Board bucks 'perception,' OKs vehicle purchase

Supervisors say Sheriff's Office needs 'tools' to respond to emergency situations, approve Shawver's request to update 'fleet'

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors Monday morning wrestled with how the public would react to the Sheriff's Office receiving the OK to purchase a new vehicle in light of the fact that the county's budget process that ended last month included eliminating a number of jobs.

Sheriff Ryan Shawver, citing the fact that he is "confident" he will have enough money remaining in his 2025-26 budget, asked board members to approve the purchase of a 2025 Tahoe that he learned has just become available from Karl Chevrolet.

The Sheriff's Office at the end of April still had \$799,000 in its 2024-25 budget, and Shawver pointed out that he did not have a vehicle purchase in

the budget year that ends on June 30 and that he also does not have a vehicle purchase in the 2025-26 budget.

"There are so many unknowns in this profession but I feel comfortable with purchasing this if that's the direction you want to go," Shawver said. "The fleet still needs to be maintained."

He said the Tahoe would cost \$51,464.20 and that he estimated that it would cost in the "high 20s" to out-

fit it.

Board Chairman Jake Hackman said he was "on the fence this morning" about the issue, and Supervisor Issac Carter wondered aloud about how county residents would feel about purchasing a new vehicle so soon after eliminating positions from the Auditor's, Treasurer's and Sheriff's Office, as



well as three positions from Chickasaw County Public Health and Homecare.

"My only concern is the public

Now, we wait for the grass to grow

Landscaper says despite challenges, work wraps up on new playing surface at football stadium

It will take a while for the fruits of his labor to be seen, but as Colin Larsen looked over the football field inside New Hampton High School's stadium on Monday, he couldn't help but smile.

"It's going to be nice, and I'm so excited to

watch the next phase," Larsen said. "The hard work's done — I mean there's still work to be done, I'm not saying that — but the last few weeks, when Mother Nature cooperated at least was nuts."

Larsen, a New Hampton High alum who owns Larsen Landscaping and Lawn, approached the School Board in December about a project he vowed wouldn't cost the school district a

dime. Board members jumped at the chance to re-grade the football field, have an irrigation system installed and the reseeding of the field.

So on April 19, with the first spraying of Roundup to kill off the old grass, Larsen went to work.

Six days later, Ricky Rosonke of Richard's

Memorial for officer who died in the line of duty dedicated in Plainfield

William "Bill" Meadows' final words to his aunt on that fateful night so long ago were "I'll be back."

And 64 years after the Plainfield town marshal lost his life in the line of duty, in a way, he returned to the little Bremer County town on Saturday as more than 100 folks turned out for a moving ceremony in which a memorial bench to honor the life of Meadows was dedicated.

Retired Federal Marshal and former Chickasaw County Sheriff's Deputy Doug Strike and Plainfield resident Kenn Deike spearheaded the fund-raising drive for not only the memorial bench in Plainfield's Veterans Park but also a gravestone that was placed at Meadows' final resting place in a Waverly cemetery.

"I think Uncle Bill would be deeply



Football field improvements come with plenty of 'heroes'

Ground Care began moving dirt — Larsen estimated 90 truckloads were hauled off the field — and then Mother Nature cost the project almost a week of work time with rainy weather.

But on May 4, Larsen and Rosonke went to work on installing the irrigation system, which is controlled by a panel in the stadium's utility room, and on May 9, they put down the HD Sports 2.0 Kentucky Bluegrass Blend seed.

"We ran into a few small hurdles, but nothing catastrophic," Larsen said. "Obviously, when you're doing dirt work, you're going to come across stuff underground that you didn't know what was there. Like, where I wanted to the electrical, we kind of had to have a Plan B for that. ... That's every job."

Still, he pointed out that late in March, when he met with school officials and coaches to go over the plan, he said he hoped his completion date would be May 6.

"So we were only three days behind, which I felt really good about," Larsen said. "If you told me that we're going to lose two days at the beginning and then we lost that entire week [of rain], if you would have told me that I would have still been within three days, I would have been thrilled."

Last week's gorgeous weather certainly helped, and those working on the field worked under the lights to complete the project.

"It was a little hot during the day, I mean we all got sunburned, but Mother Nature owed us one," Larsen said with a laugh.

