurisdiction.

"They were going to have a hard time making it work with the grant," said Supervisors Steve Breitbach, whose district includes Alta Vista, "so I don't know how they're going to handle it now."

The supervisors and Lensing discussed a variety of options — from shrinking the scope of the project to using TIF money to help Alta Vista with some of its costs to pursuing other grants.

The county also needs to figure out how it can meet its costs. Lensing said if the county used its Farm to Market Fund, "it would take a while to foot

that bill, and everyone knows that the road in Alta Vista is pretty bad."

Supervisor Jake Hackman said he was not in favor of having the county doing its portion of the project without the city involved.

"I think it it would be foolish to just do the 22 feet," he said, "and then they have to come back and do theirs later. It would be cheaper to do any kind of improvement all together."

Lensing agreed and also expressed his disappointment with the grant decision.

"We tried pretty hard to get that grant, a lot of work was put into it. I mean this was seven counties putting this application together, so it was pretty sad to get that before Christmas, too, when they said it would be March until they announced it."

the time saying it was "the right thing to do."

Kuhn was then re-elected to the chair at the beginning of 2023 on a 4-1 vote, with Hackman voting for himself. But Kuhn's second year leading the board had its rocky

moments, especially this past spring when Suckow suggested that the board replace its chairman.

But Kuhn refused to resign, and during an April 17 meeting, no motion was made to remove him and he finished out the year as chairman.

Cerwinski, a former Nashua city coun-

cilman, knocked off three-term incumbent Tim Zoll in the 2022 Republican primary for the District 2 seat that represents the southwestern part of the county, including the city of Nashua.

He then ran unopposed in that year's general election and took his seat on the board in January 2023.

• The parking meters in New Hampton have netted \$5599.00 up to Dec. 14. They were put in operation on June 10.  
This is an approximate average of \$933.00 per month or an average of about \$215.37 per week. Half of the proceeds of the meters go to the company that installed them until they are paid for.

**1973 (50 years ago)**  
• One of downtown New Hampton's older buildings - "Hansen Building" - in the

100 block of North Chestnut Avenue, was razed last week to make way for a modern parking lot. Security State Bank purchased the building from the late Henry F. Hansen.

# Salvation Army unit coordinator passes out 'thank you's' after a record year

Markham was effusive as she talked about Fareway and its store leaders for providing the Salvation Army and its bell ringers space to conduct the campaign.

"We're so grateful for all they do and that's really where it

starts," she said. "We have to have a place that we can call home and they give us one for the weeks we're ringing the bell."

Markham said more than 115 area residents took shifts ringing the bell this year, and

she appreciated the number of businesses and organizations that also signed up for a day of bell-ringing.

"We filled all the shifts," she said, "and that's pretty impressive for a small county like ours. We're ringing the bell from 8 to 7 pretty much every day, and when you start adding it up, that's a lot of one-hour shifts to cover. I can't thank the bell

ringers enough for all their work."

She said the "cool thing" about this year's bell ringers was the fact that they included a number of children who tagged along with their parents for shifts.

"The kids really get into it," Markham said, "and they have such big hearts, too. I mean how can you walk by a cute child and not donate, right?"

The "big" kettle at Fareway brought in most of the money to this year's campaign, but Markham pointed out that members of the Fredericksburg Lions Club brought in \$318 while ringing the bell at their community's Hometown Christmas celebration.

Meanwhile, the mini-kettles at Casey's in New Hampton and Fredericksburg and Klunder's Kafe in New Hampton brought in a combined \$391.

Markham also pointed out that the 2023 campaign ended with a bang as the Salvation

Army collected more than \$900,000 on Friday, Dec. 22 and about \$800,000 on Saturday, Dec. 23, which was especially impressive considering that the final day of the campaign was a "shortened" one as bell ringers were on duty just from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"Fareway, the bell ringers, the people who donate, they all show what a caring community we live in," she said.

And the Salvation Army will begin putting that money to use now that it's 2024. In addition to providing for emergencies, the unit has used funds collected in the past to help struggling residents with things like rent and utility bills and has donated funds to area schools to support children who need clothing, school supplies, coats and gloves.

In fact, Markham said she'll write her first two checks of the year this week to help New Hampton Elementary School and St. Joseph Community Schools to "catch up" on their past-due afternoon milk accounts.

"We're ready to help people," she said, "and thanks to everyone who donated, we can do so."