The project was funded by donations from not only Larsen

but also from Rosonke, the Chickasaw Athletic Booster Club and an anonymous donor.

He said the work done by Rosonke was top notch.

"The guy's an absolute wizard when it comes to dirt work," Larsen said, "and we both up in 60-plus hours last week. We wanted to get it done and get it done right."

The project's manager, if you will, said he was beyond appreciative of the support he received from Superintendent Jay Jurrens, Activities Director Cory McDonald and district's coaches.

"Cory was awesome, Jay awesome at the superintendent level," Larsen said. "The hard part we knew was there going to be some disruption regardless of how you do it. ... The people

that were affected the most was the soccer team. They had planned being up here [at the stadium] all year long, [but New Hampton boys soccer coach] Jeff Monteith was fantastic. He saw long term how this would affect us."

Larsen was also effusive about the Booster Club's commitment to making the re-graded and reseeded field with an irrigation system a reality.

"They're so much more willing to give back, and projects like this are possible because of that," he said. "They support our student-athletes, and the same thing goes for our Music Boosters. They can do things that the district just can't, and it's always why I've been such an advocate for the booster club."

Now, patience is needed, for grass doesn't grow overnight. So when will the playing surface begin to look like a football field or a soccer pitch?

"Hopefully by the end of the week, but here's the kicker: If we see grass by the end of the week, it's going to sit there and it's not going to do a dang thing for about two weeks," Larsen said. "You're just going to see it where it's going to look like little fuzz and it's going to sit there and look like that for two weeks."

But eventually the field will "take off."

"You're really going to see germination in about 28 days, because the temps right now are just perfect. It's exciting, and New Hampton's going to get a great field out of this."

on the building, and on Tuesday, she said in an interview that the building's owner brought an engineer to the city.

"The engineer has said the building is structurally sound," Robinson said on Tuesday.

"Obviously, there was an issue, but

they're working on getting the building repaired and hopefully, we can open up that city street soon."

Robinson said that the building's owner, Mark Vogt, Towncrest Pharmacy (which owns Bennett's) and Brian Tank Masonry have been "phenomenal to work with and they got right to work on it."

Tank has told city officials that, if the

weather cooperates, it will take him about five days to repair the building.


Once that process is completed, Chestnut Avenue and the sidewalk on its west side will reopen.

"What the engineer said is this was a facade problem," Robinson said, "and the engineer emphasized it has nothing to do with the building's integrity."



Be Alert for Caregiver Financial Abuse

Do you have a parent or other elderly relative who may soon need a caregiver?

If so, be diligent when selecting the right person for the job — because choosing the wrong one could lead to big financial problems.

You might find a close family member or friend to serve as caregiver — someone who is honest and trustworthy, with good judgment and strong money management skills. However, in many cases, people hiring caregivers just don't know how they'll perform until the caregivers have begun work. A dishonest caregiver could steal valuables or cash from the person they have been paid to assist or intercept their mail to obtain credit card numbers and other sensitive information to commit identity theft.

So, if you enlist a caregiver and begin having doubts about them, you'll need to watch out for these warning signs of possible financial abuse:

- Efforts to prevent the individual receiving care from speaking to family members

- Inquiries into the location of estate planning documents, such as a will

- Interest in brokerage and retirement accounts, possibly with the intent to change transfer-on-death designations

- Withholding financial or medical information from the family

- Missing jewelry or property

- Requests to be a joint holder on bank or brokerage accounts, sometimes followed by large cash withdrawals paid to the caregiver

- Request for legal authority, such as a financial power of attorney naming only the caregiver

This last item — the request for financial power of attorney, or POA — is particularly concerning because of the scope of duties covered by this type of authority. That's why it's so important that all family members understand what a financial POA can and cannot do.

A general financial POA provides the agent with the authority to act on behalf of an individual's finances, while a limited

financial POA gives the agent the authority only for certain actions, such as paying bills, making withdrawals and opening or closing bank accounts. A general financial POA and a limited financial POA both can be durable, which means they take effect once executed, or springing, which is contingent on a specific event, such as a physical illness, mental incapacity or even a hospitalization.