# Thomson expects some controversy on education

to defund somebody else," said Thomson, who is in the middle of his first House term and represents all of Floyd and Chickasaw counties and much of Bremer County. "This is a big problem. We're going to have a fight about this."

Currently, cities in Iowa can max out their basic levies at \$8.10 per \$1,000 valuation but other levies, including those that are approved by voters, can be added. New Hampton has voter-approved levies, for example, that provide 27.5 cents per \$1,000 valuation to both the library and the Carnegie.

Under HF 718, though, those levies will have to count toward the \$8.10 limit by 2029. Murphy spoke out against the levy, pointing out that "it seems to be that the best kind of government is closest to the people ... I'm asking [you] to have this amended to empower us to tax ourselves."

Thomson said he has no issue with the intent of HF 718, but he said he has plenty of issues with how it will be implemented.

"They want to be cutting the overall tax burden, and that's fine. I think if you do the math — comparing Iowa to other jurisdictions — we are not getting our dollar's worth on

government service. Our overall spending per person is too high."

But he supports reversing some aspects of the bill Gov. Kim Reynolds signed into law in 2023.

"The people in Des Moines are saying we're cutting your taxes, see? But what they're doing is cutting somebody else's budget and saying 'you figure it out.' Well, that's not a very responsible way of doing it."

New Hampton City Councilwoman Mindy Humpal told the first-term legislator that "we're having a hard time understanding how people sitting in Des Moines have a better understanding about how the local citizens here want to spend their money."

Thomson said he believes some of the issues with HF 718 show the divide not between political parties but the urban and rural parts of the state.

"The people in Des Moines who have the megaphones in the Legislature tend to be the urban and suburban representatives, from places like Grimes," Thomson said. "Not that there is anything wrong with those places, they're very nice, but we choose not to live there. The economics of running government and running a town are very different in Grimes than they are here."

He promised that "I intend to make a nuisance of myself on that issue" when the Legislature convenes for its 2024 session on Monday, Jan. 8.

Among the other issues Thomson touched on Friday were education, his opposition to allowing Chinese interests to purchase ag land in Iowa and the issue of books being removed from school libraries in the state.

On education, he said he believes there's going to be "a lot of money" moving to schools, but he added that he expects the education debate to be controversial over the next few months.

"It's going to come with some reductions that people won't like because there's a sense that there's been overspending in some areas," Thomson

said. "One area in particular I can think of is school facilities and how PPEL is working that has encouraged in some places overbuilding and discarding perfectly fine facilities."

He said he would remain vigilant when it comes to any bills that allowed Iowa farmland to be sold to China, pointing out that he led the charge to reverse a bill in 2023 that "they tried to sneak past us."

Asked by Becker about the possibility of school librarians being jailed if they allow some books to get into the hands of students, Thomson said that the press has overplayed the issue.

"The press has seen a great opportunity to say that we're banning books, which is absolutely not true," he said. "We're not banning anything, we're

restricting the availability of obscene material to children without parental consent."

And he returned to education late in the meeting, saying he has yet to see a bill that would dismantle Area Education Agencies in the state. He sounded a common theme when he said that he's in favor of looking for "the fat" in all government spending, but he also said that AEAs also provide valuable services.

Thomson said one of his goals is to improve Iowa's K-12 education system, one that he said several times have regressed in recent years.

"Now we have to do the heavy lifting of bringing Iowa's public schools back to being the best in the country ... and that's not one session worth of work. That will be going on for years."

# Former mayor now on council

to Denner, Larsen and Speltz, included council members Katie Fisher, Mindy Humpal and Kalista Porath, all of whom are in the middle of terms they won during the 2021 election.

Geerts won a three-way race for the mayoral office as he beat incumbent Bobby Schwickerath and Melanie Schmitt in the municipal and school election that took place on Nov. 7. A lifelong resident of New Hampton, Geerts served on the Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors from 2013 to 2019 and also was the New Hampton Fire Department chief for more than 24 years.

Denner is beginning his third term as an at-large member of the City Council. First elected in 2015, he ran unopposed in both 2019 and 2023.

Larsen served as mayor from 2016 to 2019 but lost a re-election bid to Schwickerath in the 2019 election. She will be taking over the Ward 1 seat that has been held by Cory McDonald, who did not seek re-election.

Like Larsen, Speltz was elected as a write-in candidate. He was appointed to the Ward 3 council seat in the spring of 2022 after then-Councilman Bob Boos resigned the seat he had won in the 2019 election.