Unfortunately, some POA agents have abused their responsibility by stealing money, making unauthorized transactions and even attempting to change the beneficiary designations on retirement accounts or insurance policies owned by the people for whom they provide care.

These beneficiary designations can even supersede the instructions left in a will or living trust — and they can't be changed by a financial POA.

If you suspect financial abuse by a caregiver, you can consider contacting your loved one's financial advisor or attorney, if you know who it is. While they can't share information with you, they can check for red flags and contact your loved one directly. You also can get help from your state government.

The National Adult Protective Services Association (NAPS) provides a listing of offices in each state at napsa-now.org/help-in-your-area. Finding a caregiver for a parent or other elderly relative can be emotionally difficult — but it doesn't have to be financially draining. Get to know the caregiver if you can and watch for any red flags, so you can take comfort in knowing that your loved one's finances are in good hands.

As promised, area farmers shift planting season into overdrive

Area agronomists weren't kidding last week when they said the "planting numbers" were going to change dramatically in a week's time.

Put it this way, area growers shifted into high gear, thanks to a giant assist from Mother Nature.

In other words, a bogged-down planting season is no more, at least according to the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition Report that is put out weekly by the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

The latest report that came out Monday showed farmers in the Northeast District that includes Chickasaw County had 6.3 days "suitable" for fieldwork, and area farmers took advantage of it.

According to the May 5 report, just 19 percent of corn and 17 percent of soybeans had been planted in Northeast Iowa. Those numbers jumped big time in the latest report that showed 56 percent of corn and 48 percent of soybeans have

State auditor announces candidacy for governor

Auditor Rob Sand, the only Democrat to currently hold statewide office in Iowa, announced his campaign for governor Monday.

Sand was widely expected to run for the position as a Democratic nominee, having raised more than \$8 million in the 2024 calendar year, according to the Des Moines Register. But Sand is facing a

different playing field for governor than predicted heading into the 2026 election cycle: Gov. Kim Reynolds announced she will not seek reelection in 2026, meaning Republicans are also facing an open primary in the gubernatorial race.

Several Republican elected officials, including Attorney General Brenna Bird, House Speaker Pat Grassley and U.S. Rep. Randy Feenstra have said they are considering a campaign for governor. Iowa Sen.

Mike Bousselot, R-Ankeny, has launched an exploratory committee for the governor's race, and former state Rep. Brad Sherman entered the race in February.

While other Democrats may join the race for governor, Sand is considered a top contender to become the Democratic nominee. Though not competing against an incumbent could be favorable in the race, Sand and Democrats still must win over Iowa voters who

have overwhelmingly elected Republicans in recent years.






A Turkey Valley alum and current Waverly-Shell Rock teacher was honored recently at a ceremony at her alma mater, UNI, with a prestigious state award.





SENIOR NUSS TIES FOR MEDALIST HONORS AS CHICKASAWS CLOSE OUT NEIC WITH 10TH STRAIGHT TITLE

It's the end of the road for the NEIC, but for the New Hampton girls golf team – a new path begins.

Eric Olson's No. 1 ranked Chickasaws – 38-0 on the season – won the final Northeast Iowa Conference girls golf meet on Monday at Cedar Ridge Golf Course in Charles City.

The top dog in Class 2A won its 10th-consecutive league crown dating back to 2016 and NH did it like they have all spring long – in dominant fashion.

New Hampton shot a 346 to claim first place on the leaderboard – 35 strokes better than league runner-up Crestwood's 381.

"The last one ever. That part's sad, but we just wanted to finish it. It's always a goal. It wasn't a goal when I first started. The goal was just to not get last," said Olson, in his 15th year as NH girls head coach. "Once we won it, we didn't want to give it up."

The Chickasaws cruised to the league championship on the hottest day of the year so far as temps reached into the mid-80s on a course that's long with plenty of trees to navigate around.

This wasn't New Hampton's best 18-hole round of the year – they broke the school record with a 325 earlier this year. But they'll take it as the regional opener on Friday at home looms and kickstarts the Chickasaws' quest to secure their second state title in the last six seasons.

"It never gets old. It's always a new group. You just keep plugging away," said Olson about the NEIC title. "The tradition continues. I'm just really proud of them."