# Losing the guy who helped me stay sober long ago just aches

When you first come into AA, one of the things you hear often is the importance of finding a sponsor, finding someone "who has what you want" and for me, 27 years ago, that was Jim Crawford.

So when I saw the Caring Bridge post on the first morning of 2024, my heart broke. The night before, his daughters wrote, Jim had passed away. He was 74, but he was a young 74 until the cancer came knocking at the door in November.

Jim, more than anyone else in my early sobriety, taught me the way to a better life. It may sound melodramatic, but without Crawford, there's no Josh, there's no Noah, there's no Abby, there's no me being the me I've been for the last 27 years.

In other words, blame him! We were two completely different people; he was blue collar; I couldn't turn a screw the right way. But that is the beauty of recovery; people who would not normally mix help each other stay sober and have a good life.

And Jim had a really good life — especially when he put down the bottles and said no to the drugs.

I have a million Jim Crawford stories, starting with lying to his kids about his birthday.

In Mason City, where we met, they shoot off the Independence Day fireworks on July 3, which happened to be Jim's birthday. I guess the sentiment is that Mason City's fireworks can't compete with those that are shot off in Clear Lake on the actual holiday. They have a point. Fireworks in a football stadium are cool, but they're nothing compared with those shot over a lake.

Jim loved telling the story how he told his daughters Sarah and Annie that Mason City's July 3 fireworks were for his birthday, and I remember when Annie was

fresh out of high school asking her about it and her giving me this cool Crawford smile and saying, "Too soon, Bob, too soon." Thankfully, the Crawford girls spared their little brother, Samuel, from Jim's mischief.

But there are plenty of other stories I'll never forget.

There was the time he was helping build the wastewater treatment facility in Clear Lake and he gave us a "tour" of the you-know-what plant and told us how it worked. Put it this way, he saved a bundle that night, which was supposed to end with Jim buying the Dairy Queen, but when you find out how a you-know-what plant works, the appetite disappears for a few days.

There were the million times he'd pull a quote out of "the book I have next to my bed" and all 1,000,000 times, it was the exact quote that you needed to hear at the exact time.

There was the day he "changed the rules" on his sponsee. When he first became my sponsor, he told me to call him before I drank. Six times in the next year, I bought beer, called him and we poured it down the sink. The sixth time, he had had enough. "Listen, you stupid \*&^%\$&\*", I'm the sponsor and I can change the rules so from now on, call me before you buy and instead of wasting money on this \$%&^, you can take me out to lunch."

There was the night after he moved to St. Paul when we talked for two hours and I asked him what project his crew was working on in the Twin Cities? "I'm building the Gophers new football stadium." He kept saying it over and over, and I knew I had him. "Hey, isn't humility part of the program?" And he quickly shot back with, "Yeah, I got 400 or 500 friends helping me."

We didn't see each other often anymore, but when we did, it was like we had been talking every day instead of once every six months or a year.

I loved following his Facebook page, especially when he posted about his three granddaughters because Jim was the absolute best grandfather this world has ever known. He knew the most valuable gift he could give them was his time ... and the couch on "Frappy Fridays" when he and the granddaughters visited a local coffee shop. Seriously, the pride he in those three girls — along with his own children — was a lesson for all of us who are dads and/or grandpas.

Today, though, I keep going back 27 years ago when I first met Jim in an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting room, and I knew he had what I wanted. He was comfortable in his own skin. He told me enough stories of his using days that I came to know he wasn't always like that, but somehow, through the grace of God and those damn meetings, he was when I met him. I wanted that, and I figured the best way to get it was to have him be my sponsor. And besides, watching him play Tetris or go on a political rant were nice bonuses (sorry for the inside jokes here).

He taught me a staple that has kept me sober all these years, and it flew in the face of everything we learned in treatment, where they told us over and over again that we had to do "it for ourselves."

Crawford taught me that was bullcrap, although as you can see from this column, his language was always on the colorful side.

"They're right ... for 355, 360 days a year, you'd better be doing it for yourself. But for God sakes, we're alcoholics," he told me. "There's going to be 5, 10 days a year that our answer is going to be to pick up the bottle and those days, you latch on to people that you're being sober for." Early on, it was my niece and nephew. And then I got married and Abby, thankfully, was part of the package. And then we had Josh and Noah.

So for 355, 360 days a year, I stay sober for me, but 5, 10 days a year, I do it for Abby, Josh and Noah. By God, it has worked for 27 years, 9 months and 9 days. And a carpenter named Jim Crawford taught me that lesson.

Seeing the post New Year's Day, it ... well, it hurt. With apologies to my mom and dad, this may be the worst ache I've ever felt. Jim Crawford meant that much to me. As I read the Caring Bridge, I had a good cry.

The ending is impeccable, and even though I'm supposed to be the writer, I can't come up with anything better so I'll conclude with this when it comes to my friend, Jim Crawford.


"He would be the first to say that he wasn't perfect, but we really think he was."


Start with Eichenberger, who breezed to the finals with a trio of falls before falling to Kalen Westerfield of Council Bluffs Lewis Central in the finals.

## Trojan girls end 2023 with best game

Here's hoping momentum can last a couple of weeks.

Or at least that's the thought of Turkey Valley girls basketball coach Steve Hoffert, who ended their 2023 portion of the schedule with their best game of the season to date.

Steinlage also grabbed a team-high 10 rebounds, dished out eight assists and made eight steals while Bodensteiner finished with eight rebounds and five steals.

Against Central Elkader, Hoffert said his team did a "good job defensively for the most part" but he added that a focus for Turkey Valley over Christmas break was to "identify shooters better."

Steinlage led the Trojans in the loss with nine points.

Turkey Valley returns to the court tonight (Thursday) when it travels to Riceville to face the 10-0 Wildcats before heading to Lansing on Friday for a UIC game against Kee.

## Trojan boys give Postville battle in final game of 2023

It wasn't the way the Turkey Valley boys basketball team wanted to end 2023, but the Trojans showed that they could be a team to be reckoned with down the stretch in the Upper Iowa Conference.

After rolling to a 59-27 victory over Central Elkader on Dec. 19, Turkey Valley wrapped up its pre-Christmas schedule with a trip to Postville, where for three quarters, the Trojans gave the 8-3 Pirates all they could handle.

But Postville used a 24-8 fourth quarter run to gain a 66-48 victory.

"It was a tough way to end the year. We got healthy last few games and guys wanted this game going to break," coach John Izer said. "We fought hard and took our first lead in the fourth quarter, but we couldn't get it to grow."

Turkey Valley was led by Caleb Kurtenbach, who hit 5-of-11 3-pointers on his way to scoring 21 points while both J.D. Kruse and Russell Nieman had seven points.

Against Central Elkader, Turkey Valley blew the game open with a 23-3 third quarter.

Oliver Schmitt led the Trojans with 18 points and eight rebounds while Kurtenbach added 12 points and three assists. Kruse finished with nine points and six rebounds while Logan Busta had seven rebounds and six assists.

The final week split left the Trojans at 4-4 overall and 3-4 in the UIC, but Izer said he was proud of the way his Trojans responded to an injury bug that left them without experienced players like Schmitt and Kurtenbach.

"We went into the season worried about depth and because of injuries had to press some young kids earlier than I wanted to," the Turkey Valley coach said. "Cale Langreck and Jordan Kriener got thrown in early and handled it just fine for not having any idea they'd see varsity action this year. Lots of season left, some of the adversity with our health we dealt with should help us going forward."

University of Iowa freshman said, "and I just hoped it was enough. When they said the distance, I don't know if I've ever felt quite like that. I love New Hampton, I loved being a Chickasaw and to win a state title for my school on my last jump, that was huge."

There were plenty of other great moments throughout the year that was.

Coach Eric Olson's girls golf team rolled through another banner year, one that included a gutty NEIC championship that saw the Chickasaws face their stiffest challenge since it began its conference dominance in 2015. New Hampton's final margin was a mere three strokes over second-place Waverly-Shell Rock.

"We didn't make it pretty, and we didn't make it easy on ourselves," Olson said, "but hey, eight straight. We got 'er done."

Three weeks later, the Chickasaws, led by Lauren Nuss' sixth-place finish, battled their way to a third-place finish at the state meet, marking the fifth time they had earned a top-three finish at the meet with the best teams in the state.

And while the boys in the area had some outstanding moments in 2023, the lone male to crack our top-six list was New Hampton/Turkey Valley's Braden McShane, who wrestled his way to a third-place finish in a loaded 220-pound field at the Class 2A state tournament.