New Hampton senior Lauren Nuss



shared medalist honors with friend Ainsley Teeling of Crestwood, a sophomore that fired identical rounds of 41 to finish with an 82.

Nuss, also paired up with Teeling, carded a 38 on the front nine and fired a 44 on the back, to win her second NEIC individual title. She beat Waverly-Shell Rock's Breanna Bodensteiner by a stroke – 92 to 93 – back when she was a freshman in 2022. The Chickasaws actually tied those Go-Hawks – who are no longer in the league – with identical rounds of 406. New Hampton won the tiebreaker to keep its conference win streak alive.

"It's definitely sad. I'm leaving. For the

girls behind us it's going to be moving to a different conference," said Nuss, who will play golf at the University of Northern Iowa. "I also think it's cool my senior year we get to end the conference with a bang and make it 10."

Nuss' little sister – Chickasaw freshman Kirsten Nuss – was medalist runner-up with an 83.

New Hampton had five Chickasaws named all-conference in the two Nuss standouts, along with junior Alivia Geerts, who placed fourth overall with an 89.

At the very least, the tale of that evening at Klunder's fits right in with the class' motto: "There's no limit to the amount of good you can do if you don't care who gets the credit."

This was a class that has had its ups and downs.

competed in as a senior. The Chickasaws' football team went 2-7. The New Hampton basketball team went 4-17. That's a lot more losses than wins, and some would wonder if all that time and effort was worth it.

Ryan Willadsen disagrees.

"I'm glad I did it. I learned a lot about myself, and as much as it sucked losing a lot, it was still fun being with my friends and teammates," he said. "You never get any of those memories back. If I hadn't done it, when I'm an old man, I know I would regret it."

He paused and laughed. "You know, old guy like you," he said.

I laughed, because let's face it, that's my kind of humor.

"Seriously, it was way worth it," Willadsen said. "We kept working hard, we stayed together, we got better."

That all matters, even the giving the old newspaper editor grief.

Over the years, I've covered

members of the Class of 2025 in a variety of activities — from sports to music to plays to the big social events like homecoming and prom. I've literally watched them grow up.

My boys and I moved to New Hampton in December 2009, and the Class of 2025 entered kindergarten in the fall of 2012. I was there for that first day of school. I watched them perform at elementary school Christmas concerts. I officiated some of their games when they were in junior high. And I watched them grow into young men and women during high school.

And sometimes that last line really hits home. Last month, I was clerking a track meet when nature called and I dashed to the restroom. As I passed this guy, I saw he had a Southern Illinois sweatshirt on and made a quick note — hey, nature was really calling — to stop on my way back and

ask the man his Southern Illinois connection.

As I returned to the track, I saw that the man wearing the sweatshirt was Reid Rausch.

I felt like a fool; after all, I've known Reid forever, right? But in that moment, I realized that he wasn't a little kid anymore. Like the rest of his classmates, he was all "grown up."

One of the best parts of working for a small-town newspaper is that reporters like me get to know kids in a way big-city newspaper folk don't. The ups mean a little more and the downs ache a lot more for us. Yes, we're supposed to be unbiased and we try, but the fact is we see these kids a lot. They're more than just subjects for one in a long line of stories.

I tell people I remain in journalism because it gives me the opportunity to write about ordinary people who do extraordinary things. Sometimes, they're biggies

— like Ryan Willadsen saving a guy's life. Sometimes, they're not — like Caleb Utley taking to the soccer pitch so the Chickasaws could play a game last month.

True story. New Hampton was short on players, and Utley basically said, "Hey, I'll play." That's pretty cool — way cool really — even if his soccer career ended that same night when he suffered a concussion during the game.

I'm wandering, I know. Anyone who knows me knows I have a tendency to digress.

My point is the same one I make every year. I'm going to miss this class of seniors.

I'm going to miss the grief they give me — like the time last summer when I wore a Southern Illinois shirt to a New Hampton-Independence softball game. Turns out, SIU's colors perfectly match Indee's. Taylor Ries walked by me, flashed a smile and said, "Nice choice of clothing, Bob."

Hey, I had it coming, and besides, that's my kind of humor.


I remember some of these senior girls when they were fifth-grade basketball players, and it seems like that was yesterday. It wasn't.