Despite giving up to 20 pounds against his opponents, McShane rolled into the semifinals before falling to eventual state champion Nick Reinicke of Dike-New Hartford, but he showed his mettle by coming back to win both his consolation matches and record a third-place finish.


And the best news of all for NH/TV coach Matt Paulus? McShane's back this year.

"He lost a heartbreaker in the semis," Paulus said. "He will be back with a vengeance next year."

The Chickasaw volleyball team for a second straight year won both the NEIC regular season and tournament titles, and although their season ended in heartbreak with a regional final loss at home to Dubuque Whalert, the

## Girls lead the way in 2023

Rochford's long jump state title, Chickasaw girls golf team's excellence tops our list of top sports stories

There's winning a state title and then there's winning a state title like this.

Carlee Rochford stood on the Drake Relays long jump runway knowing she had just one leap into the sand remaining in her storied career.

And with thoughts of her late grandfather, Jerry Rochford, she came up with the most clutch long jump in the history of New Hampton High School — leaping 17 feet, 10 inches to claim gold at the Class 2A state track and field meet.

"I've worked really hard for this," she said on a gorgeous sunny day in Des Moines. "This was me and my grandpa's event, so I knew he was watching over me today — taking that jump with me."

It put the wraps on a stellar prep career in which Rochford seemed to have an all-access pass to Drake Stadium for both the famed Drake Relays and the Class 2A state meet. Three days after claiming the long jump title, she walked across the stage at New Hampton High School and received her diploma.

But she won't soon be forgotten, and that jump represents the top sports story we covered at the Tribune in 2023, a year in which the Chickasaw girls shined. While Rochford's state title was our top story, New Hampton's girls dominated the top-six list we compiled. The New Hampton girls golf team's runs to an eighth-straight Northeast Iowa championship and a third-place finish at the state meet was second on our list, The Chickasaws' powerful volleyball team's "double NEIC championship" was fourth, the New Hampton Dance Team's state championship was fifth and the start of a new era — sanctioned girls wrestling — was sixth.

But it was Rochford who took top honors, and months later, she talked about that jump as if it were yesterday. "I knew when I took off it was good, really good," she

## A PRETTY DANG GOOD START

FORMER NEW HAMPTON STAR OVERCOMES NERVES, MAKES HER WAY ON IOWA TOP-10 LIST IN COLLEGE DEBUT

Carlee Rochford is the first to admit that the butterflies were floating and the nerves were tingling last month as she made her way to the Hawkeye Indoor Track Facility.

"I'm not going to lie, I was nervous," the 2023 New Hampton High School graduate said. "It was my first meet in college, and all I can say is that I'm glad it's over. The next time won't be quite so nerve-wracking."

Not that the 2023 Jimmy Grant Alumni Invitational was a bad thing for the former Chickasaw star; in fact, nothing could be further from the truth as Rochford placed second in the pentathlon, scoring 3,571 points.

It took all of one meet for Rochford to work her way on to a top-10 Iowa women's track and field list as her point total in the event that includes the 60-meter hurdles, the high jump, the shot put, the long jump and the 800-meter run. Her Jimmy Grant point total placed her ninth on the all-time pentathlon list.

"It was kind of a weird day because I missed some high jumps I never miss," she

said during an interview over Christmas break. "I felt like I jumped a million times that day. It seemed like I had third jumps [at heights] all the time,

but, like I said, I was just really nervous."

Still, her times and distances were excellent as she ran the hurdles in 9.18 seconds, high

jumped 5-5.75, threw the shot 36-9, long jumped 17-8.25 and survived the 800 in a time of 2:37.32.

"Still not my favorite race," she said with a laugh, "but I know I have to get better at it."

She won the pentathlon long jump and set a personal record in the shot put, although she laughed when asked about her throw.

"My coaches looked at me, my dad looked at me, everyone looked at me with that 'what-was-that' look," she said. "The form was awful, and really awful doesn't begin to describe how bad it was."

But she survived, even thrived, despite the nerves. Teammate Annie Wirth won the meet with 3,835 points, which put her third on the all-time Iowa list, while another Iowa freshman, Isabelle Woody finished third with 3,164 points.

Rochford headed back to Iowa City this week, and the rest of the year is going to be, in a word, hectic for the Iowa freshman.

The indoor season runs through early March and then the Hawkeyes head outdoors, where Rochford and her "multi" teammates will compete in the
